205. UN/Japanese agreement on Criminal Jurisdiction.
206. SPEED LIMITS.

1. Subtended hereunder is copy of memo authorising the facts behind the UN/Japanese Agreement.
2. Copies of these notes will be placed on all sub-unit notice boards.
3. The attention of all leave drafts will be drawn to this instr by Offrs giving pre-leave address.

UN/Japanese Agreement on Criminal Jurisdiction

1. With effect from 29 Oct 53 the United Nations are operating under a new agreement with JAPAN, consequent on the granting of NATO powers of CRIMINAL JURISDICTION to that country. From that date JAPAN has the legal right and power to exercise criminal jurisdiction over all members of our forces, except when they are clearly on duty.
2. Once the system has been in operation for a time and the teething troubles have been ironed out, it is thought that no insoluble difficulties will occur.
3. It is however possible that, at the very start of this new era, the Japanese may use their new legal powers to illustrate to their own people that they have in fact such rights. They may in fact look deliberately for trouble and arrest and imprison members of our Forces for minor technical offences under their own Legal Code.
4. Such incidents may be highly unpleasant and grossly undignified. All ranks will therefore, avoid giving the Japanese Police the slightest signs of provocation.

206. SPEED LIMITS

Wef 0600 hrs Mon 9 Nov speed limits for vehicles within the Div area will be 25 mph for jeeps and 20 mph for all other vehicles. Unless these speed limits are strictly observed vehicles will be BLR's faster than replacements can be provided. Coy Comds and TC will brief all dvrs and institute strictest rd discipline.

207. COUNTING OF PREVIOUS SERVICE FOR INCREMENTAL PURPOSES.

1. Approval has been given under which a male member, who is re-appointed or re-enlisted in the Permanent Forces after 30th June, 1951, after a break in full-time service NOT EXCEEDING FIVE YEARS, may, at the discretion of the Military Board, be allowed to count all previous full-time paid service in the same or other arm of the Australian Services or in the United Kingdom or other Dominion Forces for incremental purposes.

2. In accordance with the above, the following amendments to the manual "Unit Accounting Procedure for Pay and Allowances of the A.I.A." are notified:-

(a) Para 91 (b) is amended by inserting the following sub-paragraph (i) after sub-para (i) and re-numbering the present sub-para (ii) to read "(iii)" :-

"(ii) A member re-appointed or re-enlisted in the post war forces after 30th June, 1951, after a break in service NOT EXCEEDING 5 YEARS, may, at the discretion of the Military Board, be allowed to count all previous full-time paid service in an equivalent or higher rank, including temporary and acting rank, for the purpose of determining his commencing rate of pay and subsequent incremental advancement in the rank in which appointed."

208. FORT GEORGE FIELD FIRING RANGE

- (a) Fort George Field Firing Range is located in the area enclosed by Route 2Z, Route 37E, the INJIN RIVER and Route 37.
- (b) The exact range boundaries are shown in Trace 'E' attached.
- (c) The Range is a prohibited area and entrance into this area is forbidden except to troops engaged on a training activity authorized by Main HQ 1 CM EL Div.
- (d) Standing Orders for the Range have been distributed separately.

209. ROAD DISCIPLINE

- (a) In order to afford both pedestrians and drivers a better chance of anticipating each others movements, to reduce road congestion and to assist in road safety the following additional instructions are issued.

(i) Pedestrians

All troops, except when marching as formed bodies, will walk on the left hand side of the road facing oncoming traffic.

(ii) Vehicles

Drivers and/or co-drivers of vehicles forced to park by the roadside will direct passing traffic from the side of the road opposite that on which their vehicle is parked.

(iii) Formed Bodies

Formed bodies of marching troops will move on the right hand side of the road. This does NOT apply to troops moving tactically.

210. MOVEMENT BY AIR - JAPAN TO AUSTRALIA

(Ref: HQ Aust Army Component AG 348.3 of 4 Nov 53).

1. Personnel are NOT allowed overnight bag of 12 lbs in addition to 66 lbs allowance.
2. Greatcoat and webbing with haversack attached may be worn and will NOT be debited against the 66 lbs allowance.
3. The 66 lbs allowance will cover pack, kit bag, weapon (if carried), overnight bag, attache case etc.
4. Only 12 lbs hand baggage of the 66 lbs allowance is permitted to be taken into the cabin of the aircraft.
5. Personnel proceeding via GUAM may purchase one US dollar from the Pay Representative at IMAKUNI, as this is the only currency recognised.
6. On arrival in SYDNEY all pistols and US bayonets are being confiscated by Customs.

2. The following procedure will apply to CB and fd punishment parades :-

(a) CB parades will be held, controlled and supervised under coy arrangements.

(b) the following parades and duties will be performed :-

215. DRESS

1. Until further notice dress will be as follows :-

(b) Between 1730 hrs and 0730 hrs

2. Items of clothing, when worn, will conform to the following orders :-

(a) Hats KFF

Hats KFF complete with badge, puggaree and chinstrap will be worn with the side turned down and with the chin strap under the point of the chin, except on ceremonial parades with arms when the wearing of the hat with the side turned up may be ordered.

(b) Steel helmets

Steel helmets, appropriately camouflaged, will be worn on tactical exercises with troops except where orders to the contrary have been issued by Bn HQ.

(c) Smocks Combat

(i) When worn, smocks combat will be properly buttoned up with the exception of the collar button which may be left undone for ventilation. If it is necessary to further unbutton the smock for additional ventilation the smock will be taken off. Hoods will NOT be worn between 0730 hrs and 1700 hrs.

(4)

(ii) Belts waist will only be worn on the outside of smocks when pistols or sidearms are carried.

(iii) Offrs will wear only the standard authorised badges of rank.

(iv) Offrs, W and NCOs will wear brassards.

(d) Jersey Worn by

(i) When worn, the jersey will be on the outside of the trousers and will NOT be tucked in.

(ii) The cord at the neck will be drawn and neatly knotted.

(iii) Offrs will wear only the standard authorised badges of rank sewn on.

(iv) W and NCOs will have badges of rank sewn on the right hand sleeve of the jersey. The pt of the chevron will be nine inches below the pt of the shoulder. WO's badges will be sewn on 6 inches from bottom of sleeve.

(v) Signs fm or brassards will NOT be worn with jersey.

(vi) Belts waist will be worn outside jersey.

(e) Gaiters

(i) Gaiters will be scrubbed white and kept clean.

(ii) Straps will be tidily done up and, where necessary, shortened to prevent hanging down.

(f) Boots

Boots CWV will be kept polished and soles cleaned of pebbles, dirt and snow.

3. The provisions of 3 RAR memo P18/5345 of 12 Oct 53 paras 4 to 20 will be strictly adhered to. These paras outline the procedure to be adopted for the wearing and care of winter clothing.

WAR DIARY - November 1953

RESTRICTED

3 RAR STANDING ORDERS FOR OPERATIONS

PROCEDURE IN DEFENCE

(These orders supersede 3 RAR Op Instr No 5/52 of 20 Aug 52)

INTRODUCTION

1. These orders are a guide to the procedure to be followed under normal conditions obtaining in a static defensive position in KOREA. Where the situation does NOT permit of them being observed in their entirety, Commanders will devise alternative measures for meeting the general requirement.
2. The orders are NOT exhaustive. All Commanders will therefore endeavour to further their aim, i.e. to set out certain procedures which will increase efficiency.

SECURITY

General

3. See "3 RAR Standing Orders for Security in the Field" for other security measures to be observed within 3 RAR.

Stand to and stand down

4. Personnel will stand to :-
 - (a) each morning from 30 mins before first light;
 - (b) each evening from 15 mins before last light; and
 - (c) on such other occasions (eg, in fog, smoke, darkness or where there is unusual enemy activity) when, in the opinion of a Company Commander or the CO, the precaution is necessary.
5. All personnel will stand to at first and last light. On other occasions the Commander concerned may order only a proportion to stand to, depending on the circumstances.
6. Personnel will usually stand down :-
 - (a) 30 mins after first and last light (see paras 9 - 12 for sentries); and
 - (b) on other occasions, in the proportions and at the times ordered by the Commander concerned.
7. Riflemen and OIC gunners will be employed from 15 min after first light in the cleaning of trenches, but will remain close to their battle position until stand down is ordered.
8. Company Commanders will report to Bn CP when their Companies have been stood to and stood down.

