



ROUMANIA has apparently no present intention of declaring war against any power except AUSTRIA HUNGARY. This of course destroys basis of .PARIS military convention and at most would immediately entail the SALONIKA forces observing and containing BULGARIA on GREEK frontier. I will keep you fully informed of further development. Meanwhile continue to guard against being committed to any serious action until negotiations are definitely settled and you receive necessary information and instructions.





The Commander-in-Chief is most anxious that the full number of labourers should be sent up as soon as possible so that the work may be pressed on with the utmost speed. with reference to your S.R./48/20 of 12th July, the Commander-in-Chief has been gratified by receiving so satisfactory a report on the 22nd Mounted Brigade, and he wishes that an expression of his satisfaction should be communicated to the troops concerned.

Brigade should be concentrated as soon as deemed desirable, it is presumed that its concentration will necessitate the relief of the posts which it now furnishes by the 6th Mounted Brigade. It is not understood, however, whether the troops required for this relief are available - or whether they will be available until the occupation of the BAHARIA Casis enables the garrisons in the Nile Valley East and South-East of that Casis to be dispensed with or largely reduced.

In any case, however, the only instructions that have so far been received from the War Office are to "earmark" 1 Mounted Brigade, and to ensure that it shall be in an efficient state of training, if and when, it is required to be despatched to East Africa.

Sir, I have the honour to inform you that for some time it has been found necessary to employ improvised Advanced Mechanical Transport Depots on the Canal and Western Frontier. These depots are required to deal with the distribution of Mechanical Transport Stores for vehicles distributed over two separate and widely dispersed areas, which, owing to the great distances and difficulty of communication, cannot be efficiently served direct from the Base Mechanical Transport Depot, ALEXANDRIA. Since the "Advanced Base Mechanical Transport Depot", as laid down in War Establishments Part VII, is far too large for our requirements, I would ask that the approval of the Army Council may be given to the establishment for a special Advanced Mechanical Transport Sub-depot in accord ance with the attached draft, and further, that authority may be granted for the maintenance of two such Sub-depots in EGYPT. G.S.Z.58. The Vice-Admiral, Commanding-in-Chief, MAST INDIES AND EGYPT. 14th July, 1916. Sir, Since the development of events in the HEDJAZ, I have received instructions from the War Office to consider the possibility of operations in the direction of AKABA, and, if practicable, the occupation of that place. It is pointed out that the occupation of AKABA is very desirable, since the Sherif of MECCA may need our assistance by action in that direction, and, on the other hand, it would place us in a position to take advantage of any Arab success, if a favourable opportunity should occur later. It is evident it will be impossible to reach AKABA except from the sea, and that any force there will have to be based on the sea entirely. The line of retreat of such a force, in the event of a large enemy concentration against it, would also be by sea; and, since only a small force could be spared for the occupation of AKABA in the present circumstances, the possibility that it might have to be withdrawn at short notice is one that must necessarily be taken into account. I am led, therefore, to the conclusion that the advisability of detaching a force to AKABA, with a view to the permanent occupation of the place, requires exceedingly careful consideration. It seems, however, that certain advantages might possibly be secured by landing a small force at the head of the Gulf of AKABA, with a view to its maintenance ashore only so long as / would AUSTRALIAN WAR MEMORIAL RCDIG1017382 would be required for the carrying out of certain minor operations which might be of assistance to the Sherif, and which might exert a useful moral influence by impressing the local Arabs. I find myself hampered, however, by the lack of detailed information about the country, and particularly by the lack of any even reasonably accurate map of the immediate surroundings of AKABA itself.

"Ben-my-Chree" could be sent to AKABA in order, if possible, to obtain a series of serial photographs, so far as possible continuous, of the environs of the town. The area of which I wish particularly to be enabled to compile a rough map is one bounded on the south by the wadi falling into the sea immediately south of AKABA town; on the east by a north and south line about one mile inland; on the north by an east and west line about one mile north of AKABA town; and on the west by the flat bed of the Wadi Araba and the sea.

If I find it possible to do so, I should be glad to send a General Staff Officer to accompany this reconnaissance.

I should be much obliged if you would let me know your views, as early as possible, both as to the general question of any such operations in the Gulf of AKABA as are above outlined - including the question of naval support to, and co-operation with, a landing party; - and also as to the specific recommaissance for which the services of H.M.S. "Ben-my-Chree" are asked.

General, Commander-in-Chief, Egyptian Expeditionary Force. Notes on the Senior Officers' Course at the Imperial School of Instruction, ZEITOUN.

