

Dec 31 been sub-divided into five Branches, each with its necessary re-sub-divisions. This system has worked successfully. Premises sufficient for office accomodation have been occupied at 54, Victoria Street, Belgrave Square, Eaton Place and Grosvenor Place. Attached reports show that 16 ships sailed from English ports, during the period under review, conveying, 491 Officers, 55 Nurses and 13,039 other ranks, to various Australian ports. Transports in all cases were reported comfortable and commodious. Transport arrangements from Divisional Groups in France, to concentration camps in United Kingdom, thence to port of embarkation were sufficient and satisfactory. The Non-Military employment Branch established at the beginning of this period, reports a splendid response to the various schemes, educational and industrial, inaugurated in France 450 University applications were received and dealt with - all the and in United Kingdom. leading Universities of United Kingdom promising their assistance to students. 1.D. Branch (Non-Military Employment) was inaugurated on 1st December 1918 under Lieut. Colonel J.M.A. Durrant, C.M.G., D.S.O.

The policy was defined and the Branch sub-divided as follows:-

- 1.D.1. Early repatriations.

  Discharges elsewhere than in Australia.

  Leave for Educational and Industrial reasons.

  Extended leave prior to embarkation.
- 1.D.2. Non-Military Employment (Educational)

- 1.D.3. Non-Military Employment (Industrial).

(a) Shipbuilding.

(b) General engineering.

(c) Electrical, Aeroplanes, Motors.

(d) Wools and Textiles.

- (e) Building trades.
- (f) Miscellaneous.

1.D.4. Military training.

Organisation of the Branch was commenced and matters of policy discussed.

Checking of the various applications received from the Sections of this Brankc and the submitting of them for the approval of the Director General was carried out.

1.D.1. 110 applications for Early Repatriation received and 6 were approved.

252 applications for Discharge elsewhere than in

Australia, received and 36 approved.
220 applications for Leave for Educational and

Industrial reasons received and 67 approved.

1.D.2. (Educational Report)

In the original prospectus of the Education Service, plans were laid for placing University graduates and undergraduates in British Universities, and for the training of men who wish to begin University courses. Nothing could be donen until the conditions of military release were decided. The early repatriation of undergraduates was recommended by the Director, and sanctioned by Repatriation and Demobilisation, and this order was read to include others who had broken definite courses of study, and were equivalent to undergraduates. The A.A.M.C. and A.A.D.S. tooknover the charge of medical and dental officers, thus leaving to the Education Service only non-medical and

non-dental graduates, such undergraduates as missed early repatriation and men who had not yet started courses when they enlisted.

The University and Professional section (I.D.2.2.) was entrusted to 2/Lt. H.W.Allen and 2/Lt. J.H. Vaughan. Various Universities were visited - Oxford by the Deputy Director, Cambridge and London by Lieut. Allen, Manchester, Liverpool, Leeds, Birmingham, and Sheffield by Lt. Vaughan and Capt. Sewell (who was for a while attached to I.D.2.2.). Bristol had already promised by letter to tale 100 of our students in Engineering. An arrangement was made with the Council of Legal Education and Middle Temple Library for accepting students without All these bodies promised to take our men as students, and grant them concessions for war service and arrangements made for accepting them. Assistance was also enlisted from the Universities Bureau of Empire, the Officers University and Technical Classes, and the Board of Education.

An examination of 450 University applications showed 70 post-graduates (13 medical), 180 who are either undergraduates or in an equivalent position, and 200 who have not started University courses. 24 who were not considered qualified to begin a University course were recommended for the Rue School. The post-graduate medical students were informed that the A.A.M.C. was arranging for them and men in a position equivalent to undergraduates were advised to apply for early repatriation. A number of men who had made agreements with Universities or other institutions were granted leave.

# Practice Lessons.

Practice Lessons were given daily and were followed by discussion and criticism of the method employed. The standard of efficiency in teaching varied but was, in the main, high. Thirteen of the Students were experienced teachers, some being of no mean ability. Several of the students, without previous teaching experience, did not suffer by comparison with those having experience. The most pleasing feature was the degree of skill in presenting, coupled with knowledge of the subject, which was displayed by those who purpose instructing in [Land Pursuits], 'Trades and Crafts' and 'Business Principles'. The less apt were most ready to receive advice in method.

