COMMANDERS DIARIES INSTRUCTIONS

AIM

1. The aim of a Commanders Diary is to provide data on which to base future improvements in Army training, equipment, organization and administration, and to furnish historians with a record of the activities of units and formations in operational and non-operational periods in peace and in war.

GENERAL

2. Entries are to be made daily on AF C 2118 (Adapted) each entry being initialled by the officer detailed to keep it.
3. Commanders Diaries will conform with the rules for drafting orders given in "Staff Duties (Australia)" Chapter 2, Section 12.

RESPONSIBILITY

During Non-operational Periods

4. A Commanders Diary is to be compiled by commanders of all formations.

During Operational Periods (1)

5. A Commanders Diary is to be compiled in duplicate by:
 - a. Commanders of all formations.
 - b. Each branch of the staff at formation headquarters commanded by a brigadier or above.
 - c. Heads of services not below the rank of lieutenant colonel.
 - d. Personal staffs and officers holding special appointments.
 - e. Unit commanders.
 - f. Commanders of a detachment of a unit when so ordered.

COMPILATION

6. Both original and duplicate copies are to consist of:
 - a. Cover (AF C 2119) (Adapted).
 - b. Index as printed on cover.
 - c. Narrative (AF C 2118) (Adapted).
 - d. Annexes as shown in the Index.
7. All details of the unit or formation (if a detachment is concerned, the name of the parent unit), period covered and enclosure numbers of the annexes are to be shown on the cover. If there has been a change of command since the last report, the date of assumption by the new commanding officer is to be included.
8. The annexes are to be assembled in the groups shown on the cover. If there are no enclosures for an annex NII will be entered on the cover. If additional annexes are convenient for a particular headquarters, starting at B.

DISPOSAL
COMMANDER'S DIARIES

13. **Original Commander's Diary.** This is to be forwarded monthly, unless otherwise ordered, by the seventh day of the succeeding month direct to AHQ.

14. **Duplicate Commander's Diary.** This must be clearly marked as a duplicate. It is to be sent separately from the original to AHQ one month after the original has been despatched but not before the former has been acknowledged.

15. When overseas, both copies of diaries are to be sent through the Army Records organization in the overseas theatre but at different times.

16. **TOP SECRET Supplementary Diaries.**

a. The documents referred to in Paragraph 9 together with a list of them made out on AF C 2118 (Adapted) must be placed in separate cover (AF C 2119) (Adapted). All details must be filled in and the cover clearly marked in red: "ANNEX Z — OFFICER ONLY". It may be convenient to group the papers by appendices.

b. Supplementary diaries must be forwarded under the normal rules for TOP SECRET correspondence, to AHQ. The inner envelope must be plainly marked:

579. UNAUTHORISED DISCHARGE OF WEAPONS AND FIREARMS

1. Any member who negligently, or wilfully in breach of an order or his military duty, discharges or causes the discharge of any weapon is to be charged irrespective of his rank. He is not to RTA until the charge has been heard and concluded.
2. Care is to be taken that the charge is laid properly according to the circumstances in each case. When necessary, charges are to be drafted by legal officers.
3. HQ AFV is to be advised of the result of disciplinary action in each case.
4. When an investigation is deemed necessary, the investigating Officer's report is to be submitted to HQ AFV within 5 days after the incident. An investigation is to be ordered in every case where any member is injured by an unauthorized discharge. A SIB investigation is to be made at once in any case where it is suspected that there is a possibility of any such injury having been inflicted wilfully.
5. No disciplinary action or act which may amount to condonation is to be taken, or done, in respect of any member who, it is suspected, has wilfully wounded himself or another member by an unauthorized discharge, until the Investigating Officer's report has been considered by COMAFV and he has given his direction.

580. DRESS

587. SERVICES CANTEENS TRUST FUND EDUCATION AWARDS - 1970

1. Applications for Education Awards for 1970 for the Services Canteens Trust Fund are now being invited by the Trustees on the Fund. Applications close on 15 Oct 69

2. Due to the limited funds available Education Awards are granted only to eligible persons when the Adjusted Family Income is not more than:

- a. \$1300 in the case of orphans and where there are exceptional circumstances, such as the student having to live away from home to attend school, children of Social Service pensioners and children in separated, divorced or deserted families.
- b. \$1100 in other cases.

The Adjusted Family Income is calculated by taking the Gross Income of the Family and deducting 10% of that income for each dependant where the Gross Income does not exceed \$2400 and \$240 for each dependant if the Gross income exceeds \$2400.

3. These who are eligible for Education Awards are the children of men and women who served in the Australian Armed Forces between 3 Sep 39 and 30 Jun 47, and who during 1970 will be 14 years or over in the case of orphans or exceptional circumstances cases, and, 15 years or over in other cases.


