HAZEBROUCK	1916 Aug. 1st		<p>Very warm day. Second Army front quiet. D.A.D.M.S. visited the 1st and 2nd Australian Casualty Clearing Stations at ESTAIRES and TROIS ARBRES. The Units of 38th Division as they arrive are being located in the VIII Corps rest area. Evacuated to the Base:- 215.</p>	
	2nd		<p>Sultry day. Second Army front very quiet. 18th Division moving into II. ANZAC Corps area and are going to hold a portion of the line between the New Zealand and 5th Australian Division. Divisional Headquarters at Croix du Bac. The A.D.M.S. of the Division decided that one Field Ambulance in the forward area will meet the requirements with Main Dressing Station at FORT ROMPU, Advanced Dressing Stations at BOIS GRENIER, CHAPPELLE d'ARMENTIERES. 6th Division start to entrain today for Fourth Army. D.M.S. inspected the French Hospital at REMY which we hope to take over as a going concern in a few days. He then proceeded to MENDINGHEM and was satisfied with the progress being made at No. 46 Casualty Clearing Station. D.M.S. then called on D.D.M.S. VIII. Corps and discussed the position of Advanced Dressing Stations and Main Dressing Stations and the evacuation of wounded, specially in reference to evacuating to MENDINGHEM. Evacuated to the Base:- 204.</p>	
	3rd		<p>Fine hot day. Second Army front quiet. The order of Divisions now in the line are from North to South, 4th, 29th, 3rd Canadian, 1st Canadian, 2nd Canadian, 50th, 36th, 41st New Zealand, 18th, 5th Australian. 38th Division in VIII. Corps rest area. The Motor Ambulance Cars of the 19th Division which will shortly be moving into the Second Army area will be left behind and will take over the Ambulance Cars of the Division which it relieves. Evacuated to the Base:- 305.</p>	
	4th		<p>Fine day; cooler. Second Army front normal. D.D.G.M.S. visited the area and called on the D.M.S. Evacuated to the Base;- 335.</p>	
	5th		<p>Rather dull day; much colder. Second Army front quiet. D.M.S. visited the D.D.M.S. VIII Corps, also the C.G. of the Corps with reference to the provision of 'sleepers' for the making of a road up to the site selected at PROVEN for another Casualty Clearing Station. These were arranged and the work is to be put in hand immediately, utilising the personnel of various casualty Clearing Stations. The 'bore' at Chateau Lovie has been abandoned.</p>

	Aug. 5th		The C.E. VIII. Corps has made arrangements to re-open the well at the LAITERIE, POPERINGHE. Evacuated to the Base:- 215.	
	6th		Bright day with coldish wind. Second Army front very quiet. D.M.S. visited A.D.M.S., 38th Division at ESQUELBEC, then inspected 129th Field Ambulance at HERZEELE and the Officers Rest Station at WROMHOUDT. Arrangements completed with regard to taking over the French Huts at REMY. 19th Division began detraining in Army area. Evacuated to the Base:- 309.	
	7th		Fine day; dull and coldish wind in evening. Second Army front quiet. D.M.S. visited the 36th Divisional Rest Station near BAILLEUL, thereafter he visited No. 1 Canadian Casualty Clearing Station. He also visited the D.D.M.S. V. Corps with reference to using part of the building occupied by a Field Ambulance for the Canadian Advanced Depot of Medical Stores. No. 5 Motor Ambulance Convoy was also visited and a trailer to convey 2 lying patients and to be attached to an Ordinary Motor Ambulance Car was inspected and considered to be of considerable advantage. The Lys River water distribution scheme came into use today, the A.Q.M.G. V. Corps having arranged to thoroughly flush out the pipes of the system prior to use. Evacuated to the Base:- 279.	
	8th		Bright fine day; warm. Second Army front normal. No. 2 Canadian Casualty Clearing Station arriving in Second Army area from First Army and is being located in huts recently taken over from the French at REMY SIDING. D.M.S. attended the conference of the D.D.M.S. V. Corps and A.Ds M.S. of Divisions of V. Corps, then he proceeded to TROIS ARBRES and inspected No. 2 Australian Casualty Clearing Station. The advanced party of 4th Canadian Division arriving today at ABEELE. 50th Division have left the line and are now in the FLETRE AREA. Evacuated to the Base:- 250.	
