



PART I

OPERATIONS

ENEMY (iii) AIR :-

B17s bombed MADANG aerodrome on morning of 29 May, starting fires.

MADANG and ALMISHEAEN dock areas were also bombed with unobserved results.

At 1310K/29 B24s scored two near misses on the bow of a transport in position 0400S 14445E. The vessel was left smoking.

At 0800K30 Beauforts attacked GASHATA. Nil results observed. Adverse weather prevented all aircraft finding the target and one aircraft dropped bombs on MU starting small fires.

ENEMY (ii) SEA :-

Aircraft in flight at 0610K/29 reported three 1,500 to 5,000 ton cargo vessels in position 0510S 14552E (off MADANG), course 180, speed 10 knots.

At 1045K/29 one destroyer, three medium cargo vessels and one small cargo vessel were reported stationary in HANSA BAY with twelve aircraft as top cover.

At 1740K/29 two 5,000 ton transports, three 3/5,000 ton cargo vessels and one Destroyer were sighted in position 0400S 14500E, course 45 (approx 20 miles NE HANSA BAY).

(Evidently the convoy reported earlier in HANSA BAY with some additions).

ENEMY (iii) AIR :-

RABAUL area :-

A new airfield, almost completed, has been constructed by the Japanese at KERAVAT on the east coast of ATALIKLIKUN Bay approx 15 miles SW of RABAUL. It was first discovered on 19 May.

Photographs taken two days later disclose that the strip is 2,000 yards long with an average width of 180 yards. At least five earth revetments are under construction, and development generally is proceeding at a rapid rate.

There is an excellent motor highway, 50 miles long, between RABAUL and KERAVAT. It runs parallel to the shore, has no steep grades, and is wide enough for two-way traffic. After crossing the KERAVAT River by a steel bridge near the old Government Experimental farm, the motor road

and, becoming an improved track which continues on to CAPE LIVIRT.

It is considered that the object of the new KERAVIT airfield is to provide a further dispersal field for the aircraft (approx 250 on 26 May) now operating from RABAUL.

PART I

OPERATIONS

OWN (iii) AIR :-

At 0400X/30 the airfields at NEWAK and HORAM were bombed. Fires were started and a probable ammunition dump at NEWAK was hit.

GASHATA jetty was bombed.

ENEMY (ii) SEA :-

The enemy convoy reported yesterday NW of HANSA BAY was attacked by our aircraft. Two near misses on the leading destroyer are reported, smoke and loss of speed being observed.

RABAUL :

Although of course the tonnage in any port fluctuates from week to week, it was not unusual during Feb - Mar 43 to discover sixty to seventy vessels at RABAUL, totalling up to 200,000 tons of merchant shipping. On 26 Mar, for example, the harbour contained a total of sixty six vessels, of which thirty six (aggregating 136,000 tons) were merchant ships. Since this time, however, the number of ships using RABAUL has steadily declined.

The most recent photographs of RABAUL are those of 22 May and they show the following forty two vessels in the harbour. -

5 destroyers	23 merchant vessels totalling
5 submarines	37,000 tons and including an
6 patrol craft	unusually large number of small freighter-transports.

A Japanese PW, questioned on field rations, stated that they fell into two classes. The contents of the rations help to explain the Japanese ability to move almost anywhere without appearing unduly to worry over their immediate administrative problems. These are the rations :-

- Class "A" (5 days carried on the man)
 1 Sho 5 Go (4.77 pints) unboiled milk
10 tins Meat and Vegetables.

Powdered Soya Sauce
Powdered Miso (Soya Paste)
Dehydrated Potatoes
Dried Daikon (a large type of radish)
Umeboshi (pickled plums)
Class "B" (2 days carried on the man)

- iii The meaning of this is not quite clear. "Unboiled" may possibly refer to condensed or powdered.

PART I

OPERATIONS

OUR (iii) AIR :-

Our heavy bombers attacked NEWAK and DAGUA on 28 May. Five fires were started. Other results were not observed.

At 0545K/28 a medium bomber attacked supply dump area at MELA POINT. Bombs fell in the target area.

ENEMY (ii) SEA :-

During the afternoon of 28 May one of our recce aircraft reported three 5,000 ton cargo vessels, two destroyers or light cruisers, 1 probable gunboat in position 0240S 14430E (NE of NEWAF), course 150, speed 10 knots. By 1730K this convoy had reached position 0334S 14443E, course 160 and at 2332K was reported proceeding in diamond formation.

PART II

6. EQUIPMENT

Mortar Ranging by Tracer Fire

A novel method of ranging on, or indicating targets to mortars, has been introduced by the Japanese in BURMA. They site two LGs on the target and open up with tracer. About 30 seconds later, the first mortar bomb falls, being aimed at the intersection of the two tracer streams.

Although a certain amount of organization and training is necessary for the operation of this system of target indication, it is considered to have the advantage of being able to spot and indicate targets which could not be observed from a static CP.

Safety Precautions with Japanese HE Grenades

Tests recently carried out with a number of captured Japanese Type "91" hand grenades show that these weapons, so much in favour with the Japanese, might well cause more harm to the thrower than to the intended victims.

