St Sylvester Cappel	3/6/18		<p><u>Summary</u> - Three minor operations took place by Div^l Troops during the month. On 2/15/18 at 12.30, 2nd Coy of 2nd Bn + 2 platoons of 3rd Bn. c. until 7.15 trench mortar support advanced their positions 350 yds in Sqs X 20 c + d + X 26 a. The operation was successful but casualties were heavy on the left platoons - A.D.M.S. was at Capt. Borke to observe condition of wounded - They were got back rapidly + in very good condition. Date and time of Zero hour will ~~xxxx~~ be notified later.
The 11th. Battalion will make the main attack and other units of the Brigade will co-operate and if possible exploit the success of the attacking Battalion. 10th. Battalion Order in connection with this co-operation is being issued separately.
2. BOUNDARIES OF ATTACK. Boundaries are as under :-

SOUTHERN E.6.a.75.00.
Objectives as per attached map.
3. METHOD OF ATTACK. (a) The 11th. Battalion will attack on a 3 Company frontage in two waves. The first wave will capture the first objective and the second wave will pass through the first and capture the second objective.
Mopping up will be done by specially selected parties with each move.
(b) The 10th. Battalion will co-operate by keeping close touch with the flanks of the attack and establishing posts at E.6.c.55.00 and W.30.d.90.95. The garrisons of the posts held by the 10th. Battalion on the frontage of the attack will remain in position.
4. TIME TABLE. Zero minus 30 - troops will be in position on tape lines.
Zero. 1st & 3rd. Light Trench Mortars and 10th. Bn Rifle Grenadiers ~~xx~~ will open a hurricane bombardment on the 1st objective.
18-pdrs Batteries will open fire on a line 50 yards on our side of the 2nd. objective.
Zero to Zero plus 1. Medium Trench Mortars will fire on enemy trenches at E.6.c.90.95.
Zero plus 1 onwards. Medium Trench Mortars will fire on targets in F.1.a and E.6.c. and the suspected Headquarters at E.6.d.4.9.
Zero plus 2 minutes. 18-pdrs and Light Trench Mortars will lift onto the 2nd. objective, and the occupied area at E.6.c.90.95, Rifle Grenadiers cease fire, The attackers will rush the 1st. objective.
Zero plus 10 minutes. 18-pdrs lift 50 yards each 3 minutes until it forms protective barrage beyond 2nd. objective.

With reference to your 2030/8 dated 9/6/18, precis of Divisional Medical Arrangements in the event of active operations by the enemy on this front will be as follows, :-

1. The O.C., 1st Aust. Field Amb. will remain responsible for the evacuation of the Divisional front line.
2. Should it be necessary to close the A.D.S. at BORRE, the present Main Dressing Station will be taken over from the 3rd Aust. Field Amb. by O.C., 1st Aust. Field Amb., as an A.D.S. If this A.D.S. is not found suitable, or situation makes it necessary to evacuate cases in a more southerly direction, an A.D.S. at a farm at U.24.a.2.0 would be opened.
3. The O.C., 2nd Aust. Field Amb. would open a Main Dressing Station at U.19.c.6.5.
4. The present D.R.S. would be closed and patients either evacuated or returned to their Units.
5. The 3rd Aust. Field Amb., after handing over Main Dressing Station to 1st Aust. Field Amb., would move to Divisional Reserve Area.
6. All motor ambulance cars and horsed ambulance wagons of the Division would be placed at the disposal of O.C., 1st Aust. Field Amb.
7. Ambulance horse lines and transport not necessary for carrying on their work, would move to Brigade Areas allotted for that purpose to this Division.
8. Bearer Divisions not actually required at the front line would remain in reserve with their Field Ambulances.

There are indications that the enemy intends to attack on the Corps front at an early date. In anticipation, the following medical arrangements will be completed by midnight 15/16th June 1918.

