

Herewith report by Lt.Col. RAFFAN on his recent inspection for your perusal and necessary action as regards paras. 2, 3, 4, and 5 (sub-para. i.)

A.D's.M.S. will when necessary send a reliable N.C.O. and Private to LONDON to obtain the required number of Outfits and French Letters ( Cash for latter to be sent to O.C., A.I.F. Base Depot, Med. Stores, LONDON.)

Applications for move orders will be sent to Headquarters, Australian Corps. On receipt of the authority return duty warrants will be issued quoting G.O.C., A.I.F. authority.

1.FROPHYLACTIC OUTFITS.

There are no 'BLUE LIGHT' Outfits available, throughout the Whole of the Divisions, although frequently asked for. The reason is that it takes 5 to 6 weeks to get goods delivered.

RECOMMENDATION. Let each Division send an Officer and a man to London and obtain required number of Outfits. This Officer could obtain French Letters at the same time.

2. FRENCH LETTERS.

These are in great demand, and are not available in the majority of Units. The cash must be sent to O.C. Base Depot of Medical Stores, London, before goods can be handed over. Cost is £12.10.0. per 1000, i.e. 3d each.

3. BLUE LIGHT EMERKE DEPOTS.

These Depots are rightly established wherever A.I.F. Units are settled, and in all large towns visited by troops. The system of treatment is not uniform, but on the whole effective. The system of establishing BLUE LIGHT Depots so that they are available as soon as troops enter a town or area, has been carried out in most instances. This has probably saved a great number of V.D. infections. The name 'BLUE LIGHT DEPOT' should be strictly adhered to, and at night a blue Light should be shown. Some few Depots are not attractive with lack of equipment. Argyrol is not generally available. The existing stock if adequate, should be distributed among the 5 Divisions to enable each R.M.O. to carry out abortive treatment.

The procedure to carry out at BLUE LIGHT DEPOTSE is as faith

follows:-

Each step of the treatment should be clearly shown, and a set

of directions posted up in each Depot as follows: -

(a). Defere commencing treatment, let down trousers in front, folding back trousers flaps and rolling up shirt, so that the parts are completely exposed. Then pass water. (b). Wash parts, including scrotum and pubis in scap

and water.

(c). Wash parts in 1 in 1000 solution of Corrosive sublimato.

(d). Wash out anterior wrethra with a 1 in 5000 solution of Pot. Permanganate.

(e). Inject 10-15 minims of 10% solution of Argyrol or Protosil.

Substitutes. or 2% Sol. of Protargol. or 5% Sol. Silver Mucleinste.

RETAIN FIVE MINUTES. (f). Rub in Calomel cintment 33% for at least 5 minutes, on penis, scrotum and adjoining pubis.

(g). Rinse the hands in 1 in 1000 Corros. Subl.

(h). Wash hands in soap and water.

N.B. (1). The procedure of applying pure Carbolic Acid to abrasions is to be discontinued. Nothing but a saline dressing to be applied to all seres, ulcers or abrasions. Instruct soldiers to report to M.O. at once, so that the necessary examination can be carried out. H.B.(11). A notice to be put up in each BLUE LIGHT DEPOT stating that Calomel ointment must be used especially before connection, as well as after, in order to prevent infection from Syphilis. It may be too late to apply ointment more than one hour after the connection. If a soldier reports for prophylactic treatment 24 hours or more after taking the risk, give him the first treatment of the Massage-plug procedure.

4. ABORTIVE TREATMENT.

The system of Massage-plug is the best, and is the method of choice.

A strip of lint, one third to half an inch in width, and 6 inches in length to be used, soaked in 5% Argyrol. The cotton wool plug to be discontinued. To aid introduction of plug, the special probe and plug introducer are provided.

5. GENERAL REMARKS.

(1). Careful selection of men placed in charge of BLUE

LIGHT Depots.
(11). One Officer per Division could be, with advantage

placed in charge of all V.D. arrangements.

(111). Cases of Syphilis requiring further treatment to be evacuated to lat A.D.H. This includes all cases who have had Syphilis, and further treatment is necessary without regard to the Wassermann Test.

(iv). Question of gathering in and treating Chronic

Conorrhoes is still sub-judice.

(v). What happens to a case of Gonorrhoea evacuated to Veneral Hospital? What provision is made for his treatment on route from Unit to Hospital?. Recommend that each case be detained at Unit until acute stage is over, and then passed on, fit to travel. No chronic case can be effectively dealt with, outside a Venereal Hospital.

D.D.M.S., Australian Corps. Headquarters. Australian Corps 'AQ'. Reference attached. Major COLLINS can leave as soon as an Officer can be obtained to replace him. As regards Majors LEE and JONES it will be a matter for the Divisional Commander to decide ( Vide D& R. Gen. Inst. 7. paras 12 (a) ) on the necessity of withdrawing Medical Officers detailed to C.C.S. ( in which case AUSTRALIAN patients will suffer) or stopping all leave to Medical Officers. The other Officers are not under Corps administration. Within the last two days, I have received copies of orders direct to Divisions from A.M.S., A.I.F., H.Q., London, and one from D.M.S., A.I.F. instructing four Majors A.A.M.C. additional to the above, to report to LONDON. I am also given to understand that DEMOBAUST is communicating direct with Divisions regarding the withdrawal of A.A.M.C. personnel. As a matter of fact, owing to the late or non-arrival of the beforementioned copies of communications direct to Divisions, I have no means of ascertaining as to what A?A.M.C. personnel is available, in order to make the necessary arrangements before the withdrawal of Officers. As the A.A.M.C. -is of this Corps is, unlike the Infantry and Artillery still functioning it is essential for the proper administration of the Medical Services that the D.D.M.S. should have early information of withdrawal of Officers and men in order to make suitable arrangements to replace casualties due to sickness, officers on leaveetc., and for the care of troops, P. of W., Schools, Education Centres, Labour Groups, ete-Civilians etc., scattered over an area of about 1000 square miles. I shall therefore be obliged if you will request DEMOBAUST, ADMINAUST, and H.Q., A.I.F., LONDON to send communications affecting Medical Officers and A.A.M.C. personnel direct to Aust.
