COMMANDERS DIARIES
INSTRUCTIONS

AIM

1. The aim of a Commanders Diary is to provide data on which to base future improvements in Army training, equipment, organization and administration, and to furnish historians with a record of the activities of units and formations in operational and non-operational periods in peace and in war.

GENERAL

2. Entries are to be made daily on AF C 2118 (Adapted) each entry being initialled by the officer detailed to keep it.

3. Commanders Diaries will conform with the rules for drafting orders given in "Staff Duties (Australia)" Chapter 2, Section 12.

RESPONSIBILITY

During Non-operational Periods

4. A Commanders Diary is to be compiled by commanders of all formations.

During Operational Periods (1)

- 5. A Commanders Diary is to be compiled in duplicate by:
 - a. Commanders of all formations.
 - b. Each branch of the staff at formation headquarters commanded by a brigadier or above.
 - c. Heads of services not below the rank of lieutenant colonel.
 - d. Personal staffs and officers holding special appointments.
 - e. Unit commanders.
 - f. Commanders of a detachment of a unit when so ordered.

COMPILATION

6. Both original and duplicate copies are to consist of:

- a. Cover (AF C 2119) (Adapted).
- b. Index as printed on cover.
- c. Narrative (AF C 2118) (Adapted).
- d. Annexes as shown in the Index.

7. All details of the unit or formation (if a detachment is concerned, the name of the parent unit), period covered and enclosure numbers of the annexes are to be shown on the cover. If there has been a change of command since the last report, the date of assumption by the new commanding officer is to be included.

8. The annexes are to be assembled in the groups shown on the cover. If there are no enclosures for an annex NII will be entered on the cover. If additional annexes are convenient for a particular headquarters, starting at B.

COMMA DISPOSAL DIARIES

13. **Original Commander's Diary.** This is to be forwarded monthly, unless otherwise ordered, by the seventh day of the succeeding month direct to AHQ.

14. **Duplicate Commander's Diary.** This must be clearly marked as a duplicate. It is to be sent separately from the original to AHQ one month after the original has been despatched but not before the former has been acknowledged.

15. When overseas, both copies of diaries are to be sent through the Army Records organization in the overseas theatre but at different times.

16. **TOP SECRET Supplementary Diaries.**

a. The documents referred to in Paragraph 9 together with a list of them made out on AF C 2118 (Adapted) must be placed in separate cover (AF C 2119) (Adapted). All details must be filled in and the cover clearly marked in red: "ANNEX Z — OFFICER ONLY". It may be convenient to group the papers by appendices.

b. Supplementary diaries must be forwarded under the normal rules for TOP SECRET correspondence, to AHQ. The inner envelope must be plainly marked:

VUNG TAU	1 Jun		<p>Last night at 2315 hours the NE sentry post (a small sand bagged structure) was shot at by an unknown person using a rifle. Only one round was fired and it ricocheted out of the bag. The incident could have been the action of a larrikin; it did not seem serious VC work. The latter surely would be more disposed to shoot at a tent full of sleeping soldiers rather than a well protected sentry. In this location it is not possible to shoot back without risking danger to civilians.</p> <p>The first member of 1st Field Regiment to be engaged on operations (if one excludes the activities of 105 and 161 Batteries who have served here since late September 1965 and June 1965 and do not join 1 Field Regiment until 6 Jun 66), is Sergeant DURNFORD of 103 Battery. He was given permission by the Commanding Officer to accompany a river boat patrol conducted nightly by the US Navy in the MEKONG Delta outlets. This particular patrol was intended to stop traffic across the river in support of 10 ARVN Division operating to the WEST. At 2030 hours, the patrol was fired on by a machine gun. Sgt DURNFORD manned one of the patrols' M60 machine guns and returned the fire. The area was subsequently</p>

