**COMMANDERS DIARIES  
INSTRUCTIONS**

**AIM**

1. The aim of a Commanders Diary is to provide data on which to base future improvements in Army training, equipment, organization and administration, and to furnish historians with a record of the activities of units and formations in operational and non-operational periods in peace and in war.

**GENERAL**

2. Entries are to be made daily on AF C 2118 (Adapted) each entry being initialled by the officer detailed to keep it.

3. Commanders Diaries will conform with the rules for drafting orders given in "Staff Duties (Australia)" Chapter 2, Section 12.

**RESPONSIBILITY**

**During Non-operational Periods**

4. A Commanders Diary is to be compiled by commanders of all formations.

**During Operational Periods (1)**

- 5. A Commanders Diary is to be compiled in duplicate by:
  - a. Commanders of all formations.
  - b. Each branch of the staff at formation headquarters commanded by a brigadier or above.
  - c. Heads of services not below the rank of lieutenant colonel.
  - d. Personal staffs and officers holding special appointments.
  - e. Unit commanders.
  - f. Commanders of a detachment of a unit when so ordered.

**COMPILATION**

6. Both original and duplicate copies are to consist of:

- a. Cover (AF C 2119) (Adapted).
- b. Index as printed on cover.
- c. Narrative (AF C 2118) (Adapted).
- d. Annexes as shown in the Index.

7. All details of the unit or formation (if a detachment is concerned, the name of the parent unit), period covered and enclosure numbers of the annexes are to be shown on the cover. If there has been a change of command since the last report, the date of assumption by the new commanding officer is to be included.

8. The annexes are to be assembled in the groups shown on the cover. If there are no enclosures for a particular formation, the name of the formation and the date of its formation are to be entered on the cover. If the annexes are convenient for a particular headquarters, they may be assembled there, starting at B.

DISPOSAL

13. **Original Commander's Diary.** This is to be forwarded monthly, unless otherwise ordered, by seventh day of the succeeding month direct to AHQ.

14. **Duplicate Commander's Diary.** This must be clearly marked as a duplicate. It is to be sent separately from the original to AHQ one month after the original has been despatched but not before the former has been acknowledged.

15. When overseas, both copies of diaries are to be sent through the Army Records organization in the overseas theatre but at different times.

16. **TOP SECRET Supplementary Diaries.**

a. The documents referred to in Paragraph 9 together with a list of them made out on AF C 2118 (Adapted) must be placed in separate cover (AF C 2119) (Adapted). All details must be filled in and the cover clearly marked in red: "ANNEX Z — OFFICER ONLY". It may be convenient to group the papers by appendices.

b. Supplementary diaries must be forwarded under the normal rules for TOP SECRET correspondence, to AHQ. The inner envelope must be plainly marked:

ENEMY ACTIVITY - REPUBLIC VIETNAM

I CTZ

1. In the B-5 Front, a PW reported that all three Bns of the 27th NVA Regt have infiltrated the RVN, with the mission of attacking Camp Carrol. In MRTTH, enemy forces continue their logistical and recon efforts in the areas east of the A Chau Valley, while elms of the 7th Front employed 122MM rkts near Quang Tri City.

2. In MR-5, enemy forces continued their recon efforts and battle preparations for a phase of increased activity, possibly scheduled for the night of 31 MAR - 1 APR.

II CTZ

3. In MR-5, information from recent PW's and documents indicates that the enemy is planning to conduct a coordinated increase in tactical activity in Binh Dinh Province.

III CTZ

4. The low level of enemy initiated activity in III CTZ during the period was interrupted by one heavy attack by fire and ground attack on a US FSB in NW War Zone "C" on 29th March by elms of 271 and 272 VC Regts.

5. Both in this attack and in a friendly initiated contact in the same area on 26th March, the enemy suffered heavy casualties. The discovery of numerous large munitions and food caches plus heavy casualties inflicted on the divisional forces have undoubtedly hampered enemy planned offensive ops.

IV CTZ

6. During the week, enemy initiated activity decreased sharply compared to the previous week. Friendly ops continue to pre-empt infiltration of the 88th NVA Regt and preclude significant activity by the D-1 and D-2 VC Regt.

ENEMY ACTIVITY PHUOC TUY PROVINCE:

1. The situation in Phuoc Tuy is interesting although general VC activity remained at a low level for the week with four enemy initiated against GVN Forces. Contact with 1 ATF also remained at a low level with 11 contacts resulting in 6 VC KIA.
2. A Hoi Chanh, NGUYEN VAN LAC, who rallied on Long Son Island about 19 Mar 70, and got lost in the Chieu Hoi system for about a week before he was exploited, indicated that he was a member of a recce pl of D265 VC MF Bn. The Hoi Chanh indicated that his Pl was carrying out recce for a Bn base camp, possibly in the NUI DINH HILLS. The information he has given so far is being checked and it may be some time before an assessment of his reliability can be made.
3. A total of 15 Hoi Chanhs have now rallied to Long Son Island. 13 from the Long Son Production Cell and 2 from Phuoc Hoa. The last to rally was the Chief of the Long Son Production Cell and they have provided some good Order of Battle of the VC Organization on Long Son.
4. Elsewhere, B/8RAR located a cache of 770 lbs of rice just WEST of DUC MY. This find was in an area consistently used by both D440 and CHAU DUC to penetrate DUC MY, BINH BA and SUOI NGHE. Continuous ambushing along the tracks in that area should seriously hurt local force VC.
5. 1 ATF have mounted operation, NORTH of the Phuoc Tuy border in an effort to locate and destroy HQ Ba Long Province. One PW taken in the area has been identified as Commander of the XUAN LOC District Unit. A directive taken from the PW gives details of attack planned in XUAN LOC District for Apr 70, but as yet no detailed interrogation can take place due to his condition.
6. Documents taken from another enemy KIA indicated that he was the adjutant of D67 Engr Bn and that he was NVA.

ASSESSMENT.

7. Re-supply, particularly food continues as a problem for both guerrilla and LF units. Although penetrations into DUC MY, SUOI NGHE and to a certain extent HOA LONG have increased considerably over the last fortnight, supply problems do not appear to have been alleviated and the removal of the recce cache by B/8RAR will impose further hardships.

ENEMY ACTIVITY - SOUTH VIETNAM

General

1. The en high point, predicted to commence on the ni 31 Mar/1 Apr occurred on schedule with 189 ABF and ground attacks reported country wide (approx 145 ABF and 44 ground attacks).

1 CTZ

2. 28 ABF were mounted by the en in 1 CTZ during the high point resulting in 4 ARVN KIA, 1 civ KIA, 7 WIA (FWMAF). In MR TTH an ARVN search op loc a cache containing 14 tons of locally grown rice, 250 gals cooking oil, 2200 lbs salt, 600 rds RPG2 and RPG7 ammo, 500 rds 82 mm mortar ammo. The cache was believed to have belonged to the 7th Front.

11 CTZ

3. 39 ABF were mounted by the en in 11 CTZ during the ni 31 Mar/1 Apr. Cas to FWMAF were 12 KIA and 99 WIA. 10 civ were also WIA.
4. 25 km east of PLEIKU unk sized en force entered and left a hamlet with 21 PSDF who were reported to have left voluntarily.
5. In BINH DINH Province (MR 5) there were several reports of a possible reorganization of 22 NVA Regt and assignment of pers to local force units to demonstrate the en's increased emphasis on the utilization of district and lower level forces to accomplish his stated objective of countering the GVN Pacification Programme.

111 CTZ

6. 38 ABF were mounted by the en during the high point. This activity the heaviest this year, was concentrated in TAY NINH, BINH LONG, BINH DUONG and BIEN HOA Provinces.
7. Primary targets were allied mil instls and ABF predominated although sapper and ground attacks were recorded. Results were 13 KIA 91 WIA 5civ WIA.

1V CTZ

8. 40 ABF were also mounted by the en in 1V CTZ. Results were 18 KIA 123 WIA 4 civ KIA 9 civ WIA. The pattern of attacks appeared to be indirect attacks by fire.

