	4th	10am	Visited 1Xth Corps Main Dressing Stations at LOCRE and KEMMEL, one of which this Corps will shortly take over.	
		2pm	Visited Vlll th Corps, which Corps we are relieving on 15th inst. Went over M.D.S. at Dranoutre and A.D.S. at Lindenhoek. It is arranged by Corps "Q" that two Rest Stations in Bailleul which will be in our new area, are to be given over to 1X Corps. This had been arranged without consulting the Medical Staff of Corps.	
	5th		Saw Corps Commander regarding Rest Stations in Bailleul and informed him that it would be necessary for us to have Field Ambulance and Rest Station accomodation for two thousand sick during the winter.	
	6th	2pm	Visited Rest Stations of 33rd and 8th Divisions of Vlll Corps both of which are very good. Capt. M.J.Holmes o/c 2nd Aust.  - ii. The relief will be completed by 10 am 12-11-17, details being mutually arranged by A.Ds.M.S. concerned.
 - iii. The Medical Units of the 2nd Australian Division will be at the disposal of the A.D.M.S. 2nd Aust.Div on relief.
 - iv. "A" Field Ambulance 49th Division, reporting to Waratah Camp (2nd Aust.Div. Rest Station) 8-11-17, will be at the disposal of the A.D.M.S. 2nd Aust.Division, till completion of relief.
4. The Corps Central Bureau, L.23.a., will be taken over by IInd ANZAC Corps, by a tent sub-division detailed by A.D.M.S. 66th Division. Details will be mutually arranged between A.D.M.S. 66th Division and O.C. I Anzac Corps Central Bureau.
5. Area stores only will be handed over to incoming units.

Appendix 2

1. In accordance with relief of VIIIth Corps by I ANZAC CORPS the following Medical Instructions are issued.
2. A.Ds.M.S. Australian Divisions will take over from the A.Ds.M.S. outgoing Divisions, the medical arrangements of the area assigned to their respective divisions.
3. A.D.M.S. Left Division, in addition to taking over all medical posts of the VIIIth Corps in his area, will take over the Main Dressing Station DRANOUTRE, 28.M.36.c.5.3. and the Convent LOCRE, the latter now occupied by a Field Ambulance of the IXth Corps as a Rest Station.
 - ii. All reliefs will be completed not later than 15th Nov. 1917.
4. The A.D.M.S. Right Division will take over, in addition to the medical posts of his area, the Main Dressing Station at WESTHOF 28.T.19.b.5.5.
 - ii. Relief will be completed not later than 14th Nov. 1917.
5. When necessity arises A.D.M.S. Right Division will arrange to evacuate such cases of the Left Divisional Sector as may be brought to the A.D.S. of the Right Divisional sector, by bearers of the Left Division.
6. A.D.M.S. Supporting Division will take over the present Divisional Rest Stations at 28.S.14.c.4.6. from 30th Division and at 36.A.30.b.2.9. and 36.A.17.c.8.2. from 8th Division. In addition he will take over all medical equipment at 33rd Divisional Rest Station 28.S.16.c.2.3. and arrange for its storage until further orders.
 - ii. All reliefs will be completed not later than 15th Nov. 1917.
7. A.Ds.M.S. will arrange to allot accommodation for the treatment of Gassed cases in their respective Divisions.
8. All records will be kept by Divisions. The Corps Central Bureau will cease to be in operation on taking over new area.
9. The D.D.M.S. Office will close at HOOGRAAF at 10 am 15th November and re-open at FLETRE, same hour.

1st AUSTRALIAN AND NEW ZEALAND ARMY CORPS.NOTES on evacuation during Offensive Operations in September and October 1917.

Experience in the operations which this Corps has just completed has demonstrated some outstanding points from which the following practical lessons may be derived.

1. Each Division of a Corps should always be dependent upon its own resources for the evacuation of its wounded. If its own Field Ambulance Stretcher Bearers prove insufficient, it should requisition upon its own Divisional Staff to supply any subsidiary aid it may require to supplement these; and not demand upon Ambulances of the other Divisions of the Corps.

2. In the operations under review whilst one Corps 'G' Staff expressed its willingness to do all it could to assist us, and gave orders for 200 Infantry to be held in reserve for this purpose, it asked us first to effect all that was possible with the Field Ambulance personnel of the Divisions in reserve, before we called upon fighting men whom the Divisions could badly spare. We accordingly started operations on the 19th September with the Bearer Divisions of the three Field Ambulances of the 1st and 2nd Australian Divisions. These were not up to strength and barely mustered 240 each Division.

A German attack on the 19th before our offensive on the 20th began, and the fierce fighting on the 20th caused us to call up by the evening of the 20th, two more Bearer Divisions from the 4th Aust. Division and two men from the 5th Aust. Division who were in support.

