24/9/18

MOBILE SECTION MOVED OUT WITH BRIGADE AND DIVONACKED AT Sq. 115. N. 26. C. ON 22/9/18, THE AREA RECENTLY OCCUPIED BY THE R.Z.M.S. WAS TAKEN OVER WITH AREA STORES. THERE WERE 1 OFFICER AND 24 O/R LEFT IN HOSPITAL, OWING TO THE HURRIED MOVE OF THE R.Z.M.S. NO PREVIOUS NOTIFICATION HAD BEEN RECEIVED CONCERNING THESE PATIENTS REMAINING AND APPARENTLY NO ARRANGEMENTS HAD BEEN MADE FOR THEIR EVACUATION, ALSO THERE WERE PATIENTS FROM THE D.W.I. REGIMENT COLLECTED BY CAMEL. THIS NECESSITATED LEAVING A CERTAIN PERSONNEL BEHIND TO LOOK AFTER THEM, IN THE EVENT OF THE MOBILE SECTION HAVING TO MOVE OUT AT SHORT NOTICE. ANZAC H.Q. WAS COMMUNICATED WITH BY PHONE AND INSTRUCTIONS RECEIVED THAT SUCH PATIENTS COULD NOT BE EVACUATED UNTIL EVENING, BUT THAT SUFFICIENT PERSONNEL WOULD HAVE TO BE LEFT TO CARE FOR THEM UNTIL SUCH PERSONNEL WERE RELIEVED BY PART OF THE 1/1ST WELSH FIELD AMBULANCE.

22/9/18.

THREE MOTORS, ATTACHED TO THIS UNIT DID 2 TRIPS WITH PATIENTS TO ANZAC RECEIVING STATION AT JERICHO. INFORMATION RECEIVED AT 0/00 FROM D.H.Q. THAT BRIGADE WAS MOVING TO KH. FUSAIL AT 0000. CAPT. GILL WITH 4 O/R DETAILED TO REMAIN WITH THE PATIENTS TO SEE TO THEIR EVACUATION OR WAIT UNTIL RELIEVED.

Capt. Gill's Party. ONE HEAVY MOTOR AMB AND 2 FORDS WERE DESPATCHED FROM R.H.S TO R.L./A. TO ASSIST IN THE EVACUATION, ALL THESE CARS DOING TWO TRIPS EACH. ANOTHER DETAIL OF PATIENTS, 22 O/R, WERE RECEIVED FROM 1/1 WELSH F.A. CAPT. GILL RECEIVED INFORMATION THAT THERE WERE 20 D.W.I. PATIENTS TO BE COLLECTED, SO 10 CAMEL CARRIERS WERE DESPATCHED TO COLLECT THEM. AT 1700 THE D.A.D.M.S INFORMED CAPT. GILL THAT HE AND INTERCEPTED THE CAMELS AND HAD DESPATCHED THEM TO THE 1/1 WELSH F.A., WHICH HAD MOVED UP FROM Sq. J.1 TO THE CROSSING OF THE ROMAN ROAD AND THE AUJA. THESE CARS EVACUATED ALL PATIENTS BY 1000. THE LARGEST NUMBER OF PATIENTS IN THE HOSPITAL AT ONE TIME WAS 47 ALL CARDS. AT 2000 THE CAMEL CARRIERS RETURNED WITH 20 D.W.I. PATIENTS. ALL PATIENTS WERE SHELTERED UNDER TENTAGE AND THERE WERE SUFFICIENT DRUGS AND MEDICAL COMFORTS LEFT WITH CAPT. GILL TO DEAL WITH PATIENTS. THE 20 D.W.I. PATIENTS WERE RETURNED TO THE 1/1 WELSH F.A. UNDER INSTRUCTIONS FROM D.A.D.M.S. THE CAMELS REMAINED WITH THE 1/1 WELSH F.A.

Remainder of Mobile Section. Reference Map DAMIEN C.6. (1/65550). THIS MOVED OUT AT 1000 AND REACHED THE AUJA AT 1130 WHERE THE ANIMALS WERE WATERED, AND THEN PROCEEDED ALONG THE ROMAN ROAD PAST MASKARA - MUS LABA TO KH. FUSAIL, Sq. U. 25. C. AT 1430.