	9th		Bright warm day. The enemy launched a gas attack about midnight last night against the 4th and 29th Divisions, said to have been in three waves. Patients began to arrive in the Casualty Clearing Stations at REMY in early morning, about 150 having been brought in by 8 o'clock. They continued to arrive throughout the day. The late arrival of some of the cases into the Casualty Clearing Station was due to the difficulty in moving them from the canal bank, the 4th Division holding the most northerly part of the line. A number of deaths have occurred in Field Ambulances and in the trenches. D.M.S. visited the Casualty Clearing

	10th		<p>Warm sultry day. Second Army front quiet. Gas cases from the gas attack continued to arrive during last night, the A.D.M.S. 4th and 29th Divisions reported that at 9.0 a.m. the front areas were clear of cases. Delayed symptoms and dry cases have been a prominent feature in this attack, denoting the presence of a high percentage of phosgene. Oxygen has been liberally employed in the treatment and in a considerable number of cases given great relief, especially in the dry cases. Orders were issued to Casualty Clearing Stations that cases were to be retained and not sent down by Ambulance train until there was no danger in removing them. Colonel Gerrard's appointment as D.D.M.S. XIV. Corps has now been cancelled. The regiments suffering most heavily from the Gas were, in the 4th Division, 1st Somerset Light Infantry, 1st Rifle Brigade, 1st Hants Regiment, and in the 29th Division, 1st Royal Innisk. D.M.S. accompanied by Consulting Surgeon Second Army visited the Belgian Hospital at La. Panne. He was met by Dr. Depage, the Senior Surgeon and made a complete tour of the buildings and was much struck by the thoroughness of the administration and treatment of patients. D.G.M.S. called at 1. oclock and accompanied by D.A.D.M.S. proceeded to REMY SIDING and inspected Nos. 10, and 3 Canadian Casualty Clearing Stations. His visit was specially in reference to the gas cases, after leaving REMY he proceeded to MENDINGHEM and inspected No. 46 Casualty Clearing Station. He appeared quite satisfied with his visit. Lieut-Colonel H.P.W. Barrow, R.A.M.C., D.A.D.M.S. Sanitation left the Second Army area to join G.H.Q. 	12th		Hot sultry day. Second Army front quiet. The move of 50th Division from Second Army area is now complete. 4th Canadian Division less Artillery arriving in Second Army area today and continues 13th, 14th and 15th August. 51st Division has now arrived in Second Army area from Fourth Army and located between HAZEBROUCK and ST-OMER. 1st Canadian Division is now out of the Canadian Corps area and is in the Second Army Rest area, Headquarters at TILQUES. Letter received from Q.M.General saying that Motor transport, including M.A.Convoys would not accompany Divisions when moving from one army area to another. Gas cases from the recent attack have ceased coming into the Casualty Clearing Stations. Certain practical points respecting the treatment of these cases have been brought to notice and instructions are being issued to all Casualty Clearing Stations on the subject. The D.M.S. and D.A.D.M.S. attended Church parade at CASSEL and were afterwards presented to H.M. the King as were also the staff of the Second army. 23rd Division from Fourth Army start detraining at BAILLEUL Main and West today for Second Army. More wounded than normal transferred to Casualty Clearing Stations at REMY SIDING last night due to a raid by the enemy in front of hill 60 on the night of the 11/12th. The enemy said to have got into our trenches but were immediately turned out leaving a number of dead behind. The Military situation did not allow of the cases being transferred from the Advanced Dressing Stations until the night of the 12/13th. Surgeon-General Sir A. D.M.S. visited Red Farm, Headquarters 88th Field Ambulance and inspected the Dressing Station there. Headquarters IX. Corps arrived from Reserve Army by road who ^{they} are taking over from the XIV. Corps Reserve Army. Move of New Zealand Division from II. ANZAC Corps area to Bléringhem area commences today and finishes on 18th August, preparatory to moving South.</p> <p>Evacuated to Base:- 470. <i>> which goes to Reserve Army.</i></p>	
