MONTHLY REPORT

41 BN HOME FORCES

MEDICAL

1. GENERAL Since the beginning of the current month when this Unit moved to the bush in the Medowie area the weather has been generally mild with occasional winds and a little rain.
2. GENERAL HYGIENE
 - a. Tentage is adequate for protection. The system of building tents into the ground below surface level has not yet been put to the test of heavy rain, but it would appear that such an event would cause certain problems. The soil being mainly clay is not very absorbent and as the floor of the tents is not drained, the drying process if they become thoroughly wet would probably take a long time. There are not yet enough duckboards for all tents.
 - b. Messing is by companies. Facilities are adequate in general though more food safes would be advantageous.
 - c. Latrines are of deep trench type with fly proof individual seats.
 - d. Mosquitoes were very troublesome for the first week but have now almost disappeared. Fleas are prevalent in some areas.
 - e. Showers for bathing have been erected.
3. FOOD AND WATER Water for drinking and cooking is transported from Williamtown. Food is adequate but does not contain enough fresh green vegetables. Fruit is scarce.
4. EQUIPMENT AND DRUGS FOR R.A.P. Equipment is still not up to W.E. For example suspension bars for stretchers, though requisitioned for months ago have not arrived yet. Certain drugs are difficult to obtain. At the moment no Mist Tussi B has been available for over a week.
5. FIRST AID OUTFITS Have been supplied to outlying sub-units such as those at Stockton and Yacaaba.
6. MEDICAL BOARDS Forms D2 for 24 men have just been submitted to A.D.M.S. Of these men twelve have previously been boarded and are to be done again at the direction of D.D.M.S.
7. SICKNESS AND INJURIES No case of Dengue Fever has yet occurred. No confirmation from hospital has been received in any of a number of suspects evacuated from the unit.

Q. OPERATIONS DURING THE MONTH OF MAY 1942.

The month of May was a busy one for the Q Branch during which period the Bn. was moved from Greta Camp to battle stations.

The movement of stores commenced on the afternoon of 2nd and last load despatched at 0600 on 3rd. The whole of the unit was under canvas by nightfall.

Arrangements were made with the unit being relieved to take over all cooking utensils surplus to W.E. and leave behind similar stores drawn from Camp Q.M. Greta. Upon arrival at the area it was found that 5 soyer stoves were handed over and in order to fit out this unit's kitchens it was necessary to bring all camp stores from Greta.

Since occupying this area, every effort has been made to make the unit mobile by returning any unserviceable and unwanted stores and by the storage of ammunition produce long held awaiting permission to return to ordnance.

Weapons. During the month four M.L. 3" Mortars were taken over from 36 Bn. but these were deficient of certain items. The no. of weapons of this type now on hand is 10.

All other weapons are in good firing condition.

Clothing. The month of May saw the change over from Summer to Winter dress which caused a big demand for working dress. The same difficulty was again experienced in obtaining supplies of items such as shirts, Working Dress and S.D. Caps for M.T. drivers. These are still urgently required but unavailable.

Equipment. No equipment has been received by this unit during the past month. Although there are deficiencies in some items such as gas stores. All equipment on hand is in good order.

Rations. The ration position is satisfactory and, despite the number of points and premature conditions, worked smoothly. The period saw the commencement of the additional allowance per man which goes a long way towards making meals more palatable.

The month of May saw also the completion of an internal audit after many set backs occasioned by the movement of the unit to different localities.

MONTHLY REPORT OF 41 Bn. MOTOR TRANSPORT AS AT 28 May 42.

- (1) STRENGTH. 10 15cwt vans, three one ton vans, seven 3 ton lorries, one 3 ton covered lorry, ten WD type, twenty motor cycles, one 30 cwt lorry, two water lorries.
- (2) REPAIRS. Running repairs were carried out by 250 L.A.D. and there are six vehicles at workshop for repairs, four after accidents, and the remainder for mechanical adjustments.
- (3) ACCIDENTS. Three trucks were involved in minor accidents during the month.
- (4) MOVEMENTS. The move from GRETA to MEDOWIE was very successfully carried out with respect to transport. Our own vehicles formed "B" echelon while "A" echelon was provided by 102 Res. M.T.
- (5) TRAINING.
 - (A) A Drivers' School consisting of 16 Company drivers is being conducted. The personnel concerned are now ready for testing.
 - (B) In the past month, the drivers have had excellent training in conjunction with Platoon Beach Patrols, and Company moves.
- (6) MAINTENANCE. The standard of maintenance is very good. An N.C.O.'s inspection of Unit vehicles was carried out and several minor maintenance faults having been pointed out, were rectified.

2. SECURITY OF INFORMATION IN CORRESPONDENCE (E.C.R.O. 22/41 PARA 2)

1. The practice of including in communications to members of the forces serving overseas reference to past or impending embarkation of individual arrivals and departures of troopships etc. is to cease forthwith.
2. The majority of letters travel by air and as misfortune may easily deliver such into the hands of the enemy- even before ships referred to have cleared port- destruction of such vessels, together with personnel, may result from what is tantamount to criminal thoughtlessness.
3. Military personnel are instructed to impress these vital points upon civilian relatives and friends in order that it may not become necessary as the result of examination, to delay or withhold transmission of such communications.

3. SECURITY OF INFORMATION (LEAKAGE OF INFORMATION BY GOSSIP) (E.C.R.O. 28/41 PARA 3)

1. Cases have recently occurred of information regarding the movement of troops and H.M. Ships becoming public property.
2. All ranks will be warned against discussing Service matters with civilians at any time, or amongst themselves in Clubs, Theatres, Cafes or other public places.
3. All ranks will be warned that it is their duty to ensure by their reticence and by reporting immediately cases of indiscreet talk by others, that information useful to the enemy does not reach unauthorised persons.

4. CENSORSHIP AND ADDRESSING OF MAILS (2 Div R.O. 26/42 para. 5)

A considerable number of personnel are not availing themselves of the Concession Postal Rate, and it appears that they are handing letters to personnel proceeding on leave so that they may be included in Civil Postal Routes, to avoid censorship. In cases detected, disciplinary action will be taken against offenders.

Subtended is an extract from FSPB. Pam. 3 para 19(8):-

"It is forbidden to make use of the Civil Postal Service in a theatre of operations, or to transmit correspondence by the hand of an officer, soldier or civilian proceeding outside the theatre of operations except by recognised military messenger service."

Personnel should again be reminded of the necessity for the correct addressing of mail by their correspondents, (Vide 41 Bn. R.O. 9/42 para 6.) in order that mail may be expeditiously handled.

Detached personnel should have their mail addressed C/- the Unit or Bde to which they are attached, otherwise the mail will be forwarded to the Unit H.Q. for redirection, thus causing further delay.

5. MILITARY FORCES "ON ACTIVE SERVICE" (2 Div R.O. 26/42 para 1.)

Attention is directed to the proclamation dated 14 Apr. 42, published in the Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No. 114 dated 15 Apr. 42, whereby it was declared in respect of the areas com-

prising the Commonwealth and each of the territories, of the Commonwealth, that the persons subject to military law serving in those areas, are "On Active Service".