THE MOBILE SECTION CAMPED CLOSE TO THE ROAD. THE 3RD L.H. REGT PROCEEDED TO THE JERAH IN THE VICINITY OF MAID JOZELIM, BUT NO INFORMATION CONCERNING THIS MOVE WAS GIVEN TO THE MOBILE SECTION, THOUGH IT HAD BEEN PREVIOUSLY AGREED THAT SUCH MOVEMENTS BE INFORMED TO Q.C., MOBILE SECTION, SO THAT 2 BEARERS COULD ACCOMPANY UNITS AND ACT AS GUIDES SHOULD AMBULANCE VEHICLES BE REQUIRED. THE 2ND REGIMENT ALSO PROCEEDED OUT. THE REMAINDER OF THE BRIGADE REMAINING IN AND ABOUT KH. FUSAIL. EVACUATIONS TO THE 1/1 WELSH F.A. IN Sq. Y. K4. C. (REFERENCE MAP JERICHO B.6) WERE CARRIED OUT BY MOTOR AMBULANCES, ON DEMANDING SAME FROM CAPT. GOW, WHO WAS IN CHARGE OF ANZAC MOTOR AMB. AND WAS STATIONED WITH 1ST D.H.Q. AT KH. FUSAIL. DURING THE AFTERNOON A

mutual arrangement was made with Capt Gow that sick and wounded from N.Z. Brigade and B.W.I were brought to this unit and evacuated by car. Former were not shown as admitted to this ambulance but the latter were, as the B.W.I had no means of collecting those sick and wounded. During the day 5 O/R sick from 1st Regt, 2 O/R and 12 O/R sick from the B.W.I. were evacuated. Transport was sufficient and no shelter was required.

Turks, sick & wounded were evacuated. There was no congestion and drugs and medical comforts were in abundance. The largest number held waiting transport was 15 including Turks. At 1600 information was received from H.Q. of 2nd B.W.I that there were several wounded to collect, so Capt. Waterhouse and 2 bearers and 1 amb.wagon were despatched to such H.Q.s. Shortly afterwards another wagon was asked for and despatched, but the total number of patients brought in was 2. The men B.W.I. had been transported to this unit by motor ambulance, returning from the N.Z.M.F.A to KH.FUSAIL.

-23/9/18. Capt. Gill's Party, left Sq.H.17.a. (JERICHO B.C. Map) at 0500. At 0030 Capt. Gill saw D.A.D.M.S., who instructed him to collect 40 fresh camels, packets and Egyptian C.T.C from 1/1 Welsh Rgt. Rations, 24 hours were drawn from Main Supply Dump but there was great difficulty in doing so until a memo was obtained from D.A.D.M.S. At 0000 proceeded along Roman Road to KH FUSAIL and rejoined remainder of Mobile Section at 1010.

Information received from B.H.Q. that the brigade was to move to ES SALT across the hills and all transport under Lieut. Hamilton, 1st L.H.Rgt, was to move back to the GHORANIYEH brigadiers and proceed to ES SALT via the main metalled road, as soon as such was opened for traffic. Owing to Capt. Waterhouse being unfit he was sent with the transport.

A Wounded Officer admitted and evacuated being the only battle casualty from the brigade. His condition was considered not very serious though being a head case. Sick O/R were evacuated.

The C.C with Capt. Gill with 22 O/R mounted on horses and 15 O/R on donkeys and light mules, 10 camel packers carrying 12 mobile stretchers, medical comforts and medical stores proceeded at 1100 to follow the brigade, which had moved out at 0030. The route taken was more or less direct to the JORDAN close to RID HILL but still on West bank of river. Thence along West bank to UMM-ES-SHERK, crossing the ford, where some difficulty was experienced in getting the donkeys, light mules and camels across the stream. Arrived at Sq.C.2.a. (reference Map DAMIEN) at 1530. Instructions then received that the brigade was moving on. At 1545, which it did and proceeded in a Southwesterly direction to Sq.C.2.b. Gabbal. (Ref. Map. EAST of JORDAN, 2nd Ed) arriving at 1630. The brigade then followed the track, Road 6.

The camel packers were a mile in rear but owing to the brigade moving in single file they were able to catch up. It was found that there was great difficulty with the donkeys as it was quite impossible for them to be ridden in hilly country and their masters had to walk practically the whole way to ES SALT. The master was experienced with the camels.

The transport left KH FUSAIL at 1200 halting at the crossing of road 29 and the AUJA, and again at TEL-ES-SULTAN, and then proceeding direct to SHUNET NIMRIN by GHORANIYEH, arriving at 0200 on 24/9/18.