4. Education Awards are provided primarily for secondary education but may be granted also for some tertiary and semi-tertiary courses in special circumstances.



546. MARRIAGE ASIANS - SERVICE PERSONNEL AND ASIAN NATIONALS

1. Any member of 2 AOD or attached personnel who is contemplating marriage to an Asian is to consult the OC 2 AOD before proceeding with such a marriage.
2. The above consultation is necessary to ensure that the serviceman is made fully aware of the administrative procedures involved in processing such a marriage.

547. AFV DETENTION BARRACKS

1. The AFV Detention Barracks, which was officially opened on May 26 1967, is located in the 1 ALSG area VUNG TAU.
2. The area of the AFV Detention Barracks is out of bounds to all personnel unless permission for entry has been granted by the Commandant.

548. QUARANTINE AND CUSTOMS PROCEDURE

1. AHQ Admin Instr No. 8 has been rewritten. It deals with Australian quarantine and customs requirements and procedures. Copies of the following annexes to the Instruction have been distributed throughout the Depot:-
 - a. Annex A - General Customs concessions available to all incoming passengers.
 - b. Annex C - Customs concessions to members of the Aust Defence Force on special service overseas. These concessions are in addition to those allowed in annex B.
2.
 - a. The main authoritative references on the subject of Australian customs and quarantine requirements are to be AHQ Administrative Instruction No. 8, (Jan 68) and this Routine Order. All members returning to Australia should be directed to read the portions of AHQ Administrative Instructions No. 8, dealing with Customs concessions.
 - b. There are several other AFV orders and instructions dealing with local procedures for movement of personnel, stores and equipments to Australia, which refer in part to Australian customs and quarantine requirements. These are listed below. Where inconsistencies exist between these instructions and the authoritative references stipulated in paragraph 4.1. of this Routine Order, the authoritative references will be adhered to, and the conflicting element of subsidiary references will have no force and effect.

c. All responsible Branches and subordinate headquarters are to immediately amend any orders or instructions in conflict with the two authoritative references.

d. The related AFV orders and instructions are:-

- (1) AFV (Army Component) Routine Order 135/67 and 136/67. These are to be amended immediately.
- (2) AFV (Army Component) Routine Order 5/68
- (3) AFV (Army Component) Administrative Instruction 41/67
- (4) AFV (Army Component) Administrative Instruction 6/67
- (5) AFV (Army Component) Administrative Instruction 8/67

PROHIBITED GOODS

3. GENERAL.

a. The quarantine and customs legislation of the Commonwealth is intended to benefit and protect the Australian community, by preventing persons from bringing diseases in to the country which affect human life and our animals and plants, and also by preventing the importation of goods which are potentially dangerous to health, life and limb. For this reason it is illegal to import dangerous or concealed weapons and firearms, explosives, narcotics and a wide range of attractive but potentially harmful goods of various kinds. These restrictions are clearly set out in the Quarantine, Customs and Excise Acts and Regulations, and are clearly defined in AHQ Administrative Instruction No. 8 (Jan 68). Your attention is specially directed to the contents of that instruction, ample copies of which are available at all locations.

b. Understandably the penalties for breaches of the Acts and Regulations mentioned are severe and are imposed in Australia by civil courts without regard to the position, status or intentions of offenders.

c. There have been several offences against these laws committed by members of AFV. Their actions have been to the discredit of the Force in general and indicate a disregard by these members for both military and civil law. The law must be obeyed.

d. An officer is to ensure that the contents conform with the prepared declaration.

e. He is to ensure that no dangerous weapon, explosive, firearm or ammunition is enclosed. He is also to check for readily detectable quantities or drugs. He is to report to finding of any of those items to his CO/OC.

f. He is to supervise the sealing of the package, and is to complete the proforma shown at Annex B. The proforma should be glued immediately below the Customs Declaration.

g. He is then to ensure that the package is given direct to the appropriate Aust FPO, with no opportunity being afforded to reopen the package or tamper with the Declaration.

h. The Aust FPO is to hold any package not endorsed in the manner stated at Annex B, and is to advise the appropriate unit orderly room. Under no circumstance is the package to be returned to the owner once it has been accepted by the Aust FPO.

54 GIFTS TO VIETNAMESE

1. Under no circumstances will any member of 2 AOD give anything to any Vietnamese employee to take out of the ALSG main gate.
2. Any member wishing to give anything to a Vietnamese employee, will do one of the following:-
 - a. Show the gift to the Vietnamese, wrap it and write the name of the person and 2 AOD on wrapping, then bring it to the OO Admin who will ensure it is given to the Vietnamese outside the main gate.
 - b. If it is desired to personally hand over the gift - the procedure above is to be carried out except that the gift may be taken to the main gate and handed over, once the Vietnamese is outside.
 - c. Consult the OO Admin.
3. Under no circumstances will a gift and authorising note be given to Vietnamese inside the ALSG Area.
4. Any member who contravenes any of the above will have disciplinary action taken against them.

