At sea LST 694	10 JUNE	0830	A church service conducted by Capt Brocksopp held on the weather deck and practically all personnel free of duty attended, including officers and men of the ship's staff.	
		1400	We cross the Equator, and initiation service is held on deck to the occasion. The following men were initiated :- Capt Tucker, RMO (was charged as being the butcher of KAIRI)? Lts Mates, Reddan, Smith, Chadwick, Scott and Bourke, also several ORs. Capt Brocksopp acted as prosecutor, Lt Boyland as King Neptune, Lt Ryrrie as a very seductive Queen Neptune, Capt Kumnick as the barber, Lts Rickards and Rowbotham, Woll Warren and Sjt Hackett as Bears. All of these high ranking "officials of the main" were dressed and painted for the occasion. The initiation consisted of being splashed in the face with a mop, dipped in flour and water paste; then shaved by the barber with a stick; paint was also freely applied to their skins, followed by a dip head first into a drum of rusty water. Some of the victims struggled in vain to avert this drastic initiation much to the mirth of the spectators. The convoy making good progress in good weather.	MARK

- SAN FRANCISCO:** Discussing a proposed amendment at the United Nations conference, a British delegate thundered "We cannot approve this draft. The English is abominable." It turned out that the amendment was written by Mr Eden himself. The amendment was approved without further delay.
- GUAM :** 7th and 96th US Inf Divs swept southward on Okinawa through ruined towns and mud (the towns were ruined, not the mud), in a drive to cut off China peninsula in the south. On the western flank the 1st Marine Div has crossed the Naha - Yorabaru Highway in gains of up to 1000 yards. The Japs were apparently preparing a strong defence of Naha airrome, which is the largest on the island and the last airfield in enemy hands.
- PHILIPPINES:** In a surprise dawn attack troops of the 24th US Div stormed through fanatical Jap resistance to capture high ground north of Davao.
- CHUNGKING :** On Sunday Chinese troops in central China recaptured the important highway junction of Tsinkong, and threatened two Jap held air bases, the bomber drome at Luchow and the fighter drome at Aoyang. Tsinkong was taken after seven months of Japanese occupation. Chinese veterans were pursuing fleeing enemy 53 miles south-west of Luchow, which the Japs appear to be preparing to evacuate.
- MANILLA :** On Monday action in the Philippines centred mainly on north-eastern Luzon and south-eastern Mindanao. Elements of the 6th US Army probed into the south end of Cagayan Valley, 100 miles north of Manila. On the south east coast on Mindanao elements of the 8th US Army landed on the west flank of the entrance to Davao Gulf. They were supported by gunfire from destroyers.
- LONDON :** Sir Stafford Cripps, former amabassador to Moscow, said on Sunday night that Britain must show a genuine and honest desire to understand and cooperate with the Soviet Union, lest a clash of interests develop which would lead to a century of antagonism and struggle.
- MOSCOW :** A Moscow journalist writing in the Soviet paper Investia said on Sunday that the way to bring national unity in China was the creation of a coalition government dedicated to democracy and to winning the war. The Chinese nation should also improve their relations with the Soviet Union, the United States and Great Britain.
- Weather Forecast :** If the weather remains as it is at present it is going to be rather hot. If it is not fine it will probably rain. Don't say we didn't tell you.

- GUAM - Monday: US Forces smashed against fanatic Jap resistance in Okinawa. US 10th Army Officers declared that the next 24 hours would determine the outcome. An unconfirmed Jap report said that US 10th Army troops had landed behind the Nip la st stand line on Okinawa tip.
- MANILA - Monday: US Forces and Filipino Guerrillas fought through rugged terrain on Mindanao after a weekend of heavy fighting. They captured four towns and pushed into the area around Mt. Apo.
- GUAM - Monday: Carrier pilots of the 3rd US Fleet raiding Kyushu over the weekend experienced aggressive fighter interception by experienced Jap pilots employing new tactics. They were flying planes superior in speed to the Americans. After their return to the carriers, the US pilots said that this was the first definitely aggressive fighter interception encountered over the Jap mainland.
- LONDON - Sunday: Any German attempt to invade Britain in 1940 and 41 would have been met with a vast wall of fire. This statement was made by the new British Minister for information, Geoffrey Lloyd at a press conference on Sunday. He added that plans called for the release of blazing oil in the Channel and along the beaches.
- LONDON: Winston Churchill now holds five Government offices since taking over the Foreign Ministry when Eden became ill. The offices held are Prime Minister, First Lord of the Treasury, Minister of Defence, Acting Foreign Minister and Acting Leader of the House.
- LONDON - Monday: In a speech broadcast over Belgrade Radio, insisted that Corinthia in Austria belonged to Yugo Slavia, and added "We shall fight for it".
- CHUNGKING - Monday: A telephone line now operated between Calcutta and Kunming US Army Officials have announced. The line roughly follows the Indo-Cina oil pipeline and the Stillwell Rd.
- LONDON - Monday: The Luxembourg Radio has quoted a Lublin (Poland) broadcast saying that more than 7000000 Poles are to be settled in former German territory. This indicates that the Germans are being evacuated from the area. Approx 25000 Poles will be settled in Silesia the broadcast added.
- SAN FRANCISCO - Monday: Jap propogandists ave predicted that the US would be attacked in the near future by bomb carrying stratosphere balloons manned by suicide Jap pilots.
- LONDON - Monday: Mr Churchill has opened the Conservative Party's election campaign. In his opening speech, he attacked the socialist policy of the Labour Party which, he said "Is abhorrent to British ideals of freedom".
- WASHINGTON - Joseph Davies will report to President Truman on his special mission to London at a dinner to be held in the White House on Monday night. Returning from his conference with Prime Minister Churchill and others on Sunday he said that he was looking forward among other things to an early meeting of the big three.

GUAM, WEDNESDAY: US 10th Army troops on Okinawa cleared some more pockets of resistance. An official message of congratulation from Admiral Nimitz indicated that the conquest of the island may be completed within three or four days. A Tokio news despatch admitted that the Okinawa situation was most critical and added that it appears to be the enemy's intention to invade the Jap mainland.

