



The Airgraph Service is the quickest means of POSTAL communication to and from Australia and U.K.

In the event of the Unit passing through U.S.A., the U.S. Postal Administration will accept "V" mail letters (Airgraph equivalent) posted by Australian Servicemen in U.S. for delivery in Australia. These letters will be forwarded to Australia by the quickest possible means. Information in respect to the conditions of posting and charges will be advised when available.

Every effort is being made to obtain a supply of "V" mail forms (American issue) before the Unit's departure from Australia.

AIR MAIL TO U.K.

Route - Surface Mail to U.S. thence by air to U.K.  
Rates - Letters 2/1d per  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz. Limit 2 ozs.

Post Cards 1/1d. each

Endorsements - The endorsement "By Air Mail U.S.A. - England" must appear on the top left corners of letters and post cards.

Time lag - average 42 days.

It is expected that a much improved Air Mail service will be established between Australia and U.K., in the very near future. Particulars of this Service will be made available as soon as known.

AIR MAIL FROM U.K.

Route - Air from U.K. to U.S.A., thence by Surface to Australia.

Rates - Letters 1/3d per  $\frac{1}{2}$  oz (from Servicemen)

Air Mail Letter cards from servicemen - 6d. each.

Complete information in respect to Air Mail charges and conditions of posting in U.K., are not available at present. Full particulars will be ascertained and advised on arrival at destination.

SURFACE MAIL TO U.K.

Rates - Letters 1d. per oz.

Packets 1d. per 4 ozs., Limit - 1 lb.

Parcels - Min 6d., Max. 1/9d. Limit 11 lbs.

The U.K. limit of 5 lbs will not apply to parcels posted to or by Australian Servicemen in U.K.

1. All classes of postal articles are subject to Unit censorship.
2. ORs will lodge postings at the Groups Orderly room, Fort McDowell.
3. Officers at Hotel Fairmont will hand their postings to Capt Lovell who will arrange for them to be posted by the Relief Orderly Officer at Fort McDowell.
4. The Orderly Sgt will be responsible for the posting of all censored mail matter at the U.S. (Casual) P.O. located near the Groups Orderly Room, Fort McDowell.
5. Cablegrams and telegrams should be lodged by the senders at Branch offices of Western Union Telegraph Office, in which case they will be subject to U.S. Censorship.
6. Postal facilities and rates:-

Rate - Letters - 5 cents per oz.
  - "v" Mail letters (Conditions of posting as previously advised)  
Rate - 8 cents each.
  - Air Mail (Letters only)

POSTAL FACILITIES - USA TO AUST.

Facilities available are:

- (a) Surface mail (all classes of postal articles)
- (b) "V" mail (USA Airmail equivalent).

SURFACE MAIL.

Ratec - letters 5 cents per oz.

As customs duty is payable in Aust on articles of commercial value sent from USA, it is suggested that gift parcels be held for posting in UK, when Aust Customs duty concession of \$10 duty free per sender per annum will apply.

"V" MAIL LETTERS.

Rate - 8 cents each (airmail charge USA to CANADA).

Conditions of posting -

- (a) Back side of form must be completed in every detail including addressee full correct postal address which must be written in block letters within the address panel.
- (b) Indelible pencil must not be used.
- (c) After completion form must be carefully folded where necessary, but left unsealed when lodged for censoring.
- (d) Each form must be addressed on the outside to the addressee care of "CANADIAN AIRGRAPH SERVICE, TORONTO, CANADA."

Example:-

Care CANADIAN AIRGRAPH SERVICE,  
TORONTO, CANADA.

Note: Address of addressee will not be shown on outside of form.

(e) A limited supply of "V" mail form is available for distribution aboard. An initial issue of 5 per number may be had on application as follows:-

Officers - to Capt. Lovell (Cabin B40)  
C.R. - 2/Sgt. Waterston.

(f) "V" mail is a USA armed forces service which has been extended to Aust servicemen when in transit through USA. "V" mail letters posted by Aust service men are sent by air from USA to TORONTO, CANADA, where they are processed and forwarded on the Airgraph service to Aust.

(g) There is no airmail service (except for USA armed forces) between USA and Aust other than "V" mail service via CANADA detailed above.