ENEMY ACTIVITY - PHUOC TUY

General

1. There were no enemy initiated actions against 1 ATF during the week and only two significant incidents in the Sector AO. At PHUOC HOA on ni 31Mar/1 Apr (the first ni of the planned high point) VC attacked an RDC post killing one and wounding six; on ni 5/6 Apr (second planned date for a high point in PHUOC TUY) an unidentified force of VC entered DAT DO, detained and lectured a no of PSDF; no resistance was offered. Both incidents were in accordance with current VC directives to harass and disrupt GVN forces. Elsewhere VC activities were directed towards low level propaganda, tax collection and principally, supply collection which is becoming urgent with the approach of the wet season. There were 17 VC killed by 1 ATF, 1 PW and 3 detainees taken into custody and 5 HOI CHANHs rallied during Mar 70.
2. 6 RAR/7RAR The combined operation in the area NORTH of the TF boundary between SUOI LUC and SUOI SACH, directed at the HQ and admin units of BA LONG Province, resulted in a complete disruption of the HQ and destruction of 9 major base areas of BA LONG Province and XUAN LOC District. The comd of XUAN LOC District was taken prisoner and personal documents and interrogation revealed a detailed plan of operations against Xuan Loc District during the period 31 Mar-9 Apr. As none of the planned activities occurred, it is probable that his capture and the operation generally resulted in pre-emption of the plan. Similarly with HQ BA LONG which had its own directives, no offensive activities were attempted probably due to the timely disruption of the HQ. In addition the 2 Hospitals of 84 RSG in BA LONG, K76A and K76C were dispersed with the loss of a large amount of important medical supplies and equipment which will have a further serious effect on the VC organisation. Other identifications made in the area were of the Mil Int Sect, Propaganda and Trg Sect, Ord Sect, Admin Office (BA LONG and XUAN LOC) and the Fwd Sup Council of BA LONG HQ. The various groups appear now to have dispersed generally NORTH and NE and the HQ proper to the EAST.
3. 8 RAR A coy 8 RAR were reacted to a suspected VC loc where a contact was made with 4 VC and the coy subsequently located bunkers identifying HQ D445. This appears to have been a small comd group with a protection party and the HQ is clearly isolated from its unit. In operations against VC supply activities from IUC MY/AP SUOI NGHE, where food supplies have for some time been going out into CHAU IUC District (probably CHAU IUC District), patrols have intercepted two large rice deliveries of some 1500 lbs. It is probable that these supply are being brought forward by vehson Rte 2 from DAT DO/LONG LE District since the approach routes for large parties into HOA LONG, the usual sup area, have become too dangerous. VC have been making regular infiltration of SUOI NGHE during the past two weeks in an effort to dominate the hamlet and increase food sups.
4. OTHER AREAS In an initial intg of a rallier from BA LONG Mil Med Sect the rallier stated that his unit was loc in area YS 7676-7776 when he left it on 14 Feb. This instl had a str of 46, incl a security elm and had 16 cas under treatment. There have been sightings of VC in this gen area and tracks loc by VR during the week which tend to sp the statement. The normal loc for this unit would be in the northern bdry area, however it might have been deployed fwd to sp planned ops against LONG DAT District in Feb 70 and remained in the area. The unit normally sp the two province units D440 and D445, as well as other BA LONG agencies. It is possible that elms of D445 went to this area with cas after being forced out of the area south of XUYEN MOC on about 16 Mar 70, since tracks at that time led directly towards the area YS 7676.

No sub unit of D445 has been ident' during the week. The unit is likely to have dispersed in coy gps and will continue to attempt to avoid contact . No evidence of its presence in the north was found and no evidence of sup parties in its normal sup area of DAT DO has been produced. Sightings of VC and recent track activity south of XUYEN MOC could indicate the return of some part of the unit to that area, which would be convenient to food sup along Rte 23, and some part might have remained NE of XUYEN MOC. C25 has probably returned to the LONG HAI and could have been responsible for the incident with PSDF last ni. Sightings in the LIGHT GREEN/ LONG GREEN also could indicate the presence of local guerillas or LONG DAT guerillas.

5. ASSESSMENT It is unlikely that any serious VC offensive ops can be conducted during the remainder of the current high pt period 31 Mar-9 Apr. Some harrassment of vulnerable RF/PF and RDC posts could be attempted with little effort and lt attacks by fire remain possible but it is significant that, despite plans for extensive ops over the last 4 planned high pts (TET, 19 Feb, Anti-America day and the present period), no serious offensive ops have been conducted in the province. Food sup remains the most important limiting factor for VC ops and greater efforts will have to be made shortly to provide for the wet season.

III CTZ

1. En Activity Apart from Western Tay Ninh Province where activity remained high, there was a general decrease in enemy attacks throughout the CTZ. Activity was at a low level except for a slight increase on 8 and 9 Apr which probably marked the end of the first phase of the VC current operational period.

2. En locations.

a. 9 VC Div continued deployment to Western Tay Ninh Province on the Cambodian border.

b. 7 NVA Div NE War Zone C and Northern Binh Long Province with 165 Regt NE War Zone C in the former AO of 271/9 VC Div.

c. 5 VC Div in NE and NW Phuoc Long Province.

d. 33 Regt west central Binh Tuy Province: C18 AAHMG Coy was contacted 2Km SOUTH of VO DAT on 6 Apr by US/ARVN and lost 49 KIA.

e. 274 Regt around BINH SON.

3. Assessment. Enemy activity in the sub-regions will probably remain at a low level with scattered attacks by fire and occasional ground and sapper attacks against allied installations. Activity is likely to continue at a fairly high level in Western Tay Ninh Province and attacks by fire can be expected against FSPBs in Northern Binh Long Province and Phuoc Long Province. There are indications that the enemy may be planning another increase in activity during the last week in April, probably to follow the expected announcement by President Nixon of further withdrawal of troops.

1 ATF TAOR

4. General. During the week the Task Force had 22 contacts, resulting in 21 enemy KIA (BC) and 2 PW. The last two days of the reporting period were the most active, there being 15 contacts resulting in 15 enemy KIA (BC).

5. 6 RAR completed its part of the operation against BA LONG by finding and engaging the primary target, the Comd Sect of HQ BA LONG, killing 3. A large quantity of very valuable documents were recovered which are still being summarized but in general revealed info on VC intentions over the next two months. Contact was also made with a group of K76A Hospital which had returned to set up again in the MAY TAO; both K76A and K76C, two of the three major medical installations of 84 RSG, lost their supplies in this operation to 6 and 7 RAR. The Ba Long Med Sect also was dispersed and lost medical supplies adding further to the serious supply problems of the VC throughout BA LONG.

6. 8RAR Operations against VC supply activity from AP SUOI NGHE/DUC MI and HOA LONG have resulted in a significant disruption of D440 and CHAU DUC which could have far reaching effects for the wet season. Large supply caches have been destroyed and VC have been denied access to their usual supply points. The LCT working on the important VC approach to SUOI NGHE/DUC MY also has a damaging effect on VC supply and may have pre-empted an attack planned on SUOI NGHE by D440 between 8-12 April. An ambush on

11 April by 8 RAR against some 16 VC SW of HOA LONG further upset the supply programme.

7. Enemy Intentions Captured BA LONG documents revealed an ambitious period of operations intended to be conducted in Mar-Apr, in LONG KHANH, DINH QUANH and PHUOC TUY. None of the specified targets were attacked seriously and the subordinate units reported allied disruption as responsible for their failure. The most important area in the planning of BA LONG operations has been Long Dat District, principally DAT DO, which the VC clearly regard as having great significance in any future control of the province. It must be assumed that further attempts will be made to attack and demoralize GVN forces and local authority in this area.

8. Enemy AOs VC unit responsibilities for operations as indicated by documents and supported by other collateral are:

a. D445. Combines with C25 and local guerillas to op against DAT DO/LONG DIEN/AN NGAI/PHUOC HAI - Route 44.

b. D440 Combines with Chau Duc and local guerillas against HOA LONG/AP SUOI NGHE and NGAI GIAO. There is also an instruction for Ba Long Engineers to combine with D440 to mine Route 2 between XA BANG and BINH BA; this was to commence on 15 Apr but some mines have already been found on the Northern part of the road. Attacks may also be expected against the LCT in view of the importance of this entry point to the VC.

c. BA LONG At BA LONG HQ receipts and statements of arms holdings reveal a large quantity of rockets available for operations. On 11 Mar there were held 72 x 120 and 122mm rockets. In other collateral there has been noted an intention to use rockets against MSF bunkers, probably to be done by an element of 74 Arty Bn/MR7. Other arty targets could be VUNG TAU, VAN KIEP and NUI DAT.

9. Deployments. C25 with its remaining three pls (about 30) and local guerillas (another 30) are again operating from the Long Hais. D445 after its withdrawal from SOUTH of XUYEN MOC early in Mar, appear now to have returned to the area astride Route 23, conveniently placed to conduct ops against, and to drain supplies from Long Dat District. One or two coys including C8 of D440 under comd until recently, were to establish a new base in the area of PHUOC BUU from about 19 Mar. One coy appears to have been responsible for rice supplies from HOI MY/PHUOC LOI and DAT DO, which were to be stored in the new base area. This coy was operating from the area of Route 32/LONG TAN. Another coy appears to have remained in the area of the Song Rai WEST of XUAN MOC, probably providing protection for the HQ which has remained in the general area for several weeks. There was an intention to conduct an operation against an unspecified target with all coys on 6 Apr but this seems to have been frustrated, however the entry into PHUOC THANH (DAT DO) on night 10/11 Apr and the subsequent mortar attack on DAT DO Compound was certainly the work of this unit.

10 Assessment: Although the scope of BA LONG plans for Apr- May seem over ambitious in view of the disruptive action by Task Force operations, and similar plans in the past have not been implemented by the subordinate units, nevertheless there remains a capability to harass seriously GVN authorities. Most pressure is likely to be aimed at PSDF and RDC, being

the most vulnerable, but attacks by fire on other installations are likely. Mining of Route 2 and demolitions on Route 15, attacks by fire on the LCT at DJC MY and further limited attacks or infiltrations for propaganda purposes into LAT DO should be expected. A special effort might be made on or shortly after 15 April.

