





DEMOBILIZATION ORDER NO 4.

- Demobilization Orders Nos 2 and 3 are cancelled.
- Batteries have already received Australian Corps 8/991 and 2nd Australian Division 123/1/8.
- The Units specified in Schedule "A" hereto will despatch their vehicles and equipment except as hereafter provided by train leaving CHATELINEAU on 9th inst. The Units specified in second column will provide transport to CHATELINEAU for such vehicles. Unit Commanders concerned will jointly arrange for personnel to transport the guns and equipment so as to provide sufficient men in each Unit for the care of the animals not used for transport.
- The 16th Battery will send by M.T. to JEUMONT on 7th inst. two officers and 18 ORs. The ammunition of this Battery will be dumped in suitable shelter properly stacked at JEUMONT under the guard of the Sergeant and 6 ORs now there. The Officers and ORs proceeding on 7th inst. will accompany the vehicles to CHATELINEAU when transported by 2nd Divisional Artillery Rations for this personnel for 7th and 8th inst. wil be arranged by O.C. from the rations drawn at BEAUMONT.
- 5. All vehicles other than those referred to in last paragraph will proceed to CHATELINEAU on 8th inst. starting point being intersection of BEAUMONT-PHILLIPVILLE Road and GRAND PLACE. Starting time 0830. Route will be left to the senip officer with the column. Rations for 9th inst. will be delivered to the column at CHATELINEAU and Remount Stables CHARLEROI respectively on the night of 8th inst.
- 6. Each Unit will utilize its GS Wagons and Cobks Cart for carting Unit Stores to the train. In addition one M.T. is allotted to 106th and 17th Batteries respectively. 16th Battery will use 2 GS Wagons from Headquarters and requisition on BAC for further transport required.
- On completion of delivery of the vehicles to Entraining Station the horses will return to Remount Stables CHARLEROI as one column under the senior officer. On morning of 9th inst. this column will return to BOUSSU-lez-WALCOURT. Such teams as may be necessary to assist in entraining will be retained and returned subsequently independently. Draught Horses of HT vehicles will be led by Drivers whose animals are provided with bits where necessary.
- 8. Personnel employed as loaders who have goe in on vehicles will return by M.T. taking in equipment and rations. Any who cannot be accomodated will pass the night at 2nd Division Reinforcement Wing and return by ordinary passenger train on 10th inst. to SILENRIEUX.
- One cyclist orderly to be detailed by 16th Battery will accompany the column on 8th inst. and report to 2nd Division Headquarters to bake any necessary instructions from there to CHATELINEAU Station returning independently to his Unit on completion of the loading operations.
- 10. Units will detail the necessary personnel under para 7 of Australian Corps 8/991 furnishing a nominal roll of the same to this Headquarters by 9 a.m. on 7th inst. The following officers will accompany the Unit Stores to Base

Lieut Haggart E.G.S. 16th Battery Currie A. B. Bell E. M. 2/Lt. Fox C. H. 6th B. A. C.

17th Battery 106th Battery

The latter officer will act as Brigade Quarter Master in respect of the train arrangements.

11. Unit Commanders will accmpany their respective columns bothe train arranging necessary accomodation for the men and vehicles for the

night and will superintend entrainment of the guns and equipment. Major A.M.GRAINGER will be in general charge of the arrangements at CHATELINEAU.

- 12. From the time of loading of GS Wagons Units specified in Schedule "A" supply arrangements for these Units will be taken up by GS Wagons already sent by the 2nd D.A.C.
- 13. The following will be retained by entraining units
 Head Collars and Chains for all horses
 Water Carts
 Farriers Kits
 Nose Bags
 Grooming Kits

The fact that these are being retained should be set out on the lists of respective Units. Authority has already been given by Australian Corps for retention by Officers of the saddlery which they will require on demobilization of the Unit. Attention is directed to the necessity of obtaining a specific receipt in respect 8 the same.