(h) USA postage stamps are not available on board therefore cash to the value of the appropriate postal charges must accompany all articles when lodged for censoring.

(i) All matter for posting will be handed in together with postage as follows -

By C.R. - To Senior RCO's to be selected by the various units.

By Officers and selected RCO's. - To franking Officers to be selected by the various sub units.

(j) The selected franking Officers will arrange for censoring to be completed as soon as possible. Censored and franked mail will then be handed together with postage to Capt. Lovell, who will be available in his cabin from 1330 - 1430 daily except Sunday. Sub-paro (b) of RO No. 7 is cancelled.

(k) Unit censor stamp will be impressed in the case of "V" mail in the space provided and in the case of other mail at the top left hand corner, before sealing, together with franking officer's signature. G3 (Int) will issue unit censor stamps to the officers named above, selected franking officers.

(l) All articles will be posted in bulk by AIF Reception Co. Postal Unit at the first port of call in USA.

- (a) All classes of Air and surface articles, excepting parcels, posted in Australia for the Group are to be forwarded in civil despatches by all states to London Forward Section. Letters are to be bundled and face-labelled "AIF Reception Grp U.K."
- (b) Each Australian State to forward parcels for the Group in parcel mail despatches labelled "Australian FPO 191 United Kingdom".
- (c) British Civil Posts to arrange for Australian parcel mails labelled to FPO 191 to be forwarded direct to FPO 191 from the Port of receipt and for London forward to forward all other mail matter to PO High Wycombe.
- (d) D(Post) LHQ to be requested by cablegram through Aust Army staff London to arrange for routing as described in (a) and (b).
- (e) Civil posts will supply all necessary Postal stationery and stores.
- (f) British Army Posts will supply all necessary Army postal mail room equipment.
- (g) Mail stationery and stores and mail room equipment have been requisitioned for and will be available for collection within a few days. Arrangements are being made for future requirements of mail stationery and stores to be supplied by the Civil Post Office which services the Group.

Scranton rules to Australia - Free Postage.

1. The subject of free postage for surface articles addressed to Australia, weighing not more than 4 lbs, was discussed at the Civil Postal Administration, London today, and the Postmaster General's representative advised that, subject to the approval of Australian Army Staff, London, the concession will be extended to this Unit and all troops under command.

2. The required conditions are:-

- (a) The endorsement 'On Active service' must appear on the top of the addressed side of the cover of the article.
- (b) All articles must bear an impression of an Australian Army Postal stamp.
- (c) Mail originating from this unit must be labelled direct to the various State GPO's and forwarded as enclosures to GPO Index, for despatch as forward mail to Australia.
- (d) A nominal charge for all mails so despatched will be debited to the Australian Government.

3. The concession will only apply to articles addressed to Australia. All articles addressed to other places, including UK, must bear appropriate postage stamps.

4. The concession has already been extended to RAN, Canadian and South African troops.

5. Approval is accordingly sought for the introduction of free postage as outlined above. If approved, it is requested that the matter be represented to the Postmaster General's Department, London, and arrangements made for the service to be effected.

1. The subject of routing and method of despatching mails from Australia to this unit was discussed by Capt R. Lovell, DADPS AIF Reception Group UK with the officials in charge of the various mail and airgraph sections at HQ British Postal Administration, London and the following decisions were reached:-

- (a) All surface letters, packets, newspapers, air mail letters and air letter cards are to be forwarded in civil despatches from all GPOs in Australia to "London Forward."
- (b) Surface letters, air mail letters and air letter cards for inclusion in "London Forward" civil despatches are to be separately bundled, the bundles being face labelled "All for AIF Reception Group UK."
- (c) Parcels are to be forwarded in direct parcel mails to this unit labelled "Australian FPO 191 United Kingdom."
- (d) The British Postal Administration will arrange for mails labelled "Australian FPO 191 United Kingdom" to be forwarded from the ports of receipt in UK direct to the civil PO which services the unit.
- (e) Airgraphs are to circulate through ordinary channels as at present.

2. The present routing to London Foreign Section and the mixing of unit addressed articles with civil addressed ones does not permit of the expeditious disposal of this unit's mail and may result in mis-sorting.

