153 OUT OF BOUNDS

Owing to the fact that during the last fortnight at least 14 cases of VD have been traced to YOSHIURA the town is now OUT OF BOUNDS to all ranks of 34 Aust Inf Bde except personnel proceeding thereto or passing through on duty.

154 DRESS - WEARING OF BERETS KHAKI

Detailed hereunder are the methods for fixing the badge copper oxidised in its correct position for wear and the method in which the beret is adjusted on the head. No departure from these methods will be allowed.

(a) Fixing the Badge Copper Oxidized.

(i) The beret is folded so that the circumference of the leather band forms a straight line, inner surfaces of the leather band touching, with the adjusting bow to the right.

(ii) The badge is positioned so that the leading edge of the badge is one inch from the front end of the beret with the bottom edge of the badge  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch above the top edge of the leather band.

(b) Correct method of wearing the beret

(i) The beret is placed on the head with the adjusting bow at the back and in the centre of the head.

(ii) The leather band will run parallel with and one inch above the eyebrow line.

(iii) The "slack" of the beret is pulled over the right ear without shifting the leather band from its position.

(iv) The beret is then adjusted so that the badge is in position over the left eye.

(c) Badges hat copper oxidized worn on berets khaki will be burnished.

(d) Berets will only be worn after 1700 hrs when proceeding on night leave.

CURRENCY CONTROL

(a) The following conditions will apply to remittances to certain countries outside JAPAN from personnel of BCOF. This order will be effective from 18 Apr 46 and cancels all previous orders and instructions concerning this subject.

(b) UNDRAWN PAY

Remittances of undrawn pay may be made for any amount standing to the credit of the individual member. Applications to remit will be made in accordance with procedure existing for each contingent.

(c) JAPANESE CURRENCY

Under no circumstances will Japanese currency be remitted or credited to a member's pay book.

(d) POSTAL NOTES

All ranks of the Australian contingent may purchase Australian Postal Notes, only under the following conditions:-

(i) Purchases will be limited to the actual amount drawn at the particular pay parade, but will not exceed £A5 per fortnight.

(ii) Members will submit application on Form obtained from the Postal Sgt.

(iii) Paying Officer will complete the Certificate and compile in duplicate a summary of approved applications. Application form will then be returned to the member.

(iv) The CO will complete the certificate.

(v) Both copies of the summary of approved applications will then be passed to the Postal Sgt. The original will be used as an authority to draw the necessary notes from the Base, Army or Field Post Office and the duplicate will be retained by the Postal Sgt.

(vi) Base, Army and Field Post Offices will retain the original summary to support record of issues.

(vii) Postal Notes will be issued by the Postal orderly on surrender of application form and payment of the purchase price.



(viii) Application forms will then be filed by units with the duplicate summary and held for four months. These documents are subject to periodical inspections by representatives of the Chief Paymaster, BCOF.

156. DISCIPLINE - DRESS WHILE ON LEAVE

Attention is drawn to 65 Inf Bn RO 44 of 26 Feb 46.

It has been noticed that troops are proceeding on leave improperly dressed. Items of American equipment are being worn, and jackets etc have been removed.

FUKUYAMA town picquet will take action against troops on leave found to be incorrectly dressed.

157. DISCIPLINE - OUT OF BOUNDS AREA

The area bounded by the following map references including the towns of MIHARA and ONOMICHI is "OUT OF BOUNDS" to all individuals and organised leave parties except those personnel whose duty necessitates entry into the area.

Map: Central Japan 1:250000 OKAYAMA issued 1945.

158. SUBSISTENCE ALLOWANCE - AMF PERSONNEL

Subsistence allowance will not be paid to AMF members of BCOF. Personnel proceeding on leave will on all occasions be in possession of rations drawn from units prior to movement.

159. MT - USE OF GEARS AS BRAKES

The practice of using gears to decelerate, whilst travelling at high speeds is too prevalent.

This produces excessive engine speeds, undue strain on transmissions, and is a contributing factor to rapid tyre wear.

Drivers, when reducing speed, will do so gradually applying brakes if necessary before engaging a lower gear.