On the 21st June a letter was sent to General Officers Commanding the Sections of the Canal Defences, and Western Frontier Force, suggesting that it might be advantageous to hold occasional courses for Senior Officers, of three or four days' duration, at the School of Instruction, with a view to developing ideas on training in general, and to enable more sumior officers to witness demonstrations in the use of machine guns, grenades, trench mortars, etc. The General Officers Commanding fell in very readily with this suggestion, and all sent in recommendations as to the various subjects which should receive attention at these courses. In accordance with these suggestions a short syllabus of instruction was drawn up by the Commandant of the School (see paper 'C'), and the first class of 12 officers assembled at the School on Monday afternoon July 10th. Two officers each were sent by No. 1, 2 and 2a Sections, and three each by No. 3 Section and the Western Frontier Force, and the majority of these made arrangements to live in Cairo though accommodation at the School was available for those who wished it. The Class lasted until Thursday morning July 13th. A more detailed syllabus of the course is given in the various papers marked 'C', and the report of the Commandant on the work of this first course is given in paper 'B'. From this report it will be seen that the experiment has been successful and that the continuation of these Senior Officers' Courses will be useful to the Force in Egypt.

2. I was present throughout this Senior Officers' Course myself and can endorse the Commandant's opinion that the officers who attended the course were satisfied that it had been beneficial to them. The various demonstrations were most excellently carried out by a skeleton battalion composed of the various classes under instruction at the School. Considering

/that

that these young officers and men had never before worked together as a unit, they showed remarkable efficiency in carrying out the various movements, none of which had been rehearsed beforehand, and there is no doubt that they, as well as the senior officers, benefited by taking part in these tactical exercises in the last week of their course. I might remark, however, that the scheme for night operations, which forms a regular part of the instructional course for young officers and N.C.O.s, did not provide much that was new for the senior officers, who were most of them already familiar with this kind of operations. It will be seen that in the scheme for the second course (see paper 'D') these night operations have been made optional. During the course I gathered from various senior officers that they would have been ready to do rather more work than they were actually given to do. This point was raised at the final conference, and it will be seen that in the scheme for the second course (paper 'E') the syllabus has been made slightly longer, and . it has been agreed that, in future, senior officers, during the hours when they are not actually attending Senior Officers' Classes, will be able to be present at any lecture or instructional class which happens to be going on at the time. It is, however, not practicable to arrange for more lectures for the senior officers themselves owing to the fact that the instructional staff at the School is already fully occupied with the ordinary instructional work. It would certainly be an improvement if, during the tactical demonstrations in the field, one senior instructional officer could be more constantly with the members of the Senior Officers* Class, but I quite recognise that under present conditions this is not possible, and that Colonel Colston and his senior staff did all that they could on these occasions to put themselves at the disposal of the Senior Officers. For this

/reason,

reason, moreover, it will not be practicable to increase the size of the Senior Officers! Classes, as the Commandant himself remarks; since he would be unable to enter into personal discussion with a greater number than 12. It is, therefore, exceedingly important that the Headquarters of Sections should select their best senior officers for these courses, which can only take place one a month, and should, so far as possible, send no officers below the rank of field officer. Colonel Colston himself laid stress on this point, and it should be noted that all three officers sent from No. 3 Section were captains.

- extremely useful, not only in showing to all who took part in it the best methods of carrying out such an attack, but also in proving the great mobility of the new Lewis gun in operations of this kind. A special report on this subject has been made by Colonel Colston and is attached hereto (see paper 'E'). A section of Stokes guns was also employed in this demonstration, but for some reason or other failed to reach its position early enough to co-operate in the attack. No doubt in subsequent courses further experiments will be made in this direction, but it seems unlikely that the Stokes gun would have sufficient mobility to co-operate with a first line attack in open warfare.
 - 4. At the Conference which ended the Senior Officers' Course one or two officers reported that young officers and N.C.O.s who have been through the School of Instruction are apt to become discouraged on returning to their units by finding that not more than 2 hours a day, in some cases, are devoted to training. The importance of defence work is fully realised, but perhaps it is worth while drawing attention to the possibility that the good work of the School may be in some degree neutralised by this inactivity. Another point raised by a good many of the officers was that the demands upon the best men

/in

in their units for special instruction in machine gunnery, Lowis gunnery, Signalling and Grenadier work, has now grown very large, and in part/they seemed to feel it a grievance when a good man, who had successfully passed an Instructional course at the School, was retained there as an Instructor. Colonel Colston fully recomised their point of view, but them asked Frankly and they suppose he to equal to carrying on the work of the School unless he retain good instructors when he winds them; he always endeavoured to retain not good N.C.O.s but only privates, and pointed out that it was always open to commanders of units, in the case where a good private had been retained as an instructor, to send another private to be trained as an instructor in his place, whereupon the old instructor would be sent back. This complaint, which rests upon very human grounds, has frequently been made to the General Staff, who had thought it their duty to uphold the claims of the School so far as possible.