### Study Circles etc.

The Study Circles were inaugerated in a manner which was as near as possible that in which a Circle would be started in a Military Camp. The whole of the Students were included in the Circle, the obvious objection as to size being overruled forinstruction purposes; each Study period was followed by discussion of the work. Besides illustrating the method of starting and carrying out a Study Circle, an admirable opportunity was given to estimate in some measure the attainments of the Students. The success of the Circles was pronounced, and indicated quite clearly what a force they will become in the A.I.F. if properly regulated.

Each Student wrote three Essays during the course. It was made clear that matter rather than form was desired. Specimens of the work are attached. As a result of a study of these one is again forced to comment on the high standard of education of the men associated with the Land Pursuits, revealed. It would be interesting to find to what degree the class superiority in general education of these men persists mong the soldiers as a whole.

## Conclusion.

The first course of the Instructors' School shows quite clearly that the Instructors are efficient and imbued with the idex right spirit. Unfortunately the delay in the announcement of the Service Establishment has prevented the Education Officers from keeping all the Instructors desired, but now that the position has been defined, the number of Instructors should increase.

After several preliminary discussions between
Director and Deputy Director and Lord Gorrell of the
War Office a conference on Lectures to the Troops had
been held on 9.8.18. at Universities House, Bloomsbury
Square, attended by Lord Gorrell in private capacity
and by representatives of the Australian, Canadian, and
New Zealand forces and the American Y.M.C.A., and Y.M.C.A.
Universities Committee.

It was agreed that lecturers on distinctly educational topics (as distinguished from entertainment lectures) should be pooled to prevent overlapping and that periodical meetings of representatives of various organisations and forces should be held to settle questions arising. A standard rate of fees to lecturers was also agreed to.

At the first official meeting of the Committee on Lectures on 15.10.12, Lord Gorrell of the War Office, presided and the following bodies were represented. The Navy, the War Office, A.I.F., Canadian Forces, N.Z.E.F., American Y.M.C.A., Y.M.C.A. Universities Committee and Q.M.A.A.C.

It was agreed :-

- 1. That a general list of lecturers be kept at S.D.8. of all lecturers available for the Troops and the Fleet.
- 2. That each body represented on the Committee of Lectures send to S.D.8. all information it collects as to lecturers available.
- 3. That S.D.8. take steps to supplement this information.
- 4. That each body responsible for bringing in a lecturer have first call on his services.
- 5. That at a weekly meeting of Committee of Lectures final allocation of lecturer be made.
- 6. A flat rate of fees was agreed to of £1 per day, £5 per week, £300 per year.

In the original prospectus of the Education Service, plans were laid for placing University graduates and undergraduates in British Universities, and for the training of men who wishes to begin University courses. Nothing could be done, until the conditions of military release were decided. The early repatriation of undergraduates was recommended by the Director, and sanctioned by Repatriation and Demobilization, and this order was read to include others who had broken definite courses of study, and were equivalent to undergraduates. The A.A.M.C. and A.A.D.S. took over the charge of medical and dental officers, thus leaving to the Education Service only non-medical and non-dental graduates, such undergraduates as missed early repatriation and men who had not yet started courses when they enlisted.

The University and Professional section (I.D.2.2.) was entrusted to 2/Lt. H.W. Allen and 2/Lt. J.H. Vaughan. Various Universities were visited - Oxford by the Deputy Director, Cambridge and London by Lieut. Allen, Manchester, Liverpool, Leeds, Birmingham, and Sheffield by Lt. Vaughan and Capt. Sewell (who was for a while attached to I.D.2.2). Bristol had already promised by letter to take 100 of our students in Engineering. An arrangement was made with the Council of Legal Education and Middle Temple Library for accepting students without fee. All these bodies promised to take our men as students, and grant them concessions for war service and arrangements made for accepting them. Assistance was also enlisted from the Universities Bureau of Empire, the Officers University and Technical Classes, and the Board of Education.