6. DISCIPLINE - ACTIVE SERVICE (N.S.W. L of C Area R.O. 2/42, para 5).

1. Attention is drawn to proclamation, 14 Apr. 42, (C.A.G. 114/42) the effect of which is that all persons subject to military law and serving in the Commonwealth or its Territories are now "On active Service."
2. "Active Service" is a type of "War Service". Hence the law applicable to members on "War Service" will continue to apply generally but with certain modifications particularly.
 - (a) Extension of application of A.A. and D.A. to persons accompanying AMF (DA 117A, AMR&O.298-9),
 - (b) Increased gravity of certain offences and special offences which are offences only when committed OAS (AA 4-9, 12, 19, 44(8))
 - (c) Increased disciplinary powers of C.Os. including Field Punishment and forfeiture of pay up to 28 days, such forfeiture being punitive. (AA 46(2)(d) MML 438, 409)
 - (d) Limitation of powers of C.Os. to deal with offences under AA 6, 8(2) and 9 (AMR&O 409, 437).

7. CIVIL LAW= APPLICATION TO MEMBERS OF THE FORCES. (N.S.W. L of C Area R.O. 2/42)

1. Some misapprehension appears to exist as to the liability of members of the Military Forces to the civil law.
2. Attention is drawn to the fact that members of the forces are liable to the provisions of civil law including all Statutory Provisions, such as the Motor Traffic Act, 1909-42 in the same way as civilians, and strict observance must be paid to all such provisions.
3. Offrs. and N.C.Os. in vehicles are responsible for seeing that the drivers obey the provisions of the Motor Traffic Act.

8. DRUGS - USE OF (N.S.W. L of C Area 3/42, para 6).

The use of Benzadrine or other drugs to combat fatigue is strictly forbidden. Their effect is uncertain and at times dangerous. They may cause serious accidents, if taken by M.T. drivers.

9. SUNDAY LEAVE FOR TPS IN SYDNEY. (2 Div. R.O. 27/42 para 5).

2. CENSORSHIP- 1 INF. BDE. R/O 19/42-PARA 5.


3. ROADS. DAMAGE TO-N.S.W. L OF C. R/C 3/42 PARA 5.

1. Complaints are being received from road authorities that military traffic is causing a great deal of unnecessary damage to unsurfaced road pavements and formations especially after rain.
2. All commanders will ensure that alternate hard surfaced routes are used when rain soaked roads show signs of deterioration. Passing places must be regulated to obviate vehicles pulling off on to soft shoulders, and driving close to edges of pavement is to be avoided.
3. Drivers of Bren carriers and similar vehicles are to exercise care in slewing, braking and accelerating to prevent undue wear of road surface.
4. Care exercised now will ensure that roads are in good order to withstand the heavy traffic inevitable should active operations ensue in this country.

4. DISCS IDENTIFICATION N.S.W. L OF C. R/O 4/42 Para 1.

- (1) Attention is drawn to the importance of wearing identification discs in the proper manner AND AT ALL TIMES.

- (a) The disc must be worn AROUND THE NECK.
- (b) Failure to wear discs will defeat the object for which they have been issued.
- (c) A fine chain may be worn in lieu of cord suspending the green disc around the neck but it must be of the required length-32"
- (d) Cord only should be used connecting Red and Green discs.



- (2) Unit commanders are responsible that Blood Type is stamped on the identity discs of all personnel.

5. COLOUR PATCHES- A.I.F.

Transport:- Transport Officer will arrange that two three ton trucks to be at Coy lines at 1615 hrs. Coys concerned will provide two M.T. drivers with meals at 1615 Hrs.

4. M.G. DESTRUCTION. (2 Aust. Corp Orders Ser. 2 No. 18 of 42)

method of denying use of our guns to enemy by the removal of the lock is not now effective. All Units will be instructed to demolish completely all abandoned guns and utilise captured enemy materials.

5. HYGIENE IN UNITS (First Aust Army Orders Ser. 1 No. 6).

1. It is the responsibility of the Commanding Officers of Units and through them, of every Officer and man, to insure that Hygiene is maintained at the highest possible degree of excellence.
2. This frequently calls for improvisation, as all necessary appliances, such as meat safes, fly traps, etc., cannot always be supplied immediately from official sources.
3. All useful forms of improvisation should therefore be encouraged, and any such found to be of real practical value should be reported to Army H.Q. with a view to particulars being circulated to other Units.

6. INTER-UNIT TRANSFERS- BROTHERS (First Aust. Army Order Ser. 1 No. 9)

1. An elder brother may apply through his Commanding Officer for the Transfer to his Unit of a younger brother.
2. The application, accompanied by evidence of relationship, and a copy of the applicants conduct sheet, will be submitted in accordance with Order No 8 to the Commanding Officer of the Unit in which the younger brother is serving.

7. AERODROME CONTROL-PREVENTION OF ACCIDENTS (Ref. 10 Div. R/O 21/42 Para 7.)

It is requested that any Army vehicle visiting Aerodromes and desirous of crossing the flying field runways, for inspection of outlying Army Posts, or any other purposes, first call at station H.Q. so that drivers of such vehicles may be acquainted with safety regulations at present in force on aerodrome.

8. DENGUE FEVER(10 Div. R.O. 21/42 para 16).

Certain types of mosquito are known to be concerned with the spread of Dengue Fever. To prevent the breeding of the mosquito, the following rules will be observed by all Units.

- (i) That all used tins likely to hold water, be gathered up, burnt, crushed, and buried.
- (ii) That all empty bottles be bagged and sent to salvage as soon as possible or until being removed, should be stacked in such a way as not to hold water.
- (iii) That receptacles used for the holding of water be covered.
- (iv) Where there is any pond, creek, dam or an area of water, which is permanent or nearly so, that A.D.M.S. H.Q. 10 Aust. Div. be notified in order that such water may be treated to prevent any likelihood of mosquito breeding.
- (v) Coy. Comds. will ensure that rules i, ii, & iii of the above are carried out in Coy. Areas.

9. ORGANISED SPORT ON SUNDAYS IN PUBLIC PARKS NEWCASTLE-(Ref.10 Div.23417)

1. Comd. 10 Aust. Div. wishes that all forms of sport be played at any time, and on any day whenever the situation permits, except as hereunder stipulated :-
2. No sport will be played on public parks controlled by the council of the City of Greater Newcastle on Sunday, and further, permission to use the public parks on any day will be made to the above council and approved by Aust. Div.

10. LEAVE- DRESS & BEARING WHILST ON.

C-in-C AUSTRALIAN MILITARY FORCES is very dissatisfied with the bearing and appearance of Australian Troops, both A.I.F. and A.M.F. whilst on leave and directs that immediate measures are to be taken to bring about a very big improvement.

It is the duty of all officers to ensure that troops proceeding on leave depart from depots, camps, schools, etc., properly clothed, clean and tidy.

Troops must be inspected by an Officer prior to departure and men not properly turned out are NOT to be granted leave.


10. Cont'd.

Troops are to be lectured on the subject of correct turnout and bearing whilst on leave. It must be impressed upon them that the appearance of untidy and unsoldierly troops in the streets has a very adverse effect on the morale of the general public which in turn adversely effects the national war effort.

The Military police are to check on the behaviour, dress and bearing of troops in cities and towns. Flagrant cases are to be reported to the Units concerned.

The untidy appearance and poor bearing of a number of Australian troops has become a matter of adverse criticism by the Australian Government and General Public. Comparisons are made between the bearing and turnout of U.S. and Australian Troops which are unfavourable to our troops.

