COMMANDERS DIARIES
INSTRUCTIONS

AIM

1. The aim of a Commanders Diary is to provide data on which to base future improvements in Army training, equipment, organisation and administration, and to furnish historians with a record of the activities of units and formations in operational and non-operational periods in peace and in war.

GENERAL

2. Entries will be made daily on AF C2118, each entry being initialled by the officer detailed to keep it.
3. Commanders Diaries will conform with the rules for drafting orders given in "Staff Duties in the Field", Chapter 5, Section 1.

RESPONSIBILITY

During Non-operational Periods

4. A Commanders Diary will be made by commanders of all formations.

During Operational Periods (see note 1)

5. A Commanders Diary will be made in duplicate by:—
- (a) Commanders of all formations.
 - (b) Each branch of the staff at formation headquarters commanded by a Brigadier or above.
 - (c) Heads of services not below the rank of Lieutenant Colonel.
 - (d) Personal staffs and officers holding special appointments.
 - (e) Unit commanders.
 - (f) Commanders of a detachment of a unit when so ordered.

COMPILATION

6. Both original and duplicate copies will consist of:—
- (a) Cover (AF C2119).
 - (b) Index as printed on cover.
 - (c) Narrative (AF C2118).
 - (d) Annexes as shown in the Index.

7. All details of the unit or formation (if a detachment is concerned, the name of the parent unit), period covered and enclosure numbers of the annexes will be shown on the cover. If there has been a change of command since the last report, the date of assumption by the new commanding officer will be included.

8. The annexes will be assembled in the groups shown on the cover. If there are no enclosures for an Annex NIL will be entered on the cover. If additional annexes are convenient for a particular headquarters, the relevant papers should be grouped as annexes starting at B.

9. Documents concerned with future planning for operations will form Annex "Z", "TOP SECRET" and will be prepared and disposed of as such.

19. The duplicate supplementary diaries will be prepared if the original has been acknowledged.

NOTES

1. Definition of Operational Period.—The term "operational period" shall mean:
- (a) the period between a declaration of war and the end of hostilities;
 - (b) any period spent in a theatre of operations;
 - (c) any period when engaged in any form of military operations.

2. The War Office or headquarters concerned will be responsible for the conditions of the unit's employment make this note of potential importance. It will be clearly stated. Notwithstanding the above, or in addition, the following information will be given:—
- (a) Casualties to officers, men and equipment.
 - (b) Equipment captured.
 - (c) Time spent in the theatre of operations.
 - (d) Type of equipment employed in the time not accounted for. The type of equipment employed in the time not accounted for.

Efforts will be made to save work as much information as possible will be given. All annexes issued and received, routine returns, etc. All annexes will be given. All annexes will be given.

12. The narrative will supplement and connect the annexes but need not give a precis of them.

DISPOSAL

During Non-Operational Periods

13. *Formation Headquarters* will forward the original Commanders Diary annually as at 31st December to reach the War Office Records Centre (through Headquarters Field Records where applicable) as soon as possible after 1st January of the following year. The duplicate will be retained in formation headquarters.

14. *Units* will NOT render a Commanders Diary.

During Operational Periods

15. ORIGINAL COMMANDERS DIARIES

(a) *Formations and units in the UK* will forward diaries monthly by the seventh day of the succeeding month direct to the War Office (WORC for reports other than medical, AMD 1 for medical reports).

(b) *Formations and units overseas* will forward diaries monthly by the seventh day of the succeeding month to the OIC Field Records for onward transmission to the War Office.

16. **DUPLICATE COMMANDERS DIARIES.** These will be clearly marked as duplicates and will NOT be sent with the originals. They will be forwarded within two months as follows:—

(a) *Units in the UK*
To the OIC parent record office.

(b) *Formation Headquarters in the UK*
To OIC Central Clearing Wing, Infantry Records, Exeter.

(c) *Units Overseas*
To the OIC Field Records for onward transmission to parent record office.

(d) *Formation Headquarters Overseas*
To the OIC Field Records for onward transmission to the OIC Central Clearing Wing, Infantry Records, Exeter.

SECURITY

17. Documents concerned with future operational planning will be listed on AF C2118 and placed in a separate AF C2119. All details will be filled in and the cover will be clearly marked in red:—ANNEX Z—OFFICERS ONLY. It may be convenient to group the papers by annexes.

18. Supplementary diaries will be forwarded in accordance with the normal rules for TOP SECRET correspondence to the War Office (WORC). The inner envelope will be clearly marked:—

19. The duplicate supplementary diaries will be despatched as in paragraph 16 as soon as receipt of the originals has been acknowledged.

NOTES

1. *Definition of Operational Period.*—The term “operational period” for the purpose of this instruction, means:—

- (a) the period between a declaration of war and the official end of hostilities;
- (b) any period spent in a theatre of operations;
- (c) any period when engaged in any form of military operation.

2. The War Office or headquarters concerned will be responsible for instructing units to submit Commanders' Diaries where the conditions of the unit's employment make this necessary. Wherever possible the beginning and end of the period will be clearly stated. Notwithstanding the above, on the outbreak of global war all units and formations which are not at the time submitting these reports will start compiling them with effect from M day and will thereafter render them in accordance with paragraphs 15 and 16.

This form will be enclosed with the annexes in AF C 2119. If this is not available the cover will be prepared in manuscript.

3 RAR TRAINING DIRECTIVE 1/65

General

1. 3 RAR, although presently engaged in anti-infiltration role against Indonesian aggression, is mainly concerned in meeting its commitment as part of the British Commonwealth Far East Strategic Reserve.
2. In the ensuing months, training will be concentrated principally for this role.
3. There will be times when it may not be possible to adhere to certain of the planned requirements described later, however company commanders must plan to be flexible in their programmes.

Aim

4. The aim of this directive is to provide for company commanders a broad direction of the type of training to be carried out in order to enable them to plan, in detail, their training. Some specific training is included in which there can be no relaxation.

Training Doctrine

5. Training is to be based on the doctrine contained in the following publications:-
 - a. Anti Guerilla Operations in SE Asia - AGOSEA
 - Anti Terrorist Operations in MALAYA, 1958 - ATOM.
 - Keeping the Peace - Parts 1 and 2.
 - IS in a City
 - Tactics, Inf Trg Vol IV.
 - 3 RAR SOPs for Mobilization and Air Portable Operations.
 - 3 RAR Aide Memoire.
6. All officers are to read the reports on Ex TRUMPETER and Ex DHA NA RAJATA which are held by the Int Offr. When it is received the report on Ex RAVEN is also to be read by all officers.
7. In addition numerous reports on the operations in BORNEO have been distributed to officers. These should be reread from time to time by officers. They are held by the Int Offr.

Training Programme

- 8. The planned training programme for the period ending Jul 65 is to be issued separately as Annex A to this instruction.

Officer Training

9. Officer training is to be conducted each Mon from 1600 - 1800 hrs. All officers will attend. The training Officer is to be responsible to me for the detailed subjects to be covered and the co-option of officers as required to assist in the training.

Schools and Courses

10. There is a continuing requirement for officers/NCOs and Other Ranks to attend specialist and general type courses to be conducted by FARELF. Vacancies on courses will be notified to companies. Company Commanders are to ensure that personnel nominated to attend have the necessary qualifications in accordance with the booklet - "Courses of Instruction FARELF and other Trg Units".

Annual Weapon Classification Practices

11. All soldiers must qualify in two of the personal weapons to gain qualification for pay. However it will be the aim to qualify them in all three weapons.

12. A high standard of shooting is expected and soldiers who do not produce good results will reshoot to raise their standard. Coaching can play an important role and all NCOs are to be made aware of, and practice, this aspect of their duties.

Training Ammunition

13. Allotment of training ammunition is to be advised separately. Allocations for the remainder of this training year should be used wherever possible. Ammunition not used will be counted against the next training years allocation. A further allocation to 31 Jul 65 will be made; this is not to be exceeded under any circumstance.

Training Areas, Ranges etc

14. Companies are to submit their bids for training areas and ranges in accordance with current instructions. In some instances it may not be possible to confirm firm allocation of company requests as early as is desirable. Therefore companies are to ensure that alternative training is arranged should it not be possible to meet the company bid.

