

heet 6>1 GLISY	- 18 mg	8.	Glorious weather. Attended a Conference at 4th Aust.Divisional Headquarters - Present & D.D.M.S. and D.A.D.M.S. am. Australian Corps, A/A.D.M.S. 4th Aust Division, A/A.D.M.S. 2nd Aust Division. Subjects discussed were (1) Operations. In this connection my position for forthcoming operations wasdefined. As this operation is to be under G.O.C. 4th Aust Division the A.D.M.S. 4th Aust Division will be responsible for the evacuation of all casualties including those on this Divisional front. Practically however the A./A.D.M.S. 2nd Aust Division will make the disposition and carry out the evacuation. 6 M.A.C. Cars extra are promised for the M.D.S. One extra Charabanc, if possible, will be forwarded for walking wounded. D.D.M.S. laid stress on the fact that only the bearers of the Division would be available for the action, and that C.O's of the Ambulances would have to provide the full bearer division if called on. For duties at Ambulance headquarters one M.C.O. and 20 pther ranks can be obtained on application to Divisional Headquarters.	
			The D.D.M.S. alse laid stress on the preparation and issuing of orders from A.D.M.S. Office. The last orders issued were discussed. Orders are to be differentiated from instructions information etc. P.U.O. D.D.M.S. spoke at length on this subject and of the necessity of not congesting the transport lines and nucleus Battalions with their Units sick. He condemmed particularly 2nd Aust Divisional Memo 212. He insists that all such cases shall go in regular way to Medical Unit and if not recovered sufficiently be evacuated from the Divisional Area. He considers that the great consideration at the present time is that the mobility of the Division as a striking force shall not be hampered. During the afternoon, with the D.A.D.M.S., rode over the alternative route of evacuation across the Somme through M.18.a. to alternative M.D.S. at M.5.c.2.5. Inspected ambulance post at M.18.

	4/7/18		At 3-10 a.m. when action commenced the L.Bde Sector came under G.O.C. 4th Aust Division and evacuation of wounded under his A.D.M.S. to whom I was responsible. Wounded from 7th A.I.Bde who advanced their line also in conjunction with the attack used the same routes. The avacuation was remarkable prompt and successful. The shelling of back areas was extraordingly light, and the Fords pushed forward almost to the line of the R.A.P. in uses before the action commenced. At 10 a.m. almost all the wounded were out and between the A.D.S. and C.C.S. The Prisoners of War carried down many of the wounded using stretchers from special dumps. The balance of wounded were rapidly located and carried out by the Divisional Bearers. From Battle R.A.Ps at C.18.d.7.2. P.25.b.9.2. the wounded were relayed throughP.19.c.2.5. and O.24.d.2.7. to Advanced ambulance post at 0.24.c.2.3. To this post came also 7th A.I.Bde wounded from Battle R.A.P. at 0.30.a.7.4. From this letter post all casualties were carried to Mctor Loading post at 0.23.c.4.1. (Ford cars) Visited forward area at 10 a.m. with G.O.C., found everything very quiet and evacuation almost complete. G.O.C. 2nd Aust.Division visited M.D.S. at 11.a.m. and thence to C.C.S. group at GROUY. At latter location were several hundred wounded from very light walkers to severe stretcher cases. These casualties were from the 3 Brigades and also a few Americans. Their condition was very good due I think to 3 causes. (1) Prompitude of evacuation. (2) Warmth of the day and smoothness of car route along the tow path. (3) Splendid morale of all ranks. The Avacuation from the M.D.S. to the C.C.S. passed without hitch - in addition to 12 M.A.C. cars attached, an extra 5 cars did one trip from the M.D.S. to GROUY. At 5.50 p.m. a brief report was forwarded to Afm.D.M.S. of the evacuation in this Divisional Sector. At S.P.m. control of left Brigade sector passed to G.C.C. 2nd Aust Division and evacuation to Afm.D.M.S. 2nd Aust Division. At 9.p.m. called the Afm.D.M.S. 4th Aust Division by Phone



