



Summary of work done by the police of the Anzac Mounted Division, under Major J.H.BISDEE V.C. A.P.M., Anzac Mtd Division, during the month.

DEC. 19 The police of the Anzac Mounted Division are divided into five Detachmentats of 10 men under a Sergeant, one Detachment on Divisional Headquarters, and one on each Brigade Headquarters, the whole being under the command of the A.P.M. of the

Division. Their duties are, roughly, asfollows:-

Brigade Detachments are responsible for the regulation of traffic and watering, and the maintainence of discipline generally in the Brigade area. They are to keep a constant watch for suspicious looking natives and to do their utmost to prevent espionage, acting on the principle that it is betterto arrest a number of innocent men on suspicion than to allow one genuine enemy agent top escape. They will also take over all prisoners of war as soon after capture as possible, and assist in escorting them to D.H.Q.

Police on D.H.Q. perform the same duties as regards traffic, watering and espionage in the area occupied by Divisional Troops, and are also responsible for the searching, checking and listing of all prisoners of war brought in, as well as for rationing and watering them. Complete nominal rolls are made of all prisoners, showing rank, name, unit and nationality, the clerical work involved being carried out by the A.P.M. and his staff, with the assistance of interpreters.

From December 1st to 18th D.H.Q. was stationed at BIR-EL-MAZAR and the Brigades

in the surrounding area.

During this period D.H.Q. Folice supplied patrols as follows:-

- 1. To regulate traffic on the railway crossings leading to and from the watering area.
  - 2. To regulate traffic and maintain order at the canteens.

3. A general camp patrol to keep unauthorised persons out of D.H.Q. camp,

4. To patrol the railway line from Bir-el-Mazarto MAADAN, railhead to prevent damage to the formation by troops crossing at unauthorised places, and to keep mounted troops off the wire-netting Infantry road which runs beside the railway line. All patrols except No 2 were carried out mounted.

Brigade Detachments supplied the necessary patrols in their own areas. Nothing of importance occurred until the 18th. Hostile aircraft made occasional raids on Mazar and the surrounding Supply Depots and Camps, but very little damage was done.

ending 28-12-16:-"The week has been entirely taken up in moving with the Division from Mazar to Kilo #128, and thence to EL ARISH on the 21st and 22nd, and receiving and making out nominal "rolls and tickets for prisoners captured at MAGHDABA on 23-12-16. "Preliminary arrangements weremade on the 23rd with the Military Governor and A.P.M. "52nd Division. On the night of the 23rd reports came in of over a thousand prisoners "being captured. About 250 came in during the night and the rest at midday on the 24th. "All rolls were made out, tickets handed to prisoners, prisoners searched and papers "numbered by the night of the 25th. "The procedure laid down by the A.P.M., Eastern Force was followed, and worked very "satisfactorily with the assistance of A.P.M., 52nd Division and his police. It would m be impossible for the A.P.M. of one Division only to cope with such a large number in "the time usually available. "I wish here to express my appreciation of the very efficient and willing assistance of the A.P.M., 52nd Division and his police. "The troops here being without firewood, some difficulty has been experienced in prevent-"ing the destruction of trees, palms and buildings. All units have now received definite "orders regarding this and energetic action is being taken to have these carried out. Signed J.H.BISDEE Major,

A.P.M., Anzac Mounted Division.

G.O.C., A.&.N.Z. Mtd Division directs that trees and palms, telegraph posts and buildings are not to be destroyed for firewood or other purposes.

The Military Governor states that if palm branches are required, special arrangements will be made to have same cut under expert supervision and supplied as required.

POLICE STANDING ORDERS.

MAJOR J.H.BISDEE V.C. A.P.M. Anzac Mtd Division.
HILL 40.

June 8th 1916.

I. The police will parade daily at a place and time to be fixed by the A.P.M. or Officer in charge. Those going on patrol will be mounted, the rest dismounted.

They will be inspected by the Officer or N. O. in charge. They will be dressed as for duty and receive their orders daily. Rifles will also be inspected.

Men remaining in camp are responsible for the cleanliness of the lines and quarters.

- DRESS. During the hot weather khaki shirts may be worn without jackets but M.P.arm badges must be worn.

  Men must be smart in appearance and bearing; equipment and clothing must be clean and well cared for.

  Metal must be clean and free from rust, but not necessarily polished.

