			<u>SUMMARY OF EVENTS.</u>	
			<u>GENERAL.</u>	
			During the period of this diary, the battalion continued to be much happier than in earlier months, although several temporary setbacks threatened to upset the high standard of morale on several occasions.	
			The first difficulty occurred when, during a widespread outbreak of Cholera, it became necessary to place out of bounds nearly all JAPANESE towns, the normal centres of local leave for the majority of troops. Increased sporting activities however, succeeded in keeping the troops healthily occupied until areas concerned were declared in bounds.	
			On the third of September, the long awaited building programme was commenced by JAPANESE contractors. The first of the old barracks, one earlier made untenable during a typhoon, was demolished and foundations laid for new buildings.	
			To make room for the new barracks old buildings were progressively demolished and living space therefore became very restricted. In addition unit amenities were somewhat forfeited, in that the unit snack bar and wet canteen were transferred to the battalion mess hut, and pictures were shown in the open air.

				With the gradual extension and improvement of the one available playing field, athletics gained a pleasing impetus; intra battalion games became more frequent, and inter company matches were very keenly contested.	
				The high standard shown in all departments at a unit organised athletic meeting was climaxed two weeks later when the battalion finished first in the 34 Australian Infantry Brigade Athletic Championships.	
				The standard of amenities has been fairly good and the opening, by Lt Gen H C H ROBERTSON, of the new ANZAC CLUB at HIRO, was welcomed by all "other ranks". Bi-weekly pictures were shown during the month and almost two hundred personnel participated in one day launch excursions on the INLAND SEA.	
				The battalion Commander, Lt col G E COLVIN, DSO and BAR, spent the first two weeks of this period on leave in HONG KONG. In his absence the 2 i/c, Maj O H ISAKSSON, MC, administered command.	
				<u>OCCUPATIONAL ACTIVITIES.</u>	
				The most important occupational duty during the month was "OP FOXUM", which, divided into two phases, was carried out by a number of specialist teams each including



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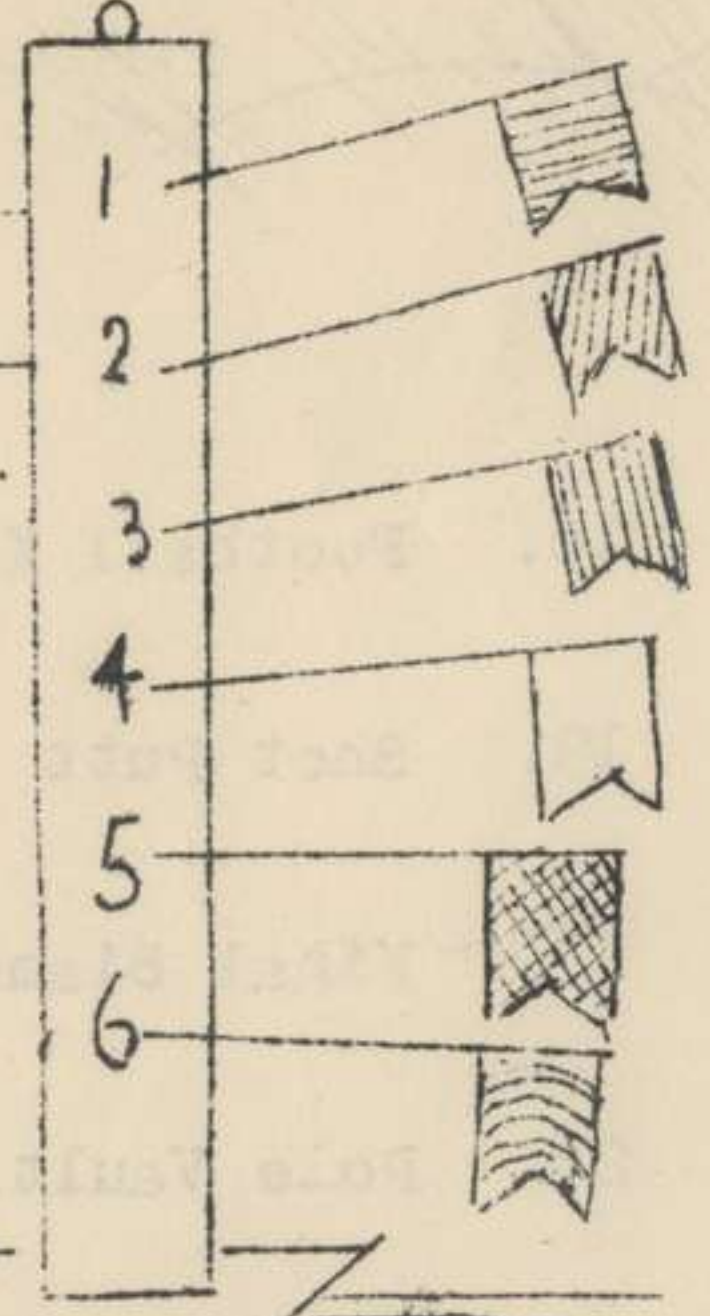

HQ BCOF memo 4/455/Maint of 7 Aug 46 is repeated.