160. TYRE PRESERVATION - WHEELED VEHICLES

Damage and excessive wear to tyres through carelessness and bad driving is prevalent in the area.

This is due to:

- (a) failure of drivers to exercise sufficient care when negotiating the extremely bad prevailing road conditions, such as broken surfaces, rubble, projecting tram and railway lines and built in railway points.



- (b) Incorrect tyre pressures, excessive acceleration when moving off, fast driving and unnecessary rapid brake application.

T O will take action necessary to eradicate the above faults.

161. SOUVENIRS - JAPANESE RIFLES AND AMMUNITION

Instances have been reported where personnel have been collecting items of Japanese military equipment, especially arms and ammunition as souvenirs.

This practice will be discouraged by Coy commanders.

No personnel will be permitted to retain any such items of enemy equipment except when issued under proper authority by direction of this HQ.

Disciplinary action will be taken against persons neglecting to obey this order.

162. WAX MATCHES

Open flame to fire risk wax matches will NOT be used by BCOF personnel. Safety matches, only will be issued by S&T and sold from canteens.

163. JAPANESE ATHLETICS

No games will be scheduled between any organisation of this army and teams composed altogether or in part of Japanese nationals.

No military personnel will engage in any athletic contests with Japanese nationals.

164. CONSUMPTION OF BEER IN CANTEENS

Beer purchased in canteens will be consumed on the premises. The practice of taking beer into canteens, clubs, cafeterias etc will cease forthwith.

165. ETA JIMA ISLAND - OUT OF BOUNDS

Owing to recent cases of pilfering in tunnel containing highly dangerous explosives the whole of the EAST shore of ETA JIMA island from northern most point to southern most point except for KOYO ferry terminal is placed out of bounds to all personnel.

Sentries have orders to fire on all trespassers from seaward.

Passes to enter closed area will only be issued by DEE HQ BCOF.

Coy etc commanders will ensure widest publicity of this instruction.

166. VEHICLES WITH FRONT WHEEL DRIVE (MBI No 7 of 28 Mar 46)

(i) The front wheel drive on 4x4, 4x6 and 6x6 vehicles was designed for cross country operations and emergency conditions, and not for general or continuous use on good roads.



- (ii) The most economical operation resulting in the saving of fuel, wear on tyres and major unit assemblies is achieved only when the vehicle is operated with the front wheel drive disengaged.
- (iii) Front wheel drive will be used only in circumstances referred to in para (i) of this instruction and will not be used while operating on roads in metropolitan areas.
- (iv) Formation etc commanders will ensure that this instruction is carried out.

Women so carried will at all times be in possession of the authorised BCOF official pass, and the senior BCOF member in the vehicle will be responsible to ensure that persons so concerned ARE IN POSSESSION of such passes.

All work tickets will be endorsed by persons so authorised that the vehicle whilst engaged on a particular duty is permitted to carry Jap civilian women.

168. JAPANESE WAITRESSES

No Japanese women are permitted to be employed in any messes after 2030 hours.

169. OUT OF BOUNDS

170. RECREATION HUT

The total number of personnel absent from units on leave and in hospital at any one time will not exceed twenty five per cent of posted strength.
175. DISCIPLINE - TRAFFIC CONTROL  
Provost Traffic Control points will institute a check on civilian vehicles suspected of carrying stolen goods which are the property of the Occupation Force.  
  
Provost TCP's will obtain the services of one member of the Japanese Civil Police (at each TCP) and if necessary an interpreter.

KIT LAYOUT

As from receipt of this order Kit layout will be standardized throughout Coys as under:-

Bathing or other direct contact with natural fresh waters (such as rivers, streams, ponds and ricefields) is forbidden except where definitely authorised for bathing.

Water will not be drunk unless it is known to have been sterilised.

179.

CONVERSION OF JAPANESE YEN CURRENCY

Under no circumstances will Japanese Yen Currency be converted in Australia.