Sentries

9. Every platoon will post sentries for 24 hrs daily.
10. By day, sentries may be reduced to one or two in each platoon, depending on the tactical situation and the degree of forward observation which can be obtained from the platoon locality.
11. By night, usually 30% of the platoon will be posted as sentries.

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12. In addition to challenging, etc, sentries will be briefed concerning :-

- (a) topographical features to their front;
- (b) movements of friendly patrols and parties (including minefield checking parties and wiring parties) likely to be in their vicinity or observed by them;
- (c) passage back of sholrops, mortrops, and information of enemy sightings and any unusual activity seen in friendly territory; and
- (d) alerting of the platoon.

13. See also II, Vol 1, Pam 2.

Standing Patrols

14. The approximate locations of standing patrols will usually be fixed by Bn HQ to cover likely approaches into the position, e.g., crossing places, entrances to safe lanes, etc. Unless otherwise ordered their strength will be 1 NCO and 3 ORs.

15. Standing patrols will be briefed as for other types of patrols and will take up their position under cover of darkness, but as early as possible after last light. They will remain in position until as late as possible before first light, bearing in mind that their withdrawal also should not be observed by the enemy.

16. By day, if observation is obscured by fog, standing patrols will be placed in positions by company commanders :-

- (a) where observation is obtained over likely approaches; and
- (b) where, in the event of the fog lifting suddenly, they can be withdrawn without unduly exposing themselves to enemy observation.

17. Standing patrols will only be withdrawn :-

- (a) during the hours of darkness with the prior approval of the CO; and
- (b) at first light or during periods of fog with the prior approval of the company commander.

18. Company commanders will report to Bn CP as each standing patrol controlled by them :-

- (a) takes up its position; and
- (b) is withdrawn.

This does NOT apply to normal reliefs of patrols during darkness.

19. The tour of duty of each standing patrol will vary according to climatic conditions from 3 to 4 hours in summer to 1 to 2 hours in Winter.

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20. Standing patrol positions will be dug in to give protection against mortar and shell fragments. The need for several alternative sites within the same area usually will mean that the extent to which positions can be dug is strictly limited.
21. Standing patrols will be provided with both line and wireless communications to the Coy HQ controlling them.

Patrols (other than Standing Patrols)

22. A patrol forecast for each week will be issued to all companies normally on Saturday.
23. A firm patrol programme for each night, based on the patrol forecast and subsequent information, will be drawn up by Bn HQ each morning.
24. Patrol briefings will be held daily as follows :-
 - (a) Bn CP - 1100 hrs
One representative from each rifle coy, sig pl, mor pl, MG pl, and 1 Tk pl will attend. Representatives of Tks and Arty in sp usually attend.
 - (b) Coy CPs - 1400 hrs (approx)
Detailed briefing of patrol leaders by company commanders controlling patrols.
 - (c) Coy areas - 1500 hrs (approx)
Briefing of patrol members by patrol leaders and rehearsals.
25. Timings in paras 24 (b) and (c) above and persons to attend briefings and rehearsals will be as ordered by the company commander controlling the patrol.
26. A verbal report will be made to the Bn CP immediately the patrol is debriefed. The written patrol report will be forwarded to the IO, by 1045 hours on the morning following the patrol.
27. See also "3 RAR Standing Orders for Operations - Patrol Procedure".

Use of passwords and codenames

28. The password will be issued each day by the IO and will be made known to all ranks.
29. Reinforcements will be briefed by their platoon commander immediately they first join the platoon on the procedure used in KOREA for challenging.
30. Whenever any possibility exists that unidentified troops may be friendly, they will be challenged. ONLY when the commander concerned is satisfied that they are unfriendly, will the order to fire be given.
31. Forward of the FDLs personnel will NOT call the password above a whisper, otherwise it may be overheard by an enemy patrol and thus compromised.

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32. Recognized topographical codenames and codenames for standing patrols, which are of a permanent nature, will NOT be used on the wireless, otherwise they soon become known to the enemy.

Air recognition panels

33. Panels will be displayed by forward platoons throughout the hours of daylight in such a position that they can readily be identified by our own aircraft, but can NOT be seen from enemy positions to the front or flanks.

OPs

34. By day, each forward platoon will establish an OP. The member manning the OP may be a sentry posted by the platoon.

35. The OP will be provided with :-

- (a) map;
- (b) compass;
- (c) binoculars;
- (d) sholrop and mortrop proformas; and
- (e) telephone.

36. See also para 12 above.

FIRE PLANS

DF Tasks

37. The grid reference(s), code name, etc, of each approved DF task will be issued by Bn HQ.

38. The location on the ground of each DF task, its code name and the method of calling for it to be fired will be known at least by all officers and platoon sergeants. Other ranks should be familiar with similar information relating to DF tasks to their immediate front and flanks, at least.

Arcs of fire and fixed lines

39. Members will be informed of the arcs of fire and, where applicable, the fixed line of automatic weapons :-

- (a) in their section;
- (b) in flanking sections, where the arc covers their section.

40. As far as practicable with the equipment available each automatic weapon will be laid on its fixed line :-

- (a) during darkness, fog, etc; and
- (b) on other occasions when there is NO specific reason why it should NOT be (eg, firing elsewhere within its arc, being cleaned, etc.).

41. Range card will be prepared for each line position (see "IT Vol IV, Infantry section leading and Platoon Tactics 1950", Sec 35),

PASSAGE OF INFORMATION

42. OPs (see para 34 above) are a fruitful source of information which, together with information obtained from other sources, will be passed to the Bn CP without delay. Similarly, information of concern to subordinate sub-units will be passed downwards without delay.
43. To facilitate the rapid passage of information, HQ telephone will be left unattended at any time.
44. When an officer leaves his CP, he will advise the telephone orderly of the probable duration of his absence and where he may be contacted.
45. By night, all platoon HQ will report to their company HQ every 30 mins, irrespective of whether there is any information to pass or not.
46. Shelrops and mortrop proformas will be maintained in all CPs and OPs. Shelrops and mortrops will be passed to the Bn CP without delay.

DEVELOPMENT OF POSITIONS

General

47. The development of the position will be a continuous process, in accordance with the priorities laid down by the CO. Hygiene will take priority next after the construction of fire trenches and before accommodation facilities.
48. In the construction of all positions, provision will be made from the outset for proper drainage. With few exceptions, the only suitable form is to lead storm water away from the trench, bunker, etc, through drains.
49. The development of the position will conform to the requirements of "Field Engineering and Mine Warfare Pam 2, Field Defences and Obstacles, Part 1 (All Arms) 1951". Particular attention will be given to :-

- (a) Fire trenches - Page 21, figure 4
- (b) Sandbagging - Section 42
- (c) Revetting - Section 43.

Defence Stores

50. Defence stores include :-

Timber (including prefabricated constructions; eg, bunkers and CPs)
Sandbags
Pickets
Wire
Corrugated iron
Tools (picks, shovels etc)
Camouflage nets and scrim.

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51. Requirements of defence stores will be forwarded by 0900 hrs daily to the Bn 2 IC covering a period of 24 hrs in advance. The allotment of available stores will be notified to companies by him. Defence stores as required, other than tools, will be delivered to company administration areas by the RSH each day usually at night. Tools will be forwarded by the RM to COMS for delivery to companies. Tools will only be replaced on production and return of broken parts.
52. Strict economy will be exercised in the use of defence stores which, until required for immediate use, will be retained in company or platoon dumps.

MINEFIELDS

53. The location of minefields and safe lanes will be known to all ranks.
54. See "3 R.R Standing Orders for Operations - Inspection and Repair of Minefield Perimeter Fences".