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

Officers of men of C.Section 129 American Field Ambulance have been at work since the 24/7/18 and have been doing good work. They are very keen and anxious to pick up the work. The Americans and Australians seem to get on splendidly so far. American R.M.Os have been visited and instructed action to be taken regarding evacuation, sanitation and water discipline. They are in close touch with R.M.Os. of the Division and doing good work. With C.O. 7th Aust Field Ambulance visited proposed site for new dugout R.A.Ps.as follows. Left Battalion Right Brigade 0.36.c.8. Right Battalion Left Brigade. P.25.d.l.8. Left Battalion Left Brigade P.20.c.9.2. 1. At each locality, the troops are to be assembled in as compact a cormation as circumstances permit, to enable the Prime Minister to address them if he so desires. No time will be available to alter the formation after the arrival of the party.

time will not permit of Junior Officers being presented.

3. The assembly of Troops at each locality is not to be confined to the Unit named in tabulation. Representatives of any other Units which are billetted or located within easy walking reach of each locality are also to be assembled, by the Senior Officer, at the locality named.

4. In every case, wherever, possible, the troops are to be assembled

under cover of woods or trees, so as to reduce the risk of enemy observation from the air.

5. The aim should be to have representative parades rather than full parades, not more than a thousand men to be assembled at any one spot. Order of dress, turn-out, and formation to be adopted are left to the discretion of the Senior Officer at each locality.

The A.D.C. to the Corps Commander will visit Commanders to

arrange all other details.

In connection with the above, Nucleus Garrisons of the 5th., 6th., & 7th.A.I.Bdes will parade at M.18.a.3.3. at 3 p.m. on July 2nd.1918. Dress: - Drill order. The G.O.C. desires that as many Field Officers as possible be present and that special attention be paid to the parade and turn-out. The Corps Commander will be present and will arraive at 3.25 p.m. Mi and will depart at 4 p.m. Units will be accompanied by bands where possible.

The evacuation of wounded from the Northern Divisional Boundary to P.25 Central, has been very complete and satisfactory.

As notified in 7th Aust Field Amb. Operation Order Battle

R.A.P.'s were established at:-

0.19.d.7.2. and

P.25.b.9.2.

In the vicinity of these R.A.P.'s and slightly forward small stretcher dumps were made in agreement with H.Q. 6th A.I.Bde, stretchers from these dumps were to be used by Prisoners of War to carry down stretcher cases. In this way such cases were delivered to Motor Loading Post very rapidly, and there was no hitch in the supply of stretchers, which very often happens when P.of W. carry down, and no stretchers go forward to replace them.

Conditions from Zero hour onwards until the bulk of the casualties were evacuated were excellent. Low visibility and very little hostile

shelling.

The Ford loading post at 0.23.c.4.1. was easily accessible, and

there was no hitch in its work.

At 10.a.m. when I visited this area, the evacuation was practically complete.

ADM INISTRATIVE MEMORANDUM No. 219.

Attention is drawn to the increasing number of cases of dysentery and distrings occurring within the Divisional gres which give cause for anxiety. Although the condition of canitation is being rapidly improved flies are still very prevalent and are in a large measure responsible for the sickness above referred to. The Corps Commander desires that Unit Commenders take up this matter at once with the utmost energy as it is of vital importance that an epidemie of dysentery is prevented. With this object in view particular cars will be taken of food, weter and semitation. considered that at the moment insufficient care is being taken in regard to the water supplies to the troops as evidenced by the fraquent cases of water carts drawing water without the necessary water details accompanying the vehicles as laid down and the lack of a supply of chlorids of lime being carried on the cart to enable chlorination as ordered. Unit Commanders will be held responsible that all water is oblorinated and that no water is drawn from unauthorised sources.

Food supplies must be carefully protected against con-

tamination especially against flies.

