Beit Jirja	Sep. 1		<p>The usual Sunday parades were held throughout the brigade.</p> <p>Tonight there was a Symphony Concert by the Palestine Symphony Orchestra - Conductor Bronislaw Szulc. The concert was extremely well received by the troops, the hall being crowded. 4 Sisters from 2/1 C.C.S. attended dinner at the mess and then, together with Gen. Blamey, Gen. Mackay, + numerous visiting officers and Sisters from Gaza Ridge, attended the Concert. After the performance supper was served in the various officers messes for visitors.</p>	
	2		<p>Our "K" Section Div. Sigs. at last reported for duty with Lieut. F. Cox in charge.</p> <p>A great scare today.— Entries from Bde. form the races had been passed over.</p>	
	3		<p>The "Entries Question" satisfactorily settled amid great sighs of relief.</p> <p>G.O.C. 1 Aust. Corps, with new A.D.C. Capt. Carlyon, called to see Brig.</p> <p>Lt-Col. C.E.M. Lloyd called and requested for platoons to assist at B.O.D. with packing and general duties.</p> <p>Lord Haw Haw of Zeesen again said his farewells to Australian troops in Palestine. Regretted that such fine troops would never return from country to which they were moving !</p>	
	4		<p>Major E.W. Woodward, sole remaining representative of Div. H.Q., arrived at Bde. H.Q., staying with us until we move. W.O.1 Coyle and 2 men also arrived as reps. of D.A.D.O.S. Conference of all officers at Bde. H.Q. B.M. explained the new Standing Orders and the jobs involved for each officer. S.C. enlarged on information regarding the move.</p> <p>G.O.C. 6 Aust. Div. called to see the Brig.</p>	69
	5		<p>A quiet day at Bde. H.Q. - one which is hoped and prayed for, but which seldom arrives. Preparations for the Race Meeting progressing well and everything points to a most successful day.</p>	
	6		<p>Capt. Bishop now occupied fully on matters relating to the coming move.</p> <p>Race books have arrived and the sportive instinct will out by picking winners with a pin.</p>	
	7		<p>The great day arrives and an influx of horses around the lines takes place. With the exception of the Field Officer and a few other ranks, the entire Bde. staff attended the races. Noted ^{plus} were the G.O.C. 1 Aust. Corps and G.O.C. 6 Aust. Div. Camp was strangely deserted, but Barbara presented an unusual sight for a military camp. In addition to the A.I.F. there were Arabs, Jews and soldiers of all Units in Palestine united to make a colourful display to what is termed the biggest race meeting in the country.</p>

			Side shows included the bar, and the inevitable "two-up". The carnival spirit was carried well into the night and practically every mess ran a party; the 2/5 Bn. staging a big one for the C.O's birthday.	
8			2/5 Bn. sent a party of R.Cs. to Church Parade in Jerusalem. the party returned but the officers spent the rest of the day in Jerusalem. (After the service 2/7 Bn. Canteen burnt down.	
9			^{Annoyed} Heavy work ahead. Officers from all messes of this Bde. were entertained by the nurses of 2/2 A.G.H. Gaza Ridge at a dance in their Mess.	
10			All time is now taken up by packing and preparing for the move.	
11			The first stage of the movement commenced. This consisted of 137 vehicles under the B.T.O., which left at 1300 hrs. from Beit Jirja. The tail of the column left at 1400 hrs. The advance party left by train. Discrepancies in Sgts. Mess Canteen Accounts discovered.	
12			B.M. to Jerusalem investigating Sgts. Canteen deficiencies. S.C. relaxed in fine style and took a party of three Staff nurses for picnic on beach.	
13			Brig., B.M. and Padre Quinn in company with C.R.E. left by road for Egypt - stayed night in Cairo and proceeded to Helwan the next day. Main body entrained at Majdal in evening. Bde. H.Q. entrained with 2/5 Bn. at 2045 hrs. Capt. Gorman issued A.C.F. stores. This was a fine effort and greatly appreciated by the men. The journey was quiet, but somewhat uncomfortable, space for sleeping being limited and consequently there was a great tangle of legs, torsos and heads.	
14			The journey across Palestine was completed at 0500 hrs., when the train pulled into Kantara. Crossed the Canal by ferry and entrained on other side. Our welcome to Egypt consisted of dozens of hawkers and boot-cleaners, clamouring at our heels. Shaving was proceeded with under difficulties, although most attempted the job. The train stopped at ISMAILIA, ZAQ-a-ZIQ and CAIRO. From CAIRO to HELWAN, there was much shunting to move through the points.	
			On arrival at HELWAN were met by advance party and tpt. at siding. Lieut. Champion arranged for Bde. personnel. 2/5 Bn. marched. The rest of the brigade arrived during afternoon and bivouacked for night on camp site.