4. Unit postal orderlies will effect the redirection of mail matter for absent members and ex-members of their respective units. Mail matter for absent repatriated prisoners of war within AIF Transit Camp who have not been allocated to a Reception Camp or posted to another unit will be readdressed by the Group's Postal Record Section.

5. Members are required to notify their respective unit postal orderlies in writing as to their redirection requirements before they move from the Group on leave, transfer, duty, detachment or to hospital, convalescent depots, schools or courses. If this is not practicable the notifications should be forwarded as soon as possible after movement. The member's army particulars, name of unit, accurate particulars of new address and the period for which redirection is desired must be indicated in each notification.

6. Units dispatching drafts will forward copies of nominal rolls of drafts to OC AIF Reception Group UK Postal Unit without undue delay.

7. Units will ensure that all members on movement are conversant with these redirection instructions.

CHRISTMAS MAILS TO AUSTRALIA  
CLOSING DATE AND CONDITIONS

CLOSING DATE

1. Letters, Christmas cards, printed matter, packets and parcels for despatch by surface route and intended for delivery in Australia must be lodged for Unit censorship not later than 1400 hrs 5 Oct 44. Unit postal orderlies are required to post all such articles at FPO 191 not later than 1800 hrs 5 Oct 44.
2. The closing date for airgraphs, air letter cards and air mail letters intended for Christmas delivery in Australia will be advised later.

CONDITIONS OF POSTING FOR PARCELS

3. Parcels must be strongly packed. An outer covering of linen, calico or canvas is recommended for all parcels. Thick twine should be used for tying.
4. The despatch of foodstuffs, tinned or otherwise, including chocolate and confectionery of all kinds, is prohibited.
5. Senders of articles to Australia at parcel post rates are required to complete and attach 2 customs declaration forms and one despatch note form to their parcels. These forms may be obtained from unit postal orderlies.





5. Civil P.C. will accept all P.C. AIR until bags requirements.
6. Ordinary Grey mail bags must be used for Mail Despatch. Green bags for registered mails. Red bags must NOT be used.
7. The transfer of inward and outward mails must be effected at the Postal Orderlies counter at rear of building. Entrance through side gate and door marked "Postal Orderlies".
8. The issuance of parcels will be effected at P.O. Counter. Particular care must be taken to ensure that every Civil P.C. condition is complied with before parcels are handed in to be issued.
9. Telegraphs and Cables will be lodged at Telegraph counter as frequently as necessary.
10. The number of words, charges, profiles, surface signatures and addresses etc. must appear on all telegrams and cables now issued by P.C. AIR. All other conditions of acceptance must be complied with before lodgement.
11. Printed telegrams and cables will be delivered by Telegraph messenger. Those definitely addressed to Hotels, rail buildings, street numbers etc., will be delivered as addressed. All others will be delivered to P.C. AIR during office hours and to Carlton Hotel after office hours.
12. Every effort is to be made at Carlton Hotel to effect delivery of messages for the collection of telegrams etc., delivered to that address after P.C. AIR office hours. Any for Transit or Reception corps which are on hand at 0050 hrs the following day will be delivered by C. Postal Orderly to P.C. AIR in time for the first transfer of mail to the Transit Corp Postal Station.
13. Receipts will be obtained in the telegram record book for all telegrams and cable messages lodged at the Civil Telegraph Counter.
14. A red line will be ruled directly beneath the last entry in record book at time of booking. The counter official will acknowledge receipt of the telegram etc. by date stamping, initialling and writing the name of telegram etc. received in the disposal column immediately above the red line.
15. Please arrange for the immediate implementation of the above additional decisions and suitably instruct all members of your staff accordingly.