550. MEDICAL ASPECTS - MOVEMENT OF MEMBERS FROM SOUTH VIETNAM

Aim

1. The aim of this Routine Order is to detail the medical administration which is prior to the movement of members from SOUTH VIETNAM.

MEMBERS POSTED HOME TO AUSTRALIA

2. By fourteen days before due date of departure, the member's RAP is to:-
 - a. Check that inoculation state (Smallpox, Cholera and Plague) is current for entry to Australia, and that IHC is correctly completed and signed.
 - b. Initiate antimalarial therapy in accordance with reference C. (If operational requirements prevent reposting at this time, antimalarial prophylaxis is to be commenced as early as possible).
 - c. Ensure medical documentation and any necessary tests are processed. (Including F Med 16).
3. Seven days before date of departure or as soon as possible after this date, if operational requirements prevent earlier reposting, members are to report to their RAP. RMO is to:-
 - a. Carry out medical and/or other essential examination to exclude infectious disease.
 - b. Warn the member of diseases which may develop on return to Australia, and what action he should take.
 - c. Endorse on the F Med 5;
 - (1) Date and place of examination.
 - (2) Date antimalarial course commenced.

- (3) Tests taken and tests required on RTA.
- (4) IHC correct.
- (5) No infectious disease.
- (6) Fit for RTA within seven days (if appropriate)

d. Attached to IHC a certificate that member is medically fit to proceed to Australia within seven days.

4. A member is to collect his IHC prior to march out and carry it on him while travelling. The medical record is to be processed in accordance with reference A.

5. The antimalarial course, as described in reference C. (Chloroquine and Primaquine), is required for all members including those taking other than paludrine for malaria prophylaxis. Paludrine, one tablet twice daily, is to be taken while the member is in SOUTH VIETNAM.

MEMBERS MEDEVAC TO AUSTRALIA

6. Hospital patients for medical evacuation to Australia are to be processed by 1 Aust Fd Hosp, which is responsible within the time limits available to carry out the medical procedure.

MEMBERS ON R & R TO AUSTRALIA

7. By fourteen days before date departure, the member's RAP is to check that inoculation state (Smallpox, Cholera and Plague) is current for entry to Australia and the IHC is correctly completed and signed.

8. Seven days before date of departure, or as soon as possible after this date if operational requirements prevent earlier reposting, the member is to report to his RAP. RMO is to:

a. Carry out medical and/or other essential examination to exclude infectious diseases which may develop on return to Australia and what action the member should take.

b. Advise the member of the necessity to continue malaria prophylaxis (Paludrine).

c. Attached to IHC a certificate that member is medically fit to proceed to Australia within seven days.

9. A member is to collect his IHC prior to march out and carry it on him while travelling. His medical record are to be retained at the RAP.

MEMBER ON EMERGENCY LEAVE TO AUSTRALIA

10. Before departure RMO is to carry out the procedure detailed in paras 8 and 9 above.

11. Quarantine officers will NOT permit entry into Australia of members whose inoculation state and IHC are NOT current.

MEMBER ON R & R TO LOCATIONS OTHER THAN AUSTRALIA

12. By fourteen days prior to departure, or as soon as possible after this date if operational requirements prevent earlier reporting, the member is to report to his RAP to ensure:-

- a. IHC is correctly completed and signed.
- b. Any necessary medical examination is carried out.
- c. Member is warned of the necessity to continue antimalarial prophylaxis (Paludrine).
- d. Member is warned of diseases which he may develop or contact while on R and R and what precautions and actions he should take.

13. A member is to collect his IHC prior to march out and carry it on him personally while travelling. His medical records are to be retained at the RAP.