AMMUNITION AND WEAPONS

Ammunition

55. The scale of ammunition is laid down by higher formation. Within the Battalion, ammunition usually will be held :-
- (a) as personal ammunition in bunkers and fire trenches;
 - (b) as reserve ammunition in platoon dumps; and
 - (c) as reserve ammunition in the RSHs dump.
56. Periodically certain types of ammunition are placed on a restricted list and their use is limited to a specified daily replenishment allocation for use in firing, harassing and similar tasks. NO restriction is placed on the use of these types of ammunition in support of patrols or other similar operational tasks. Ammunition on the restricted list, together with the daily allocation, will be notified by Bn HQ as applicable.
57. In the varying conditions of climate in KOREA constant attention will be given to the care of ammunition. To this end:-
- (a) personal ammunition will be cleaned and inspected by platoon commanders daily, usually immediately after morning stand down;
 - (b) reserve ammunition in dumps will be inspected by company commanders (platoon dumps) and by the Battalion 2 IC (RSHs dump) at least once weekly, and more frequently if boxes have been opened;
 - (c) boxes with lids will be dug into the walls of bunkers and fire trenches to protect personal ammunition against the weather; and
 - (d) ammunition in dumps will be stacked off the ground and will be given some form of overhead cover to protect the ammunition against both shell etc fire and rain.

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58. Ammunition expended will be replenished daily, or more frequently if the situation and rate of usage warrants it. The normal procedure will be :-

(a) Unrestricted Ammunition

- (i) Platoon Sergeants will notify Company 2 IC or Company Commander in the case of Support Company of expenditure;
- (ii) Company 2 IC's or Support Company Commander will consolidate the Company requirement and advise the RSM;
- (iii) RSM will meet the requirement from his reserve ammunition dump and deliver the requirement to the Company administrative area or Support Company platoon position as early as practicable;
- (iv) RSM will replenish his reserve ammunition dump by direct demand on the Ammunition Point.

(b) Restricted Ammunition

- (i) All demands for an additional allotment of restricted types of ammunition required for replenishment following an operation, or for a special task, will be passed direct to the Bn 2 IC;
- (ii) Bn 2 IC will obtain "G" release from Brigade and will notify OC HQ Coy of the number of trucks required to lift the ammunition together with time and place at which it is to be collected, or in the case of smaller calibre ammunition, such as .303 Mk VIIIZ, the RSM will be advised to collect the ammunition;
- (iii) Restricted category ammunition will normally be delivered direct to the respective base plate etc position.

59. Scales of ammunition normally applicable in static defensive positions in Korea are shown as Appendix A attached.

WEAPONS

60. Every weapon will be cleaned at least once daily and will be inspected by platoon commanders, usually immediately after morning stand down.

61. Automatic weapons will be checked by firing :-

- (a) before being taken out on patrol; or
- (b) twice weekly (temperate months); or
- (c) daily (winter months),

at times determined by the company commander, who will inform Bn CP beforehand of the time selected.

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62. Cold weather precautions are given in paras 80 to 90 of 1 CAMEL Div pamphlet "Conquer the Korean Winter".

63. See also paras 64 to 67 below.

CONTROLLED STORES

General

64. Controlled stores include :-

- . All weapons,
- Wireless equipment,
- Binoculars,
- Prismatic compasses,
- Matches,
- . Associated stores for specialist weapons

Which are issued to companies on signature by the M.

Stocktakes

65. Companies will conduct at monthly intervals a PHYSICAL stocktake of all controlled stores on their charge. . report that the stocktake has been held, and the fact that there are (or are NO) deficiencies, will be forwarded in writing to the M by each company commander by the 26th day of each month.

Losses

66. (a) Losses of, or damage to, a controlled store will be reported to the M within 24 hours of the loss or damage being discovered.

(b) Where the loss is due to enemy action, the company concerned will advise the Bn 2 IC of the following information immediately ;

- (i) type of store lost;
- (ii) circumstances of the loss;
- (iii) registered serial number of the store concerned.

(c) . certificate of loss due to enemy action signed by the CO will be forwarded to the M who will take immediate steps to have the item replaced and will sign out the new item to the COMS concerned for forward delivery to his company.

Transfers

67. (a) . member will NOT be permitted to proceed on leave or reposting without first returning all controlled stores in his possession to the COMS.

(b) . member transferred to another company within the Battalion will NOT be permitted to move without first returning all controlled stores in his possession to the COMS of the company from which he is being transferred.

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- (c) The RMO will ensure as far as practicable, that a member is NOT evacuated through medical channels with controlled stores in his possession. Such stores as are removed from a casualty by the RMO staff will be returned to the company concerned.

PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT

68. A "steel helmet line" will be laid down by Bn HQ or by higher formation.
69. Forward of this line steel helmets will be worn by all ranks at all times other than when:-
- (a) on a patrol; or
 - (b) in a bunker, CP, etc, where there is already overhead cover.
70. Armoured vests normally will be worn by :-
- (a) members of patrols;
 - (b) members in areas exposed to heavy enemy mortar or shell fire. Such areas will be defined by Bn HQ.

MEDICAL

Paludrine

74. (a) Paludrine will be taken daily under the supervision of an officer and the fact that it has been administered will be entered in the appropriate roll book and be initialled by the supervising officer. Special arrangements will be made by company commanders to ensure that personnel such as cooks, drivers, etc, are NOT overlooked.
- (b) It will be explained to all ranks that paludrine must be taken DAILY, otherwise it will NOT have the desired effect.

Foot inspections etc

75. Foot inspections will be carried out by platoon commanders at least twice weekly during temperate months. Where personnel do not belong to a platoon the officer in charge of them will carry out the inspection.
76. During the winter months (December to March) and on such other occasions as it appears necessary, the "daily inspection drill" set out in Appendix A to 1 COMFEL Div pamphlet "Conquer the Korean Winter" will be carried out under similar arrangements to those in para 75 above.

Treatment of Casualties

77. See paras 86 to 92 below for prevention of accidental casualties.

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- 78 (a) Members requiring medical attention beyond the capabilities of the Company Aid Post orderly will be evacuated to the Regimental Aid Post by stretcher jeep where the nature of the casualty appears to justify this method.
- (b) Where a stretcher jeep is sub-allotted to a company, etc., the RMO will be warned that a casualty is being evacuated. Where a stretcher jeep is NOT sub-allotted but is required, the company concerned will obtain one direct from the RMO and the Bn CP will be notified of the action taken in case of a battle casualty.
- (c) The names of casualties classified as KIA, MIA (MOP) or accidentally wounded will be notified to Bn CP and the Assistant Adjutant by the RMO at the first possible opportunity.
- (d) The names of members KIA will be notified to Bn CP by the company concerned at the first possible opportunity. Court of Inquiry will be convened to investigate all such reports.
- (e) As soon as it is apparent that a casualty will NOT be returning to his platoon, etc, after treatment where applicable, at the RMP, his personal effects will be collected under arrangements made by the platoon or company commander and will be returned to the M. An inventory of all such effects returned to the M will be retained by the company.
- (f) It is customary for the platoon commander or Company commander of a member KIA or MIA to write to the members next of kin, approximately 14 days after the casualty occurs. It is the company commanders responsibility to ensure that this action is taken.

HYGIENEGeneral

79. Hygiene will take priority next after the construction of fire trenches and before accommodation facilities.

Latrines

80. Latrines, urinals and water points will be erected and maintained under the supervision of the company 2 IC. When a latrine or urinal is closed, the site will be clearly marked "FOUL GROUND (date)".

Disposal of rubbish

81. Each section will have one or two rubbish boxes into which all rubbish will be placed. Under NO circumstances will rubbish:-
- (a) be buried in the position; or
 - (b) be thrown into the wire.
82. Rubbish will be collected, usually during each night, from each company locality and disposed of in a recognized trash dump under Bn HQ arrangements.

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83. All trenches will be swept daily, immediately after morning stand down. As far as practicable in the circumstances, they will be kept in a clean and tidy condition for the remainder of the day. Trenches, paths and steps will be kept clear of snow.

Personal hygiene

84. All ranks will wash and shave daily, normally before breakfast and will maintain themselves in as clean and tidy condition as the circumstances permit. This is of great importance, particularly in a static defensive position.

85. Bath parades will be held in accordance with arrangements notified by Bn HQ.

PREVENTION OF ACCIDENTAL CASUALTIES

General

86. Members will at all times be on the alert to prevent accidental casualties. Where the investigation into an accident discloses negligence on anyone's part, disciplinary action will be taken against the offender.

87. Accidental casualties usually are caused by:-

- (a) failure to take reasonable safety precautions with weapons, particularly with regard to the use of the safety slide on the Owen Machine Carbine;
- (b) incorrect challenging (see paras 28 to 31 above);
- (c) failure to brief personnel in forward positions with regard to the movement of parties (eg, minefield checking parties, wiring parties) forward of the FDLs.

