JDRUICQ.31/5/	/18.	WEATHER.	With the exception of three short periods of ra	in, the month has been	
			particularly fine. Following several wet days	from the 10th to the 13th inst.	
FRANCE.			a spell of exceptionally warm weather was experi	enced. This ended by rain	
			setting in on the 23rd inst., but after a couple	of days the fine weather	
			again prevailed. Changes of temperature were r	eather severe, and are reflected	
			in the health report for the month.		
		HEALTH.	The health of the men generally has not been as	satisfactory as for the several	
			months previous. A mild form of trench fever	- or influenza - has been	
			running through the Depot, and quite a number of	the Company have been affected.	
			The change from living in huts to	camping in tents of course	
			makes the men more susceptible to chills through	the sudden changes of	
			temperature which have occurred during the month	1.

	5/18.		Of these 14 cases were admitted to Hospital. Four of these after a short	
			period of treatment were discharged. Two men returned from Base Hospitals, where	
			they had been admitted previous to this month.	
			The A.A.M.C. Orderly reports 852 attendances for minor treatments. 145	
			were for Dressings, 47 for Ear, Eye, Nose & Throat complaints. 131 for Colds and	
			Influenza. Feet treatment represented 73 visits. Railway men are particularly	
			subject to foot complaints, especially men from the footplate.	
			As a result of an accident on the 4th inst., whilst detraining with party	
			from St Omer, Corporal Jarry A.E. was knocked by a light engine, sustaining cuts,	
1			and injury to knee.	
			The party had detrained between lines opposite the camp. Jarry was in	
			charge of the party and stores. A train passed over the line immediately	
			adjacent to them - followed by a light engine. Jarry failed to observe the	
			light engine, and while stacking the stores and baggage was caught by the side of	
			the engine. His injuries were not considered serious, but he has been sent to

UDRUICQ. 31/5/18.	ACCOMMODATION & RATIONS. The Company is still located in bell tents. Very large	
	huts with room for 60 men and 4 N.C.Os exist in the camp, and as they become vacant	
	through units or drafts moving out, later arrivals take their turn in occupation.	
	Most of the Unit now being employed on various camp fatigues and duties,	
	labor rations are drawn for them, which are on a slightly increased scale to the Line	
	of Communication rations.	
	DISCIPLINE. This has been excellent, and with the exception of five 2nd Corporals	
	who were Reprimanded for "failing to appear at place of parade", no other punishments	
	are recorded.	
	On the 26th inst. Captain Morgan attended at G.H.Q. as a member of	
	a Field General Court Martial. The trial was however postponed owing to the	
	prisoner not being medically fit. This man did not belong to the 5th .

AUDRUICQ	31/5	/18.	AIR RAIDS - ENEMY. A majority of the nights have been clear and suitable for	
			night flying. This Depot, whilst it has been fortunately free of any serious raid,	
			has been subject to continual night alarms. On most occasions the enemy has	
			passed overhead to Calais and Boulogne, or confined his attentions, so far at least	
			as this neighbourhood is concerned, to stations or depots like Zeneghem and St Omer.	
			At this latter town the raids have been continuous and severe. The railway yard	
			and station appears to have been the main attraction, and experiences there are of	
			interest to us as a detachment of the Company is still located there.	
			They have had some narrow escapes, and as this report closes,	
			an unofficial account of distinguished work being performed by our men at this depot	
			comes to hand. An oil store was set afire by an enemy plane, which hovered	
			overhead, dropping bombs as it circled, whilst our men with some success were	
			endeavoring to extinguish the flames. They stuck to the job in spite of the	
			menacing danger, and were able to prevent the fire from spreading.

			report many encounters with enemy aeroplanes, especially along the St Omer - Bethune	MH

			Wood escaped uninjured.	
			No dug-cuts or shelters being available during the first part	
			of the month, our Company had to march out into the country when the "Advance"	
			was sounded. Four shelters have now been allotted adjacent our lines, and these	
			give sufficient protection against falling shrapnel or the splash from a bomb.	
			It is anticipated & that at any time now this Depot may again	
			experience a severe raid, such as it has known more than once before. Railway	
			depots are getting particular attention at the present time, and the turn for	
			this place must be nearly due.

	the R.O.D. companies which evacuated from Borre have a surplus of guards available, and	
	this accounts no doubt for dispensing with the services of our men. The men left	
	are all engine drivers and firemen.	
	Nineteen men who had been left at Peselhoek, attached to the R.O.D.

OCCUPATION. supplying to the R.O.D. depot for general fatigue duties, a party varying from 40 to 60 composed of 2nd Corporals, L/Cpls and Sappers. Apart from general fatigues, cleaners to the number of 21 have been supplied. The Fitters have been engaged at their own trades, covering principally general overhaul and repairs. One engine was also assembled or connected up.

The men at St Omer are working traffic on all lines radiating from that depot. Their working conditions have much improved during the month, simply by systematising their working hours a little. Circumstances often bring about exceptionally long shifts, which cannot be avoided. Thirty hours on duty is not a rare experience.

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

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