551. POSSESSION AND USE OF PRIVATELY OWNED AND OF CAPTURED WEAPONS

1. For the purpose of this RO:
 - a. "WEAPONS" shall mean and include:-
 - (1) All firearms such as handguns, shotguns, rifles, carbines, light automatic weapons, and similar weapons which use an explosive force to propel a projectile.
 - (2) Knives with folding blades longer than three inches, swords, sabres, stilettos and spring release (switch blades) knives.
 - (3) Metal knuckles, blackjacks, saps, clubs and similar items.
 - (4) Instruments in which compressed air or a chemical propellant is used to fire a projectile.
 - b. "EXPLOSIVES" shall mean and include explosives or explosive devices such as hand grenades, smoke grenades, demolition charges, or explosive material such as TNT, G-3 primacord, or arming devices.
 - c. "AMMUNITION" shall mean and include any projectile having explosive force as a propellant.
 - d. Any part of, or any insert, or disarmed, or mutilated weapon, explosives, or ammunition of any kind, is to be deemed to be a weapon, explosive or ammunition as the case may be.
 - e. "POSSESSION" shall mean and include:-
 - (1) Has any weapon, explosives or ammunition in his custody; or
 - (2) Knowingly has any weapon, explosives or ammunition in the custody of another person corporation or entity; or,
 - (3) Knowingly has such weapon, explosive or ammunition in a house, building, lodging or open space whether belonging to him or occupied by him or not and whether such weapon, explosives or ammunition is had or placed there for his own use or the use of another.
2. Members serving in or attached for duty to, AFV (whether temporarily or not) are not to be in possession of weapons, explosives or ammunition unless they have been issued to them by or for, Australian Military sources, for the purpose of military duty, or are the property of the Commonwealth of Australia, or unless within the terms of para 5 or this RO their possession is specially permitted.

3. Units and sub-units commanders are to carry out periodic checks to ensure that personnel under their command, or supervision, are not in possession of weapons, explosives and ammunition contrary to paragraph 2 of this RO.
4. All enemy weapons explosives and ammunition captured by members are to be regarded as follows:-
 - a. In the case of capture by members of AATTV whilst serving with or attached to ARVN units as the property of GVN; and,
 - b. In every other case as the property of the Commonwealth of Australia, and are to be dealt with according to H. AFV GS Instr 25 of 16 Apr 68.
5. A member is not to use a captured weapon, explosive or ammunition unless with special permission of HQ AFV or HQ 1 ATF.
6. All members in possession of weapons explosives or ammunition, contrary to this RO, are to deliver the same of unit stores at once.
7. The AHQ and other authorities on the subject of this RO are contained in DA 79, MBI 129-5, ARO 35/68 and HQ AFV GS Instr 25 of 16 Apr 68 to which reference should be made. Units, sub-units or members are not to be in possession of any weapons, explosives or ammunition unless in accordance with this RO or the relevant authorities mentioned in this paragraph.
8. All previous ROs on this subject are cancelled.

552. AMATEUR RADIO OPERATION

1. The operation of amateur radios within the Republic of South VIETNAM is prohibited by civil law. Members of 1 ALSG are not to operate, or the parties to the operation of, amateur radio stations.

553. FREE POSTAGE TO AND FROM VIETNAM

1. Approval has been given for the introduction of free postage on personal correspondence:
 - a. To Australian servicemen in VIETNAM and HMA Ships in the area; and,
 - b. From Australian servicemen served by Aust FPOs in VIETNAM and from HMA Ships in the area to Australian addresses.
2. The approval also applies to personal correspondence to and from Australian servicemen attached to the Forces of the United States of America in VIETNAM addressed through a United States FPO, provided it is clearly indorsed "Australian Servicemen on Duty in VIETNAM". Members affected should inform their correspondents in Australia of this requirement.
3. Personal correspondence includes letters, lettercards, postcards, greeting cards and voice tapes.
4. Free postage is to apply to these articles posted on and after 1 Sep 68.
5. While the approval applies only to personal correspondence, incidental enclosures to letters such as a photograph will be allowed. Packages are not covered by the approval.
6. Voice tapes listed in the Post Office Guide as "phonopost" are limited to a maximum weight of 2 lbs and the external cover must be endorsed to the effect that the tape contains a personal communication, ie. personal lettertape.

7. Each article of mail eligible for free postage is to bear the senders full name and address on the reverse side and the word "FREE" is to be endorsed in the position which would normally be occupied by a postage stamp. If the word "FREE" is not shown, or is incorrectly positioned on any eligible article originating in VIETNAM, it is to be stamped or written prior to dispatch to Australia. Rubber stamps are to be obtained and issued to unit postal orderlies and to appropriate staff at the Aust FPOs.

8. All free mail is to be postmarked in the normal manner.

9. Special fees for registration etc are to continue. New rates for these fees will apply on and from 1 Oct 68.

10. Other concessions rates of postage for all other categories of mail remain unchanged. Free mail on eligible articles applies only to and from VIETNAM It does not apply to Malaysia, Singapore or Thailand.

11. Stock of 5c stamps, letter sheets and stamped envelopes should be reviewed and any in excess of requirement as at 1 Sep 68 are to be returned to appropriate cash office.

12. Any official mail which is dispatched other than in the official air bag is still required to be pre-paid at the full postage rate.

554. KNOWLEDGE OF ORDERS

1. Every soldier be responsible to acquaint himself with the orders of his unit. Ignorance of an order will not be accepted for non-observance.

