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## COMMANDERS DIARIES INSTRUCTIONS

#### AIM

1. The aim of a Commanders Diary is to provide data on which to base future improvements in Army training, equipment, organisation and administration, and to furnish historians with a record of the activities of units and formations in operational and non-operational periods in peace and in war.

#### GENERAL

- 2. Entries will be made daily on AF C2118, each entry being initialled by the officer detailed to keep it.
- 3. Commanders Diaries will conform with the rules for drafting orders given in "Staff Duties in the Field", Chapter 5, Section 1.

#### RESPONSIBILITY

#### **During Non-operational Periods**

4. A Commanders Diary will be made by commanders of all formations.

#### During Operational Periods (see note 1)

- 5. A Commanders Diary will be made in duplicate by:-
  - (a) Commanders of all formations.
  - (b) Each branch of the staff at formation headquarters commanded by a Brigadier or above.
  - (c) Heads of services not below the rank of Lieutenant Colonel.
  - (d) Personal staffs and officers holding special appointments.
  - (e) Unit commanders.
  - (f) Commanders of a detachment of a unit when so ordered.

#### COMPILATION

- 6. Both original and duplicate copies will consist of:-
  - (a) Cover (AF C2119).
  - (b) Index as printed on cover.
  - (c) Narrative (AF C2118).
  - (d) Annexes as shown in the Index.
- 7. All details of the unit or formation (if a detachment is concerned, the name of the parent unit), period covered and enclosure numbers of the annexes will be shown on the cover. If there has been a change of command since the last report, the date of assumption by the new commanding officer will be included.
- 8. The annexes will be assembled in the groups shown on the cover. If there are no enclosures for an Annex NIL will be entered on the cover. If additional annexes are convenient for a particular headquarters, the relevant papers should be grouped as annexes starting at B.

1. Attached as Annex A are the postings allocated to Australia for exercise purposes with

- The position regarding the attendance of other ranks from Australia has been explained to planners. It has been forecast that there will be a critical shortage of suitable NCOs for these NQs and the provision of OR personnel from Australia in place of the postings not filled (Ref Paragraph 2 above) is recommended. The positions are as shown below and are shadow posted in Australia.

- (a) One Cpl clerk typist. E2 (Int)
- (b) One Sgt Operations NCO. E3 (Ops)

#### HQ SEATO Field Forgo

(a) One Cpl clerk typist. (C4 (Logs) Movt Branch)

#### Final Planning Comference

be held in Bangkok on 4 Mar 63 to confirm proposals as to that date and to allow detailed briefs (Control and Umpire) to be concluded. This conference takes the place of the one planned for 15 Feb 63. Revised basic plans are now being distributed. One copy is being forwarded to ANQ by the Australian Military Adviser's Representative.

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#### Public Relations

- Further to paragraph 4 of the above reference. Whilst That planners are still working on a proposal for national consideration it appears that their thoughts were to distribute such donations as a SEATO gift. The fallacy of this in view of non participation in the exercise of three member nations was pointed out. The further fact that donating nations may desire their contribution to be identified as a national gift rather than a SEATO one was brought to notice. US, UK and NZ opinions are not available at this stage.
- 6. The type of gifts which will most probably be suggested are:-
  - (a) School requisites parcels of approximate cost 5-6 BT (about 2/4 2/9 Aust) and containing

One exercise book
One Ruler
Cne or more pencils and ersser.

(b) Medical requisites - to be provided by member nations in kind and made up into gift parcels containing:-

Aspirin, paludrine
Disinfectant
Ointment/Salves
Bandages, lint, plaster etc.

- 7. No indication of the quantity of gifts to various areas has been suggested. However, a population check of the area in which the Commonwealth Brigade will operate shows that at the most recent census (1958) the four major towns in the area were the centre of districts populated as under:
  - (a) UBON 100.000
  - (b) PYBUN MANGSAHAN 20,000
  - (c) AMNAT CHAREON 10,000
  - (d) MUANG SAN SIP 5,000
- 8. As there are numerous smaller centres between these main four any sort of equitable distribution of gifts may well be beyond the capacity of Commonwealth participats financial wise, whilst a token distribution may well cause more resentment than good will among the 'non-receivers'. These aspects were not raised with the Thai planners who conceived the scheme and they have been again asked for a firm proposal to present to National Authorities. This request will not be pressed unless directed and the idea may die a natural death on a time basis.