1. O.C., 1st Aust. Field Ambulance, will be responsible for the clearance of the Divisional front line.
He will take immediate steps to ensure that all R.A.Ps., Wagon Loading Posts, Relay Posts, and Dressing Stations, are supplied with sufficient water, medical stores, and splints.
He will establish an Advanced Dressing Station in PRADELLES with 1 Officer and 4 Other Ranks for the treatment of any casualties in the local garrison there.
He will post a Runner with each Brigade Headquarters, and will ensure that routes of evacuation are supplied with sufficient directing posts.
2. BEARERS.
All present bearers at R.A.Ps., Wagon Loading Posts, and Relay Posts, will be doubled. One bearer sub-division will be held in reserve at BORRE.
O.C., 2nd Aust. Field Amb., will send two bearer sub-divisions to the Headquarters, 1st Aust. Field Amb., at V.17.c.
O.C., 3rd Aust. Field Amb., will hold two bearer sub-divisions at Main Dressing Station ready to move forward at short notice.
3. MOTOR AMBULANCE CARS.
O.C., 3rd Aust. Field Amb., will make all his motor ambulance cars available for clearance from A.D.S. to M.D.S.
O.C., 2nd Aust. Field Amb., will send 3 Sunbeam cars to Headquarters, 1st Aust. Field Amb., V.17.c.
4. HORSED AMBULANCE WAGONS.
O.C., 2nd Aust. Field Amb., will send 3 horsed ambulance wagons to V.17.c. (1st Aust. Field Amb.)
O.C., 3rd Aust. Field Amb., will hold 3 horsed ambulance wagons in reserve at M.D.S.
5. WHEELED STRETCHERS.
O.C., 2nd and 3rd Aust. Field Amb., will send all available wheeled stretchers to V.17.c. (1st Aust. Field Amb.) for distribution to R.A.Ps and Relay Posts.
6. STRETCHERS AND BLANKETS.
A reserve of 100 blankets and 50 stretchers will be held at A.D.S., BORRE. Further reserves are held at M.D.S.
7. EVACUATION.
If the attack comes from the South of HAZEBROUCK, and the PRADELLES - HAZEBROUCK Road is not usable, cases from the left Brigade Sector will be evacuated along the main STRAZEELE - ROUGE CROIX road, thence via LE POUPLIER to present M.D.S. (V.9.)
If the attack comes from the North cases will be evacuated through A.D.S., BORRE, in the usual way.

WATER SUPPLY.

A report from the O.C., 2nd Aust. Sanitary Section, regarding the water supply of this Area, is attached for your information please.

1. Attention is drawn to the statement that at the present time only 35% of the total wells in the Area yield a supply of water fit for drinking which is daily decreasing in quantity.
2. The report also states that the BORRE BECQUE has practically ceased to flow, but sufficient water accumulates over-night behind the barriers to keep the supply well up to the demand.
3. It is urged that the recommendations contained in the report -
 - (a) To re-establish the supply from the deep source at LA POUPLIER or from the Brewery wells at CAESTRE, or preferably from both.
 - (b) To put the deep bore at HAZEBROUCK into operation.
 be carried out at the earliest possible opportunity.
4. That instructions be issued to Units of the Division that guards, if possible made up from water duty men, should be posted at all wells during hours set apart for drawing water, for the purpose of -
 - (a) Protecting the wells from pollution by preventing personal ablution, and the washing of clothes or cooking utensils, etc., near the well.
 - (b) To personally chlorinate all water drawn from the well, by the use of a stock solution of bleaching powder.
5. It is submitted for information that if the spell of dry weather continues for the next few weeks, the Division may be faced with the possibility of an outbreak of water borne diseases, unless provision for further supplies of water is made.

In order to prevent the spread of Dysentery, routine Sanitary precautions must be supplemented by the segregation of early cases, and by ensuring that "carriers" are not sent back to the line.

While "chronic carriers" usually initiate outbreaks of dysentery, early and undiagnosed cases are of much greater importance in maintaining and spreading the disease.

During periods of prevalence of Dysentery, many cases of diarrhoea are found to be excreting dysentery bacilli in large numbers.

The measures called for in D.G., D/2288/74 of 11:9:16 will therefore be modified as follows, :-

1. D.M.S., Armies, will arrange for the segregation of cases of dysentery and suspected dysentery in selected Casualty Clearing Stations, to be called "Dysentery Centres", a Mobile Laboratory being attached for the necessary bacteriological and protozoological tests.

When dysentery is prevalent, changes in the clinical and pathological personnel at these Centres should be avoided, as continuity of work and co-operation between clinicians and pathologists are essential.

2. So far as the military situation permits, cases of diarrhoea, except those of a trivial nature, will be at once sent from their units to Field Ambulances for observation and treatment, and cases suspected to be dysenteric will be evacuated without delay from the Field Ambulance to the Dysentery Centre. To ensure that the milder cases of diarrhoea retained for treatment in Field Ambulances are free from dysentery, "rectal swabs" should be taken and sent by the most expeditious means to the Dysentery Centre for bacteriological examination. Field Ambulances will obtain rectal swabs from the nearest Mobile Laboratory, as required.

3. Suspicious cases, in which the stools contain muco-pus or blood and mucus, will be diagnosed "Dysentery" whether the bacteriological examination is positive or not. Where large numbers of cases are occurring, bacteriological effort will be especially directed to the cases which are clinically uncertain, typical cases being diagnosed on clinical grounds alone.

4. Severe or protracted cases will be evacuated to the Base, and, as far as possible, will be kept together on Ambulance Trains.