As far as can be judged, the 1st Senior Officers Course proved a success. The officers were all very anxious to learn and to pick up any tips they could.

They seemed to have very little of idea of troops working in the open, or under such condition as they are most likely to meet with in this country. At the short conference the Officers brought up various points for discussion, but none of them were of great importance.

The question of the work for future courses was gone into, I have drawn up a new, slightly longer syllabus, which I think will meet the case. It would appear rather essential that the number of Officers attending should not exceed twelve, as I want as far as possible to discuss points raised, personally with each.

Officers on leaving this morning assured me that the course has been most beneficial, and useful to them.

The chief point, I noticed, is that there appears to be little or no knowledge of how to carry out an attack in open Warfare, as far as I am able to judge, Brigade Commanders have not considered this question, which might be a most vital one.

LEWIS GUNS IN OPEN WARFARE

This morning" eight Lewis Guns were tried working with a battalion advancing over open desert.

The result appeared to be most successful, they were left entirely with their Companies. In the first part of the advance in Artillery form ation, each Lewis Gum Section advanced as a small file on its own.

On nearing the position and forming lines of skirmishers, the guns of the two leading Companies at once got into the firing line. Where, as far as can be judged, their fire would have been most effective on the arrival of the leading lines of the supporting companies, the guns of these companies also joined the firing line, the result being that just before the assault there were 8 Lewis Guns all in action.

When the assault took place the gunners followed on 20 paces in rear of the assaulting line, on taking the position, the infantry "pursued with fire"; here the Lewis Guns were invaluable pouring in magazine after magazine, thus giving a tremendous supplementary fire to the infantry. The gunners arrived on the captured position almost as soon as the infant; far quicker than Lachine Guns could have got there, the Guns were also in action in a few seconds.

During the advance it was very hard to pick out the Lewis Guns, even when especially looking for them, the guns were carried at the trail, one man on each end in the Artillery formation, and then by one man with a sling. The desert here is not deep sand, but the guns easily kept up wit the infantry rushes, and I am sure must have proved effective. Even if picked out by a hostile Machine Gun, it would mean that the Machine Gun was concentrating on the Lewis instead of the advancing infantry, therefore reducing casualties amongst the Infantry and allowing the infantry to push.

Always remembering the axiom that to advance is to win, and that it is the Infantry who will gain the day in Open warfare by closing with the enemy, any concentration of any hostile Machine Gun fire on a target other than our Infantry is bound to assist the general advance.

Probably in desert warfare, owing to lack of cover, any attack will have to be carried out very rapidly, once under rifle fire. Is is impossible for the Machine Gun with its heavy triped to keep up with the pace of the Infantry; the Lewis appears to be able to do so easily. This morning the firing line was pushed on very fast, with the idea of seeing what the Lewis Gun could do. The results were most satisfactory.

Ammunition for Lewis Guns was carried in the regulation leather carriers (nine drums) or in haversack three drums fitting in each haversack, with the latter method ammunition carriers cannot be observed, each man carries two haversacks.

In this attack exercise, a Brigade Machine Gun Company (8 guns) was used to co-operate on the left flank; this proved effective, the guns were quickly got into action at range of about 700 yards, then 400 yards, finally after the position had been assaulted, the limbers galloped forward, and took up a position from whence they could "pursue with fire". It must be remembered that a lachine Gun Company acting on a flank must have sufficient infantry escort.



Sir,

with regard to the operations in the MAHAMDIYA - ROMANI area, I have the honour to inform you that the services of a selected officer are, in my opinion, essential to carry on and co-ordinate certain important work connected with the entrenched camps in that area. This work, which will become increasingly heavy as the preparations for forward movement develop, includes the planning, laying out, and organising of the forward base and entremehed camp at MAHAMDIYA, planning and re-organising depots and stores, including railway depots, reception and forwarding of large quantities of stores, and general co-ordination of all work and arrangements in connection with the above.

At present this work occupies nearly all the time of the D.A. & Q.M.G. No. 3 Section and his staff. In actual fact, however, much of the work in question is outside their true province, and corresponds rather to that of an Administrative Commandant on the Lines of Communication. I consider it essential that the Administrative Staff of the Section should, as far as possible, be relieved of these functions, in order to be free to attend to their normal duties which in the circumstances of a most difficult desert operation are already more than sufficient to occupy the whole of their energies.