Precautionary measures

88. All ranks will be warned at regular intervals that appropriate safety precautions WILL be observed and frequent checks will be made to ensure that the order is being obeyed.

89. The procedure for challenging set out in paras 28 to 31 above will be known to all ranks and will be observed.

90. Companies will advise the Bn CP by 1100 hrs each day of all parties, excluding patrols shown in the standing patrol task table and the daily patrol programme, which they will have operating forward of the FDLs in the ensuing 24 hours. The information will include :-

- (a) strength;
- (b) time out and time in;
- (c) route out and route in;
- (d) task.

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91. By 1200 hrs daily the Bn CP will pass this information to all companies who, on receipt of the details, will ensure that all concerned are briefed.
92. Such parties will NOT remain forward of the EDIs beyond the forecast time in unless approval has first been obtained from the Bn CP for a variation in the timing. Any such variations will be promulgated in accordance with para 91 above.

DAILY ROUTINE

93. Daily routine will necessarily vary according to the time of the year and the tactical situation. The routine applicable will be as ordered from time to time by Bn HQ. The following table is, however, a general guide :-

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3 RAR STANDING ORDERS FOR OPERATIONS

PATROL PROCEDURE (PROVISIONAL DRAFT ONLY)

TYPES OF PATROLS.

1. Standing patrols
 - (a) Task is to cover approaches into bn area (e.g. through mined safe lane) and give early warning of enemy.
 - (b) Str - usually one NCO and three OR's, sometimes more.
 - (c) Needs dug posns to withstand mortaring and also requires alternative posns in same gen area.
 - (d) If alternative dug posns are used, either flare or baby trap posns not in use.
 - (e) Posn depends on ground or task (ie. safe lane) but it must be sufficiently far end of the FDLS to give adequate warning.
 - (f) Will NOT withdraw because of enemy activity except on CO's orders. If withdrawn it will be replaced as soon as possible.
2. Recco patrol
 - (a) Task is to seek info - either relating to terrain or to possible enemy mov, etc.
 - (b) Normally works from a firm base. Str possibly:

Recco element 1 X 2
Firm base 1 X 11
 - (c) Moves out as one patrol to firm base. Recco element then detaches itself and completes recco task when it rejoins firm base and again moves as one patrol.
 - (d) Comes with recco element and firm base on same frequency but with different call signs, e.g., 47 and 47A (easier identification of outsta by diff controlling patrol)
 - (e) Requires specific orders on action to be taken if an enemy patrol is encountered (avoid or shoot) and if recco element becomes involved.
3. Fighting patrol
 - (a) Sweep area and engage any enemy found.
 - (b) Str normally 1 X 15.
4. Ambush patrol
 - (a) Take up posn in specific area (often loc result of previous recco patrols) to destroy enemy.
 - (b) Str normally 1 X 15.
5. Fighting/Ambush
 - (a) Combination of 3 and 4 above. May sweep area and take up a specific posn either during or at end of sweep.
 - (b) Str normally 1 X 15.

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6. Flying Squad

- (a) : properly a patrol but is meant in Coy loc to reinforce area of contact. Is Coy comd res. Briefed with other patrols.
- (b) Str normally 1 NCO & 8.

7. PLANNING OF PATROLS

Bde comd lays down overall policy. Within this policy CO works out patrol forecast (see Appx "A") one week ahead. Forecast will be based on known enemy patrol habits (or if not known, patrols will be planned in an effort to determine them, e.g., reconce patrols) and coverage of front. Normal distribution, incl copies to sp arms, is given in forecast.

- 8. Forecast acts as a WARNING ORDER.
- 9. Based on info received from patrols, observation of ground, air phs, interception, etc, CO keeps running watch on patrol forecast and amends as necessary.
- 10. CO finally goes FIRM on patrol programme for each night early in morning after previous night's patrols, interrogations and discussions with Coy comds, etc, during morning rounds. Patrol programme (see Appx. "B") is then prepared for forthcoming night.
- 11. Normal bn distribution, incl copies to sp arms and flanking units plus one copy each patrol leader, is given to patrol task table.

FACTORS IN BRIEFING PATROLS12. Info generally

- (a) Previous patrol reports - useful, particularly insofar as terrain is concerned. Written reports therefore always worth while even if no enemy is sighted.
- (b) Air phs - invaluable, both oblique and verticals. Wherever possible patrol leader should compare ph with ground as well as indoor study.
- (c) Discussion with other patrol leaders who have been over same ground is worth while, but is not always practicable. Info is often covered in (a) above.
- (d) Info from higher fun - disseminated in Daily Int Summaries.

13. Minefids

- (a) Patrol must be familiar with loc of minefids likely to be encountered - see on ground and on marked air phs - and safe lanes.
- (b) Safe lanes (if to be used) MUST be covered by a standing patrol to guard against enemy ambush.
- (c) Minfid wire - ever present risk of it being down. All wire will be checked daily, preferably at first lt when enemy patrols usually have withdrawn.
- (d) Action if enemy mortar safe lanes - wait outside or go to another lane.

14. Infra red aids

- (a) Sniperscope - most useful on standing patrols, ambush patrols and reconce patrols.
- (b) Prime use on reconce patrols is as an aid to identification when reconce element is rejoining firm base.
- (c) Heavy to carry and therefore tiring.

- Page 3.
- (d) Unable to become US. Therefore only trained op from sniper sec will be sent out with it.
 - (e) Offensive use of Sniperscope - "wing" on enemy and then "catch" others who try to drag him away.
 - (f) Metascope - should be particularly useful in guiding patrols to gaps and identification purposes.

15. Dogs

- (a) NOT frequently used in 28 BRITCOM Inf Bde but were satisfactory within known limitations; e.g., wet weather.
- (b) Will NOT work with KATOOMS.
- (c) Enable quicker mov by patrol, therefore particularly useful when patrol is in a hurry to reach an ambush posn before enemy.
- (d) Feeding routine must be adjusted on day dog is to be used on patrol. Therefore 24-36 hrs warning, at least, is required before dog is available.
- (e) Dog is an aid to a patrol. It is not a substitute

16. Cas

- (a) This presents perhaps the greatest problem. Vital for morale and other reasons that any cas be brought in (even if dead).
- (b) NOT practicable to take SB parties with patrol - makes it too unwieldy.
- (c) SB parties must be org and briefed with patrol (on Coy level briefing) and be standing by in case required after a contact. Important that sufficient men are in SB parties. In wet weather, up steep hills, SBs tire very quickly with a heavy load.
- (d) In briefing, prearranged stretcher RVs should be worked out and known to both patrol and stretcher party.
- (e) Cas evac plan usually:-
 - (i) patrol gets its own cas back to stretcher RV; and
 - (ii) stretcher party takes over at RV.
- (f) Poncho often useful for carrying cas, but weapons should NOT be used to improvise stretcher - they will not then be available ready for use if required. Also folding stretcher.
- (g) Problem of collecting cas is accentuated by fact that enemy (because of superior str used by him) usually retains control of area of clash.

17. KATOOMS

Always a difficult problem due to language difficulties and also capacity for sleeping (on standing patrols). However their hearing is particularly acute.

18. Illumination

- (a) Three sources - SL, Arty and mortar.
- (b) SLs not extensively used by 28 BRITCOM Inf Bde. Conditions not always suitable either due to weather or hindrance to nearby patrols.
- (c) SL sometimes useful as a def measure to stop mov in one area whilst a patrol contact was in progress in another area.
- (d) No doubt as to its value to lt area fwd of a def posn.
- (e) Arty - Not always satisfactory. High percentage of failures with 155 illm as it was in wrong place. Arty require at least 10 mins warning to prepare aim.

22. Coy providing patrol is responsible for:-
- (a) issue of warning order to patrol;
 - (b) ensuring members, et c., attend briefing and rehearsals at required times;
 - (c) keeping nominal roll of all members within the patrol; and
 - (d) adm details; i.e., provision of eqpt, etc, but not evac of cas (this is part of op control).
23. Coy controlling patrol (often may be coy providing patrol) is responsible for:-
- (a) briefing and interrogation of patrol on coy level; and
 - (b) op comd of patrol from time it enters coy zone. (Usually goes out through controlling coy) until the time it comes in.
24. Advantages of this are that coy responsible for zone accumulates detailed knowledge of ground over which it ops, and it enables res coys to take their share of patrolling. Theoretical disadvantage is that patrols often op under another coy and not own coy comd. This is not found to be real in practice.