Although the delay fuse of the grenade is supposed to be four to five seconds (and is so marked), the delay train has been known to burn in much less time. All our troops, therefore, who capture these grenades and use them, should be informed that they must be thrown immediately the head of the grenade has been struck.

While the delay train is burning, a considerable quantity of black smoke is emitted from the escape hole at the base of the fuse tube. Care should be taken to keep the hand clear of this hole.

This smoke emission serves as a feature in recognising the grenade when in flight.

7. ENEMY TACTICS

A comparison of Japanese tactics employed on the recent engagements on LABABIA RIDGE and BOBDUBI RIDGE shows great similarity in the method of using supporting weapons.

In both actions, the enemy employed his MGs well forward, using them to supplement the supporting fire from LMGs placed so that they could lay down a belt of fire in front of the LMGs as a secondary task. In the heavy jungle, it was difficult to judge positions of these guns, owing to "echoes" caused by the trees, and even when the general direction had been judged, it was almost impossible to pinpoint their positions by the flash owing to the heavy foliage.

In both attacks, attempts were made to divert the attention of our troops from the forward movement of his MGs by intense sniping.

The grenade discharger was also used by the enemy but the effectiveness of this weapon was nullified by the failure of many bombs to explode, and the fact that some bombs did not clear the trees exploding amongst the troops.

In the attack on LABABIA RIDGE, the use of cover prior to first contact was excellent, but in subsequent attacks no attempt was made to disguise movement, our troops obtaining early warning from loud noises and crashes. Prior to, and during one attack, loud shoutings and screams were reported.

When hit, the enemy gave vent to loud screams, and squeals without exception. The attack on BOBDUBI RIDGE was preceded by heavy artillery and mortar concentrations.

Throughout the engagement, both artillery and small arms fire was poor, but the mortar fire, however, was extremely accurate.

Prior to the BOBDUBI RIDGE action, the enemy used a new method of orienting his troops to the ground. An aircraft flew over the whole objective, dropping flares on the main topographical features.

8. GENERAL

Secret and Confidential Markings

Coloured paper tabs are pasted on decoded dispatches to indicate their classification. The tabs are about two inches long and less than one inch wide. They are pasted at the lower right hand corner of the form, about one inch sticking out beyond the margin of the paper. A red tab indicates the dispatch is secret (CUNKI) and a blue tab that it is confidential (KAMPU or SHOHÔ). There are no ideographs on these tabs.

Classified documents are stamped with red seals to indicate their restricted nature. There are four classifications for documents, as follows :

GUNJI KIMITSU
(GUNJI)

Vital Military Secret

GUNJI HIMITSU
(GUNJI)

Military Secret

GUNJI GOKUHI
(GOKUHI)

Confidential

Restricted

The last classification restricts the circulation of the matter concerned to members of the armed services.

The following two classifications also appear :-

RIKUGUN HIMITSU Army Secret

This appears to differ from GUNJI HIMITSU in that it is restricted solely to the Army, whereas the GUNJI HIMITSU is a secret classification for both services.

GUNJI KIMITSU - This is a general classification, referring to all documents classified higher than restricted, and is not a specific classification.

Documents will be stamped in red as GUNJI KIMITSU, GUNJI HIMITSU, GUNJI GOKUHI or BUGAIHI. A third seal stamp may appear on any type of classified document. This indicates that the document is a copy and not the original. It appears on all copies.

Survivors from BISLICH Sea Convoy - 2/4 Mar 43

LAE - SALAWAUA area :

An observer who was in the HELDSBACH area during, and subsequent to, the BISMARCK Sea action, has just returned and given the following information.

On 3 Mar a damaged destroyer hove to off HELDSBACH and unloaded stores and personnel at great speed. On the following day it was sunk by allied aircraft. Other landings were made from barges and small craft at various points along the coast ranging from SIC (50 miles NW of FINSCHEFFEL) to HOPOL. Careful analysis of native reports results in an estimated total of 1200 survivors. Of these it was stated that 300 remained at FINSCHEFFEL; 200 made their way to SAIDOR and the balance of 800 reached LAE.

Although the above does not materially affect the general estimate of 5,000 in the LAE - SALAWAUA area, it does provide the first reliable basis for an estimate of the number of survivors.

KUDANG - RINU VALLEY area :

In order to approach the CHIMBU - KIWI BEKA Plateau by the GUEBBI, BUNDI and WESI routes, the Japanese might normally be expected to cross the RINU at SEPULU, CHULU and KESMALLI respectively.

They would probably realise, from their recent contact with our force at WESA, that we have the above crossings watched. It would therefore be logical to expect them to try to cross elsewhere.

Information now received from natives at SINS indicates that on 24 May the enemy had reached the RINU River at SINI. This village is roughly midway between CHULU and KISANAI, and only eight miles from KUNDI. A native from YOMPAI was said to be acting as a guide.

Aerial reconnaissance on 26 May disclosed that the road west of KUDANG (probably the road to AMWIL) appeared to be in first class condition. Most of the tracks in this area, including those in the vicinity of HUSIK and OSULU, appeared "jeepable".

