



May I suggest that the instructions for the Demobilization of the A.A.S.C., (M.T.) be re-considered, please, with a view to putting this Branch on the same footing as the Ordnance.

The M.T. as far as at present can be seen is likely to be required in its full capacity for a considerable time. The running

for the last month was 50% more than in October and November.

Owing to the withdrawal of 1914 and early 1915 personnel the efficiency has been very much lowered, for many of the best Officers, N.C.O's, Artificers, and Drivers were of that Category. Their places have been to some extent filled by learners and men of a less experienced class, but the Branch is still considerably below strength. Owing to the bad conditions of the roads, long

distances, age of Vehicles, and the lower efficiency of personnel, much more work is thrown on the Workshop Staffs, who are themselves much lower in efficiency, as most of the best N.C.O's and Artificers have returned to Australia, consequently I have at present a large number of Vehicles off the road for repairs and overhaul that at any period since the Corps was formed.

Men have been sent from Divisions and reinforcements have been promised from England, which will eventually largely improve these conditions, but this can only be gradual, as even if these men have driven before, they have been for some time away from such work, and have probably never driven under such bad conditions as prevail at present in Belguim and France.

It is therefore absolutely necessary that replacements and reinforcements should be well trained before the men who

are at present driving, or in the Shops, can be spared.

I am anxious that all ranks in the M.T. should be able to participate in all the privileges given to other Branches such as Education, Leave etc, and that they should be Repatriated at the earliest moment, but I consider my first duty is to maintain the Units as near as possible at their full efficiency for as long as their services may be spared.

To do this I consider I am the only person who can say when the M.T. personnel can be spared without damage to the service, and therefore request that this Branch may be placed on the same footing as the Ordnance, set out in Demobilization General Instructions No. 8. as follows: "No member of the Ordnance Services will be embarked or givem orders to Embark without previous reference being made to the A.D.O.S., Australian Corps, who will decide when any such personnel may

be released" (substitute D.M.T.S.)

Much serious discontent has been caused by men on leave in England being allowed to arrange for their early Repatriation or for immediate Employment in England, direct with A.I.F., Headquarters. The men consider that this practice gives men who can obtain leave an unfair advantage over those who are not fortunate enough to be due for leave, and they have the idea firmly fixed in their minds that they only have to get to England to be able to arrange to return to Australia at I have a considerable number of men who are as far once. as I know A.W.L. and have been so registered for some weeks, I have just noticed on a Casualty List that some of these men have been returned to Australia, no Official notification has been received by me of extension of leave given to these men or that they were Repatriated, consequently their positions have been kept open for them.

I have still a number of N.C.O's and Men both on 75 days and ordinary leave, who are now considerably overdue, and it is not known whether these men are returning or if they are being held

for Repatriation.

With Units working at full pressure as the M.T. are doing every N.C.O. and Man is urgently required, and only a small percentage can be spared for leave, consequently when they do not return at the expiration, and I am not notified that they are to be struck off strength, it holds up leave of other men who are due thereby increasing the discontent.

AUSTRALIAN CORPS.



In General Instruction No.8, Just issued by the Department of Repatriation and Demobilisation, para 33 (a) reads:"No Member of the Ordnance Services will be embarked or given orders to embark without previous reference being made to the A.D.O.S. Australian Corps, who will decide when any such person may be released."

May it be recresented to the Department of Repatriation and Demobilisation please, That a similar Regulation is urgently required in respect of personnel of the Motor Transport Services in France and U.K..

The M.T. in France is in a peculiar position, as the work has considerably increased since the signing of the Armistice, and during the month of December 1918, the acerage mileage of each vehicle in the Australian Corps was 50% greater than in the preceding months, when active operations were in progress. This is due to the greater distances to be covered, owing to the scattered locations of the various Units of the Corps. In addition, the granting of 1914 furlough has seriously depleted the strength of all M.T. Units and to a greater degree than in the case of any other Unit in the A.I.F., with the result that M.T. Coys. are now as much as 30% below strength.