5. Where the military situation permits, slight cases may be retained for treatment at Dysentery Centres, and, when fit, discharged for duty, provided that, on return to ordinary diet and exercise, dysenteric symptoms do not occur, and that 3 pathological examinations after the stools have become solid exclude the presence of dysentery bacilli or amoebae. When such cases are discharged, notification will be sent in every instance to the man's unit, stating that he has been under treatment at a "Dysentery Centre", and that he must not be employed in the cooking or handling of food, or on water duties.

The following from D.D.M.C., XV Corps, is forwarded for your information and necessary attention, :-

" The influenza-like disease which is at present prevalent in the Army, appears to be an air-borne disease.

Overcrowding of billets and other accommodation should be avoided as far as possible, and care should be taken to ensure the maximum ventilation.

The spread of infection may be checked under favourable circumstances by a system of nasal douching and of gargling with antiseptic solutions such as potassium permanganate - 1/4,000, or zinc sulphate - 1/100, dissolved in normal saline solution, or chloramine - 1/200, dissolved in water. The solution is poured into the palm of the hand and snuffed up one nostril, the other being closed with the finger, and the process is repeated with the other nostril. The fluid which passes into the naso-pharynx is spat out. This is followed by a thorough gargle with a fresh quantity of fluid. This procedure should be carried out once, or, if possible, twice daily for several days after exposure to infection.

Attention is drawn to an article by Morley Fletcher under the prevention of epidemic disease in schools, B.M.J. March 16th, 1918."

Henceforth a statement of the position as regards the permanency of the water supply from Boche Beaque.

On 10.6.18 a low barrier was put across the Boche Beaque at V10 C 4.3 a point about 250 yds above the lowest water point on the Beaque (V10 C 7.3)

A daily check of the rate of surface flow is taken by means of a small V channel through the barrier.

There are now two water points in operation on the Boche Beaque above this checking point