I CTZ

1. In I CTZ during the week enemy initiated activity was light and was characterised by scattered ABFs and ground contacts. In the B-5 Front, statements by a PW indicated that elements of the 27th NVA Regt have probably received replacements from 138th NVA Regt. In MR5, a PW revealed elements of 90th NVA Regt are currently preparing for a future phase of tactical activity in BAI LOC district.

II CTZ

2. Enemy activity continued at an increased level in the B3 Front and in MR6. In the B3 Front the enemy continued to conduct major offensive activity against allied units and installations in the DAK SEANG area. A PW states that DAK SEANG is to be the centre of the Summer-Fall campaign. The PW and other sources identify 28 NVA Regt and 40 NVA Arty Regt. Cumulative results: enemy 926 KIA, 2 detained, 56 individual weapons captured and 15 crew served weapons captured. Friendly, 129 KIA (1 Aust, 16 US), 453 WIA (3 Aust, 43 US), 2 MIA. In MR5 elements of 3rd NVA DIV in Binh Dinh Province and LF units in Khanh Hoa Province conducted increased tactical activity against allied forces and installations.

IV CTZ

3. Enemy activity continued at a relatively high level of intensity, although it has declined since 1 Apr 70. Friendly units made successful contacts with possible elements of 10th NVA Regt on Nui Khet. Cumulative results: enemy 64 KIA, 8 individual weapons and 6 crew served weapons captured for 2 friendly KIA and 17 WIA. During the coming week enemy initiated activity is expected to remain at approximately the same level.

INTRODUCTION

1. The following quotation is worth remembering.  
"The biggest single risk to security at the present time is probably in a general lack of conviction that any substantial threat exists".

Lord Radcliffe 1962

2. It is only by following procedures strictly that we can achieve an effective security system which will deny the enemy or potential enemy the information which he seeks to further his aims and which will frustrate his attempt at subversive and sabotage activity.

GENERAL

3. This instruction is issued as a guide to unit CO/OCs and Unit Security Officers (USO) on matters of military security and is to be read in conjunction with References A-D. This document is to be placed inside the front cover of the Unit Security Register.
4. The ASM Vol 1 1969 has been issued in Australia but is not on issue to AFV. Until such time as this Manual is issued in AFV the provisions of Ref A are to apply .

RESPONSIBILITY FOR SECURITY

5. The Commander 1 ALSG is responsible for the overall security of 1 ALSG. Unit CO/OCs are responsible for the security within their respective areas.

CONTROL OF SECURITY

6. Technical Control of Security within 1 ALSG is carried out by GS(INT) HQ 1 ALSG. Unit CO/OCs are to appoint a senior officer as USO for his unit, who will be responsible for the technical control of security within the unit. An assistant USO is also to be appointed who, in the absence of the USO, will carry out the duties of the USO. The names of the USO and A/USO are to be promulgated in Unit Routine Order .

DUTIES OF UNIT SECURITY OFFICER

7. The USO is to carry out the following duties:
- Frame suitable Security Standing Orders and any special Security Instruction (i.e. security of armouries and office instructions etc) and ensure that these orders are understood and enforced.
  - Maintain the unit Register of Classified Documents.
  - Supervise the security training programme.

- d. Maintain the Unit Security Register and Sensitive Postings List.
  - e. Carry out regular spot checks of classified documents held in the unit as detailed in these orders, and continually review the unit's Need to Hold classified documents.
  - f. Encourage all ranks to bring to his notice any suspicious incident which may occur within 1 ALSG or VUNG TAU CITY.
  - g. Investigate any security matters which arise in the unit and report them immediately to GS (INT) HQ 1 ALSG and CO/OC of his unit.
  - h. Supervise the changing of safe combinations and lodging of combination duplicates.
  - j. Advise his CO/OC on security precautions to be taken within the unit.
  - k. Liaise closely with counter intelligence personnel in HQ 1 ALSG.
  - l. Train the Assistant USO.
  - m. Periodically test security precautions which have been implemented within the unit and enter the results in the Security Register.
  - n. Carry out the personnel security checking procedures within the unit.
  - o. Ensure that the civilian labour within the unit fully understand the restriction on movement within the area, the wearing of passes etc.
  - p. Conduct periodic checks on civil labour within the unit.
8. Units are to advise GS (INT) HQ 1 ALSG of any change of USO or assistant USO; in order that counter intelligence personnel may be made available for the handover/takeover between USOs.

ROLE OF CI PERSONNEL ALLOTTED TO 1 ALSG

9. The Counter Intelligence effort available to 1 ALSG is directed to fulfil the following tasks:
- a. Provide Comd 1 ALSG with information concerning the enemy threat (external or internal) to 1 ALSG.
  - b. Advise Comd 1 ALSG on security precautions to be taken within 1 ALSG.
  - c. Advise and assist all units on security measures and security training.
  - d. Investigate security breaches and weaknesses and bring them to notice so that action may be taken.
10. Units may request, and expect to receive, assistance from counter intelligence allotted to HQ 1 ALSG.

SECURITY REGISTER

11. The Security Register is to be used to collate all matters of security interest within the unit. Notes on the maintenance of the Unit Security Register are contained in Annex A to this instruction.

PERSONNEL SECURITY

12. Unit CO/OCs are not to give any individual access to classified matter unless the following have been established:
- a. The individual has a definite "Need to Know", in order that he may satisfactorily carry out his duties.
  - b. The individual has been cleared to the appropriate security level for access to classified matter.

RESTRICTED



SENSITIVE POSTINGS

13. A Sensitive Posting is a posting in which the occupant in the normal course of his duties, has continual access to matters classified CONFIDENTIAL or above.

SENSITIVE POSTINGS LIST

14. Units are to maintain an up to date Sensitive Postings List in the section of the Security Register marked "Current Record of Personnel Having Access to TOP SECRET and SECRET Information". Layout for the Sensitive Postings List is contained in Annex B to this instruction.

SECURITY CLEARANCE

15. When a member marches into a Sensitive Posting, the unit is to take the following action to acquire the member's security grading:

a. Forward to GS (INT) HQ 1ALSG, in duplicate, the form "Request for Security Grading", complete in all details. Layout of this form is shown in Annex C to this instruction.

16. The following action will then take place:

a. HQ 1 ALSG will forward to the unit the member's security grading on the form "Advice of security grading", or

b. HQ 1 ALSG will forward to the unit a set of Personal Particulars Forms for the member to complete in detail. This will indicate that the member is not cleared to the level required.

17. Units are to return the completed Personal Particulars Forms to HQ 1 ALSG within 2 weeks. If this cannot be done, the unit is to signal HQ 1 ALSG the expected date of arrival of the completed Personal Particulars Forms.

18. On receipt of the PPFs, HQ 1 ALSG will complete the security clearance procedure. It must be remembered that the earlier the PPFs are forwarded to HQ 1 ALSG, the earlier the unit will be provided with the security clearance and consequently the member can perform his duties effectively.

19. Units must not assume that all officers or all ORs are cleared prior to embarkation for SVN. This is not the case.

20. The member's security clearance is not an authority for the member to have access to all classified matter. The Need to Know must be strictly enforced. The unit CO/OC may deny any person access to classified matter if he feels that the member is not a fit or proper person to have access or does not have sufficient maturity to understand the security requirements involved.

UNDERTAKING TO PRESERVE OFFICIAL SECRETS

21. All units are to institute as part of the unit's march-in procedure a check of the member's documents to ensure that a copy of the Undertaking to Preserve Official Secrets has been correctly signed. If a copy of this Undertaking cannot be located then the member is to sign a copy which the unit will then place in his personal documents. The layout of the Undertaking may be found in Ref A Chap 2 Annex B.

SECURITY OF CLASSIFIED MATERIAL

HANDLING, TRANSMISSION AND REPRODUCTION OF CLASSIFIED DOCUMENTS

22. The requirements for the handling and transmission of classified documents is amply covered by:

- a. Ref A Chap 3
- b. Ref B Paras 3-5, 3-11
- c. Ref C
- d. Ref D

The following paras will amplify certain points on the receipt, registration, storage and destruction of classified documents.

RECEIPTS AND REGISTRATION

23. When a double enveloped package is received by the unit orderly room/registry and the inner envelope indicates a security grading of SECRET or higher, the inner envelope (unopened) is to be taken to the USO or addressee. The method of receipt of CONFIDENTIAL documents is left to the discretion of the unit CO/OC.

24. The USO will register the document in the Register of Classified Documents and disseminate it on a Need to Know basis. Layout of the Register of Classified Documents is found in Annex D to this instruction.

25. The USO is to be the Unit custodian of classified documents and will maintain the unit Register of Classified Documents. The custodian will also carry out spot checks of documents on the following basis:

- a. Complete check of TOP SECRET documents (if held) once per week
- b. Complete check of SECRET documents once per month.
- c. Regular spot checks of CONFIDENTIAL files and documents.