	15th		<p>Cloudy and cooler, showers at times. Second Army front quiet. 23rd Division is now in Meteren area, with Field Ambulances at Fletre, Meteren and Caestre.</p> <p>Evacuated to Base:- 315.</p>	
	16th		<p>Bolder - several showers. Second Army front quiet. 23rd Division are now taking over from the 41st Division, 51st Division are now taking over from New Zealand Division which is now occupying the area between HAZEBROUCK and ST.OMER. D.M.S. visited A.D.M.S., 1st Canadian Division at present in Rest in TILQUES area and inspected the 10th Battalion. He afterwards paid a visit to No. 7 General Hospital. A trailer brought over by No. 5 Motor Ambulance Convoy to convey two patients, and one introduced by Lieut Janson, 18th Division were inspected at the request of the Army Commander. D.A.D.M.S. visited the 2nd Canadian Casualty Clearing Station at REMY with reference to erection of huts and provision of flooring for the existing huts etc. He also visited the 46th Casualty Clearing Station at PROVEN. Evacuated to the Base:- 236.</p>	
	18th		<p>Dull day - some heavy showers. Second Army front quiet. 23rd Division has now taken over the line from the 41st Division, north of ARMENTIERES, having the 36th Division on its left and the 51st Division on its right. 41st Division is now in the FLETRE area, between BAILLEUL and HAZEBROUCK. The 4th Canadian Division is now complete and is situated in west area of Canadian Corps (Steenvoorde) also in Camp South West of VLAMERTINGHE. D.M.S. visited WESTOUTRE and called on A.D.M.S., 19th Division and inspected the Baths and Laundry there, and the means of clarifying the waste water. He then proceeded to RENINGHELST and called on A.Ds M.S. 2nd and 3rd Canadian Divisions. Evacuated to the Base:- 372.</p>	
	19th		<p>Cool morning - very heavy rain about 7.0 a.m. - several heavy showers during the forenoon. Easterly wind during night 18/19th and "Gas Alert" given. Second Army front quiet. D.M.S. accompanied by A.D.M.S., 38th Division inspected recent drafts of the following units at Camp "M" at PROVEN, 14th and 15th Royal Welsh Fusiliers of the 113th Brigade - all were of very good standard, especially some belonging to the Welsh Horse, 10th Welsh Regiment of the 114th Brigade - recent drafts were also good. Drafts of the 113th Brigade Machine Gun Company were of a very high standard. Owing to sudden orders for the Division to go into the line the programme had to be curtailed. The D.M.S. then inspected the 129th Field Ambulance and was very well pleased. The arrangements were very good. The Motor Ambulance Cars called for special comment - they were exceedingly well looked after. A very efficient portable cooker was seen at this Unit made by the Camp Cooking Co., Brixhill-on-Sea. It costs £21 and cooks for 250. It is very economical in fuel. The Officers' Rest Station at WORMHOUDT was also inspected - 130th Field Ambulance detachment. This was also very satisfactory. The D.M.S. afterwards called on General Blackadder, G.O.C., 38th Division. Barge arrived to evacuate patients from No. 1 Australian Casualty Clearing Station, ESTAIRS to No. 7 General Hospital tomorrow. Evacuated to the Base:- 221.</p>

Second Army front quiet except for a raid carried out during the night by the 5th Australian Division. New Zealand Division began detraining today for fourth Army - to be finished by 22nd.</p> <p>Evacuated to the Base:- 316.</p>	
	21st		<p>Fine day - cool. Second Army front quiet. D.M.S. inspected No. 46 Casualty Clearing Station at MENDINGHEM and found very satisfactory progress was being made, also No. 2 Canadian Casualty Clearing Station.</p> <p>Evacuated to the Base:- 287.</p>	
	22nd		<p>Fine day - coldish wind. Second Army front quiet. D.M.S. visited the D.D.M.S. Canadian Corps and afterwards proceeded to POPERINGHE where he met the A.D.M.S. 29th Division by arrangement and inspected the 87th Field Ambulance. Thereafter he visited the A.D.M.S. 4th Canadian Division. The 6th Canadian Field Ambulance at OUDERDOM and the Canadian Divisional Baths at HOPOUTRE were also visited. New Zealand Division has now left Second Army for Fourth Army. 34th Division has now arrived in Second Army and is administered by II. ANZAC Corps.</p> <p>Evacuated to the Base:- 369</p>	