Members of the Australian Services when about to embark for return to Australia may exchange Japanese Yen Currency held by them personally, for equivalent Australian currency subject to a limit of £20 Aust in the case of officers and £10 Aust for other ranks, provided that in no instance will the amount so exchanged exceed the total paybook drawings of the member concerned.

Australian currency issued under this arrangement shall NOT be expended or exchanged in Japan.



180. J. PANESE CURRENCY - FORGERIES.

Ten Yen (¥10) bank notes with forged stamps attached are in circulation in this area.

The forgeries are similar to the legitimate stamps and can easily be mistaken for the genuine stamps by personnel not familiar with this type of currency. The usual indications of a forgery are inferior printing and variation in colour.

BCOF personnel are, therefore, warned to closely scrutinise the stamps on all civilian type notes before accepting them.

Paymasters cannot give credit for other than legitimate notes.

181. GIFTS AND SOUVENIRS.

Arrangements have been completed whereby BCOF receive a per capita allocation of all purchases made in Japan by ARMY Exchange Central Purchasing Organisation, TOKYO.

These purchases will be sold through retail stores to be established shortly by ACS.

182. TITLES AUSTRALIA.

Titles Australia will NOT be burnished. Coys will make arrangements to replace any Titles Australia so treated.

183. MT CHECK POST.

An MT check post has been established near entrance to H. Coy. All vehicles will be checked between 1800 hours and 0700 hours daily.

Drivers must produce G2's for inspection by guard.

184. CANTEEN

1. SALE OF BEER.

- (a) NO beer will be sold after 2100 hours
- (b) A warning bell will be rung at 2130 hours.
- (c) Canteen will be cleared at 2200 hours.

2. Under NO circumstances will beer be taken from the Canteen. Coys will display a large notice on notice boards to the effect that NO beer spirits wines or other alcoholic drinks will be kept OR drunk in barracks.

187. LEAVE



2. Speed limits as laid down in Standing and Routine Orders will be strictly adhered to.
3. Drivers will at all times be correctly dressed whilst driving either in or outside Camp area. Unless otherwise ordered dress will be Walking Out Dress Winter or Summer
4. Drivers under NO circumstances will carry Army personnel when carrying Japanese labour.
5. Japanese civilians will NOT be picked up unless they are being carried to and from work for Occupation Forces.
6. Drivers will NOTE carefully the load capacity of 2½ ton vehicles when carrying Japanese labour. Load laid down by Higher Authority is 40 personnel.
7. Japanese will NOT be allowed to travel in cabin of 2½ ton vehicles
8. Drivers will at all times carry AAB83, Paybook, Licence and G2 when on duty and may be called on at any time to produce these for identification at MT Check Point.
9. A driver appointed to a vehicle will NOT, except in case of emergency, permit his vehicle to be driven by any other individual unless ordered by an Officer or NCO. If the driver is so ordered he will request that the order be given in writing on the back of his G2.
10. Drivers will NOT smoke whilst driving a vehicle. Permission may be granted by an Officer or NCO in charge of a vehicle on a long journey for the driver to smoke.
11. These instructions are in addition to and NOT a cancellation of STANDING ORDERS FOR DRIVERS OF MECHANICAL VEHICLES.

SOCIAL WELFARE

A Social Service Welfare Organisation has been established at BCOF HQ; its function, to advise and assist the Australian personnel of BCOF, Japan, and their families in Australia.

This has been made necessary by the closing down of such organisations as the A C F , and Unit Organisations, which, during the war were able, in many cases, to help families of soldiers, whilst units were serving overseas.

More particularly this organisation will be concerned with the investigation of applications for leave, or , discharge on compassionate grounds which are not of an urgent nature.

All Australian Units have had a Welfare Officer appointed, and the staff at BCOF, in command of Lt Northcott, daughter of the C-in-C, has direct communication with civilian Welfare Organisations which exist in all Capital cities and most large towns in Australia.

When a soldier makes application for leave or discharge it is these Civilian Organisations which will investigate his case and make any recommendations,- NOT through Military channels as formerly.