Handling of Mail matters, delivery and despatch

1. All articles on hand (5 letters and 20 Cablesgrams) were delivered to repatriated p.w. immediately on arrival at Hazelmere Park Camp. Subsequent deliveries were made to repatriates before they proceeded on leave and immediately after their return from leave.
2. Most of the repatriates regarded the period of leave as too short to warrant re-direction and preferred that articles received during their absence be held at FPO 191 for immediate delivery on their return to camp.
3. Although the repatriates were informed that Cablesgrams would be accepted at FPO 191, very few were lodged. Quite a number of the men considered that the free cablesgrams which they sent on arrival in U.K. were sufficient. The knowledge of their early return to Australia probably influenced their decisions in this respect.
4. Approx. 40 Air letter cards and 50 letters, mostly for delivery within U.K. were posted by repatriates at FPO 191.
5. Nominal rolls of arrivals were not made available to the Postal Orderly who, in some instances, obtained the required information by personally visiting the men in their huts, and in others by the helpful assistance of WO/I JoeL R. Sell. Whilst the difficulties experienced by the limited Transit Camp orderly room staff in making nominal rolls readily available are fully appreciated, it must be explained that unless they are made available on arrival of drafts, the delivery of correspondence will be unduly delayed.
6. Information in respect to the evacuation of repatriates direct to hospital and convalescent depots from the port of disembarkation was not made available to this Unit.
7. The quantity of held articles for p.w. at present in enemy hands is gradually being increased by receipts of the special next-of-kin letters.
8. The procedure as outlined hereunder will, if adopted, facilitate delivery to numbers of subsequent p.w. drafts and obviate delays in delivery.
  - (a) All "Held" articles for p.w. to be arranged in lexicographical order in suitable holding trays. This is being done at present at FPO 191.
  - (b) D.A.D. (Post) to be supplied with advance copies of nominal rolls of expected p.w. arrivals whenever possible.
  - (c) When advance copies of expected arrivals are received, D.A.D. (Post) will have articles for the listed numbers "picked out" and forwarded to the port of disembarkation or British Transit Camp, whichever is the most practicable point of delivery.
  - (d) The delivery at the port of disembarkation or British Transit Camp to be controlled by a member of AIF Reception Grp.U.K. Postal Unit.
  - (e) D.A.D. (Post) copies of nominal rolls to be checked with the list of arrivals by the Postal representative at the ports of disembarkation or British Transit Camp, whichever is the most practicable.
  - (f) Particulars of direct evasions to Hospital, Convalescent Depots etc., to be noted against the respective names on the nominal roll by the Postal representative at port of disembarkation or British Transit Camp. The particulars to include name of hospital etc., to which evacuated and probable duration of stay in hospital etc.
  - (g) The Group's I.O. to arrange for the Postal representative to be given every facility to check nominal rolls and effect the delivery of correspondence at port of disembarkation or British Transit Camp.
  - (h) When advance nominal rolls of expected p.w. arrivals are not available, copies of nominal rolls of inward p.w. drafts to be supplied by 1 AIF Transit Camp as soon as possible after the arrival of drafts at 1 AIF Transit Camp. It may be possible for the Group's I.O. to obtain an additional copy of each nominal roll of draft and forward per draft conducting Officer to Postal.

- (1) When a Postal representative does not visit the port of disembarkation, all required particulars of direct evacuation to hospital etc, from ports or British Transit Camp to be obtained as soon as possible from Records 2 Echelon or if possible by the Group's L.C. and forwarded to Postal.
- (2) Correspondence which cannot be delivered at ports of disembarkation or British Transit Camp will be disposed of at 1 AIF Transit Camp.
- (3) All new arrivals to be suitably informed as to the re-direction requirements and facilities. Personnel due for return to Australia to be requested to leave written instructions for re-direction to civil addresses in Australia.
- (4) Approx. 7,000 re-direction cards are available for issue to men proceeding on leave, returning to Australia, evacuated to hospital and posted to Units. A requisition will be submitted for a further supply of these cards.

2. Stencilled re-direction forms were issued to all repatriates before their departure from Basraire Park Camp, and all were asked on parole to leave written instructions for Postal to re-address to civil addresses in Australia. 47 of these re-direction notices were lodged at FPO 121 and 22 more were obtained by L.C. when en route to the port.

POSTAL CONDITIONS

3. All classes of surface mail articles, not exceeding 2 ozs in weight, may be sent to Australia free of postage. When the weight exceeds 2 ozs, postage is chargeable on the total weight. The words "On Active Service" must appear on the top centre of the addressed side of all articles sent free of postage.

4. AIF personnel in United Kingdom are permitted to send 2 Air letter cards (Army Form 3077) per week to Australia at the concession rate of 3d per letter card. Additional Air letter cards may be sent at the full rate of 6d. each.