-24/9/18 The horses personnel arrived at Sq.H.21.c at 0030 and the camels at 0200, the light mules being now remounts were completely knocked up. Information received at 0900 that brigade would move out as soon as all animals watered. The transport proceeded via Road 5 leaving SHUNET NIMRIN at 0830, arriving at ES SALT at 2000 and proceeding to Sq.J.5.c. and arrived there at 2200. At 1030 the mounted personnel followed in the rear of the brigade, passing through ES SALT, thence travelling direct along the ES SALT-AMMAN road arriving at Sq.O.2.b.a. at 1630. Information received that Brigade would bivouac there that night, the camels and donkeys arriving an hour later.

25/7/18.

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OCT 1918

12 ALH Field Amb Mole E5/9

Orders received that the Brigade would move out at 0630. The transport left ES SALT at 0400 and reached the brigade at 0615. Instructions received from A.D.M.S. that all sick were to be evacuated to the Turkish Hospital at ES SALT. There were 6 cases, all medical, for evacuation. These were left at AIN HEMAR, in charge of a mounted bearer, and with rations. They were to be loaded on to the returning divisional train wagons and taken back to ES SALT to the Turkish Hospital. The Brigade moved out from AIN HEMAR at 0630 and was the divisional reserve. Proceeding along the AMMAN road, it proceeded as far as Sq.P.20.B. (Ref. Map Comp.E of JORDAN). AMMAN, and waited for ½ hour. The transport and camels had now caught up with the brigade. At 0820 the brigade moved on again to Sq.R.20.B. arriving at 0900. Information was received at 1000 from D.A.D.M.S. that all sick and casualties would be evacuated to this unit, which was to transport them to SUWEILAH, where the Anzac Collecting Station was said to be. 2 Sick O/R from N.Z. Bde were evacuated to SUWEILAH. At 1400 C.O. proceeded to D.M.Q. as no instructions had been received concerning the disposal of the Tent Division of the Mobile Section and it appeared from information gathered that such section was to be established at SUWEILAH pending the arrival of the Anzac Collecting Station (Mobile Section of 1st L.H.F.A.). Instructions were then issued by D.A.D.M.S. that as soon as AMMAN was taken, the tent subdivision was to proceed there and become established as an Advanced Collecting Station for Chaytor's Force. It was considered advisable to move the Mobile Section forward, which was done and it proceeded to Sq.W.20.B., arriving at 1730. At 1800 message was received to proceed to AMMAN. The ambulance proceeded towards AMMAN and the C.O. going ahead. The C.O. was able to get transport by motor amb., to AMMAN and proceeded direct to the Turkish hospital arriving there at 1715hrs he saw the D.A.D.M.S., Anzacs. The question of a (new) building for the Collecting Station was discussed & finally one of the staff of the Turkish hospital acted as guide for the D.A.D.M.S. and C.O., 1st L.H.F.A. All buildings occupied by Turk sick were considered totally unfit as they were in a most insanitary state. A building in the centre of the town was finally chosen, and it had been the headquarters of the German Motor Transport Coy. It was littered with rubbish, and this was duly cleaned out. The surrounding area of the building was crowded with troops of the 6th L.H. Regt, which increased the difficulties. The tent subdivision with its equipment and transport arrived at 2000 and the remainder of the unit passed through the town and bivouacked half a mile N. of the town in Sq. 2,2,6.. By 2030 the tent subdivision was ready to receive patients. The building was not very satisfactory, having only two rooms, each 12 feet square and a hall 6 feet by 12 feet, the last being used as an operating theatre. All ranks worked splendidly. There were 15 Ford motor amb. placed at the disposal of the Collecting Station. One car was despatched to bring in a N.Z. Officer with a compound fracture of leg. Of those wounded and admitted there were 1 Off & 2 O/R., N.Z., - 1 Off, & 2 O/R from 2nd L.H.Bn - 2 Sick O/R & 1 Sick Indian. Of the wounded the most serious were the compound fracture, which had not been put in a Thomas splint and a case shot through the chest. The former was anaesthetised and put up in a Thomas splint. The chest case was a through and through wound, but the patient was fairly comfortable and given a morphine. There were 2 slight cases wounded through the shoulder, one through the muscles of the thigh and a third in the buttock. By now the Anzac Collecting Station was established at SUWEILAH and instructions were received to send the most serious cases direct through to the A.H.S. at JERICHO, where the Operating Unit was, and the remainder to the A.C.S at SUWEILAH by motor amb. There were 15 all ranks in hospital on the night of 25/26, and all ranks of the 1st L.H.F.A. were busily employed clearing up etc, until 0500 of 26/7/18.