GUAM, TUESDAY: Great fires enveloped Kobe today, six hours after approximately 550 Super Forts struck their heaviest blow of the war at Japan's largest seaport. Approximately 3,000 tons of fire bombs were dropped into a square mile area which included the vast Kobe steel works. The Japanese Domei agency claim that 56 of the Super Forts were shot down and added that the fires were gradually being extinguished. This is not officially substantiated.

WASHINGTON, TUESDAY: The four victorious powers preparing to hold their meeting in Berlin today announced agreement on the control of the Reich. The agreement disclosed that Germany would be completely disarmed and that the victorious nations would assume supreme authority. They further made clear that all Hitler's conquests would come under complete Allied control. Final dispositions of territories would be the subject of a later peace conference.

MANILLA, TUESDAY: A substantial part of the Jap garrison in Davao has been further compressed as American forces pushed forward on Mindanao after shattering two centres of resistance. Other US troops are pressing forward in SE Luzon and in the mountains east of Manila.

PARIS, TUESDAY: The Allied control council has assumed all government functions as from 0600 hrs today. This was announced by Supreme Headquarters.

LONDON, TUESDAY: Mr Atlee, leader of the Labour Party, tonight called for a campaign for economic freedom and promised the British people a victory as complete as the one over Germany if they gave the Government the will and power to act.

From Our Special Correspondent: CEUNGKING. A new British Army has been formed in Burma. With these extra troops and much amphibious equipment released from the European war zone, Britain is now in a position to speedily complete the occupation of Burma, and to make new drives through Thailand. British troops were last reported five miles from the Thailand frontier.

In the fighting NE of Rangoon, where a large force of Japs are trapped, bitter clashes have occurred. The Japs are forming up in bigger units in the hope of breaking through the British ring, which is daily growing stronger. In one clash our forces killed 1,045 Japs. Although small parties of Japs are managing to escape across the Rangoon-Mandalay road, it is considered that the main body faces certain annihilation.

GUAM-FRIDAY: A large force of Super-bombers have made a third attack on the industrial area of Osaka, second city of Japan. In the two previous raids 11½ square miles of the city were burnt out.

An area of almost 90 square miles has now been reduced to rubble and ashes by air attacks on six of Japan's major cities. Tokyo has suffered most heavily, more than 51 square miles having been pounded. Other Jap cities hit include Osaka, Nagoya, Yokohama, Kobe and Kawasaki.

GUAM-FRIDAY: US Forces on Okinawa have forced the Japs into an area of about 25 square miles at the South end of the island. Stiffening Jap resistance was being met in the closing phases of the campaign. The US Forces have now completed the capture of Naha airfield.

MANILA-FRIDAY: Gen. MacArthur reports that his forces are meeting decreasing Jap resistance on the final approaches to the Cagayan Valley, last major enemy stronghold in the Philippines. Davao has been sealed off by landings on the South East tip of Mindanao.

GRUNNING-FRIDAY: British troops in Lower Burma hurled back a fanatical night attack by the Japs who sought to retake allied positions at Mokhitwa, nine miles west of the Mandalay-Rangoon road and rail line. Unconfirmed reports say that Chinese troops have recaptured the big airbase city of Luchow, former US bomber base.

BRAZIL-FRIDAY: Brazil has declared war on Japan. The Acting Foreign Minister has declared that the Brazilian Army was at the disposal of the United Nations. He further revealed that Brazilian troops participated in the latter phases of the Italian campaign.

RUSSIA-FRIDAY: An unofficial report from Russian occupied Berlin states that a badly burned body found in the German capital is believed to be that of Adolf Hitler. The Russians found four charred bodies under the ruins of the Reich Chancellery and all four answered fairly well to Hitler's description. After minute examination of teeth and other features, Russian physicians found one they think is Hitler's. This report still awaits official confirmation by the Soviet authorities.

LONDON-FRIDAY: Russian Commissioner has alleged that Russians are being ill-treated in European areas occupied by allied troops. He adds that in three camps in England where Soviet citizens are confined, intolerable conditions prevail. He further states that 74,000 slave labourers in Norway were still under German guard. The British Foreign Office has said that a reply would be given to the Soviet Commissars in due course.

GERMANY-FRIDAY: A German farmer convicted of having concealed firearms, in the British occupied zone, has been sentenced to death by beheading. It has been explained that the British have adopted the custom of beheading persons convicted by military courts. This is the normal German method of execution.

LONDON-FRIDAY: Whilst operating in the vicinity of the Eueriles a large aircraft carrier, flagship of the British fleet in this area, narrowly escaped damage when attacked by three suicide planes.

CANBERRA-FRIDAY: Replying to questions by Mr Spender in the House of Reps, Mr Lakin, Minister for Munitions, stated that the report accusing Lithgow small arms factory employees of supplying the underworld with sub-machine guns was absolutely untrue.

Following the request by Admiral Sir Bruce Fraser, C-in-C British Pacific Fleet, 16 RAAF personnel have volunteered for transfer to the RNVR (Flying). Mr Drakeford stated that the applications were under consideration and a verdict would be given in the near future. He further stated that 6000 members of the RAAF would be released by the end of the year.

Mr Curtin has been granted 2 months leave of absence for convalescence after his recent illness. He hopes to make a tour of the Commonwealth during the second month of his leave.

Except for a period of 8 days spent at Morotai the whole of the period under review was spent at sea. The unit vehicles were loaded on USS LST 777 at Cairns on 22 MAY, and off loaded at Morotai on 12 JUNE. Whilst at Morotai all vehicles were subjected to the final stages of water proofing prior to being loaded on ships of the invasion fleet, bound for Balikpapan. The loading took place on 19 and 20 JUNE without incident.

It is noted that whilst the unit's WE of vehicles has been increased from 8 jeeps and trailers to 12 jeeps and 10 trailers, no increase in the establishment of drivers has been authorised. Under the old vehicle WE, the establishment of drivers allowed for a surplus of 50%, to maintain this surplus it would now be necessary to increase the drivers establishment to 1 officer 19 ORs.

