



PART IOPERATIONS(a) ~~AND~~ OWN & ENEMY5 AUST DIV

A further four PW have been captured by a PIB patrol in the SINGORAKAT area.

7 AUST DIV (ref maps ~ 1:25000 series, BAGASIN and BOGADJIM 1" to 1 mile)

Active patrolling continues. On the right flank, patrols are operating to the coast, in the centre patrols are active on the BOGADJIM ROAD proper, on the left flank activity is limited. The enemy appears to be withdrawing along the whole front.

Right Flank : On 27 Mar a patrol from BARUM encountered approx 30 enemy about 3 miles NW of the village. A further patrol reached JAM JAM and moved 6 miles south along the MINTJIM RIVER without contacting any enemy.

On 31 Mar a patrol to the enemy position NW of BARUM found the position abandoned. Fresh occupied positions were located 700 yards further north.

Centre : In the DAUDINA area, a patrol on 27 Mar located an abandoned enemy defensive position 1½ miles west of DAUDINA, overlooking the BOGADJIM ROAD. It had a frontage of 1000 yards and apparently had been a battalion position evacuated approx 2½ Mar. A smaller position was located ½ mile to the west evacuated approx 26 Mar. On 30 Mar a further abandoned position was found 3 miles NW of DAUDINA, apparently vacated 3 weeks previously.

KATEKI 1 was found to be unoccupied by a patrol on 30 Mar. On 31 Mar the same patrol found abandoned defensive positions on the 2900 feature NE of KATEKI 1. No enemy were seen.

On 31 Mar troops advancing north along the BOGADJIM ROAD reached a point 300 yards south of YAUJA where they came under enemy fire from mortars, PIs and a mountain gun.

Left Flank : On 24 Mar a patrol returned to FAITA after having been ambushed at KAP (20 miles NW of BOGADJIM). We suffered no casualties. A patrol 2 miles SW of JAPPA on 31 Mar saw no enemy.

SAIDOR (ref maps ~ POLEMEKI RIVER, BOGADJIM 1 inch to 1 mile)

The patrol to BOGADJIM Plantation reported in Summary No 352 received native reports of one enemy company in the northern portion of BOGADJIM Plantation, also defensive positions at the mouths of the GOMI and MINTJIM RIVERS. The main enemy strength was reported to be at ERIMA Plantation.

Patrols have been active west and south of YALAU. On 25 Mar a patrol reached MARAKUM (1½ miles east of BOGADJIM). No enemy were encountered. The area between the KAMBARA and GUABE RIVERS had been evacuated. A further patrol to the GUABE RIVER on 29 Mar reported no contact. Enemy equipment abandoned east of MARAKUM included six assault boats and one half-sunken barge. This area was long suspected to be a barge staging area.

An inland patrol on 25 Mar killed 16 enemy near DEMAN (10 miles SE of YALAU).

A report dated 25 Mar states that enemy in good condition were moving south from TARINGAN to GVARAVON, evidently with the intention of returning to the HOKOPO area where extensive native gardens are situated.

Enemy casualties since the landing at SAIDOR to 29 Mar total 774 dead and 17 PW.

NEW BRITAIN

Enemy movement toward GAZELLE PENINSULA continues. In the ten days ended 27 Mar 3,400 troops have now passed through GOGOSI moving east. The enemy were carrying small arms only and travelling mostly at night. Day hideouts camps were irregularly spaced. Natives in the OPEN BAY area report the relaying of arms, ammunition and equipment towards RABAUL.

On 25 Mar an Allied patrol landed at the KULU RIVER (12 miles east of ELEONORA BAY) with the intention of patrolling east to NUMUMBO. No opposition was encountered during the landing but contact was established later. No further details are available.

Active patrolling was carried out in the TALASEA and LINGA LINGA areas. Twenty one enemy were killed and 68 PW taken between 26 and 28 Mar.

Investigation of native reports dated 18 Mar to the effect that enemy were in the AUGITMI area (between REIN BAY and RAVE) was concluded on 26 Mar. One hundred enemy were found dead and 3 killed.

Enemy casualties in NEW BRITAIN to 29 Mar total 4,022 killed and 176 PW, including 3,686 killed in the CAPE GLOUCESTER - REIN BAY area.
Note : These figures correct and cancel the figures quoted in Summary No 332.

ADMIRALTY ISLANDS

LOS NEGROS ISLAND

Patrol activity continues in the area south of LOMBRUM POINT. Slight enemy opposition was encountered on 27 Mar but, on 28 Mar, an Allied patrol reached LOHNU PASSAGE without making contact. The enemy in this area are reported to be short of food and ammunition and to be withdrawing SW.

MANUS ISLAND EAST

Allied troops advancing south from LORENGAU along the Number Two Road occupied WAREMBU (5 miles south of LORENGAU) on 27 Mar. Opposition from enemy defences in both north and south of ROSSUN was overcome. Fighting patrols on 28 Mar were operating along tracks to the NE, north, west and NW from WAREMBU but contact with the enemy was lost.

On 25 Mar 28 enemy were killed on the isthmus at the NE extremity of MANUS ISLAND.

A-10 and HEDROWA ISLANDS (off the SE tip of MANUS ISLAND) were occupied without opposition on 25 Mar.

Enemy on PITYILU ISLAND were shelled from HAUWEI ISLAND by Allied troops using a captured 5 inch naval gun. PITYILU ISLAND has also been heavily shelled by Allied naval units. A report dated 29 Mar states that Allied troops have landed on the island and advanced east to within $\frac{1}{2}$ mile of the eastern tip. No further details are available.

MANUS ISLAND WEST

On 24 Mar a patrol landed from MTBs at ANUR and KALI plantations on the west coast of MANUS ISLAND. No enemy was encountered.

OUTER ISLANDS

Four PW were captured on 25 Mar by an ANGAU patrol to TONG ISLAND (25 miles east of LOS NEGROS ISLAND).

