1. To create a diversion a "Chinese" attack will take place by the 5th. Divisional Artillery on the night; 18th./19th. May 1918.

2. The Tasks of Batteries of this Brigade are as follows :-

53rd. Battery - Fixed barrage - P.15.a.0.0 to T Roads P.6.d.7.1.

54th. Battery - Creeping Barrage - P.15.a.0.0 to P.15.c.0.4.

55th. Battery - Creeping Barrage - P.15.c0.4 to P.15.c.0.0

114th. Battery - Creeping Barrage - P.15.a.0.0 to P.15.c.0.0.

54th., 55th. and 114th. Batteries will creep Westwards 100 yards each five (5) min.

3. Rates of fire --

1. During 19th/20th May 1918 B/298 Battery, 298th Army Brigade R.F.A. will occupy position, 2 guns J.26.a.20.95 and 4 guns at J.26.a.20.40. and when in position will come under the tactical control of C.O. 14th Aust. F. A. Brigade.
2. C.O. B/298 Battery will report to C.O. 14th Aust. F. A. Brigade when in position.
3. B/298 Battery will remain silent and only fire on S.O.S. and then only on orders from C.O. 14th Aust. F. A. Brigade, but will be available for special tasks at discretion of C.O.
4. B/298 Battery will be superimposed on portion of 14th Aust. F. A. Brigade S.O.S. lines, and has been allotted S.O.S. lines as follows:- P.4.a.0.5. to P.3.b.50.50. to P.3.c.50.00 to P.3.a.4.4.
5. S.O.S. lines of 14th Aust. F.A. Brigade are as follows :-

with B/298 Battery superimposed as above.
6. The S.O.S. signal is the call for immediate assistance from the Artillery normally covering the sector in question, sent by any responsible Officer in the front line. This signal, whether by telephone or visual method (such as a rocket) is a call for a barrage in "No Man's Land". The S.O.S. signal will be sent when the enemy are actually attacking.
 

The S.O.S. signal until further order is : white over white over white.

Supplementary S.O.S. Bugle Calls :- Bugle alarm posts have been established at the following points by the 5th Australian Infantry Brigade,

J.32.d.8.9. - J.32.a.85.60 - J.25.d.1.9 - J.29.c.5.9 - J.19.c.4.8 - J.19.a.50.00 - I.30.a.5.5.

In addition to the above, C.O. 55th Battery has established a relay post at I.36.a.58.66 where calls will be picked up and repeated back.

Bugle calls for ordinary S.O.S. will be three (3) "Es" repeated at short intervals until barrage falls.
7. AMMUNITION. 18. pdrs. will use 60% A and 40% Ax.  
4.5" Hows. Bx.
 

Establishment to be maintained :- 300 rounds per 18 pdr. and 250 rounds per 4.5" how. at gun positions and echelons to be kept full. 4.5" Hows Battery will keep at least 200 rounds of gas - 50% B.H.C. and 50% B.C.B.R. at position.

At each 18-pdr. Gun-pit 20 rounds are to be kept distinctly labelled "S.O.S" with fuzes correctly set. This ammunition will be changed periodically and the replaced ammunition will be fired off.
8. On receipt of an S.O.S. signal Batteries will open fire on their S.O.S. lines Rates of fire are as follows :-
 

First 5 minutes	4 rounds per gun or how. per minute.
Next 7 minutes	5 rounds per gun or how. per minute.

The above provisions are not to be taken in limiting either Group or Battery Commanders from developing the full fire power of their Batteries in the event of their knowledge of the situation demanding it.

All fire will cease at the end of fifteen minutes.

If the "S.O.S" signal is repeated after the opening of fire, the maximum rate of fire will be reverted to and the procedure as laid down above carried out.
9. All Officers must clearly understand that it is their duty to obtain immediate information as to the situation for their higher formation, e.g. Batteries to Groups, and Groups to Headquarters, 5th Aust. Div. Artillery. It is only by this means that the necessary concentration of Artillery can be procured.