An examination of 450 University applications showed 70 post-graduates (13 medical), 180 who are either undergraduates or in an equivalent position, and 200 who have not started University courses. 24 who were not considered qualified to begin a University course were recommended for the Rue School. The post-graduate medical students were informed that the A.A.M.C. was arranging for them and men in a position equivalent to undergraduates were advised to apply for early repatriation. A number of men who had made agreements with Universities or other institutions were granted leave.

Numerous interviews were held with various Associations connected with agricultural pursuits and circulars issued through them for farming out of A.I.F. agricultural students.

An inspection was made of the whole area at Sutton Veny with a view to the establishment of an Agricultural Training Depot and a detailed report submitted.

Enquiries were made by Lieut. Kelly at Bradford and Leeds for woolclassing students and a report submitted. Negotiations were finalised with wool firms for supply of raw material for classes in wool. Arrangements made for a class in wool at Halifax for 50 students.

All Divisions were establishing Divisional Central Schools for various advanced classes and for classes units were unable to provide. The 2nd Australian Division took over a small college building and the 5th Australian Division took over an old German Hospital with accommodation for 1,000 students. The Corps Central School was established as a commercial and advanced study centre dealing with advanced accountancy, bookkeeping, shorthand and Commercial art, mathematics, history, economics, &c.

The Corps Technical School was also formed. Two thousand skilled tradesmen were receiving training in its construction which takes a month and on completion it was proposed to attach 1500 - 2000 students per period for instruction.

#### Practice Lessons.

Practice Lessons were given daily and were followed by discussion and criticism of the method employed. The standard of efficiency in teaching varied but was, in the main, high. Thirteen of the Students were experienced teachers, some being of no mean ability. Several of the students, without previous teaching experience, did not suffer by comparison with those having experience. The most pleasing feature was the degree of skill in presenting, coupled with knowledge of the subject,

which was displayed by those who purpose instructing in 'Land Pursuits', 'Trades and Crafts' and 'Business Principles'. The less apt were most ready to receive advice in method.

### Study Circles &c.

The Study Circles were inaugurated in a manner which was as near as possible that in which a Circle would be started in a Military Camp. The whole of the Students were included in the Circle, the obvious objection as to size being overruled for instruction purposes: each Study period was followed by discussion of the work. Besides illustrating the method of starting and carrying out a Study Circle, an admirable opportunity was given to estimate in some measure the attainments of the Students. The success of the Circles was pronounced, and indicated quite clearly what a force they will become in the A.I.F. if properly regulated.

Each Student wrote three Essays during the course. It was made clear that matter rather than form was desired. Specimens of the work are attached. As a result of a study of these one is again forced to comment on the high standard of education of the men associated with the Land Pursuits, revealed. It would be interesting to find to what degree the class superiority in general education of these men persists among the soldiers as a whole.

#### Conclusion.

The first Course of the Instructors' School shows quite clear;
ly that the Instructors are efficient and imbued with the right
spirit. Unfortunately the delay in the announcement of the Service
Establishment has prevented the Education Officers from keeping
all the Instructors desired: but now that the position has been
defined, the number of Instructors should increase.



# GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS No. 2.

- 11. The Organisation of the Department is set out in Annexure A attached hereto.
- 12. The attention of all members of the A.I.F. is to be drawn to the fact that amendment of the Commonwealth Defence Act was assented to on June 19th, 1918, providing that in lieu of the arrangement that the period of service lasts for "the duration of the war and four months after," the Governor-General may declare by Proclamation that the forces "may be maintained after the time of war and so long as that proclamation remains in force."
  - The effect of the amendment is that any person now serving in the A.I.F. has no claim or right to discharge under the terms of his original enlistment. The intention of the amendment is entirely favourable to the members of the A.I.F. since it empowers the Commonwealth Government to pay, feed and clothe them as soldiers until such time as Repatriation is completed.
- 13. Reference General Instructions No. 1 para. 10a. A supply of A.I.F. Demobilisation Form No. 534 and instructions for its compilation have been issued to all A.I.F. Units. A copy of the abovementioned instructions is attached hereto. (Annexure B.)
- 14. Regulations covering the grant of discharge elsewhere than in Australia are promulgated herewith.