14. The personnel proceeding under para 7 of Australian Corps 8/991 will be provided on the train with 5 days rations.

DEMOBILIZATION ORDER NO 3.

- 1. The following pragraphs and the Schedules referred to in them apply together with instructions hereinafter contained to the operation of despatching by train Unit equipment to the Base. The operative paragraphs of Demobilization Order No 2 are paras 1, 2, 3, 6, 9, 11, 12, 13 and 16.
- 2. The vehicles other than M.T. to be entrained and containing stores for entrainment will be leaving for CHATELINEAU on 7th February.

 Starting point: Intersection of BEAUMONT-PHILLIPVILLE Road and GRAMD PLACE. Starting time 0830. The route will be left to the senior officer with the column.
- 3. Rations for 8th February will be delivered to the column at CHATE-LINEAU and the Remount Stables CHARLEROI respectively on the night. of 7th inst.
- 4. On completion of delivery of the vehicles to the Entraining Station the horses will return to the Remount Stabes CHARLEROI as one column under the senior officer. On the morning of 8th February the column will return to BOUSSU-lez-WALCOURT but the senior Officer of the entraining party may in his discretion retain such teams as may be necessary to assist in entraining.
- 5. In paras 6 and 11 of Order No 2 for "2nd prox." read "8th inst" and in para 12 for "9 a.m. on 1st prox" read "2 p.m. on 6th inst"
- 6. The personnel proceeding under para 7 of Australian Corps 8/991 will be provided on the train with 5 days rations.



DEMOBILIZATION ORDER NO 2.

- 1. Batteries have already received Australian Corps 8/991 of 29th January 1919.
- 2. The following amendments of the Order are promulgated
 Para 2. The train will consist of 16 Tank Flats and Covered
 Trucks for 80 tens of Stores.
- 3. The Units specified in Schedule "A" hereto will despatch their equipment except as hereafter provided for return by this train. The Unit specified in the third column will provide the transport to CHATELINEAU for such vehicles. Unit Commanders concerned will jointly a rrange for personnel to transport the guns and equipment so as to provide sufficient men in each Unit for the care of the animals not being used for transport duty.
- 4. All vehicles containing ammunition will leave in the column proceeding to MORIALME on 1st February and will proceed thence to CHATELINEAU on the 2nd prox. The route for these marches will be at the discretion of the senior officer in the column.
- 5. All other vehicles will proceed to CHATELINEAU from BOUSSU on 2nd prox. The route will be left to the senior Officer with the column.
- 6. There are 15 GS Wagons and 3 Cooks Carts proceeding for entrainment. These are allotted to Units for carting Unit Stores to the train as shown in Schedule "B" and must be loaded ready to move on 1st prox. In addition one 3 ton M.T. is allotted to 17th and 106th Batteries and BAG respectively for transport purposes. These will be available at 8 a., on 2nd prox.
- 7. Rations for 2nd prox. will be delivered to the column at MORIALME on the night of 1st prox. by M.T. and for 3rd prox. to the column at CHATELINEAU on the night of 2nd prox.
- Station the horses will return on 3rd prox. by route march to their Units. Draught horses of H.T. vehicles will be led by Drivers whose animals are provided with bits where amanimal necessary. Animals will proceed as one column under the senior Officer by such route as he may determine.
- 9. Personnel employed as loaders who have gone in on vehicles will return dismounted on completion of their duty by the ordinary passenger train from CHARLEROI to SILENRIEUX.
- 10. In case of there being any alteration or delay in the train arrangements the Senior Officer with the MORIALME Column will report to 1st D.A.H.Q. for instructions and arrange to leave an Orderly at that Headquarters to receive any messages until the departure of the column.
- 11. One cyclist Orderly to be detailed by 16th Battery will accompany the column n 2nd prox. and report to 2nd Div. HQ to take any necessary instructions from there to CHATELINEAU Station returning independently to his Unit on completion of the loading operations.
- 12. Units will detail the necessary personnel under para 7 of Australian Corps 8/991 furnishing a nominal roll of the same to this Head Quarters by 9 a.m. on 1st prox. The following Officers will accompany the Units Stores to the Base

Lieut. A. B. CURRIE Lieut. R. M. BELL 2/Lt. C. H. FOX 17th Battery 106th Battery 6th B. A. C.