The immediate effect of this is to throw more work on the remaining drivers, and in many cases, lorries can only be manned with one driver, whose time actually on the road in some cases runs into 15 hours at a stretch. These drivers are not nearly as experienced as the men they have replaced, with the result that, on narrow and bad roads, such as are the rule in this area, lorries have more rough handling on the roars and less attention when in the park. (A driver after a long spell, single handed on a lorry naturally cannot be expected to overhaul his lorry as carefully as if it had been a normal one).

are depleted in strength and quality and at the present time there are more lorries off the roads for repairs and overhaul than has been the case since the Australian M.T. first came to France.

As a remedy men have been drawn from other Units, and reinforcements have been promised from men now in England who are under
orders for France. These steps will, it is hoped, remedy in time
the very serious state of affairs, but the new men have to be trained
and passed as efficient before they can take their places on the
driving seat of a lorry, or in the workshops, as the case may be,
and this training takes time. Even if a man has had previous experience as a motor lorry deiver, the lapse of time since he last drove
and the very different conditions of theroads and the nature of the
work necessitates careful coaching before he can be trusted on the
road, while with the man not previously experienced thereis naturally
a substantial wastage of men who, after a course of training, prove
to be unsuitable.

It therefore follows that the remedial measures can only come into full effect gradually and that, for some little time to come, small immediate results will be apparent.

I have personally addressed themen of all M.T. Units with the Corps and explained, firstly, the difficulties that at present exhist and secondly, the steps that have been and are being taken to remedy matters, and the men have recognised the peculiar nature and obligations of their particular branch of the service and cheerfully accepted the position, knowing that, although many of the privileges at present enjoyed by Infantry, and Artillery personnel are denied kame them, they will shortly be in a position to have the full benefit of the Educational and Repatriation provisions of the Bepartment.

There is, however, one matter that is causing very grave dissatisfaction and discontent, and that is, the practice which is growing up, of men while on leave, calling at the Department in London and urging their special claims to early Repatriation etc.. Cases have occurred of men who, not returning from leave, when due, have been marked by me as A.W.L. and yet subsequently a message has been received that they have either embarked for Australia, or are in London awaiting their O.C's approval to an application which has never been before him.

This drainage of men to a certain extent mullifies the effort that are being made to bring the Units up to strength and from the men's point of view gives an unfair preference to men who are available for leave over those who are not so situated. The idea is now firmly fixed in the mens Minds that, if they can only get across to the U.K. they can secure preference by putting their cases up in person, and considerable unrest in consequence prevails in all Units.

O.C's are also in the position of not knowing, when men go on leave if they will ever see them again.

It is my desire that every man under my Command should have full opportunity toenjoy any of the privileges that he may desire, but I hold that it is my first duty to maintain, so long as the A.I.F. is in the Field, the Motor Transport Service, in an efficient condition, and this object can be attained if the measures I have already refered to are carried out, but I submit that I am the best, and in fact the only, judge as to which men can be spared and whem, and I think that the Director General in his instructions to Divisions, (Copy of one of which I attach) has had in mind the conditions as applied to Infantry, Artillery and other branches which since the suspension of hostilities are merely standing by and from which men can be more readily spared without imperilling the efficiency of the units, and has overlooked the fact that the circumstances of the M.T. are not on all fours with other Units.

I would therefore ask that the M.T. be placed on the same footing as the Ordnance Services, and that no man be released either for Repatriation or Non- Military Employment, until such time as in my judgement he can be spared without prejudice to the Transport Service.

In no case would a C.O. be justified in replying Not approved or in refusing to sign the form, merely because he did not agree to the man receiving the benefit applied for, that is for me and my Officers to decide, and we, of course, act upon Cables and other evidence outside which is not available to the C.O. All the C.O. has got to certify taxkis to is, that the man can be spared; except only in the case of men of bad character whom I should expect to be told of it for my guidance in giving a decision.

The official work was then carried on at MARBAIX 70,000 Xmas "Aussies" were printed with 8 pages extra, equal to 105,000 ordinary issues.