Mobilization/Airportability Training

15. In addition to the Brigade exercises which will incorporate mobilization and airportability training, snap exercises will be ordered by me both at night and during working hours to test the state of readiness of the unit in these two important aspects of training. 3 RAR SOPs for Mobilization and Air Portable Operations have been re-written as the result of experience gained and also because of the revised scale of vehicles which we might expect to accompany us on operations. These SOPs will be the basis for training.

16. The SUEO is to ensure that loading and lashing teams are fully trained in accordance with 28 COMTEL BDE SOP No 3.

Helicopter Training

17. Drills for helicopter emplaning and deplaning are to be practised by all ranks. The drills for marshalling, unloading and evacuation of casualties, are to be taught to all members.

Physical Efficiency Tests

18. Battle Physical Efficiency tests are to be carried out in accordance with MBI 252-3. AAF C12 is to be completed for each member and kept up to date. Swimming is to be conducted in the Olympic Pool and bids for use of the pool are to be made to the training officer.

First Aid

19. The Annual Revision Course in accordance with ARO 4/62 is to be completed by all members. Company Commanders are to arrange, through the Training Officer, for the RMO to conduct the revision course.

Company Training

20. During Company training emphasis is to be placed on:
- a. Physical fitness.
 - b. Shooting including night shooting. Maximum use will be made of jungle ranges.
 - c. Immediate action and battle drills.
 - d. Camouflage and concealment.
 - e. Health and water discipline.
 - f. Night training.
 - g. Map and photo reading.
 - h. Jungle navigation.
 - j. Crossing of water obstacles.
 - k. GPMG training. Note that the 7.62 Bren LMG is to remain the normal section weapon at this stage.
21. At appropriate times opportunity is to be taken by all officers to discuss with their troops the likely areas of operations in SE Asia together with the organization, weapons and tactics of our likely enemies.
22. Areas for company exercises are to be cleared by me.

Specialist Training

23. Additional to normal training Support Company platoons are to continue to devote some time to normal rifle platoon training.
24. Emphasis on platoon training is to be as follows:
- a. Anti Tank Platoon
 - (1) Normal training in anti tank role.
 - (2) Training as MMG platoon of 4 guns. British GPMG is to be standard weapon in lieu of Vickers MMG.
 - b. Mortar Platoon
 - (1) Normal mortar training.
 - (2) Training of all members in fire control duties. Maximum use is to be made of the sub calibre firing device.
 - c. Assault Pioneer Platoon
 - (1) Construction of LPs.
 - (2) Demolition and booby traps.
 - (3) Mine Warfare training.
 - (4) Watermanship.
 - (5) Construction of light vehicle tracks.

d. Signals Platoon

- (1) Training in all current RS and those to be issued under the LARKSPUR programmes.
- (2) Attainment of at least 14 WPM in morse for all operators.
- (3) Line training is to be continued to be emphasized.

e. Transport

- (1) There is a shortage of reserve 3 ton drivers which can lead to inefficiency in use of transport. OC Admin Coy and Adjt are to ensure that adequate numbers of drivers are available to provide for the efficient functioning of transport.
- (2) Companies are to provide soldiers for driving training when called on to do so.
- (3) Drivers allotted to specialist platoons are to train with their platoons as mutually arranged between OC Admin Coy, and OC Sp Coy.

Code of Conduct Training

25. Emphasis is to continue to be placed on behaviour of soldiers in the event their becoming a prisoner of war. Notes already in possession of company commanders are to be used as the basis for discussion.

Communism

26. The threat of communism is known to all ranks. However for a proper perspective to be gained of the ideals and aims of world communism company commanders are to hold discussions at appropriate times on the threat that communism poses. The method of discussion and points to be emphasized will be as contained in the material already in possession of company commanders.

First Promotion and Promotion to Sergeant

27. On dates to be notified courses, for first promotion and promotion to Sergeant, are to be conducted to prepare candidates and finally to examine them in Subjects A, B and C.

Promotion to Warrant Rank - Subject C

28. The training officer is to arrange a course of instruction for Subject C to Warrant Rank. However it is the personal responsibility of candidates for this examination to ensure that they prepare themselves adequately by devoting their own time to study. A pass is unlikely to be gained merely by attendance at the course - it is the basis for study of the subject only.

NCO Cadre Training


29. Selected Junior NCOs and senior soldiers are to attend NCO cadre training to enable them to carry out their duties and responsibilities more effectively. Bn HQ is to notify companies of dates and vacancies for this training.

7. OFFICERS' MESS 3 R/R

During the period from 2400 hrs 2 Jan 65 to 2400 hrs 22 Jan 65 the duties of PMC Officers' Mess will be performed by Maj B FALVEY and the duties of Secretary/Treasurer Officers' Mess will be carried out by Capt L N HALL.

8. SECURITY OF UNIT TRANSPORT COMPOUND

At 1600 hrs Mon - Fri inclusive, the keys to the unit tpt compound will be delivered by Tpt NCO to the Guard Commander or Duty RP for safekeeping. The keys will be held in the Guard Room Key Cupboard. They will be issued only in the following circumstances:-

- a. On mobilization, on authority of the Orderly Officer.
- b. With permission of the Bn Orderly Sergeant, to members of the Tpt staff requiring access to the compound. The time/date of issue and return of keys with the particulars of the person to whom issued will be recorded in the Guard Report on each occasion. The Guard Commander is NOT authorised to issue the keys on his own authority - prior permission of the Bn Orderly Officer/Orderly Sergeant will be obtained.

9. PROVISION OF UNIT TPT AFTER DUTY HOURS

Unit transport required after normal duty hours on weekdays and on Saturdays, Sundays and Public Holidays will be requisitioned by submission of AAF G4 to Tpt office or (in urgent cases) by telephone as far in advance as possible. The following types of tpt are included:-

- a. Movements. Delivery/collection of personnel and stores to/from MALACCA Airport and TAMPIN Railway Station after duty hours.
- b. Training. Night and weekend training incl collection/delivery of personnel and stores before and after activities.
- c. Domiciliary Tpt. The collection/delivery of late/early duty members from/to their homes, outside TERENDAK Camp.

Tpt office is responsible for provision of transport for tasks as per requisitions. The unit duty vehicle will NOT be detailed to perform these tasks (except within TERENDAK Camp by prior arrangement with Bn Ord Offr).

By 1600 hrs Mon - Fri and 0830 hrs Sat (for Sat and Sun), the tpt NCO will deliver to Bn Ord Offr at the Duty Room a list, on the authorized proforma, of all unit tpt detailed for duty after normal working hours or on rest days/Public Holidays. Detail will include date, task, vehicle number, and driver. This list will be the Orderly Officer's authority to release vehicles from the tpt compound after normal working hours and to sign Tpt Work Tickets for the tasks as necessary (eg. authorize late-duty members to travel to BUKIT BAHRU on a scheduled run to MALACCA Airport) provided the general route/timings of the task are not varied.

10. SECURITY OF STORES IN VEHICLES

Vehicles will only be left unattended in an emergency when it is unavoidable, and never if there is danger of theft of cargo.

MARRIAGES

All members of 3 RAR intending to marry in MALAYA, whether to ASIANS or EUROPEANS are required to advise the Commanding Officer through normal channels of their intention, proposed date of marriage and whether any arrangements for married accommodation have been made. This requirement exists so that the unit can be assured that all necessary arrangements such as applications for married quarters, removal of effects/wedding presents are finalized without delay.

12. FOREIGN AMMUNITION

Several cases have occurred recently when foreign ammunition or explosives have been captured or come into the possession of our forces. Coys will instruct all who may be concerned in the following actions and procedures:-

- a. Report to the Coy or Bn HQ on coming into possession of foreign or captured ammunition or explosives giving all relevant details.
- b. If the ammunition or explosives is obviously unsafe it may be treated as a blind and destroyed in situ by the unit after details have been noted. This should only be done if it is impractical to obtain the services of the Ammunition Technician.

