

- (1.) Two Officer Instructors and 2 Warrent Officer
 Instructors should be temporarily detached from the ZEITOUN
 C avalry School for instructional duty with the A.&.N.Z.
 Training Centre at MOASCAR. These instructors will be
 retained on the strength of the cavalry school for the
 purposes of pay and be shown on the School returns etc.
- (ii.) Until the operations on the Eastern Front permit of the Cavalry School being carried on at its full capacity, a reduced class will be held under the remaining Cavalry School Staff (3 officers, 3 warrant officers) for the purpose of instructing Officer and N.C.O. candidates from the A.A.N.Z.Training Centre Moascar. The duration of the course will be one month with a possible extension to 5 weeks if circumstances permit, and each class will consist of 35 all ranks (15 officers, 20 non-Commissioned officers).



- With reference to your 0.6.17/1 of May 6th, whilst 1. fully appreciating the difficulty with which you have to contend in arranging for the systematic relief of units from the front line, owing to the present inequality in strength of the divisions under your command; and whilst agreeing, in principle, with your view as regards the benefit conferred upon young and untried troops by actual training in the field in close association with more experienced troops, the Commander-in-Chief regrets that he cannot approve, without certain reservations, of the proposal contained in para.4 of your letter above-quoted. 2. (a) In the first place, the Commander-in-Chief considers it essential that the theoretical training of the new units should be thoroughly carried cut in their own brigades, and under their own brigadiers, before these units can be usefully attached to front line formations to complete their training under conditions of actual warfare.
- (b) Further, experience has shown the importance of allowing to new units arriving in Egypt, especially from the East, a sufficient period of acclimatization to ensure their physical fitness to bear the strain of operations in this theatre. In this connection the serious effects of putting unfit units prematurely into the line has recently been clearly demonstrated in the case of the Loyal North Lance, and the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infants
- (c) Finally, the Commander-in-Chief is unwilling at present to leave EL ARISH entirely without white troops, and he is unable, therefore, to consent to the withdrawal of the 252nd Brigade, pending its replacement by units of the 252nd Brigade on the arrival of the latter from INDIA.

Subject to the reservation contained in para. 2(c) above, however, as soon as the General Officer Commanding, 232nd Brigade, is satisfied that the theoretical training of his Brigade is sufficiently advanced, and provided that units are reported

medically fit for active service, the Commander-in-Chief will approve of the attachment of units of this Brigade to formations

under your command as you may think fit, to complete their

training under war conditions, the same procedure being subsequently adopted in regard to the 253rd Brigade and 234th



As regards the lines on which these attachments should be carried out, the Commander-in-Ohief is extremely anxious that the procedure adopted in FRANCE, as a result of careful trial and experience - whereby, in the first instance, individual men, and subsequently sections, platoons, companies, and finally battalions, undergo, in turn, periods of progressive attachment to corresponding units of the formation to which they are affiliated for instruction - should be most closely adhered to. In this connection the Commander-in-Chief wishes it to be clearly understood that on no account should a new unit be allowed to take over a section of the line independently until its fitness to do so has been thoroughly assured, and the approva of the General Officer Commanding, Eastern Force, in each case specifically obtained.

As regards para. 5 of your letter above-quoted, the principles laid down in para. 4 above do not, of course, apply with equal force to artillery units, which may with advantage be attached to corresponding units of existing artillery formations for training in the field as soon as their organization is completed.

A full appreciation of the situation on the PALESTINE Frant is now at sea on way home. The following is a brief resume of the main points in case the War Cabinet may want earlier information of the situation.

It is now estimated that the 3rd, 7th, 18th, 53rd, 54th, 5rd Gavalry and part of the 27th Infantry Divisions are disposed in the front line between GAZA and BIR SABA, and the remainder of 27th, probably the whole of the 58th Division and part of the 45rd in reserve; i.e., 6 Infantry Divisions on front line, 8 in the whole theatre.

Numerical strength might be put at 53,000 effective rifles, 2,800 sabres, 150 machine guns and 120 guns, but if is difficult to say exactly. Perhaps a total force south of DAMASCUS of 45,000 rifles, 2,200 sabres, 155 machine guns and 152 guns.

Following are dispositions:- 3rd and 7th Division at GAZA. 53rd Division about KHIRBIT EL BIR. 18th Division about ATANINEH and SHARIA. 56th Division in the neighbourhood of SHARIA, with elements at BIR SABA. 27th Division elements at BIR SABA. Positions strongly entrenched.