#### Cost Sharing

- 9. The revised proposal for proportional cost sharing for the exercise is attached at Annex B.
- 10. To summarize the proportional cost % is:-
  - (a) THAI 33.8
  - (b) US 59.1
  - (c) CW 7.1
  - (d) TOTAL 100%

SECRET

- 11. The recommendations of the Committee reviewing cost sharing are:-
  - (a) That the method of determining equitable national proportions of the Exercise Pool Expenses as derived in Method B of the enclosure be approved for this exercise.
  - (b) That the proportional percentage thus determined (paragraph 10 (a) (d) above) be applied to the Exercise Pool Expenses, to become effective as of E minus 16 day of this exercise (Umpire and Control personnel arrive in the training area this day).
  - (c) That the Exercise Pool Expenses incurred prior to E-16 be equally shared by the Sponsoring Nations. (THAILAND and UNITED STATES co-sponsors).

#### FARELF Planning Team

12. A team of officers was formed in SINGAPORE on 1 Feb 63 to plan FARELF participation in Exercise "DHANARAJTA". The tasks and composition of this team is detailed at Annex C.

#### Exercise Deputy Director

13. GHQ has requested the provision of the Exercise Deputy Director from Australia as a UK officer from FARELF is required to fill the appointment of Deputy Field Force Commander. The Exercise Deputy Director will be of Major General rank and would require an ADC. Ideally the Deputy Director is required in Bangkok from now until the end of the exercise. Please advise if this officer could be provided by Australia.

- 1. In accordance with reference (a), and in preparation of Annex C (Finance) to the Exercise Support Plan, the U.S. representatives have prepared a proposal for cost sharing of common expenses that will be incurred during the exercise. Enclosure (1) contains the derivation of the cost share method and contains the recommendations for its adaptation to this exercise.
- 2. It is requested that you review enclosure (1) for comments and/or recommendations, and that you initiate necessary procedures for expeditious approval by your respective national commanders.
- 3. Subsequent to your approval of this proposal, a listing of objects of expenditure to be classed as exercise pool expenses, and the estimated approximate amounts of national exercise pool expenditure will be submitted for your consideration and approval.

#### DERIVATION OF EXERCISE POOL EXPENSES PROPORTIONAL SHARE FACTORS

- 1. (Chap 6, para 2.c., SEAP 4) A percentage of the exercise pool expenditure is to be borne by each participating nation. National contributions should be in direct proportion to the number of troops being exercised and/or tons of supporting material.
- 2. National troops participating in this exercise have been committed as follows:

THAI - 16,241 = 67.87% of total troops
U.S. - 6,644 = 27.77% of total troops
C.W. - 1,012 = 4.23% of total troops
P.I. - 32 = 0.13% of total troops
TOTAL - 23,929 = 100.00% of total troops

3. By a literal interpretation of paragraph 1. above, proportional shares may be computed as follows:

#### METHOD A - Number of National Troops Committed to the Exercise

% of cost is equal to % of troops committed or computed in paragraph 2. above.

- 4. While METHOD A provides a simple formula that falls within the guidance of SEAP 4, it does not reflect another form of participation equipment and material. Such a factor might be derived by considering the amount of material and equipment required for the support of the participating national forces applied to the percentage of national troops committed to the exercise. Chapter 6 of SEAP 9 (LOGISTICAL HANDBOOK) provides several logistical factors which might be effectively utilized in the determination of a suitable cost share formula.
- a. Initial equipment deployed by SEATO forces is listed as 1.5 tons per man deployed. This is an average figure used for planning purposes only. Individual national initial equipment tonnage factors are as follows:

U.S. - 1.8 tons per man U.K., N.Z., AS, FR - 1.6 tons per man TH, PK, P.I. - 1.1 tons per man

b. Consumption factors for a Brigade Group/RCT are listed as 35 lbs/man/day and for COMZ troops as 42.5 lbs/man/day. These factors are also only general planning factors and do not apply to national forces. National consumption rates for a Brigade Group/RCT type unit are as follows:

U.S., U.K., N.Z., AS, FR - 42.5 lbs/man/day TH, PK, P.I. - 35.0 lbs/man/day

c. These initial equipment and consumption factors, although based here on a type Brigade Group/RCT ground unit, are, in the drivation of a standard cost share formula, applicable to all forces committed, both ground air.

