



DIN ANT.	Feb. 1st	Heavy fall of snow during the night. In the Morning a muster parade of the Battalion, was held and the C.O. explained the circumstances under which Battalions would be amalgamated in the near future. Medals were presented to the winners of the various events at the Brigade Sports Meeting and the Battalion Cross_Country Meeting. At the conclusion of this parade the C.O. personally interviewed all men who were dissatified with their position on the Battalion Repatriation Precedence Roll. Thirteen men were-paraded, and, with one exception, were content with their position, when the matter had been carefully explained. One man however, preferred to take his case to the Divisional Tribunal. A working party of 2 Officers and 100 men was supplied to clear the road to ONHAYE of snow, on account of the transport difficulties,	
	" 2nd.	Another Working Party of 2 Officers and 60 men was supplied on account of a further light fall of snow. Very few men, therefore, were available for church parade at 1100 hours. Captain W.J. HALL M.C., returned from leave to BRUSSELS and took over the duties of Battalian Education Officer, vice Lieut. J. H. HILL to Australia. Dance in the evening.	
	" 3rd.	During the morning instead of the usual parades, a selection of the Australian Official War Photographs of special interest to the 4th Division were on view to the men, who were invited to give orders and have them sent to any address. A great number of the men took advantage of the offer. Hon. Hieut. A.B. CRACE evacuated to Hospital.	
	" 4th	Company Route Marches during the morning. Lieut. A.B. SPIERS took over duties of Quarter Master vice ORACE. Preparation of the equipment prior to handing in was commenced. Another dance was held in the evening.	
	" 5th	Another heavy fall of snow during the afternoon and evening. The usual disciplinary and recreational training during the morning. A conference of Quarter Masters was held at Brigade Headquarters to discuss the method to be adopted when handing the Battalion equipment to the Base. The lists required by Ordmance were commenced. 2/Lieutenant L.H. CORNELL reported for duty from O.T.C.

Lieut.Colonel A.G.SALISBURY D.S.O., returned from 75 days leave to U.K., and took ever the Command of the Brigade during the absence of Brigadier General S.C.E.HERRING D.S.O., on leave. The usual parades were held in the morning. A fine day but very cold in the afternoon. A dance was held for the men in the evening.	
	11	8th.	Very cold indeed during the early morning, when Company Route Marches were carried oute C.O. attended the Divisional tribunal which met to hear the case of Pte TOWERS J.H., as regards his position on the Battalion Repatriation Precedence Roll. After hearing the case from both sides the Tribunal upheld the C.O's decision.	
	11	9th.	Ohurch Parade was held in the Factory at 1100 hours. It was bitterly cold inthe early morning, but turned out a fine and bright day.	
	***	10 th.	The ordinary parades were held in the morning. One Company had the use of the Baths at DINANT. 2/Lieutenant C.B.CORNISH reported for duty from O.T.C.	
	11	11th	The remainder of the Battalion had the use of the Baths. The BrigadeCommander inspected the billets and Transport Lines during the morning. A dance was held in the evening. A remarkable interest is shown in these dances which are always very well attended.

Feb.	12th	The ordinary disciplinary and recreational training carried out. 3 Officers recommoitred a portion of the Divisional area with a view to selecting the best tactical position for the defence of the area. Lieuts. W.L.SCARBOROUGH, A.G.ROWE and H.L.BILLING were detailed and were allotted a section of the area. The work was not completed today.	
	***	13th	1 Officer, 2/Lieut. E.G.CRISP, and 6 O.R's left the Battalion to form portion of a party of 30 who were taken to BRUSSLES on a conducted tour, embracing the city and the field of Waterloo. The tour is to last 6 days. The reconnaissance of the pivisional area was completed and a report prepared for Brigade Headquarters which proved very satisfactory. A bridge tournament was held in the evening for the men.	
	11	14th 15th 16th	the Church Parade had to be concelled on account of the illness of Chaplain HALL.	
	***	17 th	The usual parades were held in the morning. In the afternoon the Medical Inspection which is required by the Demobilization Department in order to full up the Medical Report (A.T.F.Form 536) which accompanies every man on demobilization, was commenced by the Medical Officer. The first 50 men on the Battalion Precedence roll being examined. On completion of this examination they will be paraded before a board to be convened by the A.D.M.S. Division. Orders were received in the evening that the equipment would in all probability be handed in on the 20th. inst. A dencing class for beginners was held in the evening.	
	***	18th	Nothing definite could be obtained with regard to the handing in of equipment, and the day was spent in finalizing the arrangements for same. A thaw set in and in consequence the roads and ground under foot are in a very wet and muddy condition. 2/Lieut. C.F HALE reported for duty ex O.T.C. The 50 men inspected by the Medical Officer yesterday appeared before a board today and their papers were completed	ATTA

	***	21st.	Transport left FLORENNES for CHATELINEAU at 0800 hours and arrived at their destination at 1200 hours. C.O. and Q.M. left DINANT at 0900 hours with the remainder of the equipment, arriving at 1400 hours. Captain R.G.T.GOODMAN took over the Battalion during the C.O's absence. Everything was satisfactorily handed in and a receipt obtained from D.A.D.O.S. A dance was held in the evening for the men.