Total enemy casualties in the ADMIRALTY GROUP to 29 Mar total 2620 dead 16 PW, effectives being 830.

SOLOMONS

BOUCAINVILLE

On 23-24 Mar, the enemy made yet another attempt to break through the Allied perimeter at EMPRESS AUGUSTA BAY. A determined battalion attack from the north (where the Japanese had been reported concentrating) was thrown against the

Allied line, but, although slight penetration was effected at some points, the attack was thrown back with heavy casualties. The Allied line was completely restored. Between 24 and 26 Mar, enemy dead were counted in the northern sector. Total Japanese dead occurred in the EMPRESS AUGUSTA BAY area since 9 Mar total 2384.

(b) SEA - ENEMY

NEW GUINEA

Enemy shipping activity has decreased and the majority of the vessels sighted were believed to be engaged in the distribution of supplies from HOLLANDIA.

Most of the activity was centred in the vicinity of WEWAK, where at least 15 vessels were sighted. At HOLLANDIA, the only concentration reported was on 22 Mar, when one 7000 ton and two 3000 ton vessels were in the harbour. Forward of WEWAK, the only vessels sighted were small coastal ships and the usual stack aft vessels. Two 500/1000 ton vessels visited HANSA BAY.

It is estimated that throughout this area 30,000 tons of enemy shipping were active during the week to 28 Mar. Of this amount, three small ships totalling 1500 tons were sunk and three other vessels damaged. Two gunboats were also sunk on 22 Mar in the WEWAK area.

Enemy barge activity was consistent with that observed during the past few weeks, but his barge losses have been particularly heavy. Forty one are believed to have been destroyed off the NEW BRITAIN coast and in addition eleven barges believed damaged during the week to 28 Mar.

NEW BRITAIN - NEW IRISH

No change has been reported in the shipping situation at RABAUL. However, barge concentrations may have decreased slightly as a 75 per cent coverage of SIMPSON HARBOUR and KERAVIL BAY revealed only 200 present on 22 Mar. Ten barges were sunk in the NEW BRITAIN area as a result of Allied sea and air attacks during the week to 29 Mar 44.

Allied light surface craft maintained patrols to GAROVE ISLAND and along the north and south coast of NEW BRITAIN. Early on the morning of 26 Mar, one Allied light surface craft sank a Type "A" barge, killing 35 and capturing four PW. The action took place six miles SE of GAROVE ISLAND.

In the ST MATTHIAS GROUP, enemy supply and fuel dumps were successfully attacked by Allied naval craft on 25 Mar.

(c) OWN - AIR

NEW GUINEA

The WEWAK area has again been the chief target for Allied bombers. Attacks were made against dumps and installations at WEWAK, GAGEWEI and KAIRUAU ISLAND. Many fires were started and much damage was done. Successful attacks were also carried out against shipping in the area. A total of 800 tons of bombs were dropped in this area during the week to 28 Mar.

HANSA BAY. Three LIBERATORS bombed the aerodrome area on 29 Mar. No visible damage was reported.

AITAPE. On 26 Mar BOSTONS conducted a barge sweep from BUT to AITAPE. Three barges and one lugger were strafed and a direct hit scored on the radio station at AITAPE.

HANSA BAY. Dumps and personnel areas at HANSA Bay were attacked on 26 and 27 Mar and considerable damage was reported.

BUNAEUN BAY. BOSTONS successfully attacked stores and personnel areas on 25 and 29 Mar. The whole area was thoroughly strafed.

Strikes were also carried out in support of 7 Aust Div troops in the BOGADJIK ROAD area.

NEW BRITAIN - NEW IRELAND

The daily raids on the RABAUL townships and wharf areas and on the surrounding airfields have continued. Direct hits were scored on gun positions and all strips have been rendered unserviceable.

The enemy continues to rely solely on his AA defense to protect RABAUL.

Direct hits were scored on gun positions at KAVIENG and fires were started in several light attacks by SOPAC aircraft on KAVIENG and NAMATANAI.

ADMIRALTY ISLANDS

Allied activity has been restricted, only one raid, on enemy positions 15 miles SW of LORENGAU, being reported.

(d) AIR - ENEMY

Excellent photographic coverage of airfields in the HOLLANDIA area has been obtained during the week and a substantial increase in enemy air strength particularly in fighters, has been revealed.

This renders the more perplexing the complete absence of any interception during our recent air attacks. Apparently the enemy is determined to build up the largest reserve possible, before committing his aircraft in counter-measures against the increasing weight of Allied attacks.

Attached as Appendix "A" to this Summary is a table showing Japanese air bases and their development since September 43.

PART II

9. GENERAL

JAPANESE BARGE HIDEOUTS

The ideal conditions which were available to the enemy at NAMEAMA for the concealment of his barges do not exist at all points along his barge staging route down the NE NEW GUINEA coast. Where no such ideal conditions exist, the enemy is known to construct hideouts which entail the dragging of barges across the beach to suitable cover.

A recently captured document illustrates the manner in which these hideouts are constructed. A wooden runway leads from the water's edge to the cover of overhanging foliage. Under this foliage is built a covered revetment of timber and earth designed for the protection of the stern of the barge from possible damage through air attacks.

The barge is drawn ashore by means of a wire cable attached to the stern of the barge and led through a pulley to a windlass which can be made to serve two barges. Timber rollers appear to be placed beneath the barge to facilitate its handling.

The captured sketch relates probably to barge hideouts in the CAPE GLOUCESTER area but it is thought that similar hideouts are being used in the vicinity of HANSA BAY and at other points along the NEW GUINEA coast.

A sketch illustrating the nature of these hideouts appears as Appendix "B" to this Summary.

JAPANESE TREATMENT OF CASUALTIES

During the Japanese withdrawal from the HUON PENINSULA there were frequent references by PW to the fact that officers were giving the sick and wounded hand grenades with which to dispose of themselves. One prisoner suggested that medical officers were also assisting to dispose of the sick in order that the rate of the withdrawal could be maintained.