H.Q. conducted a sit-down strike, refusing to erect tents which led to their being incarcerated in 2/7 Bn. guard hut enclosure, where they "practised" putting up and pulling down <u>A</u> tent. Later men under open arrest without prejudice.</p> <p>B.M. and B.I.O. attended lecture on security by Major Wordsworth - stresses necessity for troops being "security-minded".</p> <p>B.M. and B.I.O. reconnoitre training areas.</p>	
	18		<p>Brig. arrives home from hospital. Looks fit.</p> <p>All tents erected, slit trenches almost completed, A.A. posts sited and dug.</p>	
	19		<p>"A" Coy. 2/7 Bn. took over security posts at TURA, thus making two coys. absent on security duties.</p> <p>Heat today much more pleasant than previous days - dry heat, no wind. Judging distance will be difficult with the haze effects common to this country.</p>	
	20		<p>Conference of C.Os. held concerning training, which is to be intensive.</p> <p>S.C. took over 9 Bren Carriers. B.I.O. went to 11th. Hussars, Abbassia to see a "sun compass", of which so much has been heard and so little seen.</p> <p>Lecture by Brig. to all officers and senior N.C.Os. on protection against attack by A.F.Vs. on a Bde. group on the move. A most instructive and interesting lecture, which brought out clearly the advantages of a "BOX" formation for all round protection.</p>



OBJECT. 17 Aust. Inf. Bde. and attached troops will carry out an exercise on Monday 20 Sep. 40 based on :- Movement of a Bde Gp over open country in a 'box' formation, with special reference to defence of the force against attack by A.F.V's or from the air.

CONDUCT. The exercise will be divided into two phases as follows :-
(i) The approach march to start line.
(ii) Move of group in 'box' formation.

LOCATION. The exercise will take place in Bde Trg Area 'Z'.

ASSUMPTIONS. For the purposes of the exercises it is assumed that :-

- (i) The HELWAN camp area is a fortress.
- (ii) Fixed defences of fortress include :-
 - (a) A.T. Guns on SANDY HILLS 4885 and SOUTH RIDGE 5036.
 - (b) A.A. Guns in same localities.

COMPOSITION. The Bde Group will consist of :-

FORMATION. The formation of the 'box' will be shown as shown on sketch attached O.O. and described by Brigadier Comd in lectures.

(a) ADV GD. (i) Mobile troops move by bounds 3 - 5 miles in front of the box and covering its frontage. They will report each bound cleared in succession but not move forward until instructed by Signal by O.C. Adv. Gd.
O.C. Adv. Gd. Mob. Tps is responsible that he does not move forward if an action intervenes behind him.

(ii) Advance guard will move in box formation approx. 1000' wide and 750' deep, with front and flanks covered by its carriers and A.Tk guns.
Two Cos forward and two Cos in close support.
Bn H.Q., H.Q. Cos., recce Sec. Fd Regt and Sec. Fd Coy in a suitable position in the centre.

A.Tk defence will primarily be responsibility of O.C. 17 Aust. Inf. Adv. Gd. Coy. who is also responsible for co-ordination of forward portion of flank guards with advance guard.

(b) MAIN BODY (i) Remaining Bns will each march in box with frontage approx. 500x and depth approx. 1500x with a lane approx. 600x wide between their inner flanks provided for the move of 'B' echelon transport in bounds and for column from front to rear.

(ii) Distance from rear to adv. gd. to front of main body approx. 750x.

(iii) Bns will march on a Coy front with special attention paid to defence in depth but no distances will be maintained between Cos to achieve this.

(iv) Carrier Pls (less dets) will operate chiefly on outer flanks.

(v) Pls will be deployed in suitable formations to break regularity in line of Secs.

(e) FLANK GUARDS.

The Fd Regt will detail one Fd Bty (less How Tps) to each flank to provide flank protection against A.F.V. attack for the length of the column. Each Bn of main body will detach one Carrier Sec and two Inf Secs in M.T. with L.M.G's mounted for A.A. defence, to the flank Gd on its outer flank. Flank Gds will operate approx. 200x from outer flanks of Inf. Bns.