5. Therefore, a factor that, when applied to the number of respective national troops being exercised yields an equitable percentage for proportionally sharing the Exercise Pool Expenses, is derived from multiplying the respective national initial . tonnage factors by the respective national consumption factors. Thus:

#### MALARIA - BORDER OPS 1 AUG - 10 OCT

#### General

1. There have been an inordinately large number of malaria cases since 2 RAR has been on Border Operations in Kedah and Perlis - North Malaya. These notes consist of the RMO's observations which it is hoped may give an insight into the problems facing units in this theatre. There can be no one cause for the high rate but is the sum of several inter-related contributing factors.

#### Statistics

- 2. See Annex III.
- In any clinical infection one can equate the resistance of the host and the virulence of the parasite.

#### Resistance of the Host

- 4. a. Excessive fatigue
  - b. Food
  - c. Sleep
  - d. Physical environment
  - e. Associated illness
  - f. Suppressive or prophylactic drugs.

#### Virulence of the Parasite

- In malaria this could be called "Degree of Endemicity" which is determined by a variety of related factors the most important of which are:
  - a. The prevalence in man the reservoir
  - b. The species of indigenous anopheline mosquito and their abundance.
  - c. The presence of susceptible human population 2 RAR
  - d. Local climatic, geographical and hygrographic conditions which determine the mosquito breeding areas.
  - e. The sensitivity or resistance of the parasite to suppressive drugs.

#### Resistance of the Host

- a. A break through of clinical activity will occur in the presence of excessive fatigue. On operations, particularly following the first C.T. contact and the later C.T. camp finds, the Rifle Coys had long periods of strenuous and prolonged physical activity. Many troops were seen with mimor degrees of acute fatigue.
  - b. Food. During the 10 weeks all Coys have existed on the British Pattern 24 hour ration pack. Most soldiers agree that these are good rations over a short period. Disadvantages are:-
    - (1) Monotony. After several weeks the soldier dislikes some items he mormally would accept.

2/ ....

- (2) The problem of bulk. Most soldiers have had to carry seven days ration into the jungle. It is ridiculous and impossible to stow there in a 1944 pattern haversack which appears to be designed for one. Consequently through this specific items all discarded. The soldier usually discards the same item from each pack. After a month or two of this the soldier develops a minor nutritional deficiency. Every soldier in 2 RAR on operations lost at least 8 lb. Some soldiers lost 2 stones.
- c. There is no lack of SLEEP whilst patrolling.
- d. Physical environment. Excessive activity in the humid lowlands in which 2 RAR were operating tends to fatigue the soldier much quicker probably through Salt lack. It also dulls the appetite. The soldiers appear much happier working in undulating terrain.
- e. The suppressive drug for 2 RAR is Paludrine. One tablet taken morning and evening throughout operations the Platoon Commanders administered this religiously two subalterns had just been interviewed by the Bde Commander. Several soldiers admitted missing paludrine whilst on leave. These soldiers developed BT malaria. In BT malaria paludrine is a suppressive at the erythrocytic stage of schizogony a schizonticide. In MT malaria paludrine is actually a prophylactic and must act at the preerythrocytic stage.
- f. In much the same way as excessive fatigue any acute illness can precipitate a clinical malaria. This was evident in four cases of leptospirosis.

#### Virulence of Parasite

- 7. In malaria this could be called "degree of endemicity" which is determined by a variety of inter-related factors:
  - a. Prevalence in man the reservoir.

The RMO and Hyg inspector did a malaria reconnaissance of the area as marked in Annex 2.

Thirty five natives were examined. The spleens felt varied in size but not one was seen that was not protruding into (L) iliac fossa. Some spleens were grossly enlarged. One was so gross that the child had great difficulty in sitting.