Accordingly it is of interest to read an instruction issued on 21 Jan 44 by the Chief of Staff of 17 Division relating to the withdrawal from Western NEW BRITAIN. He states :

" Arrangements to send the wounded and sick to the rear are being made, but if this causes too obvious an obstruction to the efficient execution of the withdrawal, unavoidable instances when wounded and sick must be disposed of are to be expected. "

PART III

TOPOGRAPHICAL

INFORMATION FROM NATIVES

Before commencing a recent patrol, an ANGAU officer discussed tracks with unit IOs. His comments after completing the patrol were as follows : -

" It was interesting to note how much inaccurate information had been given to them by local natives and accepted as authentic. Reasons for giving this inaccurate information appeared to be the usual ones - village natives would stress the length and steepness of roads because they feared they might be called upon to act as carriers or guides.

For example, natives had stated that one track had not been used for 20 years and that they thought the journey would take from seven to ten days. Actually, some of the natives who gave this information had travelled by this road as carriers for the retreating Japs. The journey can be accomplished comfortably in 3 days and, during the patrol, one native traversed it in less than two-and-a-half hours."

A similar case was reported by a former prospector and recruiter with a lifetime experience in handling natives. He stated that natives had recently led him for 8 days over particularly difficult unmapped country. Afterwards he was satisfied that there was an alternative one day track which had not been disclosed because the native feared that his movements might attract Jap attention to their area.

Information from natives and native guides is invaluable, but the possibility that they may deliberately mislead should always be borne in mind.

PART V

SECURITY

ENEMY PROPAGANDA

Summary No 332 gave an instance of Japanese propaganda aimed at creating suspicion of our Allies. The following extracts from letters written by soldiers of two separate AIF units in NEW GUINEA are examples of propaganda aimed at arousing nostalgia:-

" I got real homesick the other night.....a Jap station broadcasting in English. They called it Radio Tokio and lasted for an hour of beautiful music and not so beautiful propaganda. They weren't the latest records by any means but ones that came out before the war. It's marvellous how an old song reminds you of something that happened at the time it came out."

" Tokio Radio is our, and they put on the best music I've ever heard or ... wireless. All, but none of that awful American jive.....it carries me right back to the old days when we were together."

UNIT CENSORSHIP

Censorship and security regulations are based upon commonsense. Troops will observe them willingly, only if they understand them, and the reasons why they are made. The booklet "Censorship and Security in NEW GUINEA", recently distributed, was prepared for this purpose.

Troops judge such regulations as these by the way they are applied. Unless they are applied with commonsense, they cease to be commonsense. When this happens, soldiers lose confidence either in the higher formations which make the regulations or in their own officers who apply them or even in both. If this is not to happen, the real purposes of censorship must be understood by all franking officers.

Letters are censored for one purpose only - national security. Action is to be taken on letters stopped only if security is infringed.

As long as his remarks do not offend security, a soldier can write and criticise as he pleases. No matter how offensive his remarks may appear to the franking officer, such things as the following are not in themselves censorable : e.g. obscene or abusive language, "smutty" stories, pornographic letters, lying or exaggerated stories, political or religious views, criticism of the government or army whether in general terms or of individual politicians, officers or NCOs, criticism of rations, quartermaster, postal services or censorship, etc. Nor, save in exceptional circumstances, of which the franking officer must be the judge, should a reference to or confession of a military or civil offence be held for action or investigation.

An officer reading his men's letters will learn much about himself as well as them. Their opinions, worries and complaints will enable him to help them with their problems and, by viewing the letters as a whole, to improve his leadership and his unit's efficiency.





PART I

OPERATIONS

(a) LAND - OWN & ENEMY

7 AUST DIV (ref maps - 1:25000 series, BAGASIN and BOGADJIM
1 inch to 1 mile)

The advance north along the BOGADJIM ROAD continues, with patrol activity on both flanks.

Right Flank -

Patrolling is now based on NANGAPO ($2\frac{1}{2}$ miles SW of BARUM). A summary of the activity is as follows :-

- 31 Mar Own patrol was ambushed between BARUM and KALIKO, suffering casualties.
1 Apr A patrol moving west surprised 15 enemy about 2500 yards east of YAULA, inflicting casualties.
2 Apr A small enemy party occupied ALIBU 1 (4 miles west of NANGAPO).
3 Apr A patrol moving east contacted a US patrol at SUNGUM (5 miles south of the KABENAU RIVER).
4 Apr A patrol reported BARUM was unoccupied.
5 Apr A patrol to ALIBU 1 (reported occupied 2 Apr) saw no movement.
6 Apr A patrol to ALIBU 1 returned to base without contact.

Centre -

Our advance has been rapid, the enemy's delaying tactics being small ambush parties only which withdraw after contact. Our forward elements are now 2000 yards north of AIYAU astride the BOGADJIM ROAD and 7 miles from the coast. The area north of MATELOI 1 and the track from there to YAULA are clear of enemy.

The week's activity comprises :-

Centre Right -

- 3 Apr Forward elements reached MABELEBU area, making no contact. A patrol to the junction of the MINDJIM and KOFEBI Rivers made no contact.
4 Apr Forward elements were at KWATO, no contact being made. Much abandoned equipment was found along route. One coy left MABELEBU to patrol the MINDJIM River to BOGADJIM.
5 Apr Own position was : one coy at YAULA, one coy at AIYAU with an advance patrol forward to Bridge 7 2000 yards north along the Road. This patrol was ambushed and three are missing.
6 Apr Patrols moving from AIYAU to attack enemy at Bridge 7. One was moving along the Road and one SF of the Road to outflank.

Centre Left -

- 1 Apr A patrol from MATELOI 1 successfully attacked positions 1500 yards SW YAULA.

- 2 Apr A patrol from MATELOI 1 was 500 yards SW YAULA and moving to YAULA. No contact was made.
3 Apr A patrol from JAPPA returned to SANA.
5 Apr The patrol from MATELOI 1 made contact with the coy established at YAULA.
6 Apr Firm bases were established at MATELOI 1 and KISA.