RMO MONTHLY REPORT JUNE 45HQ 2/10 Aust Inf Bn
11 JULY 45

The month was spent in the move from Australia to Morotai, thence to Balikpapan. Most of the unit moved on LST's, about 360 to 400 per ship. They were definitely over crowded, making hygiene difficult. Tin latrines and 6 wash-basins, some often out of commission, meant that men would wait in queues for hours. Also they had to wait in queues for food and had to wash their dixies in filthy water.

There being no deck space, the troops got no exercise. Most of the men were sea-sick at some time during the voyage.

At Morotai we did not have time to clean up the camp area, which was in a very dirty state. The result was poor hygiene and cases of diarrhoea towards end of week.

A severe virus infection of the throat was the main cause of illness in the unit. 20 cases were evacuated with U.R.T.I. in the week at Morotai, 2 of these developed broncho-pneumonia.

Foot and skin inspections of all coys were held at Morotai. These showed a few cases of tinea - none very bad, and 1 case of pediculosis pubis. In general, skin cases were few.

The Q Section for month were exceptionally busy. The Battalion arrived at MOROTAI on 12 Jun 45 and the checking in of stores was proceeded with on arrival at camp site. Immediately on arrival the Planning Staff prepared plans for an amphibious landing at BALIKPAPAN, BORNEO. This was completed by 18 Jun.

Stores were then sorted ready for loading and this was commenced on 20 Jun.

The Main body embarked by 24 Jun.

The remainder of the month was spent at sea on route for BALIKPAPAN - Q work was then nil.

Whilst unit was at MOROTAI, issues were completed prior to embarkation, supplies of clothing and necessaries being in fair supply.

Workshops co-operated very well and made every effort to ensure that all controlled stores were in first class condition.

1. GENERAL

- (A) BALIKPAPAN, situated on the East coast of BORNEO, is the second most important oil port in the Far East and the refineries there produce half the JAPANESE requirements of lubricating oil. It is very suitable as a base for operations in the MAKASSAR area.
- (b) Airfields
The most important airfield in the area is MANGGAR 18 kilos East of BALIKPAPAN, while SEPINGGANG airfield, 9 kilos East of BALIKPAPAN, is also of importance. Both airfields are usually unserviceable as a result of Allied bombing. The only planes sighted in BALIKPAPAN area on 22 May were 4 float-planes in the extensive flying boat anchorage in BAAI VAN BALIKPAPAN.
- (c) Defences
(i) Designed to protect airfields, oil installations and harbour shipping. AA includes 31 hy and 38 med AA guns ranged about the BAAI from PENADJIM on the WEST shore to SIGNAL HILL in the EAST.
(ii) Coastal defences with a backbone of 18 coast defence (CD) guns extend from MANGGAR to the BAAI.
(iii) Use of mines, booby traps and demolitions by the enemy is anticipated. There are numerous tunnels in the area probably used primarily as air raid shelters, but undoubtedly they are part of the defensive system. On TARAKAN booby traps were found in vacated tunnels while anti-vehicle and anti-personnel mines were often placed on shoulders of rds and edges of tracks.
(iv) The use of oil as a defensive weapon is a possibility and in addition to the hazard of detonated oil tanks it is probable that oil will be piped into anti-tank ditches.
(v) Interference with an amphibious force by major JAPANESE naval vessels is unlikely.
(vi) Hy air opposition is not expected although suicide attacks may be made by a few planes.
- (d) Strategical
There is a general trend towards withdrawal in the NEI. Owing to Allied control of the SOUTH CHINA SEA the JAPANESE in BORNEO once cut off from substantial outside assistance except from the SOUTHERN NEI.
- (e) Enemy Strengths.
(i) Total for BORNEO on 22 May was estimated at 29900. The garrison is commanded by HQ 37 Army at JESSELTON on the NW coast.

- (ii) Major units comprise 56 and 71 IMB's, neither of which is in BALIKPAPAN area. Defences on the EAST coast are thought to be the responsibility of the Navy, chief unit of which is 22 Base Force at BALIKPAPAN. Independant inf bns may be assisting naval troops.
- (iii) JAPANESE troops in BALIKPAPAN - SAMARINDA area estimated at 6000, made up as follows:-

Combat troops	-	1500
AA troops	-	1500
L of C Units etc	-	3000

In addition 4500 civilian and labouring personnel are attached to units in the area. Shipping sightings indicate the possibility of an additional indep. inf bn of 1000 men.

(f) Enemy activity

The JAP has been completing his defences during the past few weeks and considerable elaboration of def posns on ridges in BALIKPAPAN - KLANDASAN area has been made. An off shore wire obstacle extends from MANGGAR in the EAST to KLANDASAN in the WEST. This will be removed by the USN prior to operation OBOE TWO.

(g) Probable Enemy reaction to Allied landing

(i) Defensive works in the BALIKPAPAN - KLANDASAN area indicate that the enemy anticipates our aim to seize the port area as quickly as possible. The strongest beach defence is at KLANDASAN where mines are thought to be laid thickly and Anti-Tank ditches are being prepared.

(ii) The main def line is on the high gd overlooking STALKOEDO and KLANDASAN.

(iii) In the KLANDASAN sector the probable enemy aim is to contain the landing within the beachhead area and inflict the heaviest possible casualties on our forces from his posns overlooking the beaches. There is one stream down which burning oil could be directed in an attempt to hamper ops on KLANDASAN beach but preliminary air bombardment will aim at destroying installations representing the source of such oil.

(h) Local Inhabitants

(i) These consists of Indonesians, some of whom have co-operated with the JAPANESE, and Chinese who are believed to be anti-japanese. Most native village chiefs will help any Allied soldier. Indonesians are predominantly Mohammedan and object strenuously to contact with the pig and its by-products. Familiarity with the womenfolk will arouse violent resentment. Generally speaking, the local inhabitants will welcome the return of the Allies.

(ii) Language

Malay is understood by most of the people and glossary of the language will be issued to troops.

(iii) It is believed that a considerable number of Allied PW's are in the SAMBODJA area and in the vicinity of MILFORD HIGHWAY.

2 TOPOGRAPHY

- (a) Except for small cultivated areas and the industrial areas at BALIKPAPAN and SAMARINDA terrain consists of jungle - covered hills. Although the highest feature in the area is no more than 700ft, the hills are steep and dissected. There are no major rivers in the area.
- (ii) On the coastal flats soils are clay and sand. except in the built up areas this is often swampy.