These instructions are to be brought to the notice of all Officers and N.C.O's to ensure that the troops under their immediate command do not bring discredit upon the community and the Unit to which they have the honour to belong.

2. All ranks will be warned against discussing Service matters with civilians at any time, or amongst themselves in Clubs, Theatres, Cafes or other public places.

5. CENSORSHIP (FIRST AUSTRALIAN ARMY ORDER SER. 2 PARA 16)

1. Field censorship applies to all ranks in First Australian Army. All postal articles, including telegrams and parcels, must be franked by a commissioned officer and stamped with a unit censor stamp before delivery to Army postal authorities. Use of civilian postal and telegraphic facilities by Army personnel is prohibited. Civilian mail is liable to scrutiny by censors. If Military personnel are detected contravening censorship regulations they will be reported to the appropriate Military authorities for disciplinary action.
2. Franking Officers will ensure that unit locations are not divulged in correspondence.
3. The postal articles include letters, postcards, F.S. postcards, green envelopes and all parcels and telegrams written or prepared by any member of the forces.

6. EMPLOYMENT OF MEMBERS OF THE FORCES IN A PRIVATE CAPACITY (FIRST AUS. ARMY ORDER PARA 2)

Under no circumstances will the services of a soldier be utilised for reward or otherwise by any officer on or about the property owned or occupied by such officer for that officer's private purposes.

7. DISCIPLINE - INTERFERENCE WITH TELEPHONE COMMUNICATIONS (FIRST AUS. ARMY ORDER PARA 2)

Many cases have been reported of interruptions to civil telephone routes through acts of indiscipline on the part of military personnel. In each case brought under notice the aerial wire was broken as the result of Small Arms Fire.

Future acts of indiscipline in this regard will be considered as a most serious offence and dealt with accordingly.

8. DISCIPLINE - POWERS OF CIVIL POLICE (FIRST AUS. ARMY ORDER SER. 4 PARA 37)


1. Attention is directed to the fact that members of the A.M.F. are not exempt from civil law or civil arrest, and that all ranks are required to carry out the instructions of civil police provided that such instructions do not conflict with duty.
2. In practice the civil police do not generally interfere with soldiers, who are left to military police, but personnel are to be reminded that they still have the ordinary responsibility as citizens, even though in uniform.

9. SALVAGE MATERIALS - REQUISITIONS FOR (First Aus. Army Order Ser. 5 Para 65)

As from 15 May '42 all requests for materials from Salvage Depots (L of C) must be accompanied by a written order signed by an Officer of the Unit requiring the service.

10. MOTOR CYCLES

All personnel officers or O.Rs. requiring motor cycles from M.T. lines must requisition in the first instance through Bn H.Q. for prior approval by Adjutant.

SECURITY INCIDENT 19 MAY 42-REPORT.

1. On 25 May 42, 41Bn. I.O. received a report from Sgt. J.E. Boyle, O.C. 17 Pl. at Yacaaba as follows:-

- (a) On 19 May 42 a man in uniform and bearing the rank of lieut. reported to O.C. Pl. stating that he was Lieut. Donkin V.D.C. E.C. He produced to the Pl. Commander certain papers which he alleged were credentials from H.Q. E.C. These were examined by the Pl. Commander and considered by him to be in order.
- (b) The man stated that he had been in the Pl. area before reporting and had taken photographs. He had a camera in his possession but did not volunteer information as to what had been photographed. He also stated that he was moving up the coast to Queensland.
- (c) The Pl. Cmd. then conducted him over the Pl. area.
- (d) He then left the area without escort at about 1330 K.
- (e) It was noted that rank worn by the man was in the form of the usual two stars and not after the manner of the V.D.C. He was also wearing shirt and slacks. The driver was similarly dressed but bore no visible rank.

2. His description is as follows:-

Medium build.
About 50 years.
Height-5ft. 8 inches.
Wearing horn rimmed glasses.

3. (a) On receipt of the above information the I.O. returned to Bn. H.Q. and reported the facts to the C.O.
A further report was made to 1 Inf. Bde. at 0900hrs. 26 May 42.

(b) C.O. and I.O. then conducted further investigations and the following additional information was obtained.
The man crossed the punt from Tea Gardens to Hawk's Nest at 1020 hrs. 19 May 42 accompanied by a driver (in uniform) in a yellow Willys sedan license number GT 798. He recrossed the punt to Tea Gardens at about 1400 hrs. the same day.

4. This further information was also reported to Bde. at 2215 hrs, on the 27 May 42.

1. On 26 May 42, Sgt. McNeill, A/I.O. 41 Bn., reported the above incident in the first instance verbally to 1 Inf. Bde.
2. On 27 May 42, in compliance with 1 Inf. Bde. mge.0.335, the C.O. 41 Bn. and Sgt. McNeill proceeded to Yacaaba and further investigated the incident. At 2215 hrs. the same day, Sgt. McNeill telephoned Capt. O'Connor at 1 Inf. Bde. and gave particulars verbally in as much detail as possible.
3. Sgt. McNeill immediately reported the telephonic communication to C.O. 41 Bn. and further informed the C.O. that Capt. O'Connor instructed him (Sgt. McNeill) to await the return of a relevant witness (Sgt. Boyle, A/O.C. Pl. at Yacaaba) from leave on Sunday 31 May 42, and then submit a full written report.
4. For this reason no written report was previously submitted.

SECURITY INCIDENT - YACAABA.REPORT.

Further to this Unit's memo S 234/42 of 29 May 42 the following comprehensive report, incorporating information received from Sgt. J.E. BOYLE, A/O.C. 17 Pl. is submitted.

1. On 19 May, 42 a man accompanied by a driver crossed the punt from TEA GARDENS to HAWK'S NEST in a yellow WILLYS Sedan Registered No. GT-798 at about 1020 hrs. Both men were in uniform. The driver bore no visible badge of rank but the other man was wearing two stars in his epaulets. The latter's description is as follows :

Age:	About 55 years.
Height:	5'9" to 5'10"
Build:	Medium.
Complexion:	Fair.
Hair:	Fair, partly bald.
Eyes:	Blue.
Wearing hornrimmed glasses.	

2. This man next presented himself to Sgt. J.E. BOYLE at about 1400 hrs. the same day. Sgt. BOYLE was acting as O.C. 17 Pl. at YACAABA and in the temporary absence of Capt. FITZGERALD, J.E. was in charge of the position. He introduced himself as Lieut. DONKIN of V.D.C. H.Q. Intelligence Section and asked for the senior officer. On Sgt. BOYLE's explaining the absence of Capt. FITZGERALD to him, he produced certain credentials. These took the form of a memo on the usual Army headed paper stating that the bearer was Lieut. DONKIN of V.D.C. H.Q. Intelligence Section, as the man had stated, and his photograph was attached to the document. Sgt. BOYLE read the memo and compared the photograph with the man. He was satisfied that the man and his papers were genuine and after copying the credentials, showed the man over parts of the position. The latter had a camera with him and in Sgt. BOYLE's presence took a photograph of the neck of land connecting YACAABA to the mainland. He then took his departure along the beach in the direction of HAWK'S NEST. During his stay, the man was in Sgt. BOYLE's presence the whole time and was at no time in a position to take a photograph of SOUTH HEAD. He stated that he had also taken photographs of the beach before reaching the YACAABA posns

3. On his way back to HAWK'S NEST the man met Capt. FITZGERALD and had a discussion with him and then passed on and later recrossed the punt to REA GARDENS.