The proper employment of sanitary and water details under the R.M.O. is the best safeguard to ensure that food, water and sanitation are satisfactory and it is important that Commanding Officers give every assistance to R.M.Os in the matter as laid down in A.Q. Memo No.196 of the 19.3.18. Instructions regarding these details have been forwarded to R.M.Os. and it is important that Unit Commanders at once confer with their R.M.Os. and take all necessary steps to ensure that all precautions are being taken against the spread of diarrhose and dysentery.

The attention of all officers should again be specially directed to FOURTH ARMY Standing Orders on -

1. Water A.S.O. 782 - 828 2. Medical A.S.O. 877 - 883

3. Sanitation A.B.O. 920 - 967.

Arrangements should be made by all Unit Commanders to see that the main principles of these Standing Orders are communicated to all ranks.

It is still found that in cortain Units the proper Sanitary organisation does not exist. To keep the Divisional area it was sanitary condition is the duty of Officers and men themselves and while many Officers and mondo all that is expected of them others are very negligent and broak all rules of sanitation. It is the duty of Medical Officers of the Division to draw attention to these breaches of sanitary discipline which are inimical to the health of the troops. It is fully recognised that k.M.Os. and other Medical Officers cannot see frequently every or any part of the area in which their troops are disposed. Supervision once or twice daily is required. It is pointed out that Battallons do not occupy only forward areas, but they have Transport Lines, Nuclous Garrisons and at times schools which need supervision in this respect.

Insanitary conditions in one unit area affects the troops of another, flies for instance travel from one area to another, and everybody is concerned where insanitary conditions exist in one

place: it affects all adjoining units.

Recognising the R.M.Os. particularly could not be in several places at once, it was laid down in A.Q. Administrative Memo 196 dated 19/3/18 (attached) a certain number of men in each Unit were to be taken from unit establishment, and used solely as water duty men or sanitary inspectors, as the eyes of the Medical Officer to daily inspect the whole units area and report faulty conditions to the R.M.O. of their unit, or where their own M.O. was not available to the Officer responsible for care of sick and sanitation of the section concerned. It would seem on enquiry that R.M.Os. have not availed themselves of this assistance, and have not used these men, particularly sanitary men, as inspectors, but allowed them to be used as fatiques merely for burying faecal matter, and other odd jobs akin to sanitation. There is every Military Authority for a stand upon the following statements upon which R.M.Os. are in future instructed to act.

P.T.O.

Mater Details are mater inspectors under-control of R.M.O. they are not only expected to follow the water cart and see that it is chlorinated but patrol their own and other Units areas adjoining to see that men do not use improper unauthorised water supplies. During last winter amazing water supplies were used especially by troops in the forward area. Spare water duty mon are at the disposal of R.M.O. for running his R.A.P. Sanitary Dotails have nothing to do with Battalion Pionoors and the Pioneor ... Sgt must not answer for a Sanitary Corporal. They are quite distinct. Pioneors are under Battalion administration Adjutant or 0.0. Sanitary details are under R.M.O., and cake orders from him. Realising that loss mon than War Establishment lays down can probably in some cases do the work, the whole available details have not boon demanded our they are at the disposal of the R.M.O. if he requires them. (At.. Q. Order 193 dated 19/3/18).

With reference to Sanitary inspectors and Water daily mon, there is no necessity that those should be with Companies to which they belong, they can be attached to R.A.P. or whorever the R.M.O. desires them (A.Q. Memo 196 dated 19/3/18) that is wherever they will do the work most officiently.

MALTESE CARTS. 15 are equipment on Battalion establishment for use of R.M.O. and is placed always at disposal of R.M.O. It is driven by a medical orderly who is attached to and under orders of R.M.O. (War Establishments) repeatedly state this.

Lance Corporal Orderly . Every R.M.O. is entitled to a Lance Corporal Orderly supplied by Unit to which he belongs, and in addition he has a batman under unit arrangement.