- (b) Four good landing beaches are found between MANGGAR and BALIKPAPAN BAAI. ABLE Beach in the KLANDASAN area is bounded by a coral reef which is dry at LW. However the shoreward portion is completely covered with firm white sand and trafficable by MT at LW. There are no transverse gutters, but some coral boulders 2 - 3ft in diameter may be encountered.
- (c) The only rivers of any importance in the area are S.WAIN BESAR, S.SUMBIR both of which enter BALIKPAPAN BAAI and S.MANGGAR BESAR which enters the sea some 18 kilos E of BALIKPAPAN.
- (d) Magnetic variation is $2\frac{1}{2}^{\circ}$ OE.
I time (9 hrs ahead of GMT) will be used during the operation.
- (e) Climate
There is no pronounced wet or dry season. During the first fortnight of the operation rain can be expected on 4 or 5 days. The prevailing wind in this season is SW
- (f) Medical
Principal diseases of military importance are malaria, dysentery, VD and scrub typhus. Cholera and any mosquito-borne disease may occur. The native population is the reservoir of disease.
- (g) Roads
Roads in the BALIKPAPAN town area are good. VASEY HIGHWAY runs E along the coast to SAMBOCJA. MILFORD HIGHWAY runs NE from the refinery area to SAMARINDA.

3 TOPOGRAPHICAL & DEFENCE DATA - KLANDASAN area

- (a) (i) S KLANDASAN KETJIL (now known as LAHEYS Ck) is a small stream which enters the sea at 589591. Its mouth marks the right hand bdy of ABLE BEACH. LAHEY'S CK is 20 yds wide at its mouth and narrows quickly upstream. There is a wooden br (SOUTH BR) where VASEY HWY crosses the stream some 100 yds from the mouth. The bed appears to be sandy. The banks are lined by trees from the mouth to NORTH BR at 588593 and a few trees are scattered along the remainder of its course as far as rd junc at 586597. Crossing places are indicated on appx and the stream is fordable by tps at any place.
- (ii) Beyond the timber edge on the WEST bank of LAHEY'S Ck is a large stores area with a number of long sheds. This area extends to VALLEY RD which joins VASEY HWY some 400 yds from SOUTH BR. Former Dutch military barracks are sited immediately above NORTH BR. Between VALLEY RD and WEST RD two large buildings (LOLA'S) are situated 100 yds in from VASEY HWY at the end of a low spur running down from the vicinity of the CHATEAU at 582594. The remainder of the area bounded by VALLEY RD, VASEY HWY and WEST RD is mostly under cultivation and in the NE there is a small coconut plantation in the vicinity of 585595. Part of the plantation covers a low spur running SOUTH from PRUDENT feature towards the stores area. Three tunnels have been identified on the WEST slope of this spur and one on the EAST. An anti-tk ditch runs from the SOUTHERN tip to LOLAS where there is a tunnel on the SE corner. The spur running from the CHATEAU to LOLA'S is believed to be defended although air photos do not reveal any def posns and the whole area is covered generally by the defences on PRUDENT feature.

(iii) WEST RD runs from VASEY HWY up a gradual slope to PETERSHAM X rds at 580596. There is a cutting at 582593 and between VASEY HWY and the CHATEAU there is a depression on either side of the rd. The one on the left is bounded by a terraced spur. The whole of the area under consideration is dominated by the PARRAMATTA feature in the NW. This ridge appears to be well defended particularly on the SOUTHERN spurs. 2 CD guns have been identified, also 3 med AA and 6 lt AA guns. Old Dutch defences are also in this area. FROG SPUR extends from the SOUTHERN end of PARRAMATTA feature to Route 6 and an extensive trench system along the spur is visible on air photos. The spur immediately NORTH is also defended.