  - A.I.F. Form 535 (Application for Discharge) is printed as part of Annexure C. Copies of this form will be distributed in bulk to all Units forthwith.
- Regulations covering the grant of applications for early repatriation to Australia are promulgated herewith. (Annexure D.)
  - A.I.F. Form 537 (Application for early repatriation) is printed as part of Annexure D. Copies of this form will be distributed in bulk to all units forthwith.



# Instructions to Officers responsible for filling in A.I.F. Demobilisation Form No. 534.

All Officers entrusted with the duty of compiling A.I.F. Form No. 534 will carefully note the following :-

- The Commanding Officer of each unit will be responsible for filling in a Demobilisation Form No. 534 for every
  soldier under his command. The forms are to be filled in under the direct supervision of an officer, who
  must interrogate the soldier and ensure that the information recorded is complete and accurate.
- A sufficient quantity of forms will be delivered to each unit by the A.I.F. Postal Service. Reserve pools of uncompleted forms will be established at each Headquarters and all Divisional Headquarters, from which source further demands can be made if required.
- 3. The work of filling in the forms will be simultaneous as tar as possible throughout the A.I.F.—starting on Tuesday, 17th December, 1918, or as early as possible thereafter as circumstances permit.
- 4. Every man is to be informed that the information asked for on this form is exclusively for the use of the Repatriation and Demobilisation Department, A.I.F. It does not reach the Pensions Department, nor has it anything to do with the allotment of his pension or the granting of other than Repatriation privileges.
- Question No. 11 relating to a promise of employment should only be answered affirmatively if there has been a definite promise of employment. The Commanding Officer must take all possible steps to ensure that this question is truthfully answered.
- 6. The answering of question No. 14 is optional to the soldier.
- Electoral question 16. The State in Australia and the Federal Electorate in which the soldier has resided for a period of at least six months continuously are to be given.
- 8. The questions on the front of the form printed in "italics" and underlined will be filled in by the Repatriation and Demobilisation Department in London.
- 9. Under the heading "General Remarks" on the back of the form, any special request or information MAY be filled in, provided the questions on the front portion do not cover the information which it is desired to state.
- 10. The greatest expedition consistent with accuracy must be observed in completing this work. Immediately a substantial majority of forms for any unit has been filled in, they will be strongly packed and posted.

Each packet should be clearly addressed as follows:-

THE DIRECTOR-GENERAL,

Repatriation and Demobilisation Dept., A.I.F., 54, Victoria Street, LONDON, S.W. 1.

- 11. The remainder of the forms will be held until EVERY soldier under the command has his form filled in. They will then be posted to London in the manner set out in para. 10 above. Any surplus forms not required by units will then be returned to the Headquarters or Divisional pool, by whom they will be collected and retained until instructions are issued for the return of such unused forms.
- 12. The work of filling in the forms must be completed by December 31st, 1918, when O.C. Units will forward to the Director-General in London a nominal roll of any soldiers under their command for whom a form has NOT been filled in by that date, giving reasons for failure to complete such forms.
- 13. Care must be taken that the forms are completed in legible writing. All surnames and the Federal Electorate must be shown in block letters.
- 14. The Educational Service section of the form below the perforated line must NOT be detached.

One Form No. 534 will be filled in for every Member of the Australian Imperial Force.

### ANNEXURE C.

Vide Para. 14.

