Juhker supply planes flew towards area coming from NORTH during morning, and in reply to white Very lights from C Coy dropped stores containers (mostly amn medical supplies-also a motor-cycle, but this was smashed in landing). Snipers in one or two places were still causing annoyance, (only to C Coy in our area) and the large number of enemy dead needed attention. Bofors guns shot down one ME 110 into C Coy's area. WEST WADI HERAKLION HERAKLION During the early hours of morning the enemy in the West commenced to move across our front tracing towards APEX HILL, capturing a few men from the 1:20,000 forward company of 1 A.& S.H., who had moved into the area on our right during the night. This force got between our lines and LIEMT. KESTERVAN'S patrol, which, however, fought its way out inflicting severe losses on the enemy for the loss of only one man killed to themselves. They returned through B.W. area on our East flank. Owing to them having moved in during the hours of darkness, the 1 A.& S.H. at first mistook us for ehemy and peppered us liberally with Brens - this misunderstanding, however, was cleared up, fortunately without loss of life, although two of our men were wounded from their fire. 15 platoon moved out to 7740 and established a standing patrol in this area, exchanging fire with the enemy on APEX HILL. After dark, a German medical officer and seven stretcher bearers were brought through our lines, having come down from APEX HILL with a See R.M.O's wounded A.&S.H. and one of their own wounded. report, Appendix 'D' Weather: Fine and sunny. Enemy preparing positions on APEX HILL. They seemed content to keep in their own area, (the wounded A. & S.H. reported them to be fery fatiqued). Stores were dropped on APEX HILL from troop carriers. Fairly quiet in ourarea, except for the usual hostile aircraft flying about. These were so common now as to be an accepted part of the scheme. Enemy dropped some mortar bombs around "A" Coy and Bn. SUMMARY OF EVENTS REFERENCES TO C.O.'s REPORT AND COMMENTS ON MONTH PLACE DATE Routine training details and information given in Casualty Returns are NOT required APPENDICES (On Operations, Equipment, Movement, Health, Administration, etc.) WEST WADI HERAKLION Weather: Fine and sunny. CO and Adjt went into a conference at Area HQ early in the morning at which they received orders for the evacuation of the area. Evacuation was on a timed plan and the order of withdrawal was communicated at a Company Commanders conference in the afternoon. Reconnaissance of routes to the Western Mole were made during the afternoon by CAPT. ROLFE, who was to lead the first group of the Bn down and by the "I" SEC who were responsible for leading the rest of the Bn. Enemy turned on a very heavy "blitz", 1700-1830 s. At 2250 hours, "C", "D" and elements of H.Q. Coy moved out and down to the Mole. Remainder of unit moved back according to plan, final elements clearing F.D.L's at Ollo hours, Despite the distance, our rear elements 29 May. made such good time that all personnel were on board the destroyers by 0215 hours, (some personnel on cruisers "DIDO" and "ORION", remainder on destroyers "IMPERIAL", "HOTSPUR" and "JACKAL". Vessels cast off 0230 hours - the HERAKLION garrison had been successfully evacuated. About 0400 hours, "IMPERIAL", which had been dive-bombed the day before had to be abandoned and sunk, crew and soldiers being transferred to "HOTSPUR". Daylight found the convoy still in the dreaded Straight of SCARPANTO, (Bomb Alley), and from then until 1500 hours the convoy was consistently attacked by Stukas, it being estimated that 100 dive-bombers in all took part in these attacks. Destroyer "HEREWARD" was left in a sinking condition, "DIDO" and "ORION" were hit, with heavy casualties, but wontinued unchecked. Convoy arrived ALEXANDRIA 2100 hours, garrison disembarked - our unit entraining for AMARIYA. Signature.







I hope you may feel inclined to pass on to them anything in this letter that you think fit, and to wish them all good luck in the future.

Medical aspects of parachute warfare at HERAKLION.

Diary for MAY.

Movements of Unit:-

Arrived at SUDA BAY - 26 Apr.

Moved to HERAKLION - night of 29/30 Apr.

Evacuated CRETE - 29 May.

Medical Equipment. Surgical Haversack - Shell Dressings.