VUNG TAU	1 Jun		<p>saturated by two armed helicopters, but, alas, on the return trip the patrol was mortared from the same area.</p> <p>At 1430 hours, the Commanding Officer flew NORTH to visit 105 and 161 Batteries on a "social" visit and to give them an idea of immediate developments. The two batteries are left rather in the dark at the moment; Command from 173 Abn Brigade to 1 ATF changes on 6 June and the batteries move to their new (ATF) locations on 5 June. Meanwhile, the US FA Battalions, of which they are a part, moves NORTH in support of US operations leaving our guns outranged and unemployable except in support of 5 RAR operations.</p> <p>The Commanding Officer of the US Artillery Battalion was prepared to leave behind approximately 1800 rounds HE with our two batteries. Fortunately the matter is not serious, because we have not the resources to store water even if it could be supplied and, of course, in the monsoon season, the soldiers can always leave their hats out to collect rainfall. Finally, of course, we can always drink from the padi fields and we have water sterilization tablets to rid its taste of nitrogenous matter.</p> <p>An administrative conference (Major McDERMOTT attended) for the movement forward of the Force was held this afternoon - before, alas, the operation order had been received. VUNG TAU	2 Jun		<p>The Commanding Officer, Second in Command and Captain TOWNLEY, commanding 1 ATF Locating Troop, attended the Task Force Commander's co-ordinating conference at 1000 hours associated with the deployment of the Task Force during 5-16 June. Relevant gunner points included the following:-</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">a. 105 and 161 Batteries are likely to retain, between them, about 1200 rounds of ammunition (US sources)b. 173 Brigade will release the batteries to their new locations from 0600 hours 5 June and will assist with transportc. With 5 RAR, we shall co-ordinate clearing operations of the HQ 1 ATF and gun areas on 5 Jund. The Sappers look like being able to provide a dozer to assist with gun pit construction. A dozer is a desirable piece of equipment for a RAA regiment in this theatre.e. IROQUOIS helicopters are unlikely to be available for 103 Battery's deployment on 6 June but CHINOOKs are on 5 June. It was clear that the RAAF had no wish to run the FSCC but they were anxious to take over the co-ordination of air effort and this is going to lead to a RAAF/USAF "power" struggle. This is unlikely to hurt 1 ATF because the FSCC will, in our time, consist of only two officers - an Airforce representative (USAF or RAAF) and a RAA representative. SQUIBB, in the back seat, saw five figures run into a patch of thick scrub. The plane circled the area; the forward observer in the aircraft also saw the figures and they were engaged as a battery target. Results are unknown. Unfortunately, owing to the tight turns of the aircraft, BSM SQUIBB was ill.</p>	
VUNG TAU	4 Jun		<p>The Second in Command led reconnaissance parties forward this morning attached to the 5 RAR road convoy. VUNG TAU	4 Jun		<p>G Staff and the heads of Services at the Headquarters).</p> <p>One of the latter, (Captain BLAND, the Task Force RAAOC Officer, a most helpful, competent and courteous officer), had the difficult task of presenting himself to the Commanding Officer late this morning, with the Commander's compliments, and requiring the Regiment to deliver to him a one section marquee of US origin. (Out of our totally inadequate tentage, this marquee, is at present housing 34 soldiers, and on their departure tomorrow to our new area, is intended to house our soldiers' trunks until these, too, may be called forward). Gunners and the RAAC are sick of being regarded as second class citizens. These impositions cannot be hidden from the soldiers. For example, today, the soldiers are called upon to dismantle the marquee in question and as there were four other soldiers from outside the Regiment present, they speedily learnt what was going on. The airlift was done by CHINOOK helicopters, each capable of lifting about 30 men. The movement was an hour ahead of schedule by the middle of the morning. On arrival it was raining and the HQ Bty party waited in the rubber plantation which is to be the TF area, while areas were allocated for various section of TF HQ. NUI DAT	6 Jun		<p>A conference this morning went partially towards settling the changeover of command difficulties confronting the Regiment and particularly 105 and 161 Batteries. The difficulties lie in the differences arising from an independent battery joining a regiment and in the change back from exclusively US procedures to normal Australian and New Zealand procedures. The Regimental standard procedures are being applied and as they are based largely on local experience it is hoped that not a great deal of amendment is required.</p> <p>One of the radars is now out of action as a result of a damage to the elevating motor. A replacement has been requested. It is understood that some are being repaired in Australia and that the School of Artillery has some.</p> <p>Major KENNING, BC 161 NZ Battery, visited the RAE and RAAC units (having no OPs) in order to help them select defensive fire tasks. (All Corps are manning the perimeter). Although these targets are being embodied in the DF plan, the latter is a pretty flexible plan - the infantry are obliged to change their requirements as their company bases and standing patrols change their locations.</p>

NUI DAT	6 Jun		<p>At 1925 hours tonight, the Regiment fired its first regimental target at a "large body of VC", as reported on reliable information from higher headquarters. Results unknown.</p> <p>Sentries of 161 Battery fired on a prowler, outside the wire, who ran behind a tree and disappeared.</p> <p>At 2147 hours, Radar 21A (Sgt SIMMONS) located its first mortar in action in an area 2,500 metres SE of our position. The mortar had not been detected and was situated on the road leading from PHUOC LONG (a destroyed VC village) to the EAST and in the middle of a large area in which we were carrying out harassing fire. We fired a bombard in suppression.</p> <p>After this eventful beginning (first Regimental target in action by an Australian regiment in 21 years, first locrep) the remaining radar slightly spoilt the record by subsequently locking on to a bird or something and giving an improbable locrep which occasioned a temporary flap at Tac HQ.</p>

NUI DAT	7/8 Jun		<p>not only themselves but also the Headquarters, but to do so with an inadequate supply of wire etc renders the task very difficult. Our Army continues to labour under the delusion that a field regiment is an infantry battalion with too many officers armed with guns. It is to be hoped that when our infantry in VIETNAM are educated, the lessons will percolate back to AUSTRALIA.</p> <p>Another cause for concern is the inadequacies not only of our establishment but also the thinking which went into its design. Today there were flocks of helicopters supplying ammunition at a fast rate. On the surface this sounds fine but in fact the supply had to be called off because there being only one LZ, the ammunition was stockpiling too fast and could not be cleared even using every soldier we owned. Moreover there was no transport to shift the stuff the odd 1000 yards to distant batteries anyway.</p> <p>This night developed into one of considerable activity. From PHUOC LONG village (the fortified and tunnelled VC village to the SE), a succession of mortars fired from an area of about 1500 by 2000 metres. Firing was spasmodic and indicated that each mortar appeared to be firing from a</p>

DF PLANNING

1. As an interim measure until the Task Force is complete on its new locations and a final co-ordinated DF plan can be produced, DF planning will be based on a list of pre-planned DF tasks of which a number will be selected as current DF tasks for the period 1800 to 0800 daily. The tasks selected will be determined by infantry movements and locations. At 0800 hrs, the currently selected DF tasks lapse. This does NOT mean that in the period 0800 to 1700, DF tasks cannot be engaged; it merely means that they cannot be engaged as DF tasks. On the other hand they can be engaged by an OP ordering the target number as an ordinary previously registered target. For example, target 5048 is a DF task for the night. It can be fired by ordering "Fire DF 5048". By day, when it ceases to be a DF it can be engaged by ordering "Fire Mission Bty. Tgt 5048 etc".

2. Additional DF tasks, if required may be presented by BCs using the OVERLOAD procedure. These targets (whose target numbers will be allotted by the BC concerned) will join the list and will thereafter remain on the list.

3. All previous DF lists are cancelled and should now be destroyed. Target records should be amended accordingly.