13. 3 RAR BEACH CAMP PORT DICKSON

- (1) The facilities of the above camp are available to soldiers who are NOT required for duty.
- (2) By 0930 hrs each Tue Coys will advise the Camp Supervising Officer (2IC C Coy), or in his absence the Asst Adjt, of the following particulars:-
 - a. The number of soldiers wishing to use the camp on the following weekends.
 - b. The number of soldiers wishing to use official tpt to and from Port Dickson.
- (3) When required tpt will leave Bn HQ at 1700 hrs each Fri and Port Dickson at 1600 hrs each Sun.
- (4) Coys will ensure that all soldiers quartered at Port Dickson are either rationed in or purchase meals through their Coy Orderly Rooms. In the latter case meal vouchers will be handed to the camp supervising NCO at the time of meal consumption.

14. OPERATIONS OUTSIDE MALAYA - PERSONAL ASPECTS

1. In the event of Australian Troops serving in MALAYA being required to leave the FEDERATION at short notice on operations, some members may not be able to re-arrange their personal affairs within the time available prior to departure.
2. A wife has only very limited power to act as agent for her husband unless specifically authorised by him. Thus, even a married member could find difficulty where a hire purchase agreement must be adjusted or there is a motor vehicle or other property to be returned to AUSTRALIA.
3. In these cases where individuals consider that they may have trouble settling personal matters before embarkation, they may desire to execute a Power of Attorney.
4. To assist those members, a form of Power of Attorney has been

prepared. Copies are available from Bn HQ Orderly Room. The choice of an ATTORNEY and execution of a Power in his favour are purely personal matters for the individual concerned.

5. It is most undesirable that any member of the Australian Military Forces should be appointed to act as holder of a Power of Attorney. Should there be such an appointment, it could ultimately prove embarrassing to the Army if the Attorney failed to carry out his functions in a way that pleased the donor. It could also become a major administrative commitment. Wives can be appointed holder of a Power of Attorney for their husband.

6. Accordingly it must be emphasised to all ranks that the form of Power of Attorney is made available for any member to use or refrain from using as he sees fit, and this is the beginning and the end of Army responsibility in the matter.

15. ACTION TO BE TAKEN BY PARENTS IN RELATION TO CHILDREN BORN IN SINGAPORE/
MALAYA

Notification of Birth

1. When a child is born to the wife of an Australian serviceman in a British/Military Hospital, the hospital registers the birth of the child.

2. The Certificate of Registration of a birth is NOT a Birth Certificate. A Birth Certificate may be obtained by presenting the Certificate of Registration of a Birth to the local Registrar of Births and Deaths accompanied by the necessary fee.

Registration of a Child as an Australian Citizen

3. A child of an Australian serviceman who is born in MALAYA/SINGAPORE is, at birth, automatically a British Subject but not an AUSTRALIAN CITIZEN.

4. To register a child born in MALAYA/SINGAPORE as an Australian Citizen the parents should complete two copies of an application form obtainable from the husband's unit and forward them through the unit to the Australian High Commission, 44 Ampang Road, KUALA LUMPUR, together with the following:

- a. Marriage Certificate
- b. Child's Birth Certificate
- c. Two (2) passport sized photographs (2 in x 2½ in) of each parent and the child to be registered.
- d. Evidence of the Father's Australian Citizenship.
Any of the following documents provide this evidence:
 - (1) Birth Certificate.
 - (2) An extract of Entry
 - (3) Naturalization Certificate
 - (4) Registration Certificate.
- e. Mother's passport for endorsement plus \$1.00 fee.

5. The application should be lodged as soon as possible after the birth of the child and in any case not later than six mths after the date of birth.

Malaya Allowance

6. Immediately a child is born to an Australian serviceman in MALAYA/SINGAPORE, the member must notify his unit and obtain a "MALAYA PAY 3 VARIATION OF MALAYA ALLOWANCE ADVICE." This form will be completed by the member and submitted to his unit pay representative who will make the necessary adjustment to the member's pay and allowances.

Maternity Allowance and Child Endowment

7. Wives of Australian servicemen are entitled to claim Australian Maternity Allowance and child endowment for children born to them in MALAYA/SINGAPORE. Such claims should be submitted on Form SCI "CLAIMS FOR MATERNITY ALLOWANCE AND/OR CHILD ENDOWMENT." Copies may be obtained from the Australian High Commission, 44 Ampang Road, KUALA LUMPUR.
8. The claim form should be completed and then forwarded direct to the Australian High Commission.
9. The payment of maternity allowance and child endowment cannot be made through a Post Office in MALAYA/SINGAPORE. When forwarding the claim to the Commission the claimant should state which of the following methods of payment is desired:-
- By cheque through the Commission.
 - To a specified bank account in AUSTRALIA.
 - To a specified bank account in MALAYA/SINGAPORE.

16. ATTESTATION OF DOCUMENTS

Under the Defence Force Regulations, the following arrangements apply to Statutory Declarations and Affidavits required to be signed under Australian Commonwealth, State or Territory Law:-

- An Australian, New Zealander United Kingdom Army officer, NOT below the rank of Captain, may administer an oath (for affidavits) or attest Statutory Declarations.
- The officer attesting the document will
 - Write, type or stamp under his signature his number, rank, name and unit.
 - Ensure that the attestation includes a statement of the date on which it was taken.

2. The Bn Runner will deliver mail as detailed above at 1100 hrs and 1500 hrs. He will deliver mail etc outside these times as required by Bn HQ Staff. Addressees responsible for clearing their own mail will do so at hourly intervals during working hours commencing at 0800 hrs daily. SDS deliveries call at 3 R/R at approximately 1030 hrs and 1430 hours.

18. DRESS - KNOTTING THE LANYARD

1. The method of wearing Lanyards in 3 RMR is to be as follows with immediate effect:
 - a. Push the smaller loop upwards through the larger loop (Fig 1) and bring the smaller loop towards the body. Take it under the scorn of the larger loop and complete the circle by pushing this smaller loop down through the larger one again to form a reef knot (Fig 2).
 - b. Tighten the reef knot, then take the smaller loop 'A' (Fig 3) in the right hand and the other end of the reef knot 'B' in the left hand and pull apart.
 - c. Tidy up by squeezing together the knot now holding the lanyard and hold together with a stitch (Fig 4).
 - d. Wear lanyard with larger loop acorn to the rear under the arm pit.

21. AMENDMENT NO 3 TO 3 R/R STANDING ORDERS

The amendments as published to Sect 2 (Security Standing Orders) of 3 R/R Standing Orders are to take effect from 2400 hrs 14 Jan 65.

The attention of all ranks is to be brought to these amendments.

22. LOSS OF ID CARDS - FRO 116/63

- a. Attention of all Sub units / drawn to FRO 116/63. /is
- b. With the security situation that exists in Malaysia at present, the loss of ID Cards is even more serious than in the past.
- c. Sub units should remind all personnel of the need for special care of ID Cards and that any such loss will be treated as a prevalent offence.

23. CONSERVANCY - MARRIED QUARTERS

- a. Rubbish is being allowed to accumulate in the garden and surrounds of many married quarters. This is unsightly; allows mosquitos to breed; and may interfere with grass cutting contracts.
- b. Householders are responsible for clearing their own garden refuse by burning or other means.
- c. Sub units are to ensure that this responsibility is made known to all married families.

24. SECURITY OF INFORMATION - ORDER OF BATTLE

All ranks are warned to be on their guard against correspondence from persons calling themselves 'students of military history' or 'military unit stamp collectors' and so on.

- b. This correspondence usually takes the form of a covering letter with stamped, addressed envelopes attached. The recipient is asked to put the unit stamp on the envelopes and post them.
- c. Any person complying with these requests is committing a breach of security by giving order of battle information to persons not authorised to receive it.
- d. The correct way of dealing with requests of this kind is for the recipient to report it to his unit HQ.

25. CONSERVANCY - TERENDAK BEACH

- a. The following area is placed Out of Bounds for recreation or picnics:

The flat ground extending from the beach above high water mark to the cliff within the limits of:

- (1) The Headland 100 yards NORTH of the Officers Beach Club.
 - (2) The stream (with outlet culvert marked Mosquito Control Unit) and track leading down to the area from behind the WO/Sgts Mess of the Military Hospital.
- b. Private cars are NOT to use the above track or park in the above area.
 - c. The above bounds do NOT restrict the use of this area of the Beach itself for walking or swimming.

26. THEFTS BY DEPENDANTS

- a. A number of petty thefts from NAFI shops have recently been committed by children.
- b. Sub units are to notify all married families that any child caught stealing in future will be liable to legal action including, if necessary, prosecution in the civil courts.