LABOUR

Responsibility

- (a) The Japanese Government will maintain and service such apartment buildings, family housing units and communities as may be requisitioned for the dependant housing programme in JAPAN.
- (b) The Japanese Government will furnish without expense to the occupant all services which are not personal in nature. These include servants such as housekeeper, charwomen, gardener, furnace man, house maid, scrub woman and scullery maid. These servants will be hired for the individuals in accordance with present established policies.
- (c) Services of personal nature such as valet, ladies maid, nurse maid, chauffeur for private car, cook and waitress, if provided, will be at the expense of the individual, without reference to any agency of the Japanese Government.
- (d) The provisions of para 7(c) above become effective in each case on the first Japanese pay day following the time dependants take up residence in assigned quarters.

Rations

- (e) Rations for servants will NOT be provided by the employer, but unconsumed portions of meals may be consumed on the premises of the employer.

Accommodations

- (f) Accommodation of servants may be arranged by formations.

332. DISCIPLINE - SALE, BARTER OF GIFTS OF GOODS, STORES ETC TO JAPANESE.

Stores or goods obtained from official sources are from Canteens or Welfare Organizations will not be given, bartered or sold to the Japanese.

333. HYGIENE - FRESH WATER

Many of the natural fresh waters in JAPAN are infested with organism of BILHARZIA which can pass through the skin and cause severe disease.

Bathing or other direct contact with natural fresh waters (such as rivers, streams, ponds and ricefields) is forbidden except where it is definitely authorised for bathing.

Water will not be consumed unless it is known to have been sterilised.

Strict compliance by all BCOF personnel is required.

334. MEDICAL - SWIMMING

The restrictions placed on swimming and fishing in the sea off UJINA, YANO, KAITAICHI, POINT CAMP, KURE, and the East coast of ETA JIMA are now lifted. The safety distance from villages and creeks will continue to be observed.

6. Railway Tickets and Warrants

- (a) All Allied persons whether proceeding on duty or on leave will obtain from the RTO on production of leave pass or movement order a railway ticket or warrant.
  - (b) A railway ticket known as BCF T1 will be issued by the RTO to all personnel whether proceeding on leave or on duty to any station in the BCOF area.

2. The location of the new level crossing is at YOSHIURABASHI and the trolley line is expected to remain in use until 31 March 1947. A permanent watchman will be on duty with a signal flag.

3. This order is to be brought to the notice of all personnel employed on or liable to be driving MT vehicles.



322. IMPORTATION OF LIVESTOCK INTO JAPAN

Winning 100 Yards and 220 Yards <sup>feet</sup> in bare feet at the 66 Australian Infantry Battalion Sports on Thursday, Pte PULLEN (Grafton) NSW, ran gamely with bleeding feet to finish second in <sup>final of the</sup> 100 Yard sprint. The condition of his feet, cut by Atomic rubble prevented him from starting in 220 Yards final.

Spiked shoes were disallowed.

Running into strong headwind, STREETE of (Lismore) NSW won the 100 Yards in slowtime of 11 3/5 seconds. STREETE also won the Hop, Step & Jump, recording 42 Feet. He competed all events wearing football boots.

Battalion Tailor, Sgt OSSIE HAYDEN (Crows Nest) NSW, distinguished himself by winning 220 and 440 Yards. He is tipped as likely winner in the forthcoming 34 Infantry Brigade Sports.

The thousand spectators rose to their feet and cheered Pte FORD of (Sydney) NSW as he staged a magnificent burst of speed to sprint the last 150 Yards to win the 3 Mile footrace. His victory was a popular one.

Capt A.P.A DENNESS, a 9 Div Veteran of (Fremantle) West Australia and O/C B Coy 66 Bn said, "I've organised sports meetings on the Tablelands of Australia but, I have never seen Sportsmanship to equal the Infantry boys here today."