555. ARNOLD CLUB VISITORS

1. Other rank members of 2 AOD are permitted the privileges of the 2 AOD Other Rank canteen (The Arnold Club) except when on CB, FP or when denied the privileges by a superior authority.

2. Other Rank members of 1 ALSG other than 2 AOD, are permitted the use of the 2 AOD canteen provided they have been invited and signed in the visitors book by a 2 AOD member.

3. Members are responsible for the actions of their guests and are to ensure their visitors comply with 2 AOD orders.

4. Member of the 2 AOD Sergeants Mess who are invited to visit the Arnold Club may be permitted to do so up to 1800 hrs provided permission is obtained from the PMC's of the respective Messes.

5. Sgt Mess members except when on duty are forbidden to enter the ORs canteen after 1800 hrs unless approval has been given by the 2 AOD Office Commanding.

556. SECURITY LIGHTING - STOREHOUSES

556. SECURITY LIGHTING - STOREHOUSES

1. Storeholders are to ensure exterior security lights are switched on at completion of work and switched off at commencement of work daily. Interior lighting in storehouses are to be switched off during daylight hours when not required for illumination of working areas within the storehouse.
2. Roving Picquets are to check that security lighting has been switched on during their first tour of the stores area. Any lights not switched on are to be remedied by the Roving Picquets.
3. Interior lighting is to be replaced on a group basis while faults in exterior lighting are to be notified to respective OO Sub Depot immediately the defect is noticed.

557. DANGER OF PREMATURE EXPLOSION BY ELECTRICAL DETONATION

1. An accident with a Claymore Mine at 1 ATF may have been caused by induced current from powerful radio transmitters setting off the detonator as soon as it was inserted in the explosive charge.
2. A similar accident could occur with any electrical initiator brought within 300 feet of some of the transmitters in 110 Sig Sqn's area, unless it is enclosed in a metal container.
3. All units and individuals are therefore warned that no electrical detonating apparatus is to be brought within 30 feet of any part of the 110 Sig Sqn perimeter or the aerial farm just outside the northern perimeter unless shielded by a metal container.

558. VEHICLE OPERATING INSTRUCTIONS/ISSUE 1 APR 67

1. All members driving military vehicles are to comply with the instructions laid down in Australian Military Forces Vehicle Operating Instructions.
2. Contravention of this instruction constitutes an offence in the terms of this Routine Order.

559. REMOVAL OF FOOD STUFFS FROM REFRIGERATORS

1. During and immediately prior to meal periods, it is necessary for the refrigerators at 2 AOD kitchen to be unlocked to enable the cooks to readily obtain prepared foods and table requirements.
2. Recently incidents have been reported of members of the mess removing foodstuffs from the refrigerators without the authority of the catering staff.
3. Unless he has been directed to do so by the senior cook present members using the 2 AOD mess are forbidden to remove any item from the 2 AOD kitchen refrigerators.

560. REPORTING OF VEHICLE ACCIDENTS

1. From the date of promulgation of this order any vehicle accident involving vehicles or personnel of 2 AOD are to be reported immediately to the person authorising the use of the vehicle ie NCO I/C Cpl or Tpt Sgt.
2. All cases of accidents involving Local Nationals or personnel of other nations are to be immediately reported to the Adjutant.

561. HANDLING OF OPDEM AND MAINTDEM

1. Operational Demands (OPDEM) and Priority Maintenance Demands (PRI-MAINTDEM) are requests for very urgent supply of stores or ammunition. These requests are received in signal form from 1 ATF 1 NUI DAT.

2. It is essential that 2 AOD provides a rapid and efficient reaction to these demands. Frequently these items are to be delivered by helicopter very soon after the demand is received.

3. The system to be followed on receipt of on OPDEM or PRI-MAINTDEM is as follows:-

a. The Control Office (which ever officer receives the particular demand) is to telephone firstly the storeholder of the group concerned and then the WO Traffic.

b. The voucher is then to be hand delivered to the storeholder.

c. When the stores are ready for issue the storeholder is to advise Traffic. If, however, Traffic cannot be rapidly contacted the storeholder is to deliver the items to Traffic.

d. All such consignments MUST be marked clearly in red on 3 sides with the words "PRI-MAINTDEM" or "OPDEM" and the reference number.

e. The principle to be observed is that nothing can delay the issue. If difficulty is experienced in contacting the required person, the next senior person should be advised immediatly. If any doubt arises and delay is caused the SSO should be advised promptly.

4. Duty staff will from time to time be required to action issues of this nature. Whilst the detail actions may differ from those carried out during the day the principle expressed in para 3 will always apply.