These went in for 36 hours and enabled the 1st and 2nd Aust. Divisional Bearer Divisions to get a little rest.

On the 24th September the 4th and 5th Australian Divisions were put in line and took their Bearer Divisions, and after the offensive of the 26th it was found necessary to supplement these with two Bearer Divisions of the 1st and two of the 2nd Australian Division. But, on the 1st and 2nd Aust. Divisions relieving the 4th and 5th Aust. Divisions on the 2nd October, it became obvious that under the heavy calls of almost incessant fighting, and heavy shelling with the rapid return of Divisions in reserve to the front line, that the Ambulance Bearer Divisions in reserve could not stand the strain of re-inforcing, and yet be ready themselves again.

Accordingly, the services of 200 Infantry were called upon to supplement the Ambulance personnel at once, and this was continued as reserve Divisions returned to the front line. This policy has now been accepted, and except in the case of some isolated operation which, whilst throwing a heavy strain, would be over in 48 hours, each Division will in future depend upon its own resources entirely.

2. The uselessness for evacuating purposes of a single way plank road when rain had made it greasy and slippery, was made very evident on the plank road between BIRR X Roads and WESTHOEK. Motor Ambulance wagons were constantly slipping off it, and as these corduroy roads were frequently raised, and the surrounding ground was always impassable, disaster usually resulted, and blocking and congestion occurred for hours. Our hand carry in consequence frequently ran to nearly 6000 yards or even over, although actually on paper it would have looked as if we could have reduced it to 3000 or 4000 yards by using motor ambulance wagons further up.

To have these roads made double from the start would well repay the extra expenditure and carriage of material in many other ways than that of evacuation of wounded, but certainly in the latter.

/Casualties.....

3. Casualties amongst Stretcher Bearers must necessarily increase under the extended sweeping barrages which the German now throw broadcast, and which have been much greater in depth than has usually been the case hitherto. Even though at BULLEGOURT, our Bearer Divisions carry for hours at a time through most deadly fire, our casualties never amounted to anything like what we sustained in these recent operations. Between 19th September and 20th October amongst the Field Ambulance personnel we had -

This percentage is very heavy, considering that 12 Bearer Divisions amongst whom these casualties almost entirely occurred numbered less than 1000 men, as on the average on going in, they only had about 80 men apiece.

The Australian Stretcher Bearer has always excited the highest admiration by his absolute fearlessness, and in this intense fire which went on for so many days, he was bound to suffer severely. He never allowed cases to be hung up; only once during these operations was any congestion in any forward post, and on that occasion only about 20 cases were held up for a couple of hours, when additional bearers were at once sent up; otherwise, under the most tremendous fire that this Corps has possibly ever sustained evacuation was absolutely continuous, and that, even whilst for many days was a 6000 yard hand carry for the Bearer Companies. Never have stretcher bearers performed more arduous and devoted work with more magnificent courage, though the same men have always shown up so splendidly.

It is difficult to arrive at the percentage of casualties amongst Medical Officers, but it would be even greater; as not more than 18 Medical Officers, Ambulance and Regimental were employed forward during the time that the four Divisions were holding the front line. Of the casualties amongst other ranks about 40 were due to gas, but, though many were severely affected, there were no deaths so far as is known.

These casualties with the exception of one shell which fell amongst a group of 23 stretcher bearers on the MENIN ROAD who had just returned from the front, were scattered the whole way along the carry from BIRR X ROADS to the firing line. No particular point producing more than any other. The possibility of taking steps in future to try and reduce the incidence of casualties was fully discussed by the A.Ds.M.S. of all Australian Division.

Great stress was laid upon the Bearer Divisions Officers knowing their men well and being accustomed to work with them, and that the full number of Officer should always be present. In this connection it was pointed out that it had become the custom when we were on the SOMME for casualty Clearing Stations to ask for a third Medical Officer to be sent in addition to the complete Tent Sub-Division allotted to them for duty, and that this third Officer had often to be detailed from a Bearer Division in reserve, which later had to go into the line, and consequently either went in short of an Officer, or with one temporarily attached who was not known to the men, and that this was always likely to lead to an increase of ~~casualties~~ casualties.

A third Officer in these Operations had been attached to some of the Casualty Clearing Stations, but on the disadvantage being pointed out, orders were at once given by the Director Medical Services for their return. There is no doubt but that neither Tent Sub-Divisions nor Bearer Divisions should ever be broken up by separation of small details. If the efficiency and discipline Bearer Companies of Field Ambulances are to be maintained they should always be kept complete in Officers and men.

/EVACUATION.....

