



APPENDIX

REPORT ON WORK OF R.H.A. BATTERIES WITH ABZAC MOUNTED DIV. DURING THE RECONNAISSANCE TO MAZAR BETWEEN 14th & 19th SEPT. 1916.

Ref.:- SINAI. Map. 1 125000. KATIA and BAHOAWIL sheet.

UNITS ENGAGED.

The Battories employed were the Ayrchire and the Inverness-shire, with their (2nd & 3rd) L.H. Bde. Ammitn. Columns and also that of the Leicestershire Battery (lot L.H.Bdo.)

PRELIBIRARY HOVES.

On Monday 11th September, the Inverness Battery marched out from ROMANI to HOD EL AMARA relieving there one section of the Somerset Battery which came back to BOHANI.

On Wednesday, 13th September, the AYRSHIRE Bty. marched out to AMARA.

On Saturday, 18th September, both batteries and ReasHelle marched with 3rd LeHeBdee to SALMANA where they arrived at 3. a.m. and remained for the day.

The three Bds. Ammtn. Columns (1st, 2nd & Srd) assembled at BIR BL ABD by 6. a.m. on the 15th Sept.

THE MARGIL.

DEPLOYMENT.

The Batteries marched at 5,15 pem. for the Est Rendezvous, 40 miles E. of SALAMANA on the telegraph line reaching there, without incident about 1900. Here the 2nd L.H. Bde. joined the troops from SALMANA, the whole forming the main Column for the advance on MAZAR.

At 2050 the main Column moved off Bastwards over good ground for the first 5 miles, the batteries keeping up easily with the L.H. Later the going became rough sand dunes covered with scrub, and the guns found difficulty in keeping their place in the Column. A steep and narrow defile was spassed about 12 miles B. of SALMANA, when hard, level ground was again found about

12 midnight, after the moon had risen.
Near here was the 2nd Rendezvous, whence Gen. ROYSTON'S Column of Srd L.H. Bde. moved off S. Bastwards to meet a Battalion and 2 Hountain Guns of the Camel Corps and attack HAZAR at 0500 from S. and S.E. in conjunction He had orders to withdraw if he encountered severe resistance, without getting seriously involved.

With this Column was sent an Artillery Officer to endeavour to communicate taggets and to facilitate co-operation with the main Column. He carried a helio and got touch with Div. Hd. Grs. about 0700, but was unable to do more than indicate his own position.

INTERCOMMUNICATION.

All troops of the L.H. Bdes. also carried small red flags to wave, so as to mark progress and to show their positions to the Artillery in rear.

ACTION.

At 0230 the main Column moved on 3 miles to W. end of SABKHET EL MUSTABIG, where it arrived at 0400% Here the road opened out on to a hard flat plain apparently about I mile wide N. and S., and 2 miles B. and W.

ACTION (CONTINUED).

The Guide, a Sergt of Sinai Police, said that MAZAR was close and that this SABKHET would be under M.G. fire from redoubts in daylight.

for likely positions for the gums but little could be done until dawn appeared. However, one position was chosen and the AYRSHIRE battery was brought into action at 0450 (before it was light enough to shoot) in a position whence it could have shelled MAZAR, had it been where it was supposed to be. But when itsbecame light the range was found to be too great.

At 0500 the Guide pointed out to me from the hill where D.H. was being established what he said was the tomb at MAZAR. This was in a E. S. E. direction and at a distance of about 4 miles. In the dim light I thought I made out a camp near the tomb and therefore took the INVERNESS Battery about 14 miles S.E. to a place which looked like a position from which the camp could be shelled.

I recalled the AYRSHIRE Battery to a position of readinessnear D.H.Q. and set out myself to reconneitre the new position for the INVERNESS Bty.

At 0530 the INVERNESS Bty was in action facing the supposed position of MAZAR, but there was absolutely no target then visible, although the light had improved. There was also no sound of firing from that direction and only one or two desultory rifle shots from the East.

certain that the Guide had been wrong and that the position of MAZAR was really considerably further to the North East.

Pattery to follow. I found that D.H.Q. had moved and left no word to say where they had gone to, but their telephone wire guided me and both batteries to their new position which was reached about 0615.

A message had just come in from 5th L.H. describing "a good Artillery target", so two S.Os were despatched to recommoitre positions near the Caravan track to N.H.

It was now quite evident that the position of MAZAR was as shown on the map and that the A.A. guns, which had now begun to fire, were near a conspicuous hospital which could be seen to the N.E.

I therefore took the two batteries straightvoff in that direction and brought them into action & mile S. of the Caravan track against series of trenches facing N.W. and S.W. and full of Turks near the Tomb ABU. GILBAN.

The AYRSHINE Bty. opened fire about 0730 at 3250 yards range, and the INVERNESS about 0725 at 4000 yds. range.

Rifle fire was coming from the trenches apparently against Gen. Royston's Column to their S., and some of the trenches were taken partly in enfliade by the shells which certainly were effective in subduing the rifle fire.

Whenever pauses took place in the shelling, movement was visible in the trenches and rifle fire broke out again, but it was invariably stopped by bursts of shrapnel.

APPENDIX

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ACTION. (CONTINUED)

We could however, see no signs of Gen. Royston's men and so it was difficult to co-operate with success. The light was such that the red flags could not be seen anywhere till about 0700, and never with the detached Column. The early morning sun shone directly over the enemy's position into our eyes and it was impossible to make out anything at any distance to the East before 0700.

A.A.GUN TARGET.

Lt. Col. Wilson of 5th L.H. pointed out by their flashes thepositions of two A.A. guns on to which the AYRSHIRE Bty turned fire about 0800 at the short range of 2800 yards, but no information could be obtained as to the result of this fire. The A.A.Guns at first returned the fire of the battery but only two of their shells came anywhere near it and they did no damage.

After firing about 30 rounds at these guns, and when the A.A. guns had ceased firing, the AYRSHIRES again fired on the trenches near the Tomb, in co-operation with the INVERNESS Bty.

WITHDRAWAL.

About 12. noon orders were received from Gen. Chauvel to withdraw the guns, which was done by alternate batteries, the 5th L.H. Regt. covering their retirement from the left.

The retirement took place without trouble and undisturbed by any hostile fire and at 1230 the return march to SALMANA started from the MUSTABIG Lake with the rest of the Division.

RETURN MARCH.

About 1500 a halt was made to water at a point 9 miles E. of SALMANA. There was however great difficulty in getting water at all there, and though the horses and men of the AYRSHIRE Bty. and the INVERNESS men got some, it was found impossible to water the horses of the latter battery.

Both Batteries reached SALMANA about 1945 on

17th September and HOD AMARA on 18th by 1800.

The INVERNESS Bty horses were without water from 1700 on 16th to 2030 on 17th, during which time both batteries did notcless than 40 miles. So the horses were rather exhausted, but they have already improved and considering everything did their work extraordinarily well and with very few casualties.

The Ayrshire Battery lost 1 horse died and 1

missing, and expended 111 shrapnel shells.

The Inverness Battery lost 4 horses died and 2 missing, and expended 156 shrapnel shells.

The three Bde. Ammtn. Cols. moved with the 1st L.H.Bde. and the water convoy to a point 9 miles East of SALMANA on the night of 16th and remained there until the return of the Column on the afternoon of 17th.