26/9/18. The two serious cases, one with fracture of C.S.R. of chest were sent direct through by motor and to JERICHO, leaving at 0700. Both cases appeared to be comfortable and were given sedatives prior to their being sent away. The remaining cases were despatched to SUWILEH. The 6th L.H. Regt were still camped around the Collecting Station which added to the difficulties & also fouled the ground, as such regiment had no sanitary equipment. As soon as possible all available O/R were employed in cleaning the area. At 1000 the D.A.D.M.S. arrived and it was arranged that 7 of the cars were to be attached to the Anzac Collecting Station and 6 to remain at the 1st L.H.F.A. (Mobile Section). These 7 were duly despatched later, loaded with patients. The question of the evacuation of the Turkish sick and wounded was discussed, and it was arranged that when such was to take place, it was to be left for the C.O., 1st L.H.F.A., to see to their evacuation. During the day the following were admitted:-

Owing to the above patients not all coming in together extra shelter was not found necessary as they were all evacuated by motor ambulance.

Of the total admissions 19 were evacuated by motor and to SUWILEH 1 to duty, 28 remained being the maximum in at one period.

Capt. GILL personally saw to all these admissions and was responsible for their treatment. At 1000 D.A.D.M.S. arrived stating that 32 motor lorries would be available at 1600.

20 of these for the Turkish sick and wounded and the majority of the hospital staff and 2 for the evacuation of the Sick of Chaytor's Force, the supervision of these evasions being left in the hands of the C.O., 1st L.H.F.A.,

It was decided by D.A.D.M.S. that two medical Officers, 4 hospital orderlies and 4 nurses of the Turkish hospital staff were to remain to treat and care for any further Turkish sick who might be admitted. The two medical men, Dr TEEN and Dr. SAMON ZACHARIA were most useful. The C.O. 1st L.H.F.A., interviewed Mr. TAHILIK BEY, the P.M.O. and it was arranged that all sick or wounded were to be carried down by the hospital orderlies to the area immediately east of the Anz.Dav.Collecting Station by 1700. Information was received from Dr. TEEN that amongst the hospital staff was a clique who systematically were selling hospital food, equipment, cattle and horses and retaining the proceeds of such sale. Under these conditions the C.O., 1st L.H.F.A., decided to search all personal trunks etc of the staff. The result of the search produced a considerable quantity of drugs and medical equipment and in one instance, one of the staff Dr. Goldberg, a German Jew, was forced to proceed to a house in the village where the majority of his personal gear was stored and amongst it a considerable quantity of medical equipment was recovered.

Originally on the evening of the 25th the P.M.O. of the Turkish hospital had stated that there were in all some 450 patients for evacuation but now on 27th such number had increased to 700. At 1700 no lorries had appeared and at 1800 a message was sent to D.A.D.M.S. asking if motor lorries were to be available.

An answer was received to the effect that these lorries would not be available until 0900 on the morning of 26th. It was considered impossible and impracticable to return those patients to the Turkish Hospital so the hospital orderlies were sent back to the Turkish hospital to drag down all available blankets and mattresses. The sick and wounded were made as comfortable as possible and given some nourishment and were left there all night. During the day a cash box was taken over from the P.M.O. containing some 2600 in notes, 460 odd in silver, £17 in gold, which was handed over to Am. Env. Hrs on following day. It was expected that several of the Turks sick would die during the night. A guard has been placed over the medical equipment at the hospital as it was found that equipment was disappearing particularly instruments from the operating room. The sanitary condition around the building occupied by the Tent-subdivision of the 1st L.H.F.A. was very foul owing to troops bivouacking and also numerous dead animals were lying about in close proximity, and these were removed by the local inhabitants.