In future, except where urgent cases have sufficient documentary evidence to support their applications, vide GRO 343/45 personnel desirous of compassionate leave or discharge will first apply direct to the Unit Welfare Officer who has direct access to BCOF HQ. All matters which may affect the application and irrespective of the Welfare Officer's opinion will be forwarded to HQ BCOF. From HQ BCOF Army Signal Service will be used to expedite the application to its destination.

Members wishing to make use of this Service are assured that all applications will be treated impersonally and confidentially.

At the same time the Staff at HQ, BCOF are confident that they can do much to improve the speed with which these matters were dealt with formerly.





202. VEHICULAR PASSENGERS - JAPANESE WOMEN (BCOF RO 185)

1. Under no circumstances will Japanese women be permitted to enter or travel in BCOF vehicles unless they are employed as civilian labour by BCOF and are engaged in or being transported to such work at the time they are being carried in military vehicles.

Japanese women will NOT be carried in staff cars.

Japanese women will NOT be carried in the front seats of vehicles and may only be carried in the back seats of jeeps as single passengers or with other Japanese nationals and in this event the trip will be authorized by an officer who will endorse the work ticket.

Women so carried will at all times be in possession of the authorized BCOF official pass, and the senior BCOF number in the vehicle will be responsible to ensure that persons so concerned ARE IN POSSESSION of such pass.

This replaces Routine Order 167 of 7 May 46 (BCOF RO 102)

203. DISCHARGE ON OCCUPATIONAL GROUNDS - AMF PERSONNEL

National Security (Manpower) Regulations have been repealed and the Manpower Directorate has ceased to exist.

Applications for accelerated discharge on occupational grounds now should be submitted to the Deputy Director of Employment in each State instead of to the Deputy Director General of Manpower as in the past. The addresses of the Deputy Directors of Employment remain the same as the former Deputy Directors General of Manpower

204. LEAVE

222. VICTORY DAY MESSAGE

225. PAC

Any man who has sexual intercourse or exposes himself to infection with Venereal Disease will attend and receive treatment at a PAC without delay. A record of attendances will be kept by recording at least the Army number. Such records will be treated as confidential until VD is diagnosed. It will then be used as evidence as to whether the man has or has not obeyed this order.

226. MT TO THE STATION

Instances have been occurring of personnel travelling to FUKUYAMA being unpunctual for the MT. In future transport will leave at appointed time and personnel missing such tpt will travel the following day.

227. DISCIPLINE - CARRYING OF INTOXICATING LIQUOR

Personnel will NOT carry, be in possession of or consume intoxicating liquor outside prescribed unit canteens, messes, institutions or billets.

The practice of carrying bottled liquor whilst on leave or proceeding from unit lines is forbidden.

Military police and members of town picquets will confiscate all liquor found in possession of personnel outside unit lines.

230. POSTAL RESUME OF ACTIVITIES FOR WEEK ENDING 13 JUN 46

Reprinted hereunder are extracts from a report received by 34 Bde HQ from AD POSTS BCOF for the information of all ranks:-

"(a) Complaints have come to hand from nearly all quarters regarding the infrequency and irregularity of mail. Unfortunately the complaints are well-founded, but it remains for satisfactory and dependable Air Services to be established before a better and more reliable Mail Service is possible. It cannot be too strongly stressed that these complaints must not only be expected to continue but to increase in volume until the present unsatisfactory Air Services are improved and the frequency with which aircraft are becoming unserviceable is diminished.

(b) Until the circumstances of the jettisoning of mail ex Aircraft RPQ on 1 Jun 46 are known and the results of any inquiry held come to hand, the question of compensation for loss of registered articles cannot be considered. Under ordinary circumstances, losses deemed to be due to "Acts of God" are not liable for compensation. Lists of articles lost are being prepared, without prejudice, and



compensation will probably be payable on the basis of legal opinion furnished to the Government.

(c) No progress has been made to provide an "All-Empire" Direct W/T from JAPAN. Until the Governments concerned agree to SCAP demands for the production of certain information as to charges and "splits" thereof between terminal and originating stations, it is not to be expected. All steps possible have been taken at TOKYO and in AUSTRALIA to remove the present impasse. The present HONG KONG W/T outlet is not regarded as satisfactory.