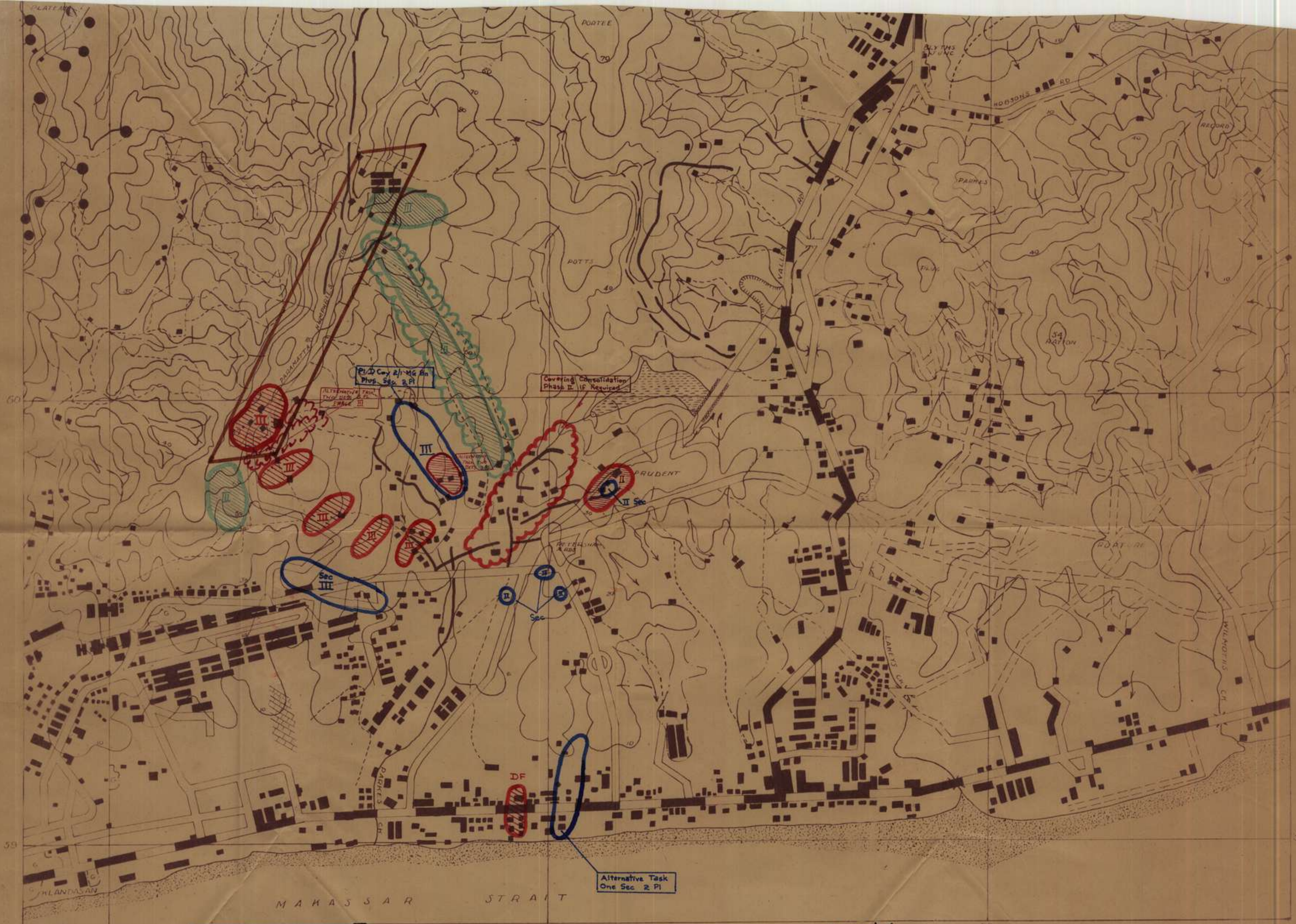

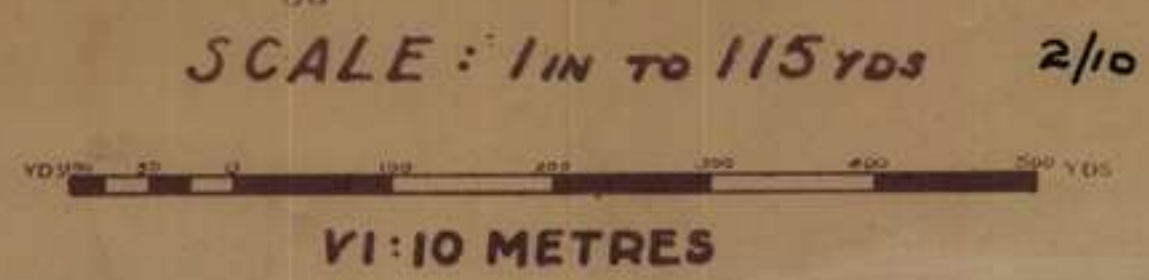

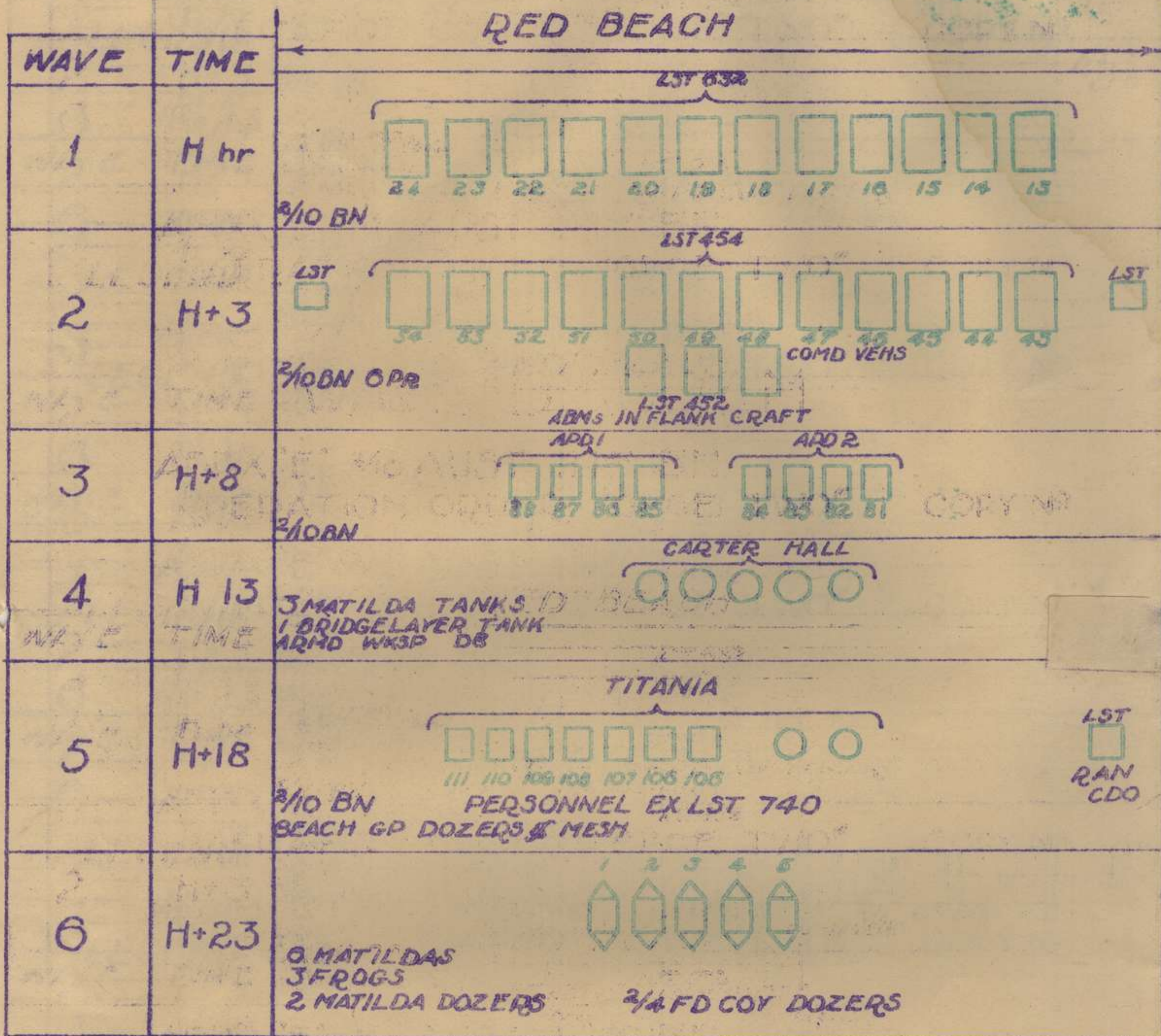

FUEL AND ASSOCIATED STORES FOR MAN PACK FLAME-THROWERS (M2-2)

4. (a) Fuel

(i) General

All thickened fuel for manpack flame-throwers will be mixed before distribution.