Left Flank -

Few details were received. On 3 Apr a patrol reached KUALU (24 miles WNW of BOGADJIM) and reported clearing the area of enemy.

Enemy Information -

Natives report the enemy have prepared positions 4 miles SSW of BOGADJIM covering the WENGA - JAMJAM track and that they recently occupied positons along the KALIKO - MINDJIM track. Enemy patrols are operating in the MALE area.

SAIDOR (ref map SAIDOR 1 inch to 1 mile)

The activity was confined to patrolling only.

Between 1 Apr and 5 Apr patrols killed 14 enemy and found 141 enemy dead in the TARIKNGAN - GWARAWON area.

An OP in the YANGALUM area reports an unstated number of enemy west of KABENAU River on 5 Apr.

ADMIRALTY ISLANDS

The enemy garrison can no longer be considered a force with any striking power. However, in view of the effectiveness of the control of the withdrawal after the fall of LORENGAU, the final mopping up may take time and resistance may be met. The total enemy losses to 4 Apr (approx) are now reported 2800 known dead and 1100 estimated dead. The effectives now number only 350.

LOS NEGROS ISLAND :

All organised enemy resistance has ceased. Isolated small groups continue to fight. PW stated that the enemy were breaking up into small parties and attempting to rejoin the mainbody on MANUS ISLAND.

MANUS ISLAND (see map attached as Appendix "A")

The enemy has broken off contact and apparently is attempting to regroup in the south eastern area. At MT DRÉMSEL he has supplies cached. It is probable he may attempt a stand in the DRONDRA area. Attempts to evacuate officers and key personnel by seaplane are probable.

- 29 Mar Natives report many enemy at YIRU (5 miles SW of WAREMBU). These troops are apparently withdrawing from KELAUA HARBOUR area.
30 Mar A patrol contacted a small party of enemy NW of WAREMBU. A large enemy patrol was dispersed 500 yards east of OLD WAREMBU.
Patrols were despatched to ALACRITY POINT (westernmost MANUS) and to ALEYOS POINT (northernmost point of MANUS)
3 Apr A patrol near WAREMBU killed 17 enemy.
4 Apr Increased enemy activity observed in the DRONDRA area (SE MANUS); bunkers were being occupied and stragglers continued to move in.
6 Apr In the vicinity of DRABITO and METAWARI on No 4 Road it is estimated there are 200 enemy. Ten patrols were observed moving north in this area.

OTHER ISLANDS :

PITYILU ISLAND, by 31 Mar, was cleared of enemy, the total killed being 58. Our losses were 7 killed and 15 wounded.

On 31 Mar NDRILLO and KORUNIAT ISLANDS (off western LOS NEGROS) were occupied without opposition.

RAMBUTYO ISLAND (east of LOS NEGROS) was occupied on 3 Apr without opposition. On 6 Apr 29 enemy were contacted and 2 killed in the vicinity of PELCHAL.

NEW BRITAIN

Allied activity comprises the consolidation of areas evacuated by the enemy with mopping up patrols active in localities where isolated enemy groups are known or reported to be.

The enemy appears to have entirely evacuated all areas west of a line drawn NE from JACQUINOT BAY except for occasional abandoned groups and a few small rear parties.

On 31 Mar a patrol encountered 73 enemy near KANDOKO (4 miles east of ELEONORA BAY). Six were killed including a high ranking officer. On the same day 27 PW were captured in the IBOKI Plantation area.

A patrol is investigating a report of an organised enemy group on POI ISLAND in EMELINE BAY.

SOLOMONS

BOUGAINVILLE

After the failure of their attack on 23/24 Mar the enemy has withdrawn from close contact, probably to reorganise.

Allied patrols from the perimeter found five enemy guns destroyed and evidence of mass burials.

(b) SEA - OWN & ENEMY

NEW GUINEA

The enemy appears to have been engaged only in minor coastal traffic during the week.

HOLLANDIA, as usual, was the focal point for shipping but the number of vessels sighted was considerably lower than over the past fortnight. The largest concentration of shipping sighted in this harbour was on 3 Apr, when two auxiliary naval craft, possibly gun-boats, and seven or eight small merchant ships totalling at least 4500 tons were reported.

Elsewhere along the NEW GUINEA Coast 500/1000 ton ships were sighted at VANIMO, SISSANO Lagoon, TADJI and WEWAK. Three 500, 1000 ton stack-aft vessels were in the WEWAK area on 2 Apr and several small unidentified vessels, possibly luggers, were reported in the vicinity of CAPE GOURDON and KARKAR ISLAND.

During the week, Allied air and sea attacks accounted for 19 barges sunk and a similar number probably damaged.

On night 3/4 Apr PT boats sank 3 and damaged one barge near SARANG HARBOUR. Heavy 37 mm fire was encountered from the shore.

On night 4/5 Apr PT boats sank 2 and damaged one barge north of BUNABUN. The barges were armed with 37 mm and 20 mm guns and numerous MMGs. One of our boats was slightly damaged.

NEW BRITAIN

A small cargo ship was probably sunk and another vessel was

beached in the RABAUL area as a result of Allied air attacks. In addition a possible destroyer was attacked in KERAVIA BAY on 29 Mar causing an explosion. Subsequent attacks were made on the hulk of a destroyer in this area on 30 Mar.

A string of spiked, orange coloured spheres, probably mines, spaced 50 feet apart has been sighted extending from the eastern tip of WATCH ISLAND to LIGUAN BAY.

Allied PT boats made a torpedo attack on an enemy submarine 13 miles NE of UBILI on 2 Apr. Seven torpedoes were fired and a heavy explosion occurred although results could not be observed. The same units sank a Type "B" barge and captured a second similar type on the same night. One Japanese was taken prisoner.

Thirteen barges were destroyed and seven damaged in these waters during the week.