	23rd		<p>Mild day - slight rain in evening. Second Army front quiet. D.A.D.M.S. along with O.C. No. 2 Canadian Advanced Depot of Medical Stores inspected various sites for placing a hut for these stores. The most suitable site was considered to be REMY SIDING adjoining No. 2 Canadian Casualty Clearing Station. It is proposed to consign stores to WIPPENHOEK and to utilize the Motor lorries of the Casualty Clearing Stations. 41st Division begin to entrain for Fourth Army.</p> <p>Evacuated to the Base:- 237.</p>	
	24th		<p>Fine day - cloudy. Second Army front quiet. 41st Division has now left the Second Army area. 34th Division has now taken over the middle sector of the II ANZAC Front with H. Corps at Croix du Bac from 18th Division which is now in Neuf Berquin, Douliou Area. Detachment from North Midland Casualty Clearing Station has now taken over the special Hospital at BOESCHEPE as a temporary measure, there being no other Field Medical Unit at present at BOESCHEPE. D.M.S. inspected the Casualty Clearing Stations at HAZEBROUCK.</p> <p>Evacuated to the Base:- 376.</p>	

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HAZEBROUCK.	25th Aug. 1916		<p>Hot sultry day. Second Army front very quiet, only 47 wounded transferred from Field Ambulances to Casualty Clearing Station in last 24 hours. 18th Division are now entraining for Third Army. D.M.S. visited D.D.M.S. IX. Corps and then went to No. 2 Australian Casualty Clearing Station and also visited A.D.M.S., 23rd Division - Colonel Blackham. All lying down cases from No. 1 Australian Casualty Clearing Station at ESTAIRES are now being evacuated by Barge to No. 7 General Hospital, MALASSISSE. Cases of Shell shock and those suffering from gas poisoning who show no obvious symptoms are now being retained in the Army area. Evacuated to the Base:- 259.</p>	
	26th		<p>Fine day - some rain. Second Army front normal. 1st Canadian Division is now entraining for Fourth Army. 1st Australian Division arriving in Second Army area near Steenvoorde and is administered by the Canadian Corps. Letter to "Q" for information of the D.A. & Q.M.G., Army stating the experience in this Army of the working of the Divisional Ambulance Workshop Unit since absorption into the Divisional Supply Column. The experience of this Army is that it has not been successful owing to the great delay in returning damaged cars and the length of time that cars take to be repaired. D.M.S. recommended that the personnel of the Divisional Ambulance Workshop Unit which was absorbed by the Divisional Supply Column should be transferred to Motor Ambulance Convoys and that the Convoy should be responsible for the upkeep of Field Ambulance Cars and repair of any damages thereto. The conference convened by "Q" Second Army to consider the question of the pollution of VLETERBEEK in the neighbourhood of POPERINGHE assembled this morning at 11.0 a.m. at No. 10 Casualty Clearing Station under the Presidency of Surgeon-General R. Porter, C.B., A.M.S., D.M.S., Second Army. Captain L.H. ADEN GUEST R.A.M.C., 29th Division was asked to act as Secretary. The conference decided as a Preamble that the pollution was greatly accentuated by the deprivation of water from the VLETERBEEK owing to the operation of the MONT-DES-CATS water catchment and distribution scheme, the feeders of the stream being deprived in their upper reaches of a quantity of water estimated to vary between 60,000 and 90,000 gallons daily; and recommended</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. That waste from the 16 breweries and Malleries at POPERINGHE was to be treated in sedimentation tanks before discharge into the stream, otherwise the defaulting brewery and mallery to be closed. 2. That standard method of treatment of bath and laundry waste at installations operating along the course of the stream were to be followed, the plans to be drawn up by Captain Matthews, R.E., and Captain Coplans, R.A.M.C. 3. Both the VLETERBEEK and its tributaries to be cleansed in their course through POPERINGHE.