(d) The only mail received from AUSTRALIA during the period since 1 June 46 arrived at IWAKUNI on 8 June 46, a gap of seven days. The mail position for BCOF as at 2100 hrs 11 June 46 is as follows:-

235. PASSENGERS CARRIED BY WATERCRAFT

239. VENEREAL DISEASE

- (a) The following amplification of the term "Venereal Disease" as affecting leave, alcohol restrictions and suitability for kitchen duty is made.
- (b) "Venereal Disease" will include Gonococcal Urethritis, Non Specific Urethritis, Syphilis, Chancroid and Penile sores, the latter only where blood test is to be carried out later.
- (c) All personnel found suffering from any of the above complaints will be debarred from partaking of alcoholic liquor and will NOT be granted leave for a period of 15 days after discharge from hospital (vide Bn RO 104 of 20 March 46 and Bn RO 143 of 16 Apr 46). In addition all such personnel will be considered unfit for kitchen duty until a Wasserman Blood Test has proved negative after a period of 3 months.

240. CANTEEN COMMODITIES

Certain canteen commodities as enumerated hereunder have been recently in short supply and it has been found necessary to ration weekly in some cases and issue monthly in others. It is understood that substantial stocks are now enroute to Japan and it is hoped that a liberal ration will be issued in the near future:-

An outbreak of Cholera has occurred in FUKUYAMA, 15 deaths having been reported in the last few days.

Attention of all ranks is drawn to the fact that this is a food and water borne disease with a very high death rate.

All Japanese labour has been banned from kitchens and canteen. On no account will food or fruit of Japanese origin be eaten.

Chlorinated water ONLY will be used for drinking, cooking and washing utensils.

244. DRESS

Shirt sleeves will be rolled down by 1900 hrs nightly or a long sleeved garment worn. Duty NCO at VASEY THEATRE will NOT admit personnel who fail to comply with this order. Owing to the advent of hot weather, shirts may be removed whilst personnel are engaged in strenuous labour in actual camp area between the hours of 0800 and 1800. Shirts will NOT be removed outside these limits without the prior approval of an officer.

Personnel will NOT swim after 1900 hrs.

245. MOSQUITO NETS

- (a) By 1900 hrs nightly mosquito nets will be erected in barrack huts and tucked in around bedding. Bn Orderly Officers will conduct periodical inspection to ensure the enforcement of this order.
- (b) In addition, disciplinary action will be taken against personnel who fail to observe full anti-mosquito personal measures. This order becomes necessary in view of the risk to life which may be anticipated in the outbreak of B Encephalitis.

246. ANTI VD DRIVE - POSTER COMPETITION

- (a) In order to provide suitable posters for future reproduction as part of a drive against VD and for circulation to units, a poster competition has been organised.
- (b) Entries are invited from all ranks. These may be illustrated in colours or may merely consist of a pencil drawing. Such drawings, however, must occupy at least a foolscap page and will contain a suitable slogan or caption. An experienced artist will judge the entries and prizes up to £500 will be awarded.
- (c) Posters will be judged on the following points in the order of priority as shown:-
  - (i) Would the poster materially assist by display in the prevention of VD.
  - (ii) Does the slogan or caption bring home significantly the evil of contracting VD?
  - (iii) Drawing ability.
  - (iv) General poster design.
- (d) Entries will be lodged with ammunities Officer HQ 34 Inf Bde by 8 July 46. The decision of the judge is final and will be notified through Bde Routine Orders



247. DISCIPLINE

It has been noticed that some soldiers are becoming lax in saluting. Other Ranks will at all times salute all officers either when passing or before addressing them either out of doors or in offices. This applies equally whether men are on duty or on leave outside the camp area.

In future upon the commanding officer or other high ranking officers officially entering the unit theatre prior to the commencement of the entertainment, all ranks will stand until the official party is seated.

This procedure will be observed upon a visit being paid to unit canteen, mess huts, education centre, barrack rooms, etc, allowing the visiting officer to speak to all or any persons whom he may wish to.

MAIL RESUME - WEEK ENDING 29 JUN 46.