(f) REAR GUARDS.

'D' Coy and one Carrier Sec. of each Bn of main body will be detached to form the rear gd. They will adopt box formation approx. 1000x wide by 500x deep across rear of column.



(Issued in conjunction with 17 Aust. Inf. Bde. Operation Order No. 1 and Exercise Inst. No. 4).

My Dear Colonel Cremor,

You will please detail one Fd. Bty. (less How. Tp.) to each flank to protect the column against attack from A.F.Vs., co-ordinated by yourself.

Flank guards will move past the start line in conformity with the move of Adv. Gd., and will take up gun positions in succession on their forward move.

As the column passes rear guns or gun, they or it will move forward to head of column and report to O.C. flank guard. Route to be followed will be lane between guns and Infantry column.

Average interval between line of guns and outer edge of marching troops will be approx. 200', but use of ground rather than accurate distance will be ruling factor. Interval therefore is given as a guide.

The following will come under command of each flank guard commander :-

- (a) One sec. of carriers, whose primary role is :-
 - (i) Short distance recce. to outer flank.
 - (ii) Protection of gun crews against attack by land troops or
 - (iii) To super-impose the weight of their fire on that of A.A. defence of the flank guard.
- (b) two Inf. Secs. mounted on trucks with A.A. mounting to add to Bty's own A.A. defence. They will move within protection of guns, as will also the carriers except when detailed for recce.

The placing of guns is at discretion of Flank Gd. Comd. as is protection of his guns and crews afforded by carriers and Inf. A.A. Secs., provided always that Comd. is responsible for protection of the flank protected by his guard against excursions of enemy A.F.Vs. against that flank.

Transport : Vehicles required by Bty. Comd. -

Possible enemy action. You will/instruct your O.C. Flank Gds. that an attack against land troops may be anticipated. If so it may not be possible to free all field guns from their primary role of A.Tk. defence, yet on the other hand, it may be essential to have the services of a Troop or possibly two Troops for supporting fire to attacking Inf. If such an event arises, would you kindly provide for the immediate re-organization of, say, the four rear guns of each flank guard into a Troop ready to be withdrawn for covering fire as their primary role and the possible closing of the rear positions against tank attack. My plan will be to close the column, or otherwise, deploy it, when I estimate one Fd. Tp. will be sufficient for flank guard protection against attack by A.F.Vs.

The Troops remaining with primary role of A.Tk. flank defence will then pass from your command and come under my direct command in the general A. Tk. defence plan, which will be co-ordinated by the O.C. 17 Inf. A. Tk. Cey. This pre-supposes that you will then have replaced your senior officers in command of the Flank Gds. by the O.C. remaining Troop.

You will naturally, no doubt, desire to withdraw certain vehicles, and this is left entirely to your discretion.

It is my desire that you remain with me at all times up to the moment when your duties in supporting an attack force you elsewhere, so that I may have your collaboration and technical advice, as well as to provide for the rapid transmission of orders which a change in the situation may force me to give.



2. Para 2. 17 Aust Inf Bde will arrange for a cook and necessary cooking gear to be taken on train, 1 Offr 10 O.Rs. per Bn. 17 Aust Inf Bde to arrange representation of other formation HQ & units.
3. Para 3 (a). Movement Control Order No. 11 giving rail arrangements will be issued separately when received by 6 Aust Div.

4. Para 3 (c). Immediately after receipt of Movement Control Order No. 11, Units will submit requisitions to AASC through HQ 17 Aust Inf Bde for tpt required for move of personnel and stores to AL MAJDAL. Numbers of vehicles should be kept to a minimum by increasing the number of trips as far as practicable.

17. LOADING OF VEHICLES. In addition to weapons and amn specified in para 11 (c) of Adm Instn 109, Units will load vehicles with War Equipment, and NOT with accommodation stores. Care will be taken that vehicles are NOT overloaded.

As the state and position of deviations is continually varying, 17 Aus Inf Bde will arrange for recce of the route as far as ABU AWEIGLA to be carried out on 9 Sep, and for necessary instructions arising therefrom to be promulgated.

3. MOVE.

3 X (a) Movement Control Order No. 11 giving rail arrangement has been issued separately.

(b) Personnel will entrain at MAJDAL and proceed to KANTARA. All arrangements for the move beyond KANTARA will be made by G.H.Q. MIDDLE EAST.

4 X (c) Hired Transport required for move of personnel and stores to MAJDAL will be demanded by 1 Aus Corps.

(d) Vehicles will move by road in accordance with Movement Table attached at Appendix 'A'.

