1. The approach to the assembly positions will be made in accordance with Liarch Table attached.

Troops will be in assembly positions not later than Zero minus 1 hour and will report completion of move to Brigade Headquarters.

- 3. In the assembly area C.Os of Units will exercise their own discretion as to frontages and depth provided that the 4th. and 3rd. Battalions form up SOUTH of the road which runs L.7.B.4.7. via CRUCIFIX.

 The Suffolks will form up NORTH of this road.
- 3. Troops operating on the flanks are as follows :-

- 4. The Infantry Start Line is now amended to read L.27.C.O.A. L.1.D.7.O.
- 5. At Zero hour the barrage will fall 200 yards in advance of the Infantry Start Line. The 1st.lift will be at Zero plus 3. The 2nd.lift will be at Zero plus 5. The next and succeeding lifts up to and including the 11th.lift will be at intervals of 3 minutes. The 12th. and following lifts will be made at intervals of 4 minutes. Each lift will be 100 yards.

The Infantry will, at Zero, close up to the barrage and as it lifts

follow to the attack.

In front of the BROWN line the Artillery will halt until Zero plus 3 hours 10 minutes. During this halt the 2nd. and 4th. Battalions will occupy and consolidate the BROWN line; and the 23rd.N.G.Company will take up suitable positions for their barrage task, covering the advance from the BROWN to the RED lines.

During this period also the 1st. and 3rd. Battalions will get into

position for the resumption of the advance.

At Zero plus 3 hours 10 minutes the 1st. and 3rd. Battalions will pass to the capture of the RED line. In front of the RED line the protective barrage will dwell for 15 minutes, when it will cease. The 1st. and 3rd. Battalions will them exploit success and gain the BLUE line. This exploitation will be assisted by Field Artillery. Machine Guns and Trench hortars under direct arrangements between Battalion Commanders concerned and Liaison Officers with them.

6. Two tanks will assist in the operation and will be used against any enemy strongholds which continue resistance.

They will approach the tape along the NORTH side of the HESBECOURT

SPUR and will pass the Infantry Start Line at Zero.

Having reached a suitable supporting position they will be avail-

able to assist Company Commanders as required.

The Infantry attack will be pressed forward regardless of the action of the lanks, which, in this action, are to be regarded as supporting unita rather than armoured patrols.

The tanks will, in addition to the above tasks, make approaches for the Infantry through the wire which exists along the tronch systems.

Their activities will not, however, extend beyond the RED line, upon

the capture of which they will return to the rallying point.

The 1st. and 3rd. Battalions will each attach one man to "B" Company. No.2 Tank Battalion, for the operation. These men will report at 9 a.m. on "Y" day to a location which will be notified subsequently and will act as ground scouts and connecting files between tanks and Infantry. P.T.O.

The 1st. H. G. Company will attach one Section V. H. Gs to each Battalion.

The 23rd. ii. G. Company will on conclusion of the barrage task for the

up into the line as to the proper use of ground flares and dises and that considerable risk must be run in signalling to our Contact Eachines. It is imporative for the benefit of the troops in general and especially of the heavy artillery that information remarding front line positions be brought back by the quickest method, which is by nachino.

(vi). Troops in front line at all times, even after some days subsequent to operations, will be provided with flares and discs, so that positions may be signalled when called for to the ordinary norn-

ing and evening Contact Hachines.

2'.COUNTER-ATTACK HACHTHES.

(i). From Zoro onwards counter-attack rachines will be constantly in the air with the object of observing heatile concentrations or ab-

normal novement.

(ii). In the event of an enery concentration indicating a counterattack, the counter attack aeroplane will signal this information to the artillory by wireless. In the case of a counter attack actually davaloping a WHITE parachute flare will be fired by the aeroplane in the direction of the troops roving for the impending counter attack, for the inforration of the infantry.







- (a) Work of the 3 guns of "A" Section under Lieut. C.S. Williams.

 After relief by Second Australian Machine Gun Company on night of 20/21st Septr. the guns of this Section moved round behind "A" Coy. First Battalion into positions covering BUCKSHOT RAVINE. At zero hour the Infantry moved out and these guns moved forward into NINNON TRENCH, still covering the same ground. At zero plus 30 minutes these guns again moved forward and took up positions in the gap which formed between the First and Sixth Battalions, and covered the road leading into BELLICOURT and BUCKSHOT RAVINE.

Transport Officer's Monthly Appreciation.

During the month under review the Transport of this Unit has maintained its normal standard of efficiency. The personnel has varied considerably owing to casualties caused by line operations and 1914 men returning to Australia on leave. The general physique of the drivers is good and they have suffered no illnesses, while leave to United Kingdom has been granted to a number of them.

The good condition of the horses has been maintained and with the exception of one case they have been quite free from any disease. This state of affairs has been made possible owing to the excellent facilities that existed for grazing and watering.

The following is a brief summary of the work done during the month.

During the first week, whilst at rest at MORCOURT our duties con-

On the morning of 6th Septr. Transport was brigaded and moved out under the command of the O.C. 2nd Aust. Divisional Supply Train to MONT ST. QUENTIN. On the march considerable delay was caused through conjection on the roads near CLERY, but we arrived at our destination without accident or trouble.

On the 8-9-18 we again moved, this time with the Company, to DOINGT. Once more conjection of traffice on the roads was particularly noticeable.

On 9-9-18 Transport moved out with Company to TINCOURT where it was established with Rear Headquarters for the forthcoming operations.

During the operations from 10th to 15th instant, in addition to the ordinary routine work of moving sections into the line and their daily rations, 140,000 rounds of S2A.A.were transported to the gun positions. In the performance of the work on 12th Septr. 3 horses were killed, 2 men were wounded and a limber was slightly damaged.

On 15-9-18 the fighting limbers of each section moved up, (the respective sections being attached to 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th Infantry Battns, the limbers moved with them). Rations and ammunition were transported. During the second phase of the operation, as one section was doing barrage work, Headquarters transport was utilised for the purpose of carrying 40,000 rounds of S.A.A.

On 22-9-18 Transport was re-assembled on the outskirts of HERVILLY where it remained until marching orders were received on 24-9-18, when we proceeded to BIACHES.

On 25-9-18 the Transport (less the cooker) moved, brigaded under Captain Bootle, 1st Battalion from BIACHES to EPAGNETTE as per Appendix 16. This march was conducted in 3 days and was free from accident, there being no conjestion on the roads.
