

The Company with Living Train of 35 wagons, departed from Bergues Echange at 9.27 for Conchil-Le-Temple, arriving at destination at 17.00 hours after an expeditious and uneventful journey. The train was garaged on R.O.D. Lines adjacent to 5th.A.B.G.R.O.coy Depot, a distance of about 3½ kilometres from Conchil-Le-Temple Nord Station. Weather conditions first and warm.

Summary of Events and Information

Company resting awaiting orders to proceed to England via Le Havre for repatriation to Australia.

The weather conditions generally have been fine and mild.

Unit departed for Le Havre at 7.30. The Living Train of 35 wagons was abandoned, and Company

was moved in 17 covered wagons. Destination was reached at 23.30 hours, the Company resting in train for the night. Weather fine.

The Company detrained at 6.00 hours and was marched to No 1 Reception Camp, A, I,B,D, a distance of 3 kilometres. On arrival, the Company was given a hot meal, and housed in tents, afterwards going through a clothing parade, Medical Inspection and Cleansing Bath; when completed the Unit was moved to No 2 Camp, A.I.B.D. to await embarkation to England. Weather conditions squally, dull and cold.

April	1919.		The Company throughout the month have been waiting orders to move to England en route to Australia for Repatriation. A rest of 25 days was made at Conchil-Le =Temple prior to moving to Le Havre, where a furth further rest was made. On arrival at Le Havre, all baggage and kit bags were conveyed to Camp by motor lorry from the train, the Company marching to Depot. The rail road journeys undertaken were without incident. The general health of the Company has been good, no cases of serious illness having occurred. During the month several members of the Company proceeded to England to undergo a course of training in marm various subjects under the direction of the A.I.F. Educational Scheme. The weather conditions in the early part of the month were mild, fine, and clear; towards the end of the month changing to cold squally conditions, rain also falling.