- (a) AD Posts BCOF advises that PMG Australia has now taken over the sorting of letter mails to service aircraft for transit to Japan and those mails arriving in Australia from Japan.
- (b) South bound mails to Australia from Japan averaged one South bound mail carrying aircraft every 2.42 days or slightly less than 3 mails per week over the last 3 months.
- (c) However, owing to the irregularity of the transit times and the frequent "groundings" through weather and unsuitable aircraft, it is NOT likely that this frequency represents the true position today. Everything possible is being done to improve the service, but until more reliable and frequent Air Transport is available, very little in that direction is possible of accomplishment.
- (d) Some Aust newspapers have carried a paragraph advising the public that letters for BCOF should be addressed to the place at which the addressee is located. This is NOT CORRECT and to ensure correct initial addressing, all personnel are advised to repeat their correct address {no., rank, name, unit, British Commonwealth Occupation Force (in full), Japan} to all correspondents in Australia.
- (e) Approximately 1750 bags of surface mail arrived from Australia on HMAS "WESTRALIA" and "CANBERRA" and is being discharged steadily.

MINUTES OF BOXING COMMITTEE CONFERENCE

Held at HQ 34 Aust Inf Bde at 1500 hrs 27 May 46

1. The following members of the committee were present:-

2. The Rules and Regulations governing the boxing within the formation were discussed and the draft to be promulgated by HQ 34 Aust Inf Bde was read to members and accepted.
3. The Committee then discussed the officials considered necessary to run the boxing contests. These will be promulgated in Rules and Regulations for Boxing. The members have undertaken to nominate these officials at the next meeting.
4. The entries for the tournament were scrutinized and as there were only sufficient entries for an evenings boxing, it was decided to :-
- (a) Postpone tournament for at least two weeks, and the date of commencement to be reconsidered in about ten or twelve days time.

  - (b) Arrangements for the boxing evening on 8 Jun 46
  - (c) Draw
7. A further meeting at 15 00 hrs 5 Jun 46 will be held to check on all arrangements.
8. The dress to be worn in the ring by the boxers was discussed and it was decided that it would be:-

  - Colour Sash
  - Boxing Boots or Athletic shoes.
9. Gloves were discussed, and the decision was made that the committee hold six pairs of gloves, that will be used for the contests. These gloves will be softened up with a suitable oil or wax.

1. Attached as Appendix A are the Minutes of the Boxing Committee Conference held at HQ, 34 Aust Inf Bde at 1500 hrs on 27 May 46.
2. The meeting was held to decide:-



"Q" REPORT FOR JUNE 1946

1. ACCOMMODATION:- No change from previous month. Electric Light fittings and glass for window panes still in short supply.
2. CLOTHING AND NECESSITIES:- Due to lack of maintenance requirements, position in regard to summer wear is rapidly becoming serious and likely to be accentuated if the proposed tour of duty in Tokyo is effected.
3. EQUIPMENT:-
  - (a) Transport :- Still poor; spare parts for vehicles are still not obtainable. Replacement of U.S. vehicles in the same category.
  - (b) Technical Equipment:- Some improvement. Signal equipment (Wireless sets) and Machine Carbines have at last been serviced. Other items of Signal equipment such as telephones and switchboards are in need of replacement.
4. RATIONS:- Number drawn for month 24,204. There has been a slight deterioration in quality, due to the effect of hot weather on fresh vegetables, but generally the position is satisfactory.

Ref Map: 1:50,000      CENTRAL JAPAN

INFORMATION

1. "Operational Task Areas of Responsibility" of 20 May is cancelled.
2. Tasks of 65 Inf Bn will be as set out in Occupation Instruction No 1 (Intelligence Requirements) of 24 April 46.

INTENTION

2. 65 Inf Bn will:-
  - (a) Ensure that all instructions, issued by Supreme Commander for Allied Forces, to People of JAPAN are obeyed in full in so far as they apply to Japanese civilians in this Bn's area of responsibility.
  - (b) Gain the maximum amount of detailed information regarding the area under its control so that a complete topographical and geographical study may be compiled.