5. PHASE 1. - Inspection of schools.
- (a) Team comds will select schools to be visited within their areas of responsibility upon arrival at such areas. Primary and Secondary Schools only will be inspected.



GENERAL

1. Operating in the Central Sub Area five inspection teams each comprising one officer and two specialist personnel examined a total of nineteen schools in the police districts HIRO, SAIJO, TAKEHARA and KOCHI.
2. Banned books were found at five schools; however, in two instances they were prepared in bulk allegedly for despatch to collecting centres or to paper mills for pulping.
3. Team Comds were of the opinion that examinations were NOT thorough because of the following reasons :-
  - (a) Interpreters are NOT equipped to detect banned literature.  
NB : Three only of attached personnel were translators.
  - (b) School libraries are very large and spot checks only were possible.
  - (c) On the first day of each term children are engaged in school cleaning and are NOT in possession of text books. NO check could therefore be made of pupils' books.

HIRO POLICE DISTRICT

1. NO 2 KURE PREFECTURAL GIRLS SCHOOL HIRO MACHI

NO banned publications detected.

2. KORUN MIDDLE SCHOOL HIRO MACHI

Headmaster : KUKIAKADO TOSHINARI

NO banned publications detected; however, in the headmaster's office five old magazines, of NON-educational significance, but containing ultra nationalistic passages and illustrations were found.

NO banned books were found, however one copy of JIJI NENKAN - 1944 encyclopaedia - containing many accounts of Jap victories in World War II was located. HIRAOKA claimed that the book was used for reference purposes only. The category of this work is doubtful.

NO banned books found.

7. IIDA HIROSHIMA GAKUEN

NO banned books detected.

8. SHIMO SAIJO YOUTH SCHOOL

Headmaster : TAKESHIGE HEIHACHI

Banned books were found stacked in a top floor room of the school and, according to the headmaster, awaited despatch to SAIJO TOWN OFFICE in compliance with a recently received instruction.

Detailed examination of all books was NOT possible, however several old type readers with offensive parts illustrated were noticed.

9. HARA MURA PRIMARY SCHOOL

Headmaster : FUJISAWA NOBUO

Banned books were still in process of collection and those

already in were found stored in bulk. New books supplied by Education Department were in use.

MITSU POLICE DISTRICT

10. KIDANI PRIMARY SCHOOL

NO banned books detected.

Three posters depicting battle scenes of the RUSSO-JAP war were found in a schoolroom. SHIRO claimed that the posters had been overlooked and having been stored away some years ago.

12. KAZAHAYA PRIMARY SCHOOL

Headmaster : YOSHINODNI TSUTOMU

The schoolmaster had been warned of the patrols presence in the area and expected it's arrival. Search revealed NO banned books.

13. HIROSHIMA GIRLS HIGH SCHOOL YASUURA MACHI

This school does not open until 11 SEP.

Premises were searched and two copies of the HIGH SCHOOL READER, (1941 publication), believed to be banned, were located.

Neither staff nor students were in attendance at the school and NO explanation was obtainable.

14. TAKEHARA PRIMARY SCHOOL

NOTHING of subversive nature observed.

15. TAKEHARA GIRLS HIGH SCHOOL

One cabinet was found to contain six hundred prohibited books and pamphlets.

The principal alleged that these books had been collected during MARCH and because paper mills at HIROSHIMA had refused at an earlier date to accept them for pulping he was forced to hold them until sometime this month.

KENZO was NOT in receipt of any order directing the disposal of the books through Prefectural Authorities.

ACCOMMODATION HEATING

Coal burners are preferred to oil, although the latter are considered satisfactory provided they are not left unattended while in operation.

Electric radiators are not favoured since they produce a large drag on current resulting in breakages in both fuzes and internal wiring.

It is anticipated that adequate supplies of coal will be available, and an issue made to units by middle of October.

3. Permanent

A contract to supply boilers is in hand. It is expected that rate of production will be one every 5 days commencing from 27 Oct 46.

The anticipated scale of issue of these boilers will be on a basis of 3 per battalion layout.

4. Dependants Housing

It is proposed that the heating of dependants housing will be by gas. A large gas supply at present exists in HIRO may also be used for small outlying units in HIRO area in lieu of boiler systems.