Patrol Masters

25. (a) Some bns used patrol master system (usually OC Sp Coy) who attended briefing of all patrols on coy and bn level, rehearsals etc, and then sat in Bn CP throughout night whilst patrols were out. Advantage - offr thoroughly familiar all phases of patrolling and sufficiently senior and experienced to relieve CO of much of routine connected with patrolling.
- (b) Other bns (incl 3 RAR) do not use patrol master system. Briefing on Bn level usually by IO; on coy level by coy comd controlling patrol. Overall control exercised direct by CO to coy comds to patrol leader. Advantage - more normal chain of comd. Nobody is interposed between CO and coy comds except in very quiet periods when duty offr remains in Bn CP.

COMMUNICATIONS

26. (a) Line is primary means to standing patrols with WS 88 as an alternative. This allows passage of much useful info with min loss of security.
- (b) Line to standing patrols is always difficult to keep IN and consequently is a drain on linesman.
- (c) WS 83 generally is NOT suitable in KOREA due to terrain and blind spots but skilful use of set can overcome many disadvantages. WS 31 is too heavy for patrols and is therefore not much used (except as control set in coy CP)
- (d) Standing patrols and a patrol in same area should be on same frequency. Where not practicable; eg, if standing patrol is under comd flanking coy, CP controlling standing patrol should keep WS 88 on patrol freq on listening watch. It can then pass relevant info or orders rapidly to its standing patrol (if affected).
- (e) Interference from neighbouring units is often a problem. It is accentuated by limited number of channels available on WS 88 with intensive patrolling along the sector. Represents an added reason for good voice procedure.
- (f) Security - of vital importance. Very high standard of voice procedure essential both to gd security and to speed up passage of info. Use only callsigns of safe lanes - NOT codenames. Enemy probably knows them..
- (g) There is often a tendency with inexperienced patrol leaders NOT to use tele or wrls for fear of being heard by enemy. Thus info is not passed back in time for it to be acted upon. On occasions this is justified - but need to pass back of info MUST be impressed on leader.

- (h) Patrol sig must be well trained. During contact, or if patrol leader is wounded it may be necessary to act on his reports.
 - (j) Lt sigs are rarely used, but allowed for, mainly to call down DF in event of other means failing.
- 27.
- (a) Line is the primary means between coy CP and Bn CP.
 - (b) In the event of a contact, or where a contact appears to be imminent, a line is usually left open between Bn CP and the CP of the coy controlling the patrol.
 - (c) Direct lines are maint between :-
 - (i) OFO and MFC with coy comd to bty comd and mor Fl CP, respectively
 - (ii) Bn CP and mor and MG Fl CP's.
 - (d) OFO usually also keeps WS 88 on patrol freq to obtain rapid info.

FIRE SUPPORTGeneral

- 28.
- (a) There are three types of patrol fire sp:-
 - (i) close patrol tasks;
 - (ii) patrol tasks in depth;
 - (iii) counter-mortar (CM).
 - (b) Close patrol tasks are fired on patrol leader's request. Patrol task in depth and CM are fired by or on request of CO.
 - (c) Close patrol task - destruction of enemy in immediate vicinity of patrol. Patrol task in depth - discourage reinforcement of area by enemy or discourage withdrawal (incl cas) by enemy. CM - normal purpose.
 - (d) Weapons usually available:
 - (i) 25 pr - used for all three types of fire but primarily for close patrol tasks and tasks in depth.
 - (ii) 4.2 in mor - patrol tasks in depth and CM, but primarily CM.
 - (iii) 3 in mor - patrol tasks in depth and CM.
 - (iv) 60 mm mor - primarily illumination
 - (v) MMGs.
 - (vi) Tks - 20 pr and Besa, primarily Besa.
 - (e) Heavier weapons in (d) above are only used when patrol cannot satisfactorily do task with its own weapons. Then only use as much as is necessary to achieve end. How much depends on reports from patrol leader, views of coy and bn comds and arty and their knowledge of enemy habits (eg, to reinforce area of contact). Preferable to use too much rather than too little.
- 29.
- (a) Fire sp is controlled to previously determined points; eg:-
 - (i) Normal DF tasks.
 - (ii) Special patrol tasks (often selected for a particular patrol - sometimes standard for all patrols in an area)
 - (iii) Code name for feature, etc, along or near route.
 - (b) During briefing on coy level, patrol leader (with coy comd and OFO) selects any special patrol tasks required. Patrol leader then calls for fire by using fixed OT (360° in 3 RAR) and indicating target and corrections from any one of pts in (a) above.

Calls for fire

- 30.
- (a) Initially from patrol leader to coy comd controlling patrol. OFO with Coy Comd would obtain info at same time.
 - (b) Coy Comd would pass back a request to Bn CP at same time as OFO passed request on arty net. Therefore CO and BC receive info at same time.
 - (c) If 3 in Mor fire was requested (which is unusual) MFC with coy comd controlling patrol also passed back info direct to base plate posn at same time as coy comd passed info to Bn CP.
 - (d) CO then decides whether sp will be provided, how much, and where, having regard to :-

 - (A) Preliminary debriefing.
 - (B) Preparation of written patrol report. (see Appx C).

3 RAR STANDING ORDERS FOR OPERATIONS

INSPECTION AND REPAIR OF MINEFIELD PERIMETER FENCES

INTRODUCTION

1. Minefield perimeter fences cease to fulfil the function for which they were erected for a variety of reasons, the more common of which are:-
 - (a) they are cut by friendly or enemy shell or mortar fire;
 - (b) they are cut by enemy patrols;
 - (c) they are obscured by undergrowth, etc.;
 - (d) the wire falls down because pickets are not driven firmly into the ground;
 - (e) the markers fall off, thus making the fence indistinguishable as a minefield perimeter; and
 - (f) the wire, particularly where it is stretched across a small re-entrant, is more than 2 - 4 feet above the ground.
2. The fences must be maintained in good order if unnecessary casualties to patrols and other parties of troops are to be avoided. Moreover, if it is known or suspected that fences are not properly maintained, friendly patrols avoid areas where minefields are believed to exist. This brings about an unacceptable restriction in their movement.

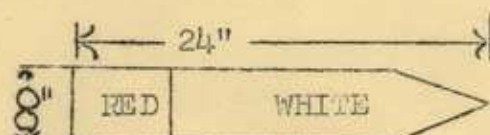
RESPONSIBILITIES

3. The party laying a minefield or clearing a safe lane (formerly known as a gap) is responsible for erecting the fence in the first instance.
4. 3 RAR is responsible for inspecting and repairing fences within the area allotted to it by HQ 28 BRITCOM Inf Bde.
5. From time to time a trace will be issued by Bn HQ showing the allocation to sub-units of responsibilities for the inspection and repair of fences.
6. The Assault Pioneer Platoon usually will have no specific responsibility for the inspection and repair of fences. However, members of the Platoon will be available to assist sub-units responsible for carrying out this task. The OC Assault Pioneer Platoon will be conversant at all times with the position of minefields and safe lanes within the area allotted to 3 RAR and the condition of the fences and markings.

SYSTEM OF MARKINGS

7. The system in 1 COMWEL Div is that a mined area will be surrounded by a fence consisting of a single strand of barbed wire 2 - 4 feet above ground or grass level.

8. The wire will be marked by RED metal triangles hanging from it at intervals of 10 yds.
9. A safe lane will have a properly marked fence down each side. The entrance and exit will also be marked on either side with a safe lane marker conforming approximately to the following design



The RED end of the marker will be on the mined side of the lane.

10. The fence should not conform exactly in shape to the pattern of the minefield and at no place will it be closer than 5 yards to the nearest mine.

MINFIELD CHECKS

Frequency

11. Under operational conditions, fences will be inspected daily, usually at about first light, and repaired where necessary. If the minefield is located in such a position that the check can be made without the party being observed by the enemy, the inspection may be made in daylight. Authority for inspections to be made less frequently than daily may only be given by the CO.
12. Under non-operational conditions, fences will be inspected at twice weekly intervals and repaired where necessary.