4. When Capt. FITZGERALD reached the YACAABA posn. Sgt. BOYLE told him of the man's visit.

5. On 26 May 42, 41 Bn A/I.O. visited YACAABA and was told of the incident by Sgt. BOYLE. The A/I.O. then returned to Bn. H.Q. and verbally reported the matter to C.O. and to Bde. H.Q. C.O. and A/I.O. conducted further investigations on 27 May 42 which revealed the crossing by punt to and from HAWK'S NEST as stated above. This information was also verbally passed on to Bde.

6. on 29 May 42, a written report was submitted to Bde. setting out the facts as then known. The only information lacking was further details which could only be obtained from Sgt. BOYLE. Sgt. BOYLE went on home leave on 26 May 42.

7. A copy of Sgt. BOYLE's report on the matter is attached.

REPORT - SECURITY INCIDENT - 19 MAY 42.

In reference to the above matter, I beg to report as follows :-

1. I am acting as O.C. 17 Pl. 41 Bn. at YACAABA. On 19 May, 42, during the absence of Capt. FITZGERALD, the senior Offr., I was in charge of the posn.
2. At about 1400 hrs a man in shirt and drill slacks and wearing two stars on his shoulders approached me and asked for the Offr. in charge. I told him I was in charge in the absence of Capt. FITZGERALD. He then said he was Lieut. DONKIN of V.D.C. H.Q. Intelligence Section and produced his identification card. The document had his photograph attached to it and bore the usual printed Army heading. It stated that Lieut. DONKIN was from the Intelligence Section of V.D.C. H.Q. and it bore the impress of a rubber stamp. I compared the photo with the bearer and assured myself that the paper was in order. I took a copy of it and filed it with the messages out.
3. The man's description is as follows :-

Age:	About 55 years.
Height:	5'9" to 5'10"
Build:	Medium.
Complexion:	Fair.
Eyes:	Blue.
Hair:	Fair - mostly bald.
Wearing horn-rimmed glasses.	
4. I gave him a cup of tea and took him up on a hill at the back of the position. I told him our general task but did not mention the presence of heavy artillery. He had a camera with him slung over his shoulder and took a photo of the neck of land connecting us to HAWK'S NEST. He told me that he had taken photos of the beach further down before coming to our posn.
5. He expressed his disappointment at not seeing the senior offr. and left about 1530 hrs. on foot in the direction of the pavilion. He had no one with him the whole of the time he was in our posn.
6. When Capt. FITZGERALD returned, I told him of the whole incident, and he stated that he had met the man on the beach himself and spoken to him. I took no further action in the matter.
7. On 26 May, 42, I was interrogated by Sgt. McNEILL and Sgt. UNICOMB of 41 Bn. I Sec. and gave the full particulars of the incident to them.

If in Coy. areas, return to tents and keep under cover, taking with them equipment, rifles & respirator which is to be worn in the "alert" position. Personnel detailed for special tasks will report immediately to their posts.
 - (c) All tps will remain under cover until "ALL CLEAR" is sounded and will NOT move from positions unless ordered to do so.
 - (d) The "ALL CLEAR" will be a succession of long & short blasts on the whistle at five second intervals and will originate from Air Defence H.Q. (to be selected).
 - (e) GAS ALARM. All tps are responsible for their own protection but Coys. will ensure that arrangements are made for an efficient alarm. "GAS CLEAR" will be given under local arrangements at the discretion of the Coy. Gas N.C.O. or Offr.
4. COMMUNICATION.
 - (a) Normal Sig. communication will be used & arrangements will be made with Sig. Offr. for a phone to be at Air Defence H.Q.
 - (b) In the event of interruption to normal channels, runners will be used and these tps must be well trained and be able to locate any point. A thorough knowledge of Air Defence Organisation and the localities where all parties are to be located is essential.
5. LIGHTING RESTRICTIONS.
 - (a) Lights must be shielded to keep light inside buildings or tents and NOT outside. These must be put out on alarm being sounded, excepting at R.A.P. & other essential services.
 - (b) Fires must be extinguished immediately alarm is sounded.
6. DECONTAMINATION.

Decontamination of gassed areas etc. will be carried out by Bn. Pioneers.
7. MEDICAL.
 - (a) Position of R.A.P. will be notified later.
 - (b) R.M.O. will control R.A.P. & stretcher bearers.
8. TRANSPORT.
 - (a) T.O. will arrange for dispersion of vehicles on alarm being sounded and will practice drivers in getting vehicles under cover quickly.
 - (b) Arrangements will be made for the safe storage of petrol and all other inflammable materials.

AIR DEFENCE 41 BN. (Cont'd)

- (c) Report is required once weekly (Saturdays) from T.O. regarding progress of (a) and (b) above.

9. SECTORS.

- (a) Coy. areas will be known as sectors and present designations will apply (i.e. "A" Coy. will be Sector "A" and so on.
- (b) Exceptions to the above are :- H.Q. Coy. will be "F" Sector, Bn. H.Q. "G" Sector, Ration Store "H" Sector, Bn. "Q" Store "I" Sector, M.T. Park "K" Sector.

10. Instructions as laid down will be immediately acted on. Any further instructions will be issued through Coy. Air Defence N.C.O's from time to time.
11. Any enquiries or suggestions regarding scheme are to be made to Bn. Air Defence Officer.
12. AIR ATTACK-COUNTER MEASURES. (2 Aust. Corps Order, Para 14 of 15 May '42)

- (i) The term "Passive Air Defence" will NOT be used. It has a bad moral effect. Measures against air attack form part of the defence scheme of every H.Q. and Unit. The non-active portion will include alarms and precautions against casualties and fire; but every H.Q. and Unit with means of attack against low flying aircraft will arrange to rehearse and stress the value, both moral and material, of the controlled employment of fire against the attacker.

- (ii) As soon as H.Q. is established a defence scheme will be drawn up and promulgated. The work of the H.Q. is to go on at all times, even during an air attack. There can be no question of "scattering or fleeing for cover". Personnel not on duty may disperse for cover when ordered, in an orderly manner.







3. TREES

All troops are warned that it is an offence to cut, blaze, or in any way disfigure trees in the area and offenders will be dealt with accordingly. Attention is drawn to 41 Bn R/o 38/41 Para 2.

4. RANK - CORRECT ADDRESSING OF

All ranks are warned that the practice of addressing each other by their first names must cease forthwith. Correct rank must be used at all times. Failure to observe the above will result in disciplinary action being taken.

5. PHOTOGRAPHS - TAKING OF IN FIELD

- (1) The use or possession of a camera in the field is forbidden except in accordance with official authority.
- (2) Any person having a camera in his possession must surrender same to Bn. H.Q. immediately for safe keeping.
- (3) The possession of a camera after promulgation of the above may result in confiscation of such camera and disciplinary action being taken.

6. DISCIPLINE- TROOPS MARCHING ALONG ROADS

1. The following procedure will be adopted when the Bde. Comd's car approaches from the front.
2. Men will not be called upon to march at attention.
3. Pl. Comds or N.C.O. in charge of party will salute Bde Comd.
4. Attention is to be paid to correct covering of files.
5. Men will march on sides of road and not in the centre, unless otherwise directed.
6. Rifles slung uniformly on shoulder as directed by O/C Party.