27. ADMISSION TO MILITARY HOSPITAL TERENDAK

With effect from 2100 hrs daily the main entrance to the Military Hospital will be closed and will not re-open until 0630 hrs. Entrance after 2100 hrs should be gained through Casualty.

28. STOCKTAKE - REGIMENTAL PROPERTY

A stocktake of all Regimental property will commence on 25 Jan 65.

All equipment on issue from the DPRI Store will be returned by Thu 21 Jan 65.

29. DAMAGE BY FIRE TO HIRED MARRIED QUARTERS

- a. It is normally a condition of Hiring Agreements for Married Quarters that the Landlord will insure the property from loss or damage by fire and other risks normally covered by a Householders Insurance Policy. Unreasonable delay in reporting an incident to the Insurance Company concerned may prejudice or invalidate the claim. Thus the War Department through the local Lands sub-office, has a duty to report to the Landlord any incident likely to give rise to a claim as soon as ever possible following the occurrence.
- b. A case recently arose where a War Department hiring was damaged by fire and 19 days elapsed before the incident was officially notified to the War Department Lands Agent. It is possible that the delay may prejudice the Landlords claim in which case he may seek redress from the War Department.
- c. To prevent a repetition of these circumstances all occupants are to ensure that any damage which occurs to War Department hirings by fire, explosion or any other hazard likely to be covered by a Householder's Insurance Policy is reported to MQI as speedily as possible, and in any events, not later than 24 hours after the incident. MQI will inform DAD LANDS immediately.

30. CIVIL LABOUR

No member is permitted to grant leave to Asian Civil Labour without reference to and permission from the Civil Labour Officer (OC Admin Coy).

31. CLOTHING AND EQUIPMENT ISSUES - TIMINGS

1. Issues on Payment Issues will be made as follows:

32. PREVENTION OF RABIES

- a. Introduction

Canine rabies has re-appeared recently in MALAYA after a lapse of some years. There is however always the possibility of an outbreak occurring elsewhere in the Far East. The following notes on the action to be taken in a rabies declared area should be given maximum publicity.

b. Action to be taken

- (1) Persons bitten or licked by a dog on broken skin should wash the wound thoroughly with soap and water to remove as much of the virus as possible and report at once to the nearest medical officer or medical centre.
 - (2) Persons who were in contact with the dog during the previous 14 days should if possible be ascertained and their names and address reported to the nearest medical officer.
 - (3) If it should become necessary to kill the animal it should not be shot through the head as the brain is required for laboratory examination.
- c. Stray dogs should not be handled or adopted. In barracks and camps such unwanted dogs should be caught and handed over to the civil veterinary authorities or destroyed humanely.

33. CHOLERA VACCINATION

All personnel are warned that Cholera vaccination is NOT valid for entry to or departure from HONG KONG unless six clear days have elapsed after vaccination or revaccination. Passengers arriving at HONG KONG with invalid certificates are being placed in quarantine.

34. VACCINATION - DEPENDANTS

The Commonwealth Department of Health has clarified the minimum age limits for immunisation of dependant children on return to AUSTRALIA. These ages are shown below:-

| Cholera | - | No requirements under 6 months of age. |

All dependants must be immunised against smallpox and cholera prior to return to AUSTRALIA - except as stated above.

In order that all dependants may be protected at all times against Smallpox, Cholera and Poliomyelitis heads of families should ensure that vaccinations are kept up-to-date to avoid having to be completely re-vaccinated.

35. COMPLAINTS CONCERNING TREATMENT AT MEDICAL CENTRES

1. From time to time families have complaints regarding treatment afforded families at Medical Centres.
2. These complaints are not always reported to the correct authorities with the result that the complaint is not fully investigated nor the cause corrected.
3. The correct method of reporting complaints so that proper investigation may take place is as follows:-
 - a. The head of family should ensure any complaints are registered by himself with his Commanding Officer, who will investigate and settle the complaint if possible. If the head of family is NOT in station the complaint should be referred to an officer of the unit by the individual concerned.

- b. If the Commanding Officer is unable to resolve the matter, he must report it to the DDMS/ADMS District/Area Headquarters.
- c. If the matter still cannot be resolved it must be referred to DMS Headquarters FARELF if the Centre is administered by the Army or to the PMO FES or FEAF for Centres administered by them.

36. IDENTITY CARDS

To enable the return of lost Identity Cards it is a requirement that a piece of paper showing the holder's Number, Rank, Name, Unit and Unit location be inserted in the back of ID Card Holders. The issuing unit as shown on the front of the card is frequently NOT the unit in which the holder is serving.

37. CHECKS AT ENTRANCES TO TERENDAK CAMP

1. A member of the ADP has recently been knocked down, but fortunately not seriously injured, by a car driven by a Private soldier in plain clothes which was driven through the main guard room check post at well over 30 mph.
2. As a result of this act and to prevent any further possible injury to duty men at the main gate and at the rear gate ALL vehicles, military and civilian will slow down to 10 mph at each gate and will permit duty ADP adequate facilities for observing and recognising the occupants and driver. This will apply whether those concerned are wearing uniform or not and it will also apply to families.
3. If the 10 mph restriction is not observed no alternative will remain except to stop all vehicles at each guard room, for check purposes.

38. CIVILIAN IDENTITY CARDS - FEDERATION OF MALAYA AND SINGAPORE

1. It is clear that the regulations concerning the requirement for all visitors to the Federation of MALAYA and SINGAPORE to be in possession of civilian identity cards are not well known by units and individuals.
2. To assist sub-units and individuals, these regulations are reproduced below:
 - a. All visitors to the Federation of MALAYA and SINGAPORE for a period of more than one year, require a Civilian Identity Card issued by the Registration Department of both territories. This requirement includes children 12 years of age and over. Members of the Commonwealth Armed Forces do not require Identity Cards in respect of themselves, but they are required for all families and dependants.
 - b. Civilian Identity Cards will be obtained within 30 days of arrival in the Federation of MALAYA or SINGAPORE. Identity Cards will also be obtained for a child within 30 days of reaching its 12th birthday.
 - c. Failure to comply with the Immigration Laws may result in a civil prosecution.
 - d. Civilian Identity Cards will be surrendered to the Issuing Office within 30 days of the departure of the family from the Federation of MALAYA or SINGAPORE.

3. Sub-units will ensure that all new arrivals are warned of their responsibilities in obtaining a Civilian Identity Card. The cost of these Identity Cards will be borne by the member concerned.

39. MALARIA PRECAUTIONS

The attention of all ranks is drawn to the current AUSTRALIAN Policy that all AMF members returning to AUSTRALIA from MALAYA, either on RTA or for leave etc, must complete a fourteen day course of Primaquine/Chloroquine under medical supervision before leaving this theatre. A unit instruction covering this procedure has been issued but all who may be connected with the movement of members of 3 RAR out of the theatre are reminded of this requirement. Where insufficient warning of movement is given for the course to be completed, it must be commenced at 3 RAR under the RMO's supervision, and completed under medical supervision in AUSTRALIA. This requirement does NOT apply to soldier's families.

40. SEWERAGE POLLUTION

Due to a break in the sewerage system the stream running between the Officers Married Quarters and Other Ranks Married Quarters areas, ie between Boyd Avenue/Beach Avenue and Weir Avenue is polluted. The repair will take some time to effect, therefore parents are warned that this stream is OUT OF BOUNDS, including the beach area where it runs into the sea, particularly to children.

41. REGISTRATION OF CIVILIAN MOTOR VEHICLES

1. Attention is directed to 28 Bde Standing Order 22 d. All motor cars, motor cycles and scooters owned by members of 3 RAR will be registered with the RP Section. The action will be completed by 1600 hrs 29 Jan 65.

2. Within 72 hours after purchase, sale or disposal of a private motor vehicle, members of 3 RAR will notify the RP Section of full details

42. ARREST

1. The attention of all officers, WOs and NCOs is drawn to the fact that there is no such thing as "protective custody" and that a soldier placed in confinement under charge of the unit guard is in close arrest. This presupposes that he is charged with a serious offence. AMR and O 364-372 are relevant and should be studied by all officers, WOs and NCOs likely to be employed as Orderly Officer, Sergeant or Guard Commander. While a Guard Commander cannot refuse to accept into custody a person liable to arrest who is committed to his custody by an officer, WO or NCO, he may render himself liable to disciplinary action if he confines a soldier without ensuring that he is charged with an offence and that the person committing him to custody signs the Guard Report in the appropriate place.