First Field Dressings. Five (5) stretchers.

Later: Two (2) small surgical kits and one (1) small medical kit, both dropped with German parachutists.

Medical Arrangements:

2/4 Bn formed part of a Brigade of five (5) Inf.

Bns and attached troops defending HERAKLION area against parachutists.

were two (2) ADS's:- Each Inf Bn had an RAP within its own area. There

- (1) At the VILLA GALBA, which always remained in our hands, and from which all patients were ultimately evacuated. This was about 1 miles from our RAP and about 2 miles east of HERAKLION.
- (2) At the VILLA ARIADNE at KNOSSOS, 5 Km south of HERAKLION.

 This fell into enemy hands early and, at the evacuation, only two patients got away. Even after it fell into enemy hands there was free ply to and from it for patients from both sides.

From a medical aspect, time spent at HERAKLION may be divided into two (2) phases:-

(1) Before 20 May - Hygiene and sanitation.

(2) After 20 May - Surgical and Public Health.

Before 20 May.

Water Supply - always abundant, clean and assured.

Control of V.D. - by civil authorities and very satisfactory.

Sixty (60) "femmes publiques" in HERAKLION
examined by very competent public health man twice per week.

15% of these still suffering from syphilis, but having proper treatment.

Sanitation - Owing to their conspicuousness from the air,
Latrine Covers, Middle East pattern - though available - could
not be used. Buckets and conservency system not available.
Deep trenches used where possible, but in the majority of
areas ground was so hard and stony that trenches could not be
dug more than two feet deep. These shallow grenches were
filled in and changed daily.
There were only a few cases of gild diarrhoea
Infestation of fleas was heavy and universal.

After 20 May.

RAP consisted of a series of caves in the side of the hill some of which were connected together.

RAP isolated from all other medical units for four (4) days, owing to collections of parachutists not yet mopped up.

During this time, twenty five (25) patients were nursed in the RAP for four (4) days by four (4) people, including the RMO., some of them requiring man a considerable amount of surgical aid. This was due to the fact that evacuation was impossible owing to enemy troops in lines of communication.

Injuries.

- (1) Penetrating wound left side of chest, surgical emphysema, entrance and exit wound, spitting baood.
- (2) Bullet wound, SAA, entrance and exit wound, side of neck, haematoma of base of neck with some respiratory obstruction
- (3) GSW, developed peritonitis, died within 24 hours.
- (4) Bullet wound of entrance and exit, left thigh, very swollen.
- (5) Multiple superficial grenade wound of back.

- (8) Bullet wound of left wrist.
- (9) Charred wound, tissues of left forearm, from explosive bullet.
- Bullet wounds, (1) entrance right cheek, (2) exit below andbehind mastoid, passed through tempero mandibular joint, right facial paralysis, mouth involved, large haematoma of face.
- (11) Bullet wounds, left forearm, entrance and exit.
- (12) Bullet wounds, entrance and exit, left leg, haematoma right breast.
- (13) Multiple wound, (1) large laceration left side scapular region, involved muscle, (2) destructive pom pom wounds of nose and left thumb, traumatic amputation of left index finger.
- Bullet wound of nasion, passing through right orbit, blind right eye, haematoma of face, no exit wound.
- Four wounds from one bullet, (1) and (2) entrance left axillary region and exit above right nipple, (3) and (4) entrance and exit wound of left arm.
- (16) Simple fracture of right tibia and fibula about the middle.
- (17) Large wound of left axillar of upper arm with destruction of tissues and severe damage to vessels and nerves.

 Destruction and bruising of muscle, was thought for one day, to be developing gas gangrene but this fear proved to be unfounded.
- (18) Compound fracture of skull with cerebral lacerations.) Both

 - (20) Penetrating wound of posterior aspect of chest with surgical emphysema, large wound of outer aspect of gright arm and shoulder with loss of about 20 of humerus and most of deltoid muscle, axillary nerve, damage to other nerves and muscles.
 - (21) Multiple lacerations of right hand, arm and neck, large lacerations of left shoulder.
 - (22) Bullet wound of chin.