SECURITY

NATIVE MOVEMENT

As natives in other theatres of war have been successfully used as 5th columnists by the Japanese, the possibility of the natives of this area being likewise employed either through compulsion or of their own free will should not be ignored.

Because of the splendid services rendered by many natives on the KOKODI Trail popular opinion is that all natives are pro-allies. This is not the case and there are many who for

reasons over which there can be no control would be only too willing to assist the enemy.

Natives, simply because they are natives, are allowed to do things which can seriously jeopardise our security.

All personnel must realize that bush natives and even mission natives who have gone bush cannot be controlled by censorship and that anything they see or hear is likely to be passed on either by word of mouth or by letter. The average native writing to a friend in an area adjacent to the enemy may, as a piece of news for his friends, say that "PAIV PELLA BEN BILUS I SEAP LONG DOB/DURA NAU OL I GIT TU PELLA ARS BILONG IN", which in simple pidgin means that there are fifty P58s (Lightnings) at DOBODURA. The dangers of such a leakage need no comment.

Mail can and is being forwarded between natives by such means as the crews of small ships, lakatois, etc, plying up and down the coast and by many other channels.

Although there are no definite reports that the Japanese are using natives for this type of work all troops would do well to remember that "Forewarned is forearmed" even if they are armed only with the knowledge that all natives are not necessarily "Fuzzy Wuzzie Angels".

SECURITY MINDEDNESS

The following extract shows the increasing security mindedness of troops in the N.W. GUINEA area ...

"I can't understand Joe worrying about pieces being cut out of his letter. If anything he ought to be pleased that the authorities look after troops as they do. If he or anybody else, both soldiers and civilians, had enough commonsense, they'd realize that all this darn fool talk is only asking for trouble. Everybody should be made to see the picture "Next of Kin" - they'd see then how foolish all this talk is."

OWN (iii) AIR :-

LAE. At 1000K/27 our medium bombers and Beaufighters attacked the airfield, TERRACE, EMERYS, JACOSENS, MALAHANG and LASU areas, bombing and strafing. Many fires and explosions occurred. Smoke was visible for 75 miles.

ENEMY (ii) SEA :-

It must be presumed that submarine reinforcement of the LAE - SALAWAUA area is continuing, since sightings of submarines off Cape CRFORD are still being regularly made. Six (three on a northerly and three on a southerly course) were reported here between 19 and 25 May. Roughly speaking, all sightings have been made at either first or last light each day, and it is stated that each submarine seen has had large white markings on the conning tower.

Vessels observed in transit include two destroyers which may possibly have visited GASHATA about dusk 23 May, and have left about midnight on the return journey to RABAUL.

1. The Wireless Set 108 Mk II, is designed to provide Radio Telephony communication within infantry battalions and field regiments.
2. Recent operations in jungle warfare have established that certain modifications embodied in the set considerably improve both its range and reliability when operating under tropical conditions.
3. The modifications include the provision of facilities for establishing communication by Wireless Telegraphy (MORSE), in addition to Radio Telephony, and are intended as an interim measure until such time as the Wireless Set 108 is replaced by a patrol set of different design which is now being developed.
4. It is anticipated that the modified set, which will be known as the Wireless Set 108 Mk III, will be issued to units during the latter part of Jul 45.
5. Regimental signallers have not previously been required to use Morse code except to a limited extent when operating on line circuits. The introduction of the modified set and, subsequently, the new patrol set, demands a higher standard of efficiency in Morse operating than that hitherto accepted.
6. Formations and units concerned will therefore take action to ensure that the standard of Morse operating by regimental signal personnel is raised to a degree sufficient to ensure efficient operation of both the Wireless Set 108 Mk III and, ultimately, the patrol set mentioned above.
7. The objective to be reached by regimental signal operators is the ability to maintain communications at the rate of 12 words per minute. The telephone D Mk V has been found particularly suitable for training purposes as the buzzer note closely resembles the note characteristic of the Wireless Set 108 Mk III.
8. Copies of GS publication "The Morse Code and How to Learn It" are available at all stationery depots and the utmost value should be made of the instructions contained therein during training.

BUANG RIVER area :-

An Allied patrol on 19 May moved down a track to within a mile of the mouth of the BUANG RIVER. They discovered two huts which appeared to have been occupied by the enemy a week earlier and there were many indications that the Japanese had been looking for food. Some natives with the patrol later went forward towards the beach and sighted a party of twelve Japanese moving north. Information from other native sources and AFCAU indicates that this patrol probably moved on to LIE. Patrols in this area may account for the earlier native reports of detachments up to 40 strong at the mouth of the BUANG and B.USSI R.

SAIDOR area :-

It will be recalled that between 26 Mar and 15 Apr, enemy patrols from BOGANIM and PINCHIKERI were very active along the R.M coast, especially in the vicinity of SAIDOR.

During the last twelve days, enemy patrols in strength have carried out extensive patrolling in this area, penetrating as far inland as MATKO, SIROG and GUNRACE. A standing patrol was left at SUNDAM and another party covers the difficult track which leads from MATKO across the PINTSERRE RANGE and along the GUSAP RIVER to the R.M Valley.