2. The practice of placing soldiers considered to be drunk in the unit guard room "for protective custody" and later releasing them is illegal and will cease. If the soldier is committing a serious offence or a minor offence accompanied by drunkenness, he should be arrested and confined, the charges preferred being entered in the Guard Report.

43.

WEARING OF UNIFORM AT MALACCA STATE AND MUNICIPAL FUNCTIONS

1. Uniform may NOT be worn at civilian functions in MALAYSIA in general, or MALACCA State in particular, except in the following circumstances:

- a. If the invitation stipulates that only uniform may be worn and in this case HQ 28 Bde will clear with the host exactly what type of uniform is expected to be worn and all invited will be so informed;
- b. On certain occasions when HQ 28 Bde considers that uniform should be worn and in this case, too, a clear direction will be issued.

2. All cases of doubt should be referred to Adjt 3 RAR for advice.

44.

DISCIPLINE - MEMBERS OF 3 RAR AWAY FROM UNIT

1. From time to time members of 3 RAR are individually admitted to British Military Hospitals, spend leave at British Leave Centres, attend courses at British Service Schools or are processed through British Transit Camps in FAR EAST LAND FORCES.

2. Should such servicemen be alleged to have committed a military offence the Commanding Officer of British Unit will:-

a. Inform the soldier that:

- (1) He is considered to have committed a military offence.
- (2) A report will be submitted to 3 RAR.
- (3) He will be returned to 3 RAR at the earliest practical moment for investigation of the report.

b. The Commanding Officer of the British Unit will use his discretion, having regard to the exigencies of the service, as to when the soldier is to be returned to 3 RAR. However, in the interests of the soldier he should be returned at the earliest practical opportunity.

3. The British Commanding Officer will ensure that a written report signed by him personally together with signed statements by witnesses and where appropriate a certified copy of any unit order allegedly contravened is submitted to 3 RAR as soon as possible. 3 RAR is responsible for framing appropriate charges under Australian service law and requesting the attendance of any witnesses that may be required.

4. Should it be necessary to arrest the Australian soldier or escort him back to his parent unit this must be carried out by either:-

- a. United Kingdom, Australian or New Zealand Provost personnel but not Gurkha Military Police, or;
- b. Any Australian Officer, Warrant Officer or NCO by rank.

5. For the purpose of para 4 b above it can be generally accepted that a military offence under the Army Act 1955 (ie the Army Act applicable to the UK Forces) would also be an offence against Australian Service Law.

6. Certain special provisions under the Defence (Visiting Forces) Act 1963 make it possible to "dispose" of members of 3 RMR to the British Army under some circumstances, eg. long term detachment. These members then become subject to British discipline and would be dealt with by their British Commanding Officer. However, these cases would be the exception and members of 3 RMR concerned would be notified of their legal position.

45.

TRAVEL WARRANTS

1. Members may be granted a free return travel warrant twice each year to visit leave destinations within the territories of the Federation of Malaya (excluding the Border Areas of MALAYA as defined) and SINGAPORE. There is now no restriction to specified places as existed previously.
2. Certain areas or destinations within the territories of the Federation of Malaya or Singapore may be restricted as leave destinations from time to time. These restrictions will be advised in Routine Orders as they occur. Travel warrants will not be issued to areas or destinations so restricted.
3. For members wishing to proceed to a destination beyond the territories of the Federation of Malaya and Singapore approval must be obtained from HQ Australian Army Force FARELF if a travel warrant is to be claimed or allowances paid in lieu.
4. The following restrictions will apply with respect to the issue of free warrants:-
 - a. The year term commences from date of arrival in SINGAPORE/MALAYA.
 - b. In principle no member should receive his first free travel warrant until he has been in the theatre for 3 months.
 - c. No more than two free travel warrants will be issued to any member per year. Married members may use both free travel entitlements to include their wives on ONE occasion per leave year.
 - d. In principle a free travel warrant should not be issued to any person within 3 months of a previous issue of a free travel warrant or mileage allowance paid in lieu.
 - e. To qualify for a free travel warrant a member must be granted at least 7 days leave.
5. Approval may be given for personnel to travel by civil aircraft. Personnel will purchase their own return tickets and make their own reservations. On return from leave, claims may be submitted for refund of air fare, or equivalent rail fare at entitled rate, whichever is the lesser amount. Cost of sleeper berths, if the journey is such that a sleeper would be necessary, may be claimed but charges for cancellations of bookings may not.
6. A claim for refund must be supported by the triplicate copy of the air ticket. The form TS 4 will be certified as follows:-

"Certified that (No, Rank, Name) travelled by air during authorised leave, was entitled to an issue of a free travel warrant, and details have been entered in Unit Register."

Use of Private Vehicle for Leave Purposes

7. A member may use his private vehicle on leave and claim

mileage allowance. When it is intended to claim the member will apply to his OC for approval to use a private vehicle. Such application must state that the member will be in possession of the following documents:-

- a. Current drivers licence.
- b. Current car registration.
- c. Current Third Party Insurance Policy.

8. The subsequent claim will be submitted to Bn HQ on Form TS 4 and endorsed by the claimant as follows:-

"I certify that the journey from to..... and return, was in fact undertaken."

The approved application to use private transport will be attached.





54. GARRISON LIBRARY - BORROWING OF BOOKS

Readers are reminded that the maximum borrowing time for a book is fourteen days from the date of issue. CARE OF DENTAL APPLIANCES

1. A number of instances have occurred recently, where troops have reported to the Dental Centre, stating that they have lost their dentures while swimming or participating in other forms of sport. A check of dental records has revealed that often the denture in question has been in service for a period of only a few weeks or months.

2. In view of the fact that these appliances are expensive and time consuming to fabricate, and the dental services are in any case strained to capacity to satisfy the demand for these appliances, all ranks when participating in sports, where damage or loss is likely should remove the appliance beforehand and keep it in a safe place.

59.

UNAUTHORISED "LIFTS" IN WD VEHICLES

1. Drivers of WD vehicles may NOT pick up or offer lifts to either other soldiers or civilians unless authorised to do so for a specific purpose by an officer.

2. It should be explained to Drivers this order is necessary as in the event of an accident involving an un-authorized passenger, service or civilian, no compensation whatsoever for any injuries sustained would be admitted.

60.

PETTY CASH

1. The following procedure for purchases from Petty Cash will be adhered to:-

- a. Approval of the Assistant Adjutant is to be obtained prior to purchases being made, except in emergencies.
- b. After purchase the member is to present receipts to the Assistant Adjutant for re-imbursment.
- c. Receipts/Accounts are not to be forwarded to the Battalion Headquarters by runner or through SDS.

2. Purchases made in contravention of this order are liable to re-imbursment being refused.

61. WEARING OF CRASH HELMETS

1. 3 RMR Standing Order 73 z, is republished for compliance by all concerned.
2. All members riding motor cycles or motor scooters whether within C.NBERMA Lines or without and whether within uniform or civilian clothes, are to wear a crash helmet.

62. VACCINATION OF CHILDREN AGAINST DIPHTHERIA - SINGAPORE

Introduction

1. The Diphtheria Immunisation Ordinance 1961 of the SINGAPORE Government makes vaccination against diphtheria compulsory for all children aged 12 years and under.
2. There are penalties to the extent of 500 Malayan dollars for failure to comply with the Ordinance.

Families Affected

3. The Ordinance applies to all children of families residing in SINGAPORE Island or entering SINGAPORE Island to take up residence.
4. The Ordinance also affects children in boarding schools on SINGAPORE Island.
5. Families in transit through SINGAPORE are exempted as are also school children visiting SINGAPORE for holidays.
6. Children in Boarding School in SINGAPORE

The Head Teacher will require parents to provide evidence of protection against diphtheria in respect of all children under 13 years or to give consent to Schick Testing (for immunity against diphtheria) and/or vaccination as may be necessary.