(ii) Fuel is being provided on a basis of 20 emptyings of each flame-thrower for period F day to F day plus 7.

(iii) Allocation of fuel is as follows:-

Flame-throwers will be landed with fuel tanks full, 50% with thickened fuel and 50% with unthickened fuel. (distillate)

Two fuel refills per flame thrower (i.e 4 galls thickened fuel and 4 galls of distillate per flame-thrower will be carried in LVTs) To be left in LVTs and forwarded from Assembly Area as required.

Three fuel refills per flame-thrower (50% thickened and 50% distillate) will be available from "B" Ech at approx H plus 3 hrs.

As from F plus 1 day to F plus 7 day fuel and distillate will be available on demand from "B" Ech.

(b) Pressure Tanks

(i) 7 Pressure tanks for flame-thrower are available.

Allocation is as follows:-

One charged on each flame-thrower.

Two charged per flame thrower in LVTs.

Four per flame-thrower available from "B" Ech at approx H plus 3 hrs.

(ii) Testing

All pressure tanks to be carried ashore are to be tested prior to ldg, if below 1700lbs to be left in LVTs and collected by QM, recharged and forwarded to coys.

(c) Ignition cylinders are issued on a basis of 24 per flame-thrower.

(d) All empty fuel containers and pressure tanks are to be returned as soon as emptied to "B" Ech.

(e) Damaged or US flame-throwers will be returned to QM for repair at earliest opportunity.

MEDICAL

- 5. (a) Two SBs with each Coy will dress all wounds.
- (b) Coys will advise RMO no of SBs required for carry to R.P.
- (c) Where operational posn allows, Coys will arrange carry of own cas to R.P
- (d) Evacuation beyond R.P will be arranged by 2/5 Aust Fd Amb.
- (e) Coys will ensure that weapons, amm and controlled stores are collected prior to evacuation of cas to R.P.
- (f) R.P will be located in area rd junct 586591.

REPAIRS

6. General: All repairs will be passed through normal channels to B Ech.

FIRE REPAIRS

7. All types for repair will be allocated to 2/47 Aust Fd Amb situated in Bde B Ech area.

DROWNED VEHICLES

8. All powered apt that has been drowned or immersed for lengthy periods during landing will pass through 2/47 Aust Fd Amb located in BMA for immediate treatment.

RECOVERY

9. (a) Vehs requiring urgent recovery service will be notified to TO by quickest possible means giving the following infm:-
- i. Location of eqpt and any directions to assist in its location by recovery crews.
 - ii. Type of eqpt, incl make and registration number.
 - iii. Brief description of damage or fault.
 - iv. Indication whether or NOT repairs can be effected in situation and, if known, replacement parts required.
 - v. Whether towable or NOT.
 - vi. Whether or not driver is with vehicle.

CANNIBALIZATION

10. Cannibalization will be carried out by AEME units only.

DE-WATERPROOFING

11. (a) The initial stages of dewaterproofing will be done by drivers as soon after landing as possible and in any case within 3 miles of landing.
- (b) Initial stages consist of:-
- i. Tighten fan belt.
 - ii. Open all vents and drain holes.
 - iii. Remove rubber tubing and grease from spark plugs.
 - iv. Clean down commutator of generator and starting motor with clean rag moistened with petrol.
 - v. Remove extension pipes if required.
 - vi. Check oil level in sump, differential and gear box. If level has increased proceed to Drowned Veh Park for flushing and refilling.
- (c) Dewaterproofing will be completed under supervision of TO within 5 days of landing.
- (d) Non-expendable and recoverable expendable items will be recovered and retained by TO for subsequent waterproofing.
- (e) On completion all vehs that have waded will pass through 2/47 Aust LAD for final checking. This will be completed within 7 days of landing.

ALLOCATION OF AEME PERSONNEL TO VESSELS CARRYING VEHS

12. Arrangements have been made for 2 AEME pers to be embarked on each vessel carrying vehs for supervision of waterproofing stage 4 and final check up of all vehs shipped.

TRANSPORT

1. DRESS - GENERAL

- (a) Since arriving in this area there has been a rapid deterioration in the standard of Dress and turnout. This will be rectified. It is realised that the order re wearing of shirts whilst working entails extra washing of clothes, but this should present little difficulty as water and soap are plentiful.
- (b) The season for fancy hats styles has finished, from now on all personnel will wear hats regulation style with the correct dent. No chin straps will be worn under the chin, where they are on issue they will be on the back of the hat.
- (c) Gaiters in most cases are filthy, these will be scrubbed and kept clean.
- (d) Puggarees will be drawn from RQ as soon as available and re-issued. No unauthorised hat bands will be worn.

2. OFFICERS TURNOUT

- (a) The CO is concerned about the standard of turnout among Officers. A definite improvement will be effected immediately.
- (b) Coy Commds will enquire into the activities of Coy batmen, and ensure that they are carrying out their duties effectively and that Officers are at all times neatly and properly turned out.

3. CLOTHING ISSUES

- (a) It will be approximately five days before issues can be made through Bn Q Store, until then Coy Commds will ensure a high standard is reached with present issues.

4. ANTI MALARIAL PRECAUTIONS

- (a) An inspection of Areas carried out after evening Mess revealed that these precautions regarding clothing and nets were not being enforced. Common faults were, sleeves rolled up, no mosquito repellent being carried, nets not correctly erected, and in a lot of cases nets not erected at all.
- (b) Coy Ord Officers will in future be on duty in Coy lines from evening meal until Lights Out to enforce these orders. NCO's also will be instructed once again to enforce these regulations.
- (c) Coy Commds will inspect Atebrin Roll books and render a certificate to BHQ, by 261600I that all rolls have been checked and are now correct.