PALAU

It was estimated that, on 25 Mar, 300,000 tons of shipping was present in MALAKAL HARBOUR. One battleship, one light cruiser and two destroyers left PALAU on 29 Mar on a course NW by north. An Allied submarine which attacked the convoy probably damaged the battleship.

(c) AIR - OWN

NEW GUINEA

The weight of Allied bombing has been concentrated against HOLLANDIA following the reduction of WEWAK. Airstrips forward of HOLLANDIA are now almost deserted.

HOLLANDIA. On 30 Mar 65 Liberators thoroughly bombed the strip and dispersal areas, destroying aircraft on the ground and starting large fires. The attack was continued on 31 Mar by 61 Liberators which dropped 20 lb fragmentation bombs over the entire dispersal area, starting many fires. Photographs show that 165 enemy aircraft were destroyed or probably destroyed on the ground and 15 fighters were shot down in attempting interception during the two days of operations.

Another heavy attack was made on 5 Apr by 237 bombers with fighter escort. Huge fires up to 12000 ft were started and large explosions caused terrific damage. Twenty five intercepting fighters were shot down. On 5 Apr 201 bombers again attacked the area with the same excellent results. Smoke and dust prevented detailed observation. Six Buggers in HUMBOLDT BAY were strafed and sunk.

Photographic reports are not yet to hand but it is anticipated the damage revealed will confirm that the enemy air strength in the area has been almost totally eliminated.

TADJI AND AITAPE. The airfields at TADJI and AITAPE were successfully attacked and rendered unserviceable. On 5 Apr 85 fighters carried out a strafing sweep from ULIGAN to TADJI. Buildings and fuel dumps were set on fire and 2 barges sunk.

WEWAK, KAIRIRU and MUSCHU ISLANDS were heavily attacked on 31 Mar and 1 Apr. Large fires were started and 12 barges were destroyed. On 4 Apr 8 squadrons of Liberators, unable to reach HOLLANDIA due to bad weather, dropped their bombs on personnel and dump areas at WEWAK.

HANSA BAY. Eleven Liberators bombed AA positions on 1 Apr with unobserved results.

BOGADJIM, MAMARIA Plantation and bivouac area west of ERIMA were bombed and strafed on 1 Apr.

On 4 Apr two unsuccessful attempts were made to destroy the bridge over the OBO River on the coast road north of BOGADJIM.

BISMARCK ARCHIPELAGO

RABAUL was again raided each day, a total of 270 tons being dropped on the township, and surrounding airfields which photographic reconnaissance shows still unserviceable.

Once again there was no fighter interception although several fighters were sighted on the ground. AA fire was reported to be less intense than in the past and no damage was caused to our aircraft during the week.

The enemy has attempted to keep in repair some of the strips at RABAUL, possibly to enable evacuation of remaining aircraft.

Several small raids were carried out on KAVIENG and NAMATANAI and AA positions on GAROVE ISLAND were satisfactorily bombed.

TRUK

A series of raids have been carried out on the CAROLINE ISLANDS during the week, most being carried out by one and two aircraft but, on the night 29/30 Mar, 29 SOPAC Liberators dropped 30 tons of bombs on ETEN ISLAND. Heavy toll was taken of grounded aircraft - 35 fighters ten dive-bombers and four medium bombers were reported destroyed. The enemy had 90 fighters airborne but interceptions were not determined and a possible 20 were destroyed by Allied aircraft.

PART II

1. ENEMY OOB

The enemy, following the fall of LAE, has been most active improving the defences in NW British NEW GUINEA and NE Dutch NEW GUINEA. Reinforcements for the area have been received but Allied air attacks against shipping have undoubtedly eliminated many others en route.

In British NEW GUINEA, enemy dispositions are :

WEWAK - 51 Div, now about 55 per cent below full strength including 3/4000 reinforcements. Morale probably affected by huge losses in the BISMARCK SEA convoy.

HANSA BAY - 20 Div, now about 50 per cent below strength including 1/2000 reinforcements. This division was very badly mauled in the SALAMAUA - HUON PENINSULA campaign. Its morale can be considered poor.

Forward of HANSA BAY - 41 Div, now about 35 per cent below strength. Comprises two Regts not committed to date. One Regt well below strength due to battle casualties. The morale of the Div can be considered good.



At the time of the earlier report, steel shell cases only had been encountered. In addition, it has now been established that the conical type 88 Instantaneous Fuse is normally employed with this shell, confirming the earlier assumption that this was the normal fuse.





5 AUST DIV INTELLIGENCE SUMMARY NO 335

(From information received to 1200 hrs 15 Apr 44)

PART I

OPERATIONS

(a) LAND - OWN & ENEMY

11 AUST DIV (ref maps - 1:25000 series, BIGASIN and BOGADJIM
1 inch to 1 mile)

BOGADJIM ROAD AREA :

Movement NE along the main road continued during the week, with patrols operating forward of the advance. Only slight opposition was encountered.

On 7 Apr a patrol reached JAMJAM and moved through MAGARIA and DUAU Plantations to a point one mile south of BOGADJIM. Indications of enemy movement to the north were seen but no enemy were encountered. Natives from BOGADJIM reported that there were no Japs at BOGADJIM but many in ERIMA Plantation.

Patrols in the vicinity of Bridge 7 on 8 and 9 Apr saw no enemy. On 10 Apr one platoon moved forward and encountered enemy positions at Bridge 6, 2 miles NE of ALKU and inflicted casualties. One company then successfully attacked and occupied an enemy position 1100 yards north of the Bridge. A further position 600 yards north of the Bridge was occupied on 11 Apr.

On 11 Apr a patrol NE along the Road some 600 yards reached Bridge 5. No enemy were seen. On 12 Apr a patrol along the road reached the western edge of MAGARIA Plantation, 3 miles SW of BOGADJIM. Indication of recent withdrawal were found at BAU-AU, otherwise no movement was seen. On 13 Apr the patrol entered BOGADJIM and reconnoitred tracks to the north and south. An engineer dump and seven abandoned trucks were found but no enemy were sighted.