- (23) Four bullet wounds through the right thigh, wound of right leg.
- (24) Explosive bullet wounds, right forearm, entrance and exit, two wounds right cheek.
- (25) Entrance and exit wounds right chest, not involving pleura.
- (26) Bullet wound of right brachial plexis, bullet wound of left supra scapular region with open pneumothorax.

Treatment of most wounds after cleansing, consisted of packing with acraflaving gauze. Only one wound with charring of tissues showed infection on evacuation to ADS. Fractures by improvised splints. Five (5) prisoners were treated. Patients treated were from six (6) units other than our own.

Public Health.

Difficulties of sanitation were increased because air activity seldom allowed even sufficient time to dig latrines in the open. All dead within our bn area were buried, but in some cases could not be buried to a depth of more than 18 ins owing to the ground in their areas.

On the night of our evacuation, HERAKLION was one large stench of decomposing dead, debris from deatroyed dwelling places, roads were wet and running from burst water pipes, hungry dogs were scavenging amongst the dead. There was a stench of sulphur, smouldering fires and pollution of broken sewers.

Conditions were set for a major epidemic!

Difficulties of nursing.

No beds, blankets, bed pans, urinals or towels.

As far as possible, these were improvised from tins and boxes, and blankets were withdrawn from fighting troops.

Paucity of equipment.

Equipment was grossly inadequate, even for the treatment of more simple cases. No anaesthetic, serum or bone saw was available.

Failure of Supplies.

Due to several factors:-

Evacuation of Greece left us with fery little equipment.

(2) Few supplies were available by purchase in HERAKLION.

(3) After the "blitz" started supplies could not be got up to RAP's.

Lessons to be learned.

- (1) RAP's must have anaesthetic, preferably intravenus and ldcal.
- (2) Must have better equipment as regards instruments for emergency surgery, (suggested a similar type to those used by Italians).
- (3) Larger reserves of dressings, suture materials must be
- (4) held at RAP because supply will fail.

 ADS and gas gangrene anti-serum should be held at RAP if isolation is likely.

German unit using 2/4 Bn RAP. On 26 May about 1930 hrs., a German Doctor and stretcher bearers with white glag brought one of our own, (Argylle and Southern Highlanders), and one German wounded into our lines. They were permitted to rejoin their own troops, and the arrangement was made for future severe casualties for their stretcher bearers to bring them half way across "No Man's Land" and our stretcher bearers would then bring them to our RAP. The wounded Argylle and Southern Highlander was: No. 4269744, Pte Davies A. The German Officers and O.R's showed every respect for medical personnel and wounded at VILLA ARIADNE. Rull 2/4 Bn. JUL 7 1941 C R E T E. Medical aspects of parachute warfare at HERAKLION. Diary for MAY. Movements of Unit:-Arrived at SUDA BAY - 26 Apr. Moved to HERAKLION - night of 29/30 Apr. Evacuated CRETE - 29 May. Medical Equipment. Surgical Haversack - Shell Dressings. First Field Dressings. Five (5) stretchers. Later: Two (2) small surgical kits and one (1) small medical kit, both dropped with German parachutists. Medical Arrangements: 2/4 Bn formed part of a Brigade of five (5) Inf. Bns and attached troops defending HERAKLION area against parachutists, Each Inf Bn had an RAP within its own area. There were two (2) ADS's:-15 miles from our RAP and about 2 miles east of HERAKLION.

- (1) At the VILLA GALBA, which always remained in our hands, and from which all patients were ultimately evacuated. This was about
- (2) At the VILLA ARIADNE at KNOSSOS, 5 Km south of HERAKLION. This fell into enemy hands early and, at the evacuation, only two patients got away. Even after it fell into e nemy hands there was free ply to and from it for patients from both sides.

From a medical aspect, time spent at HERAKLION may be divided into two (2) phases:-

(1) Before 20 May - Hygiene and sanitation. (2) After 20 May - Surgical and Public Health.

Before 20 May.

Water Supply - always abundant, clean and assured. Control of V.D. - by civil authorities and very satisfactory. Sixty (60) "femmes publiques" in HERAKLION examined by very competent public health man twice per week. 15% of these still suffering from syphilis, but having proper treatment.