5. HYGIENE

- (a) Lt CHADWICK Unit Hygiene Officer is to be consulted on all Hygiene matters. He has the necessary authority to institute any alterations he sees fit to make, to existing Hygiene arrangements.

On 1 Jul 45 the 2/10 Aust Inf Bn, on the left of the Division landed on BALIKPAPAN. Most of the fighting by the unit was done in the first three days.

Very few problems arose during the action as the system of evacuation used in training was followed accurately and worked very satisfactorily. The work of the Stretcher-bearers was very pleasing. Two bearers were left with each company, the rest being kept as a pool in the RAP and sent out when needed. Their attention to patients was prompt and efficient with the result that they reached the RAP in good condition soon after being wounded. LVTs were used to carry two patients straight to the BDS in one instance.

Evacuation was made very ~~easy~~ easier by the RAP being kept as near to the Companies as possible. The RAP staff treated the patients with efficiency making their stay at the post as short as possible.

Lt. Leader with a squad of bearers from the 2/5 Fd Ambulance kept in constant touch with the unit so that we did not at any time have any difficulty in clearing the RAP.

The casualties during the three days totalled 14 KIA, 1 DOW, and 38 wounded including 5 officers. Of these 3 were killed and 21 wounded by an accidental bombing of our troops on PARRAMATTA RIDGE by Allied planes.

Since the action there has been very little sickness. So far the expected rush of patients with fever has not occurred. There have been no cases of Dengue, Malaria or Scrub Typhus also skin diseases have been surprisingly light.

Unfortunately one man was accidentally shot dying before reaching hospital and one had died of Methyl-Alcohol poisoning.

We are now constructing a camp at the perimeter of the town. At first the flies and Dengue carrying mosquitoes were numerous but are diminishing slowly. There have been a few cases of Diarrhoea of a mild type not necessitating evacuation. No anophelene mosquitoes have been found in this area. The general health of the troops is good and it appears that on the whole the area is a very healthy one.

7 AUG 45MONTHLY TRANSPORT REPORT JULY 45

The first part of this report deals with the part played by the Unit transport in the operation "OBOE TWO".

LANDING F day 1 JUL 45: It was planned that the unit transport, 12 jeeps, 6 trailers and 2 water trailers would land on call, as required and where directed. It was expected that this would be approximately H plus 2 hours on YELLOW BEACH. The following is a summary of events as they happened:-

F day 1130 hrs 1 jeep and trailer landed.
1230 hrs 1 jeep and trailer landed.
1530 hrs 2 jeeps and 2 water trailers landed.

F plus 1 day
1200 hrs 8 jeeps and 4 trailers landed.

The vehicles that landed on F plus 1 were unloaded from the A.K.A. TITANIA at 1200 hrs on F day into an LSM. The LSM then ^{ANCHORED} landed in the stream until 0800 hrs on F plus 1. After making 3 separate attempts to reach the shore and after being driven off each time by enemy fire the LSM finally beached at 1200 hrs. Immediately after landing all vehicles proceeded to the Bde B echelon area on YELLOW BEACH and drivers proceeded with de-waterproofing. Dry landings were effected by all drivers. It will be noted that 2 trailers have not been accounted for. These were intended to be landed on F plus 2. 1 landed on F plus 5, the other on F plus 6.

For the first 3 days of the operation practically the whole work of maintaining the Bn in action was carried out by LVT's. This enabled our drivers to thoroughly de-waterproof vehicles before any call was made on their services. On taking over from the LVT's the task of maintaining the Bn, no difficulty was experienced. Roads and tracks were found to have suffered very slightly from our own or enemy action but numerous punctures were suffered, caused by nails protruding from timber that littered the roads and tracks.

GENERAL From the transport point of view the main lesson learnt from the operation, was the inability of the 2 80 gallon water trailers to supply the Bn with the amount of water required. There were 2 main reasons for this:-

1. The distance from the water point to the unit B echelon.
2. The lengthy waiting period at the water point, caused by the number of vehicles loading water.

After the action was over the maintenance of the Bn was carried out by the unit vehicles, with the assistance of ASC 3 tonners which were on loan from day to day.

WAR DIARY - Q SECTIONJULY 1945

In general the diary for the month covers the landing at BALIKPAPEN, the ensuing operations and preparation of camp at STALKOEDO area.

The first Q personnel landed on F day at H plus 18; immediately proceeded to assembly area where they commenced collecting mens' and Coy personal equipment left on beachhead. Elements of Q personnel were engaged in maintaining the Man-pack Flamethrowers in use whilst others were preparing the 'B' Ech area for occupation.

On arrival of Unit Stores personnel were detailed to check same, also to search for same as, at that time, control of the stores on the beachhead was very lax and stores had the habit of going to the wrong units.

Unit consumed 02 rations which were carried on the man on F day: water bottles were filled and 02 rations were issued on night of F day.

First hot evening meal was prepared from ABL6 rations and was delivered to all troops on night of F plus one day. Bread was made by unit cooks and issued as from evening of F plus 5.

Requests for amn and stores by fwd companies were complied with with speed and efficiency; all Q personnel working well and in complete harmony.

The main worry for the first 14 days was caused by the late arrival of stores. There appeared to be no co-ordinating authority on the beaches to control the forwarding of stores to units.

Losses from pilfering experienced by the unit were very slight. These losses were kept to a minimum by having picquets placed on all stores dumps to collect and guard unit stores.

This unit, by having a Q staff which worked in complete harmony, was able to cope with work required and must be congratulated on their fine team work. At present, they are in the process of building Q store etc in new camp area.

3. This order will be promulgated to all ranks.



II. DRESS - WEARING OF SHIRTS (7 Aust Div Adm Instr AG55/45)

1. As a result of an entomological survey, it has been ascertained that a definite threat of an epidemic of dengue fever exists; a number of cases have already been notified.
2. In view of the serious nature of this threat, all previous orders regarding the wearing of shirts are cancelled. Commencing forthwith, shirts will be worn at ALL times, by ALL personnel; with the exception of those actually working in the holds of ships, and unit cooks, who may wear a singlet during the hours of daylight.
3. Particular attention will be paid by all officers to ensure that this order is adhered to by all personnel resting in unit lines during the hours of daylight.
4. It is requested that this order is brought to the notice of all officers, upon whose co-operation its success depends.