4. VEHICLES.

0	<u>GAZA</u>	The road to BEERSHEBA is for a short distance bitumen surfaced, but later is constructed mostly of white metal, topdressed with dirt and at present extremely dusty. The road surface is good throughout to -
24	<u>BEERSHEBA</u>	Entering the town we pass the War Cemetery on our right, continue for a distance of about 200 yds, turn <u>right</u> near POLICE STATION, then abruptly <u>left</u> into main street. Emergency accommodation for 30 persons can be made available, if required. Right at the frontier (indicated by a Boundary Pillar) there is an incomplete bridge over a Wadi, the track across the Wadi at present is good but would become impassable if excessive rain were encountered. From here we travel almost due West towards our next point ABU AWEIGLA, a distance of about 10 miles.
79	<u>ABU AWEIGLA</u>	This is the Egyptian frontier post and here a Customs and Police Post is established, here also, usually, a thorough check of baggage and passports is carried out. 

Notes on Helman Camp.

1. SITUATION. The Camp which is approximately 16 miles from the centre of Cairo, is 1½ miles from the right bank of the NILS and 1½ miles South of the town of Helwan.

2. ACCOMMODATION. A tented camp with latrines provided on same scale as at our Palestine Camps.

Accommodation for approx 4/5ths of a Division.

Holes have been dug for tents in three Bn. Lines only.

3. TRANSPORT SERVICES TO CAIRO.

(a) Railway. 3 trains per hour (last train each night from CAIRO not earlier than 0100 hrs.)

1st. Class Return fare -- 4 piastres.

Time of journey - 45 minutes.

Taxi Fare - Camp - Helwan Station - 15 piastres
(Single)

(b) Taxi to Cairo. 75 piastres return.

(NOTE.) 1 piastre = approx 3.19d.

4. DISEASES.

No Sandfly Fever or Malaria, but a lot of mosquitoes. Practically no flies.

V.D. The prevalence of V.D. in this area creates a serious problem, aggravated during the last war by enemy action in introducing infested women. All ranks must be warned of this danger and impressed with the necessity for prevention of the disease.

5. SECURITY.

A British officer, whose Unit was recently camped at Helwan reported that:-

(a) A.A. picquets as for our Camps.

(b) A guard of 2 H.C.O's and 6 G.R's for whole of a Bn. area.

(c) Am. and weapon security same as in PALESTINE.

(d) A patrol of 2 H.C.O. and 3 men required to guard water pipe line at night.

6. LIGHTING.

No electric light except for small private plants in Cinemas, therefore Wireless Sets and Kelvinators no use.

Only partial black out enforced by British Inc. Lights permitted in tents.

7. WATER.

Ample service of purified NILS water. Good pressure.

nearer Cairo, 14 Classifications/ Rifle Targets at HAIDI - (7 miles)

However as Camp is on edge of desert one can shoot anywhere

9. HOSPITAL. A Camp Hospital with accommodation for 16 - 20 beds.

10. Cookhouses. Good - 2 Ovens per Bn plus one for each Officer, and
Sgts. Mess.

11. LAUNDRY. A central camp washing service provided.

12. LABOUR - NATIVE Same proportion as in Palestine Camps.

13. H.A.A.F.I. BUILDINGS. Accommodation very good.

14. SHOWERS. Hot and cold, but provided on the scale of approx. 20
showers per Bn Only.

Officer Lines approx. 200 yards from showers in Bn Lines

15. LATRINES. Poo Service. Contractor.

16. FLIES. Practically none. (See also para. 4.)

17. SPORTS. No cricket pitches.

All area is sandy.

18. SWIMMING. No swimming is permitted in Nile, but its water which is
purified at an elaborate pumping station is pumped into a swimming
bath in the centre of the Camp.

Ambit, dimensions. Area of 30 yds x 15 yds., and is
13 foot deep at one end and 6 foot at the other end.

19. CINEMA. Two large open air Cine as in Camp.

MOVE OF 14th. INFANTRY BRIGADE FROM GEDERA, PALESTINE TO
HELWAN, EGYPT.

1. INTRODUCTORY:

On Wednesday, 29th. May 1940, 14th Infantry Brigade were ordered to move from GEDERA, PALESTINE to HELWAN, EGYPT starting at 0500 hrs on Friday 31st. May, 1940. This report deals with the move by road of Brigade Transport. Attached to this report are Appendices B. and B/1 of CR/PAL/16439/Q dated 11th May, 1940. Appendix B/1 is the move table for the move as far as ISMAILIA. As this part of the move was the most difficult, this report deals mainly with it.