REPORT - PHASE II OF OP FOXUM

PART I

GENERAL

1. Operating in the Central Sub Area four inspection teams each comprising one officer and two specialist personnel examined nineteen (19) brothels and interviewed a total of 40 prostitutes in the police districts HIRO, SAIJO, KOCHI, HONGO and TAKEHARA.
2. Seventeen (17) brothels existed in the HIRO police district.  
One (1) in TAKEHARA  
One (1) in HACHIHOMMAISU and nil in KOSHI and HONGO.
3. Prostitutes interrogated revealed that only at their own request were they working in brothels and were NOT under any obligation to MASTER to remain there.

Team Comds are of the opinion that :-

- (a) NO registered brothels exist in their respective police districts.
- (b) Large numbers of prostitutes operating singly in HIRO/AGA district are NOT beholden to any MASTER.
- (c) Police in all districts are co-operating to fullest extent to comply with SCAP directive 642.



PART II

REPORT OF TEAM OPERATING IN HIRO/AGA AREA

1. During this phase of the operation 16 brothels were visited in HIRO, 1 in AGA, YASSUURA, KAWAJIRI and NIGATA were also visited. Of these NO girls are operating in 7 in HIRO area. NO brothels are operating in the last three villages. A total of 29 prostitutes were interviewed.
2. Of prostitutes interviewed all claimed that they were NOT being held against their will and were free to leave whenever they so desired. Five owed the Master of the house amounts over ¥ 1000, but claimed the amounts were due for lodging and food. Large debts have been accumulated because of shortage of business occasioned by vigilance of Military Police.
3. In addition to those mentioned in para 1 there is a great number of prostitutes operating singly in the area. These patrol the streets and change their abode frequently. They do NOT subscribe to any Master.
4. Each prostitute interviewed was told the provisions of the SCAP Directive, and that all debts were cancelled, and that they could not be forced into prostitution, but were free to leave should they so desire.
5. The brothel at AGA was originally checked at 1430 hrs on 7 SEP 46. At this visit five girls were interviewed. It was rechecked at 2345 hrs of 7 SEP 46. It is significant to note that, though all five girls claimed they were NOT held by the master and owed him nothing, four had left the house by the time of the second visit.
6. NO breaches of SCAP 642 of 21 JAN 46 were detected.

TAKEHARA POLICE DISTRICT

1. Brothel run by ASANO HATAKEYAMA at SHINMACHI, TAKEHARA, was visited and all prostitutes interrogated individually.
2. Names of prostitutes verified with local police.
3. During the questioning there seemed to be no evidence of direct violation of SCAP directions, although it was noted that the majority of the prostitutes were in the brothel for financial reasons.
4. No further brothels were located in TAKEHARA or MITSU.

SAIJO POLICE DISTRICT

1. One brothel existed at HACHIHOMMAISU operated by two women; police knew of this and have plans afoot to close it down.



SAIJO POLICE DISTRICT (CONT)

2. Interrogation of women revealed that they were under no financial obligation to any other person.
3. No brothels were found in SAIJO or district.

HONGO AND KOCHI POLICE DISTRICT

1. Investigations revealed no brothels in either area.
2. Prostitution was NOT being practised by individuals.
3. Police aware SCAP Directive 642.



66 AUST INF BN.SUMMARY OF SPORTING ACTIVITIES.For Month ending 14 Sep '46.

The 34 Aust Inf Bde Australian Rules competition was concluded when 66 Bn defeated 67 Bn and carried off the premiership. However, in the Rugby League premiership, the 66 Bn team proved to be no match for 65 Bn, who secured an easy victory. The Bn basketball team was also unsuccessful being eliminated from the competition in the fifth round.

On arrival at Infantry Lines North, HIRO, the battalion immediately tackled the problem of providing suitable sporting facilities. A suitable site of vacant land was selected on the Western boundary of the camp and work was commenced. Very welcome aid was given by the 653 Ind Mech Sq Coy RIE, who generously supplied earth moving and levelling equipment. One cricket match wicket, two practice wickets and a combination Rugby League, Rugby Union and Soccer field has since been completed. Tennis courts are under construction and when they are completed, it will be possible to carry on two sports on the field simultaneously.

Keen interest is being shown by all ranks in all types of sport and the numbers of men participating in sport is constantly on the increase. Cricket, Rugby and Basketball are very popular and as many inter-coy and inter-unit matches as can be held are being arranged. Other sports gaining popularity are softball and baseball. Australian Rules is not being forgotten and the Bn team is already in training to retain its lead in the field. The Brigade Boxing Tournament has been concluded, but the response in this battalion was not enthusiastic, due possibly to present lack of gymnasium facilities, but this condition will, no doubt, be remedied when the reconstruction of the camp is completed.