26. Results of checks are to be entered in the Security Register.

STORAGE

27. To amplify Ref B Para 3-7, classified documents are to be stored as follows:

- a. TOP SECRET and SECRET - Class B (CHUBBS) or Mosler Container (US)
- b. CONFIDENTIAL - Any container fitted with a combination lock
- c. RESTRICTED - Key locked container or locked office.

if some doubt exists about the security protection of a particular container affords, the unit is to contact GS(Int) HQ 1 ALSG for clarification.

28. When a member leaves his office or area of work, (even though another part of the building may be occupied), classified documents are to be secured in accordance with para 24 (above). Commonsense should apply in cases where the member is merely going to another office and would be returning in a few minutes.

29. A Safe Security Log (Ref Chap 7 Annex A) is to be affixed to each container holding documents classified CONFIDENTIAL or above. When the container is closed at the completion of the days work, the Safe Security Log is to be filled out in accordance with the instructions contained on the Safe Security Log.

KEYS AND COMBINATIONS

30. The following apply to key locked safes and containers fitted with combination locks:

a. Combination changed in accordance with Ref A Para 745. In addition the combination is to be changed if it is felt that the combination may have been compromised.

b. Duplicate keys and combinations are to be lodged in accordance with Ref A Para 746. (Not necessarily at GS (Int) HQ 1 ALSG)

c. A Key Register is to be maintained in accordance with Ref A Para 750 for those keys held permanently by responsible persons. Persons issued with keys on a daily basis are to sign a day book.

d. Each safe or container is to have a sticker affixed indicating the location of the duplicate key/combination.

31. The knowledge of the combination should be kept as limited as possible, depending on the administrative requirements of the unit.

32. If any combination lock malfunctions, the USO is to contact GS (Int) HQ 1 ALSG so that corrective action can be taken. If a combination locked or key locked container fails to open after a reasonable number of attempts, the unit is NOT to attempt forcible entry but is to contact GS (Int) immediately.

NEED TO HOLD

33. Units are to critically assess the need to hold classified documents. Classified documents should only be held if they are necessary for the efficient functioning of the unit.

34. Classified documents can only be destroyed with the approval of the originator and once the unit has assessed that certain classified documents are no longer required, it should request the originators permission, through HQ 1 ALSG, to destroy them. The layout of this request is shown in Annex E to this instruction.

DESTRUCTION OF CLASSIFIED WASTE

35. The following points are to be noted:

a. All office waste, paper, maps, charts etc is to be treated as classified waste.

b. Classified waste is to be destroyed daily by burning (weather permitting) under supervision of the USO.

c. If classified waste cannot be burnt due to inclement weather conditions, it is to be secured in a container according to its classification.

RESTRICTED



36. All units are to outline in the Security Standing Orders, procedures for destroying classified documents in the event of an emergency. A suitable destruction device (incendary grenade or bottle of petrol) should be kept near the container holding classified documents. The order to destroy classified documents will originate from HQ 1 ALSG and documents are to be destroyed in the following order:

- a. TOP SECRET
- b. SECRET
- c. CONFIDENTIAL
- d. RESTRICTED and UNCLASSIFIED

37. GS (Int) HQ 1 ALSG will advise units on the suitability of their incinerators for destroying waste and procedures for the emergency destruction of documents.

SECURITY STANDING ORDERS


38. CO/OCs of units are to issue Security Standing Orders which outline security procedures to be followed in the unit. These orders should be brief, simply expressed and are to contain only those points which concern the individual. It should be stated that ignorance of such orders is no excuse for non compliance with them.

39. Notes on the Unit Security Standing Orders are found in Annex H.

CIVIL LABOUR

40. The importance of very tight control of civil labour within units cannot be overstressed. Unit Security Officers are to periodically test the security measures laid down in Ref A Part 1 Chap 1 Sect 3 Annex B, and results are to be recorded in the Security Register.

41. Civilian labour are NOT to have access to any classified material or official publication.

NOTES ON SECURITY REGISTERS

1. The Security Register is to be used to collate all matters of security interest to the unit or branch. It is to be maintained by the Security Officer and is to be made available for perusal only to those officers designated by the commander (or Military Board Member) and to members of Intelligence Staff. It is to be classified CONFIDENTIAL, unless information contained therein requires a higher security grading.
2. The Security Register should take the form of a foolscap book or file where relevant sections are to be devoted to the following:
  - a. Current security instructions (subjects, file reference amendments and dates).
  - b. Record of Security Officers (numbers, ranks, names, dates of appointment).
  - c. Current record of personnel graded to have access to TOP SECRET and SECRET information and the date of receipt of such a security grading.
  - d. Record of periodic checks of personal documents of members to ensure that all have signed the "Undertaking to Preserve Official Secrets" or equivalent certificate required by civil staff.
  - e. Record of security training (date, brief summary, action, instructor, remarks).
  - f. Record of security breaches (date, brief summary, action taken).
  - g. Record of dates of changes to the combinations of containers.
  - h. File reference to suspicious or subversive incidents reported to Intelligence Staff.
  - i. Record of visits by Counter Intelligence personnel (date, nature of visit, names, remarks).
  - j. Record of checks of civil labour (date, nature of check, name of person conducting check, remarks).
  - k. Record of checks of classified documents (date, nature of check, name of checking officer, results or remarks).
  - l. Record of internal security checks (date, nature of check, name of checker, remarks).

1. Security Standing Orders are to be brief, simply expressed, and are to contain only those points which concern the individual.
2. Security Standing Orders should be readily available to all ranks. All members when joining a unit are to be briefed on the need for security and are to read a copy of the unit Security Standing Orders.
3. The following points are to be included in Security Standing Orders in non operational situations:
  - a. The appointment and names of the Security Officers.
  - b. A reminder that all members of the Army have signed the "Undertaking to Preserve Official Secrets" and their responsibility under the "Official Secrecy Legislation".
  - c. Instructions regarding visitors.
  - d. Procedure for reporting breaches of security.
  - e. Encouragement of all ranks to report at once suspicious incidents and the procedure for making such reports.
  - f. Warning to all ranks concerning careless talk, spreading of rumours, etc.
  - g. Instructions regarding the use of cameras on defence property and introduction of electronic recording devices.
  - h. The system for safeguarding arms, ammunition, equipment, etc.
  - i. Regulations regarding communications with the press.
  - j. Routine procedure for the safeguarding of protected documents.
  - k. Legal powers of guards and sentries for dealing with unauthorized entry.
  - l. Control of keys.
  - m. Instructions regarding penfriends.
  - ..
4. In operational situations, the following additional points need to be considered:
  - a. Warning to all ranks against carrying documents, letters, and photographs into action.
  - b. Prohibition or restriction of vehicles in the neighbourhood of headquarters, parking arrangements, camouflage, concealment, dispersal and track discipline.
  - c. Amplification of instructions regarding cameras.
  - d. Conduct in case of capture.
  - e. Censorship instructions.
5. With Security Standing Orders, it may be necessary to issue complementary instructions e.g.:
  - a. For guards, on the examination of visitor's papers etc, and the responsibility for this.
  - b. For office personnel on the disposal of office waste.
  - c. For unit signal personnel on special signal security measures.

ENEMY ACTIVITY - PHUOC TUY

ENEMY LOCATIONS

1. HQ Ba Long Province are believed to have dispersed with elements being located north of the province border (YS 6095), May Tao mountains and in the Ba Long Base Area to the east of Xuan Loc.
2. K76A (Hosp) is now located in the May Taos but K76C may still be in the vicinity of HQ Ba Long north of the province border.
3. D440 LF Bn, less possibly K6 Coy and C8 Coy (Hvy Wpns) remain west of Route 2 in the areas adjacent to Nui Nghe. No contact has been made with D440 by 1 ATF elms therefore detailed location is difficult.
4. Docs found in a transit camp by 9/C/7 RAR in the vicinity YS 517658 on 19 Apr 70 indicated K6/D440 had occupied it. This unit has been attached to D445 for some time and it is possible that the coy has moved east to join elms of D445 loc in the Dat Set Area west of Xuyen Moc, or they may have used the camp on their way back to rejoin D440.
5. Elms of D445, possibly C4 Coy, are located in the Long Hais, and at least one coy, possibly C2 Coy, are located in the Song Rai base area west of Xuyen Moc. The HQ D445 is also believed to be located with this coy.
6. Chau Duc Committee and C41 (Chau Duc Coy) are believed to be in the Nui Dinh foothills after being forced to move from Area K (YS 3977) by allied ops.
7. Chau Duc District Civil Hosp is located in the area YS 3374 after moving for the same reason.
8. HQ Long Dat District and C25 (Long Dat Coy) remain in their traditional base in the Long Hais.
9. Xuyen Moc Pl (C23) could be located in vicinity YS 6964 where a report indicated that a number of VC approached woodcutters and set fire to their trucks.
10. HQ Xuyen Moc District is possibly located NE of Xuyen Moc YS 7272.
11. Ngai Giao Party Chapter and Guerilla unit could be in vicinity YS 4385.
12. There have been no indications of the locations of the coys of D67 Spr Bn, or C610 - Baria City Unit. They possibly remain in the Nui Thi Vais and Nui Dinhs respectively.