The actual situation is that the line from KANTARA to

ROMANI - MARAMDIYA practically forms part of the Lines of Communication. Owing to its tactical position, however, it is necessarily in the area of the command of the General Officer Commanding, No. 3 Section, Canal Defences, and cannot be placed in charge of the Inspector General of Communications This will explain why an Administrative Commandant is required, and why such an officer in this particular case must work under the General Officer Commanding, No. 3 Section instead of under the Inspector General of Communications, as would normally be the case.

I have available for appointment as Administrative
Commandant, Colonel W.J.S. Ferguson (Retired Pay). This officer
is at present performing the duties of Camp Commandant,
Training Centre, TEL FL KEBIR, but he will shortly become
available on the reduction of the Staff of that establishment.
Colonel Ferguson's special qualifications render him specially
suitable for this post, and I have, therefore, to request
permission to appoint him accordingly, and that he may retain
his present grading as A.A.G. while so employed.

- 1. There are three works, Nos. 61, 62 and 63 at Point 259(Y.3)
 "the Punchbowl"; I recommend that they should be filled in and
 marked.
- 2. My recommendation is based on the following arguments:The effect of the Punchbowl has to be considered for two
 conditions -
 - (a) Where the enemy is in large numbers with a proportionate number of gums.
 - (b) Where he is numerically weak and has but few light guns.
- (a) is not a practicable military operation in summer and for the present may be disregarded.
- (b) is a possible, but improbable, venture; improbable because
 - i. A waterless, roadless and foodless desert has to be crossed.
- ii. For a small force to venture west of BIR EL MAHADAT is asking for capture.
- iii. Dts only object could be as a diversion to operations further north, or part of a demonstration to hold our troops in EGYPT.
- 3. Assuming, however, that he does send a force of 2,000 infantry and a battery, which seems the outside limit, what will be his objective ?.
 - His line of advance in the winter of 1915 was BIR EL MAHADAT THREE PEAKS.
 - He probably knows that the Punchbowl, though prepared, is unoccupied, and that there is a gap of three miles in our defences, of which that place is the centre.

iii. Work 47, at the northern end of THREE PEAKS, is unsupported by other works, commanded by high ground on the line Point 293 - 309 - 207 - 161 - 131, and the capture of the sand ridge THREE PEAKS would lead to the fall of Work 46.

iv. An attack from BIR EL MANADAT on any other part of FERDAN Railhead defences, or on BALLYBUNION, is too big an undertaking for a small force.

The enemy's most likely, if not only, course would be to hold Points 300 (Y.10), 293 (Y.23) and 250 (Z.19), and attack Work 47 from the direction of the Funchbowl.

I am impressed with the belief that, as long as we have some mobile troops, any advance of the enemy in summer, within striking distance of No. 2a Section advanced works, would give us a golden opportunity for offensive action.

Our object being to cut him from his line of retreat, capture or destroy him, the more he can be induced to enter the gap at the Punchbowl the easier it will be to surround him. Once that is done he will have to surrender for want of water. For this reason I recommend the abandonment of the idea of occupying the works there onnews being received of the enemy's approach.

But to leave the three works at the enemy's disposal would prolong the action and increase our casualties; for they are strongest against attack from the east and our main attack would come from an easterly direction.







I have the honour to request sanction for the establishment of a Maps and Survey Department for Army Headquarters at SALONICA in addition to the existing Topographical Section which is not adequate to meet the exigencies of the situation. It has been necessary to triangulate and survey the country round SALONICA without reference to the existing inaccurate 1/200,000 maps; and, in view of the urgency of this work, the whole preparation and issue of the new maps must be carried out at SALONICA. There are still some 1,200 square miles to be surveyed, and it is necessary that special measures be taken to ensure that the completion of this work is not hindered by the heavy routine work of issuing and draughting mans, supervising stores, and attending to general administration. For this reason I recommend, and have provisionally sanctioned, the following establishment for a Maps and Survey Department which will undertake the stationary work at A.H.Q., thus freeing the Topographical Section for work in the field :-



This operation should not, however, be undertaken until the completion of the works now in progress at ROMANI MAHAMDIYA, (which, he undertaken can be completed approximately by the end of this month), and until the railway and pipe line has been pushed forward far enough to be able to serve the force at EL RABAH.
- The Commander -in-Chief does not wish to render immobile, by confining your troops to an offensive role behind entrenchments, one man more than is necessary. - the force placed about EL RABAH should, therefore, be thoroughly entrenched, and the defensive arrangements covering railhead at that place should be fully adequate to enable the garrison to maintain their ground, and to protect the railhead until sufficient supporting troops from MAHAMDIYA can be brought up to repel any attack which the enemy may endeavour to make.
