



I should like you to take into immediate consideration the question of getting rid of the re-entrant at present existing in our Front Line across the Valley of the SOMME.

The attached Map shows in black our approximate Front Line, while the green line shows, approximately, a desirable method of straightening our front, gaining ground, and disposing of this re-entrant.

I am opposed, at the present juncture, to undertaking any organised operation to achieve this purpose, but I am convinced that it will be comparatively easy to do so by a process of "nibbling" or sneaking ground. - A precedent for such a procedure is furnished by the gradual advances achieved between MARETT WOOD and the village of VILIE sur ANCRE with practically no loss to us.

In view of the disorganised state of the enemy forces South of the SOMME, it is quite probable that the ground in /Square

Square P.5. could be taken, occupied by standing patrols, and denied to the enemy, without any fighting at all, - provided we act vigorously, and seize the opportunity before the enemy can re-establish himself in this vicinity.

If the spur in P.11 and P.5 thus comes under our control, it should not be a difficult matter, by a process of offensive patrolling by night or in the early dawn, to gradually force the enemy out of any trenches or shell-hole defences which he may be occupying in Squares K.35.d. and K.36.— The use of converging machine gun fire, from the South of the SOMME as well as from the direction of SAILLY LE SEC, and also the use of light trench mortars, should succeed in rooting out any machine gun positions which he may have established in this neighbourhood.— This process, so far as concerns the ground North of the SOMME, could be a gradual one and spread over a series of successive nights.

In the present definitely known very weak condition of the enemy division now astride of the SOMME Valley, it is quite safe to speculate upon the probability that it is impossible for him to undertake anything like a determined attack down the valley in the early future. - Consequently, there would seem to be very little risk in slightly weakening those battalions which are holding our ground astride of the SOMME, in order to provide the necessary patrols and small offensive parties, which would be requisite to



carry out these operations on the lines indicated.

At, or near the new inter-divisional boundary, it will be necessary for the "B" and the "C" Divisions to confer and work in collaboration.

Further Artillery cooperation is being arranged which will take the form of a barrage along the whole Divisional front, and on portions of the fronts of Flank Divisions, and of counter-battery work. barrages along the front will be arranged in accordance with the wishes of Brigade Commanders concerned.
- 4. U.O.C. 12th A.I.Bde. will arrange the details of the advance, and for cooperation with flank brigades.
- A contact aeroplane will fly at 4.30.a.m., and will call for red flares by sounding a succession of "A's" on the Klaxon horn.
- 6. Zero hour for the operation North of the SOMME will be 12.15.a.m., 8th July.



REPORT ON MINOR OPERATION CARRIED OUT BY 54th BATTALION. NIGHT 7th/8th JULY 1918.

1. Brief recountal of plan. In conjunction with 4th Australian Division (46th Battalion) who were operating on right, the 54th Battalion were ordered to push out from their present line to a line J.36.b.l.3 -J.30.d.50.00.

(a). Object. To straighten out line and improve present position.

(b) To kill or capture the enemy.

2. Recountal of events. The operation was carried out by 3 platoons. 2 platoons with objectives enemy posts J.36.b.4.8 - J36.b.4.9. Without artillery preparation and according to plan party rushed enemy posts and found them unoccupied. Consolidation began and new posts were dug. Just before reaching objective two stick bombs were thrown at party but no enemy were seen. A platoon with objective enemy post J. 36.b.2.3 advanced under artillery barrage, objective was successfully reached and found clear of the enemy. This post was consolidated and touch was made with right (46th Battalion) and left flanks. Consolidation was carried out until daylight and new line is a series of posts on line J.3.b.10.30-J.30.d.50.00. At Zero plus 3 minutes in reply to our barrage enemy artillery barrage came down between front and support line, this was supported by minenwerfer and M.G. fire which continued intermittently until Zero plus 2 hours 40 minutes. All posts showed recent signs of occupation; a number of M.G. belts and stick bombs were found in each post. Our casualties were 11 other ranks slightly wounded. (M.G. and M. W. fire.