2. CONDITIONS OF ROAD:

The main towns and posts passed through were GAZA, BEERSHEBA, ASLUJ, EL AUJA, BIRABU AWEIGLA. The road from GAZA to BEERSHEBA was good. From then onwards to the EGYPTIAN frontier it became uneven and rocky. From the EGYPTIAN frontier post BIRABU AWEIGLA it became first class except for drift sand on the road as far as ISMAILIA.

3. ROAD MOVEMENT TABLE:

Certain points, as follows, arise as regards to movement table itself. Serial F.1 was given from 0500 hrs on D.1 to 1300 hrs on the same day (1300hrs) to cover the distance of 240 miles m.i.h. (sic). This only allowed one hour to spare for the whole journey. If convoys were to rest every three hours for 30 minutes, at least one more hour would have been needed. Nothing like 20 m.i.h. could be maintained on the very bad road from BEERSHEBA to BIRABU AWEIGLA with the result that speeds had to be increased to as much as 35 m.i.h. after the latter place, where the new EGYPTIAN road begins. Other timings gave more allowance for halts and emergencies but M.T.Os. of all 3 Battalions agreed that more time would have made the move more elastic and reduced the need for fast driving by tired men. From ISMAILIA the road table was so elastic that no difficulty was experienced.

4. FATIGUE:

All drivers stuck the journey remarkably well although in most units there was a scarcity of reserve. In Brigade Headquarters, for instance, only 21 drivers are allowed for 18 vehicles and not all these drivers were present. In Battalions some spare drivers were absent through such causes as sickness and courses. At the time of the move there was a Khamsin blowing strongly.

Sand was driving across the road and the temperature was high. The heat for the first part of the journey and the dreariness of the landscape made many of the drivers very sleepy and some fell asleep whilst driving. The Motor cyclists found the journey almost too much, although many of them had breakdowns and were able to put their machines on trucks. At ISMAILIA many drivers were able to get some sleep and this, together with the added interest of the surroundings and the prospects of the near end of the journey made fatigue from thereon a negligible factor.

5. PETROL:

Petrol supplies were good although in one or two cases vehicles ran short. This could largely have been remedied by vehicles completely filling at ASLUJ and taking one spare 4-gallon tin on the vehicle.

6. BREAKDOWNS AND ACCIDENTS:

There was one serious accident in which a 30-cwt turned over and killed the passenger. 2 30-cwt had to be towed by the L.A.D. (this included the one which turned over). Some vehicles were towed within their own serials, the longest tow of this kind being ASLUJ to HELWAN. There were many minor breakdowns all of which were put right on the spot. At least 20 motor cycles had punctures. In one unit 6 motor cycles did not complete the journey owing to lack of spare inner tubes. In connection with accidents it is suggested that the L.A.D. should carry medical first aid equipment.

7. RATIONS:

Although there was no shortage of food there were cases of men missing meals owing to the breakdown of vehicles. This could have been remedied by every vehicle carrying its own reserve of rations. A good meal provided at ISMAILIA would have been welcomed by the troops who had to wait for several hours before their own cooks came up with the slow moving convoys. This was probably caused by the confusion as to the date of arrival mentioned in para 9. The fact remains that the excellent arrangements for the rail party at KANTARA were in marked contrast to the lack of arrangements at ISMAILIA.

8. WATER SUPPLY:

The supply of water in the vehicles and in the water trucks was sufficient. It had been expected that there would have been water at ASLUJ. On arrival there an Australian Unit was found to be in camp. The Commander of this unit stated that he had only enough water for his own troops. The only other means of drawing water was by lowering a petrol tin on a rope down a well. This method was slow and the water was dirty.

9. CONTROL:

Control from GEDERA was easy as all vehicles were present. At ASLUJ, however, it would have been easier if a control post had been established. At BIRABU AWEIGLA the Egyptian Police were suspicious of the first car to arrive and held it up for over twenty minutes whilst they demanded identity cards and passports. If a warning from Force H.Q. was sent to this post it was disregarded. At ISMAILIA there was nobody to meet the column and when H.Q. Canal Brigade were rung up, a private soldier was sent down to meet the head of the column. It finally appeared that H.Q. Canal Brigade had received orders from H.Q. B.T.E. that 14th. Infantry Brigade Transport would not be arriving until 24 hours later than it actually did. Once the transport moved off from ISMAILIA however, the road was straight and all vehicles were well escorted through CAIRO to HELWAN.