ENEMY INTENTIONS

13. Little is known of the intentions of HQ Ba Long Province or K76C. Directions to K76A indicate that they are to stay close to the May Taos, and construct a base area by May 70. It is to have 100 beds and be prepared to accept cas by Jun 70, particularly from Q4 (274 Regt) and 33 NVA Regt.
14. D440 are expected to remain in their base areas and continue resupply from villages along Route 2. C41 is expected to follow a similar pattern. There have been indications of a high point during the period 27 Apr to 1 May 70 (Labour Day), and some activity may be expected in the area of Route 2 from these units.
15. The areas around Route 44 and Route 23 are traditionally resupply areas for D445. The majority of the Bn come from the Long Dat district and principally DATIED and they will not move out of the area for a protracted period.

16. Captured documents indicate C4/D445 or Long Dat Coy (C25) are expecting delivery of 122mm rockets for use against MSF camp in the Long Hais. The mortar attack by possibly C4/D445 on 15 Apr 70 on MSF camp was probably executed because of non-delivery of the rockets.

17. It is highly likely that the rockets will be used on the same target to coincide with the expected increase in activity between 24 Apr - 1 May 70.

18. Information from the Province Chief indicates that the VC intend to enter DAT DO on one of the nights of 23-24-25 Apr to carry out assassinations.

19. Although 1 ATF sources do not agree with this, this type of enemy operation must be expected in the future.

4 ATF TAOR

1. General There were 12 VC KIA, 5 PW captured and 1 Hoi Chanh as a result of 1 ATF contacts during the week. Enemy planned operations for late April appear to have been disrupted and there was only very low level harassment of GVN admin and security forces.

2. AO PENNY. 7 RAR during the week had 13 contacts for 9 VC KIA, 1 PW and 1 Hoi Chanh. There were two significant contacts, one with the enemy in a company defence position on the Song Rai at YS574685 and an ambush against 40-50 VC near PHUOC HAI at YS504525.

3. In a bunker position at YS574685 a captured diary and other documents identify C3/D445 and C6/D440. C6 has been attached to D445 for some three months to support planned operations in the DAT DO District, which did not eventuate, and is probably returning to its normal AO WEST of Route 2. Several other contacts further identify C3, and weapons captured from B1/C3 now leave that platoon with only 2 x AK47s. From other sources it is evident that the HQ and other companies of D445 were also located in AO PENNY but no known contacts were made.

4. A PW of C6, captured at DAT DO on 25 April after contact with an AP of 7 RAR, states he was told that HQ, C1, C2 and C4 returned to the Long Hais as a result of 7 RAR operations. This cannot yet be substantiated; a contact with a 7 RAR AP near LANG PHUOC HAI with an estimated 40-50 enemy on 25 April could have included some of D445 but the only identifications made of VC killed were those of C25 and PHUOC HAI guerillas. A detachment of 2 x AAHMGs of C8/D440 on loan to D445 appear now to have been returned to HQ BA LONG.

5. 8 RAR. There were two contacts in the eastern part of the AO during the reporting period, one EAST and one WEST of the Song Rai, in which local PHUOC BUU and XUYEN MOC guerillas appear to have been involved. In a contact SOUTH of HOA LONG on 26 April 1 VC was KIA, tentatively identified as commander Vung Tau City Unit, and a PW later captured identified as a member of C2/D445. Initial interrogation indicates the latter was one of a group of 8 on a reconnaissance mission to BARIA in preparation for an attack in the near future. It was reported earlier that a conference between Chau Duc District Committee and D445/Ba Long Province has been held between 6 - 14 April apparently to co-ordinate future operations. Co-ordination was also being effected between Vung Tau City Unit, Baria City Unit and Chau Duc District, probably for some operation in BARIA.

6. a. Enemy Locations. It cannot yet be established whether D445 has moved entirely from AO PENNY. If some companies have left it is probable that they have returned to the LONG HAIS with a view to conducting operations in support of local guerilla forces. The unit retains a capability to carry out limited harassing attacks on local GVN posts.

b. C25. Remains in the Long Hais, strength about 30.

c. Local guerilla units, possibly total 40-50 also in Long Hais.

d. D440 with its two companies C5 and C9 remain WEST of Route 2, probably in the vicinity of the SOU XI XOI/SOU DA DEN. C6 might now have returned to the WEST from AO PENNY and would be preparing for attacks on GVN posts between LUC THANH and AP SOU NGHE, having carried out some training with D445.

e. CHAU DUC/C41 are probably located on the eastern side of Nui Dinh or to the NORTH near SOU CHAU PHA area YS3669, strength about 40. There have been three ralliers from one platoon of this company in the past two weeks and morale appears to be low due to casualties and sickness.

8. Enemy Future Intentions.

a. The role of the Province units is to support local guerilla forces in harassment of GVN forces, to undermine morale and effectiveness of the GVN admin and security forces.

b. Principal target areas are DAT DO, BARIA, and HOA LONG but any of the district posts could be subject to small scale attacks. On Route 2 NGAI GIAO, DUC THANH, SOU NGHE continue to be areas of particular interest to the VC, especially since recent operations have prevented entry to them for food supplies. Terrorist attacks are also likely on GVN officials by specially trained cells living within the towns. A captured document of CHAU DUC revealed that at present there are 52 such secret members within that district and LONG DAT District could be expected to have a similar number.

c. Documents captured by 199 LIB from 74 ARTY REGT indicate that VAN KIEP, MSF Trg Camp, VUNG TAU and NUI DAT are among targets intended for rocket attacks. These could be conducted by small detachments from D74 or D6 in company with local forces. Documents captured earlier from BA LONG HQ, in correspondence with MR7 tend to substantiate this intention.

d. A new round of offensive activity was planned for late April but has not eventuated. All high points planned each month since January 70 have been pre-empted by TF operations but it must be expected that further efforts will be made to carry out the directives of HQ BA LONG to attack the pacification programme. Enemy capabilities are low but their persistence is evident.

1. Enemy initiated activity throughout VIETNAM was characterized by scattered attacks by fire and light ground attacks, with the exception of II CTZ where enemy activity continued at an increased level in the North-Western highlands.

I CTZ In the B-5 Front, enemy forces continued preparations for future tactical activity. In MR TTH, a captured document possibly indicates an increase in the tactical posture of 304 NVA Div support elements. In MR5, Front 4 elements and Quang Nam Provincial elements are continuing plans and preparations for another stage of intensified tactical activity which possibly will commence between 1-19 May.

II CTZ In the B3 Front, the enemy continued to conduct offensive activity against allied units and installations in the DAK SEANG area. There are indications that elements of 66 NVA Regt may have relocated into the Tri-Border area, and that the enemy may be planning to increase tactical activity in the BEN HET area in the near future. In MR5, major 3 NVA Div forces remain out of contact.

III CTZ Elements of the three Divs remain deployed along the Cambodian border in the Northern provinces of the CTZ although major elements of 9 Div have completed redeployment to Western Tay Ninh Province. 7 Div is shifting its AO to the WEST. In SR1 a PW stated that COSVN has directed a large scale offensive near the end of April.

IV CTZ. Major activity during the week consisted of operations conducted by friendly forces against enemy base and supply areas along the RVN border. During the coming week, enemy initiated activity will probably remain at its current level.



CARE AND MAINTENANCE OF TYPEWRITERS

1. Many instances have arisen where typewriters have been rendered un-serviceable because of inadequate unit maintenance. Units have demanded replacements for some typewriters which have failed because operators have neglected even elementary aspects of care and attention.
2. Typewriters are delicate equipments but they will give good service if cared for correctly. However, when they become clogged with dust and dirt, their operation becomes stiff and sluggish and rapid wear results. This situation is aggravated in the Nui Dat and Vung Tau areas.
3. Units are to ensure the following action is taken to correctly maintain typewriters:
  - a. Machines are to be covered when not in use. If covers are deficient requisitions for their manufacture (AF G1045) are to be raised.
  - b. Machines are to be cleaned twice daily to ensure all dust, eraser particles etc are removed. CES equipment only is to be used to clean typewriters.
  - c. As eraser dust is very abrasive, erasures over the working parts are to be avoided if possible. The carriage should be moved to one side when erasures are made.
  - d. Care is to be taken not to damage small springs and levers when cleaning machines.
  - e. Lubrication should be applied very sparingly to avoid attracting dust.

Reference. HQ AFV Routine Order 50/70.

1. Advice has been received that effective from 5 Apr 70 the following variations to message handling procedures will be made by all Australian Services:-


a. Filing time will be entered by the signal centre as a seven figure Julian date time. Julian date-times are always expressed in Z time. e.g. A message handed in at 1 ALSG Signal Centre at 1000 hours local 6 Apr will show the filing time as 0960200. 6 Apr is day 096 this year and 0200Z is 1000H.

b. The originators date time will continue as a six figure date-time with Z suffix and abbreviated month year added. e.g. A message originated at 0900 hours local on 6 Apr 70 will show originators time as 060100Z Apr 70.

