COMMANDERS DIARIES INSTRUCTIONS

AIM

1. The aim of a Commanders Diary is to provide data on which to base future improvements in Army training, equipment, organization and administration, and to furnish historians with a record of the activities of units and formations in operational and non-operational periods in peace and in war.

GENERAL

- 2. Entries are to be made daily on AF C 2118 (Adapted) each entry being initialled by the officer detailed to keep it.
- 3. Commanders Diaries will conform with the rules for drafting orders given in "Staff Duties (Australia)" Chapter 2, Section 12.

RESPONSIBILITY

During Non-operational Periods

4. A Commanders Diary is to be compiled by commanders of all formations.

During Operational Periods (1)

- 5. A Commanders Diary is to be compiled in duplicate by:
 - a. Commanders of all formations.
 - b. Each branch of the staff at formation headquarters commanded by a brigadier or above.
 - c. Heads of services not below the rank of lieutenant colonel.
 - d. Personal staffs and officers holding special appointments.
 - e. Unit commanders.
 - f. Commanders of a detachment of a unit when so ordered.

COMPILATION

- 6. Both original and duplicate copies are to consist of:
 - a. Cover (AF C 2119) (Adapted).
 - b. Index as printed on cover.
 - c. Narrative (AF C 2118) (Adapted).
 - d. Annexes as shown in the Index.
- 7. All details of the unit or formation (if a detachment is concerned, the name of the parent unit), period covered and enclosure numbers of the annexes are to be shown on the cover. If there has been a change of command since the last report, the date of assumption by the new commanding officer is to be included.
- 8. The annexes are to be assembled in the groups shown on the cover. If there are no enclosures for an annex NIII will be recover. If additional annexes are convenient for a particular headquarters, tarting at B.

RAEME UNIT MONTHLY REPORT - JUL 70

1. Herewith subtended is the 106 Fd Wksp monthly report for Jul 70.

LESSONS LEARNT

Training

- 2. The Nui Dat complex which exists today can be regarded as the normal development of a TF base during protracted counter insurgency operations. Furthermore it is the current situation in which one field workshop is working. The field workshop in Vung Tau is in a similar position ie part of a developed base. These two field workshops are the only ones deployed now in an operational area.
- 3. Both workshops are static and it is unlikely that either will be required to operate in a mobile role while in South Vietnam.
- 4. The role of each workshop is primarily recovery, repair and modification of equipment. They are responsible to maintain unit security. Occassionally the workshop is given an operational task.
- This workshop must continually improve techniques so that the total time an equipment is in the workshop is kept to a minimum. Examples of this are as follows:
 - a. M113 A1 Turrets. These are removed, repaired and refitted now in a total of 7 hours. Previously it took 16 hours.
 - b. Centurion Engines. For the last engine change the vehicle was in the workshop for only 28 hours.
- 6. Soldiers coming to the unit complete the BE course at JTC. If required to perform on operations they go through preparations vide para 6 of the Apr 70 report.
- 7. The Corps, in training soldiers to come to the field workshop in South Vietnam, must specialise in equipment and repair techniques training. Exercises involving the redeployment of a field workshop are not preparation for the current situation in South Vietnam. Field training must be kept to a minimum and not engaged in at the expense of equipment training.

WORKSHOP CAPACITY

General

8. All sections of the workshop were heavily loaded during July. B Vehicle Section struck a severe peak caused mainly by a recent EIS visit to TF. Telecommunication Section had several peaks caused by priority 1 equipments. The M113 A1 belly uparmouring programme will heavily commit the Fitting Section who will consequently have little capacity for other work.

Output

9. The output for Jul 70 and work in progress at 31 Jul is shown in Annex A.

M113 A1 Modifications

- 10. Planning for the modification of all M113 A1 APCs in TF is completed. Modifications include the following:
 - a. Belly armour.
 - b. Foot rest.
 - c. Right hand sponson.
 - d. Drivers hatch cover.
- 11. This programme will commence as soon as the belly armour arrives.

OPERATIONS OF INTEREST

Recovery

12. The workshop completed 57 recovery tasks in the month. The Pettibone fork-lift did 17 tasks for other units.

13. One ICAP protection Party was provided in the month.