Parties

13. In certain circumstances it may be practicable for fences to be checked by standing or other patrols returning at or about first light. Otherwise special parties will be required to carry out the task.
14. The strength of the party will vary according to the task and the degree of protection required. In no case should it be less than 3 men.
15. The party invariably will include at least one member who has previously checked the fence and who is conversant with its route. Whenever a reallocation of responsibilities is made, the sub-unit assuming the responsibility for inspecting a fence will attach personnel to the outgoing sub-unit to accompany their parties and thus become familiar with the route taken by the fence.
16. The party will carry with it stores to effect an immediate repair of the fence. Normally, to reduce weight, assault cable and only a small number of markers will be carried. However, repairs effected with assault cable will be regarded as temporary repairs only, and it will be replaced by barbed wire with the correct scale of markers within the following 24 hours.

Reports

17. Each sub-unit will report to the Bn duty officer immediately on completion of its minefield check:-
 - (a) that the check has been carried out;
 - (b) the general condition of the fence;

- (c) the location of any temporary repairs; and
- (d) the action it is intended to take to effect permanent repairs.

18. The Bn duty officer will log the information and will bring to the notice of the CO any apparent irregularities.

SAFETY MEASURES

19. Unless otherwise ordered, no man will ever cross a single strand of barbed wire, or any other fence, until he KNOWS what is on the other side.

20. The action to be taken by a person finding himself in a minefield, and the drill for the removal of a casualty from a minefield, are outlined in Appendices A and B, respectively.

21. All ranks must be thoroughly conversant with:-

- (a) the provisions of these orders; and
- (b) the importance of them.

To ignore them can still, in the present non-operational conditions, mean the loss of life. To ignore them under operational conditions will inevitably lose lives.

22. Provision will be made at suitable intervals for instruction on this subject in normal training programmes.

ACTION TO BE TAKEN BY A PERSON FINDING HIMSELF
IN A MINEFIELD

Immediately a person is aware that he is in a minefield he will :-

1. STAND STILL. Even if a companion is lying wounded nearby. Any hurried move may merely set off another mine killing the wounded man and the rescuer.
2. Feel around his feet for a mine free place and SIT DOWN
3. THINK THINK THINK and THINK
4. (a) If possible call to the nearest person outside the minefield to obtain assistance from the Pioneers or the Engineers.
(b) If (a) is not possible, decide on the best route out. This will usually be to the nearest fence and then along the fence.
5. When getting oneself out of a minefield the drill is : -
 - (a) feel in front for trip wires.
 - (b) Prod at a slant, not vertically, (bayonet, knife, pencil) for mines.
 - (c) Advance over the 6 or 8 inches checked and then repeat the process.
6. Crawl. DO NOT STAND
7. TAKE YOUR TIME. 5 minutes more may mean another 50 years on your life.
8. Step over mines found, having first found a mine free area to step on.
9. Beware of booby traps on the perimeter fence

Appendix B to 3 RAR SOs for Ops
"The inspection and Repair of
Minefield Perimeter Fences"

EMERGENCY REMOVAL OF A CASUALTY FOR A MINEFIELD

NOTE : The guiding principle is that if there is an accident whilst endeavouring to rescue a casualty, the casualty will die due to the extra delay or the additional wounds he will get.

DRILL

1. Can the Pioneers or Engineers be called in 10 minutes ? If so, do so, and keep out unless you are an expert.
2. Call medical assistance.
3. If Pioneers or Engineers cannot be called in time :-
 - (a) Get some material for making up safety pins.
 - (b) Get something to mark your way in. Assault cable is good.
 - (c) Enter the minefield crawling and :-
 - (i) feel for trip wires ;
 - (ii) prod for mines ;
 - (iii) make mines safe and lift to one side ,
 - (iv) fix down route marker ; and
 - (v) advance and repeat drill.
 - (d) On reaching the casualty search around him so that you do not stand on a mine and so that he does not move and hit one.
 - (e) Carry out minimum first aid (stop bleeding)
 - (f) Remove casualty.
4. REMEMBER - To get a casualty out single handed a gap wide enough to stagger along is needed - say at least 30 inches wide.
5. If a stretcher party is behind you, do not let them enter the minefield until you have reached the casualty. If you have an accident you do not want them to be injured. Make sure they understand how you have marked your way in.
6. REMEMBER
If you are slow the casualty may die
If you rush he is BOUND TO DIE

OPENING NARRATIVE

1. The political situation at HANMUNJON and elsewhere has become impossible and it has become obvious that a resumption of hostilities in KOREA is under consideration by the Communists.
2. On 15 Nov 53 the CG I Corps called his div comds to a conference and told them that reliable sources indicated that a CCF offensive, with the mission of capturing SEOUL, was a distinct possibility within the next week.
3. However, he anticipated that he would receive about 24 hrs warning of such an offensive.
4. He advised his div comds that the CCF now had sufficient jet ac immediately available to enable them to achieve local air superiority in a selected area for as long as four or five days, and the indications were that they would use ac if an offensive were launched.

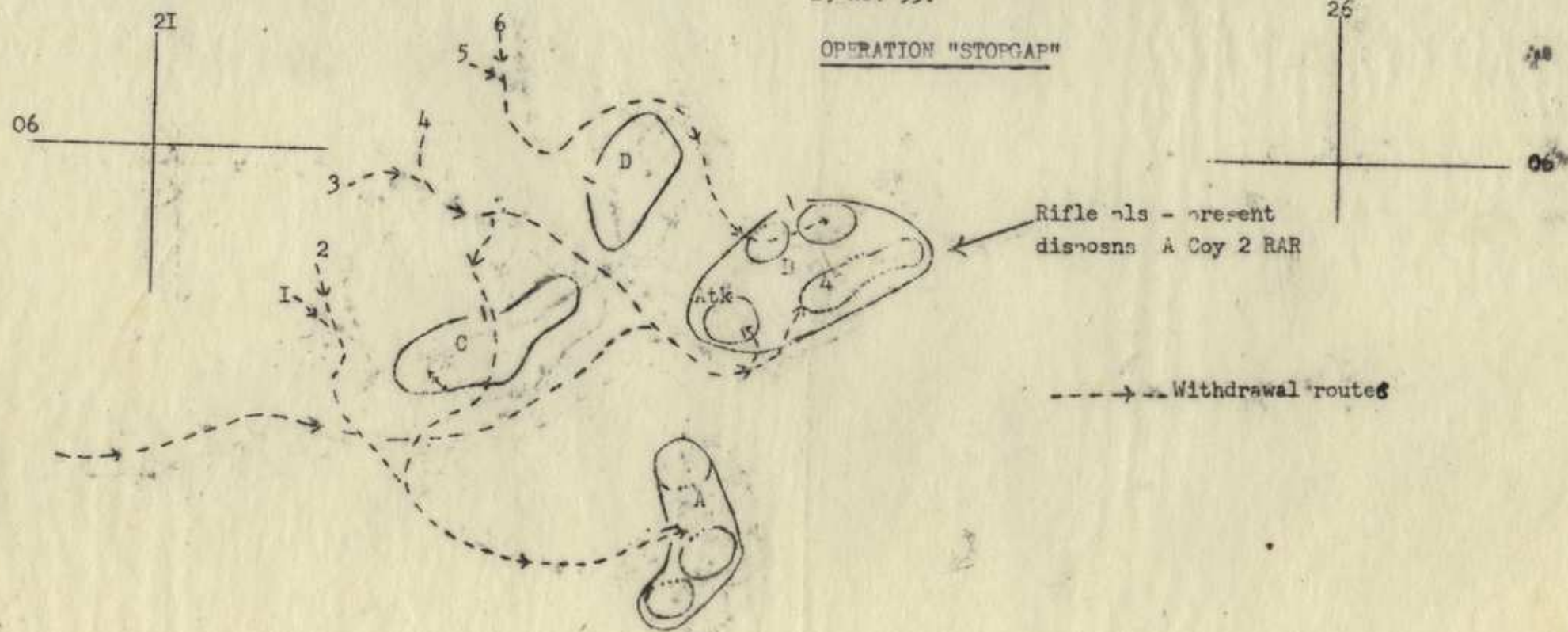

MEDICAL REPORT

WAR DIARY - November 1953

The Bn continued with winterization of Area 6 and intensified preparation of KANSAS positions during November.