Barrages on the stream to the north of L. 16 sheet 27 to be removed or modified - before the end of October next(details to be arranged) to prevent the possibility of damage by storm waters.</p> <p>5. Brewers and Maltsters to be allowed to put a reservoir for collecting water, preferably at night and to put forward a detailed scheme to carry this out, which the conference decided should be supported.</p> <p>6. Wells to be developed for supplying baths and laundries.</p> <p>7. In questions affecting the civil population the advisability of co-operating with the Chief Sanitary Officer to the Belgian Government was considered.</p> <p>The D.M.S. subsequently inspected the barrages on the VLETERBEEK at No. 10 Casualty Clearing Station and the Canadian Laundry at HOPOUTRE Siding when it was noted that the Barrage had raised the stream to within 30 inches of the crown of the bridge arch at that point. He also inspected work in progress(including light railway) at No. 3 Canadian and No. 10 Casualty Clearing Stations. Afterwards he inspected the Divisional Rest Station(Highland Field Ambulance) of 29th Division(O.C., Lieut-Colonel Fraser).</p> <p>Evacuated to the Base:- 201.</p>	
	27th		<p>Heavy rains at times - fine in intervals. Second Army front quiet. 2nd Canadian Division is now in BOLLEZEELE and NOORDPEENE area. 3rd Canadian Division is in STEENVOORDE area, both preparatory to leaving the Army area. The 1st Australian Division finishes detraining today for Canadian Corps area. D.M.S. visited ADINKERQUE on the Belgian Coast and inspected a boat for carrying a wounded man, invented by a Belgian Engineer - Carton by name. He considered that the boat was excellent in its way for canals etc but not much good for the present waterways in the Area occupied by the British Troops.</p> <p>Evacuated to the Base:- 276.</p>	

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HAZEBROUCK	1916. Aug. 28th		<p>Fine day. Second Army front normal. Destination of 18th Division now is RESERVE ARMY and not THIRD ARMY as previously stated. 4th Division is now in trenches at HOOGE and comes under administration of CANADIAN CORPS, with 29th Division on its left and 4th Canadian Division on its right. Evacuated to the Base:- 261.</p>	H
	29th		<p>Fine day in morning - heavy thunderstorm in afternoon. Second Army front normal. 2nd Canadian Division is now in TILQUES AREA. Headquarters 23rd Division is now in BAILLEUL and Headquarters 51st Division is now in STEENWERCK. A slight epidemic of Diphtheria has recently occurred in the 51st Division. 6 cases were diagnosed. All contacts were segregated and throats examined by the bacteriologist and 24 men were found to be carriers. No cases have occurred since the initial outbreak. 28 cases of P.U.O. admitted at No. 8 Casualty Clearing Station today; investigation as to cause is being carried out. Enquiries are at present being made into an outbreak of slight diarrhoea and Colic which has occurred for the third time amongst the men of the Second Army Heavy Mobile Workshop located near Hondeghem close to HAZEBROUCK. So far investigations point to the fact that something had been added to the men's tea. The attacks came on between 1 and 3 in the morning and only affected those men who had partaken of the tea meal. D.M.S. inspected the workshop this morning. Evacuated to the Base:- 212.</p>	
	30th		<p>Heavy rain all day. Second Army front very quiet. No Ambulance train has been ordered for Second Army area tomorrow. Colonel Foster, D.D.M.S. Canadian Corps came to visit the D.M.S. before leaving Second Army area tomorrow. Arrangements have been made for the washing of the Four Casualty Clearing Stations at REMY SIDING to be taken to DUNKIRK by rail. This will supersede the present system of carrying by lorry and will save a considerable amount of petrol. Evacuated to the Base:- 220.</p>	
	31st		<p>Fine day - cool - no rain. Second Army front quiet. No evacuation by Ambulance train today. D.A.D.M.S. inspected Special Hospital, BOESCHEPE. This is not considered very suitable for the purpose and the question of giving it up and transferring the Hospital to HAZEBROUCK is being considered.