7. UNATTENDED VEHICLES (First Aus Army Order 5/42)

No vehicle shall be left unattended except in an authorised military parking area. Provost personnel will report all unattended vehicles through formation etc. H.Q.

8. M.T. VEHICLES - UNAUTHORISED USE (First Aus Army Order 5/42)

1. Vehicles are issued to Units as part of W.M., and in the case of a vehicle being found in the possession of a unit other than to which the vehicle is on charge the C.O. of the unit in which the vehicle is located will be held responsible.
2. All officers in charge of transport will take strict precautions to ensure that the vehicle in their charge are not removed by any unauthorised person. The only authority for vehicles to be removed from transport lines is the Transport Work Ticket (AAF G2) and disciplinary action will be taken if vehicles are found on the roads without work tickets.

9. MECHANICAL VEHICLES- DRIVING OF BY OFFICERS (2 Aus. Corps Order 5/42)

1. Attention is directed to Para 8 of SOs for Drivers of Mechanical Vehicles and Para 38 of SOs for the Operation and Maintenance of Mechanical Vehicles (Australia)
2. Officers and W.Os. will NOT drive cars or other vehicles except in the case of emergency or where, owing to the exigencies of the service, it is found necessary.
3. Such driving of any vehicles by officers and WOs will be confined to trip NOT involving periods of absence during which essential maintenance requirements become due.

10. M.T. ROAD DISCIPLINE (First Aus Army Order 7/42)

1. It is observed that many M.T. Drivers adopt the practice of changing to lower gear ratios when approaching road corners with a view to reducing speed and gaining rapid acceleration after turning.
2. This practice is both dangerous and harmful as the braking effect is absorbed by the rear wheels only, introducing the possibility of skidding and subjecting the rear tyres to increased wear.
3. Drivers are instructed to reduce speed by the application of the foot brake otherwise disciplinary action will be taken.

11. HEAD GEAR- MOTOR CYCLISTS (2 Aus Corps Order 5/42)

Hats are not to be worn by motor cyclists. Where caps have not yet been issued, steel helmets will be worn.

12. M.T. ACCIDENTS

1. There are three main causes of accidents as at present:-
 - a. Exceeding the speed limit
 - b. Blackout conditions
 - c. Narrow and dangerous roads
2. If M.T. drivers set their minds at this problem accidents causing deaths and injuries etc., and damage to vehicles could be avoided.
3. The speed limits laid down are not to be taken as the speed at which the vehicle must travel.
4. Speed limits imposed are maximum and should only be equalled in cases of emergency.
5. Throughout 1 Aus Inf Bde Group the normal speed to travel will be 10 miles less than the maximum imposed.

13. TRANSFERS A.M.F. TO R.A.A.F. (First Aus Army Order 6/42)

1. Transfer of personnel to the R.A.A.F. may now be approved subject to the following provisions :-
2. AIR CREWS
 - (a) Every facility will be given for personnel, including Subaltern Officers, to volunteer for R.A.A.F. AIR CREWS.
 - (b) Names of all volunteers will be recorded on Unit Casualty Returns.
 - (c) Personnel who, prior to the issue of this order, volunteered for the RAAF as Air Crew will also be recorded on a casualty return.
 - (d) Under arrangements to be made and notified by this H.Q. all Units will be visited by RAAF Recruiting Officers for the purpose of selecting AIR CREW personnel from volunteers.
 - (e) The names of subaltern officers volunteering and who are accepted will be reported to H.Q. First Aus. Army.
 - (f) All personnel accepted will remain with their units pending call up for active duty with the RAAF.
 - (g) On call up for active duty, officers so selected will be required to submit resignations of their commissions in the A.M.F. These resignations will be dated the day preceding that on which duty is taken up with the RAAF. A notation of resignation is to be made on the Casualty Return striking the officer concerned off Unit strength.
 - (h) Pending call up for duty, all RAAF (AIR CREWS) Reservists are required to undertake a course of study.

When any vehicle is involved in a traffic accident which is investigated by Civil Police, the driver will give to the police investigating the accident the following particulars :- No., Rank., Name, Unit - specifying the Unit is part of First Aust. Army.

7. PRIVATE VEHICLES.

Under no circumstances will private vehicles owned by Tps be allowed to remain within the Brigade area. This instruction applies to all vehicles viz. motor cars, motor cycles, and bicycles. Any personnel effected by the above will remove such vehicles immediately.

8. TAILOR.

Before any clothing is taken to S/Sgt. Tailor for repairs or alterations, approval certificate MUST first be obtained from Bn. Q Office. All personnel are reminded that they have been issued with a HOUSEWIFE. Please use same for minor repairs to clothing.

9. BN. BOOT SHOP.

3. CARRYING OUT OF DUTIES

Coy Comdrs & etc., will ensure that all personnel carry out their duties in a smart and soldier like manner.

4. RATIONS

Coy C.Q.M.S.s are reminded that it is their responsibility to ensure that all personnel moving from the unit over a meal period or periods have cut lunches in their possession.

5. SECURITY OF INFORMATION IN CORRESPONDENCE (E.C.R.O. 22/41 PARA 2)

1. The practice of including in communications to members of the forces serving overseas reference to past or impending embarkation of individual arrivals and departures of troopships etc. is to cease forthwith.
2. The majority of letters travel by air and as misfortune may easily deliver such into the hands of the enemy - even before ships referred to have cleared port - destruction of such vessels, together with personnel, may result from what is tantamount to criminal thoughtlessness.
3. Military personnel are instructed to impress these vital points upon civilian relatives and friends in order that it may not become necessary as the result of examination, to delay or withhold transmission of such communications.

6. SECURITY OF INFORMATION (LEAKAGE OF INFORMATION BY GOSSIP) (E.C.R.O. 28/41 PARA 3)

1. Cases have recently occurred of information regarding the movement of troops and H.M. Ships becoming public property.
2. All ranks are warned against discussing Service matters with civilians at any time, or amongst themselves in Clubs, Theatres, Cafes, or other public places.

7. COMPLIMENTS TO BE PAID TO OFFICERS (1 Aus. Inf. Bde. 27/17/10)

1. As a good deal of doubt exists as to the compliments to be paid to officers, attention is drawn to M.B.D. 1935 Chap. 5. and these instructions are to be carried out, except in the following cases:-
2. When officers of the rank of Brigadier and above pass bodies of troops on the march the men need not march to attention and Officers or N.C.O.s acting as officers only will salute.
3. When, however, the Officer concerned is on foot or horseback, the troops will march to attention and the usual compliments will be paid. NOTE. It is not necessary for troops to slope arms. The rifles will be slung uniformly throughout the platoon or sub-section and on the command eyes right, will turn the head and eyes to the right or left as the case may be.
4. When troops pass a car flying a pennant or flag they will salute as the car passes, irrespective of whether the troops are in a body or moving singly.