The weather was much colder and this resulted in moderate incidence of upper RESPIRATORY TRACT infections, none very serious, however V.D. again showed a slight rise on previous months, fifteen cases of definite Venereal origin and twenty two of non-specific urethritis were seen. NO MALARIA occurred but Pte COOK W.G. was evacuated 7 Dec 53 as suspect HAEMORRHAGIC FEVER. He was later diagnosed as SCRUB TYPHUS - the second case to occur in KOREA in recent months. This soldier had been on D.M.Z. patrol.

The Bn occupied its KANSAS positions for several days in mid-November, as part of a Divisional exercise and for the first time, the RAP was allowed to occupy its tactical position. Evacuation of practice casualties through CCP (38 Canadian Field Ambulance) was satisfactory and the exercise provided a good shakedown for the whole medical staff, which has changed considerably since the cessation of hostilities.

The various dogs in the unit were inoculated against RABIES during November.

Cpls BROWN I.G. (RAAMC), A Coy and BLACKFORD (RAAMC) C Coy, left for School of Army Health early in November. Cpl STUBBS D.J. (RAAMC) moved to RAP from D Coy. STUBBS was granted reversion to ranks after Sgt BROOK's return to unit at the end of the month.

Stretcher bearers had gradually fallen away in numbers due to postings and transfers. A call for volunteers had little effect but it is hoped that trained bearers will arrive shortly among reinforcements.

Visitors during the month were D.D.M.S., Brig FRANKLIN and Maj COOK D.A.D.M.S.. The problem of supply, which has become increasingly difficult, was discussed with the latter.

An indifferent report resulted from divisional hygiene inspection on 27 November. It was felt that some criticisms were unfair and were due more to the untidiness of quarters and kitchens undergoing winterization than actual hygiene breaches.

THE UNITED NATIONS

Why is it there are so many men who hold little regard for the United Nations? Constantly there is heard criticism and abuse for this organisation.

It appears they believe that as the League of Nations failed, then the United Nations is doomed to the same fate. As a matter of interest, what do you know about the United Nations?

You probably know that it is the organisation behind the allied forces here in Korea. Some say United Nations should not have interfered with the dispute of Korea. But it would do no less for Australia were she molested by an aggressive nation. It is not seditious to say that the United Nations is communistic in principle. The ideals of communism are the pooling of resources, and the division of that pool evenly. Proportionate to the size of the country, United Nations receives money from each nation big or small. Each get a fair share in return. If a lesser nation is aggressively attacked by a stronger country, United Nations is morally obliged to stand by the side of the wronged.

Settling disputes between nations is but one of its aims. Its duties are manifold. New Guinea had an earthquake and eruption; thousands were homeless and in need. United Nations sent aid in the form of clothes and medicine. When another nation suffers drought, famine or disaster, she is cared for. The less advanced countries receive help in the form of education for illiterate, advanced ideas on agriculture and farming. Definitely not a cause to be reviled.

Why should America head United Nations? As America is its vast financial member naturally she has the most say. But each nation, no matter how small has the right to veto any suggestion on which it does not agree.

Possibly only the comic book war from Mars will ever wholly unite the nations of the world, but understanding, less ignorance and more sympathy towards this organisation, will go a long way towards that end.

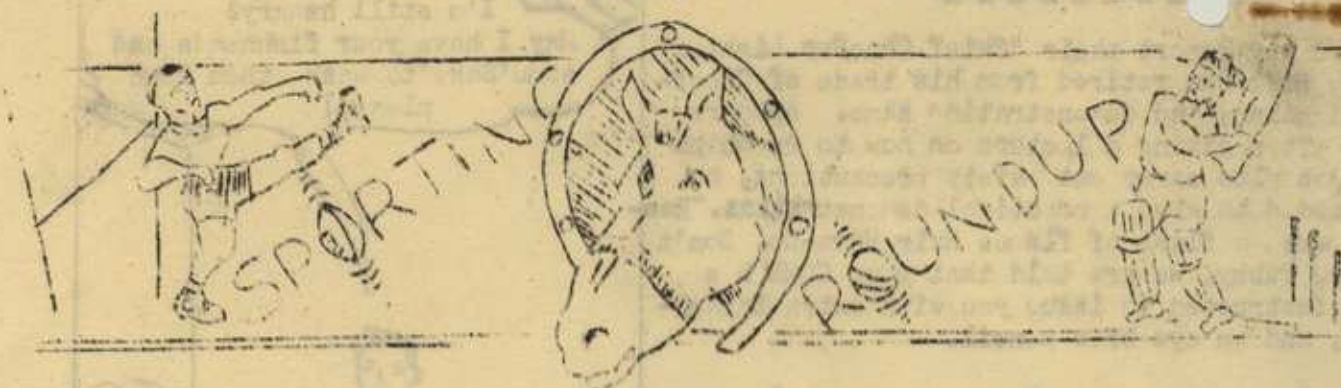

DEFENCE WORKS - LOZENGE

TASK

1. With effect from 23 Nov 53, each coy will erect the following MINIMUM length of protective wiring (Cat wire Type 2) at LOZENGE in each week :-

A Coy	- 1000 yds
B Coy	- 900 yds
C Coy	- 1300 yds
D Coy	- 1200 yds
Sp Coy	- 600 yds

TOTAL	- 5000 yds

STORES

2. Stores required for the task will be drawn from the allocations given in 3 RAR memo S2/5425 of 14 Nov 53.

LAYOUT

3. Protective wiring will be erected in three belts, approximately 40, 80 and 120 yds forward of fire posns :-
- (a) around coy locs; and
 - (b) between pl locs (and in A Coy between sec locs, where they are on separate features).
4. The priority for the erection of wire is :-
- (a) 40 yd fence around coy loc;
 - (b) 80 yd fence around coy loc;
 - (c) fence between pl and sec locs;
 - (d) 120 yd fence.
5. Each leg of the fences must be sited so that, at least in the case of the 40 and 80 yd belts; it can be covered by fire.
6. The run of each fence will be taped and approved by the OC Coy concerned before wiring begins.
7. To ensure that fences are erected as rapidly as possible, wiring parties should be formed within each coy. Members of the parties will be issued with denims to protect their clothing against tears.
8. The drill for erecting Catwire Type 2 fences is attached as Appx A. Ultimately the ground between each belt of protective wire will be filled with low wire entanglement.

SAFE LANES

9. In the case of A and B Coys, safe lanes will be cleared in which fences will be erected.

10. The clearing and taping of safe lanes, each of which will be 8 yds wide, will be the responsibility of the OC Aslt Inr Pl. A and B Coys respectively will :-

- (a) provide such assistance to OC Aslt Inr Pl as is required by him; and
- (b) indicate where the safe lane is required.

11. Gaps will be left in the wire for patrols, etc. Where gaps are required, the two ends of the fence will overlap 10 ft.

NOTES ON THE ERECTION OF CATWIRE (TYPE 2) FENCES

CONSTRUCTION PARTY

1. Each party should consist of 1 NCO and 10 men.

DIRECTION OF WORK

2. The fence is usually constructed from LEFT to RIGHT, facing the enemy.

PREPARATION

3. Tracing tape will be laid along the line of the fence and, in the case of A and B coys, along either side of the safe lane.
4. Once a length of fence is erected, the tape will be removed and reused.
5. Tape marking the sides of safe lanes in A and B Coys will be replaced, as it is removed, with a standard minefield perimeter fence.
6. Stores required for each 100 yds of fence will be dumped at intervals along the run of the fence by working parties detailed for that purpose.

SUPERVISION

7. The comd of the wiring party will :-
 - (a) see that the tasks are carried out in proper sequence;
 - (b) see that wires are strained and spaced correctly;
 - (c) see that windlassed connections are being made correctly and at the right points.

STORES

8. Stores required for the erection of 100 yds of Catwire Type 2 fence are :-
 - 24 Concertinas
 - 3 (400 yd) coils barbed wire
 - 96 x 6ft channel (NOT screw) pickets
 - Small stores (tracing tape, wire cutters, windlassing sticks, sledgehammers).
9. Providing that stores are laid out on the site, the fence should be erected at the rate of 100 yds in 100 mins, by one party of 1 NCO and 10 men familiar with their task.