During the month a battalion athletic carnival was held at KANNON Sports Ground, HIROSHIMA. Many entries were received for all events and the competition was very keen throughout. The battalion competed in the Brigade Athletic Carnival at HIROSHIMA held on the 28 Aug and 4 Sep and after a hard fight, especially on the final day managed to win, outdistancing 65 Bn, the closest competitor, by 18 points. Some promising talent was revealed in the persons of Ptes STREETE and PULLEN as sprinters and Pte FORDE as a strong long distance runner.

With the approach of winter it is anticipated that a still greater number of men will engage in the more strenuous sports. The standards of physical fitness and sportmanship in the unit are high and now that playing fields are almost complete and stocks of sporting equipment are on the increase more men will be able to participate in sports of their own choosing.

INFM

1. Nine Japanese hotels have been procured for use as Holiday Clubs by all components of BCOF. The names, locations and estimated capacity of these hotels are shown in Appx A.
2. The procurement demands require the Japanese Government to provide modernised hotels adapted to European style complete with furniture, fittings, staff and services of all kinds except the supply of foodstuffs.
3. A supervisory staff of Service personnel drawn from Formations is being provided in each hotel. In addition, transport and certain items of equipment not procurable from the Japanese are being supplied from Service sources.

4. DESIGNATION

Each hotel will be known by its Japanese name followed by the words "BCOF Holiday Clubs" e.g. "MAIKO Hotel, BCOF Holiday Clubs".

5. SUPERVISORY STAFF

A provisional WE for supervisory staffs showing formations responsible to provide is shown at Appx B. These personnel will be accounted for as still serving with their units and will be merely dropped from unit ration strength. They have already been supplied in part under instructions previously issued. Balance will be called forward as required. Tour of duty will not be less than four months. The control of staffs is the responsibility of HQ BCOF and personnel will not be changed without HQ BCOF permission.

ADMINISTRATION

6. ORGANISATION

For adm purposes the hotels will be grouped as follows :-

- (a) TOKYO Group - Lakeside Hotel
- (b) KYOTO Group - OTSUYA Inn  
YANNAGIYA Hotel  
KOKKASA Hotel
- (c) KOBE Group - MAIKO Hotel
- (d) BEFFU Group - KAIHIN Hotel

KANKAISO Hotel

7. All holiday clubs will be directly under comd HQ BCOF except that the Lakeside Hotel will be under local adm comd of Brit Com Sub area.

8. RATIONS

In addition to the normal ration the following additional items are being supplied :-

....(a)/



- (a) The special Holiday Club canteen scale shown as Appx C will be used by Holiday Clubs.
- (b) Items on the special Holiday Club Canteen scale thus obtained shall be a charge against the C in C's special amenities fund, against which canteens will submit a monthly a/c. The maximum amount may be charged against the C in C's special amenities fund will not exceed the rate of ¥ 3 per head per day. Canteens will submit a monthly account to HQ BCOF.
- (c) Advances of up to ¥ 200 will be made from C in C's Fund to Hotel Supervisors for the purpose of financing wet canteens and incidental expenses connected with the Club. These advances will be repaid from profits when sufficient funds have been accumulated.
- (d) Instructions will be issued to units that leave personnel are to obtain dry goods from their units for duration of leave prior to departure. Dry canteen goods will NOT be available at Holiday Clubs.

9. PAY

Personnel proceeding on leave to clubs will be paid by their units prior to departure. No arrangements to pay them during their stay at hotels will be made.

10. PRO

There will be small BCOF Pro Dets in each of the towns frequented by BCOF leave personnel. In each case BCOF Provost will work in conjunction with American MPs and will be responsible for :-

- (a) Rendering assistance whenever required to BCOF personnel on leave.
- (b) Maintaining the necessary high standard of discipline amongst BCOF personnel whilst on leave.
- (c) Providing liaison link between MP organisation and supervisors of BCOF Holiday Clubs.

11. EDUCATION

- (a) DAD Edn BCOF will provide and deliver to each Club a suitable library based on the estimated capacities shown in Appx A.
- (b) Libraries will be changed at suitable intervals.

12. ACCOUNTING FOR PERSONNEL - SUPERVISORY STAFF

- (a) OsC Clubs will not submit any casualty or other returns to 2 Ech
- (b) The parent unit and HQ BCOF will be advised by signal of any casualty affecting a member of the supervisory staff, E.G. admission to hospital, injury etc.
