Jap comd reports Japs seized 2 rifles 123 hunting guns 110 bayonets 2 swords 1 pistol 6 pistol rounds quantity powder and bullet making apparatus from natives. New FIM committee appointed 18 Dec 45 following arrest on 15 Dec of radical advisors by the Japs. This committee has not asserted itself. Apparent Sultan has lost all control and now only mouthpiece. SOEMBAWA BESAR SURVEILLANCE party reports, HARUOKA MARU arrived SOEMBAWA BESAR 310800H. Japs report political situation quiet after many conferences with Sultan over the last few days and more radical advisors dimissed. Sultan came aboard HMAS QUIBERON and was advised of the intention to land RNIA coy and install NICA. After some persuasion Sultan decided to co operate and was instructed all FIM flags and badges be removed. RNIA coy and NICA landed 311400H and installed in buildings. In presence of large undemonstrative native crowd C in C's proclamation read by Comd Timforce.</p>

1. Treatment of Japanese PW and Surrendered Personnel.

1. The Japanese have been informed that a higher standard of smartness is necessary, and that all Japs will salute all officers at all times.
2. The following Orders from HQ MOROTAI FORCE are issued for compliance of all concerned.
 - (i) On no account will gifts of cigarettes, tobacco or food be made to Japs.
 - (ii) Disciplinary action will be taken against any personnel who treat Japs with severe justice.
 - (iii) Any JUST Officer, or NCO who observes Jap failure to salute and other slackness will report the matter immediately through normal channels, and in his report give details of the offence, time, place, date and circumstances.
 - (iv) An Offr will in no circumstances return salute of a Jap but will merely indicate that he has noted this as being a direct and severe look in the eyes of the Jap concerned.
 - (v) No preferential treatment will be given to Jap personnel such as artists or interpreters who will be made to do their ~~own~~ share of manual labour unless required full time for special duties.
 - (vi) Units employing Jap labour will ensure that Japs are only employed under supervision at all times.
 - (vii) Commanders will ensure these orders are brought to notice of all ranks forthwith.

2. DRESS - NIGHT BASKETBALL.

1. Team Captains and match umpires will be responsible to see that:
 - (i) Reserves of competing teams standing out wear shirts and shorts until they have actually participated in the game.
 - (ii) Immediately after the game, players shower and observe material control regulations, in accordance with Unit R.O. 13/45 Para 3 of 22 Dec 45.
2. Failure to observe above will disqualify offending teams from further play at night and disciplinary action against individual players will be taken.

3. ALCOHOLIC LIQUOR.

1. Personnel will not be permitted to consume alcoholic liquor before 1700 hrs on any day. Disciplinary action will be taken against any offenders.

1. Following upon appearance of Malaria, precautions are to be more rigorously applied throughout TIMFORCE units.
2. Attention of all Officers is directed to G.R.O. 321.
3. Requirements in brief, to be enforced are:-
 - (i) Sleeping huts to be sprayed twice daily, nets at night; all nets erected by 1800 hrs daily.
 - (ii) No showering or bathing after 1800 hrs - applicable to cooks and all sports.
 - (iii) Coy Officer will supervise evening meal to ensure pers are observing requirements laid down for dress.
 - (iv) Shirts are approved for removal during hours of 1230 - 1330 ; 1530 - 1700 hrs.
 - (v) No night sports will be permitted.
 - (vi) atebrin Parades will be supervised by an Officer, and certified rolls maintained covering all Unit pers, and attached troops.
 - (vii) All sub units are responsible that potential breeding areas (incl tins, coconut husks etc) are dealt with as prescribed. Area of responsibility extends well beyond perimeter of occupied area.
 - (viii) Disciplinary action will be taken against pers responsible for breaches of Malarial Precautions.
4. All ranks will be constantly warned of the risk of infection resulting from sexual intercourse. Exposure to risk can only occur in contravention of Orders prohibiting association with natives.

WITHDRAWAL OF TIMFORCE.

5. No foundation exists for rumours relating to withdrawal of AMF Force in Timor. No information on this matter is likely to be available until the Govt has decided future policy in regard existing commitments.

TRANSFER OF LOW PRIORITIES.

6. No instructions have been received for troops of low priority pers to 1 Aust Army for reallocation. Pers with 149 points and under should not anticipate release prior to April.

I. Vehicles DRIVEN BY NATIVE DRIVERS

AMF personnel will NOT ride on any vehicle which is driven by a native driver.