  A full issue of dubbim will be drawn whenever possible and well rubbed into all leather.
- 2. A systematic patrol will be arranged of all camping areas and of all roads in the vicinity or within the area allotted to Brigades.

  One or two M.Ps. should be on duty in the vicinity of all railway stations, bridges, ferries and canteens during the time that troops are using them.

DUTIES. (A) To give any informatuon needed by troops.

- (B) To keep riders off the hard road.
  - (C) To check the pace of riders and drivers, and the speed of motor vehicles in accordance with orders.
  - (D) To see that the rule of the road is observed and that vehicles
  - do not halt where they may impede the traffic.

    (E) To inspect the passes of men riding into Kantara and men Out of Bounds, taking names and numbers of any defaulters.
  - (F) To check soldiers for not saluting.
  - (G) To see that all sanitary orders are strictly carried out and
  - report any man found to be not complying with them.

    (H) To check undue familiarity with natives.
  - (I) When in action, to collect stragglers and conduct them to the nearest units. To guard against spies. To assist in controlling
  - Prisoners of War.

    (J) To prevent plundering, marauding, making unlawful requisitions, gambling, pilfering from trains and convoys of committing offences of any kind.
  - (K) To prevent any unlawful natives or civilians from entering the camp area.

(Note) The only pass authorising a civilian or native to enter a camp is a greenpass which should bear the holder's photograph and be signed and stamped by an A.P.M. and is only valid for a w week at a time. The only exceptions to this are members of the Egyptian Forces, who should be in uniform or wearing badges and be under control.

(L) To check any disturbances or unsoldierly behaviour, taking the name, number and unit of soldiers and if necessary, (but only if really necessary.) arresting those engaged in disturbances and handing them over to their respective guards, or the nearest Guard. In such cases a written report must be sent to the A.P.M. or Officer in charge of police who will at once notify the Unit if necessary to send for the man.

- 4. RAILWAY TRAFFIC. Where a number of men are travelling on leave or otherwise two M.Ps. should accompany the train returning the same day if possible. Their duties are to prevent men travelling without leave or duty passes, or in a class of carriage to which they are not entitled and to preserve order generally.
- EXTRACTS FROM ORDERS.FOR THE INFORMATION OF THE POLICE ARE PUB-Every M.P. will make himself conversant with these orders and any that may subsequently be published. He willmalso make himself acquainted with names of all localities and troops in the vicinity and by intelligent observation he should be able to supply any information as to camping grounds, water supply etc:.
- In carrying out their duties M.Ps. are to use VIGILENCE, COURTESY,
  FIRMNESS and DISCRETION.
  Their first duty is to PREVENT irregularities and crime, so as to
  render ARRESTS unnecessary.

Appendix I. TO VOLUME 5 OF WAR DIARY OF EGYPTIAN SECTION AUSTRALIAN PROVOST CORPS.

DECEMBER 1916.

Military Police are entrusted with considerable powers which they must exercise with courtesy, firmness and discretion.

When on duty they must be vigilant and alert and observe all that is going on. They must avoid lounging and godsip and abstain from petty interference unless necessary to preserve discipline. They must be prepared at all times to give information with regard to regulations and to prevent irregularities when they seem likely to occur.

They must know their work thoroughly and their powers and limitations to enable them to act with confidence and decision. They must, by their actions keep themselves free from any suspicion of bribery or corruption, and by integrity and fair dealing earn the respect which is essential for the successful carrying out of their work.

Police usually work in pairs, and when they are of equal rank the man with the lowest number must take the responsibility.

When arrests are necessary they should be made quietly but with determination and without altercation. Quick and prompt action at the right time will almost invariably avoid trouble.

In cases of drumkenness a man should be arrested or got out of harm's way before he becomes too much under the influence of liquor.

There are no gegrees of drunkenness in Military Law. A man is drunk if he is unfit to go on duty from the effects of liquor or drugs. A man found unconscious sgould not be charged with drunkenness but taken to hospital.


Notebooks should always be carried and notes made of any unusual occurrence. Anybdetails of evidence should be noted at the time. Never trust to memory.