8. MOVE OF M.T. - NOTES ON (1 Aus Inf. Bde. 15/17/23)

On the recent move of M.T. the following points were noted and should receive attention :-

- (a) A good deal of confusion occurs at the embussing points due to the fact that men are not always allotted to vehicles.
- (b) In all moves by M.T., troops should be allotted to their vehicles in an assembly area and marched in vehicle groups to the embussing points. These groups being in the same order as vehicles. It is advisable to number the busses and every man in the group to be acquainted with the number of his vehicle. The men should be formed up beside their vehicle and embussed on a signal in the daylight and if in the dark passed down the column. The same for debussing, no one leaves the vehicles until the signal is given.
- (c) Too much noise at embussing and debussing points. Silence and quietness is essential and it is not possible for moves to be done expeditiously if everybody is shouting.
- (d) Routes not properly reconnoitred. In all moves, whether by M.T. or by foot, the route should be reconnoitred and guides left to direct, if this is necessary and on all occasions when the route leaves the main road.
- (e) Notes on the move by M.T. Attention is drawn to the fact that some men still do not sit correctly in vehicles, (back to back) with rifles in a perpendicular position, held between the knees and not hanging over the side of vehicles. Very often men start off correctly, but change their position during the route. An N.C.O. or senior Private should be placed in the vehicle with the troops, apart from the platoon commanded or higher officer, who may sit in the cabin of the vehicles.
- (f) No smoking should be allowed while in the vehicles.
- (g) Some responsible officer or N.C.O. should be specially detailed to move up and down the column to check distances. Drivers should be warned as to the interval between vehicles particularly in the case of troop carrying companies.

9. WATER BOARD INSTRUCTIONS (1 Inf Bde. 18/17/9)

- 1. The G.O.C. N.C.F. directs that no troops are to be camped closer than 500 yards from suction lines of Hunter District Water Board installations on Tomago water supply system, except in cases when a state of emergency exists, or is imminent or action joined with the enemy.
- 2. Every assistance is to be given the officers of the Hunter District Water Board by Unit Comdrs to ensure that the ground around such suction lines does not become fouled. The fouling of such ground is a definite menace to the health of the populace of Newcastle.
- 3. Where Camps are at present located within 500 yards of such suction lines, the necessary action will be taken to comply with the requirements as set out in paragraph (1).
- 4. Carriers Universal and M.T. will not be taken inside the wire fences which surround Water Board Pumping Stations.
- 5. The G.O.C. is most anxious that the harmonious relations which exist between the officials of the Hunter District Water Board and this formation are preserved, therefore, unit Comdrs will co-operate by doing everything possible to maintain such friendly relations.

10. DRESS OF TROOPS ON LEAVE IN NEWCASTLE ADMINISTRATIVE AREA (10th Aus Div 35579)

- 1. All personnel of units stationed in Newcastle Administrative Area when on leave within that area will wear F.S. Dress and in the case of N.C.O.s and O.R.s, web belts will also be worn.
- 2. To ensure that N.C.O.s and O.R.s proceeding on leave are correctly dressed units should arrange for all such personnel to be inspected by an officer immediately before they leave the camp area.
- 3. The above instructions will be strictly enforced on and after 19 June '42.

11. DISCIPLINE DURING MOVEMENT (First Aus. Army Order 5/42)

- 1. Complaints have been received by H.Q. First Aus. Army of bad conduct by parties of troops travelling by rail. Complaints include :-
 - (a) Shooting from moving trains;
 - (b) Foul Language;
 - (c) Noisy behaviour at night.
- 2. These complaints have been received from both military and civil sources and indicate lack of discipline in units, which Comdrs must take immediate action to correct

12. DRESS

N.C.O.s and O.R.s have not been paying sufficient attention to dress, this applies particularly to the wearing of equipment and steel helmets. O.C. Coys are to ensure that all personnel under their command are instructed in the correct manner of dress in order to ensure uniformity throughout the unit. Disciplinary action will be taken against offenders after promulgation of the above.

13 OUT OF BOUNDS, CLUB BALL ROOM NEWCASTLE (10th Aus Div 35819)

1. Comd. Newcastle Adm. Area (G.O.C. 10 Aus Div.) instructs that the abovenamed establishment be placed "out of bounds" as from date hereof.
2. This order will be promulgated to all troops who will be warned that their attendance at this hall will render them liable to punishment.

14. MISSING RIFLE

Any Coy having in their possession rifle No. 124512 will notify bn 'Q' office immediately.

3. FIRES

Troops are warned that open fires at night will not be permitted. Braziers constructed from oil drums etc., provided that they are covered from overhead view may be allowed.

4. LEAVE

Troops proceeding on home leave are warned that any person misconducting himself on the station platform prior to the departure of the train will be returned to the unit and his leave cancelled. Officer in charge of leave personnel will ensure that discipline is maintained and that the troops entrain in an orderly manner.

5. PERSONNEL EVACUATED OR DETACHED

Coys will ensure that all personnel evacuated or detached from the unit are in possession of their pay book and kits. This instruction applies particularly to personnel evacuated through sickness.

6. DOGS

Troops are instructed that they are not to encourage dogs within the Camp area. Any person found so doing will have disciplinary action taken against him.

7. CENSORSHIP (First Aus. Army Order 9/42 Para 123)

- Investigations and reports from district censors show that franking officers are NOT carrying out their duties as laid down in Army Fd Censorship Instn No.22.
- The large amount of uncensored mail posted in civil post boxes indicates that security officers in units and formations have not succeeded in impressing upon ALL ranks the need for security in correspondence.
- Unit and Formation Security Officers will ensure that all franking officers read and intial again Army Fd. Censorship Instn No.22 and that every franking officer prepares, submits to the security officer for approval and then delivers a series of short talks to his troops explaining the Censorship Instns. These talks must also emphasise the need for security in correspondence and the grave consequences that may follow leakage of information through faulty censorship.
- Franking Officers will warn their tps that uncensored mail is liable to censorship interception at Base, that many instances of evasion of censorship are being detected every week, and the offenders punished and that all future breeches of censorship Instns that are detected will be followed by disciplinary action.

8. CHANNELS OF COMMUNICATION FOR COMPLAINTS ETC., (First Aus Army Order 9/42 Para 126)

1. It has come to notice that many soldiers are writing to authorities outside the Army to have complaints, applications for leave or exemptions etc., dealt with.
2. This course is usually taken by a soldier who is ignorant of his rights and all ranks must be instructed as to the correct channels of communication and the actions to be taken on a complaint or request by a soldier. COs will ensure that a soldier's complaint or request is not neglected through a subordinate's lack of knowledge of his duty.
3. Personnel will be instructed that a soldier's quickest means of obtaining redress of a wrong is through his own C.O. If a soldier's case is genuine, he will obtain the necessary relief through his own unit, but if his case is not genuine, writing to an outside authority will not help. In a genuine case, approach to an outside authority will merely delay the relief which would be obtainable in the unit.
4. All ranks must understand that in certain circumstances, approach to an outside authority may constitute an offence. In the case of soldiers who have recently been enlisted from civilian life, this rule is not enforced strictly, but if a unit is in danger of failing in its task through pressure of outside correspondence, strong action will be necessary.

9. COLOUR PATCHES AIF AND EX AIF PERSONNEL SERVING WITH CMF UNITS (First Aus Army Order 9/42 Para 127)

1. Members and ex-members of AIF units who have served overseas and reinforcements who were allotted to the AIF units or proceeded overseas, who have been transferred to CMF units will wear the colour patch of the CMF unit with which they are serving and above it a miniature of the last AIF unit in which they served.
2. Members of the AIF who are "attached" to a CMF unit will wear only the colour patch of their AIF unit.
3. Personnel accepted as reinforcements for the AIF, but who have not been allotted to an AIF unit or proceeded overseas, and who are transferred to CMF units, will wear the colour patch of their CMF unit with a battle gray background of the same shape. Such colour patches will not exceed standard size.
4. Where complete AIF units are transferred to a new formation their colour patch will not be changed.
5. The following extracts from Standing Orders for Dress 1935 are repeated. Para 294.