4. EVAQUATION BY TRAIN.

The Light Railways which ran up beyond the Adv. Dressing Station were only of use on three or four occasions. Our experience of these has everywhere been the same. Unless a time table can be given to some extent, ~~xxxxxxxx~~ or certain trucks set aside they are very broken reeds to trust to.

If the Railway authorities announced that they will not be responsible in any way, our experience has been that little effort is made to fall in with the existing conditions of evacuation by those working the line forward. This same independableness applied very much to the hand pushed trucks on the tramlines which ran beyond the Light Railways. Here the continual lifting of trucks to avoid broken portions of lines, or to avoid trucks coming up, used to weary the Bearers to such an extent that they usually of their own wish, carried the whole way, rather than put up with the fatigue of this and the consistent failure to get trucks after waiting a considerable time. Although it sounds very simple to utilise returning trucks; in practice it has been found most difficult. On the SOMME we always had our own hand pushed trucks reserved only for wounded, and then it did not work so badly.

The broad gauge railway with a time table of trains, has always held well to us. They have usually given us a time table of trains, which, though it was only adhered to as regards the first train of the day, yet it gave us two trains a day which satisfied us.

On the Canadians, coming in on our left, it was asked that the number be increased to five, but though the Railways were most obliging they never succeeded in running more than two, and these at irregular intervals. This would appear capable of remedy, if use is to be made during the winter, for evacuation by broad gauge daily.

5. ADVANCED DRESSING STN. AID & RELAY POSTS.

In the terribly indiscriminate shelling which watered in depth the whole of the advanced area, and constantly YPRES, it was very difficult to erect any sort of shelter Relay or Aid Post. The cellars in the MENIN ROAD were a fairly safe place, but these had the disadvantage of being on the main road. The only other place was the ECOLE 200 yards to the south, and this, when we first arrived, had a battery of 8" guns actually in it, which drew fire all day upon it, however, except for one unfortunate shell which caught a party of 23 Stretcher Bearers returning from the front was found in practice that the MENIN ROAD was safer than any other place.

But, now that we have ZONNEBEKE, I would advocate the cellars being turned into a really good advanced Dressing Station for the winter, and also that tunnels should be made wholly for evacuation purposes in the ZONNEBEKE Ridge, where men fatigued and with feet beginning to threaten should at once be rested and fed before being returned to the line.

In YPRES, there is no doubt but that if real security is to be obtained for the wounded, that one of the arches in the Ramparts at present occupied by Signallers and by Divisional Headquarters, should be allotted for the wounded during the winter, as the present station though much work has been put into it, cannot be regarded as thoroughly safe for severe shock cases to be collected and kept in for any time.

The necessity for very early assistance from Engineers in making shelters for Relay Posts and rendering these splinter proof is made obvious by the fact that in almost continuous operations with very severe shelling going on daily after the actual day of the offensive, the Bearers get no respite from their carrying duties from the moment they go in, and they are therefore unable themselves to erect posts.

Labour and skilled supervision should therefore be detailed from the very first; this, of course only applies to these continuous offensives, with constant moves forward.

6. The central Bureau system of registration at the Casualty Clearing Stations was undoubtedly of the greatest service in enabling the wounded men to be passed through the Adv. Dressing Station quickly. Apart from the benefit gained by the wounded reaching the Casualty Clearing Station quickly it also enabled congestion of Dressing Station to be avoided and where the latter must necessarily be often under fire as must constantly be the case with the recent developments of enemy barrage fire being thrown far back, this saves lives. This was evidenced by the fact that although our Advanced Dressing Stations were in situations necessarily exposed to fire, not a single wounded man was struck whilst passing through them.

1. In accordance with Second Army A.2410 and QM/813, the following moves of Sanitary Sections of I ANZAC CORPS will take place. -
2. The 1st and 4th Australian Sanitary Sections will move to BLEQUIN area and BOMY area respectively for duty with the 1st and 4th Australian Divisions.
 - ii. They will move by motor lorry, leaving present locations at 9 am 14th November and proceed to destination, which will be notified to this Office by A.Ds.M.S. of respective Divisions, who will arrange necessary billeting accommodation.
 - iii. They will requisition on "Q" I Anzac for necessary transport, which must be kept to a minimum, by 5 pm 13-11-17.
3.
 - i. The 2nd and 5th Australian Sanitary Sections will move to Bailleul and Ravelsberg respectively. on 16-11-17.
 - ii. They will do duty in the 2nd and 5th Australian Divisional areas respectively.
4. Arrangements should be made to send a small advance party to take over from the VIIIth Corps on the day before.
 - ii. Transport will be requisitioned from "Q" I ANZAC by 5 pm 14th November 1917.
5. The 3rd Australian Sanitary Section will move under orders from IInd ANZAC CORPS and report for duty in 3rd Australian Divisional area.