562. AMERICAN PX

1. Each Payday, 2 AOD provides 1x2½ ton truck for personnel who desire a trip to the American PX.

2. The vehicle departs from the Q Store at 1230 hrs and leave the PX at approx 1320 hrs.

3. Any member who wishes to go to the PX is to ensure he is at the Q Store by 1220 hrs.

563. SOCCER

535. WEARING OF FINGER RINGS

1. Accidents caused by the wearing of finger rings are relatively common especially among members working on vehicles and handling equipment or weapons. These accidents often result in removing the entire skin from the finger leaving amputation as the only feasible procedure.
2. Members should be discouraged from wearing finger rings when performing military duties. Wedding rings may be attached to Identity Tag cords and be carried in that manner if desired.

537. TRANSPORT CIVILIAN LABOUR

1. All civilian employees working on the late shift are to be transported by vehicle from their place of work or unit orderly room to the main gate guard room on completion of their shift.
2. No civilian employee is to move outside 2 AOD after 1900 hrs unless travelling in an Army vehicle, or else with a soldier.

538. CLEANING AND ADJUSTMENT OF PERSONAL WEAPONS

1. It is a soldier's duty to clean his own weapon with the cleaning kit provided, and the QM holds replacement items such as Flannelette and Oil at the Q Store.
2. The cleaning facilities in the Armoury may be used to clean weapons, provided permission is obtained from the Storeholder R.S.G. or the Armourer.
3. The practice of taking personal weapons to the 2 AOD Armourer's Assistant for the purpose of cleaning is to cease immediately.
4. LOADED MAGAZINES will not be taken into the Armoury work area but placed on the Armoury office table until the tasks on the weapon have been completed.
5. If the weapon requires repairs of any nature the Armourer should be notified and he will assess and correct the fault. The Armourer's Vietnamese Assistant is not to be asked to assess and correct faults in weapons.

539 TRANSMISSION OF SPIRITOUS LIQUORS THROUGH THE POST

1. Commonwealth of Australia Postal Regulations prohibit the transmission of inflammable substances (including liquors) having a flash point of more than 80 degrees F through the post.
2. Investigation has revealed that spirituous liquors having a proof rating in excess of 85 Proof US or 74 UK come within this category and are therefore not to be transmitted by members through the post to Australia.
3. There is not objection, however, to member posting spirituous liquors to Australia provided:
 - a. They have a proof rating below the stipulated figure.
 - b. They are packed safely and in such a manner that damage will not result to other posted items should the bottle/bottles break.
 - c. The member is prepared to pay any duty imposed by the Department of Customs and Excise (Customs concessions on spirituous liquors only apply when members are physically arriving in Australia).
4. It should be noted that most spirituous liquors available in SVN are within the approved limits.
5. The proof rating is displayed on the label of most spirituous liquors sold in Vietnam. Where any doubt exists it is to be checked against the PX catalogue held in PX and ASCO establishments.



510. RESALE OF MERCHANDISE BOUGHT AT THE PX OR ASCO

1. It is an offence to re-sell any merchandise bought at the PX or ASCO stores to any person not authorised to use the privileges of the PX or ASCO.
2. Member of the Australian Military Forces are forbidden to sell or give merchandise bought at the PX or ASCO Stores to any person not authorised to use the privileges of those stores.

511. SECURITY OF INFORMATION

1. 2 AOD stock figures will not be revealed to outside sources without the prior concurrence of the OC.

512. MOVEMENTS - MFO BOXES

1. The aim of this instruction is to detail the procedures and entitlements for the despatch of personal effects through the Military Forwarding Organization (MFO)

The MFO is a service provided within the Army Movement Control organization by which unaccompanied baggage of members on reposting or discharge may be consigned.

2. The following consignments may be handled by the MFO.
 - a. Excess baggage of a member travelling by air,
 - b. Unaccompanied baggage
3. The following items are not to be handled or included in packages despatched through the MFO.
 - a. Weapons
 - b. Ammunition, explosives or any item inflammable
 - c. Alcoholic beverages of every description
 - d. Pornographic material
 - e. Any item containing information of a security nature
 - f. Soiled items
 - g. Letters and parcels within the scope of the postal service.

Each member is entitled to consign through the MFO a total of 334 lbs, but no one package is to exceed 112 lbs or 5 cubic feet. (A trunk cabin metal measures 5 cubic feet)

No consignment under 22 lbs will be accepted, except deceased effects.

Normally items will not be accepted until a posting order is received or the member is warned for RTA.

Consignments are to be inspected by an officer or senior NCO to ensure that the prohibited items as defined in para 4 are not contained in the consignments.

A certificate of Safety and Cleanliness is to be signed by the inspecting officer, or NCO.

Consignments of MFO for Australia may be despatched by RAAF C130 if space is available or by charter or Army shipping.