63. STATEMENTS TO THE PRESS OR PUBLIC

1. Members of the AMF are warned against making or releasing, to the press or the public, any unauthorized statement or information bearing on any aspect of Government or Service policy.
2. Attention is directed to AMR and O 309-340 and MBI 196-1.
3. A member of the AMF will not issue or disseminate, in written form or verbally, through interview, speech or conversation, information or other material relating in any way to Government or Service policy. There are the following exceptions :-
 - a. A GOC/Comd of a command issuing official statements for publication in his own name and within his own responsibility.
 - b. A member dealing directly with publicity media otherwise than in his official capacity or on official matters.
 - c. A member of the PR Service acting officially under MBI 196-1.
 - d. A member specifically authorised by a GOC/Comd of command, the DPR, or his delegated representative.
4. Prohibition embraces:-
 - a. information or impressions gained on visits

abroad, on return or while still abroad, relating to or having any bearing on any aspect of Australian Government policy;

b. leakage of information from classified or other official documents;

c. discussions with representatives of the press or members of the public.

5. If a member is questioned by a representative of the press, radio or television on any matter covered by this instruction, it will usually be best to answer "No comment".

6. This directive is not intended to curtail the promotion and dissemination of news and information relating to the normal activities of the Army.

64. SECURITY - BN HQ

With immediate effect the following orders apply to Battalion Headquarters Block 12A, containing offices of CO, 2IC, Adjt, Asst Adjt, RSM and Duty Rooms (2):

- a. The following offices and the verandah fronting them are OUT OF BOUNDS to all ranks below WO2:
 - (1) CO, 2IC, Adjt, Asst Adjt, RSM.
 - (2) Duty Rooms to other than Bn duties and authorised visitors.
- b. No members below the rank of WO2 are permitted to report direct to staff officers/RSM.
- c. The Bn Orderly Sergeant is responsible for control of visitors other than officers and WOs to Block 12A.
- d. All visitors to Bn HQ below the rank of WO2 other than coy runners will report to the Bn Orderly Sergeant in the Duty Room. The Bn Orderly Sergeant will ascertain their business, whom they wish to see, and contact the appropriate staff officer/RSM. The Duty Rooms may be used as waiting rooms, but visitors will NOT wait on the verandah of Block 12A.
- e. All correspondence for Bn HQ, whether addressed to a particular officer or not (incl classified mail) will be delivered to the Orderly Room.
- f. Sub-units will ensure that the above rules are promulgated and enforced and, in particular, that:-
 - (1) ORs are NOT sent to visit staff officers/RSM without prior arrangement. ORs below Cpl reporting to Bn Orderly Sergeant will be issued with a slip showing the reason for reporting, signed by an officer, CSM, or Coy Clerk.
 - (2) Correspondence is NOT addressed directly to staff officers/RSM. All correspondence must be delivered to the Orderly Room but may be marked, "for....." where a particular officer has asked for it.

65. CLEARANCE OF MAIL FROM BN ORDERLY ROOM

Coy's are to ensure that mail is cleared from Coy boxes at the Bn Orderly Room at least once every hour beginning 0800 hrs to 1600 hrs every working day including Wednesday afternoons.

All families. Children must be in possession of toothbrush, toothpaste, face flannel, soap, brush and comb. Wives are advised to include a "Housecoat" or a light dressing gown for use when "Up-patients".

2. Families attending Out-Patients from distant units will be in possession of toilet accessories, etc in the event of possible admission.

3. All OR patients will report in uniform. Cases of patients reporting incorrectly dressed or without Medical or other documents mentioned above will be reported to this Headquarters. The unit will be asked for an explanation.

66. LOCAL PURCHASE - ORDNANCE STORES

1. There have been several recent incidents of units locally purchasing Ordnance Stores without first obtaining the necessary authority. Neither HQ 3 RAR nor HQ 28 Bde have financial delegation to authorise local purchase of Ordnance Stores.

2. CRAOC Malaya Area has a delegation to spend a maximum of £25 on any one purchase. Approval for such local purchase is subject to the following conditions.

- a. That the unit/coy is authorised to hold the item.
 - b. That the item is NOT currently available through normal channels.
 - c. The urgency of the requirement must be justified in that the item is essential for operational needs or the efficient functioning of the unit, and the supply through normal channels cannot meet this requirement.
 - d. The item is available locally and the cost known.
3. Coys will ensure that all prospective purchases are submitted to the QM. The QM will submit the application together with his recommendations to the ZIC for further recommendation. Approval will then be sought through DADOS HQ 28 Bdo.
4. When advised of the approval to purchase locally, and NOT beforehand the QM will obtain the required item/s from the supplier together with an invoice/bill, and obtain the suppliers signature on Army Form P1922. The QM is to complete AF P1922 quoting RV No, and account on the reverse of the form for non expendable items.
5. The QM is to send the completed AF P1922 with the original copy of the suppliers invoice to CRAOC Malaya Area as quickly as possible for payment.
6. Items locally purchased are NOT to be paid for by individuals, PRI or any other Regimental Funds.

67.

EMERGENCY LEAVE

1. Emergency leave and free travel to AUSTRALIA may be granted by the Military Board in exceptional circumstances connected with domestic affairs. A guide to the circumstances under which emergency leave may be approved is attached as Annex 'A'.
2. Application will be processed as follows:
 - a. Emergency Circumstances Notified to a HQ Comd in AUSTRALIA

HQ Command in AUSTRALIA investigates and signals a recommendation together with details of the case to AHQ CANBERRA. A copy of this signal is forwarded to HQ Aust Army Force FARELF. AHQ advises both HQs by signal of the decision given.
 - b. Emergency Circumstances Notified to Unit Overseas

In all cases where it is considered that emergency leave should be granted, the unit is to send an OP IMMEDIATE signal to HQ Aust Army Force, FARELF, (copy to formation etc., headquarters) requesting that the circumstances be investigated. The signal should contain the following information:

 - (1) Outline circumstances of the case.
 - (2) Name, relationship, address and phone number of any person in AUSTRALIA who could be interviewed regarding the circumstances of the case.
 - (3) Any other relevant information to include ARL credits of the member concerned.

- (4) The units recommendation stating whether:
- a. it is considered the member should be returned to AUSTRALIA for Emergency Leave only; or
 - b. he should be returned for leave and reposting in AUSTRALIA.
3. On receipt of a signal requesting emergency leave, HQ Aust Army Force FARELF will send an OP IMMEDIATE signal to the appropriate HQ Comd in AUSTRALIA for investigation. AHQ CANBERRA will be included as an information addressee in this signal.
4. When the unit receives information that emergency leave has been approved they will immediately advise HQ Aust Army Force FARELF by the quickest means of the date and time the member is available to be moved.
5. All 3 RAR members are to be advised to inform their relatives, in cases of emergency, to contact the HQ of the Comd in which they reside. The conditions under which emergency leave to AUSTRALIA is normally approved will be brought to the attention of all 3 RAR members.

68. SUBMISSIONS FOR ROUTINE ORDERS

Sub-units or individuals wishing to submit information, statements, etc for inclusion in 3 RAR Routine Orders are to comply with the following :-

- a. The submission is to be written in exactly the form it is to appear in the published RO. If possible it should be typed.
- b. The submission should reach Bn HQ NOT later than 1600 hrs on the Monday prior to publication of Routine Orders. These are normally published every Wednesday.

Coys are reminded that the late arrival of submissions at Bn HQ may result in the delay in publication of ^{the respective} information to be promulgated.

- c. Any submissions regarding promotion, grouping, annual PE and Wpn trg tests results, skill at arms, and levies for barrack room damage are to be certified as correct by an officer.

69. POWERS OF ARREST - DEFENCE (VISITING FORCES) ACT 1963

1. Pursuant to Sect 25 (3) of Defence (Visiting Forces) Act 1963 Section 25 (3), Commander Australian Army Force FARELF has requested Commander NEW ZEALAND Army Force FARELF to direct all members of the NEW ZEALAND Army serving with Far East Land Forces to arrest any Australian member inferior in rank to member making the arrest, who is alleged to have committed or who is reasonably suspected of having committed an offence punishable under Australian Military Law, and to deliver him to an Australian officer. Any Australian officer to whom a member under arrest as above has been delivered will detain the arrested person in his custody and as soon as possible notify the arrested member's unit of the arrest. The latter will send an escort for the arrested member and hold him in custody until the charge or charges have been investigated under AMR.