METHOD

3. Patrols

- (a) Patrol activity will commence, under coy arrangements as from the receipt of this instruction.
- (b) At least one patrol will be despatched daily from each Coy; except on "stand down" days and the respective areas systematically and progressively covered.
- (c) Where roads permit, patrols will be sent out by MT leaving camp at 0830 hrs. Patrols will then move on foot through the area selected, and will be picked up at a prearranged rendezvous in order to arrive back in camp by approximately 1600 hrs.
- (d) Two day patrols may be necessary to cover more outlying areas, in which case patrols will carry own rations and will bivouac. On no account will local food or accommodation be utilised.

4. Interpreters

Where possible an interpreter will accompany patrols. This however, will not be practicable at all times. When no interpreter is available the patrol comd will note any matters which may need further investigation, requiring the use of an interpreter.

5. Written Reports

- (a) Patrol comds will submit written reports to Intelligence Office by 1000 hrs on the day following the patrol.
- (b) These reports will be submitted in the form set out in Appx to Operation Instr No 1 and in 65 Inf Bn 19/9/55 of 24 June 46, and will cover all aspects of the patrol.



6. Respect of Civilian Rights

- (a) Stress will be laid on the integrity of patrol comds and the conduct of the patrols.
- (b) Civilian rights and places of worship will be respected by patrols.
- (c) Whilst it is appreciated that shrines and places of worship may be a fruitful source for concealed weapons etc, they are not to be regarded as "Fair game" by patrol members. Patrol comds are authorised to enter such places in the course of their duties, but private property will be respected. Disciplinary action will be taken against offenders.

7. Logs

- (a) Coys will maintain a log of all patrols, showing:-

- (b) These logs will be available for inspection by Bn HQ at all times.

8. Maps

Maps and overlays of areas to be covered are being issued separately by Intelligence Officer.

1. Para 3 of abovementioned instruction is now cancelled.
2. A written return of ALL personnel travelling by train will reach the Asst Adjt by 1500 hrs daily, showing following information:-
  - (a) Number, rank and name
  - (b) Destination
  - (c) Type of duty or leave
  - (d) Expected time of absence
3. In case of a party travelling on duty or a sports team, number rank and name of senior member will be given and number of personnel in party or team shown.
4. Orderly NCO will collect completed Leave Passes and Rail Warrants from Asst Adjt's OUT basket by 2000 hrs daily, he will issue them to individuals or personnel in charge of parties at 0715 hrs or 1115 hrs on day of travel.
5. Personnel staying away overnight will be advised of accommodation arrangements, prior to departure.
6. In case of B and D Coys information required in paras 2 and 3 above will be phoned through to Bn HQ by 1500 hrs daily. Information regarding departures need NOT be advised RTO. Arrivals however will be rung through to RTO FUKUYAMA at earliest.

RMO's WEEKLY REPORT

1. HEALTH

In the week ending 28-6-46 seven (7) cases of urethritis were evacuated to hospital. Three (3) cases of penile sores were evacuated. Encephalitis B inoculation commenced on 27-6-46.

Typhoid and Cholera refresher inoculations will be given to all personnel after the completion of Encephalitis inoculations.

2. HYGIENE

(a) FUKUYAMA

Mosquitoes:- Less adult culicine mosquitoes are evident.

This improvement probably results from spraying of breeding places in hills behind camp. The procedure is being continued.

Flies:- A few adult flies are evident.

Water:- Super-Chlorination of camp water commenced on 26-6-46.

(b) ONOMICHI

Mosquitoes:- Many adult culicines in camp areas B and D Coys.

No breeding in D Coy lines. Many larvae in street gutters and water containers of civilian establishments. Newly occupied B Company barracks showed many larvae breeding in water containers. Emptying of containers and ciling has been carried out where required.

Water:- Super-Chlorination of drinking and cooking water in both B and D Coys was expected to commence today.

Flies:- In both coys flies are fairly numerous. In each case these flies are breeding outside camp areas.

D Coy kitchen is satisfactorily flyproofed. It is advised that B Coy kitchen be flyproofed as soon as possible.