It is further reported that barges are continually working along the coast at night.

MAINING - RAINU VALLEY :-

It is stated that, according to native reports, the Japanese are leaving MADANG by all roads, bound for the SURKI, BUDI, and MESA areas. They are said to be heavily equipped, but to date no indication of strength has been given.

It is significant that the places named as their destination command three of the routes from the RAIN to the MESA BUDI Plateau.

SEPIK Area :-

A report from native sources indicates that the enemy have again visited BURUI where they cleared the landing ground and departed. ZOROGO, twelve miles east of BURUI, was visited by an enemy party in a small vessel. They landed and took compass bearings. The enemy were last in the BURUI area at the beginning of March when they burnt the village and then withdrew.

A further enemy party is reported to be headed towards MAINAI from MAPRIK. MAINAI is approximately fifty miles WSW of MAPRIK.

A later native report states that another party, consisting of 200 Japanese, is moving to SURKI via MAPRIK. (A good road joins these two places). This would be in keeping with the report of work on the strip at SURKI, but strips are plentiful along the coast and it is difficult to see what the enemy expects to gain from putting SURKI into a serviceable condition.

These are likely to be the earlier models of the P40 and should easily be recognised upon careful observation. All pilots and aircraft warning personnel should be particularly observant of any P40s in their vicinity, since the enemy may use these planes to achieve a surprise attack.

Other Allied planes which are reliably believed to be in the hands of the Japanese and which might also be used for surprise attacks, either against ground installations or planes in flight, include Brewster Buffaloes, Hurricanes, S 10s, Blenheims, Hudsons and B17s.

Barge Activity N. W. GULF

- (a) It has long been known that there is enemy barge traffic along the N. W. GULF coast between NABE, ALBAG and possibly L.M. Few sightings have however, been made by our aircraft during their daylight reconnaissances.
- (b) During the last two nights, advantage has been taken of moonlight conditions to conduct special air searches for this traffic. Results confirm the suspicion that these craft move during the hours of darkness, lying up camouflaged by day.
- (c) At 2032 hrs 19 May, two barges loaded with square wooden boxes were strafed two miles south of Cape GRETH (ten miles south of KIRSCHEN) while moving in a S. direction.
- (d) Between 1310 and 2345 hrs 20 May, a total of fourteen barges, all under way, were sighted. A convoy of ten near S.M. Island was attacked and five sunk, the remainder being beached. In the vicinity of the small islands off Cape GRETH, two barges loaded with ammunition and personnel, and being towed by a launch, were sunk; while another large received a direct hit.

- (e) Sightings along the coast of ILL. BRITAIN have recently been on a larger scale than usual, a total of over fifty barges being observed between 6 and 9 May along the north coast, and over thirty between 13 and 18 May along the south coast. Activity has been especially noticeable in the vicinity of ROME Island. In some cases the barges were packed with troops and supplies.
- (f) In the WEMM area, the enemy have well over a hundred barges, about forty of which are permanently employed around the port. The remainder are normally dispersed along the coast nearby. When a large convoy is expected, all available barges are assembled in order to unload and turn the ships around as speedily as possible. Thus when the ship vessel convoy of 12 May arrived, it was attended by ninety barges, as photographs showed.
- (g) There has for a long time been daily barge movement between ~~the~~ ~~the~~ and LEB-LRU. Eighteen barges were counted at LRU on 19 May.

GENERAL

1. Attached at Appendix "A" is tracing of the type of MMG posts to be adopted in the MILNE BAY area and which is to be completed as soon as possible.

MMG POSTS

2. (a) The pit will be 6'6" x 6'6" with a coconut log freeboard surface projecting inwards 6 inches from the top.
 (b) The tripod rests on a raised platform 6 inches from the bottom of the gun pit.
 (c) Recesses for ammunition boxes etc are provided in all four walls of the gun pit and strengthened by fixed frames.
 (d) A camouflage spider is necessary for concealment.

SECTION POSTS

3. (a) Attached at Appendix "B" is a standard layout of an MMG section post.
 (b) This type of post will be adopted forthwith and will be adapted to the local conditions at each approved machine gun site.

ADVANTAGES

4. It will be seen from the tracings that the layout of each position enables all round fire to be produced. It is simple and communications are ideal.

CONSTRUCTION

5. (a) Where section posts are sited on low lying ground, it is desirable that a simple plan of drainage for the post be first considered and only when this is not practicable will the position be built above ground level.
 (b) Before the construction of the section posts a camouflage plan must be decided upon.

CAMOUFLAGE

6. It is not sufficient for the finished post to be camouflaged and plans will be made so that all works are camouflaged while in progress, and at no time visible from the air.



to distinguish from other image, which passes through an adjustable prism, operated by rotating range scale. Range is found in the normal manner of bringing both images into coincidence and reading off indicated figure on scale.

1. In order that requests for Air Support may be clearly interpreted and immediate action taken, the following information will be included in requests preferably in the order listed.