10. CONCLUSION:

A report on the condition of the road on the lines of the R.A.S.C. road reports to motorists in ENGLAND would give a tremendous amount of help. An alternative to this is that a recce could have been made by B.T.O.

Motor cyclists should not be taken unless there is a considerable reserve of riders. It is important that a proportion of M.T. 30-cwt lorries should be conveniently placed at the rear of the Serials in case of emergencies. This point was brought out when a truck carrying ammunition of one unit broke down and had to have an escort left with it until it was mended. The journey was in the main fairly satisfactory and was a useful experience.

- (a) Units will move as detailed by O.Cs. to ASLUJ Staging Camp.
- (b) Beyond ASLUJ vehicles will be grouped into convoys, each under command of an officer, each consisting of from 18 to 20 vehicles. Convoys will be classified as FAST, consisting of M/Cs not required for use with the Slow convoys, 15-cwt and smaller vehicles, and SLOW, consisting of the remainder.
- (c) The object of this grouping is to facilitate driving and to prevent congestion at ISMAILIA ferry, the capacity of which is 12 vehicles per hour only. Special care will be taken to avoid congestion at this ferry by use of forward recce by M/Cs or light vehicles.

INTERCOMMUNICATION:

- (a) A civil line connecting with EGYPT and PALESTINE is at Police Post ABU AWEIGLA about 50 miles beyond ASLUJ.
- (b) Wireless of Brigade Sig. Sec. will be distributed within the Brigade for use in emergency only should distances permit. Operators should listen at stated hours.

ADMINISTRATIVE:

Staging Camp - ASLUJ. Facilities exist at ASLUJ for bivouacs. Water is piped to water points. Cookhouse shelters and latrines have been erected.

WATER:

Units will leave GEDERA with all water carrying vehicles full and each convoy will ensure that water bottles, radiators and other water containers are full before leaving ASLUJ.

RATIONS AND MESSING:

(a) Units will be self-contained for two days before leaving GEDERA and will carry in addition two days reserve rations.

(b) Unit meals and haversack rations will be arranged to fit into the timings of the convoys. These have, however, been arranged as far as possible to allow cooking at GEDERA, ASLUJ and ISMAILIA. At the latter place it is suggested that the leading unit may be able to assist those following by the preparation of breakfast on D.2.

P.O.L.:

(a) All vehicles will leave GEDERA with tanks full and oil and lubricants complete.

(b) Under orders to be issued by A.D.S.T., Force H.Q., seven R.A.S.C. 30-Cwt. lorries each containing 380 gallons of petrol and appropriate quantity of oil will be attached as under - subject to any modification made by the Bde Comd. for the move:-

One lorry of rear Bn. will carry reserve petrol for L.A.D.

(c) Careful attention will be paid to the packing of tinned petrol in lorries to avoid waste on bad roads.

(d) Petrol for any journey beyond ISMAILIA will be under arrangements H.Q., B.T.E.

Recovery: L.A.D. will assist in breakdowns of both B and R.A.S.C. vehicles.

Medical: One ambulance are with M.O. and attendant detailed by D.D.M.S. will be attached to each Bn.

RECCE report by O.M.E. BASE ORD DEPOT dated 8 Aug 40
on Shell road - GAZA to ISMAILIA.

The following is a brief description of the road leading over the Sinai Desert from GAZA to ISMAILIA, a distance of approximately 224 miles.

The road from GAZA to BEERSHEBA is for a short distance bitumen surfaced. This is quite good; however most of this road is of white metal and has been constantly top dressed with dirt which has been so powdered up with use that it is now a very fine dust, and at present would be very unpleasant for taking a convoy of vehicles over. The surface of the road is quite good throughout.

From BEERSHEBA to ASLUJ (about 36 Kilos) - practically the whole of this road is under repair and an excellent road is being built. The road at present is rough and many detours have to be made; the road and detours are quite passable however and no difficulty whatever was experienced in getting through.

From ASLUJ to EL-AUJA (frontier) approximately 42 Kilos. This road is rough on the surface, with loose stones, but is very solid and is quite sound in dry weather. Right at the frontier there is an incomplete bridge over a wadi. The track cross the wadi at present is good; however in wet weather it would be impossible to cross at this point, and also at many other points along the track if excessive rain was encountered. There are very many sharp bends with loose metal about, and, in there present condition, would be dangerous to some drivers, and care would have to be exercised considerably in Convoy work on some of these corners.