26/9/18. At 0450 all available men were instructed to assist in the evacuation of the Turkish sick and wounded. All Turks who could possibly walk were made to do so to where the lorries were to park as they were not allowed across the stone bridge in the town yet the German motor lorries had crossed it daily frequently. The Turkish Hospital orderlies were made to carry all sick and wounded Turks who could not walk and such orderlies required constant supervision, as they were most reluctant in assisting. Dr. Aman Abrahim (Capt) from Bagdad rendered valuable assistance as interpreter. At 0545 five lorries arrived and they were loaded with Turks averaging 26 per lorry. It was then found that ~~xxx~~ these particular lorries were not intended for these particular Turks. At 0615 the A.D.M.S. Amman, arrived and he and the C.O., 1st L.H.F.A. proceeded to where the motor lorries were parked, ½ mile north of the town. It appeared that the guide sent from this unit had not reported to the Cof of the motor lorries. 27 motor lorries were then sent forward to be loaded. At 0640 loading began, and by 0930, 690 sick and wounded Turks had been loaded as well as the Turkish Hospital staff of 25 officers of all ranks and 21 women. It was considered that some of the Turks would not reach JERICHO alive. After the despatch of the Turks one was found dead close to the bridge and 3 in one of the buildings. A party of Turkish prisoners was set to work to clean up the hospital and other buildings as they were found to be in filthy condition. All remaining mattresses, clothing etc was burnt owing to the lousy condition of the Turks. Dr Teek supervised the cleaning operations at the hospital. In the afternoon 4 German soldiers and 1 German woman were admitted in a semi-clad and starving condition, having been stripped of their clothes by Bedouins some miles N. of AMMAN, when attempting to escape by train. The woman whose name is HANSOUR, stated she was the wife of a manufacturer in BETHLEHEM. The C.O., 1st L.H.F.A. was at the Turkish Hospital supervising equipment etc. One motor lorry load of patients, 16, was sent away in the early morning. Capt. Gill again took charge of the admitting and treatment of all sick and wounded from Chaytor's Force and was kept busily employed throughout the whole day. The admissions for the day were as follows:

Of the above 17 were evacuated and 44 remained.

Increased shelter had to be erected, as one batch of 32 N.Z.Bde came together. Two C.D.L and 1 Operating Tent were erected, so that the accommodation was now increased so as to hold a total of 60. The supply of blankets was inadequate. Both the 2nd L.H. and N.Z.Bdes had allowed their troops to take one blanket/p with them, whereas this was not so with the 1st L.H.Bde, as these

Troops could take either a blanket or an overcoat and the latter was invariably chosen. Owing to the ground being so cut up by previous traffic, the conditions in the tents were more than dusty and dirty yet there was no complaint from the patients. There was at least 4 inches of figure-like dust everywhere in the area and no personnel were available to scrape the dust away from the inside of the tents. Medical comforts were now available from the Supply Dump. Captured petrol, (19 cases) was obtained from a captured dump, and the drugs were still sufficient to deal with all cases. From the Turkish Hospital the following drugs were obtained which were most useful:-

The maximum number in hospital was at one time period, by all ranks. Owing to the increase of medical cases being admitted, it was arranged with A.D.M.S. that both the Amb's of the 2nd L.H. and N.Z. Brigades retain their sick until the evening prior to the arrival of the motor lorries for evacuation, when their sick were to be sent to this unit for evacuation on the following morning.-----

27 All Ranks admitted on previous day were evacuated to-day all evasions being by motor amb. to SUWEILEH. The majority of the sick admitted and evacuated were Pyrexia. N.Y.E. which it is considered will be found to be Malaria.

29/10/18.

Information received that the Am. Collecting Station (Immobile Section, 1st L.N.R.A) would proceed from SUWEILEH on 20th Inst and relieve this unit in AMMAN and that no further cases would be evacuated to SUWEILEH to allow the A.C.S. to become cleared of all patients. # 6 car loads of patients had been despatched to SUWEILEH before receipt of these orders. At 1700 information received from A.D.M.S. that 2nd L.H. & N.Z. Bdes had received orders to move out. Their respective amb's had left a minimum of personnel and 1 amb.wagon each. This unit was to collect such patients. The N.Z. were reported to have about 50, the number with the 2nd amb being unknown. 5 motor ambulances, 2 amb wagons, 2 G.S.Wagons and 1 L.G.S. were despatched to the N.Z. Amb, and 31 patients were brought back. The patients from the 2nd ambulance could not be collected as the motor ambulances could not reach them and they were left till the morning as it was found that there were not more than 15 and they could be cared for. One N.Z. patient died in hospital, having been brought in unconscious, and was found to be suffering from a Pontine Haemorrhage. The accommodation was taxed to its utmost. All ranks gave most valuable assistance and worked splendidly and medical stores were becoming somewhat depleted, but the medical comforts were in abundance, as a regular supply was obtained from the A.S.C.

Of the admissions of 20/10/18 there were 10 all ranks evacuated. The number remaining was 69 all ranks. Of the evacuations 10 were sent by car to SUWEILEH. The maximum in hospital at anyone period was 69 all ranks.

30/9/18. Of those remaining there were 40 all ranks evacuated Oct 1918 by lorries (3) to JERICHO, and another lorry containing 5 sick Turks, 4 sick Germans and one German Woman. These were all despatched by 0600. At 1000 the R.A.D.M.S. arrived stating that now that the cars had been increased to 17 Fordas, it was decided that 3 were to be attached to the 1/1 Welsh F.A. at ES SALT and that the remainder would be with the Anz. Collecting Station as soon as it arrived from SUWEILEH and became established at AMMAN. The cars were of course only to be used for serious cases.