These figures are not comprehensive but are enough to say that the area was hyperendimic.

- b. A cursory inspection of the mosquitos in the area showed several species of the anopheline. All mosquitos were abundant.
- The new host: In the close vicinity of the area marked in Annex 2A.B.C. and elements of Sp, D and BHQ had camps at various periods. See Annex I. Indeed A Coy was camped 400 yards from the kampong at one stage. As can be seen by the graph (Annex I) each

coy developed MT or clinical malaria within the incubation period of being in this specific area (10 - 13 days). Those troops who did not go into this area did not get MT malaria with one exception.

- d. Throughout the area were thousands of buffalo wallows stagnant pools padi, creeks. There was mosquito breeding in all of these. The area is a humid lowland area. The season was not particularly wet. (there was active mosquito breeding in pools.)
- e. Although not shown on the map there is quite a deal of old rubber in Perlis. To the north of the road on the map are old plantations. According to several Malays questioned some people in that area particularly rubber tappers were given irregular doses of paludrine. It seems probable that a resistant strain of MT malaria has been manufactured.
- 8. There were four cases of BT malaria in 10 weeks. Three of the soldiers admitted to the RMO that they had missed paludrine for a few days whilst on leave. Control is difficult when soldiers have an alcoholic bout for 7 days. (see Annex III)

#### Summary

- 9. There is a resistant strain of malignant Fertian malaria in the northern part of Perlis State. This resistant strain as well as nutritional deficiency and physical fatigue seems to be the main cause of the high rate.
- 10. A second cause is the missing of paludrine during leave periods mostly up to one week.

#### Recommendations

- ll. RMO recommends that whilst on operations chloroquine tabs. weekly be given as well as daily paludrine. This was suggested in March 1962 but refused by medical authorities. This would not detract anything from the discipline of the soldiers or their confidence in paludrine. Since the first four or five cases of malaria the soldiers have had almost a menace for taking paludrine mainly I suspect to disprove my ascertions that "paludrine will supprest malaria". They are convinced now that paludrine will not stop MT malaria especially when they see their platoon commanders and NCO succumbing. Chloroquine would also ensure that soldiers going on leave for up to a week had adequate care. Many soldiers are now buying chloroquine at the local chemists shops.
- 12. These notes are intended to excuse the Bn for the high rate of malaria.

- Reference 'D' detailing suggested amendments to the above establishment, is forwarded herewith for Army Headquarters consideration.
- 2. This Headquarters agrees with the suggested amendments. It is recommended that the barracks staff increment, as detailed in paragraph eight of Reference 'O' be implemented with the other amendments.
- No alteration has been made to the scaling of first reinforcements for the battalion. It is noted that the first reinforcement scale listed in the establishment (10 officers and 156 OR) which is based on one month's wastage at the intense rate, varies from the reinforcement scale listed at Appendix 1 to Annex B to E Comd Op Instr 2/61 of 3 May 61 (revised 10 Jan 62). The latter figures are 7 Offrs and 141 OR, based on wastage from all causes in the first month subject to replacement from AUSTRALIA. For information, the UK battalion first reinforcement scale is 6 Offr and 128 OR and that for the NZ battalion is 9 Offrs and 176 OR. Further reinforcements for these battalions are provided as required.
- It is accepted that the battalion, if committed to operations in Plan TAFFY, will operate initially with a rifle section organisation of one corporal and six OR. This is acceptable providing the sections are reinforced to this minimum effective strength. Subsequently the rifle companies should be made up to full strength by 108 fillers by which the battalion is underimplemented.
- Our recommendation, that the initial infantry battalion element of Plan REFIT provide first reinforcements as well as fillers (Reference 'B' refers), is applicable to the battalion as amended by Reference 'C'.
- GHQ clearance is awaited and any GHQ comments will be advised by signal.