70. MARRIED QUARTERS MAINTENANCE REPAIRS

1. Excessive labour and expense is being occasioned by:
 - a. Repair and replacement of electrical plates on stoves.
 - b. Unblocking lavatories and sinks.
2. This damage is almost invariably caused by either direct negligence or lack of supervision of Asian staff, ie amahs.
3. Typical examples of this are as follows:-
 - a. Hotplates being left on for excessive periods ie overnight.
 - b. Fats and fluids being allowed to congeal onto hotplates.
 - c. Rags, newspapers and cigarette butts etc being flushed into toilet systems.
4. With effect from 17 Aug 64, a scale of repair charges was introduced by Barrack Services at the following rate:-
 - a. For unblocking lavatories, sinks and drains - \$5
 - b. For replacing hotplates and rings - \$25.
5. Coys are to ensure that this information is fully promulgated to all ranks particularly married soldiers.

71. ACCESS BY UNION OFFICIALS TO AMAHS AND THEIR EMPLOYERS

1. In the event of the WDCSA wishing to contact either an amah at her place of work or her employer, the following procedure is to be adopted:-
 - a. The WDCSA Official wishing to see an amah who is a member of the Union should do so outside the garden of the house concerned unless invited into the house or precincts by the employer himself. Such calls are to be made before 1900 hrs;
 - b. A Union Official wishing to contact the employer of an amah in pursuing a complaint by her should request an interview by writing to the soldier concerned, copying the letter to the Unit Civil Labour Officer;
 - c. If the Union Official receives no reply from the soldier within a reasonable time, say four to seven days, then the Union Official should seek the assistance of the Unit Civil Labour Officer in arranging the required interview;
 - d. Only if the matter is extremely serious should the Union ask the soldier's Commanding Officer to intervene;
 - e. In the prolonged absence of the employer, the WDCSA may wish to interview the employer's wife. In such circumstances the Union Official will always be accompanied by the Unit Civil Labour Officer.
2. In amplification of the above, it is stressed that:-
 - a. The soldier is the employer and it is with him that the WDCSA should deal;
 - b. A soldier's house is his home and as such it is he and he alone who says who can enter it;
 - c. Action by the Unit can only be in the form of arbitration.

4. No provision has been made for emergency leave to UK with free travel to be granted. Application should only be made for permission for the member concerned to travel to UK at his own expense in accordance with MBI 128-1 (Prov).



GEN IDEA

Introduction

1. The year is 1965. There are three mythical countries in South East Asia, MISA which is a member of SEATO, SOLA a neutralist country on her Eastern border and VANDALIA to the NORTH. The geographical limits of these countries are shown in Appendix 1 and Appendix 2.

Background

2. During the past few years, VANDALIA, a Communist Satellite, has been helping to organise and train the SOLA People's Liberation Army (SPLA) the military arm of the outlawed minority SOLA People's Party.

This interest in Solan affairs was part of the Vandalian grand design for the eventual conquest of the Magayan peninsula. This conquest hinges upon the final successful invasion of the relatively strong country of MISA.

Defence Plan

3. There is a contingency plan for the defence of MISA which involves the deployment of three forces:

- a. Force MIKE Comprising two Misan divisions.
- b. Force NOVEMBER Comprising two US divisions.
- c. Force OSCAR Comprising two US divisions and 1 Commonwealth Division of which 28 COMWEL Inf Bde Gp is a part.

The Sectors of responsibility of each of these forces is shown in Appendix 1.

4. The tasks given to 1 COMWEL Div are:-

- a. To secure the approach routes from SOLA towards the communication centre of Malacca.
- b. To defend against the enemy along the Sungei Gemas.
- c. To secure the road Malacca - KUALA LUMPUR.

5. To achieve these tasks it is planned that 28 COMWEL Inf Bde Gp should be the first element of the division to be deployed into MISA. This deployment is to be by air from Singapore to Malacca with the aim of securing the main approach from SOLA to MALACCA via the Northern flank of MT OPHIR.

The Threat

6. The assessment of the threat is that the main thrust would be delivered in the NORTH and North West and that not more than one battalion of regular Vandilians would initially attempt the advance through the primary jungle area swamplands of Northern SOLA. However this force would be increased to approximately regimental strength by the end of the first month of hostilities.

7. The irregular forces of the SPLA would support the movement of the Vandilians by harassing attacks on the flanks and rear of our forces. These attacks would increase in intensity as the Vandalian build-up progressed.

8. The Vandalian Air Forces consist of two Squadrons of MIG 17 fighter ground attack aircraft and a number of reconnaissance aircraft. Maintenance and spares problems are such that the fighter ground attack effort will be largely expended in six days after any incursion into MISA, but the reconnaissance effort can be maintained for several weeks.

Recent Events

9. During 1964 unrest became rife in SOLA. The SPLA had begun to carry out company size attacks against regular army garrisons throughout the country. The economy of the country began to suffer through a drought which ruined the rice harvest. In the political field the government majority had been reduced through defections and assassinations to the point where a general election was proposed for mid January 1965.

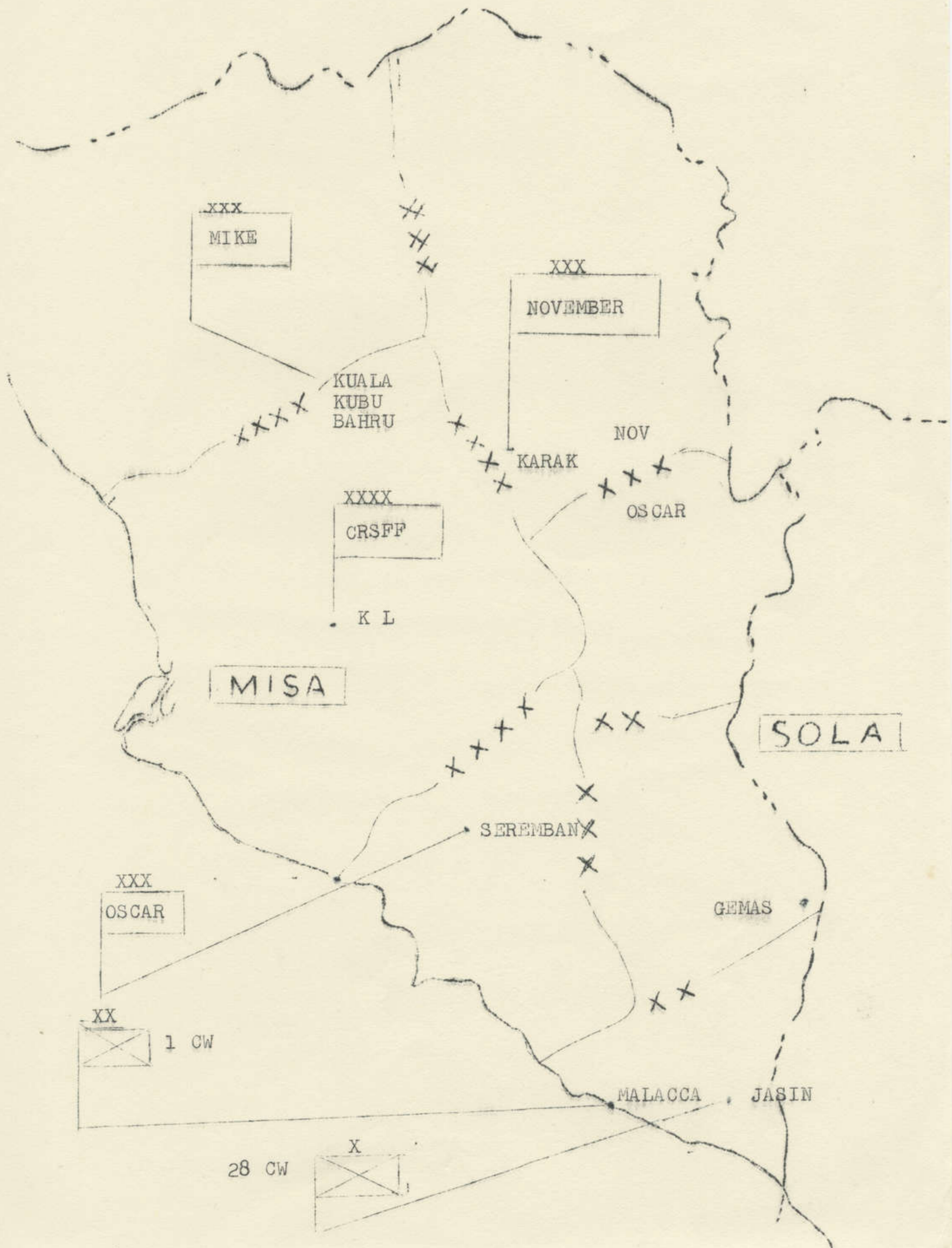
10. In late December Vandalian forces began their summer manoeuvre along the border of MISA and SOLA. However intelligence reports indicated that elements of the Eastern Corps had been infiltrated across the Pahang River and into the Northern swamplands of SOLA. These reports caused wild scenes of panic in the national and provincial capitals.