Capt. Hedgson, O.C., Anz. Coll. Station (Mobile Section, 1st L.H.F.A.) arrived at 1200 and his unit at 1500. It was decided not to hand over to him until the following day. The total admissions for the day were as follows:

The maximum number in hospital at any one period was 71 all ranks. Some of the personnel of the staff were rendered ineffective owing to illness. A Summary of such ineffectives is attached at end of report. The Mobile Section (Anz.C.S.) was to take all admissions from 1st inst. The 110th Inf. F.A. had been established for a few days at AMMAN and dealt with all Indian Troops.

1/10/18. Of the 71 all ranks remaining in hospitals 2 were discharged to duty - 50 were evacuated by motor ambulance to 1/1 Welsh F.A. at ES SALT, such number requiring 2 trips during the day by some of the cars. The average length of time taken by a motor amb. to proceed to ES SALT and return was 4½ hours. The road was becoming extremely rough owing to motor lorries. 17 all ranks were transferred to the A.R.S. and 21 evacuated by motor lorry, thus clearing all patients from hospital. Owing to the C.O., 1st L.H.F.A. and Capt Gill being ineffective they remained at the Anzac C.S. whilst the Tent Subdivision rejoined the Brigade at Sq. 157 A.26.a Ref. Map. MAFRAK, 1/62220).

2/10/18. The 3rd L.H.Regt moved out from the Brigade to S. of AMMAN, and with it went 1 amb wagon and 4 bearers. The tent Division now only dealt with admissions from its own brigade. The number admitted was 12 O/R, the majority of such cases being pyrexia. As to the 2nd Regt, one squadron is attached to Descorps H.Q. and consequently its sick do not pass through this unit, and there is also a troop from this Regt attached to Anz.Div.Hqrs and its sick do not pass through this amb.

3/10/18. All sick from the 3rd L.H.Regt were evacuated direct to A.C.S. at AMMAN, and transport for same was arranged by A.D.M.S. as it was found to be impossible for Mobile Section, 1st L.H.F.A. to supply any extra transport owing to the heavy evacuation from the remainder of the Brigade. The C.O. rejoined the Mobile Section but Capt. Gill and 4 O/R were ineffective and had to be left behind. Only 5 cases were admitted from 1st L.H.Regt and evacuated to A.C.S. at AMMAN.

4/10/18. There are 16 O/R of this unit ineffective to-day. The admissions for the day were 42, and the tentage was taxed to its utmost. Great difficulty was experienced over the blanket question as practically none of the men of the brigade are in possession of them. The details of admissions for the day were as follows:

There is now one squadron of the 2nd Regt at SUWEILEH and its sick are being evacuated through a section of the 110th Inf.F.A. Medical stores were becoming low and there appeared to be no prospect of supplies arriving. A summary is attached showing the dates of supplies of drugs etc. Medical comforts were still available.

- 5/10/18. Capt. Wood R.M.O., 2nd Regt, evacuated sick and as the remainder of such regiment was proceeding to SUWEILEH, Capt. Waterhouse was detailed to proceed with it. Capt. Gill returned from A.C.S. The admissions for the day were 50 and details as follows:

 B.M.Q: 2. E.L.C. 1. M.G.S: 5. Sig Trp: 1
 Major Ferguson of the Anz.Lab. is now at A.C.S. & giving great assistance in the diagnosis of the pyrexial cases, the majority being Malaria M.T.
- 5/10/18. Capt. Baker, R.M.Q., 3rd Regt, was evacuated with Malaria M.T. but it was impossible to replace him as Capt Gill was the only available officer. Arrangements were made by the A.D.M.S. to have an M.Q. supplied. Capt Waterhouse, 1st L.H.F.A and acting R.M.Q 2nd L.H.F.A also evacuated sick with Pyrexia which turned out to be Malaria M.T. No M.Q. could be sent to replace him. The total admissions for the day were 62, as follows:

 The tentage was again taxed to the ~~MAXIMUM~~ maximum and the transport was unable to cope with the evasions. Of the above 10 were evacuated and there remained 44. The personnel of this unit was slowly decreasing and there were 25 ineffective to-day. Capt Gill worked splendidly and so did all the staff under him.
- 7/10/18. There were 64 admissions for the day made up as follows:

 M.G.S: 11. B.M.Q: 1. Sig Trp: 4.
 All these cases arrived early in the morning with the result that there were 100 patients in hospital at the one time. 5 amb waggons were loaded to their utmost and it was found necessary to obtain extra transport, so the Staff Captain arranged that G.S.waggons were made available. 57 patients were sent by amb.waggon - 18 by mule & camel & 27 by G.S.waggon, making a total of 62 evacuated leaving in hospital 26. As to the ineffectives of 1st L.H.F.A. these were not shown in the A.A.D. book until the actual date of evacuation and were shown as admitted on the same date.
- 8/10/18. The admissions for the day totalled 64 made up as follows:
 1st Regt: 25. B.M.Q: 6. Field Trp. 2. M.G.S: 20. Field Trp. 9. 6 M.V.S: 2. There were remaining from yesterday 26, the maximum in hospital for the 24 hours being 90. Again the tentage was more than taxed. Of the above 50 were evacuated by amb.waggon, still leaving in hospital 52.
- 9/10/18. Daily admissions totalled 42 made up as follows: 1st Regt. 12. M.G.S: 2, making a total in hospital of 70. Of these 44 were evacuated by amb.waggon & camels. The majority were pyrexia (clinical Malignant Malaria) some of whom were extremely ill & it was considered advisable that they be retained until fit to travel. These included some of the personnel of 1st L.H.F.A. Drugs were now extremely low. Fortunately a supply of captured Turkish Quin Hydroch. for intramuscular injection was obtained from A.C.S. and it was freely used.
- 10/10/18. Admissions for the day, 5 as follows: 1st Regt: 4. M.G.S. 1. This made a total of 51 to be evacuated, & they were got rid of and so cleared the tentage.
- 11/10/18. Admissions for the day, 12, as follows: 1st Regt 2 Sick. 1 Wnd. M.G.S. 2. L.H.F.A. 7 (all of them being Malaria M.T.).
- 12/10/18. Admissions for the day, 27, as follows:
 1st Regt: M.G.S: 2. B.M.Q: 2.
 1st L.H.F.A: 20. All of these were evacuated, some being extremely ill, but as they did not appear to improve under suitable treatment it was considered advisable that they be sent away.
- 13/10/18. Total admissions 8, as follows. 1st Regt: 2. M.G.S: 2. Sig Trp. 1. Field Trp. 1. These were all evacuated to A.C.S. at ANMAN. The result of infection of Malaria, acquired in the valley at Kh. FUSAIL - RAPID JOSEPH, appears to have ceased, but the Anopheline mesquite has been found in ANMAN and along the Wadi HAMMAM, with the result that probably some of the latest pyrexial cases were due to Malaria infection in the above 2 areas.
 The strength of the mobile section has been reduced from 5 Officers & 60 O/R on 19/9/18 to 2 Off. & 20 O/R on 12/10/18 & of these 1 Off has had recurrent Malaria, 2 O/R with similar condition & 1 O/R with Clinical Malaria, who have not been evacuated.
 All ranks have shown throughout the greatest keenness, ability and endurance, and it is considered that they could not have done more than they actually did.

Owing to the rough country these have become partially unserviceable and require frequent temporary overhauling. It is suggested that at first opportunity all vehicles be sent to Ordnance Workshops for general overhaul.

HORSES.

These have stood operations exceptionally well. Forage has always been abundant and there has been a copious water supply. One Draught horse died - cause unknown and one donkey has been evacuated with debility. The donkeys have proved to be most ~~XXXXX~~ unsatisfactory in hilly country when expected to carry personnel, who have had to walk the whole way except when travelling on good roads.

C.T.C. and M.T. PERSONNEL.

The majority of these have been infected with malaria but with suitable treatment it was considered unnecessary to evacuate them.

REPORT OF WORK OF ANZAC COLLECTING STATION (IMMOBILE SECTION,
1ST A.D.M.S.). FOR PERIOD 21.9.18 TO 10.10.18.