In making a charge, each charge should state one offence only, which should usually be in two parts, (I) Statement of offence (2) Particulars of offence. There may be more than one charge on a charge sheet. The offence should be stated as shortly and clearly as possible. Particulars of the offence should also be as short and concise as possible, and should state all the essential facts but no more. It should be absolutely fair and not suppress anybfacts which may be in the offender's favour. It shouldnalways be borne in mind that the object should be to put the actual facts of the case before the officer who will investigate it, just as it appeared to the witness, to enable him to form a just opinion. Care must be taken not that a case is not exaggerated from annoyances. Particulars should be given in the following sequence:— Date, Time, Place, Number, Rank, Name, Regt,

It is necessary to have the corroboration of at least one other witness, who must carefully read over the evidence and make quite sure that it is correct before signing it. On no account must a man sign a charge sheet that he is nit prepared to swear to.

Statement of particulars. Witnesses.

Always remember that a policeman's first duty is to prevent crime and to maintain order and discipline. He wast Keep lies

temper at all times, even under trying circumstances, and gives every men a fair deal, and treat him as he would expect to be treated under similar circumstances himself.

When on Ditsion or Brigade Headquarters or attached to any camp the police will do their share of camp duties, but will not

be detailed for fatigues except on their own lines.

Their duties on the march and in the Field are to ensure that all orders with regard to sanitation, traffic, watering etc, are carried out, to prevent straggling, and to patrol villages etc:

During active operations their duties will vary much according to circumstances, the chief being control of traffic over crossings and bridges, collecting make battle stragglers, escorting prisoners, and controlling watering areas.

As regards dress, the standard for the Australian Police is



In cases of soldiers from places outside the Cairo District the men will be detained, and escorted to the station in time to catch the next train back to their Units, and their passes handed to them. Escorts will return to their posts after the men have left.

cases of soldiers stationed in Cairo District, the passes will be endorsed by the Officer i/c Patrols at the Soldiers' Home, as previously mentioned, and they will be directed to retorn to their Units immediately.

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APPENDIX VI. TO VOLUME 5. OR WAR DIARY OF EGYPTIAN SECTION AUSTRALIAN PROVOST CORPS.

Summary of work done by the Field Troop during the month of December 1916, from report made by 0.C. Troop.

The patrols mentioned in the report for November 1916 were carried out till the 18th December, when the advance on EL ARISH was made on the night of the 18th/19th.

El Arish was occupied without resistance, and for the next three days the country within a radius of 10 miles was rigorously patrolled, my troop taking its turn.

On the night of the 22nd, the advance was resumed towards MAGHDABA, The 1st A.L.H., having to do all the advanced patrols, were placed in reserve during the early part of of this engagement, and did not go into action until late in the afternoon, no casualties being sustained by my troop. "B"Squadron, to which I was attacked, stayed bening next morning to collect captured material, arriving back at El Arish on 24th December.

A few days rest were here given us, which were badly needed by both men and horses, but we were still kept on outpost and patrols by day, but not so constantly as before owing to the 5th Mounted Brigade coming into the line.

With reference to the

I have been passing prisoners into the Field Punishment Compound at Abbassia until quite recently, but the G.O.C., Delta District and Lines of Communication Defences, now informs me that they cannot accept any more prisoners from outside the District.

The last three received from the Anzac Mounted Division, I had to take away, and I sent them to the Field Punishment Compound at Moascar, where they are undergoing their sentences under the supervision of the Officer in charge of my Detachment at that place.

I wish to recommend that for the future, Field Punishment prisoners who cannot be accommodated with the Divisons, be sent to carry out their sentences at Moascar, and that the Compound be established as a standing Field Punishment Compound for the Australian Imperial Forces in Egypt, in cases where there is no other Compoung available.

I might say that the Staff I at present have there, are fully capable of running it as a Field Punishment Compound, and there is every facility for carrying out the necessary disciplinary training of men convicted to Field Punishment.

I have spoken to Major Bisdee on this subject, and he agreed with me that it is

a very workable idea, and together we visited the Compound on Monday.

I find there are one or two alterations necessary viz: the segregation of the convicted from the unconvicted men, and this can be done with practically no expense to the Government, except the cost of a few poles, and some barbed wire.

I have written to the commandant Anzac Training Centre, and Detail Camp, With a view to obtaining the necessary poles and wire, and the labour could be supplied from men

under going Field Punishment. 7

IIIn the evnt if your approval being obtained of the place being established as a Field Punishment Compound, it can be worked in precisely the same manner as that of the one at Abbassia, and with the working of which all my officers are fully acquainted.