- (a) If mission is coordinated with movement of friendly troops, state so.
 - (b) Description of target and its exact location referring specifically to map or photo used.
 - (c) Disposition of friendly troops in relation to target and designation of bombsite.
 - (d) Time limits of requested support (if time of attack is immaterial state "time immaterial"). The inclusion of LT (latest time over target) under bombsite on the Air Support pro forma message form covers this requirement, and will indicate the latest time for COMPLETION of the attack.
 - (e) Direction and rate of movement (if this is not mentioned in message target will be assumed to be stationary).
 - (f) Description, and location of secondary target (if adequate secondary target is not immediately apparent do not include this element in message as Headquarters will usually have a secondary target in mind).
 - (g) If a late intelligence summary of target and situation is to follow request should be concluded "X" follows.
2. If at any time between origin of request and the air attack, the situation is changed in any degree whatsoever, Air Support should be notified immediately.
3. A reply can be expected to requests indicating approval or disapproval and if approval the estimated time of arrival over target (ETA), and number of aircraft.
4. In a case where close, direct support is to be given to an advance, and a time limit has been set, it must be remembered that weather can prevent the aircraft getting in to the target at the last minute, and this must be provided for in any plan. In this type of support under no circumstances will air action be taken after the time laid down for the completion of the strike. Many factors can delay aircraft being made available and reaching the target so full consideration should be given to this when laying

/down

down a LTT. If by the time the request is received by Air Support HQ, it is obvious that the aircraft cannot reach the target in time reply "NOT approved" will be sent immediately.

5. These instructions will be promulgated down to Battalion etc Commanders so that all units may become familiar with the procedure in calling for Direct Air Support.

SUMMARY OF ENEMY MOVEMENTSLAND

Documents captured on LABABIA ridge on 11/12 May confirm the suggestion on the change over of enemy forces put forward last week.

Two battalions of the 102 Inf Regt have relieved the MILITRU No 2 SNLP in the area KUB - LABABIA ridge. These, with some attached troops, participated in the attack of 9 May. The regrouping of enemy forces is dealt with in detail in Part II - Enemy COB Land.

RAHU Valley

From time to time attention has been directed to the growing Japanese interest in the MADANG - BOGADJI hinterland. One obvious and immediate object would be and no doubt is, the development of the overland trade route from MADANG to LAE. However, in addition to this, during the past ten days there have been increasing pointers to an interest in the approaches to the BEMA BEMA - WE HAGEN Plateau. An Allied watching post at WESA (six miles SOUTH of LISAWAI) was over-run on 10 May. The enemy are reported, through native sources, to be at a number of villages all within an eight mile radius of LAIGULLI. The natives state that the Japanese patrols said that fighting troops were following behind them. Up to 19 May the enemy had made five aerial reconnaissances in the BEMA BEMA area, one aircraft circling four times LASOKA and GROKA. LASOKA, a former mission station with an emergency landing ground, is on the track to BEMA BEMA from the RAHU valley via ZAIWA and BUNDI. The advantages to the enemy that this rich plateau would provide need no emphasis - one being the immediate acquisition of a base from which to reinforce LAE.

MARSHAM Valley

An enemy patrol of about 20 has been operating SOUTH of the MARSHAM in the vicinity of MARSHAM POINT, endeavouring to discover the routes used by our troops in reaching this area. Our forces made contact with this patrol on 5 May.

Enemy patrols are also working NORTH of the MARSHAM, between LAE and the LERON River. Between 4 and 7 May, one officer and forty nine other ranks passed through TARARAN (ref MARSHAM Strat (L)R 0659), CHIVASING (ref MARSHAM Strat (L)R 2356) and GIBSONEEK. The Party were armed with rifles and ten automatic weapons, and stole native foods along their route.

Native rumours previous to 12 May indicated another Japanese patrol near the headwaters of the LIPAP River, on its way to LAE - possibly the patrol earlier reported to have visited BOAMA 4 May.

Rumours persist of impending enemy movement southwards across the FLISTERPES.

OWN (iii) AIR :-

Our medium bombers strafed and bombed 10 barges NE of SEMI ISLAND, near ALEXISHAFEN, at 2115Z/20. They sank 5 and thoroughly strafed the remaining 5 which were beached.

RABAUL. Our heavy bombers again attacked YUMAEKANAU at 0400Z/21, starting large fires.

GASMATA was bombed by our heavy bombers at 1115Z/21.

Our Beaufighters strafed HOHE and CIESENBOB (HISSEL area) in direct support of forward troops.

ENEMY (iii) AIR

WAU was raided at 0900Z/21. Our P-51s intercepted 15 to 20 ZEPHS, ZELES and OSCARS, destroying 7 certain, 5 probable.

An unknown number of enemy aircraft bombed and strafed one assault landing craft on the LAKELAU River about 20 miles NORTH of TEKAPO. No damage or casualties resulted.