2. In a message received by teleprinter, the filing time appears on the line starting DE, the originators time appears on the line above the sender.

3. Effective 5 Apr 70 originators should enter after the date time the abbreviated month year.

4. The above information will assist those receiving messages. Most desk calendars and some diaries show the Julian date, so the filing time of a message may be easily ascertained.

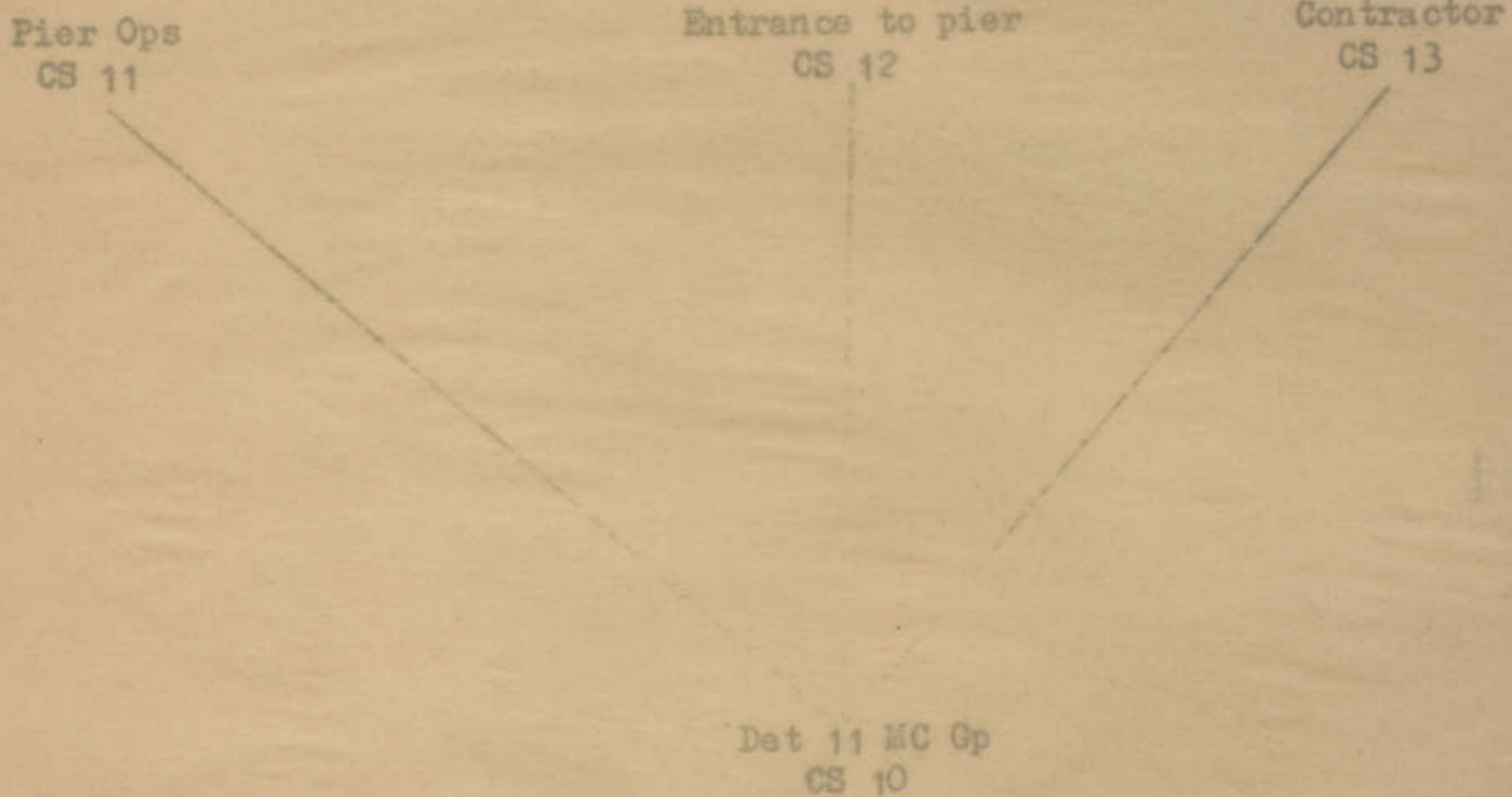



GUIDANCE FOR COMMAND COACHING BOARD  
PREPARING ADMIN AND TECH OFFICERS FOR  
PROMOTION EXAMINATIONS

Reference: Promotion Manual Part 1, Annex G to Chapter 3.

Introduction

1. This paper has been prepared to assist and guide Command Coaching Boards preparing Administrative and Technical Officers for the Jul 70 Promotion Examinations.

Definitions

2. The examinations for Administrative and Technical Officers are open book examinations, vide paragraph 3 of the reference, and definition of Open Book Examination is:

Open Book Examination is any examination where text/reference books may be used by candidates during the examination. The text/reference books allowed have been given in the reference.

3. Types of questions used in open book examinations are:

a. Objective Questions. These questions normally require candidates to select the correct response from a number of choices (multiple choice questions) or to decide whether a statement given is true or false.

b. Open-ended Sentences. These questions normally require candidates to complete a sentence with one or two words or not more than a short phrase.



c. Short Answer Questions. These questions normally require candidates to provide information in sentence or note form. Answers required will vary from a few words to no more than a short paragraph. These questions have been used in previous promotion examination papers.

d. Statement/Short Essay Questions. These questions have formed the basis of promotion examinations papers until now. Candidates are normally required to provide information and/or to give reasoned argument or opinion.

e. In-basket Questions. These questions present candidates with situations which staff officers are required to handle daily in the routine performance of their duties. They may require the candidate to prepare answers in one or more of the following formats (the list is not exhaustive):

- (1) Letters
- (2) Minutes, including conference minutes
- (3) Messages
- (4) Briefs
- (5) Notes for guidance of a superior
- (6) Agenda

4. In the Jul 70 examinations for Administrative and Technical Officers one or more of the above types of questions will be used.

#### Subjects 2/3P

5. The papers have the following features:

- a. All questions are to be answered.
- b. Marking is out of 100, 50 marks will be a pass.
- c. The papers are of three hours duration.
- d. Marks will be deducted for incorrect answers to true or false questions. Marks will not be deducted for questions left unanswered.
- e. In the subject 2P paper, candidates are required to answer some questions on the question paper which is to be detached and handed in with the AAB 24.
- f. Examples of types of questions to be used in these papers are at Annex A.

#### Subject 2/3Q

6. The papers have the following features:

- a. All questions are to be answered.
- b. Marking is out of 100, 50 marks will be a pass.

- c. The papers are of three hours duration.
- d. Candidates are expected to quote references in support of their answers. Failure to do so will incur loss of marks.

  - c. Marking is out of 1000, 500 marks will be a pass.
  - d. These papers are of a three hour duration.
  - e. Candidates should be familiar with the index to the ALM so that they may quickly find the subject under consideration.

TYPE QUESTIONS - SUBJECTS 2/3P

General

1. Questions in these papers fall into two broad categories:
  - a. Those designed to test candidates in searching references for the basic information relevant to the question, and an interpretation of the reference to answer or match the specific query or problem posed in the question.

References in most instances are not required nor should it be necessary for the candidate to refer to text books. Definitions

2. The examinations for Administrative and Technical Officers are open book examinations, vide paragraph 3 of the reference, and definition of Open Book Examination is:

Open Book Examination is any examination where text/reference books may be used by candidates during the examination. The text/reference books allowed have been given in the reference.

3. Types of questions used in open book examinations are:

a. Objective Questions. These questions normally require candidates to select the correct response from a number of choices (multiple choice questions) or to decide whether a statement given is true or false.

e. In-basket Questions. These questions present candidates with situations which staff officers are required to handle daily in the routine performance of their duties. They may require the candidate to prepare answers in one or more of the following formats (the list is not exhaustive):

- (1) Letters
- (2) Minutes, including conference minutes
- (3) Messages
- (4) Briefs
- (5) Notes for guidance of a superior
- (6) Agenda

4. In the Jul 70 examinations for Administrative and Technical Officers one or more of the above types of questions will be used.



a. Prescription Drug. A drug that may be dispensed only on the order of a medical officer.

b. Dangerous Drug. A Prescription Drug that has such dangerous effects as to require special care in its useage and control. Sedatives, narcotics, stimulants and Drugs of addiction are Dangerous Drugs and examples are barbiturates, marijuana, opium, morphia, heroin, amphetamines, cocaine, LSD and their derivatives.

2. No member is to:


a. Produce, partake or possess any Prescription Drug or Dangerous Drug except those issued to him on the order of a Medical Officer or legally purchased in Australia or an Australian canteen or US PX facility.

b. Knowingly permit the production, partaking, possession, sale, trade, distribution or administration of Prescription Drugs or Dangerous Drugs, except as provided in sub paras 2a and 2b, by any member of Australian Force Vietnam.

3. Any member having knowledge of infrigements of this order is to report the matter by the quickest possible means to his unit.

IMMUNIZATION AGAINST INFLUENZA

Vehicle Checks

14. a. Australian and New Zealand Service Vehicles.