- Discharge elsewhere than in Australia will be granted sparingly, and only under special circumstances. The
  interests of Australia, rather than of the individual, will have first consideration.
- No such discharge can, in any case, be considered until, having regard to the military situation and the requirements of this Department, the applicant's military service can be dispensed with.
- 3. Such discharges will be granted only for very substantial reasons, and only in exceptional cases. The guiding principle will be that such discharge must be desirable and unobjectionable on broad national grounds. It is against Australian policy to acquiesce in any member of the A.I.F. giving up his Australian citizenship.
- 4. It is a condition precedent to any such grant of discharge that the applicant must, if called upon, be able to produce evidence to the satisfaction of the Director-General, Repatriation and Demobilisation, of the following facts:—
  - (a) That he has no dependants in Australia; or that his dependants in Australia are agreeable that he should be discharged elsewhere than in Australia.
  - (b) That his domicile was ordinarily outside Australia before the war, and that, if returned to Australia, it will be necessary for him again to leave Australia for the place at which he desires discharge.
  - (c) That he is able to maintain himself in the country in which he desires discharge, or in the country to which he intends to go after discharge.

The places other than Australia, in which discharges can be granted are confined to :-

- (a) The United Kingdom.
- (b) Some place en route, in the normal course, between the United Kingdom and Australia, e.g., France, Egypt or Colombo.
- 5. In every case the applicant must furnish an undertaking on the prescribed form that the issue of the desired discharge absolves the Government of the Commonwealth of Australia from any further liability to repatriate him, his wife, or widow, or any of his dependants, to any country outside the United Kingdom.
- 6. The question whether persons so discharged elsewhere than in Australia will be entitled to any war gratuity or to leave on full pay in lieu of same, or to a payment to cover the cost of the voyage, or to cover pay and sustenance during period of voyage to Australia, or to pension rights, or the like, has not yet been decided; but it is probable that no such pay will be granted, except at the discretion of the Director-General of Repatriation and Demobilisation, and then only on compassionate grounds.
- 7. Plain clothes or allowance in lieu upon discharge will be given subject to provisions of War Financial Regulations No. 50 in following amounts:—

30s. per suit of plain clothes and cap.

21s. 9d. per overcoat.


8. Deferred Pay is payable on discharge. The member's Pay Account, including Deferred, Balance of Nett Rate, and Allotment (if any) will be settled as follows:—

30 per cent. on discharge.

35 per cent, after one month.

The balance after three mnoths from date of discharge.

- Upon the granting of the discharge, the individual so discharged must, at his own expense, return to a place designated by the Director-General, Repatriation and Demobilisation, all military arms, equipment, uniform and clothing in his possession.
- 10. Each applicant for discharge shall be examined by a Medical Board, as ordered by the Director-General, Repatriation and Demobilisation. The Medical Board will express and record an opinion of the applicant's condition.
- 11. The decision of the Director-General of Repatriation and Demobilisation shall be final in each case. The Director-General, R. and D., may defer or postpone the consideration of any application, or the granting of any discharge, to any date.
- 12. The discharge of any officer or soldier authorised by the Director-General, Repatriation and Demobilisation, to be discharged, will be carried out by an officer deputed by the Director-General, R. and D.
- 13. Any Commanding Officer to whom application for such discharge is made by an Officer or soldier under his command, is to forward the same through the usual channel, to this office on the prescribed A.I.F. Form 535, together with his recommendation.

- Applications for early repatriation will be submitted, through the usual A.I.F. channels, to this Department, for the decision of the Director-General.
- 2. Every application must be accompanied by a certificate of the Commanding Officer to the effect :-
  - (a) That the applicant can be spared from military duty. In the case of Divisions this must be endorsed by the Divisional Commander.
  - (b) That the C.O. has, as far as possible, satisfied himself that the accompanying statement of reasons by the applicant is bona fide and true. If there are no means of verifying the statement he should so report.
- 3. The applicant must submit a statement in writing, accompanied where possible by documentary evidence, setting out fully and frankly the reasons for which early repatriation is desired. The applicant must also sign a statement to the effect that he agrees to a debit of not more than £1 10s, being entered in his paybook, to cover the cost of any cable to Australia that may be considered necessary to verify his statements.
- 4. Such applications will be granted only very sparingly, and should not be encouraged; seeing that it would be most unfair to the great body of the personnel to grant special priority to individuals, except for the most substantial reasons.
- 5. The only reasons which will receive favourable consideration fall under one or more of the following heads:-
  - (a) Business reasons: but it must be shewn that great hardship will ensue to a business or an individual, if repatriation occurs only in the normal course.
  - (b) Family reasons: but these must be of a distressful nature, and the early repatriation of the applicant must be shewn to be a measure of relief of such distress.
  - (c) Educational reasons: but it must be shewn that there would be substantial hardship to the individual if his repatriation occurs only in the normal course.
  - (d) Public or National reasons: where the applicant is holder of an important public office, or where his early return is desirable on National economic grounds.