I am now closely in touch with the enemy, as a result of my recent operations, on a front of some 14,000 yards from SHEIKH AJLIN, on the sea, to the north-east corner of the SHEIKH ABBAS ridge. My line turns back from the latter point through SHARIA towards the WADI GHUZZE, with my right flank extended to SHELLAL, in order to deny to the enemy the valuable water supplies lying in the WADI at that point, and at the same time to protect my southern flank. In the meantime in order to enable me to conduct operations on a broader front than is at present possible from the single railhead at DEIR EL BELAH, arrangements are being made

made to construct a branch line of the railway as rapidly as possible from RAFA to the neighbourhood of SHELLAL.

I am also making every endeavour to strengthen the northern portion of my position from the Sea to SHARIA, in order to set free as many troops as possible, which will, on release, be concentrated as a general reserve to meet an enemy threat against my right flank, or, should the situation admit, to undertake offensive operations.

offensive action must be governed by the fact that, exclusive of my mounted troops, I have at present only three divisions, fully trained and equipped, with which to carry out operations of this nature. Moreover, owing to recent casualties and sickness, these divisions (viz., 52nd, 53rd and 54th) are at present under strength, and infantry reinforcements amounting in round numbers to 350 officers and 9,000 other ranks are required immediately to complete them to war establishment. These have been demanded through the normal channels.

At present the # 74th Division consists of three Infantry Brigades with two Field Companies R.E. recently formed from Army Troops Companies, but it has no artillery.

The 75th Division exists merely on paper at present, only one brigade, namely the 252nd having been formed as yet. Too sick to be sent to the front.

I am forced to the opinion, therefore, in view of these circumstances, that my strength is insufficient to justify an attempt to undertake general offensive operations at present.

I therefore intend to assume an active defensive for the time being, whilst pressing forward preparations to resume vigorous offensive as soon as the situation admits.

- (2). Following is a very brief resume of the railway situation, an appreciation of which was also sent by last mail.
- (a) The existing single line from QANTARA to DEIR EL BELANT is of sufficient strongth capacity to maintain a force of five

five divisions (at full strength), eight mounted brigades and one camel Brigade, operating at, or in advance of, railhead, in addition to Camel Transport Corps, Egyptian Labour Corps, and all troops allotted to the Lines of Communication.

(b) It is estimated that the capacity of the line can be one additional mounted division and developed to provide for the maintenance of one additional division by the construction of additional sidings and crossing places, by enlarging existing stations and by increasing supply of engines, rolling stock etc.

This work has already been taken in hand and will be present forward as rapidly as possible. It is calculated that it will take about three months to complete.

(c) It will be essential, however, to double the line throughout, should the Wer Cabinet decide to send any considerably larger
force to this theatre in the Autumn. It is estimated that this
operation will take about eight months to carry out provided the
necessary material, constructional personnel etc., can be supplied
without undue delay. With regard to this larger project, namely,
doubling the line, your instructions have been requested and are now
awaited, as the necessity for this course must depend upon the
intentions of the War Cabinet as regards the future policy in this
theatre.

Summary of present

Sheet 1/250,000. From the sea at SHEIKH AJLIN across GAZA-RAFA
Reference SINAI-RAFA/road to SHEIKH ABBAS ridge a continuous wired
and entrenched line has been constructed. From last-named point
line turns back through EL MUNDUR to WADI GHUZZE about TEL EL JEMMI,
this portion of line consisting of strong wired posts. West of Wadi
main line resistance continued by further series of strong posts to
WELL SHEIKH MURAN which position is also entrenched and wired. A
defensive position of strong posts is in course of preparation east
of WADI GHUZZE.

Following is distribution of troops on this line:-

/S4th

54th Division plus one brigade 74th Division attached holds from MANSURA inclusive to TEL EL JEMMI.

74th Division (less 2 brigades) at WELL SHEIKH NURAN.

SERVE Division less one brigade in Corps Reserve east of the WADI GHUZZE 1 miles west of SHARTA.

One Brigade 55rd Division in Corps Reserve near TEL EL AJUL. One brigade, 74th Division, in Corps Reserve west of TEL EL JESSI

Anzac Mounted Division concentrated near SHELLAL, less one brigade holding line of outposts on the east bank of the WADI GHUZZE as far south as EL GAMLI.