FIFTH AUSTRALIAN FIRED AMBULANCE. Headquarters. 22rd June, 19 2md Australian Division. Ref. your 18/124 dated 12-6-18. above memo I have to report as folkows:-(1) Whether Field Ambulances are as at present constituted are satisfactory?. Had this question arisen at any time before the opening of the German Offensive, I should unquestionably have written, that the present constitution of a Field Ambulance is unsatisfactoryy Just now it is difficult to forecast the role of a Field Ambulance. should the Division be on the Defensive. The function I think, would come under one of two headings: -(a) As formerly one ambulance, with bearer divisions from the remaining two, will evacuate the wounted from the whole Divisional Sector. (b) And which appears not improbable, each Ambulance will move with its Prigade Group, and deal only with such casualties as the group may sustain. The second alternative I shall consider at once. Should this defensive role, take on any mobility, an ambulance will almost automatically, he formed into a Brigade Group, and for such work I think would be moderatly well adapted .. It would have the disadvantage of having 3 Tent Sub-Divisions and only 120 bearers. Conversations with R.A.M.C.Officers who have been through the recent retreat, have convinced me that, at such a time, and when moving with Brigade, the work done by Tent Sub-Divisions has been almost neglegable. Time has not permitted their sub-divisions to erect a Dressing Station, or when they had done so, in certain instances, it was only to hurridly move again with the loss of considerable amount of stores, and possibly to leave wounded cases behind. So the position arose that while 3 Tent Sub-Divisions were doing nothing, except to move with H.Q. to new positions, as brigade moved back, the bearer divisions were with 30 squads of bearers trying to cope with the whole wounded of the Brigade. In any precipitate movement towards L. of C. the disorganisation effects all zones, as well as Divisions. In this way the evacuation simply became from Field Ambulance to C.C.S's and where the C.C.S's were no one knew. The M.D.S. apparently, very early in the operations ceased to exist - Under these circumstances a valuable plan would be, I think, for a site to be selected on a main road or corner and for Divisional Ambulance Came to run the wounded back, and return for other loads - Once the cars start on a long journey to C.C.S. they may be considered as lost to the Ambulance for the time being. M.A.C. cars were in use moving C.C.S. personnel and patients to new positions or railhead. Such conditions should never occur again, but in the event of any witch in the chain of car evacuation, the indication is to get ones casualties away from a chance of capture, and that question solved, the further transportation can be effected by M.A.C. when available or any returning motor vehicles. My recommendations, therefore, for the Medical Services when Brigaded are as fol lows: -(a) One Tent Sub-Division complete with H.Q. Staff moves with Brigade. (b) Bearer Mivisions are at the disposal of O.C. and moves with him, and is worked under his directions - Reinforcements to bring up bearer strength to 45 squads be obtained, if possible from ADMS. If necessary Tent Sub-Divisions to be used for this purpose. (c) All Motor Transport - 3 Horse Ambulance Waggons - 1 Water cart -1 G.S. Waggon and 1 Limber moves with H.Q. Transport of unit moves independently of unit, either with (d) Brigade Transport under Brigade Transport Officer, with unit W.O., or under Unit Transport Officer am keeps about 5 miles in rear of unit, marching under orders of O.C. unit to a selected rendezvous each night - Such order to be delivered by D.R. to Transport Officer. Field Ambulance evacuating all wounded from Divisional Sector with aid of Bearer Sub-Divisions of remaining two ambulances:- This should be done, although with considerable difficulty while the Division presents an unbroken front and falls back gradually. Should any Brigade lose touch with its flanking brigade, the bearens attached would find themselves for a while, in the air, as regards car evacuation Ambulance Commanders would then I think, have to detail a proportion of their cars, and the Officer i/o of Bearers would have to act independently on his own line of evacuation. For such work, I think, the idea of Field Hospital and Bearer Companies of 3 sections, would be most valuable and easily morked. In submitting these remarks sir, I realize that I may be touching on an aspect of the situation you do not require as I have confined my suggestions, to questions the German Offensive has brought into prominence. Shouls you require other matter and details with conditions prior to March 21st., a second report could be forwarded. Monnon O.C. 5th Australian Field Ambulande.

remarks on Establishment of Field Ambulances.