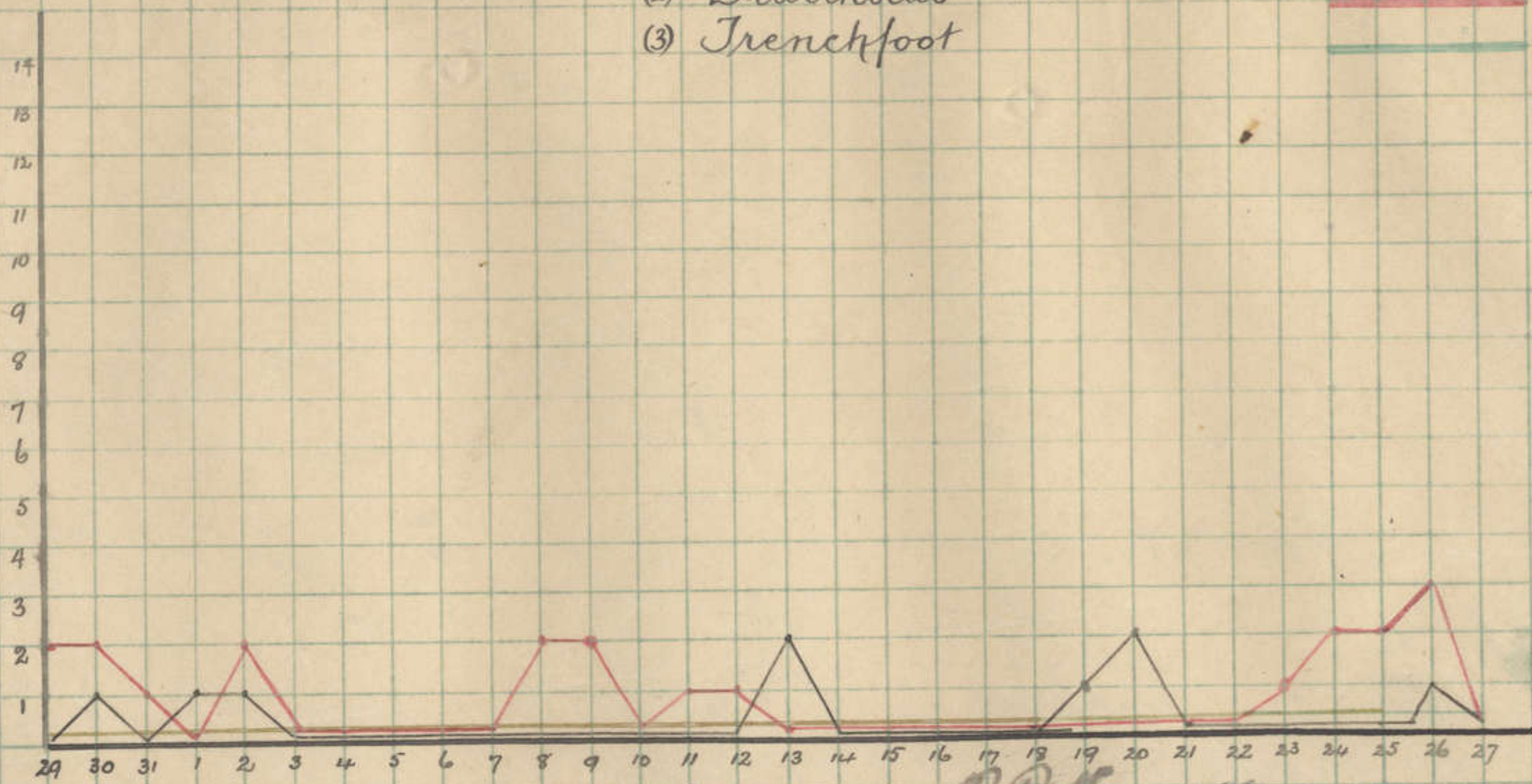

MONTHLY SANITARY REPORT

by

A.D.M.S., 1st Australian Division,For Month ending 27th June, 1918.

PHYSIQUE. Remains fairly good.

CAMPS & BILLETS. During the month the Division has remained in the Area occupied last month, the same billets, camps, and bivouacs being used, with the exception of a few changes in the position of Camps. The conditions under which the men have been living were as last month.

CLOTHING. Practically all winter underclothing has been withdrawn from circulation. One blanket per man has been retained.

FOOD & COOKING. As last month.

WATER SUPPLY. The water supply is from the same sources as reported last month, from shallow wells in the forward Area, and in the back Area mainly from the BORRE BECQUE. Two new water points with storage tanks used by this Division and from which carts can fill direct, have been established at V.10.a.3.9, and V.7.d.7.2. A water point has been established in the SERCUS Area. The water at all these points is put through a sterilizer and is ready for use when drawn. Elsewhere, each unit attends to the chlorination of its own supply of water.

CONSERVANCY. Sanitation of the Area has improved. Practically every unit is now fitted with fly-proof latrines. Meat safes (collapsible) are being constructed for units under supervision of the Sanitary Officer, and already a considerable number are in use.

Manure is being packed, buried, or carted to Area Dumps. There are four of these Dumps. One at Sheet 27/V.17.b.2.9, which is being stacked by the A.A.S.C., is very satisfactory, but at the other three the manure is becoming spread over a large Area in small heaps, and the condition is very unsatisfactory.

The Sanitary Officer and Area Commandant have endeavoured to get P.B. personnel (one to each dump) to supervise the dumping, the packing to be done by labour from Divisional Units. This personnel for supervision is urgently required.

BATHS. As reported last month. Men are being bathed fairly frequently whenever the opportunity occurs. The present conditions make it impossible for units as a whole to be bathed at regular intervals. Units have been bathed on an average twice during the month.

LAUNDRY. As reported last month. Satisfactory. Each unit has had at least two changes of clean underclothing.

GENERAL HEALTH. During the month a severe epidemic of influenza has spread throughout the Division, and some units have been very seriously affected. Evacuations to special G.C.S. for such cases have been high. The epidemic reached its highest point between the 18th and 20th of the month, and has since been gradually diminishing with an occasional fresh outbreak. Units have tried gargles and nasal douches as a prophylactic measure, and in one case a camp was moved, but these measures did not appear to have any definite effect. Scabies steadily decreasing.

No disinfection of blankets has been carried out during the latter half of the month owing to the Foden Disinfector being in workshops. At other times very few blankets can be put through

owing to the necessity of disinfecting all dirty underclothing, before being returned to the laundry. It is considered that a second Foden lorry is urgently required by the Division, if disinfection of blankets is to be carried out at all satisfactorily. Two Russian Disinfestors have been constructed, and a third is in progress of construction.

Apart from Influenza, the health of the troops has been good.

Will you kindly arrange for the following recommendations to be carried out in order to check the spread of the present "epidemic" as far as possible.

1. The contagion of the present "epidemic" appears to be air-borne, although its exact nature has not yet been ascertained. The main principle to be followed therefore is to distribute troops as widely as possible, avoiding the crowding of men in tents, billets, mess-rooms, etc.
2. Whenever the military situation permits, it is advisable that troops should sleep in individual blanket-shelters in the open air.
3. As the infection appears to be spread by the movement of infected individuals, drafts arriving at Reinforcement Depots from England or the Bases should, as far as possible, be accommodated in separate lines for a period of 4 days. Individual shelters should be insisted on in order to avoid the necessity for quarantine if any cases arise.
4. In Medical Units arrangements should be made for the separation of these cases from other patients.
5. In billets where cases have occurred, all blankets and kits should be taken out and aired and the usual precautions taken against infection so far as circumstances permit.