DAD (Post) will forward monthly supplies of unstamped Air letter cards to units on the first day of each month. The issue will be based on 2 for each Thursday in the month for all AIF personnel on strength or attachment. These concession rate letter cards must bear the requisite postage stamps when posted.

5. Postage stamps and 6d Air letter cards may be purchased from Unit Postal Orderlies and at FPO 191.

6. Postage stamps to the value of the appropriate charges must be affixed by senders to all articles requiring postage before they are lodged for consignment and posting.

7. Information in respect to rates and conditions not contained in these instructions can be obtained from Unit Postal Orderlies and at FPO 191 located at Dickens Hall, Upperton Road, EASTBOURNE.

8. Adhesive labels "Official Paid" (Army Form Nos. A2019E and A2019G) are issued for use in respect to official postal articles addressed to places within United Kingdom only. When such articles are intended for registration or insurance, postage stamps to the value of the appropriate registration or insurance fees must be affixed to the articles in addition to the labels. Articles addressed to places outside United Kingdom must bear postage stamps to the value of the appropriate charges.

#### REGISTRATION

9. All classes of Postal articles except parcels addressed to places outside UK and Eire and letter cards may be registered. All articles for registration must be sealed.

#### INSURANCE

10. All classes of surface mail articles except letter cards, addressed to Australia and other countries mentioned in the civil Post Office Guide may be insured. Air mail articles cannot be insured.

The insurance limit in respect to articles addressed to Australia is £50, and the fees are 5d for £12 and 2d for each additional £12 or part £12. Articles for insurance must be sealed by means of wax or lead seals which must bear impressions of a private device.

11. The form of postal address applicable to members of this Group will contain the following particulars :-

- (a) Army Number.
- (b) Rank, initials and surname.
- (c) Name of Unit within the Gp. to which the member is posted or permanently attached.

12. The postal addresses to be used by repatriated prisoners of war will be :-

All correspondents should be advised accordingly.

13. The redirection of mail matter to absent members and ex-members of units including absent repatriated prisoners of war who have been posted to units will be effected by the respective Unit Postal orderlies. Mail matter for absent repatriated prisoners of war who have not been allocated to a reception camp or posted to another unit will be readdressed by the Record Section, 1 AIF Reception Group Postal Unit.

14. Repatriated prisoners of war and members of units are required to notify their respective Unit Postal orderlies, in writing, as to their redirection requirements before they move from their units on leave, transfer, duty, detachment or to hospital, convalescent depots, schools or courses, and before their departure to Australia. If prior notification is not practicable the notifications should be forwarded as soon as possible after movement. The member's Army number, rank, name and initials in block letters, unit, accurate particulars of new address and period for which redirection is desired, must be indicated in each notification.

15. Personnel returning to Australia will be requested to leave civil forwarding addresses. If this is done deliveries will be expedited and much unnecessary work at base post offices and searching of district records in Australia will be obviated.

16. Any postal redirection cards have been issued to Unit Postal orderlies. Further supplies are obtainable at rPO 191 located at Lickens Hall, Upperthorpe Rd, EASTBOURNE.

17. Units will ensure that all members on movement are conversant with these redirection requirements.

18. Units receiving and despatching drafts will forward copies of nominal rolls of such drafts to DAD (Post) HQ AIF Reception Group UK without undue delay.

4. FOX & MOTH DISEASE.

(a) An outbreak of foot and mouth disease has been confirmed on the following farm:- F.E. Collier, Downside, 103 Small Holdings, Old Town, Dartmoor. Bay Reference - C22192, about 1349, 1" to 1 mile, and an area two miles in radius from the centre of the farm must be considered as infected. No training will take place in this area and movement will be confined to roads.

(b) Particular care will be taken by all ranks to ensure that gates within and on the perimeter of the infected area are kept closed so that the outbreak may not be spread by straying animals.

5. COMMUNICATIONS WITH ARMY OFFICERS.

It has come to notice that units of AIF Reception Gp. U.K., individual officers and soldiers have communicated direct with the local representative of Army Welfare (Capt. J. Pearson) for supply of easy chairs, radios and other furniture. This practice will cease forthwith.