The A.D.M.S. 3rd Australian Division will arrange for necessary accommodation.

1. The 5th Division are attacking POLDERHOUK CHATEAU on 6th November 1917, and the following arrangements will come into force on 5/11/17.
2. A.D.M.S., 14th Division will detail 2 Medical Officers and 30 other ranks to take over from 1st ANZAC CORPS and administer the ENTRAINING CENTRE at H.27.c.3.7.
Blankets, stretchers and 2 Soyers stoves will be provided from D.D.M.S., X Corps Dump and will be delivered at H.27.c.3.7.
Medical comforts, rations dressings etc., will be provided by the Field Ambulance of 14th Division providing the party.
A.T.S., must be given to any cases which are detained for some hours at the Entraining Centre. A record that A.T.S., has been given must accompany the patient.
3. S.H.T.O., X Corps has been asked to supply 10 Lorry Ambulances: these lorries should report to O.C., Field Ambulance at WOODCOTE HOUSE by 6 p.m. on 5/11/17. Their personnel will be rationed and accommodated by the Field Ambulance at WOODCOTE HOUSE. These lorries will not function until ZERO. After ZERO they will carry lightly wounded from WOODCOTE HOUSE to X Corps Entraining Centre H. 27.c.3.7.
Should walking wounded arrive at the ECOLE, MENIN ROAD, in considerable numbers, the O.C., at the ECOLE will communicate with the O.C., at WOODCOTE HOUSE, and arrange to obtain the services of 2 or 3 of these lorries to clear walking wounded from the ECOLE to ENTRAINING CENTRE.
4. The Corps Prisoners of War Cage will be at I.20. c.3.3. and the O.C., Field Ambulance at WOODCOTE HOUSE WILL BE PREPARED TO SEND A Medical Officer to this cage should his services be required.
5. O.C., Entraining Centre will keep in touch with R.O.D., OUDERDON and requisition trains as he required them; if possible at least 4 hours notice should be given to R.O.D. of a train being required.

 - ii. The relief will be completed by 10 am 12-11-17, details being mutually arranged by A.Ds.M.S. concerned.
 - iii. The Medical Units of the 2nd Australian Division will be at the disposal of the A.D.M.S. 2nd Aust.Div on relief.
 - iv. "A" Field Ambulance 49th Division, reporting to Waratah Camp (2nd Aust.Div. Rest Station) 8-11-17, will be at the disposal of the A.D.M.S. 2nd Aust. Division, till completion of relief.
4. The Corps Central Bureau, L.23.a., will be taken over by IInd ANZAC Corps, by a tent sub-division detailed by A.D.M.S. 66th Division. Details will be mutually arranged between A.D.M.S. 66th Division and O.C. I Anzac Corps Central Bureau.
5. Area stores only will be handed over to incoming units.

MEDICAL INSTRUCTIONS No.44

1. In accordance with relief of VIIIth Corps by I ANZAC CORPS the following Medical Instructions are issued.
2. A.Ds.M.S. Australian Divisions will take over from the A.Ds.M.S. outgoing Divisions, the medical arrangements of the area assigned to their respective divisions.
3. A.D.M.S. Left Division, in addition to taking over all medical posts of the VIIIth Corps in his area, will take over the Main Dressing Station DRANOUTRE, 28.M.36.a.5.3. and the Convent LOCRE, the latter now occupied by a Field Ambulance of the IXth Corps as a Rest Station.
 - ii. All reliefs will be completed not later than 15th Nov.1917.
4. The A.D.M.S. Right Division will take over, in addition to the medical posts of his area, the Main Dressing Station at WESTHOF 28.T.19.b.5.5.
 - ii. Relief will be completed not later than 14th Nov.1917.
5. When necessity arises A.D.M.S. Right Division will arrange to evacuate such cases of the Left Divisional Sector as may be brought to the A.D.S. of the Right Divisional sector, by bearers of the Left Division.
6. A.D.M.S. Supporting Division will take over the present Divisional Rest Stations at 28.S.14.c.4.6. from 30th Division and at 36.A.30.b.2.9. and 36.A.17.c.8.2. from 8th Division. In addition he will take over all medical equipment at 33rd Divisional Rest Station 28.S.16.c.2.3. and arrange for its storage until further orders.
 - ii. All reliefs will be completed not later than 15th Nov.1917.
7. A.Ds.M.S. will arrange to allot accommodation for the treatment of Gassed cases in their respective Divisions.
8. All records will be kept by Divisions. The Corps Central Bureau will cease to be in operation on taking over new area.
9. The D.D.M.S. Office will close at HOOGRAAF at 10 am 15th November and re-open at FLETRE, same hour.