The consignment should be packed in a container of substantial strength. It is advisable to wrap the contents in some form of waterproof material.

Each package must be banded, wired or locked. If locked one key should be forwarded to the receiving MFO in Australia to facilitate customs inspection.

For the members own convenience it is advisable to include an inventory in each package and retain one copy himself.

All consignments are received under bond in Australia.

When cleared by customs the consignments may be delivered under arrangements of 10 MC Gp or collected by the member.

Some delay may be experienced in delivery of personal effects lodged for movement from SVN as;

4. Items and definitions

a. Members are not to import to Australia by any means what so ever, including by their use or by the use of any other person or of the postal services of any country, any narcotic, any dangerous weapon, any explosive, any firearm any ammunition, any blasphemous or pornographic thing, any essences of wines or spirituous liquors or any of the other prohibited items stated in AHQ Admin Instr No. 8, unless with the prior consent of the Minister for Customs and Excise, Canberra.

b. For the purpose of this Routine Order:-

(1) "Dangerous Weapon" means and includes all concealed or concealable weapons whether firearms or not all weapons used for waging war and also includes spring bladed knives, daggers, bludgeons, coshes, knuckledusters and swordsticks.

(2) "Explosive" means and includes explosives, explosive devices, all grenades and smoke grenades, mines, pyrotechnics, flares, fireworks and solid fuels such as hexamine.

(3) "Firearm" means and includes pistols and parts of pistols, rifles and parts of rifles, rifles of a military type being of a calibre larger than .22 of an inch and parts of those rifles and silencers for use with firearms.

(4) "Ammunition" means and includes ammunition and ammunition produce of any kind for firearms of a military type being of a calibre larger than .22 of an inch.

(5) "Blasphemous or Pornographic" are such things as are so in accordance with the consorship laws of the Commonwealth of Australia current from time to time.

(6) In addition to those items stated in paragraphs 6.b. (1) to (5) above, "Prohibited goods" means essences of wines and spirituous liquors and any other items so classified by the quarantine customs and excise laws of the Commonwealth of Australia current from time to time.

(7) "To import" means the act of physically bringing or sending into any part of the Commonwealth of Australia or its Territories anything of any nature and includes the act of attempting to procure such bringing or sending of anything of any nature.

5. Declarations

Members importing goods to Australia by the use of the postal services of any country are to accurately complete a Declaration and to attach it to the exterior of the package or parcel before posting.

6. Members importing goods to Australia on their person or in accompanied baggage are to accurately declare all dutiable or prohibited items at the point of entry to Australia.

7. Parcels to Australia

The following procedure is to be used to check the contents of all parcels and packages sent through the mail to Australia.

a. An Australian officer. is to check the contents of all parcels and packages.

513. AFPO - MAIL SERVICE

1. The AFPO mail service in Vietnam is designed for,

a. The receipt of mail by Australian Servicemen, members of Philanthropic organisations and certain Australian civilians e.g. Members of the Australian Surgical Team, and

b. Despatch of mail by those personnel mentioned in para a.

2. Personnel other than those mentioned above are prohibited from using the AFPO facilities.

514. R & R

1. Members proceeding on R & R are to be in possession of their paybooks. Destitute Army personnel can be advanced moneys on presentation of paybooks at any Australian Embassy.

515. MANUAL OF ARMY SAFETY

1. HQ 2 AOD holds one copy of the publication "Manual of Army Safety, Provisional 1967". The subject of safety in the army embraces of very wide field and the publication is the safety authority for most facets of training and operations both tactical and technical.

2. All 2 AOD Officers, Warrant Officers and others placed in supervisory position should be aware of the safety requirements of their regular duties and those extra regimental or occasional duties which they may be required to carry out.

3. All 2 AOD Officers and Warrant Officer are to read the Manual of Army Safety (Provisional) 1967 during the period 1 - 15 Aug 68.

4. After reading the Manual each Officer or Warrant Officer is to sign the certificate retained in the front cover of the Manual.

516. EXPEDITIONARY FORCES MESSAGE (EFM) TELEGRAM SERVICE

1. The Expeditionary Forces Message (EFM) Telegram service is available between members of AFV and persons in Australia and New Zealand.

2. Copies of the EFM code are held in all Australian FPOs. Only the prescribed standard phrases may be used in the composition of the text of the message.

3. A flat rate of 40 C MPC will be charged for all EFM telegrams originated in the theatre.

4. EFM telegrams may be sent to members of the AFV from all post offices in Australia and New Zealand. Members are advised to tell their relatives and friends of this service which is available for them to use when sending telegrams from Australia to members in Vietnam.

5. Some of the smaller post officers and agency post offices in Australia may not be aware of this service and in these cases, the attention of the post Office staff should be drawn to Section 9 of the Post Office Guide.

