

l. The Battalaon will move from Bendigo Camp to Camp at Shelter Wood at X.22.C. today the 5th.inst.

2. ORDER OF MARCH HOUR OF MARCH. "B"Company 1000 men n 1005. -aDu u 1010. aH6 a 1015. WAU 1020.

Troops will move in file.

100 yds. will be maintained between Plateonsand every six vehicles.

3. ROUTE. Via Contalmaison.

4. DRESS Full marching order plus two blankets. Blankets to be rolled round the pack. Leather jerkins and sheepskins to he worn. Steel helmets will be worn, felt hats and greatcoats to be carried in the pack. Fulliwater bottkes and unexpended portion of days rations to be carried.

5. Lieut. H. M. Shield will march in rear of the Battalion and collect all.

6. Lieut. S.J. Chapman with a party of 5 N.C.O's (one from each Coy.) will report to Bgde. Headquarters at 0900 as advance party, to allot accomedati in the new area. Lieut. Chapman will report to Battalion Officebefore moving out, to obtain Coy. strengths etc. After allocation of accomodation the N.C.O's in the party will be instructed to meet their units, and guide them to their alloted area.

7. Lieut. J.S. Young and a party consisting of 2 Sanitary men from weach Coy., anda a Sanitary Sjt. will remain in present camp as rear party, to

hand over the camp to the incoming Unit.

A certificate will be obtained from the incoming Unit that the camp has been handed over in a clean and tidy condition. The certificate will be forwarded to the Adjt.

9. Officers kits will be stacked at Q.M. 's store by 0930.

PATROLS 1700-1900 Patrols on the nights of 22nd. and 23rd. reported no enemy movement in the front line, and a daylight patrol was sent out at 1700 to reconnoitre THE MAZE, and returned at 1900, having been all through the enemy lines facing our sector, reporting that the enemy had vacated his lines.

The order was given to advance - Two bombing teams from "A" Coy. were ordered to proceed into THE MAZE, one team to clean up the CHORD LINE, and the other to work up BAYONET TRENCH, and create a bomb stop at M.24.B.40.99. Two bombing teams from "B" Coy. were ordered to proceed into the MAZE, one team to clean up the MAZE, and the other to work up GIRDnTRENCH as far as BLUE GUT and create a bomb stop at M.18.C.4.7.

At 2035 the remainder of "A" and "B" Companies moved out and occupied the enemy thenches, "A" Company occupying BAYONET TRENCH and the CHORD LINE. "B" Company occupying GIRD TRENCH. The CHORD LINE was then consolidated and saps dug from YARRA BEND to M.24.B.32.92. and M.24.A.5.8. and M.24.A.72.9.

"D" Company moved up from YARRA BANK and took over old line from "A" Company, "C" Company taking over from "B" Company.

PATROLS 2100

a patrol consisting of 1 Officer and 10 Other ranks was sent out to investigate BANK TRENCH. This patrol found BANK TRENCH occupied by a few snipers. These were driven off by the patrol. At 2300 this patrol reported BANK TRENCH clear of the enemy.

ADVANCE 2330 BANK TRENCH and consolidate it. Up to this point there was no connection between us and the flank Battalions.

Two more Officers' patrols were then sent forward, one working up BLUE CUT and the other working up YELLOW CUT. These patrols examined the ground forward for about 600 yards, and reported the enemy retiring to OATh LANE.

The enemy placed a heavy barrage on our positions and greatly hampered operations. We linked up with the right Battalion at BANK TRENCH. No connection so far with the left Battalion. It was owing to our flanks being unprotected, our advance was held up till 1300.

ADVANCE 1300 At 1300 our line moved forward towards OAT LAME, reinforced by one company from THE MAZE. Strong opposition was met with and enemy shelling was intense. Casualties heavy from machine gun fire and artillery fire.

At 1530 OAT LAME was occupied, 2 machine guns and 2 prisoners being captured.

ARTILLERY

During the advance from BANK TRENCH the enemy persisted in a strong barrage, hampering our movement to a great extent.

ADVANCE At 0100. *D* Company moved forward to occupy WHEAT TRENCH.

PATROLS 1330 one Officer, I Lewis Gun and 30 Other ranks to establish a post at N.7.C.8.9. One Bomb team and fifteen riflemen to N.7. A.4.4. At 1530 the patrols returned having encountered the enemy and were forced back. Enemy snipers and machine guns were active. A fighting ptrol was then sent along WHEAT TRENCH and finally dislodged the enemy.

1800 At 1800 our troops established posts at N.7.C.5.7. and N.7.C. 8.5%. Patrols were despatched from the left and right to link up with the flank Battalions, and duly reported having done so.

1. INFORMATION. The Woods North of BAIZIEUX in Squares C.a. and U.29. are enclosed by a belt of wire in most places about 12 feet deep. All trenches are manned. A deep and steep valley extends from the road junction at C.6.A. 1.3. to U.29.C.0.0. which is swept by a Machine Gun at C.5.B.6.2.

The Wood at C.5. is occupied but no trenches or wire can

be seen in it.

BAIZIEUX Village does not appear to be defended.

Movement of Guns and Infantry in a S.E. direction was seen on all roads south of AMIENS-ALBERT Road.

The 2nd Australian Division is operating on our right and the 14th Corps on our left.

(E) In the event of an enemy counter attack dislodging any part of the garrison of our forward of out forward, or any other part of our newly captured area, the reserve garrison, located in captured enemy dugouts, must immediately launch a counter attack to regain the lost ground.

On outpost line sending up S.O.S. Signal reserve garrison in sedond line will immediately man their trenches. If outpost line is dislodged it will become the duty of the garrison occupying the second right flank objective to launch a counter attack in order to regain the lost ground.

(h) The Medical Officer in conjunction with the A.D.M.S. will make all arrangements for the evacuation of wounded.

(i) All leaders will make sure that every man carries his first Field Dressing and Identity Disc.

(j) The most stringent precautions will be taken to ensure that no Officer or Other Rank carries with him any papers, maps or documents.