KALIKO AREA :

Active patrolling was carried out forward of NANGAPO during the week.

On 7 Apr a patrol en route to KALIKO was fired on 1000 yards east of the village and withdrew to BAKLI. A patrol en route to WENGA (3 miles north of ALIBU 1) encountered 20 enemy in prepared positions 1300 yards south of WENGA.

On 9 Apr a patrol contacted an enemy position 1 mile south of KALIKO and returned to NANGAPO.

Patrols to WENGA, ALIBU 1 and KALIKO on 13 Apr sighted no enemy.

MARGHAI VALLEY :

A patrol is investigating a report of enemy movement in the vicinity of WANTOLI (approx half-way between DILHU and LAB).

SAIDOR

On 12 Apr 39 dead Japs were found at BAMBU and another 65 en route to GWARAWON. All enemy equipment found in the area had already been destroyed.

NEW BRITAIN :

In the WILLAUMEZ PENINSULA and HOSKIN S PENINSULA areas, no enemy contacts have been made and no movement over the road near CAPE HOSKINS is reported. It is apparent that these areas have been abandoned by the Japanese in their movement eastward.

In the UBILI area Japanese are reported to be on both sides of the stream which empties into HIXON BAY 8 miles ESE of CAPE DESCHAMP and at the mouth of the PANDI RIVER. On 8 Apr eight enemy barges were reported operating from LOMBAU ISLAND to the PANDA RIVER area, no doubt accounting for the presence of these enemy troops.

On the south coast, enemy have been reported digging on a line between NATONG (east side of WATERFALL BAY) and PULPUL, and recent signs of activity have been observed on the northern shore of WIDE BAY.

ADMIRALTY ISLANDS :

MANUS ISLAND :

A report dated 7 Apr stated that enemy in the LORENGAU area were retreating south completely routed and had abandoned hundreds of dead and many wounded.

Patrols despatched for the purpose of mopping up scattered enemy parties killed 58 enemy during the week. The DRABITO area is reported to be occupied by approx 200 Japs where extensive enemy patrolling is also reported.

OTHER ISLANDS :

On 10 Apr Allied troops made an unopposed landing at PAK ISLAND (east of LOS NEGROS). Patrols on 11 Apr killed 4 enemy.

Known enemy dead in the ADMIRALTIES operations to 11 Apr total 2952.

SOLOMONS

BOUGAINVILLE :

During 7/8 Apr our troops east of the TOROKINA RIVER mouth advanced against scattered resistance and engaged the enemy dug in on a hill east of the perimeter. Further to the north the hills NE of our defences have been reported clear of enemy.

Our patrols have found many graves and unburied Japanese in the North TOROKINA perimeter.

Mortars, MGs and ammunition have been captured in the areas north and east of our FDLs.

(b) SEA

NEW GUINEA

Following the recent smashing attacks on HOLLANDIA by Allied aircraft enemy shipping activity on the northern coast of NEW GUINEA has been substantially reduced. No shipping was sighted east of WEWAK during the past week.

However, on 5 Apr eight vessels totalling 8000/16000 tons were observed at HOLLANDIA. This was the largest concentration reported at any port in NEW GUINEA during the week. Seven of the above ships had left the area by 7 Apr. There are indications that barges are being withdrawn from forward areas to WEWAK and HOLLANDIA. A greater use of barges forward of HOLLANDIA may therefore be expected.

In converse proportion to the extent of enemy shipping traffic, losses were heavy. At WEWAK two medium sized merchant ships totalling 2500/4000 tons were observed burning fiercely on 8 Apr, and on the same day a 2000/3000 ton vessel and a smaller vessel, possibly a barge,

were sighted burning off CAPE DJERUAN, 40 miles west of WEWAK. Enemy barge losses were particularly heavy. At least 30 were destroyed and 45 - 55 damaged by air and surface action between MADANG and HOLLANDIA.

Eleven Allied PT boats in conjunction with eleven medium bombers carried out a successful co-ordinated attack on KARKAR ISLAND (NE of ALEXISHAFEN) on the morning of 7 Apr. BISON, KURUM BIU and EAVILO BAYS were bombed, strafed and shelled with resultant destruction to enemy installations.

A new type of barge was encountered by PT boats in the BUNABUN area on the night 4/5 Apr. The barges, which were heavily laden, were described as 110 feet in length and box-like in shape. They are believed to have been propelled by twin screws and were travelling at 8 - 10 knots.

Allied naval vessels which bombarded HANSA BAY on 10 Apr start several fires in the AWAR Plantation. AA positions at CONDOR POINT received concentrated shellfire and LAING ISLAND was reported completely devastated.

ADJACENT AREAS

Crippling losses were inflicted on the enemy when an Allied naval task force attacked shipping and ground installations at PALAU on 30/31 Mar. Twenty five ships were definitely sunk and a further 17 damaged. ULITHI and YAP ISLANDS were also attacked on 31 Mar and WOLEAI ISLAND on 1 Apr. A total of 121 enemy aircraft was destroyed in all these operations. No damage was sustained by the Allied naval forces. Two tankers totalling 20,000 tons were recently sunk by Allied submarines 320 miles ENE of SINGAPORE and a freighter of unreported tonnage was sunk near WAKE ISLAND on 4 Apr.

A 9000 ton freighter transport was observed amongst other ships at WOLEAI ISLAND on 10 Apr.

(c) AIR - OWN

Following the devastating attacks on HOLLANDIA reported in Summary No 334, Allied aircraft extended their range to WAKE ISLAND (110 miles NW of HOLLANDIA), the last main enemy air base on the north coast of NEW GUINEA. HOLLANDIA andAITAPE were also attacked and regular attacks were made against the enemy L or C between WEWAK and MADANG. Details are as follows :-

WAKE ISLAND. On night 5/6 Apr 15 Liberators, 6 Mitchells and 4 Catalinas attacked the strips and dispersal areas, starting large fires visible for 50 miles. One of our aircraft was damaged by AA fire. Weather prevented a further heavy attack scheduled for 7 Apr.