Imperial Mounted Division and Camel Brigade concentrated in the neighbourhood of ABASAN EL KEBIR.

Pipe line from KHAN YUNUS through ABASAN EL KEBIR to ABU SITER constructed and in service as far as ABASAN EL KEBIR.

Pipe line from RAFA to ABU KHATLI commenced and 8 kilometres pipe ready for distribution.

I propose to advance my main line of resistance to the east side of the WADI GHUZZE at SHELLAL to secure valuable water supplies at that place, as soon as the spur railway and pipe lines have been completed.

Any further offensive operations must depend upon the progress of training and equipment of the 74th and 75th Divisions, upon the rate of railway construction and water development in the area of operations and upon the arrival of drafts to complete and maintain divisions up to strength.

Sir,

The advance and growth of the Eastern Force during the last three months renders it necessary to release more Signal Sections for work in the Field. It has, therefore, become necessary to re-allot the two Airline Sections, 1.14 and No.61, hitherto employed on military railways. Native personnel has already been employed to some 2. extent, under local arrangements, for the Signal work in connection with the military railways. It is now proposed, on the withdrawal of the two airline sections, to raise locally a new unit with mixed British and Egyptian personnel Rulevay to be called the "Military Telegraph Section". This section will consist of two sub-sections, one for the maintenance and the other for construction. It is essential to employ British rank and file for linemen's duties in the maintenance subsection, but Egyptians can be largely utilized for the construction work.





In reply to your communication with reference to the Imperial School of Instruction at Zeitoun, I am directed to inform you that every facility will be afford to officers and N.C.O's of the French detachment to attend the courses held at the School, but it must be remembered that a good knowledge of the English language will be necessary before candidates would profit by the instruction.

The following particulars regarding the School are forwarded for your information :-

The Imperial School of Instruction is situated at Zeitoun, close to Heliopolis (railway station - Helmia), and is under the command of Lieut-Colonel Colston, D.S.O., M.V.O., who is Commandant of the School. With reference to your letter No. 15/2, dated 5th May, your proposal that armed parties of our troops should no longer be permitted to operate beyond the western frontier is, in principle, approved.

As regards the actual line, however, which should for this purpose be regarded as the frontier, it has been decided, in consultation with General Officer Commanding, Delta and Western Force, that this should coincide with the line of the road from SOLLUM to SIWA Camp, since to extend the area within the frontier westwards as far as MRLFA, would entail a considerable increase in the patrolling to be carried out by our armoured cars without any apparent corresponding advantage.

Arrangements are being made, therefore, to issue the necessary proclamation to give effect to this decision, and the General Officer Commanding, Delta and Western Force, is being instructed to limit the action of our patrols on the lines you propose.

Armed Patrols beyond Western Frontier.

Sir,

I have the honour to submit for the consideration of the Commander-in-Chief, that armed parties of our troops should no longer be permitted to operate beyond our Western Frontier, which, for purpose of convenience, I suggest be defined broadly as a line running North and South from SOLLUM to be western end of MELFA.

The presence of armed parties in what was previously considered to be enemy territory, cannot fail to have a disturbing effect on the local population, and also tend to raise a feeling of distrust of us in the mind of Mohamed Idris.

There is, in addition, the consideration that, by allowing armed parties west of our border, we will be encroaching on territory which either belongs to the Italians or to Mohamed Idris, according to the arrangement which has been arrived at between these two parties.

- 1. With reference to telegram No. 53988, of the Sth May, from the Secretary of State for War, and my telegram A.M. 1894 cipher of the 10th, I have the honour to put before the Army Council further considerations regarding the use of enimals in this theatre of war, and also regarding the possibility of obtaining more British personnel from the administrative services for the fighting ranks, in amplification of my telegram above-quoted.
- 2. As stated in my telegram A.M. 1894, the total of 98,000 animals with the force under my command is made up as follows :-

of those 54,000 horses and nules, 28,000 are riding horses.

Of the 24,000 riding horses, 18,600 are employed in the Mounted

Divisions and Imperial Service Cavalry Brigads. I will deal

with the question of riding horses for mounted units and of other

riding horses, of which not more than 1,800 can be considered suitable as remounts for sounted troops. This number, on the basis of average monthly wastage in the mounted divisions since January 1st, will barely cover normal wastage up to July 1st; and

should there be any increased wastage due to heat-exhaustion or battle casualties, those remounts will be absorbed into the ranks before that date. The situation, therefore, is that if no more fit and seasoned cavalty remounts can be sent the fighting efficiency of the mounted divisions must suffer.