Sanitation - Owing to their conspicyousness from the air, Latrine Covers, Middle East pattern - though available - could not be used. Buckets and conservency system not available. Deep trenches used where possible, but in the majority of areas ground was so hard and stony that trenches could not be dug more than two feet deep. These shallow trenches were filled in and changed daily. There were only a few cases of mild diarrhoea Infestation of fleas was heavy and universal.

After 20 May.

RAP consisted of a series of caves in the side of the hill some of which were connected together. RAP isolated from all other medical units for four (4) days, owing to collections of parachutists not yet mopped up. During this time, twenty five (25) patients were nursed in the RAP for four (4) days by four (4) people, including the RMO., some of them requiring mad a considerable amount of surgical aid. This was due to the fact that evacuation was impossible owing to enemy troops in lines of communication.

- Penetrating wound left side of chest, surgical emphysema, (1) entrance and exit wound, spitting blood.
- Bullet wound, SAA, entrance and exit wound, side of neck, (2) haematoma of base of neck with some respiratory obstruction

- Multiple wound, (1) large laceration left side scapular (13) region, involved muscle, (2) destructive pom pom wounds of nose and left thumb, traumatic amputation of left. index finger.
- Bullet wound of nasion, passing through right orbit, (14) hlind right eye, haematoma of face, no exit wound.
- Four wounds from one bullet, (1) and (2) entrance left (15)axillary region and exit above right nipple, (3) and (4) entrance and exit wound of left arm.
- Simple fracture of right tibia and fibula about the middle. (16)
- Large wound of left axillar of upper arm with destruction (17)of tissues and severe dama e to vessels and nerves. Destruction and bruising of muscle, was thought for one day, to be developing gas gangrene but this fear proved to be unfounded.
- Compound fracture of skull with cerebral lacerations.) Both (18)
 - died 50 (19) Penetrating wound of posterior aspect of chest with (20)
 - surgical emphysema, large wound of outer aspect of dright arm and shoulder with loss of about 22 of humerus and most of deltoid muscle, axillary nerve, damage to other nerves and muscles.

Treatment of most wounds after cleansing, consisted of packing with acraflaving gauze. Only one wound with charring of tissues showed infection on evacuation to ADS. | Fractures by improvised splints. Five (5) prisoners were treated. Patients treated were from six (6) units other than our own.

Difficulties of sanitation were increased because air activity seldom allowed even sufficient time to dig latrines in the open. All dead within our bn area were buried, but in some cases could not be buried to a depth of more than 18 ins owing to the ground in their areas.

On the night of our evacuation, HERAKLION was one large stench of decomposing dead, debris from destroyed dwelling places, roads were wet and running from burst water pipes, hungry dogs were scavenging amongst the dead. There was a stench of sulphur, smouldering fires and pollution of broken sewers. Conditions were set for a major epidemic!

Difficulties of nursing.

No beds, blankets, bed pans, urinals or towels. As far as possible, these were improvised from tins and boxes, and blankets were withdrawn from fighting troops.

Paucity of equipment.

Equipment was grossly inadequate, even for the treatment of more simple cases. No anaesthetic, serum or bone saw was available.

Failure of Supplies.

Due to several factors:-

Evacuation of Greece left us with fery little equipment. Few supplies were available by purchase in HERAKLION.

After the "blitz started supplies could not be got up to RAP's.

Lessons to be learned.

(1) RAP's must have anaesthetic, preferably intravenus and ldcal.

(2) Must have better equipment as regards instruments for emergency surgery, (suggested a similar type to those used by Italians).

(3) Larger reserves of dressings, suture materials must be

held at RAP because supply will fail. (4) ADS and gas gangrene anti-serum should be held at RAP if isolation is likely.

German unit using 2/4 Bn RAP.

On 26 May about 1930 hrs., a German Doctor and stretcher bearers with white glag brought one of our own, (Argylle and Southern Highlanders), and one German wounded into our lines. They were permitted to rejoin their own troops, and the arrangement was made for future severe casualties for their stretcher bearers to bring them half way across "No Man's Land" and our stretcher bearers would then bring them to our RAP. The wounded Argylle and Southern Highlander was: No.4269744, Pte Davies A. The German Officers and O.R's showed every respect for medical personnel and wounded at VILLA ARIADNE.