HOLLANDIA. Forty nine Liberators attacked the township and installations on 9 Apr. Warehouses were destroyed and large fires started. Another heavy attack was made 12 Apr by 97 aircraft. A further 23 attacked shipping in HUMBOLDT BAY scoring direct hits on a freighter TADJI. Strips and dump areas were attacked on 7 and 9 Apr. Large fires were started and one aircraft was destroyed on the ground.

WEWAK area. Heavy attacks were made on 8 Apr against AA positions and dump areas at BUT, CAPE NOEM, BRANDI and POTSDAM HARBOUR. Large fires were started but results were largely unobserved.

Forty eight Mitchells again attacked the area on 11 Apr.

HANSA BAY. AA positions were heavily attacked on 9, 10 and 11 Apr. Many direct hits were observed but low cloud prevented detailed observation.

Regular barge sweeps were carried out between HANSA BAY and AITAPE and a number of barges were destroyed. A 7000/10000 ton

freighter was bombed and strafed off WEWAK on 6 Apr and left burning fiercely.

BISMARCK ARCHIPELAGO

SOPAC aircraft kept up their assault on RABAUL this week dropping over 300 tons of bombs on supply areas and the RABAUL airfields.

Air reconnaissance revealed that only the concrete runway at VUNAKANAU was serviceable, and that work was being carried out on it at one end. No enemy interception was reported but AA fire was heavier than in recent weeks.

(d) AIR - ENEMY

Air photographs reveal considerable activity on the SARMI PENINSULA (west of WAKDE ISLAND) and in the surrounding areas. The Japanese have constructed a fighter and bomber strip at SAWAR, 6 miles SE of SARMI, and are building a further strip at MAFFIN, three miles SE along the coast near the WOSKE RIVER. There is also a clearing at the south end of FOE MAOE Plantation (5 miles south of SARMI) which may indicate the construction of yet another strip.

Considerable activity is reported on the SARMI PENINSULA. Large concentrations of stores and personnel areas were observed.

SARMI has become an important Japanese supply and staging area for troops and barges moving from HALMAHERA to HOLLANDIA and points SE along the north coast of NEW GUINEA.

In addition, the WAKDE - SARMI airfields have replaced the HOLLANDIA group, in that they now house the bulk of the enemy's air strength in the NEW GUINEA sector.

PART II

I. ENEMY OOB - LAND

The withdrawal from MADANG continues. Pending some clarification of the enemy's eventual intentions all troops from MADANG, together with those thought to be still there, are carried in estimates of strength under HANSA BAY - MADANG.

Accordingly it will be of interest to observe whether the current withdrawal to HANSA BAY is followed by further movement westward to WEWAK, AITAPE and HOLLANDIA. At the moment it is significant that the withdrawal of the enemy's air strength from HOLLANDIA to WAKDE ISLAND and airfields further west is accompanied by activity which suggests a hurried preparation of ground defences and the building up of supplies in the HOLLANDIA area.

PART V

SECURITY

JAPANESE COMMENTS ON INTERROGATING PW

The professional notebook of a Japanese Naval Ensign begins by declaring the official Japanese views on PW, which, of course, reflect the commonly accepted principles of International Law, but, in interpreting these principles, the writer proceeds to give his own views. Despite official pronouncement, it might well be that the views of this Ensign represent the views of many Japanese officers.

Attention has recently been directed to the ways and means available to the Japanese to extract information from PW, and, in this

regard, it is of interest to note the comments of this Japanese officer on the limitations of cross-examining PW in English and his suggestions for overcoming them. These details, if known to troops, may assist them, in the event of capture, to defeat the object of such an interrogation.

"My Own Views Concerning the Interrogation of PW
(Translation - JICPOA Item No 4986)

- A. Insofar as possible, PW should be picked up separately.
- B. Conversation and communication between PW should be restricted.
- C. To help elicit testimony from PW, material recognised to be of value (documents, messages, etc) should be gathered and arranged to the best of one's ability. The principal function of interrogation then should be the further interpretation of this material.
- D. In interrogating, coercion should be the principle. Since in cases when the PW's native language differs from one's own, it is difficult to take advantage of any slip of his tongue, to practice detailed examination, or to use indirect questioning (especially at times when one lacks confidence in one's vocabulary), it is easier (for the interrogator) to adopt the formalities of a consultation. The feeling that the victor is superior, the loser inferior, should pervade the interrogation. If necessary, you should demand that questions and answers be made in writing.
- E. Until the object of the interrogation has been attained, the PW should be made to feel anxious about his fate, should become haggard. Consideration should be given to PW's quarters, sustenance, surveillance, etc."

RUMOURS

Rumours may be considered in two military aspects - the one, rumours relating to our operations, plans and intentions - the other, rumours damaging to morale.

Troops, particularly those in static roles or resting after operations, naturally speculate on their future use, and that of other troops; but it is one thing for a soldier to expound his own views on the strategy of war and another to impute intentions to Commanders.

Within limits, speculation by troops does no harm, and is generally a sign of healthy interest. It has, however, inherent dangers. Soldiers who possess some scraps of knowledge about future moves may give away information, often unwittingly, in the course of discussion. The piecing together of little scraps of information observed and heard may lead to an appreciation or a guess, which, in a snowball fashion, soon becomes a widespread rumour, often surprisingly close to the truth.

The other type of rumour is probably even more dangerous. This may deal with all sorts of subjects, many trivial in themselves, but in their cumulative effect lead inevitably to a lowering of morale, e.g. rumours about leave, the conduct of civilians or of our Allies, dissension between AI and CMF, distrust of our leaders, etc. Whatever its subject, it consists, in essence, either of "bad news" which creates an immediate lowering of morale or of "good news"

which, by creating temporary and unfounded optimism, lowers morale when the falsity of the news becomes plain. This is the sort of rumour that frequently springs through doubts or wishful thinking from enemy propaganda.