I may, perhaps, point out that the shortage in this respect is mainly due to the fact that the supply of riding horses sent to this country last autumn fell considerably below expectation. 5,000 riding horses were provised from Australia, but only 2,000 suitable for cavalry resounts were delivered. If the mounted divisions are to be kept up to strength with seasoned horses, it is absolutely necessary that cavalry resounts should be supplied to make good normal wastage in sufficient time before they are required to take the field.

As regards other unimals, it is estimated that the supply of riding horses (other than cavalry remounts) and draught animals should suffice until next autumn, given conditions similar to those that have prevailed in the past. In this connection I would point out that, owing to local conditions on the Eastern Front, it is absolutely inevitable that there should be a certain amount of overlapping in the different forms of transport. During the considerable period when the force east of the Canal was operating wholly in heavy sand, all transport was organized on a pack basis (camels and mules). This transport was, of necessity, of a hybrid nature, fulfilling the duties of 1st-line, train and water convoy. The work which under ordinary circumstances is performed by a supply column had to be done by camel convoys, which carried, not only food and forage for men and unimals, but also thousands of gallons of eter. Further, when the respective capacity, speed and redice of action of a 5-ten lorry and a camel are compered, the result is that it probably requires 100 camels to do the work of one S-ton lorry.

Of late, however, former conditions have to some extent been modified, and the Mastern Force has been operating in country where the soil, though still very heavy, is not so heavy as that of the desert, and for purposes of speed and officiency it has been necessary to commence the organization of whosled transport for units on this front. Divisional trains for infantry have been formed, but they were first organised on the basis of two horses per vehicle, with a result that all vehicles had to be double-spanned owing to the heavy nature of the ground, thus halving the carrying capacity of the trains. These units are now being re-organized on the basis of four horses per vehicle - a basis upon which it is absolutely necessary to work - but this reorganization cannot be completed for at least another month, since the additional native drivers required have to be recruited and trained .. Then all trains are on the basis of four horses per vehicle, the transport difficulties will be to some extent modified; at the same time there is no prospect in the near future of makin may considerable reduction in the amount of camel transport held available, since it is still necessary to have at hand complete provision for the Bastern Force to operate in country where only camel transport is suitable.

(11) Special care should be taken to show to the French Commander and, as far as possible, to all ranks of the French Contingent types of our men, both in British and Australian uniform, types of the Indian troops on the Line of Communication, and the mounted and dismounted police, under the orders of Colonel Parker. It is of the greatest importance that these demonstrations should be carried out as thoroughly as possible in order to avoid any chance of our men being shot by mistake. (iii) The situation as regards Bedouins and native population and the action in dealing with both should be thoroughly explained to the French Contingent. In this connection it might be helpful to arrange for an interview between Colonel Parker and Colonel de Piepape. (iv) Plates showing types of our aeroplanes are being despatched to the French Contingent and arrangements are being made with the Royal Flying Corps to send a selected Officer to explain the types of our own and hostile aircraft employed in this theatre. As regards the employment of the French Contingent, the Commander-in-Chief is anxious that they should be very carefully "nursed" and instructions are being issued to the Inspector, Palestine Line of Communication, to meet all their reasonable administrative requirements and to make them as comfortable as is possible in the circumstances. 



with reference to the employment of Cloud Gas on the Palestine Front, the Commander-in-Chief is anxious that you should consider whether there is scope for the successful employment of this form of attack in any future offensive operations which may be undertaken.

In this connection the Chemical Adviser, General Headquarters, is being despatched to you shortly to consult with you as to the technical advantages or difficulties of any scheme of combined cloud and gas-shell attack which you may put forward. Should you consider that the situation of your troops, the configuration of the country, and probable weather conditions are such as to admit of the successful employment of this method of warfare, the Commander-in-Chief would be glad if you would submit a detailed plan showing the object and scope of the operation proposed, the results which you consider might accrue, and an exact estimate of your requirements in gas equipment and personnel to carry such an operation into effect. Should it be decided to make use of cylinder gas in this theatre, well a demand can then be put forward to the War Office for our immediate requirements in this respect.