"A member of the Australian Military Forces who served on active service overseas may wear, above the regimental colour patch a half size colour patch of the last unit of the AIF (or other force of the Empire) in which he so served.

Para. 295.

"When worn on sleeve head unit colour patch will be attached to the jacket sleeve 1" clear from top except when miniature patches are worn in addition, when the top of the miniature will be $\frac{1}{2}$ " from top of sleeve with $\frac{1}{2}$ inch space between miniature and unit colours.

10. DISCIPLINE DURING MOVEMENT (First Aus Army Order 9/42 Para 129)

1. Reports have been received that during movement parties of troops are in the habit of leaving Railway Stations in search of liquor, and that M.T. Columns are in the habit of staging at country hotels.
2. These reports indicate lack of training and discipline in units, which must be corrected immediately.

11. DISCIPLINE - TROOPS ON LEAVE (10 Aus Div R/O 25/42 Para 5)

Instances of troops turning off tail lights of parked cars has been brought to the notice of H.Q. 10th Aus. Div. In two cases the owners of the vehicles have been penalised. All units will advise troops of possible results of this practice and instruct that there must be no interference with property.

12. BINOCULARS, COMPASSES (IRISMATIC), AND WATCHES (G.R.O. O. 87)

1. Binoculars, Compasses (Irismatic), and Watches are unit stores and must remain so. When personnel to whom these articles are on issue are transferred from the unit for any reason, action will be taken to withdraw the items for re-issue.
2. The unit will keep a record of the registered Numbers of these articles on issue to each member.
3. All personnel at present in possession of these articles will report them to the unit H.Q.

13. COMPLAINTS BY MEMBERS OF THE FORCES (G.R.O. A. 108)

1. The attention of all ranks will be directed to A.M.R. & O. 293 (1) which provides as follows:-
"Officers and soldiers are forbidden to use any method of obtaining redress of real or supposed grievances other than those prescribed by the A.M.R. or authorised by these orders. Anonymous complaints and complaints through the press are forbidden."
2. The use of outside influence is forbidden by A.M.R. & O. 307 (1) which provides :-
"The use of outside influence to support complaints or applications for personal advantages, or in any matter effecting the position of an Officer or soldier is contrary to discipline. The only proper course for an Officer or soldier is to apply through his C.O. or to complain in accordance with the A.M.R. & these orders. Any attempt to obtain favourable consideration of requests or grievances by other means is forbidden." 1
3. The provisions of Division 1 of Part IV of the A.M.R. & O will be explained to all formed Units on parade at least once in every 3 months, and to all members in training depots once every month. The consequences of failing to observe the provisions of that division will be made clear.
4. All complaints or applications of the nature described in para. 2 above received at any H.Q. through unauthorised channels will be forwarded to the Units concerned, with a direction that the member will be paraded and informed of the Unit order on this matter and that any further failure to observe its provisions will be dealt with as an offence.

1. STRENGTH remains same as for May
2. REPAIRS Running repairs were carried out by Unit mechanic and 250 L.A.D. Four vehicles are still in workshops and have been there for four months which has proved very unsatisfactory on the part of workshops. Six motor cycles are also at workshops but this can only be expected as we find the Royal Enfields are not suitable for the hard work they have to do.
3. ACCIDENTS Two accidents occurred during the month, both very minor one being in a collision with a cow and no damage was caused to vehicle. Straying cattle have been a menace to drivers with blackout lights and we are very fortunate that more accidents of this nature have not occurred.

APPRECIATION OF THE SITUATION by Lt.-col
E.P.FOSTER, 41 BN COASTAL AREA AT 1600
hrs. 3 JUNE 42.

OBJECT

1. To defend WILLIAMTOWN Aerodrome and the area on the NORTH and NORTH EAST of NEWCASTLE.

FACTORS

2. GROUND -

(a) THE WHOLE AREA GENERALLY: About 20 Miles long by an average of 3 Miles wide, with the STOCKTON Peninsula on the SOUTH and a promontory known as SOLDIERS POINT projecting into PORT STEPHENS on the NORTH.

The whole of the front of this area from STOCKTON BREAKWATER on the SOUTH to CEMETERY POINT on the NORTH is SANDY BEACH fronting the PACIFIC OCEAN, and from there to excl. TELEGRAPH SHOAL - MORNA POINT Sq. 1345, it consists of rocky headlands and three small bays - FISHERMAN'S BAY and BIG and LITTLE KINGSLEY.

The rear defence line of this area is HUNTER RIVER - FULLERTON COVE to DAWSON DRAIN Sq. 8341, along drain to main rd., thence by main rd. to WILLIAMTOWN, thence by main rd. WILLIAMTOWN to NELSON'S BAY to where it crosses TILLIGERRY CREEK - NCLE 943462, thence down RIGHT BANK of TILLIGERRY CREEK to PORT STEPHENS and along the southerly shore of PORT STEPHENS to SALAMANDER BAY - PORT STEPHENS 124534.

The inter Bn. boundary is a line running from SALAMANDER BAY - PORT STEPHENS 124534 to MORNA POINT 135559.

An A/tk. obstacle has been constructed on the STOCKTON peninsula on a line from the HUNTER RIVER - NCLE 811367 to the beach at 834360. The area from STOCKTON to incl. of the obstacle is defended by fxd. def and special tps. and need not be further referred to in this appreciation.

The whole ground is divided into three areas and is shown on attached sketch as follows:-

Yellow

Main green

Red (Incl a Green area to the NORTH)

(b) YELLOW AREA: A strip of beach and high sand dunes (drift - length about 19 miles - width 600 yds. to 1600 yds.)

(1) The beach proper is totally exposed to the open sea. Tps. disposed there could for isolated limited distances command the water's edge with SA fire, but could be easily shelled or smoked by naval craft. An enemy could make this position untenable. Therefore the water's edge and beach should be covered by Arty, A/tk, or Mortar fire plus what MMG Fire can be brought to bear upon it from further back.

(11) Sand dunes in some places command the beach. Well back in the sand dunes there is a small amount of cover. These small patches of cover in some cases cover small portions of the beach itself, and some of the approaches to the dunes, and are within effective MMG range. Therefore MMG could be given tasks from there without undue risks.

(111) There is dead ground among the dunes and ridges - this must be covered by Mortar and arty fire.

(IV) It is not possible to cover the whole of this with fire - therefore points will have to be selected and used as strongposts but a mobile reserve as strong as possible must be retained so as to be readily available for counter attacks in the event of a break through any where on the beach.

(V) This area at isolated points can be crossed by carriers. These points therefore could be covered by what weapons are available for A/tk def.

(c) MAIN GREEN AREA : A belt of low timbered hills running behind the sandhills of varying depth intersected by roads and tracks shown on sketch plus some poorly defined sand tracks. The road shown on the sketch is bitumen and the tracks gravel. The timber is mixture of hardwood, ti-tree and healthy undergrowth. Generally speaking it would not be impenetrable by tanks, but their progress would not be easy and they would tend to make for roads and tracks. Carriers would find progress difficult off the tracks in most parts of the area. The tracks lead into the rds. and the main tcks. are YPRES TRACK, OAKFIELD TRACK, ADELIE TRACK and FRIEND'S TRACK. Therefore the heads of these tracks should be defended and strongposts established there for that purpose.