# AMENDMENT TO ESTABLISHMENT INFANTRY BATTALION - BRITISH COMMONWEALTH FAR EAST STRATEGIC RESERVE AUST VIII/320/1 (TE) UK FE 1338/3/61 (P&W) (Regt)

- As directed, amendments to the establishment of an infantry battalion in BCFESR are forwarded herewith. It is recommended that the establishment be amended prior to the reorganization of 3 RAR. It will be noted that the new proposal reduces the establishment to 729 a reduction of eight all ranks.
- An endeavour has been made to make the organization as compatable as possible with its British and New Zealand counterpart. However any attempt at further standardization poses the question of disbandment of Support Company. It has been the experience of 2 RAR that the retention of a Support Company is a more efficient organization than building up Rifle Companies by attaching supporting arms. The retention of Support Companies gives the CO the necessary flexibility particularly in this theatre where because of difficulties of terrain company groups would have to be constantly broken down because supporting weapons cannot be carried across country at infantry pace. The most likely movement of mortars or anti-tank guns is by helicopter which is best organized on a battalion basis. British COs generally seem to favour the retention of Support Company and point out that the Company Group organization is dictated by external worldwide consideration of British Army policy rather than suitability for his area.
  - 3. It is considered therefore that the conversion of the Aust battalion to a Company Group basis would result in a loss of operational efficiency. As the Support weapons etc are the same in all battalions a difference in internal organization should have no effect on the functioning of the Comwel Bde.
  - 4. Whilst retaining Support Company some standardization can be achieved by reducing the numbers of mortars from eight to six. It has been found in exercises over the past twelve months that limitations on ammunition make six mortars the most efficient fire unit. A reduction has therefore been recommended.
  - of rifle platoons to ensure that in the event of the unit being brought up to its war establishment, the increase in personnel can be absorbed in the battalion without the disadvantages of a major reorganization. It is proposed therefore that rifle platoons be organized into four sections comprising 1 NCO and 6 men. The REFIT requirement would

2/ ...

remain as 108 ORs. These ORs would provide two reinforcements for each rifle section plus one rifleman on Pl HQ to make up the second man on the two inch mortar. The only overall change involved would be the upgrading of one private to Cpl in each platoon (total 12 for bn) with a compensating reduction of 12 Cpls to Ptes in the REFIT increment. No overall change in manpower is involved.

- There are weaknesses in the current establishment in the transport platoon. In this theatre the transport is run along British administrative lines and the present establishment has been unable to cope with the extra administrative burden. The running of POL accounts, FAMTO stores and the extra clerical work warrant an increase of three personnel. In addition the absence of drivers to drive the four ½ ton prime movers in the Anti-Tk Pl and the Pioneer Pl Stores Truck has seriously hampered the operation of these platoons. However by reducing the overall number of vehicles in the battalion by nine it is possible to rectify these discrepancies without any increase in establishment.
- Another weakness has been in the number of RAEME personnel. Because of REME policy units are expected to do far more unit repair than in Australia. A detailed case for an increase in Establishment was forwarded under cover of our 132/3/4 of 20 Aug 62. It is considered that this increase can be offset by a reduction in AACC personnel.
- Another additional burden in this theatre is the work involved in handling Barrack Stores under the British system. The present establishment makes no provision for these additional duties and the Australian battalion is under a severe disadvantage compared with its British counterpart. Our 132/3/6 of 10 Apr 62 proposed that a Barracks increments should be provided for Canberra Lines and should comprise the following:-

One WO Class 2 One Cpl One Clerk (Pte)

You will recall that this proposal was not approved by AHQ. Since the date of original submission experience has shown that the British requirements are even more stringent than was then envisaged and the saving in manpower will probably have/be balanced against discrepancies in the Barracks Stores Account. You may consider it an appropriate time to reopen this subject with a view to either having the personnel as a separate increment or even as part of the unit establishment to offset the proposed overall reduction of eight all ranks. No provision for this increment has been made in this submission.

- 9. As directed consideration has also been given to the REFIT requirement during the period until 2 RAR is relieved. It is considered that in the event of 2 RAR being committed the extra "bayonets" are required to strengthen the fighting element of the battalion. The present plan provides for the raising of an extra section in each platoon and it is considered that there should be no change to the present plan.
- 10. Annex A sets out the amendments in detail while Annex B gives detailed reasons to support each proposed amendment.