The alterations which T am suggesting have been brought before my notice on account of the following facts:

- 1. Under present conditions the great time (often sixteen hours) that elapses before a wounded man receives efficient operative treatment and also the great reduplication of dressings whereby a man is dedressed at the R.A.P., A.D.S. and M.D.S. before being operated upon. This in my opinion is inimical to the best interests of the patients and also wastes time and surgical dressings.
- 2. The great wastage of Medical Officers when the Division is out of the line and also in nearly every case when the Division is in the line (usually one Ambulance being in reserve). This occurs often when C.C.S's. and General Hospitals are unable to cope with the work on hand.
- 3. The wastage of life in highly trained Medical Officers who are frequently killed or wounded whilst doing work which could be just as efficiently performed by combatant Officers; and, in addition, as efficient Medical Officers are unnecessarily exposed in the Torward Area without being able to treat patients there in a satisfactory manner.
- 4. The large number of Medical Officers in a Division (especially in Field Ambulances) that are not doing "legitimate" medical work. If the numbers of hours spent on "legitimate" work by Medical Officers in Ambulances were contrasted with the hours worked in Base Hospitals the result, I think, would be startling.
- 5. In the Field the large number of horses does not give an adequate return for the quantity of fodder and the number of personnel required to look after them.
- 6. The large quantity of equipment that is carried by a Field Ambul-

A Field Ambulance is practically the only unit that has not marked--ly changed its Establishment since the commencement wince of the War and I would like to suggest the introduction of :-

- (a) Bearer Companies under Non-Medical Officers who will be responsible for the evacuation of the wounded from the R.A.P's. to the Brigade Collecting Post.
- (b) A Senior Medical Officer who will be attached to the Brigade Headouarters with whom the Brigadier could consult on matters respecting the health of the troops, sanitation etc. He would be responsible for the establishment of a Brigade Collecting Post to which the wounded would be conveyed from the R.A.P's. There the cases would be sorted out (Medical and Surgical) and sent direct to the Mobile Field Hospital. Only dressings of the very greatest urgency would be done. He would have an Assistant Medical Officer who would assist him at a Brigade Collecting Post and would serve as a reinforcement Medical Officer and also attend the attached companies of the A.A.S.C. and Engineers.

- (c) Divisional Ambulance Convoys which would come under the direct control of the A.D.M.S. who would be responsible for clearing the cases from the Brigade Collecting Post to the Mobile Field Hospital. Should the S.M.O. Brigade require Motor Ambulances to work forward of the Brigade Collecting Post he could obtain same by direct application to A.D.M.S.
- (d) Mobile Field Hospitals (one (1) per Division) in which the Medical Officers do medical and surgical work and thereby the wounded are much earlier operated upon and the strain consider--ably relieved on the C.C.S's. and General Hospitals.

Discussing the scheme in detail: -

On general scheme see Appendix 1.

- (a) R.M.O's, are absolutely indispensable, but I believe that they should be selected more on the grounds of temperament and per--sonality that Medical qualifications. Men with very special Medical and Surgical qualifications are more or less wasted as R.M.O's.
- (b) Bearer Companies. The Brigade Company of stretcher-bearers would be under the control of the S.M.O., Brigade, who is responsible to A.D.M.S. The Company would be commanded by a Lieutenant (Non-Medical Officer) who could be obtained from a good general duty Sergeant of a Field Ambulance. The Lieut. Bearer Officer could arrange and post relays and superintend evacuation of wounded from the R.A.P's. to the Brigade Collect--ing Post. He would report any difficulties to the S.M.O. and apply to him for reinforcement stretcher-bearers.

Suggestion Establishment and Equipment of Bearer Company Appendix 2.

(c) The S.M.O., Brigade, would have under his control three (3) Horsed Ambulance Wagons for use in the Forward Area and also for following Battalions when the Brigade moves. He could obtain Motor Ambulances from the Divisional M.A.C. if necess--ary to assist in the Forward evacuation. The duty of the S.M.O. in the Forward Area would be to establish a Brigade Collecting Post for sorting the cases and also to receive from the R.M.O's, and Bearer Officers reports during action and transmit them to A.D.M.S., if necessary.