3. Deductions. Both parties kept good direction and objectives were reached without any hitch, again proving the fact that a thorough reconnaissance of objective and ground over which an operation is to take place, is essential.

BATTLE STATIONS PRACTICE

- 1. It is intended at an early date, and by night, to carry out the manning of battle stations on the Army front for practice purposes.
- 2. (a) On the evening of date selected the following telegrams Will be sent by Australian Corps to Divisions and units allotted for garrisons in ARMY SYSTEM:-

"Battle stations practice acknowledge".

- (b) Recipients will acknowledge receipt by wire to Australian Corps: -"Acknowledged Practice".
- As soon as all troops are in their allotted positions Divisions and Os.C. Sub-Sections Army System will wire Australian Corps:-"Position Practice".
- 3. No movement in connection with the practice will take place before 8.30 p.m.; in the forward areas no movement will take place until after dark.
- On receipt of wire from Australian Corps to Divisions and Os. C. Sub-sections: -"Normal dispositions".

normal dispositions will be resumed; when this has been completed Divisions and Os.C. Sub-sections will wire to Australian Corps:-

"Normal practice".

5. (i) ARMY SYSTEM.

Full strength garrisons of troops allotted to the . ARMY SYSTEM under Australian Corps Instructions for the Defensive No. 54, will be employed; paragraph 6 of above instructions will not apply in this practice.

(ii) 2nd or CORPS ZONE.

All troops definitely allotted as garrisons in Divisional Schemes for Defence will man their stations, and counter attack troops will fall in on their alarm posts.

The above will not affect reliefs, or troops who normally

stand to in the morning and evening.

With reference to this, the Reserve Brigade, on receipt of message shown in 2 (a), will take action as detailed in para. 4 of Section F. "C" Division Defence Scheme. The messages shown in 2 (b) 2 (c) and 4 will also be used between Divisions and Brigades and Battalions.

(iii) FOR VARD ZONES.

No troops in forward zone will be affected.

- 6. The artillery will not fire any special programme in connection with the exercise.
- 7. Every opportunity will be taken during the exercise to discover any points in connection with existing orders and arrangements which require adjustment, and all Staff Officers of formations concerned that can be spared from other duties must be employed throughout the practice for this purpose.
- 6. Communications will be tested during this practice; reports will be rendered later by units concerned giving the time taken from receipt of wire "Battle Stations practice acknowledge" to the completion of the meaning.
 - 9. It is essential that no orders should be issued which can in any way be interpreted to indicate that an/hostile attack is anticipated.

Care must therefore be exercised that all orders issued signify clearly that they are only concerned with a practice operation.



It is proposed to exchange this party with a party of similar strength from III Corps.

This party will be employed by the III Corps to organize, train, and lead patrols. The object in view is to assist the III Corps units, which consist in a great measure of men who have had very little experience in FRANCE, to raise the standard of patrolling.

It is essential, therefore, that men of experience and knowledge in patrolling, and leading patrols should be selected. They will be withdrawn by the 15th July and put into training under the Commandant 15th Infantry Brigade School pending further detailed instructions.

The G.O.C. Division desires that the 15th Infantry Brigade should provide the extra School Staff necessary to carry out this plan.

5. Similarly the party from the III Corps will be put through a short course at the School before being used in the line. They will then be distributed amongst units in the line and will take part in patrols.

The handbook to be used when training the above parties is S.S. 195 "Scouting and Patrolling". A syllabus based on the above will be drawn up by the Commandant 15th Brigade School and submitted through 15th Infantry Brigade to this office on the 14th instant,

7. A definite time limit for the absence from their units of the parties referred to in para. I to be arranged by Australian Corps with III Corps.

8. (a) Extra tentage etc. required for accommodation will be demanded from Divisional Headquarters.

(b) Any casualties to troops of III Corps while attached either to 15th Brigade School or afterwards to units will be reported separately from Casualty Reports of troops of this Division. A nominal roll is to kept by units of the men attached and should any casmalties occur the fullest details available are to be forwarded for transmission to III Corps.



Report on Raid carried out by 57th Battalion against

Enemy Posts at E.26.A.2-9.