The road from EL AUJA to ISMAILIA is for about two miles a white metal road in excellent condition; from there on to ISMAILIA is bitumen surface throughout. The bitumen road is approximately 255 Kilos; it is about 18 ft. wide and is a bitumen and sand mixture about 4 inches thick; the surface generally is good but in some cases is breaking up. The road has not been graded off and has just be put down over the sand in its normal form; therefore the road is somewhat like a scenic railway, up and down practically the whole way. About one and three-quarters hours from ISMAILIA there is a Shell rest-house where cool drinks, beer, etc. can be obtained off the ice. Foodstuffs can also be obtained at reasonable prices; there is also reasonably good accommodation available at five or six shillings per night and up to thirty (30) persons can be accommodated. The Canal is crossed by ferry, two cars taken over each trip. Customs Officials operate at ISMAILIA ferry and all baggage is inspected thoroughly. Petrol and Oil are available at Shell rest-house and at BEERSHEBA. Hospitality of the frontiersmen at each of these outposts is very good; they are only too pleased to supply you with the usual cup of tea or coffee.

For convoy work from SUEZ, I would suggest that it would be too much to bring a convoy from SUEZ to BARBARA in one day. I suggest that a convoy could be moved off from SUEZ on the first day and the canal crossed at ISMAILIA; with a convoy of 40 trucks it would take about $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 hours to get them across the Canal; they could then proceed to the Shell rest-house and spend the night, and proceed with the journey in easy stages next day. This would make the journey a two day trip in easy stages. At the present time the road is quite in order for convoy work, providing care was exercised on some of the loose metal areas, and the badly surfaced bends. Sand drifts are plentiful along the track from the Frontier to ISMAILIA; workmen are constantly employed keeping these off the road.

DURING PRACTICALLY THE WHOLE OF THE JOURNEY A CONVOY WOULD BE VERY MUCH EXPOSED TO HOSTILE AIRCRAFT AND THERE IS NO SHELTER WHATEVER AT ANY STAGE OF THE JOURNEY.

Notes on New Trans Sinia (Shell Road) from Jerusalem to Ismailia

1. Length: From Palestine Egyptian Frontier just West of EL AUJA to No. 6 Ferry crossing of Suez Canal ISMAILIA.: 226 Kms. or 141 miles. Generally level, some short steep gradients over dunes but no long hills.
2. Width: About 6 metres or 18 feet.
3. Surface: Reasonably smooth, plastic black asphalt. The road however is "wavy in places" and a fore and aft oscillation set up. This coupled with patches of "corrugated" surface and blind crests crossing sand dunes (which are always at right angles) necessitates careful driving and reduces speed in certain sections. The road should by now have settled down and a final top surface is to be applied. It is however considered dangerous to drive at speeds over 75 k.p.h. (45 m.p.h.) and a greater average than 55 (k.p.h.) should not be expected of an ordinary driver.
4. Capacity:
 - (i) No more than 1000 vehicles per day on the road at present and these must be fitted with pneumatic tyres. (the larger the section of these the better)
 - (ii) The through capacity of the road at present is chiefly limited by single small chain ferry at ISMAILIA which takes about 10 minutes for each journey (or say 3 round trips per hour) and carries about 2 lorries or 3 cars each trip.
 - (iii) Normally the ferry does not run after 6 p.m. and therefore unless special arrangements have been made it is essential to reach ISMAILIA before this if a through journey is contemplated.
 - (iv) A further limiting factor is the capacity of the BEERSHEBA - EL AUJA and EL AUJA - SINIA Frontier sections of the through road from JERUSALEM. (The first section may be impassable in bad weather, also the WADI EL AUJA until it is bridged properly).
5. Amenities:
 - (i) Water Except in the WADI EL ARISH where there is a small perennial supply and at a few small native wells (e.g. BIR HAMA, Km 135 - dry in summer.) There is at present NO water supply other than at the ISMAILIA end.
 - (ii) Petrol)

6. General:
 - (a) The road (black on yellow - white background) is a conspicuous landmark from the air. There is generally no cover from the air.
 - (b) Vehicles fitted with low pressure tyres can run along side the road almost everywhere (except over bad dunes) as could tanks and tracked vehicles. In this case there would be a lot of dirt giving away traffic and sand filters and spaced traffic are necessary.
 - (c) Trouble may be caused by drift sand which will be caused by high winds, and care should be taken over blind crests.