Documents captured on LABASIA RIDGE 11/12 May included an Operation Order from which the composition of the Japanese attacking force on 9 May is seen to be as follows :-

These two battalions participated in the original attack on HAU on 29 Jan. Their combined strength at time of relief was estimated at 650. Allowing for increments, the strength of the force which carried out the attack on LABASIA RIDGE is estimated at 700. Deduction of casualties to date leaves the estimated strength in the LABASIA RIDGE - HENG - KCHLATUM area at 600.

Forward troops estimate that the strength of the enemy force used in the attack on BOEDUBI was possibly 600. It is reasonable to assume that this attack was made by 3 Bn 102 Inf Regt, which was held in reserve during the WAU operation. Its strength was established from captured documents at 500. Assuming this as the more accurate figure, and allowing for casualties so far reported, the remaining enemy in BOEDUBI area are estimated to be in the vicinity of 400.

An adjustment of the SALAMAUUA total in line with the foregoing leads to the round figure of 1,000, including the

returned HAIZURU SLP; or a total of 2,000 troops in and forward of SALAMAU.

3. IDENTIFICATIONS

IDENTITY DISCS

The following information in connection with identity discs was volunteered by an enemy prisoner, who is considered to be both intelligent and reliable. There is, however, no confirmation, and in fact it is probably true to say that there are many systems of marking identification discs. Apparently each formation is empowered to adopt its own preferred method, and that shown below is probably in use in the prisoner's own formation, and may be the only one known to him.

Identification discs are issued to Japanese Infantry Troops. These discs are brass (=) ovals, issued in blank. When a Japanese Infantryman is assigned to his company, it is the function of his Corporal to stamp the disc with :-

- (a) Divisional Code Character;
- (b) Regimental Code Number.
- (c) Coy Code Number.
- (d) Individual's Number
(or officer's name).

The Coy code number is as follows :-

PACKAGE LABELS

Another fruitful source of information from which identifications may be made are Paybooks, and various labels torn from cartons and packages etc used by the enemy to contain stores of any description. One such label captured in BURMA is described as being of white cloth, 5½ inches in length, with the unit's name, code name, and code number stencilled in black ink. The importance of this information cannot be overstressed. These labels, or in fact any document or label bearing Japanese characters, should be handed promptly to the nearest Intelligence Officer.

6. EQUIPMENT

JAPANESE MULTIPLE INCENDIARY BOMB (ref Summary No 119)

From the complete technical examination, three points of general interest emerge concerning the clockwork tail Fuze :-

- (a) It is considered that the clockwork mechanism is NOT of Japanese manufacture, but possibly of German origin, and that it was designed for artillery use. In order to incorporate this clockwork, the fuze body and arming arrangement have had to be specially developed, with adaptors at two points.
- (b) The whirling motion during flight of the bomb, rendered necessary by the clockwork design, adds approximately 50 per cent to the time of flight.
- (c) It is thought that the Japanese may possess a considerable number of this type of mechanism. It could be readily adapted to other fuzes, or used as an anti-handling device. Therefore, it is suggested that any new type of fuze, or what may appear to be a plug in a nose and tail fuzed bomb, be regarded with the utmost suspicion.

OPERATIONS

OWN (iii) AIR :-

GASMATA airfield was attacked by our heavy bombers at 1750K/19. Results were unobserved.

At 1352K/20 our heavy bombers bombed the airfield, exploding a possible ammunition dump.

At 1540K/20 a heavy bomber attacked the airfield, starting a fire.

Our medium bombers, between 2100K/20 and 0145K/21, attacked coastal dumps between the jetty and the runway. All bombs fell in the target area which was then strafed. A small 50 ton vessel ran ashore 4 miles EAST of the airfield. An enemy night fighter intercepted. One of our aircraft is missing.

CAPE GLOUCESTER new strip was bombed by a heavy bomber at 0831K/20 with unobserved results.

RABAUL. Our heavy bombers attacked VUNAKANAU airfield at 0430K/20, starting a number of fires. An AA position was silenced and a searchlight destroyed. Other results were unobserved.

SALAHUAU. Our Bostons bombed and strafed the FRANCISCO RIVER area at 1552K/20.

ENEMY (ii) SEA :-

One of our heavy bombers dropped 3 x 500 lb bombs on a 5,000 ton cargo vessel in position 0300S 14941E, course 280, speed 12 knots. Results were unobserved.

An enemy submarine was sighted at 0718S 15357E, course 360. Our aircraft was 40/50 miles from the submarine which appeared to be a large ocean going type. By the time the position was reached the submarine had dived and disappeared.

ENEMY (iii) AIR :-

DOUGLAS HARECOUR. At 1200K/19 12 enemy aircraft strafed a 12 ton and a 50 ton supply ship. The 12 ton vessel was burnt out, beached and is a total loss. The 50 vessel was beached and was slightly damaged. Our casualties were 2 natives killed and 3 members of the ships' crews wounded.

Ref MILNE BAY Raid No 26. Reports from our troops at WEDAU indicate the possibility of one enemy bomber coming down in the sea at 2220K/19 off CAPE FRERE, and another going down towards GOODENOUGH. A RAAF launch searched the CAPE FRERE area but no trace was found.

An air raid was reported in progress at DOBODURA at 1440K/19.