With reference to the Cadre System adopted by the British War Office, it is suggested that this is not necessary in the A.I.F.

The proposal for dealing with Stores of Units as they become available for return to Army Ordnance Department is as follows:-

- (1) In France and United Kingdom, that the A.Ds.O.S. shall be appointed as Limison Officers to this Branch and take direct instructions from this Branch on all questions of Demobilisation of Ordnance Stores.
- (2) That the existing organisation of A.A.O.C. be utilized for the return to A.O.D. of all Unit Stores. The Establishment of this organization comprises D.A.D.O.S. and 20 other ranks in each of five Divisions and Corps Troops in France; in U.K. it is 6 Officers and 163 other ranks, distributed between London, Millwall, Tidworth and Codford, and these Units should be maintained at full strength until the complete returns have been made.
- (3) In the event of demobilisation of personnel by units or categories the stores should be returned by Quartermasters to D.A.Ds.O.S. as was done on the reduction of Brigades to the nine Battalion basis recently, except that in the event of demobilisation by categories the complete stores of a Unit should be returned at a time when the numbers have been reduced to below 50% of its establishment, and it has ceased to be an effective force.
- (4) D.A.Ds.O.S. who issued the Stores (in U.K. Officers i/c Depots) having a knowledge of the Stores which have been issued and should be returned, and of Ordnance Base requirements, as to vouchering, waybilling etc., will be best qualified to carry out the work, and make the necessary enquiries into discrepancies.
- In Egypt, the returns of Stores may be made direct to A.O.D., as there is I believe no A.A.O.C. organisation there. In this case the A.D.O.S. Mounted Corps and D.A.Ds.O.S. Divisions, with their A.O.D. personnel, would be responsible for the correct listing, vouchering etc. of the Stores returned to A.O.D. Depots, an officer of Field Rank and with Ordnance knowledge being sent to Egypt to supervise the transaction on behalf of Demob. 4. and he would be responsible that the records of all returns, explanations of discrepancies, and receipts for Stores are completed and collected by him.

I have gone into this matter with Major Brinsmead,
Australian Flying Corps, and from what I can gather, there should
be no objection to the repatriation of the U.K. portion of the A.F.C
during the period January to March.

As regards the equipment - he tells me that the whole of the equipment at the two stations could be packed within a period of six weeks and that the indents required to cover the material to be passed over to Ordnance could also be prepared in that period.

I feel that it is desirable that the personnel should be demobilised at the same time so that they can accompany the equipment out to Australia and be available there to unpack it and to assemble the machines. The actual personnel, he tells me, consist of about 242 Officers, 131 Cadets and 1331 Other Ranks. As regards the Cadets in training, they could finish their training in Australia and therefore it would not be necessary for them to remain behind. As the personnel of the Other Ranks are mostly drawn from trades there should be no difficulty in at once absorbing them in Australia as soon as they were no longer required for putting the machines together on arrival.

I attach suggestions made by Captain R. H. CHAPMAN, R.E., at my request, with reference to Screen Calibration and Sound Ranging and I strongly recommend that the question of training of personnel in Calibration and Sound Ranging be taken up as early as possible.

I am generally in accord with Captain CHAPMAN'S suggestions and I suggest that 2 Officers and 20 Other Hanks be selected for each Section.

In selecting the Officers I consider they should have the qualifications as suggested in the attached letter, i.e. a high knowledge of science or electrical engineering. Half of this personnel should be selected from the R.A.G.A. and R.A.F.A. the other half being selected from those with the Militia Forces who would be likely to continue their studies, or be employed in electrical work, after the war.