Injuries received in consequence of non observance of this order will be regarded as having been sustained through members' own negligence and disobedience.

2. CARE AND PRESERVATION OF TYRES

It has been reported by force ~~and~~ representatives that on a number of occasions recently, comparatively new tyres have been submitted for sentencing as US due to faults which are obviously the result of carelessness and lack of maintenance on the part of drivers.

The main faults are due to under-inflation and the running of vehicles on flat or almost flat tyres resulting in weak and fractured tyre walls, and shredded inside walls.

All unit CO's and O'sC will ensure therefore, that the drivers are again instructed in vital necessity for correct tyre maintenance, and also issue definite orders to the effect that the practice of under-inflating tyres to obtain more comfortable riding ceases forthwith.

3. EXCESSIVE SPEEDS OF MOTOR VEHICLES.

(a) Attention is drawn to the prescribed speed limits for vehicles in this area.

Maximum speeds allowed are:-

Town Area

Staff Cars and M/C 20 miles (32Km) per hour

All other vehicles 15 miles (24Km) per hour

Outside Town Area

Staff Cars, Jeeps, M/C 25 miles (40Km) per hour

All other vehicles 20 miles (32Km) per hour

(b) Recently three serious accidents have occurred in the vicinity of KOELANG in two of which fatal injuries have resulted. The cause in each case has been the gross negligence of the driver of the vehicle.

(c) Bad driving is noticeable frequently e.g. excessive speed, driving on wrong side of the road and approaching corners at high speed and relying on a quick gear change down to slow the vehicle before cornering.

Those faults constitute dangerous driving and upon conviction the driver will, inter alia, have his licence cancelled.

(d) Each CO or OC will ensure all officers, NCO's and drivers are

CONVERSION OF CURRENCY - DUTCH TO AUSTRALIAN.

1. Landforces signal AG 4857 of 24 Jan 46 details the restrictions upon redemption of GUILDER currency, either in N.E.I. or on return to Australia for Australian service pers.
2. Broadly speaking, no redemption of currency will be effected for amounts in excess of pay book drawing in GUILDEERS during period of service in N.E.I. areas.
3. Thus if pay drawn on TIMOR totals G 200, an Army Paymaster will, on return of soldier to Aust, change G 200 into Aust currency - provided that deduction is firstly made of any amounts in Dutch currency, paid to credit, and / or paid in for transmission to individuals or bank accounts.
4. As examples to assist clarifying the situation :-
 - (a) Pte A's pay book shows drawing of 100 Guilders during period in Timor. He returns to Australia with 70 Guilders. The AIF Paymaster, port of disembarkation, will change this holding into Australian currency.
 - (b) Pte B's pay book shows drawing of 300 Guilders. He received permission to repay 80 Guilders to credit, making his actual drawing 220 Guilders. He then arranges to transmit 200 Guilders (A £ 32/18/4) to his bank account, and pays that amount in. His redemption value is now 20 Guilders. He sells a sword for 60 G., some canteen goods for 20 G., he picks a couple of winners with the unit bookie to collect 10 G., and the "swl" brings in another 25. His "roll" has grown to 115 Guilders, but he cannot pay in more than 20 G., so returns to Aust holding the lot! Pte B then applies to paymaster for conversion, and simple check of pay book transactions show that only 20 G. of legitimate drawings remain for conversion - the remainder can be dealt with only as shown in para 5 hereof.
5. Where holding of Guilder currency by a soldier is in excess of drawings, paymasters will prepare lists showing personal particulars and excess amount held. Lists will be forwarded to N.E.I. Authorities (in BRISBANE, SYDNEY, or MELBOURNE) who will, when in due course the total liability for redemption is known, consider whether declared excess holdings are to be redeemed in full or in part.
6. BANKS WILL NOT REDEEM GUILDEERS. The only means of conversion available to troops is in conformity with outline above given.
7. If you are not now clear how you stand in respect of Dutch currency apply to Coy Comd, Adjt, 2 i/c or C.O. for amplification. It's no use writing to "Smiths Weekly".

STANDING ORDERS AGAINST FIRE.

(Revised 7 Feb 46 in conformity with GRC No. 53 of 1 Feb 46).

These Orders will be read to all ranks, and will be posted on Company Notice Boards, Q.Stores and Petrol Stores.