PORT MORESBY. On the night of 19 May approximately 16 bombs were dropped at RORONA near the AROA River.

4. ORGANIZATION

Independent Wireless Unit

A PW has stated, that whilst he was training in Signal work in SHANGHAI, eleven INDEPENDENT WIRELESS UNITS were organised, numbered one to eleven. These were in reality platoons having a strength of 32, commanded by a Lieutenant, with a Sergeant Major, one Sergeant and two Corporals. Their longest set had a range from GUADALCANAL to TRUK (approximately 1,300 miles) and was probably the Model 2.

GENERAL

The Regimental Medical Officer is responsible for the training of AAMC personnel attached, stretcher bearers, Water Duty and Hygiene personnel. He should also arrange for training of auxiliary stretcher bearers (especially batmen and general duty personnel) and elementary training in first aid and personal hygiene for all members of his unit including Officers.

STANDARDS OF TRAINING

(a) AAMC personnel

(i) Knowledge of RAP administration and general organization of Medical Services.

(ii) Sound knowledge of First Aid and minor medical and surgical treatment including:

Treatment of tinea, External Otitis, skin infections generally, management and disposal of men with diarrhoea and pyrexia.

General observations and care of the sick and wounded. Care of the feet.

Hypodermic injections and use of morphia.

(iii) Knowledge of stretcher bearer, hygiene and water duty work.

(iv) Some knowledge of cooking in the field.

(v) Appreciation of own responsibility and limitations.

(b) Stretcher bearers.

(i) Simple First Aid especially:

Application of First Field and Shell Dressings, RAMC Training 603 - 607.

Control of Haemorrhage - RAMC Training 608 - 614. First Aid to the Injured pp 80 - 107.

Prevention and Treatment of Shock - RAMC Training 649 - 650. First Aid to the Injured pp 24-26, 112-144.

Immobilisation of Fractures - RAMC Training 615-630, 633-636.

Sprains and Dislocations - RAMC Training 638-643.

First Aid to Burns - RAMC Training 645.

One man in every gun team or small detachments and all officers should have a knowledge of elementary first aid. Material is to be drawn from following sources:

- (i) RAMC Training paras: 1,2,3,284-291,429-435, (in general only), 590-5 (in general only), 605-7, 608-614, 636, 638-643, 645, 649-650, 675-679.
- (ii) St Johns Manual: First Aid to Injured page 24, 25, 26, 80-104, 105-107.

Every soldier should be able to

- (i) control bleeding
- (ii) apply a Field Dressing.
- (iii) realize the danger of shock and apply those simple life saving measures so essential to a wounded or sick man awaiting evacuation.

NOTES FOR RMOs

5. (a) First Aid

Make your first aid lectures to stretcher bearers and other unit personnel very simple and practical covering the essential aspects of the subject listed above. Later if you have time and they have the aptitude you can go through the more detailed material of RAMC Training Chapters XIII-XXXIX.

(b) Stretcher Drill

If not confident of the ability of yourself or your FCOS to instruct in Stretcher Drill, apply for loan of a Fd Amb NCO. Don't overdo the stretcher drill. Get them into the field or jungle.

(c) Field Work

If necessary, ask your unit for assistance in this. It is more than desirable however for RMOs to have this knowledge themselves and carry out the training.

(d) Syllabus

A concentrated syllabus may not always be possible, but a definite object and a controlled approach to that object will greatly add to the value of what may be performed intermittent instruction. Don't overlook the value of instruction to men while they are on the job. But aim at a definite standard and programme.

(e) Record and Progress

Keep a very brief record of all essential personnel being trained, showing experience, training, progress etc.

(f) Training Ideas

Make use of the excellent material suggested from time to time in Army Training Memoranda (War) (Aust) which should be available in your unit orderly room. The following are likely to be of interest.

Instructing: No 12 Part 1 paras 5 & 6, No 13 Part 1 para 1, No 15 para 8.

A great number of barges was observed on the shore west of CESER (off the SE tip of CERAM ISLAND) and 17 landing barges and a 100 ton ship in the KAIMANA area. On the same day, seven vessels totalling approximately 13,000 tons were noticed in HANOKWARI. These probably included a 4,000 ton freighter damaged on 1 May.

Also in this connection, it should be noted that, on 6 May, six vessels were photographed there and were revealed to total not more than 2,500 tons. The only other sightings were at SORONG and BABO where 2,200 tons and 500 tons respectively were observed on 9 May.

ENEMY (iii) AIR :-

WAU. Further information on the raid at 1116K/18 disclosed that 23 OSCARS dropped approx 10 bombs, one of them strafing the airfield from 50 feet.

DOUGLAS HARBOUR. At 0700K/18 this area was bombed. No damage or casualties was sustained. One enemy aircraft reported to be shot down by AA.

MILNE BAY Raid No 26. Red 2116K/19; all clear 2203K/19. Three possibly four enemy bombers at 23,000 to 26,000 feet dropped approx 10 bombs between PONTOON WHARF and TURNBULL AIRFIELD. Two parachute flares were dropped at the commencement of the run.