- 21.9.18. Received orders from A.D.M.S. to evacuate all patients at Desert Corps Rest Station, JERUSALEM, and to proceed to Anzac Receiving Station, JERICHO, arriving on morning of 23rd inst.
- 22.9.18 Red Cross Stores and equipment collected and handed to Capt. Hordern Red Cross Commissioner. Camp thoroughly cleaned and rubbish incinerated. 3 O/R left as guard, and 1 Sanitary Native.
- 23.9.18. Two G.S.Wagons and 1 water-cart moved out and mounted personnel. Unmounted personnel left by motor ambulances at daybreak and arrived at Anzac Receiving Station the same morning. Received orders to proceed at daybreak on 24th to ES SALT. Under orders from A.D.M.S. 3 O/R remained at Receiving Station.
- 24.9.18. Moved out at 0900 with 2 G.S.Wagons, 1 water cart, and with personnel mounted and leading 24 Turkish mules, laden with fanatis & forage. Total personnel, 1 Officer, 26 O/R. Joined up at JERICHO with 7th Sanitary Section under Capt. H. Button. Halted at 1200 at KHUNET NIMRIN, resuming journey at 1500. Owing to the poor condition of the mules they were left there until next morning in charge of 10 O/R. Outspanned in WADI SHAIB at 2100. Mosquitoes very prevalent.
- 25.9.18. Moved off at 0800 and reached ES SALT at 1000, rested 3 hours and proceeded to SUWILKH which was reached at 1600. Three well tents pitched on a site adjacent to S.E. end of village. Following admitted straightway. Brit. Off. Wounded 2, O/R wounded 14, sick 15. Indian O/R sick 1. These were brought from AMMAN by light ambulances (motor).
- 26.9.18. Additional tents erected increasing accommodation to 8 beds and 1 operating tent. Rest of personnel with mules arrived during afternoon. 1 O/R remained at ES SALT with part of Sanitary Section. Evacuated by light amb. c.s to JERICHO. Lying 10, sitting 4, total, 14. Capt. H. Button left for AMMAN.

ACCOMODATION. The Anz. Div. Collection Station was situated in and around the arena of the Roman Amphitheatre. Seven rooms in 3 stone cottages were utilized and accommodated about 80 patients; also 1 Operating Tent & 6 well tents accommodated about 55 patients. During periods of congestion five rooms in the Turkish Hospital (about 200 yards away) were utilized. The necessary sanitary arrangements were improvised from materials found there. It was impossible to feed patients except in relays as only about 60 cu.s and basins were found, and very few patients brought their mess gear with them. Most of the staff were off duty part of the time with pyrexial attacks (some have since proved to be malarial) and physical exhaustion; 7 were evacuated with malaria and 1 with appendicitis. 9 Turkish P/W were used for fatigues, sanitation etc.

COLLECTION & EVACUATION. Patients were brought in by horse Ambas, camel drivers & light motor amb.; in some cases litters & G.S. wagons were used. Evacuations chiefly by motor lorries to JERICHO serious cases by light motor amb. to RS SALT. Mattresses and pillows from the Turkish Hospital were placed in lorries for the worse cases to lie on and when these were used up, young oleander branches were littered on the floor. A supply of tinned milk, bovril and milk biscuits were placed in charge of the N.C.O 1/c lorry convoy for the patients and the latter's water bottles were filled prior to leaving AMMAN. A meal of tea, arrowroot or bovril and bread were given to the patients before the convoy left (at 6000 ft altitude always). 50 P/W. (Turkish) were evacuated by motor lorries to Jericho.

SUPPLIES. There was ample supply of medical comforts, blankets and drugs. The Aust. Red Cross promptly sent from JERUSALEM when wired to 100 blankets, insecticide, soap & cigarettes. These blankets supplemented those we already had. For two days we were short of quinine solution for injection, but this was relieved by finding a stock of Turkish quinine solution of a strength of 1 grammes in 9 c.c.

NATURE OF CASES. The vast majority of the patients were suffering from malignant malaria and many - those particularly from JERKA - were in a serious condition owing chiefly to the exhausting effect of a long rough journey. As far as possible the most serious cases were held, morphia given to ensure rest, and stimulants ordered in addition to intramuscular quinine. Most of the patients complained of intense headache and backache, nearly all vomited (rendering quinine by the mouth useless in many cases) and all were very prostrate. Some had diarrhoea and five were typicallly cerebral. Major Ferguson and S/Sgt Newton (of ANZAC Laceratology) arrived on 9.10.18 but both fell ill next day and were only able to examine a few blood smears. Despite their severe pyrexial symptoms they later examined about 100 and nearly all were

positive for M.T. The routine treatment was to give intramuscular daily IX grains (5 c.c.) of the Turkish solution, and gr.XV twice daily by the mouth of the Quin-Nya. IR solution. Later the XAGARSKAYK intramuscular dose, when supplies were increased, was raised to Gr.XII (4.c.c.). The injections were made into the pectoral regions in preference to the sacral regions as causing less pain (Particularly as the men had to sit on a long journey) and as being more likely to be aseptic. Quinine was given to my serious cases without waiting for a laboratory report although preliminary smears were taken as far as was possible with a reduced staff. The bulk of the cases were Malignant Tertian of recent infection with a probable incubation of about ten days.