XX (1) YPRES TRACK At the head of this track the beaches are much more narrow than at other tracks but as the timbered area does not dominate the ~~area~~ beach, positions would have to be established on the beach.

(2) At MACK'S TRACK, OAKFIELD LANE and ADELIE TRACK the edge of the timber covers none of the beach and no appreciable amount of the dunes. Therefore to protect the heads of these tracks, positions must be established fwd. of the timber. OAKFIELD LANE is the SOUTHERN entrance to the lateral track.

(3) At FRIENDS TRACK there is high ground at and within the fringe of the timber affording good concealment. Although it does not command the whole of the water's edge, it commands the sand dunes to the front and flanks. Therefore, posns. should be established on this high ground.

(4) LATERAL TRACK This is a rd. which has been constructed behind the sand dunes commencing at ANNA BAY and terminating at OAKFIELD LANE.

(5) at CEMETERY POINT the beach takes a sharp turn - roughly from NORTH EAST to SOUTH EAST. On the end of the beach there are some elevated rocky positions and NORTH of these are steep timbered hill features. Therefore posts could be established behind the former posns. which are natural tank obstacles.

(6) About a mile EAST of CEMETERY POINT are several small inlets. These could afford landing places for a small party and must be watched.

(d) RED AREA with GREEN AREA to its NORTH The GREEN portion of this area is bounded on the NORTH by PORT STEPHENS and TILLIGERRY CREEK. The RED area from STOCKTON EAST is bounded on the WEST and NORTH by the rear def. line, The red portion is cleared, flat and low - the green portion is timbered and swampy but the SOLDIER'S POINT - SALAMANDER BAY area is undulating and in some parts hilly.

(1) From incl SOLDIER'S POINT to the limit of the area in SALAMANDER BAY there are good facilities for an enemy landing - therefore provision must be made for its protection.

(2) TILLIGERRY CREEK is flanked on the south generally speaking by Mangrove Swamps and must be watched.

(3) From the head of TILLIGERRY CREEK the area is virtually in a bottle-neck. There provision must be made for blocking this neck from enemy penetration from the NORTH.

(4) At this point the country is flat for about 1000yds. running to the timbered sand hills, and is excellent tank country. Tilligerry Creek bridge has been prepared for demolition.

XX (5) TILLIGERRY CREEK has been deepened and is partially a tank obstacle to the bridge - with little difficulty it could be made into an obstacle as far as the bridge itself. An open ditch has been constructed, running from TILLIGERRY CREEK where it is crossed by main NELSON'S BAY RD. - Ref Ncle 943462, in a SOUTHERLY direction to the sandhills at 943453. From the terminal point of the ditch at tank obstacle has been constructed to the beach at 954437. A trafficable road has been built immediately in rear of the obstacle and runs on to the beach.

(6) The RED area from Junc. ANNA BAY - NELSON'S BAY RD. - MORNA POINT 101484 to the A/tk obstacle at STOCKTON is flat country, fairly free of timber and suitable for tanks to operate on and also for the landing of paratroops. Provision must be therefore made to protect this area from attack by air-borne tps.

In the event of beach posns. being occupied to prevent a landing A/tk. guns should be sited at BOB'S FARM at the junction of Rds. Sq. MORNA POINT 0348, as it is considered the most suitable place fwd. of the TILLIGERRY CREEK A/tk. obstacle to deal with penetration of tanks.

(3) TIME and SPACE

(a) The area is unusually large - a concentration of tps. at any point threatened must be moved over long distances. This will take from 2 to 3 hours - therefore we must strive to attain the utmost mobility for reserves. Shortage of troops precludes disposing them between the strongposts except in a few places. Therefore retain a mobile reserve as large as possible so as to be able to rush resistance to any point threatened or to reinforce strongposts.

(b) An enemy's approach to the Aust. coastline cannot be effected without warning to defending troops. On the other hand it could not be assumed (in spite of existing searchlight system) that beyond a general warning of his approach to the coastline, defending troops would receive any warning at all of any proposed landing on the beaches within the area. Therefore lookouts and listening posts must be established well fwd. even on the beaches.

(c) Any warning the lookouts could give would be short. To meet an enemy thrust at short notice, the utmost mobility of reserves in this area is essential. For this purpose mobile troops should be held in rear of but reasonably close to, the TILLIGERRY CREEK A/tk obstacle.

(4) COMMS.

(a) The area is larger than Bn sigs. can handle. Therefore arrangements must be made for sig comm. (Line etc.) to be laid in advance formation.

(b) The bridge over TILLIGERRY CREEK is liable to easy demolition by enemy aircraft - provision must therefore be made for supplies to be dumped forward of this.

(5) RELATIVE STRENGTHS

(a) An enemy force landing will have a concentration of tps. giving him numerical superiority at whatever point he decides to strike. He will however probably lack in the early stages any considerable number of tanks and any tanks he does land will be light until he is firmly established. He can only be dealt with effectively by utilising surprise to the utmost from posns. secure or comparatively secure from tank attack.

(b) Our forces doubtless numerically weaker will have to rely upon their capacity for fighting in timber, their local knowledge and their superiority in mobility in the early stages.

COURSE OPEN TO BOTH SIDES.

(6) (a) THE ENEMY

(1) May land on the beach area and proceed directly inland across the dunes. He will either :-

(a) meet any strong posts at the entrances of YPRES TRACK, MACK'S TRACK, OAKFIELD LANE A/tk. obstacle ADELIE TRACK or FRIEND'S TRACK but owing to domination to fixed defences is less likely to land south of MACK'S TRACK.

(b) strike a point between those meeting with little or no opposition until reserves can be brought forward to meet him.

(2) May land on the beach towards CEMETERY POINT and move EASTERLY with the object of taking the POINT.

(3) Force an entrance into PORT STEPHENS and land in vicinity of SOLDIER'S POINT and SALAMANDER BAY.

(4) Move up to TILLIGERRY CREEK and land. He will have to be careful in the spot selected for the landing - otherwise on account of the swampy ground he will have difficulty with heavy vehicles.

(5) Land in 13 Bn area and move through there on to our area.

(6) Land on the NORTHERN side of PORT STEPHENS and then move SOUTH - WEST towards WILLIAMTOWN Aerodrome. We should have ample warning of this and time in which to move our forces to meet the threat.

(b) TO US

(1) Dispose our tps. on the beach. He can shell and smoke them from the sea.

(2) Keep all forces mobile in the rear of the A/tk. obstacle TILLIGERRY CREEK with standing patrols on the beach posns. in order to give warning of an impending landing. This will allow us time to oppose him anywhere before he is firmly established.

(3) Dispose all forces at the entrances to the tracks referred to - this will be ineffective in the enemy effects a penetration elsewhere except that we may be able to harass his flanks.

(4) Hold the heads of those ~~flanks~~ tracks and CEMETERY POINT with small parties, well dug in and camouflaged and disposed on commanding features with as large a mobile reserve as possible. This could have the effect of disorganising his attacking forces separating them into small bodies, thus making them more vulnerable to counter attack.

(5) Occupy defensive posns. behind A/tk. obstacle at TILLIGERRY CREEK and along beach SOUTH of the obstacle.