A dump of approx 50 drums of petrol was destroyed; a tent and a Tk/A portee were damaged. Nil casualties reported. AA engaged, firing 41 rounds of heavy and some .50 cal at flares.

Night fighters sighted but could not make contact.

PART II

6. EQUIPMENT

Japanese RDF Equipment

Photographs disclose the existence of Japanese RDF Installations on KISKA ISLAND (ALEUTIANS) and on WAKE ISLAND (PACIFIC). Evidence suggests that they conform to a standard type, which has been produced in some quantity.

On KISKA ISLAND a dual installation has been observed which permits two raids to be tracked simultaneously, or allows searching to be continued after one raid has been picked up. Each installation consists of a rotating operating hut with a 35 ft square aerial frame on one side, raised 20 feet off the ground. Two small subsidiary huts are a power house and probably a control room. The whole installation is well sited, 600/700 feet above sea level and has an estimated range in favourable conditions of up to 100 miles, over a 120 degree sector.

Another smaller, but rather similar, installation on KISKA is believed from its location to be for the purpose of detecting surface craft entering the Harbour. The importance of such equipment in a region of almost unrelieved fog and storms is obvious.

Sets found on WAKE ISLAND are credited with a 360 degree coverage.

It should be borne in mind that these installations and others of the same kind have so far been found only in regions where air operations are under the general direction of the Japanese Navy Air Force. There is, so far, no evidence that the less well developed Army Air Force makes any systematic use of RDF, though no doubt it is only a matter of time before they will.

SECURITY

CENSORSHIP

Censorship reports indicate that much of the censorable matter deleted in letters is occasioned by the soldier attempting to advise his womenfolk and friends of his location and any projected movements.

An angle, which might well be exploited in lectures to troops, is that they are causing their womenfolk unnecessary distress in telling them beforehand that the writer is leaving for NEW GUINEA, or other battle areas.

It is much better and safer to write after a safe landing and so save the recipient her natural worries concerning the dangers of the voyage.

OWN (iii) AIR :-

Liberators bombed the VUNAKANAU airfield on early morning 18 May.

Normal recce's were carried out.

two 2,500 ton cargo vessels
two gunboats

in position 0220S 14915E (approx 45 miles EAST of NEW HANOVER) on course 110 degrees, speed 10 knots.

It is suspected that enemy mines have been laid off the QUEENSLAND coast in the vicinity of FITZROY ISLAND.

ENEMY (iii) AIR :-

At 1116 hrs 18 May one enemy fighter strafed the airfield at WAU.

PART II

1. ENEMY OOB - HUBO area

(a) Following reports that enemy troops recently encountered in this area appeared to be fresh and in good physical condition, the suggestion was made that MAIZURU No 2 SNLP (which had been forward since 17 Feb) had been relieved by the rested and reformed 102 Inf Regt.

(b) Confirmation of this has now come from preliminary translations of documents captured after the Japanese attack on 9 May, which reveal the following identifications :-

1 Bn, 102 Inf Regt
5,6,7 & 8 Coys, 2 Bn 102 Inf Regt
2 Bn Gun Pl
38 Fd Arty
One Sec Regt Sigs.

(c) According to "notes on the operation order", which were signed by Major SERI, the foregoing made up the attacking force. Another identification from a clothing tag proved to be 115 Inf Regt.

COMMENT

(i) 38 Fd Arty: It is suggested that either this represents stragglers from the BUNA - SANANANDA operations who reached LAE via MILBARE, or reinforcements who remained in RABAUL and later proceeded to LAE.

- (ii) Since Major SERI (probably short for SERIKAWA) signed himself as Bn Comd, it would appear that various statements by PW that Col. SEKI (Comd. 2 Bn in the attack on WAU) was killed, can now be regarded as confirmed.
- (iii) It would seem that those members of 115 Inf Regt who were not lost in the BISMARCK Sea action have been used as reinforcements for 102 Regt.

OTHER FRONTS

GENERAL :-

Increasing enemy interest in the BENA BENA - MT HAGEN area is evident.

The following extracts are taken from NGF Information Summaries Nos. 5 and 6.

UPPER RAMU VALLEY

On 9 May a native police boy watching the RAMU at WAIERIBA (on western bank of river, 15 miles NW of DUMPU) saw two Japanese cross the river. At noon the following day our watching post was surprised by a party of 15 Japs, and their supplies captured. Our troops suffered no casualties. The enemy, whose casualties were 3, were being guided by WAIERIBA natives. The Japanese were dressed in dark green clothes and caps, and were travelling light. They had one LMG, and were armed also with rifles. After contact they returned to WAIERIBA.

On 13 May two native constables who were about to cross the GUSAP River were beckoned to by six Japanese who made signs to be led across. When the constables later returned to our party they reported that the enemy were at DUMPU, WAIIPUN, BUM BUM and BOPIRUMPUM - all villages within an eight mile radius of KAIGULIN. The Japanese told the natives that fighting troops were following behind them.

NOTE : The GUSAP River flowing west joins the RAMU just above BUM BUM, four miles south of KAIGULIN.