In my opinion the Germans did respect the GENEVA CROSS.



ARMS & EQUIPMENT

(a) Each individual officer and soldier is personally responsible for the safeguarding of such arms and ammunition, Government or private, as may be issued to him, placed in his charge or belonging to him.

(b) Unit Commanders will, however, make the best collective arrangements as are feasible to relieve individual officers and other ranks of the burden

of personal responsibility.

(c) Orders for this collective safeguarding must lay down a drill for handing over so that there can be no doubt as to the individual responsibility

for custody.

(d) Arms and ammunition will either be carried securely by the individual or securely locked in, or to, some immovable box or object. In the case of M.G's the following rules will be observed:—
(1) M.G's will be secured in locked boxes and placed in a locked store with barred windows.
(11) Where this is not possible the boxes will be locked and kept in a room or tent where there is always a sentry, storeman or orderly on duty.
(111) Failing (1) and (11) above, the boxes will be locked and secured to an immovable object by means of a chain to be obtained on indent from A.A.O.C.
(1v) In tents, boxes will always be locked and secured to the tent pole.

(e) When arms or ammunition are held collectively (e.g. in guard rooms, stores or barrack rooms) they will be continuously guarded by a sentry, a

storeman or a room orderly.

(f) In the field, by day, when the arms of men are piled, an armed sentry will be posted and M.G's will be locked in their boxes.

(g) When sleeping in the field all ranks will have their arms and ammunition securely attached to them.

PREVENTION OF SEPTIC SORES

(a) The skin will be cleansed by daily bathing and the finger nails kept short and clean.

Every soldier should have a nail brush and a cake of carbolic or other disinfectant soap. (b) Underclothing, socks and bedding will be

(c) Scratches, abrasions and bites will be treated by thorough washing of the wound and surrounding areas with soap and water followed by application of iodine and a bandage where necessary. INTRODUCTION OF STANDARD TEXTS IN E.F.M. SERVICE BETWEEN THE M.A. AND THE BRITISH EMPIRE (EXCEPT INDIA).

1. Commencing 16 Jun 41 standard texts only will be permitted in Expeditionary Force Messages (EFM) A list of these texts, each of which has a number, is exhibited at every Marconi, Civil Telegraph Office and Army Post Office. A copy will also be held at the Headquarters of each Formation and Unit. Up to three of the standard texts may be sent in any message.

cont.

When the sender has decided which of the standard texts he wishes to send he should write the corresponding number or numbers, up to total of three, in the text portion of the form. A space of at least one inch should be left between each group of numbers. Examples of typical messages are shown below.

CHARGES

- 2. The charge will be fixed rate of two shillings and sixpence a message or the equivalent in local currency.
- 3. There are no special classes of E.F.M. URGENT, DEFERRED and accessory services such as "Reply Paid" will not be admitted.
- 4. The surname of the sender MUST be included at the end of the message. It will be transmitted.

 A Christian or first name may be included if desired.
- 5. The sender must write his Regimental number, Rank and Name only at the foot of the message. This is for record purposes Only; it will not be charged for or transmitted.
- 6. Telegrams will be accepted at senders' risk and no inquiries concerning them will be undertaken.
- 7. Special forms have been issued for these messages and the name and address of the person for whom the telegram is intended should be written in BLOCK CAPITALS, in the space provided, immediately after the word EFM, which is already printed on the form. The text will then consist of three numbers representing the sentences chosen and the signature.
- 8. The sender may notify a change of his address in the message by quoting the standard text number 200, meaning "my address is" followed by his address.

3. GAMBLING

4. SOLDIERS! PAY BOOKS

- (a) A number of cases have recently occurred of civilians offering to purchase from soldiers their pay books sometimes for considerable sums of money. (b) Such civilians are unquestionably working on behalf of the enemy's fifth column, which is known to be operating in the Middle East. Any soldier approached by such agents should report the matter to the Military Police, and all soldiers should be made to realise the fact that lost or stolen Pay Books may sooner or later find their way into the hands of the enemy for the use of spies or fifth columnists.
- (c) The loss of a Pay Book is a military offence which calls for severe disciplinary action.