I have to report as follows regarding the Raid carried out last night by the 57th Battalion on the posts above mentioned.:

- 1. "Zero hour was 12.15 a.m. . The barrage fell exactly to time and was satisfactory throughout. The 3" Stokes Mortars bombarded the posts from Zero to Zero plus 2 and then lifted to the left of the posts to be raided where they formed a block. Though the BLUE cartridges were used the firing was accurate and by concentrating the whole eight mortars of the battery on this task the decreased rate of fire was made up.
- 2. "From Zero to Zero plus 6 minutes the enemy fired ordinary white flares from the vicinity of where the barrage was falling. A few Orange Clusters also went up. At Zero plus 6 minutes double Green flares were fired from the enemy posts to the North of the objective and repeated to the rear in relays.
- 3. "On the 3" Stokes barrage lifting the Raiding Party advanced and about 12 of the enery were seen leaving the trench and making for the rear. Bombs were thrown at them but on account of the crop the result could not be ascertained. A subsequent search in the vicinity did not lead to the discovery of any enemy casualties. The enemy wire was found to be effectively cut and the enemy posts were rushed and found to be unoccupied. The posts and vicinity were searched but no enemy or dead were found.
- 4. "From members of the Raiding Party it has been ascertained that the enemy defences in this locality consist of a series of posts about 4'6" to 5'6" in depth, fairly wide, resembling organised shell holes connected by little more than aspitlocked trench. There were two small listening posts about 25 yards in front. The main posts contained a poor class of trench shelter which were badly knocked about by our trench mortar fire.
- 5. "At Zero plus 8 the enemy placed a heavy barrage on out front and support lines. This is the first time since being in the sector that the enemy has retaliated on our front line in the left subsector of the Brigade front. Scattered shelling reached as far back as the Reserve Company.
- 6. "Our casualties were one killed and four wounded (slightly). All these casualties occurred in our own trenches when returning.
- 7. "Strength of Raiding Party, I Officer and 40 Other Ranks. O.C. Raid Captain W. H. L. McDONALD. O. C. Attack, Lieut. F. J. KENEALY, 57th Battalion.
- 8. "No identifications were obtained and no equipment or material, posts being badly knocked about and quite empty.
- 9. "There is no doubt that casualties were infliced on the enemy in rear. During the preliminary wirecut ing shoots on the loth July casualties were inflicted. 3 wounded left a post, one being a stretcher case.

10. 'All arrangements for the raid worked well and there is nothing special to be prought to notice.





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APPENDIX.

LECTURE.

GIVING AWAY INFORMATION.

To be given to every Platoon of the Australian Corps at fortnightly intervals.

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As you all know, information about the enemy is essential to the winning of a battle. The bulk of the information and the most valuable, is that which is obtained from prisoners of war.

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If by any chance one of you should be taken prisoner, the only information which you are required to give is your NAME AND The enemy knows this as well as you do and resorts to RANK. many means of endeavouring to obtain the information which he requires in order to make his plans for the slaughter of your comrades. He will bully you, and threaten you, he may even threaten to shoot you or to starve you, in order to try and bluff you into giving away information. Sturdy men will not be overcome by this means, and so, the enemy resorts to more cunning methods. By a careful collection of information from all sorts of sources, he has obtained the names of a certain number of commanders of battalions and brigades. He has also discovered the movement of certain divisions. He uses this knowledge with great cleverness, and theman is sometimes surprised to find that the friendly German he is talking to appears to know more about the affairs of the A.I.F. than he himself does. This put him off his guard and he quite unconsciously gives away information which leads to the loss of the lives of many of his comrades.

German Army on this matter says: - "recently there has been an "increase in the number of French prisoners who give extraordinary "little information. They state as a rule they have recently "arrived as drafts or have recently arrived from leave. It appears "that they have been trained to give the replies stated above when "captured and thus avoid being asked further questions. I direct "That the troops be instructed to give similar answers". This method of the French of avoiding giving information is one, which we may well follow. If a man allows himself to be drawn into conversation on military matters he is bound to give away valuable information without the least intention of doing so, and even though he does not know that he is doing so.