I understand that Captain CHAPMAN is an Australian who was transferred to the R.E., and, from correspondence attached, it will be seen that he has had a considerable amount to do at the initiation of Screen Calibration. He has been highly spoken of as regards that work, and has also had experience in Sound Ranging. I therefore strongly recommend that he be transferred to the Australian Imperial Force to supervise the instruction of these Sections.

This is an urgent matter, as in a short time the facilities for training Officers and Other Ranks in this important branch of the service will disappear.

In a coordance with your request, I beg to submit the following suggestions relating to Screen Calibration and Sound Ranging in the Australian Forces.

for both Sound Ranging and Screen Calibration is a very urgent one for the following reasons:-

- I. The men of the necessary technical qualifications will soon be demobilized.
- II. The opportunity for obtaining training from Officers who have had practical experience of Sound Ranging and Calibration under service conditions will soon be passed.
- III. The necessary supply of Sound Ranging films taken under service conditions should be obtained for instructional purposes, also the latest information regarding Screen Calibration and new methods for measuring Muzzle Velocities requires to be properly collated.
- IV. The necessary instruments and equipment should now be easily obtainable, and their supply could be at once arranged for.

#### REGULAR FORCES.

Supposing the establishment to include one Sound Ranging and one Calibration Section. The personnel for a Sound Ranging Section is 4 Officers and 43 other ranks. For a Calibration Section 4 Officers and 77 other ranks.

It would not be necessary for the whole of this personnel to be trained as many of them have not very specialized jobs, but 20 men of each Section should undergo training if possible, for, say one or two months, depending on the importance of their work in the Section.

Two Officers for Sound Ranging and two for Calibration would be required to attend courses of instruction. It is important that these Officers should have good technical qualifications, and have degrees in either Science or Electrical Engineering; and the longer their course of instruction could last the better.

#### CITIZEN FORCES.

with reference to the Citizen Forces a similar procedure could be adopted. In this case I consider that such Units could be best run in connection with the Universities. In this way the supply of the necessary technical men in peace time would be assured, and experimental and research work in connection with these Units greatly assisted.

It would be necessary in the case of Citizen Forces for the whole of the nucleus trained for any one Section to peopose residing in the same city after the War. I do not know how many Sections you will require, but it should be possible to thus arrange for the skeleton establishments to be trained for two Sound Ranging and one Calibration Section for the various Capitals, such Sections to work in close touch with the Universities.

In order to encourage Officers and men of the necessary qualifications to take up this work, it would perhaps help if they could be promised immediate demobilisation at the end of (say) a six weeks course.

I would suggest that Sound Rangers be trained at MAPS. G.H.Q. and a Calibration personnel at 4th. Army Calibration Section, if this could be arranged.

In connection with the above, I beg to offer my services for a period of 3 months from the date of this letter, should it be possible to arrange for my immediate transfer to the A.I.F.

Captain CHAPMAN was in charge of the first Section formed to determine the muzzle velocity of guns by Screen Calibration. It was asserted at that time that it was useless to measure the M.V. of a gun, in the field, for the purpose of calibrating it, because the wear of the gun introduced an unknown factor which could not be measured. Captain CHAPMAN proved that Screen Calibration is capable of predicting with great accuracy the flight of a projectile, and that the argument that unsteadiness of flight affects the projectile too much to allow of this is erroneous.

Incidentally Captain CHAPMAN, in order to account for certain discrepancies, which occurred in the results, investigated the effect of droop and jump in the guns. He made a most exhaustive examination of this subject, and was able to demonstrate many facts that were previously unknown.

The whole series of experiments was very thorough and was excellently carried out by Captain CHAPMAN. At the same time Captain CHAPMAN evolved a most efficient organization for a Calibration Section, which enabled the Section to work out a very large number of results in a day with a minimum chance of error.

The problem with which he had to deal was a new and a difficult one. Captain CHAPMAN handled it with great thoroughness and showed considerable experimental ability as well as high powers of organization.
