



C/O's. REPORT for January 1919.

1 LOCATION. The Battalion was billeted as follows :-B.H.Q. & 2 Coys. RAMBURELLES. 1Coy. LE TRANSLAY. Transport FRAMTCOURT.

Sufficient accomodation has been found in RAMBURELLES and the LE TRANSLAY Company has been shifted.

Billets have been improved and stoves placed in the larger buildings.

Three Nissen Huts have been erected and are used as Educational Rooms and Reading Rooms.

12 hours daily is devoted to military training consisting mostly of route marches and ceremonial. 2 hours are devoted to education and the afternoon to recreational training.

EDUCATION. The interest in the various classes is well maintained and a new class in type-writing has been starte ed. Text books are to hand after a long delay. A reading room has been established and Serpus of the London Papers, Australian Weeklies etc. are provided.

The subscription library (5frs. per member) now contains 120 volumes. It is proposed to buy 100 volumes out of the Regimental Funds.

L 100 Copies of official photographs of the war, bound in albums, have been placed in the Reading Room.

Men have applied for employment in Gt. Britain under the Repatriation Scheme.

Brigade is running a Commercial and an Agricultural School and at both the Battalion is well represented.

RECREATIOAL. The severe weather has mitigated against outdoor sports. Several football matches and cross-coun-

try runs have been carried out.

Indoor tournaments at, Cards, Draughts and Chess have proved successful.

Several concerts by Divisional and Brigade Troupes and the Lena ASHWELL Party were great attractions.

#### EDUCATION REPORT. Appendix 2.

for month ending Jan. 31. LECTURES AND DEBATES. Early in the month the policy of two lectures and one debate was adopted, and this has given allround satisfaction.

In-door recreational games now takethteir place side by side with Educational evenings; and both have much benefited by the provision of three Nissen Huts with means for lighting and

heating. A wide range of subjects has been traversed by various speakers, and in debate; and despite the lack of fires and accommodation during the first half of the period, attendance

and interest has been good throughout.
The following is a list of the subjects dealt with:-Sanitation and Public Health. Poultry Breeding. Statue Opfickshipner\_Railways Repatriation and Land Settle-ment.

League of Nations. State Ownership of Railways. Campaigns of Present War. Water supply in Australia. Western Australia. Expansion of the British

Empire.

Education in S.A. The War of 1870. Stable Management and Horse Mastership. Improvement of Political Life in Australia.

BATTALION CLASSES. Enrolment (on a weekly basis) has averaged 284, and attendance 245. This represents 55% of the average Ration Strength for the period.

The coursesin Building and Construction and Poultry Breed ging have been completed, their places, however, being filled by classes in new subjects.

The classes at present in operation embrace the following Arithmetic, Elementary and Intermediate; English; French; Shorthand; Bookkeeping; Typewriting; Telegraphy; Elecution; Bootmaking; Photography and Motor Mechanics.

SCHOOLS OUTSIDE THE UNIT. The month ends with 40 O.R. detach ed at schools in various parts of France and Belgium. Technical Education is the special object of this Branch of the Service, and the following trades are presented :-MOTOR ENGINEERING, MOTOR CAR FITTING, Engine Fitting, Black smithing, Rigging and General Construction, Carpentry, Survey ing, Cooking and Bakery, Agricultural Pursuits, Accountancy and Commerce, General Matriculation Subjects are taught at an CORPS CENTRAL SCHOOL, RUE.

In general, it may be said the efficiency and Benefits of the Education System are being increasingly felt by the Unit.