517. SAFETY - FILLING OF M1937 FIELD RANGE GASOLINE

1. Burner units for M1937 Range are not to be filled inside kitchens.

518. TRUCKS $\frac{3}{4}$ TON TECHNICAL LOADING-CARRIAGE OF PERSONNEL

1. It is extremely dangerous to carry passengers on the tray of $\frac{3}{4}$ ton vehicles with plat form trays. The maximum number of personnel which may be carried in these vehicles is two, including the driver. Under no circumstances are passengers to be carried on the tray.

519. BOUNDS

1. The following places are out of bounds to all members of the Australia and New Zealand Military Forces at all times:-

a. The area inside the triangle formed by Trieu Au St, on the South Le Loi St on the West, and the line formed partly by Le Lai St to where it would join Le Loi St.

b. All establishments and places on the road which runs SW from the 1 ALSG Main Gate to "Five ways", excluding the Nguyen Hue Laundry, 30/3 Nguyen Tri Phuong Rd.

c. All establishments and places on the back road past the old French fort, from Nguyen Tri Phuong Rd to the entrance to Vung Tau airfield.

d. All establishments and places on the road which runs SW from the 1 ALSG Main Gate (Duong Nga Binh So 7) to the intersection of the Back Beach Rd.

e. The ARVN training Centre for revolutionary development bounded by an imaginary line joining GR323494, GR328502, GR450508, GR367503.

f. The area known as the Front Beach and Duong Thanh Thai, on the side of the road nearest the beach, between Duong Quang Trung to the North, and the harbour area to the south.

g. The ice works on Le Loi St and Duong Ly Truong Kiet, except to those members on authorised duty for the purchase of non-potable ice for their unit.

h. The area known as Rach Dua, bounded on the North By Cat Lo village, on the east by the RIDGE CAMP and on the west by the Cau Rach Ba river.

i. The ARVN housing are adjacent to the back gate of the 2nd Maint Bn compound, south along Nguyen Tri Phuong St from its intersection with Co Giang St to the US leased housing facility and west for a distance of 100 metres.

2. No member of the Australian or New Zealand Military Forces is to enter any establishment or be in any area described in para 16 above, except in the performance of his military duty.

3. In the area known as Back Beach, south of the Beachcomber Club, all bars are out of bounds to all members of the Australian and New Zealand Military Forces between 1800 hrs and 0800 hrs daily; members are not to visit or be in the back beach area between those times.

520. G AIR/ATOC OFFICE

1. Wef 26 Jul 69 the G AIR/ATOC Office at HQ 1 ATF is out of Bounds to all ranks between 1400 - 1800 hrs daily.

521. GENERAL BEHAVIOUR

1. An incident occurred on 18 Jul 69 in the 1 ALSG Area which resulted in serious injuries to a soldier.

2. Members are reminded that scuffles/fights etc in barrack rooms/messes, although in fun, can result in some persons sustaining serious injuries. Members attention is drawn to the fact that if they are involved serious consequences may follow such incidents.

522. LAMBRETTA/TAXI/SULKY FARES - VUNG TAU

1. Sub Para A, B and C show the authorised price lists for journeys in Lambrettas, Taxis and Sulkys respectively. These prices have been fixed by Civil Authority and should be displayed in a glass frame in the vehicle. Offences could incur a fine against the driver and impounding of the vehicle.

2. Details of any attempt at overcharging should be reported to Australian Military Police.

c. US Supply. There is an indication that the US supply channels are drying out and difficulty is being experienced in obtaining some stores from US service depots. Over the last 2 months only 11 demands were satisfied out of a total of 143. Out of 1327 Service Demands only 25 could be passed on to US Supply. Due to the reduced reliability of US Supply sources, it could become necessary to resupply theatre requirements from the ASA for items previously obtained from US sources.

d. Outscaling/Downscaling. The outscaling is now operating satisfactorily. To date the teams have reviewed approx 16,000 items and produced a total of 11,187 vouchers.

e. Signal Demands. The numbers of Service Demand increased sharply during July. (1097) against 796 in June 1. The ratio of Service Demands to indents increased to 12%. This increase is due to the following factors:-

(1) Sudden increased demand on C Vehicles spares. This was due to increased operational use of C Vehicles in the pacification program, details of which had not been advised to the Ord Service.

(2) Inability of US supply agencies to meet our requirements.

(3) A considerable number of vehicles have not had modifications carried out. Even vehicles arriving from ASA have outstanding Group modifications which have to be completed by RAEME workshops in the theatre. In most instances outstanding modifications are discovered during inspection and/or repairs. Attempts have been made to group the requirement for modification kits and spares but short of inspection of all vehicles in the theatre no satisfactory answer has as yet been found