(c) It is advised that mosquito nets be worn at night by all personnel.

R.M.O's Report for Month of June '46.

In the first two weeks of June the general health of the troops was satisfactory. VD evacuations were slightly lower than the prevailing average. No serious epidemic diseases had occurred, but in one coy a small number of cases of Pediculosis (body lice) occurred.

On 13 Jun'46 troops rejoined the Bn from TOKYO. In the control of sick parades and PAC treatment Field Ambulance staff were relieved by Bn personnel. At this time a fair amount of Vincents Mouth disease had become evident.

On 22 Jun'46 the state of the city water supply in FUKUYAMA and ONOMICHI was reviewed. In both towns the city water had been regarded as safe and drank unchlorinated. After investigation it was decided that the water should be regarded as not consistly reliable and should be chlorinated for drinking. This was commenced on 24 Jun'46.

On 28 Jun'46 definite news was received of an outbreak of cholera amongst the civilians in FUKUYAMA City. (By the end of the month 39 cases had occurred with 17 deaths).

In the latter two weeks of June skin diseases steadily increased in number. On 22 Jun'46 80 reinforcements "G" Coy were examined medically. A fairly low standard of mouth hygiene and a fairly high rate of tinea existed.

In this period flies became more numerous in both FUKUYAMA and ONOMICHI camp areas. This as a seasonal occurrence had been anticipated.

SUBJECT: EDUCATION REPORT.

In June it was decided that the centre was not big enough, so the unit provided a more spacious building. The new position was ideal for it overlooked the sea and the rooms are large and airy with plenty of light large windows running the whole length of the centre. The main library is the best room in the barracks at FUKUYAMA, having very attractive fittings etc. When finished the centre consisted of five main rooms, library, reading room hobbies music and class rooms. Each room was made as attractive as possible so that now the centre is now the show place of the area. Furniture is adequate and extra fittings have been supplied. A large wall newspaper is in the reading room and is kept up to date with the latest news. The music room is also used to show Art Reproductions and the entire Centre when completed was widely used by the troops.

Activities for June were:

1. Lectures were given by Lieut Klestadt of CSIDIC, who spent many years in Japan before the war. Subject was current Jap problems. One debate was held, subject being "does the Press in Australia Perform Its True Function". Total attendance approx 170.
2. Films: Approx 2,550 attended 18 screenings and ten different films were shown. Places were ONOMICHI and FUKUYAMA.
3. During the month a Music club was formed and recitals were held regularly. Programmes and annotations were printed and discussions took place on the music played. However, the music room is open all day and is in constant use. Sgt John Hansen visited the camp and gave a recital together with the film "The Music of Verdi". Attendance was about 120.
4. Drama: There was about six members in the drama club at the beginning of the month increasing to 14 by the end of the month. Two plays were read and discussed. Bn detached one OR permanently to AES and it is his job to attend to the music and drama club. The drama club is connected closely to the Bn concert party supplying short sketches, etc.
5. Leatherwork: When the new centre was opened full time leather work instructor was attached to the centre. This man is an expert leather worker and during the month gave lessons to 55 persons. Leather work room is open daily from 1000 hrs to 2200hrs and is used **constantly**. Lessons are also given to personnel at ONOMICHI.
6. Library: During the change over from the old centre all books were called in and checked, the library being closed for about a fortnight. It functioned from the end of the second week in June. Approx 600 books were lent out. The library and reading rooms are furnished very well and has large range of magazines, etc. It is open daily from 1000 hrs to 2200 hrs, and is well patronised.
7. Classes: Three classes functioned at the beginning of the month, two Jap language and English and Maths. Unfortunately at the end of the month the Bn was split up into three areas and the services of the Jap Language teacher and the English and Maths teacher were lost.
8. At the end of the month arrangements had been completed for the production of a Bn paper. This newspaper was to take the form of giving the troops Bn news generally, news of interest from home and overseas, commentary on Bn sports news, and as an outlet for personnel who wished to express their literary or journalistic talent. The first edition is to be published on the 1 Jul '46.