All requests for supply of furniture etc. from Army Welfare sources will be made to Ammunition Officer, II AIF Reception Gp. U.K.

6. SICK PARADES.

(a) All sick parades will be held at Group RAF Keylegton Flt, at 0800 hrs. daily. Unit orderly RCO's will ensure that morning sick Report (AF 326) is properly prepared before parading sick personnel at RAF.

(b) Where necessary, units may arrange transport to carry sick personnel to RAF.

7. DRESS.

The following orders re dress will be observed by all concerned:-

(a) British pattern Battle Dress. The wearing of this dress or any part thereof by Australian personnel is forbidden.

- (b) Fatigue Dress. - Will not be worn in streets or public places except by personnel actually performing fatigue or proceeding to or from such duty.
- (c) Australian Jackets, SD (Olive pattern)
- When worn, this item of dress will be buttoned to the neck. Members, both Officers and Gns, are forbidden to wear a collar and tie with Australian Jackets, SD (Olive pattern).
- (d) Walking Out. When walking out or appearing in streets or public places (except on fatigue) members will wear appropriate head dress, jacket, trousers, belt (Australian personnel only) and footgear.
- When wearing jackets, SD: Aliots web, will also be worn except after Retreat and before Reveille, when the wearing of jackets will be at the members discretion. The practice of proceeding between billets, mess-room and places of duty incorrectly dressed will cease.
- (e) Group Routine Order 29 of 14 Sept 44 is cancelled.

8. FOOTWEAR.

- Arrangements have been made for the repair of boots, free of charge, of all personnel in this Group other than Officers.
- Boots must be securely tied together and labelled with owner's regimental number, name and unit. Australian & British personnel will mark the labels 'Australian' and 'British' respectively.
- Boots for repair will be forwarded to (X store R) AIR Reception Cpy. S.E.

9. LAUNDRY.

- Arrangements have been made for a free laundry service for WOs and all personnel below that rank. The service, which will operate weekly, provides for the free laundering of a bundle comprising not more than seven (7) articles selected from the following:-

Blouses.	Towels.
Shirts.	Gym shorts.
Socks.	Gym vests.
Toots.	Bathrobe/towel (5 to count as one article)

- The Laundry allocated to AIR Reception Cpy. S.E., Portal Unit in Beach Laundry, Royal Alfred, ROYAL ALFRED.
- Special labels obtainable from G.S. stores, R.A. AIR Reception Cpy. must be filled in and attached by the owner to each bundle. Number of units allocated to Beach Laundry will add in brackets to AIR Reception Cpy. R.A. The labels issued for Beach Laundry are returned with washed laundry, and may be used on subsequent occasions until the label is filled.
- Bundles of laundry must be forwarded to X store R, AIR Reception Cpy. S.E. Cumberland Hotel by 0900 hours each Monday.

10. TRAVEL OF ARMY PERSONNEL.

Civilians other than Government officials and F.D. employees, must not be transported on F.D. owned or hired mechanical transport unless on production of a certificate signed by an authorized officer to the effect that they are travelling by reason of authorized duties on behalf of the Army, the performance of which makes it necessary and desirable that they should so travel.

11. DRYING OF BOOTS.

- Damage to boots by 'burning' is liable to take place whenever boots become wet and drying by artificial heat is used.
- All personnel should adopt the correct method of drying boots. Serious damage to soles and uppers can, and usually does occur without evidence of burning becoming apparent on the outer surface.
- Wet leather must NOT be subjected to the heat of a stove pipe or exposed near an open fire. If this is done, the leather will lose its flexibility and will crack. If the boot is uninflamed, the fibres of the leather will melt and form a rigid resinous mass, which will break immediately on bending. This process takes place NOT on the outside first but from the inside outwards, and the mere fact that the outer surface of the sole is still sound is no assurance that internal damage has not occurred. The sight of steam rising from the soles of wet boots should always be regarded as sure evidence of instant burning within.

4. Every care must be taken to ensure that the fastest drying of boots by artificial heat is avoided. They should be dried, if possible, in a current of air, and drying will be accelerated if some form of absorbent material, (crumpled paper, cotton, or the like) is placed inside the boot, and the boots laid on their sides. The use of a heated room is quite permissible, but the boots must be kept well away from the source of heat.