1. GRASS. All grass will be cleared for a distance of
 - (a) 20 ft from sleeping huts, vehicle harbours, Tpt lines, Mess Huts, Adm Building or buildings.
 - (b) 25 feet from incinerators, kitchen and storage sheds
 - (c) 40 feet from POL and Amn Dumps.Areas specified will be thoroughly cleaned and action will be taken to ensure further growth is removed immediately.
All grass will be dumped in safe areas, where, when it is dry will NOT be a danger to camps or installations.
2. MATCHES. All ranks are cautioned against the danger of causing grass fires, and particular care will be taken in the use of wax matches, carelessness in throwing away of cigarette ends, pipe ashes, or glowing matches from moving vehicles, or in the vicinity of tents or in any place where there is a danger of fire.
- 3 FIRES. (a) Fires will NOT be lit in living areas for any purpose whatsoever. Laundry will be boiled in areas approved by O.C's Coy. Such areas will be, where possible, near a water point. Fires to burn rubbish will NOT be lit unless authorised by a Commissioned Officer, who will be personally responsible that such fires are outside the DUTCH BARRACK or A.Coy area.
(b) Camp or bivouac fires when no longer required will be covered with earth and at no time will such fires be left.
4. NAKED LIGHTS. (a) Naked lights in tents and hutments are prohibited.
(b) Naked lights or Hurricane or pressure type lamps will on no account be taken into or used in the vicinity of an inflammable liquid or material store, nor will the use of such lamps be permitted when filling petrol tanks at night, or where there are loose inflammable liquids.
5. INFLAMMABLE STORES. "NO SMOKING" notices will be placed in all Q.Stores, Amn and Petrol Dumps, and the prohibition will be rigidly enforced. Tins of sand will be kept available where inflammable liquids or materials are stored, in addition to tins for oily waste etc.
In NO circumstances will authority for smoking in garages, forage Barns, or dumps, stables, magazines; in the vicinity of petrol or oil stores, or in any other buildings in which inflammable materials are stored.

6. VEHICLES.

Great care will be exercised when the tanks of vehicles are being replenished. Engines will be stopped and any petrol spilled will be immediately wiped up or liberally sprinkled with sand. Smoking & naked lights are prohibited when replenishing tanks of vehicles.

Petrol, oil & grease, and other inflammable liquids and materials will be stowed apart from ALL other stores.

7. INCINERATORS.

Food incinerators will function with lids closed when NOT actually being charged. The possibility of wind borne sparks will NOT be overlooked.

Waste paper etc, incinerators WILL BE emptied by hygiene personnel daily and on no account will waste paper etc be burnt in these incinerators.

8. HEATING

FACILITIES. Particular attention will be paid to the proximity of all heating facilities to such materials as sisal kraft, fibreen, hessian etc. Tins containing water will be placed inside entrances to latrines.

9. FIRE FIGHTING

- (a) Will be placed so that any outbreak can be quickly dealt with.
- (b) Beaters will be kept in good condition.
- (c) Sand in buckets will be checked to see that it does not set into a solid lump (This is for use in event of an oil fire)
- (d) Water in drums will be changed each Wednesday and will not be oiled.
- (e) Chemical Extinguishers, where provided, will be kept on OUTSIDE of buildings on suitable rack.

10. FIRE BREAKS.

Before burning fire breaks, Cos will obtain permission from Bn HQ and such breaks will be burnt under supervision of an Officer.

11. ACTION IN EVENT OF FIRE.

- (a) Person or persons discovering fire, will do everything possible to put it out; at the same time raising alarm.
- (b) The first Officer at the scene of the fire will:-
 - (i) Take immediate steps to advise Bn HQ.
 - (2) All water carts will come under orders of senior officer present at scene of fire, and will continue to supply water whilst the need exists.

12. At night Orderly Officer will be immediately responsible for initiating action against fire, and will utilise non-posted members where required. On outbreak of fire, guard will fall in in front of Bn HQ.

A Male member whose service is not being terminated for any of the reasons set out in GRO 65/46 will at time of such termination be paid an allowance of £11/- and will be issued with a "Discharged Serviceman's Clothing Priority Form" which will establish his right to priority in purchase of civilian clothing.

GRO 130/45.

Provided a member's Service has not been terminated on any of the grounds mentioned in GRO 65/46 the issue of clothing coupons on Termination of Service will be - - 160, in addition a pro rata maintenance issue of civilian ration coupons in accordance with the following scale will be made :-

If the Service is terminated between -

15 Nov '45 and 31 Mar '46	-	-	56
1 Apr '46 and 30 Jun '46	-	-	42
1 Jul '46 and 30 Sep '46	-	-	28
1 Oct '46 and 31 Dec '46	-	-	14.

