

WINNEZEELE.  -do- 29 th A.M.	On this day, the march was a trying one, as the hill on which the town of CASSEL is situated, had to be crossed, and the distance covered was approximately 16 miles. Only one man dropped out en route.  On SEPTEMBER 28th the Fattalion moved from the EECKE AREA, 1-30 F.M., to the WINNEZEELE AREA, via STEENVORDE and WORNEIGUET, a distance of six miles. On this occasion the Fattlin. moved into tents, and the accomposation furnished it was most markedly good. The Camps into which it moved, although occupied previously for months, by many Units, were found scrupulously clean.  Companies paraded in their respective lines. Kit and general inspection was had, and in the afternoon, a half holiday.  Church Farade was held, and the Battlin. moved out from WINNEZEELE 11-30 A.M., embuseed, and were conveyed to VLAMMENIMEE arriving there at 5-30 Fem.  Left VLAMMENIMEE at 7 F.M. and marched to Area known as YPRES South, arriving there at 8 F.M., and bivouaced for the night in paddock.	Man Mohn to	
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