To prevent their beginning or spreading requires constant work and much patience on the part of every officer; but, if every unit commander ensures that rumours do not spread in or emanate from his unit, their mischief will soon be ended.

REPORT OF TRIALS CONDUCTED BY 5 AUST DIV

GENERAL

1. The above trials were carried out by RAA 5 Aust Div on 6 and 8 Apr 44 in area HUBIKA ref map 1/25000 FORTIFICATION POINT 562847.
2. Except for four rounds which were fired in a static position against the armour, all rounds were fired at a range of 150 yards.
3. Major GROVER, Operational Research Section, represented the AMGO(E) at the trials.

GUN

4. A Japanese 75 mm Field Gun (Pack Type) similar in detail to the equipment shown in AMGO Equipment memorandum Number 9 was used in the trials.
5. This gun was salvaged by 5 Aust Div Sal Unit in the BLUCHER POINT area and serviced by 2/83 Aust LAD.
6. Attached as Appendix "A" is a brief report on the preparation of the gun for firing and its performance during the trials.
7. The gun crew was selected from personnel of 2/14 Aust Fd Regt.

AMMUNITION

8. 10 rounds hollow charge HE ammunition, fitted with fuze 88 and 8 rounds AP shot were used. There were no blinds with the HE shell and the tracer of the AP shot functioned on all occasions.
9. All ammunition was thoroughly examined by an Armour Examiner AAOC before firing and as far as could be ascertained it performed quite normally during the tests.
10. Four of the 10 rounds hollow charge HE ammunition were fired electrically in a static position against the armour.

FRONTAL ARMOUR OF A MATILDA TANK

11. The frontal armour was cut from a disabled MATILDA tank at ref map 1/25000 FORTIFICATION POINT 622739 and was transported to and set up in the range area with its general line normal to the line of fire.
12. The armour was examined after each strike, the effect inside the tank being assessed by the result on a piece of sisalkraft placed approximately 20 inches behind the target.
13. Diagrams of the armour both before and after firing are attached as Appendix "B".

SCHEDULE OF EFFECT OF EACH ROUND

14. There were 8 hits with the hollow charge HE shell and 5 hits with the AP shot obtained on the target.
15. Attached as Appendix "C" is a schedule showing detailed effects of each hit scored on the armour.

PHOTOGRAPHS

16. Attached as Appendix "D" are a series of photographs taken during the trials by the Official Military History Section photographer attached to 5 Aust Div.

CONCLUSIONS

17. At close range, 75 mm HE hollow charge shell will penetrate any portion of the armour of a MATILDA tank, provided the trajectory is normal, or nearly normal, to the surface struck. While the hole forced through is only small, the blast and splinter effect within the tank is considerable, and would probably have fatal results for anyone near the point of impact.
18. While the splinter effect on the outside of the armour is not as great with hollow charge as it is with normal HE shell, the former will normally penetrate much further into the armour. The penetration is caused mainly by the concentrated blast and the burning effect, very little of it being due to the velocity of impact.
19. 75 mm AP shot is NOT effective against the armour of a MATILDA tank. At close range, even with good angle of impact, it will not penetrate more than $1\frac{1}{2}$ ". It would, however, have considerable effect on ports, tracks and external fittings.



PREPARATION AND FIRING 75 MM JAP GUN (PACK TYPE)

1. Before firing took place this gun was completely stripped and it has been found that the description in MGO Memorandum No 9 agreed.
2. The buffer cylinder was stripped and found to be an excellent piece of machinery. The packings used in the forward end of the cylinder around the piston were extremely good. Hydraulic Mineral Buffer Oil was used in the buffer cylinder in place of the normal solution of glycerine and water. Nothing unusual was noticed on firing.
3. There are NOT any safety precautions on the breech, and the firing mechanism may be fired when the breech is in any position. There is, however, on the left hand side of the breech when closed, a small thumb catch. This must be turned up before firing, otherwise the breech is likely to be forced open upon shock of discharge.
4. Normal sights for this eqpt were not available. A steel bracket was made and mounted on the left hand side of the gun. Onto this bracket was fitted a No 29 telescope which was tested and adjusted with the eqpt. Cross levelling was provided by means of a bubble already on the eqpt. On firing it was found that these sights gave fair results. The difficulties of making an accurate sight were considerable.
5. When a certain amount of rust was removed, and thorough maintenance carried out, the eqpt was assembled and found to work quite easily. There was however a large amount of play in the elevating and traversing gears, and in the wheels and axle. Due to this play the eqpt had to be laid very slowly and carefully and the firing lanyard pulled in prolongation of the piece.
6. During firing on 6 Apr 44 and 8 Apr 44 the eqpt behaved normally as a field piece. It is capable of maintaining an accurate and effective rate of fire.


=FRONT ARMAMENT "MATILDA" TANK -












BLACK AND WHITE EFFECT OF HOLLOW CHARGE TO AMMUNITION FIR D



2. Own Tps

(a) 32 US Div is to be concentrated in the SAIDOR area in preparation for an operational role elsewhere. It will remain staged in the SAIDOR area pending movement.

(b) Allied Air Force will continue responsibility for AA protection of SAIDOR.

INTENTION

3. 2 Aust Corps is responsible for the defence of the HUON PENINSULAR excl AA protection SAIDOR and FINSCHHAFFEN and for coastal operations west from SAIDOR.

METHOD

4. 5 Aust Div will:

(a) Relieve 32 US Div and assume responsibility for the ground defence of SAIDOR.

(b) Maintain contact with enemy forces in the BOGAMBI area and in the event of enemy withdrawal occupy MADANG.

5. In the execution of the above tasks Comd 5 Aust Div will first relieve the forward troops of 32 US Div. In conjunction with Comd 32 US Div he will decide the minimum strength required in the SAIDOR area for its ground protection and, with such forces as remain available to him, will maintain contact with the enemy by vigorous patrolling towards MADANG.