2. EXTRACT GRO 209/45.

Officers and other ranks will be informed that disciplinary action will be taken without exception in any case of theft, tampering with, failing to report possession of, or being in unauthorised possession of captured enemy material. The term "Enemy Material" includes every store and article of equipment, maps, diaries, documents, food etc, known to have been in possession of the enemy at any time. It thus includes recaptured material of British or Allied Forces.

WAR SOUVENIRS.

- (a) Personnel are permitted to possess or send to their nominated addressees, but NOT to Aust Kit Stores, as War Souvenirs, items of enemy equipment and documents which are of no value to Intelligence or Ordnance, but they are not permitted to possess or return the following :-

Pistols, Rifles & Bayonets, SMG's, LMG's, Grenades, Dischargers, Mortars, Field, Mountain Tk A and Arty Sites, Technical Equipment, and parts, Amn, Explosives, Mines, Flame Throwers, Rangefinders or any original item(unless authorised by Intelligence).

- (b) Personnel desirous of retaining or returning to their nominated addressees items of enemy equipment(other than those specified in above para of this order), as War Souvenirs, will present such material to their formation or Unit Intelligence Offrs for inspection. Such Offrs are authorised to issue and sign a certificate, certifying that the item is of no value to Intelligence or Ordnance & releasing it as a War Souvenir if

it complies with the postal regulations, the certificate must accompany the item, otherwise the article will be liable to confiscation by Censorship Authorities.

- (c) Items of enemy equipment & documents so certified will be forwarded only through the POSTAL SERVICE & NOT by any other official means. The following is a guide to the type of items which may be regarded as War Souvenirs :-

Flags (after examination by Intelligence), Post Cards, Newspapers (after examination by Intelligence) cigarettes & cigarette cartons, Pocket or pen knives (unless recovered from living or dead P.W) whose possessions are required for return to higher formation. Spectacles (unless bearing name, identification or particulars of ownership) Rice Bowls, canteens, mess kits, chop sticks, waterbottles, steel helmets, head handkerchiefs, rubber soled tabis (split toed or solid) Compasses (commercial type) Watches, pens whistles, toilet articles etc (if found and bearing no name, identification or particulars of ownership), Clothing money, Field Glasses, respirators.

TORTURE IN TIMOR

Darwin Trial Of Japanese Begins

From Our Special Representative
DARWIN, March 1.

The torture of Australian members of a special reconnaissance detachment captured by the Japanese in Timor early in 1943 by officers and NCO's, including some Kempei Tai (Japanese secret police), was described when the first Australian trial of nine Japanese accused of war crimes began here today.

The prosecuting officer said that a corporal, fearing after long torture that he might become deranged and divulge information, attempted to bite out his tongue, and failing this, to kill himself by battering his head against the wall.

The court assembled under the President (Lt-Col. A. Brown). The most imposing entry was made by Lt. Takeda, the Japanese defence officer, who removed his white cap at the table and calmly removed spotless white silk gloves. Capt. Goto, his associate in orthodox military uniform.

Dwarfed by the tall, lean Australians—four guards, the Japanese prisoners—four captains, two sergeants—four, one sergeant and one lance-corporal—marched into court, bowed low, and listened impassively to charges translated by the 19-year-old Australian interpreter. "Not guilty, please," to all charges was most emphatic.

P.O.W. Statements

The Australian officer defending the Japanese (Capt. W. Cole) objected to passages of the address by the prosecutor (Capt. G. R. Pitcher) about the alleged torture of Australians on the grounds that they were irrelevant and likely to prejudice the accused. He succeeded in having reference to the death of an Australian lieutenant POW struck out of the court record.

Capt. Pitcher said that evidence was mostly statements by re-covered POW and by some accused with oral evidence by Japanese witnesses. Evidence by Japanese treatment, who Capt. J. R. Cashman of Victoria, who was captured in 1943, was told that Kempei Tai was kicked and beaten by members of the Japanese Conven-tion and that the Geneva Convention never heard of his treatment.

He suffered "log" torture, in which his legs were crushed between logs, and was beaten by straps, cane whips, fasts, and pieces of wood. He was once suspended by his fingers. He received solitary confinement for two years and seven months until his release in August, 1945.