(1). Between 0730 hrs and 2200 hrs

(a) All Australian and New Zealand Service vehicles leaving or entering the 1 ALSG area are to be stopped and the driver and passengers checked for correct dress - hats worn if in uniform, no mixed ~~service~~ civilian dress and shirts done up. RAAF, Red Cross and YMCA personnel are not checked for dress.

(b) If the vehicles have ~~passengers, personnel~~ other than Australia/New Zealand service personnel, Red Cross or YMCA representatives, the detail of such passengers is to be endorsed in the special vehicle and personnel log on entering the area and the entry marked with the time of leaving the area on exit.

(2) Between 2200 hrs and 0730 hrs

(a) All Australian and New Zealand service vehicles leaving or entering the 1 ALSG area are to be stopped and all drivers and passengers checked for :

(i) ID Cards

(ii) Valid leave passes (except officers) checked against the late leave list.

(iii) Details of vehicle and personnel leaving or entering the area on duty are to be recorded on the vehicle and personnel log.

(iv) Personnel not having valid leave passes are to be reported in the Guard Comds report.

(v) In the case of a convoy entering or leaving the area, the convoy cmd is to declare the number of vehicles in the convoy, the destination and the details of any non Aust/NZ drivers and passengers. This detail is to be recorded in the vehicle and personnel log.

(vi) The name of any officer driving a vehicle during this time is to be recorded in the Guard Comds report.

b. US Service Vehicles and Aust. NZ and US Civilian Vehicles

(1) All such vehicles entering the area are to be stopped and identification of the driver and passengers checked. Entry is to be permitted only if they are:

(a) On official business with a 1 ALSG unit, or

(b) Proceeding only to the 1 Pl 2 AFCU PX and Gift Shop, or

(c) The subject of a special invitation to the 1 ALSG area by a unit or individual. Personnel are not permitted entry to visit the Peter Badcoe Club. They may enter if invited by AFV Amenities Unit or a member of that unit.

(2) The detail of persons allowed to enter is to be entered in the special vehicle and personnel log sheet and is to include the name of the person or unit inviting the visitor.

(3) Vehicles allowed to enter for the purpose of visiting the 1 Pl 2 AFCU PX and Gift Shop are to be directed to the car park established for this purpose. Should any vehicle be noted not going into the car park or on leaving the car park turning left into the 1 ALSG area the guard is to ring AFV Pro Unit, EMU 187, give a description of the vehicle and request them to direct the vehicle to leave the area.

(4) If such vehicles contain persons other than Aust/NZ or US personnel the vehicle is not to be permitted entry until the host or host unit has provided an escort.

c. Civilian Contract Vehicles - Non Aust/NZ or US

Vehicles required to enter the area on the servicing tasks such as garbage collection, PA&E, Vinnell and AB&T vehicles are to be admitted only under escort. If the personnel provided by the duty unit is insufficient at any one time, up to three members of the West Gate Guard may be used for the escort tasks. If the supply of Guards runs out the Guard Commander is to inform D&E Pl Comd/Sgt.

d. All Other Vehicles

(1) Vehicles other than Aust/NZ, US or Civilian contract vehicles are not to be permitted entry unless:

(a) A 1 ALSG vehicle pass is held for the vehicle by the West Gate Guard. The pass is to be uplifted by the driver and returned to the West Gate Guard when the vehicle leaves the area. The driver and all passengers exchange their civilian ID Card for a valid AMF pass via Civil Labour Unit or if after normal working hours via the West Gate Guard. This affects Concessionaire, Firestation and Water Point Dutymen staff and vehicles. Personnel not having passes are not to be permitted entry.

(b) The host individual or unit provides an escort to the West Gate Guard to escort the vehicle to the unit desired. For visitors to HQ 1 ALSG the West Gate Guard is to provide the escort.

(c) Full details of visits are made under para 14d(1)-(b) above are to be recorded in the special vehicle and personnel log including detail of the host individual/unit.

(2) Vehicles leaving the area within this category are not to be released from the area until cleared with the West Gate Guard by an escort or have handed in the appropriate vehicle pass. Any vehicle attempting to leave the area without an escort is to be held until the host individual/unit is contacted and verifies release. Detail of such action is to be included in the Guard Commanders report.

(3) Vehicles are to be searched and any illegally carried goods are to be confiscated and held. GS Branch (IO) is to be informed of such action and a report is made in the Guard Commanders report.

Personnel Entering or Leaving the Area on Foot

15. a. Aust/NZ Service Personnel 0730 - 2200 hrs. Free access/exit except for a dress check for:
- (1) Correctness of dress if in uniform including wearing of hats.

  - (3) No wearing of thongs.
- b. Aust/NZ Service Personnel 2200 - 0730 hrs. Details as for para 14 a (2).
- c. US Service Personnel and Aust/NZ, US Civilians. Detail as for para 14 b.
- d. Civilian Employees (Incl Concessionaire, Firestation and Water Point Dutymen)
- (1) Entering when Civil Labour Office is Open
    - (a) Pass through Civil Labour Office.
    - (b) Hand in civilian ID Card.
    - (c) Collect AMF civilian pass.
    - (d) Exchange of ID Cards/Passes to be carried out by Civil Labour staff.
  - (2) Leaving when Civil Labour Office is Open
    - (a) Pass through search point - West Gate Guard to search all baggage and male personnel. Female staff are to be searched by female searcher.
    - (b) Hand in AMF Civilian pass.
    - (c) Collect Civilian ID Card.
    - (d) Exchange of ID Cards/Passes to be carried out by Civil Labour Staff.
  - (3) Action when Civil Labour Office is Closed. All action to be as for para 15 d (1) and (2) above except that:
    - (a) Exchange of ID Cards/Passes is to be supervised by West Gate Guard. On no account are the civil labourers be allowed to select ~~their own~~ ID Cards/Passes.
    - (b) Female staff are not to be searched if no female searchers are available.

e. All Other Personnel. Entry or exit is not to be permitted unless escorted by the host individual or unit representative. Full details of such visitors are to be recorded in the special vehicle and personnel log.

Exceptions

16. a. Vehicles. Following vehicles are not to be stopped when entering or leaving the area:
- (1) Comds vehicle when he is travelling in it.
  - (2) AFV Provost Unit vehicles when sounding a siren and a flashing light is on.
  - (3) Ambulances when sounding a siren and a flashing light is on.
  - (4) Fire Engine when sounding a siren and/or flashing light is on.
- b. Emergency Servicing Vehicles. From time to time emergency calls will be made by the Garrison Engineer/1 ALSG Duty Officer for electrical/fire etc contract vehicles. The person making the call to the supplying organisation is to inform the West Gate Guard Commander of the details of the expected vehicle arrival and the West Gate Guard Commander is to reserve an escort for the vehicle and to ensure that the vehicle is not delayed. If a servicing vehicle arrives unannounced, claiming to be on an emergency call, the West Gate Guard Commander is to provide an escort and report the details in the Guard Commanders report.
- c. Querries. If the West Gate Guard has reason to doubt the eligibility of any person or vehicle to have access to, or exit from, the 1 ALSG area they may hold the vehicle/persons until they have verified their status via G Branch (EMU 32, 37, 38) or EMU 38/72 (Duty Officer) in after normal working hours.

ORDERS FOR HQ 1 ALSG DUTY OFFICER

Introduction

1. The duty officer represents the Comd 1 ALSG and HQ 1 ALSG Staff. Within his capability he is to take the appropriate action on any staff matter arising during his tour of duty.

Tour of Duty

2. All officers of HQ 1 ALSG below field rank and such other officers as are nominated from time to time by GS02 HQ 1 ALSG are rostered as HQ 1 ALSG Duty Officers.

3. The tour of duty is for twenty four hours, commencing at 0900 hrs daily. The duty officer is to be in attendance in the HQ 1 ALSG duty room during the following times:

- a. Monday to Saturday 1200 - 1330 hours and 1700 - 0730 hours.
- b. Saturday to Sunday 1200 - 1330 hours and 1700 - 0830 hours.
- c. Sunday to Monday 1200 - 0730 hours.
- d. He is to check with the three staff branches at 1645 hours Monday to Saturday inclusive and at 1145 hours Sunday for any special instructions.

4. During the periods listed at para 3 a,b&c the duty officer may be absent from the duty room as follows:

- a. 0600 - 0630 hours. To wash and change.
- b. Urgent tasks of short duration.
- c. During quiet periods meals may be taken at the Officers Mess.

Responsibilities

5. Routine Tasks

- a. Receiving unit leave states by 1800 hours daily and:
  - (1) Informing the West Gate Guard by means of the leave proforma the numbers on normal leave and the names and destinations of personnel on authorised late leave.
  - (2) Informing 5 Coy RAASC the numbers on normal leave so that transport may be arranged to return leave personnel to 1 ALSG.
  - (3) Informing AFV Provost Unit the numbers on both normal and late leave.

