

Major Genl. Mc. Clagan officiated.	
	24th		I was asked by C.S.O.4th. Army if it is possible for me to supply the 42nd. Divm. at Charleroi with 14 miles of D5 or D8 single cable. This will be arranged from Mob. Store table stores of 2nd. Div., and Army will supply receipt to 2nd. Div. as though this cable was handed into Army.