The latter Officer will act as Brigade Quarter Master in respect of the train a rrangements.

- Unit Commanders will accompany their respective Columns to the train arranging necessary accompdation for the men and vehicles for the night and will superintend entrainment of the guns and equipment. Major A. H. GRAINGER will be in general charge of the arrangements at CHATELINEAU.
- From the time of departure of G.S. Wagons of Units specified in Schedule "A" the supply arrangements for these Units will be taken up by G.S. Wagons to replace Supply Wagons by the 2dd DAC and these will report on 1st prox.
- Units will be individually responsible for obtaining necessary receipts for ammunition handed in at MORIALME and for the proper completion and receipt of the list of stores and equipment referred to in para 9 of Australian Corps 8/991.
- 16. The following will be retained by entraining Units Head Collars & Chains for all horses Water Carts Farriers Kit

The fact that these are being retained should be set out on the lists of respective Units. Authority has already been given By Australian Corps for retention by Officers of the saddlery which they will require on demobilization of the Unit. Attention is directed to the necessity of obtaining a specific receipt in respect of the same.



Demobilization Order No 5.

1. Units have already received Australian Corps 8/991 and 2nd Aust. Division 123/1/8.

- 2. The 18th Battery and 6th B.A.C. will take all vehicles and equipment except as hereinafter provided to CHATELINEAU on 13th inst.

 16th, 17th and 106th Batteries will despatch their Water Carts with the same column. They will be entrained on 15th inst.
- 3. If necessary 18th Battery will arrange with 16th Battery and BAC with 17th Battery for such assistance from personnel as they may require so as to provide sufficient men in each Unit for the care of animals not used for transport.
- 4. Starting Point will be Intersection of BEAUMONT-PHILLIPEVILLE Road and GRAND PLACE, BOUSSU-lex-WALCOURT. Starting time 0830. Route will be left to the senior officer with the column.
- Before marching all ammunition in the vehicles of the 18th Battery and 6th BAC will be dumped at the vacant house Corner of ERPION-BOUSSU Road where it will be stored under orders of Capt. J.W. TURNER who will provide necessary assistance from 17th Battery. This ammunition will subsequently be removed to a Corps Dump. Until removal a Guard will be provided under Brigade arrangements separately detailed.
- 6. Each Unit will utilize its GS Wagons and Cooks Carts for carting stores to CHATELINEAU and will carrybin vehicles sufficient rations and fodder to cover up to the return journey and for the guard. If necessary Major MEATES will arrange for rations for men at CHATELINEAU Station locally.
- 7. On completion of delivery of the vehicles at CHATELINEAU animals with harness will return to Units as one column under the snior officer but such route as he may determine. The whole of the Units' harness except as hereinafter provided will be packed for despatch on 14th inst and sent in by M.T., reporting on 14th inst, early on the morning of 15th inst to CHATELINEAU. Arrangements have been made for the return of saddlery from AVESNELLES in time for it to be packed by Units.
- 8. Unit Commanders will accompany their respective columns to the train arranging necessary accommodation for the men and will superintend entrainment of their vehicles and equipment.

 Vehicles and stores will in the meantime be parked at CHATELINEAU under arrangements made by Major V. MEATES. Equipment will be stored under a composite guard in charge of an Officer on Units responsibility as he and Capt. C.J.MASTERS may arrange.
- 9. Personnel employed as loaders will go in on the vehicles returning after entrainment. If necessary rations will be forwarded on 13th inst. for the personnel for 14th inst. by M.T. Personnel will return by M.T. after entrainment on 15th inst.
- 10. Units will detail the necessary personnel under para 7 of australian Corps 8/991 furnishing a nominal roll of the same to this Headquarters by noon on 13th inst and employing late category men not on Embarkation Quota. The following Officers and QMSergeants will accompany stores to Base

11. Two GS Wagons for each of 18th Battery and BAC will be provided by 2nd DAC reporting to Railhead on 13th inst and remaining with Units for supply.