DESCRIPTION OF FENCE (See diagram)

10. The Type 2 fence consists of four coils of concertina wire laid in two rows. Each row consists of one concertina on top of the other.
11. Rows are held in position by 6 ft pickets driven into the ground for 18 inches at 10 ft intervals. Pickets in the centre row are staggered centrally between pickets in the two outside rows.
12. Pickets in each row are joined by three strands of barbed wire, forming, in effect, a "cattle fence" on either side of the concertinas. The bottom strand of barbed wire should be windlassed to the bottom concertina between pickets when the fence is completed, and should be left slack in the first instance for this reason. The top strand should also be windlassed to the top concertina at each picket.

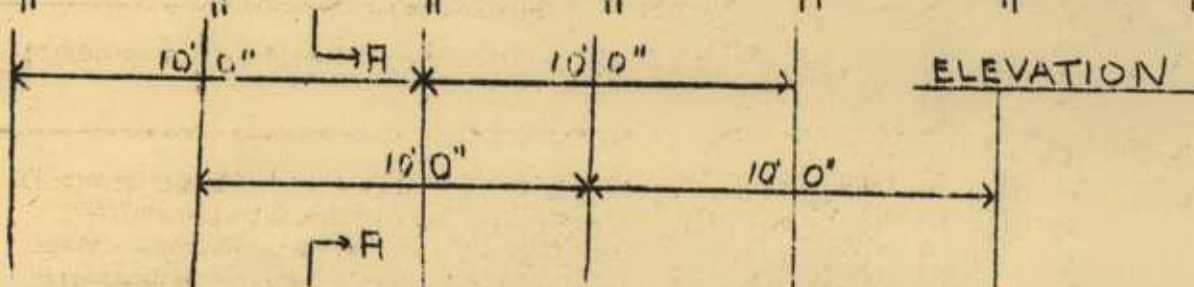
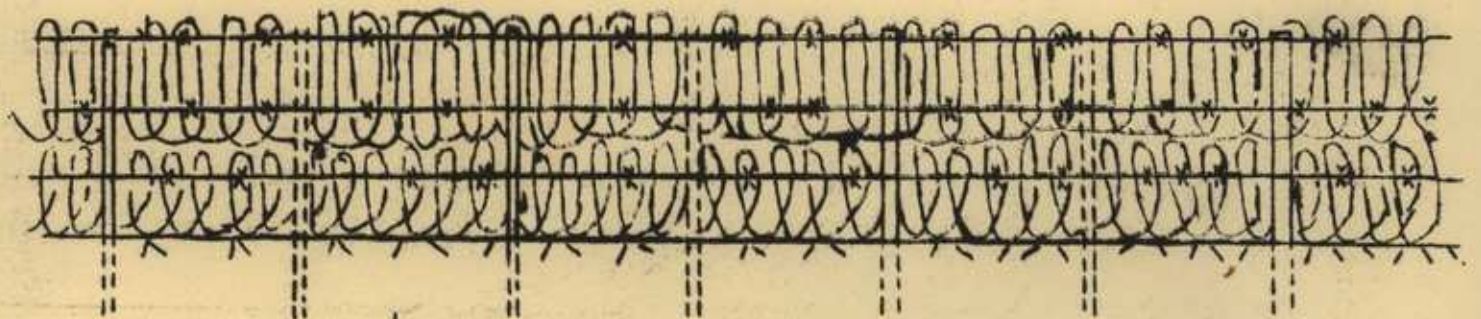

13. The following drill modified as necessary to meet the requirements should be adopted:-

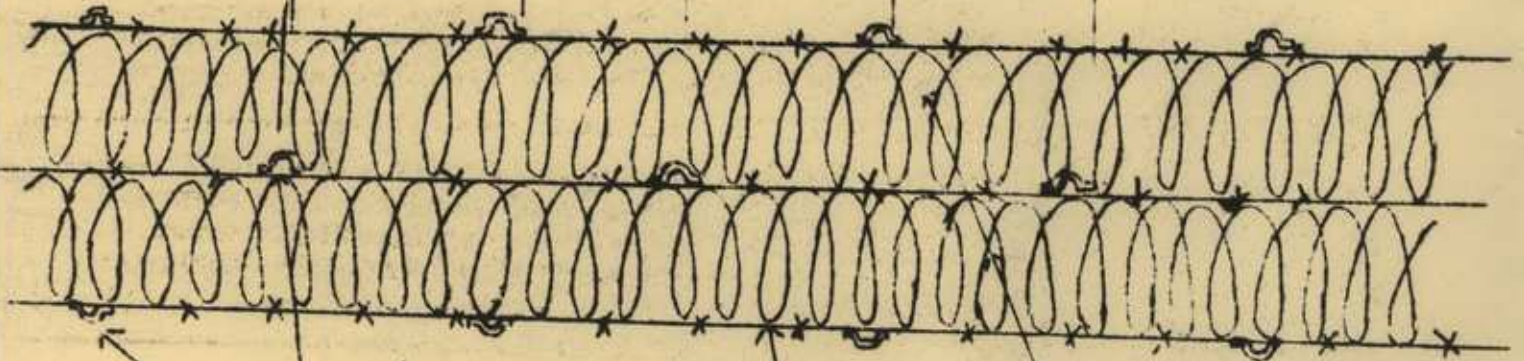

5.	E	The three fence wire parties C1,2 and 3, form two concertina parties and place next two pairs of concertina in position and windlass them to enemy side cattle fence.
6.	A	Complete Task 1 on centre row of pickets.
7.	B	Complete Task 2 on centre row of pickets.
8.	C1 C2 C3	Complete Task 3 on centre row of pickets.
9.	D	Complete Task 4 on second row of concertinas.
10.	E	Complete Task 5 in second row of concertinas
11.	A	Complete Task 1 on home row of pickets.
12.	B	Complete Task 2 on home row of pickets.
13.	C1 C2 C3	Complete Task 3 on home row of pickets.

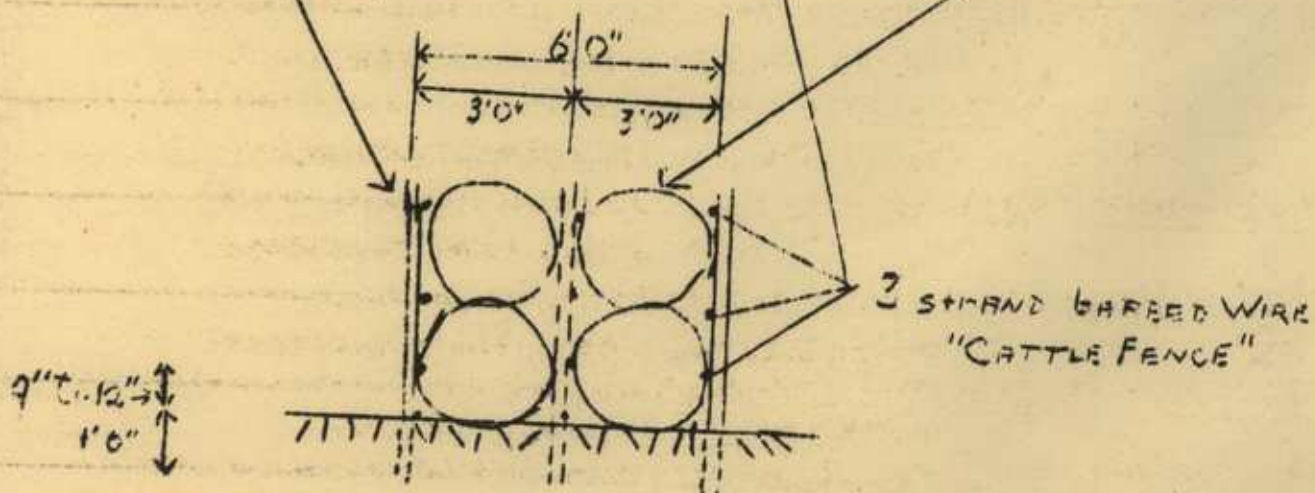
ELEVATION