III. FIRST LINE AMMUNITION

1. With the exception of a proportion for use by sentries and picquets (this amount to be left to Coy Comds discretion), all first line ammunition will be withdrawn from troops, waterproofed and stored in Coy dumps.
2. All SAA, Grenades and mortar bombs will be thoroughly cleaned, wiped over with an oily rag and stored in regulation boxes, a supply of which will be available shortly.
3. Grenades will be unprimed and all igniter sets, detonators etc will be examined for deterioration by the Bde Amn Inspector. Faulty equipment will be replaced, that passed as serviceable will be packed in tin boxes and sealed with adhesive tape.
4. Bombs Mortar 2" will be repacked in carriers and sealed with adhesive tape after oiling.
5. An accurate return of amn holdings will be submitted to the RSM when this action has been completed.

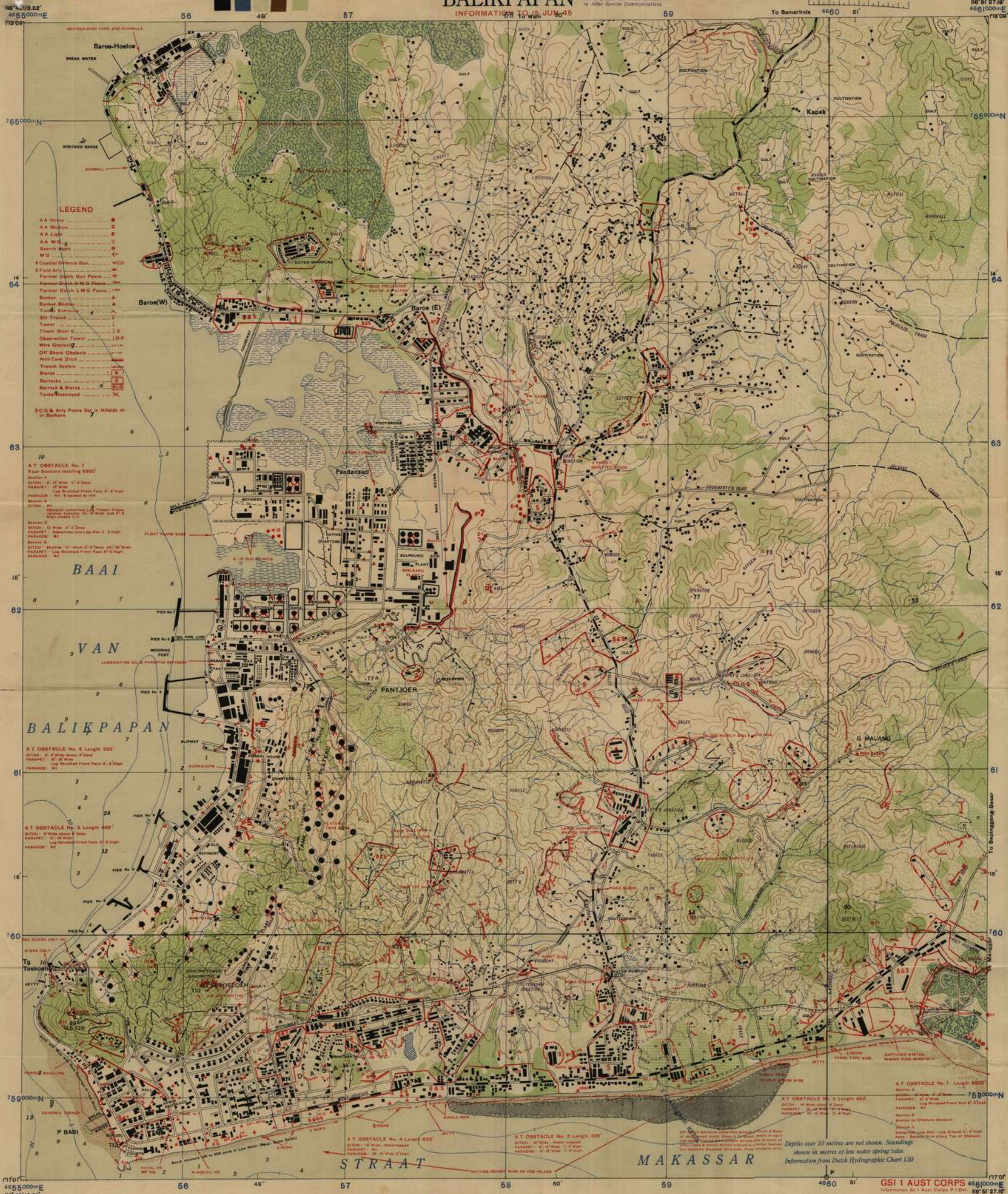

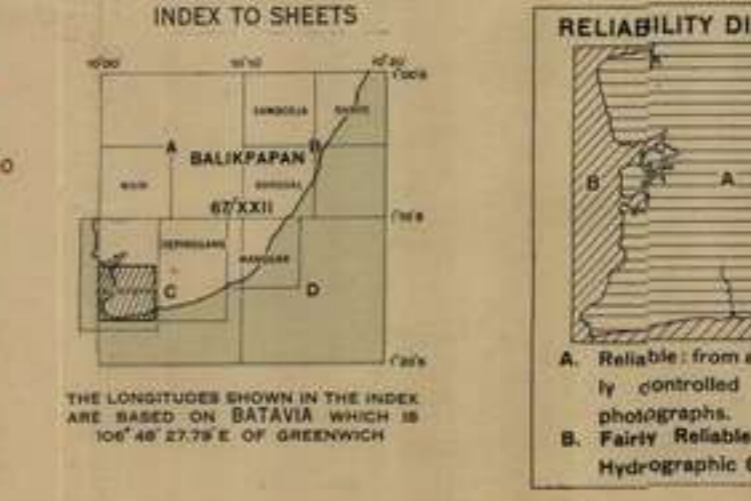