12. The following will be retained by entraining Units: Head Collars and Chains for all animals Farriers Kits Nose Bags Grooming Kits

Camp Cooking Utensils.

The fact that these are being retained is to be set out on the lists of respective Units.

- The personnel proceeding under para 7 of Australian Corps 8/991 13. will be provided on the train with 5 days rations.
- The following matters relative to entrainment are laid down for 14. compliance. The train consists of 16 Tank Flats and 8 Covered Wagons. Two Covered Wagons and accomodation for 4 Pillboxes is required for 2 Div. M.T.M. Battery.

Guns, Gun Limbers, Limbered Wagons and G.S. Wagons are to be loaded on separate Tank Flats for dispersal at the Base.

In loading equipment the harness of Units will be put in the same trucks and kept distinct other equipment being placed in another truck and kept distinct. The object principally in view being whilst utilizing the whole available space to facilitate the breaking up of the train for the various unloading depots.

Drawing NCOs will adjust rations as between personnel and horses proceeding to REUGNIES and those remaining so that the pro rata rations to represent the balance of 17th inst will proceed to REUGNIES from BEAUMONT; an equivalent ration being retained here to cover the 18th for personnel and animals remaining with Units.
- 6. A proportion of Officers' saddlery will be employed to provide mounted men with the party. Animals will be led in threes by personnel. All necessary scissors, twitches and clippers will be taken by Veterinary Sergeants.
- 7. Head Collars and chains and nose bags are to be returned to Units at the completion of the sale. Purchasers are finding their own horse furnishings
- 8. BAC cooks and cooking utensils will be despatched by Ration Lorry at 0900 on 17th inst. BAC personnel remaining with Unit will be fed under arrangements to be made by 17th Battery.
- 9. Instructions in regard to the classification of animals, preparation of forms and certificates and conduct of the sale will be issued to all concerned at REUGNIES.



All stores must be disposed of and final Balance Sheets prepared in respect of each Canteen as at that date which will be submitted to Brigade Headquarters for audit. If Unit Canteen Committees think it desirable a proportion of funds may be sent with Quota No 11 for the use of personnel on the trip. Indents for this sum must be submitted to this office today. Balances remaining at credit on 24th inst. will be handed over to 2nd Divisional Artillery for the benefit of personnel transferred
- 5. Units will make immediate arrangements to parcel up for depatch to Records, 130 Horseferry Road London, all Unit Records and papers not actually in use and for the destruction of unnecessary papers by fire. It is proposed to despatch these papers on or about 24th inst
- 6. All clothing and other paraphernalia in Units Stores will be returned to Ordnance or Salvage according to character on or about 24th inst. under arrangements to be subsequently detailed.

Now that our Corps is being withdrawn from that part of the front in which we have seen so much hard fighting during the last two months, I wish to convey to all ranks my very heartiest congratulations upon the real good work which has been put in, and my deep feeling of gratitude to officers, non-commissioned officers and men for the magnificent spirit and self-sacrifice which has been shown by all. All I think must realise that the fighting we have been through has been of an entirely satisfactory nature in that we were able to attain our objective in every one of the many attacks which we have put in, and that without a single hitch of any sort. The Army Commander has testified to this after each attack made, and we know with what appreciation the Commander-in-Chief wired to Australia regarding the results of the fighting done by her troops.

In a great deal of our previous fighting, the brunt has fallen to a large extent on the Infantry In all these recent attacks the infantry have again naturally come in for the giant's share of the fighting, but they will I know be the first to acknowledge how their success has so much depended upon the magnificent work done by the Artillery. 3.. The success of the raid was due to the presence of three conditions essential to all military success -


(ii) Thorough preparation