12.

SMOKING OF CIGARETTES.

Cases have occurred of live embers having been found in the chimneys of recognized buildings. Personnel will ensure that before fires are lit all chimneys are examined.

13.

SALE OF AMERICAN CIGARETTES TO GIVE RANK & BRITISH ARMY PERSONNEL.

- (a) American cigarettes are made available at special prices under arrangement with the Customs Dept., on condition that they are not sold or made available to civilians or to members of the British Army.
- (b) Notwithstanding the orders issued for compliance with the above-mentioned conditions, it has come to notice that Australian personnel are re-selling American cigarettes to British personnel. This practice is forbidden.
- (c) Prohibition on resale of American cigarettes is brought to the notice of all ranks and that disobedience of the orders is treated as a serious offence.

14.

LONG WEEKEND LEAVE & REST DAYS - British & Australian personnel.

- (a) Local leave may be granted at the discretion of COs until 2400 hrs daily. Except as provided in sub-para (c) below, personnel on local leave will not proceed outside a radius of 25 miles from Harbours.
- (b) Subject to the exigencies of the Service, one day, which shall be Sunday whenever possible, will be observed as a rest day on which COs may, at their discretion, grant local leave.
- (c) Effective from 14 Oct 44, weekend leave may be granted at discretion of COs from 1200 hrs each Saturday until 2400 hrs on the following day (Sunday) with no restriction as to distance of travel. The following rules will apply:-
  - (i) A member will not be granted weekend leave more often than once in every three weeks.
  - (ii) A leave pass will be issued in each case and will show the city or area to which leave has been approved.
  - (iii) Members granted weekend leave will NOT be granted free travel facilities.
- (d) Local leave, weekend leave and rest days will not be accumulated, free railway warrants will not be issued in respect thereof, the count will not be counted against recreation leave and records of the granting of these privileges will not be entered in the members record of service book etc.
- (e) The introduction of weekend leave is to be regarded as a temporary arrangement only and subject to cancellation at any time.

SICK PARADE.

- (a) All sick parades will be held at Group RAF Appleton Flats, at 0900 hrs daily. Unit orderly HODs will ensure that morning Sick Report (AF 2256) is properly prepared before parading sick personnel at RAF.

**27. SECURITY - REPORT.**

1. With the exception of the security address shown for AIF Reception Group, the arrangements as outlined in the attached file are adequate and will facilitate the handling of diverted and accommodation addressed P.W. mail.

3. and HQ Melbourne advised accordingly. Should the publication of this address be considered inappropriate and the security address retained, an alternative suggestion is that the Australian FMS Dept. be requested to arrange for such State in the Commonwealth to despatch all air and surface postal articles addressed to AIF Reception Group United Kingdom, in bags labelled 'Australian FPO Eastbourne.England.', such bags to be forwarded as labelled or as indicated in mails to 'London Forward'.
4. Accommodation and floor space at FPO 101 is sufficient for the sorting and handling of diverted and accommodation addressed PW mail.
5. Social and officially labelled mails containing diverted and accommodation addressed mail matter for repatriated Naval PW will be made up at FPO 101 and forwarded to the Naval Representative, Australia House, London, per DH vehicle without undue delay. A system of mail exchange between Australia House and FPO 101 is not in operation.
6. The method of sorting and despatch of PW mail from Melbourne to Europe was investigated before my departure from Australia and it was ascertained that every effort is made to separately bundle letters intended for the various services (Navy and civilian detainees) according to addressed, i.e. that while a number of incorrectly and indefinitely addressed letters are forwarded in mixed bundles for sorting for the country of destination.
7. When the PW mail is diverted to G.H.Q., the sorting of letters contained in the mixed bundles will be difficult unless a consolidated postal record of all Services PW., and civilian detainees is maintained at FPO 101 for the direction of addresses. In order that this may be completed it will be necessary for R.A.F., Navy, Merchant Seamen and Civilian Interned representatives to prepare and forward record cards (6" x 4") or nominal rolls of their respective P.W. personnel. If nominal rolls are forwarded AIF Reception Group Postal Unit will prepare the cards. Approval is sought for me to interview the various representatives and conclude arrangements with them.