NOTES

The enemy, having come into possession of large quantities of notes in FRANCE and BELGIUM, is suspected of attempting to smuggle them into the Middle East thereby obtaining services or gold to be used to our detriment.

All ranks are warned that by accepting British Notes from anyone they may be unconsciously helping the enemy. They should therefore refuse to accept any British Notes at all. If anyone should receive any such notes legitimately, e.g., by post from the United Kingdom, he should report the matter to his C.O., who will, if he is satisfied as to the source, arrange for changing them into local currency through the Army Pay Service.

6. KING SOLOMON On account of the theft of large numbers of towels from the above hotel, personnel are requested, in future, to provide their own towels when staying there.

7. MILITARY Personnel on duty will be the only ones admitted to the Military Compound, GAZA. Drivers of vehicles must produce satisfactory evidence that they are proceeding on duty to HQ., A.I.F. Base Area before being allowed admittance to the Compound.

This is prevalent in this country and all dog bites must be properly treated. Any soldier who has been bitten by a dog or jackal must report to his R.M.O. without delay and report the circumstances.

9. P.A.C. The P.A.C. is located in the M.P.Building, Hayarkin Street.

Many kitbags of wounded, etc., have been returned inadequately labelled for delivery at Base Depots. On opening these to identify the owner some have been found to contain enemy hand grenades, mortar bombs and other amn.

THIS PRACTICE OF PLACING AMMUNITION IN KIT BAGS WILL CEASE FORTHWITH.

Severe disciplinary action will be taken against the owners of any kitbags found to contain such items of amn.

AIR MAIL 5. LETTER CARDS

a. As from 15 July 41, a reduced rate air mail letter card service to Australia will be introduced. b. The postage rate will be threepence, and Australian stamps only may be used. Although the cost is much less than the ordinary air mail letter, there will be no distinction in speed of despatch and delivery.

c. The concession is available to all members of

the Imperial Forces in M.E.

d. On application at any British Army P.O., A.I.F. personnel may avail themselves of the s imilar British air mail letter card service for correspond-

ence with persons in United Kingdom.

e. The letter card is designed to provide a writing space of one and a half pages, quarto size. Censorship arrangements will apply as in the case of letters. All ranks are specially warned that if anything is enclosed, the card will be sent by ordinary surface mail.

f. If issues of letter cards have not reached units by the date of commencement, an emergency supply may be obtained by requisition from the nearest Australian Army P.O. Requisitions must be signed

by the Officer Commanding. g. The available aircraft space and load is limited and it is therefore desirable that letter cards be used instead of air mail letters to the maximum

possible extent. h. Owing to the acute shortage of suitable paper, all ranks are warned that wastage must be avoided. Strict disciplinary action will be taken, if

necessary to check improper use of letter cards.

TREATMENT OF UNDELIVERABLE POSTAL ARTICLES

In accordance with National Security (General) Regulations promulga ted by the Minister for the Army, the following procedure will be adopted with all unclaimed unregistered postal articles (other that letters, postcards and commercial papers):-Newspapers and Periodicals Undeliverable newspapers and periodicals, clearly distinguishable as such, shall be distributed, at the discretion of the senior postal representative with the force, among other members of the unit of address or made available as reading matter to hospitals, convalescent camps or recreational centres for troops. The address labels or covers should, in such cases, be destroyed, or the addresses completly obliterated before such distribution is effected. Parcels and Packets Undeliverable parcels and packets shall be opened at the Overseas Base Post Office and such contents as are suitable forthe purpose shall be handed over to the accredited representatives of the Australian Comforts Fund and the Australian Red Cross Society for general distribution to the troops. Items of sentimental value shall, however, be withheld from distribution and wherever possible returned to the senders. Officers Commanding will ensure that the foregoing instructions are given effect in accordance with the technical instructions issued by the A.D.P.S., H.Q., A.I.F. (M.E.) for the guidance of unit postal orderlies.