- b. Continual maintenance of the duty officers log.
- c. When required maintaining radio communications with any patrols that may be out during the period 1700 - 0730 hours and on Sundays - Mondays during the period 1200 - 0730 hours.
- d. Conducting a radio communications check at 1900 hours between 765 Trans Bn (US) and HQ 1 ALSG.
- e. Conducting a radio communications check between 1900 - 2100 hours of the 1 ALSG defence net.
- f. Ensuring that the duty clerk conducts a communications check of the alternative 1 ALSG defence sector telephone net during the period 2000 - 2100 hours.
- g. Inspecting the 1 ALSG West Gate Guard and Guard Room once during his tour of duty between 1900 and 2400 hours. The Duty Officer is to liaise with HQ Coy 1 ALSG Duty Officer to ensure that his inspection does not coincide with any inspection carried out by HQ Coy 1 ALSG Duty Officer.
- h. Ensuring that the duty clerk:
- (1) Raises and lowers the five flags situated at HQ 1 ALSG at 0630 hours and 1800 hours respectively.
  - (2) Cleans and tidies the duty room before dismounting duty.
- j. Taking action on Operational Demands (OPDEMS) and Priority Maintenance Demands (PRIMAINTDEMS) in accordance with 1 ALSG Standing Orders Part 2 Section 2.
- k. The handling of urgent telephone or signal messages of priority or higher precedence and:
- (1) Taking immediate action when necessary and later informing the relevant staff officers of that action taken, or
  - (2) Referring the matter to the relevant unit or staff officer if in any doubt to the appropriate action. All signals requiring acknowledgement will be referred.
- l. Ensuring that all messages are receipted, registered and that the duplicate copies of all signals are placed on the inwards message folder.

Operational Tasks

6. The duty officer is to contact the following officers or units on matters listed below.

a. G302 or IO

- (1) Defence emergencies (see paras 7 - 10 below) or on receipt of information of a tactical nature affecting 1 ALSG,

- (2) On receipt of information of a counter-intelligence nature.
  - (3) Report of a PW escape from a 1 ALSG installation.

- (1) Urgent RTA or other matters affecting personnel.
  - (2) Unannounced march-ins.
- c. SCC (Ops) or in his absence DAQMG (Maint) EMU 75
- (1) OPDEMS, PRIMAINTEMS, (see para 5j)
  - (2) Attacks on convoys or LSM resulting in the loss of vehicles and/or stores.
  - (3) Changes to resupply arrangements.
  - (4) Any other matters as requested by the staff officers concerned.
- d. Provost Marshal
- (1) Fatal accidents involving Australian service personnel.
  - (2) Serious accidents which occur in the VUNG TAU/1 ALSG area and which involve Australian or New Zealand service personnel.
  - (3) An escape from the Detention Barracks.
  - (4) Request for Military Police assistance from the National Police Chief of Vung Tau or his deputy.
  - (5) Outbreak of fire in the Detention Barracks.
  - (6) Any important messages from Military Police detachments at SAIGON or 1 ATF. These messages will normally come over the police net.
  - (7) Any incidents involving soldiers under sentence.
- e. 1 ALSG Fire Officer (Garrison Engineer). Fires.
- f. SCC (Mov) or in his absence any member of Det 11 MC Gp
- (1) Any urgent information concerning movements:
    - (a) LSM - departure, arrival or amending reports.
    - (b) JEPARIT, or other ships from overseas - arrival times if imminent.

(c) RAAF aircraft - arrival times of Courier from AUSTRALIA, cancellation of Courier aircraft (WALLABY and C130).

(2) Any information concerning the closure of airfields.

(3) Movement of stores by LCU.

g. Chaplains. Casualties, battle or otherwise, taken to 1 Aust Fd Hosp.

#### Defence Emergencies

7. A defence emergency is a situation in which 1 ALSG or allied installations in the VUNG TAU area are threatened or ~~under~~ attacked.

8. Under the defence arrangements made by HQ VUNG TAU Special Zone (Sector HQ), the peninsula is divided into seven areas of responsibility. Those ~~areas~~ directly affecting 1 ALSG area are:

Area G - Occupied by 1 ALSG.

Area A - Occupied by the National Trg Centre for Revolutionary Development (North of 1 ALSG area), which is ~~their~~ responsibility.

Area C - Airfield and US installations (NORTHWEST of 1 ALSG area), which is 765th Trans Bn responsibility.

Area E - VUNG TAU (WEST and SOUTH of 1 ALSG area), responsibility of National Police HQ.

9. If 1 ALSG is under attack or notification is received that an allied installation in VUNG TAU is being attacked, the Duty Officer is to:

a. Advise GS02 (Quarters telephone EMU 32) who will inform Comd as necessary.

b. If GS02 absent, inform Comd direct (Quarters telephone EMU 31, VT 6735). If both are absent contact next senior officer on HQ 1 ALSG.

c. Inform VTSZ TOC Duty Officer (VT 6932/6611) and seek further information.

d. Inform Duty Officer HQ 1 ATF and HQ AFV.

10. If an Alert notification is received the Duty Officer is to carry out actions 1a & b, and then act on instructions of Comd or GS02 supplementary to those contained in Annex D to Section 4, Part 1, Chapter 1.

11. In the event of enemy action requiring immediate response in 1 ALSG area, the Duty Officer is to carry out actions 1a and 1b and proceed to:

a. Bring units to RED or ROCKET alert status as applicable.

b. Advise Main Gate Guard of situation.

c. Instruct units to come up on 1 ALSG Defence Net and open unit nets if applicable.

Handling of Classified Material

12. Classified material received during hours of duty is to be handled as follows:
- a. Material classified up to and including SECRET - open, take actions as required; handle in accordance with the security classification.
  - b. Material classified TOP SECRET - to be immediately delivered by the Duty Officer personally to the person to whom it is addressed, the Commander, or a senior staff officer.

Communications

13. A list of important telephone numbers (incl. some on EMU exchange) is attached as Appendix 1. Up to date directories are located in the duty room.
14. On rest days, signals correspondence, register and log sheets are handed to the relieving Duty Officer.
15. Four copies of the Duty Officer's log are to be prepared. Copies are to be distributed by 0730 hours to the desks of the Comd, GS02, DAA & QMG and DAQMG (Maint).
16. All occurrences/messages/communications of importance will be recorded in the log along with details of action taken, where applicable. The following are examples of what are to be recorded in the log:
- a. All telephone calls to and from outside mil agencies such as 1 ATF, AFV, RAAF and 765th Trans Bn.
  - b. Any case of civil incidents in and around Vung Tau.
  - c. Unusual incidents within 1 ALSG area.
  - d. All matters connected with ops, tactical or logistic.
  - e. Queries and visits by ChdComd to the ops room after hours.
17. As much as possible of the log is to be typed by the Duty Clerk but entries may be handwritten and the principal period may be written in legible longhand.

ORDERS FOR THE DUTY CLERK HQ 1 ALSG

General

1. The duty clerk is to assist the HQ 1 ALSG Duty Officer in his duty and, if directed to do so, act on his behalf.
2. All clerks in HQ 1 ALSG are to be rostered as duty clerks.

Tour of Duty

3. The tour of duty is from 0900 hours to 0900 hours the following day. During normal working hours the duty clerk is to carry out the duties of his appointment.
4. The duty roster is to be prepared by the Chief Clerk HQ 1 ALSG, and a copy sent to the GSM HQ Coy.

Location

5. Outside normal working hours, the Duty Clerk is to remain in the Operations Room.

Duties

6. The Duty Clerk is to:
  - a. Register all incoming messages.
  - b. Place duplicate copies of all incoming messages in the message folder for the appropriate day as soon as they are received. Long messages are to be separated into their separated pages.
  - c. After having registered all incoming signals, hand to the Duty Officer all Maintdems, Primaintdems, Sitreps etc for necessary action. All other signals are to be registered in, the inwards correspondence register, the duplicate copy being placed on the signals float file. Originals are to be handed to the Registry by 0730 hours each morning. He will ensure that no persons other than Comd, GS02, DAQMG (Maint) or DAA & QMG are permitted to peruse correspondence without the express permission of Comd, or GS02. Where it is necessary for correspondence to be removed, the person removing the correspondence will sign the inwards correspondence book to that effect. All correspondence is to remain in the inwards register and is to be handed to the Registry by 0730 hours each morning.
  - d. Produce signals, memoranda, letters etc as required by the Duty Officer.
  - e. Maintain the officers location board and delete any outdated entries by 0730 hours daily.

- f. Mark and maintain charts, maps and boards as required by the Duty Officer.
- g. Produce four copies of Duty Officer's log and place one copy on the desks of the Commander, GS02, DAA & QMG and DAQMG (Maint) by 0730 hours.
- h. Answer the Duty Officer's telephone, record any messages in the log and pass the information to the Duty Officer.
- i. Ensure that the Operations Room is swept and tidy at all times and that the Duty Room is tidy by 0730 hours daily
- j. Open the door of the Comd's Office and clean his desk by 0630 hours.
- k. Perform such other duties as required by the Duty Officer.

Dress

- 7. The dress of the Duty Clerk is to conform with the orders of dress laid down in current 1 ALSG Routine Orders Part 1.