He would keep a supply of dressings and splints to replenish stores of R.M.O.

He would have an Assistant M.O. to work night shift. This Officer would be available if a R.M.O. were evacuated and also he could attend to the sick of attached A.A.S.C. and Engineers.

- (d) Divisional Ambulance Conv-oys. I should suggest that all cars be placed under the direct control of A.D.M.S. I believe that this would be in the best interests of the service in that it would prevent overlapping and also the A.D.M.S. would be better able to control the sending of M. Ambulances into workshops etc. For suggested Establishment see Appendix 3.
 - (e) The Mobile Field Hospital. This Field Hospital would be equipp--ed mainly to do efficient surgical work but one or two small sub-sections could be detached at any time to receive Medical cases or run a Scabies hospital. The Medical sub-section would be small and very mobile and without any excess equipment. The site would usually about five (5) miles from front line.







SECOND AUSTRALIAN DIVISION

Monthly sanitary report for month of July 1918.

Physique. Good. Reinforcements generally good.

Billets. The Infantry during the past month has been holding the line and troops have been in the forward area living in trench systems. Hone of the troops are billeted in villages except details. Transport lines of W.Garrisons are living in tents and bivouacs. During the warm weather. The principle of sinking systems of dugouts has been adopted throughout the Divisional area, especially well forward. Protectively they are highly advantageous and the occupants are relieved from the mental tension and disconfort of exposure, but the ventilation of these dugouts is bad, and even with double entrances at times the air becomes think. It is suggested that a passage be bored for a stove pipe from roof to surface of ground, and a platform attached to pipe on which will stand a Tonmy cooker. At present if one man gets P.U.O. in a cubicle they all get it and from obvious reasons it is out of the question to place these augouts out of bounds.

Clothing. is obtainable for Troops but there is atill some shortage of Australian Pattern. From the aspect of health diothing is satisfactory.

food and Cooking. The rations issued are good and plentiful. Plenty of fresh meat with a proportion of preserved ration. Vegetables are supplied from CAMON gardens which amplifies and improves the ration. Food is cooked in cases of front line Infantry, either 1600 yards behind the front line at Company Cookers, or else at Transport lines and sont up cold, usually however the front line troops get one good not weal a day. Artillery and other supporting units have their rations issued by sections or companies and cooked in their trenches or Battery positions.

Water is drawn from authorised water points. There is still a certain amount drawn from promiseuous supplies. This has been the cause of a certain amount of Diarrhoea but efforts are being made to prevent its happening.

Latrines Public latrines are in existence at Lamorra Errebilde, GLISY, MANOR Thompilde, and in addition units have their own latrines, and every effort is made by units to prevent access of flies to faces. Horse lines are gradually being improved from a deplorable condition to some pretensions to decency for the gradual disappearance of the hordes of flies. The unsatisfactory condition of bombreaks is largely due to a misleading of Army Order 2280 of 3/7/18. Where revetting material is available they still use MANOR manure and this fact leads to all sorts of abuses perticularly putting manure on top of revettments when they can no longer carry it to be recovered. The fact that the use of manure is allowed at all in revettments is taken as an invitation to carelessly deal with the manure question.

Dump of manure under supervision of Town Majors are being covered with earth, in some few cases manure is being burnt.

Baths and Laundry. Baths are in operation at LaMOTTE and BLANGY TROMVILLE and the question under consideration of establishing a baths at BOIS L'ABBE. Largo numbers of men bathe in the SOMME. There has been an ample supply of clean clothing.

Drying rooms not available and not required at present.

Health of Troops has been satisfactory when looked at in an absolute sense and latterly in a comparative sense, but from 20/8/18 to 9/7/18 there was recrudescence of P.U.O. epidemic and a large number of cases occurred in the Division.

P.U.O. Admitted July. 584. P.U.O. Nyaouated 287. July Sick admitted. 1076 Evacuated 855. Diarrhoea is slightly more prevalent than previously.