PART 1.

Stages I & II of R.1., are passable to all types of military H.T.

The roads vary considerably being classed as A.1. in some places while only A.2. or A.3 in others.

Many parts of the road are either under construction or in repair but in all cases the detours are quite adequate.

There are several bridges along the route, but all are capable of taking the heaviest traffic. The destruction of any one of these would considerably hamper the movement of H.T.

These bridges constitute the only real defiles although the embanked section of the GAZA-BEERSHEBA road (Kilos - 104 to 108) and the main street of BEERSHEBA may be included under this classification.

Very little cover from air observation is available for the vehicles to disperse and in many places along the route it is impossible for them to do so owing to cuttings, drains, embankments etc.

Traffic control posts and guides are not necessary as the route is clearly defined and the defiles should not cause any congestion.

PART 2.

1. ROUTE :- The route passes through GAZA town then south west to BEERSHEBA. Here it turns almost due south to BIR ASHLU. This is the first stage.

From BIR ASHLU it runs in a westerly direction, crossing the EGYPT-PALESTINE frontier at EL AUSA.

Continuing west the EGYPTIAN frontier post of ABU ANAGHA is reached. This constitutes the second stage.

2. DISTANCES. :-

GAZA TOWN	-	BEERSHEBA	27 Miles.
BEERSHEBA	-	BIR ASHLU	18 Miles.
BIR ASHLU	-	EL AUSA	25 Miles.
EL AUSA	-	ABU ANAGHA	22 Miles.

3. ROAD MILEAGES

GAZA to BEERSHEBA. This road can only be classified as A.2. because, although it is wide enough for two streams of traffic in most places, there are several embankments where two streams would be impossible. It will take heavy traffic but is very rough and dusty.

BEERSHEBA to BIR ASHLU. Along this section of the route are many gangs at work repairing and constructing the road, which at present can be classified as A.2.

The road surface is generally good, but there are bad patches. As a whole, it will take heavy traffic.

BIR ASHLU to EL AUSA. This can be classified as A.2. but is very rough. Almost throughout its length it is being re-constructed and therefore several detours are necessary and many patches of loose stones will be encountered.

EL AUJA TO ABU ATIGLA.
Road classification A1. This road is Macadam and is very wide. Already it has developed a number of "soft spots" and these, with the numerous sand drifts, make fast driving dangerous. Gongs are at work repairing these "soft spots".

4. DETOURS.

GIZI. The Giza end of the BEIR ASLUY road is under repair and the route follows the JAFFA-GIZI road over the BI-SHEH road, making two left hand turns in the native village and runs into the BEIR ASLUY road just South of the cemetery.

BEIR ASLUY - BI ASLUY.

Detour at Kilo 117, to the left of the road, keeping well out. It is soft, but passable. Very likely, the road will be open by the time the movement takes place.

This also applies to another detour at Kilo 118.

BI ASLUY - EL AUJA.

Detours at Kilos 119, 120, 121 to the left side of road and at Kilo 130, detour to right.

At all three places the road may be usable by the time of the movement.

5. GRADIENTS.

There are a number of rather steep gradients along the route. The main ones are at Kilo 112 on the BEIR ASLUY road and at Kilo 148 on the BI ASLUY road - EL AUJA road.

Neither of these should prove to be any obstacle.

6. BRIDGES.

The main bridges along the route are met at Kilos 98 and 107 on the BEIR ASLUY RD. and at Kilos 89 and 148 on the road between BEIR ASLUY and EL AUJA.

These bridges are composed of reinforced concrete and stone and, although the ones at Kilos 98 and 107 are very narrow, they are all capable of taking the heaviest H.T.

7. DITCHES.

Apart from the bridges mentioned in para. 6, the most important defiles are the sections of embanked road, on the way to BEIR ASLUY between Kilos 104 and 102.

The destruction of any part of these would cause a certain amount of inconvenience but would not hamper the movement as would the loss of one of the bridges.

8. Protection against Air Observation and Diversion.

No cover, apart from that afforded by the buildings of BEIR ASLUY, is available along the route.

In addition, the vehicles are confined to the road, almost the entire way to EL AUJA owing to the numerous cuttings, embankments, ditches and walls of road metal.

From EL AUJA on it is possible to leave the road. The road is reasonably firm on both sides and will take any weight of traffic.