The most dangerous method for us, and the eleverest means which the enemy has adopted to outwit our men whom he may capture, is the introduction of decoys for getting information. These are men wearing Australian or British uniforms with Australian or British badges, and with certain knowledge of units to which they pretend to belong. They mingle in an unobtrusive way with the prisoners and listen to their conversation with one another, and engage in conversation with them, and so matters are brought out. These decays are used in Prisoner of ar eages and numerous instances have been discovered where they have been brought into hospitals bandaged up and apparently suffering from wounds. Their dummy wounds are dressed every day and they are put in beds beside the prisoners.

The enemy has another trick of using a listening instrument which records all conversations carried on between prisoners even when in their huts. Even faint whispers can be recorded by this instrument.

If you want to play the game by your comrades, if you do not want to sacrifice their lives, follow one single rule SAY NOTHING TO ANYBODY. Avoid conversations, give your NAME and RANK only, do not start trying to bluff, but refuse to give any further information. The at one time captured some of our Australians in the neighbourhood of WARNETON. A German Intelligence Summary snoke of these Australians as absolutely refusing to give any information whatever and refusing point blank to discuss any military matters at all. The Germans paid a great tribute to these men and held them up as an example to the German Army.

A German Summary of the 109 German Division issued in May, which fell into our hands, gave the details of the Headquarters of a Brigade and a camp where Australian troops were billetted in our present sector. These places were immediately shelled and bombed and several of our good men were killed and wounded. A map captured at HAMEL showed a headquarters of one of our Brigades in the vicinity, and the headquarters of two of the battalions in the line, and the boundaries between battalions. All of this information was given by men who had been captured.

A man who is captured should not imagine that he is going to gain any further consideration from the enemy by giving information. It will not make any difference to his treatment. Silence and endurance will gain the respect of the enemy - giving information will gain their contempt. In either case you will not recaive any very great consideration at the hands of the enemy.

that it has been established that the German attack of the 9th June was revealed to the French by the statements of prisoners. and it was due to this information alone that the French were able to meet the German attack. He goes on to say the majority of the men who were made prisoners do not realise to what extent statements, even on insignificant matters, not only endanger the lives of their comrades but compromise the success of their attacks and raids. This is equally true in our case.

Remember that your speech may cause the loss of the lives of your best friends and comrades: that no harm can come to you by maintaining silence and keeping a still tongue.

1.- A satisfactory practice was carried out near VAUX-en-AMIENOIS on 10th instant, by units of 3rd Aust. Division, to demonstrate the co-operation of Tanks with Infantry in the attack.

2.- The normal formation for the attack was adopted and the five Tanks started at zero some distance behind the "jumping off line", and passed through the infantry at the first halt of the barrage.

3.- No. 27 phosphorous rifle grenades were satisfactorily used by the Infantry as a signal to the Tanks to indicate hostile points of resistance which were holding up the Infantry advance.

The new Stokes Mortar flare bomb was also successfully used for this purpose by a section of a Stokes Mortar battery which was

supporting the attack.

The Tanks responded well to both the above signals and in all cases at least two Tanks turned on seeing the signal and dealt with the opposition. As soon as the Tanks considered they had dealt with a hostile strong point, they flew a green and white flag (signal to the Infantry to "come on") and waited in the vicinity until the strong point was "taken over" by the Infantry.

- 4.- The simple flag signals from Tanks to Infantry do not appear to be universally known and quickly recognised by Infantry Officers and N.C.O's. There was obvious hesitation on the part of the Infantry on a Tank flying a flag of any sort.
- 5.- The experiment was tried of having a trained Infantry scout or observer in the turnet of each Tank to act as liaison between the Tank and the Infantry Company which it was supporting. His duty was to watch closely the movements of the Infantry, to watch for signals from them and to look out for hostile points of pesistance. The experiment worked well.

His presence in the Tank does not unduly crowd the Tank crew.

6.- The steel helmet raised on the top of a rifle proved a useful general signal from the Infantry to indicate "we want a Tank to help us". The signal is not yet fully understood by platoon and section commanders.