11. By the 25 Jan tension in SOLA and MISA had reached such a pitch that the Government of MISA approached the SEATO Council of Ministers and requested immediate deployment of SEATO forces to prepare for the threatened invasion of their country by the forces of VANDALIA.

72. WATER CONSERVANCY

1. Water rationing is now in force in the town of Malacca for eight hours per day.
2. Although, as yet, no restrictions have been imposed in Terendak Camp, information has been received that restrictions have been imposed by the Malacca authorities on the numbers of hours water may be pumped into the reservoirs.
3. It is absolutely necessary that the most stringent economy is exercised in the use of water within Terendak Camp if rationing is to be avoided.
4. With immediate effect the Unit Water Conservancy Officer, Lt FREEBAIRN, is to ensure that personnel comply with the following:
 - a. Gardens, lawns, playing fields etc are NOT to be watered by hosepipe.
 - b. Army vehicles and private vehicles are NOT to be hosed down.
 - c. Cookhouses, ablution areas, monsoon drains are NOT to be hosed down.
 - d. Unit dhobie lines are to be checked for the excessive use of water. Washing is NOT to be done under running taps.
 - e. Ablution areas to be checked frequently for running taps.
5. Families are to be warned of these restrictions and requested to cooperate by supervising amahs, and gardeners and exercising the strictest economy within their households. They should be informed that RMP patrols have been instructed to report cases of water wastage observed by them during their patrols.
6. Subunits are to ensure promulgation of the above to all concerned.

80. INDONESIAN CONFRONTATION

1. It is understood that attempts have been made to infiltrate INDONESIAN terrorists into MALAYSIA with orders to use terrorist tactics against BRITISH Servicemen and dependant.
2. Terrorist activities could include:
 - a. Attacks on cars
 - b. Sabotage attempts against homes and quarters
 - c. Attacks on individuals or groups in public places eg in streets, bars, dance hall, restaurants, massage parlours, cinemas, etc.
3. Adequate precautions have been taken to meet contingencies which could develop and wardens have been appointed in areas where Servicemen live. The warden in each area will keep families up to date with the situation and will warn families when terrorist activities are thought to be likely.
4. Prior information, however, will not always be available. You should therefore take the following precautions at all times to minimise the risk to yourself and family:-

89. HYGIENE - ICE AND ICE CREAM

1. Recent outbreaks of bowel infection in MALAYA Area have been traced to ice and ice cream.

2. Ice. Block ice, although made from pure water, is very liable to contamination during transport. While this type of ice may be used safely for cooling bottles, it should not be put into water or any other drinks. Ice made from pure water in a domestic refrigerator may however be used for this purpose.

3. Ice Cream. Ice cream of "Magnolia" or "Walls" brands can be regarded as safe, provided that it is supplied in its original wrapping. The practice of its being served from bulk in cornets, or between wafers is highly dangerous, particularly when the server is an itinerant vendor. Consequently vendors of Walls or Magnolia ice cream should be allowed into Camps and barracks only on condition that they sell their wares ready-wrapped.

4. Other locally made ice creams are suspect and should not be bought.

90. DRESS IN PUBLIC PLACES

1. The attention of all ranks is directed to the standard of dress in Public Places, both inside and outside TERENDAK Camp.

2. It should be particularly noted that working dress including the wearing of shirts outside shorts, grey socks rolled down over boots, PT shorts, and the failure to wear hats is not permitted in the Community Centre, the "Evergreen" area and anywhere outside the Garrison.

91. MALAYSIAN VIGILANTE CORPS - IDENTIFICATION

1. Members of this Corps wear normal civilian clothes.

2. In order to maintain a high standard it is essential that any Officer, Warrant Officer or NCO observing a fault in saluting should immediately take energetic action to correct it and to prevent its repetition.

3. A summary of orders relating to saluting are produced below. These instructions are to be imparted to all ranks at frequent intervals during training and the points as amplified below are to be particularly emphasised during such instruction.

Flag Cars

4. a. A car conveying the British High Commissioner flies a Union Flag over the bonnet.
- b. Cars carrying General Officers and Brigadiers exhibit the star plates appropriate to the rank of the passenger. In addition, cars carrying officers holding certain appointments fly flags as detailed in AMR & O.
- c. All such cars are to be saluted when the flags or star plates they bear are exposed.

Officers of the Federation of Malaysia Armed Forces

5. All officers of the Armed Forces of the Federation of MALAYSIA, whether seconded from the British Service or commissioned by the Government of the Federation are to be paid the same compliments as officers of equivalent rank in the Australian Army.

6. The badges of rank worn by officers of the Federation Armed Forces are generally similar to those worn by officers of equivalent rank in the Australian Services.

Colours

7. Compliments to be paid to uncased standards, guidons and colours, and to the Queen's Truncheon of 2 GR.

The National Anthem

8. Compliments are to be paid when the National Anthem is played, except that, whenever the National Anthem is played as part of a salute or on a parade other than a Church Parade, all ranks in military uniform, not under the orders of an OC parade, are to salute.

9. Similar compliments are to be paid when the National Anthem of the Federation of Malaysia, or the State Anthem of any of the States of the Federation of Malaysia is played.

95. SWIMMING

1. Several cases of accidental death by drowning have recently occurred in FARELF.

2. All ranks are reminded of the dangers of swimming either as individuals, or in parties unaccompanied by a strong swimmer and without properly organised life saving facilities, especially in dangerous waters.

97. EXEMPTION FROM AD-VALOREM REGISTRATION TAX ON PRIVATE MOTOR VEHICLES

1. Since MALAYSIA DAY 16 September 1963, certain provisions of the Anglo Malayan Defence Agreement are to apply to both SINGAPORE and MALAYA.
2. Under paragraph 4 Section 6 of Annex 3 of the Defence Agreement, exemption from the Ad Valorem Registration Tax, payable when a vehicle is licenced, on private motor vehicles may be claimed by any member of the Commonwealth Naval Land and Air Forces, or by component of such forces. No claim may be made by any member of the Malaysian Armed Forces or by citizens of MALAYA or SINGAPORE employed by the forces.
3. The regulations permit the importation of a new and unregistered motor vehicles or the initial registration of a motor vehicle purchased in SINGAPORE or MALAYA without payment of this tax.
4. Claims for exemption or refund of tax already paid must be submitted within three months of the applicant's first arrival in SINGAPORE or MALAYA. Claims should be submitted, on a proforma as at Annex 'A' to this order.

Personnel in MALAYA: The Commissioner for Road Transport, KUALA LUMPUR.

Personnel in SINGAPORE: The Registrar of Vehicles,
Middle Road, SINGAPORE 2.

5. Claims for exemption need not be related to a specific car which the claimant intends to buy. A claimant who does not intend to buy a car for say 6 months or a year after arrival, may put in for exemption within 3 months of arrival, and use such exemption at a later date when a car is actually bought.
6. Should a member of the overseas Commonwealth Forces, or the civilian component, wish to sell or transfer a vehicle on which exemption has been granted, the exemption continues if the vehicle is disposed of to another member of such Forces or civilian component who has not previously been granted a similar exemption and who has applied for and been granted this exemption in the usual manner but has not yet acquired a vehicle. However, if the vehicle is to be disposed of to any other person the vehicle will become liable to ad valorem registration fees assessed on the value of the vehicle at the time of disposal.

General

 - (1) All roads, streets, alleyways, paths, courtyards and kampongs in Malacca town not lit by public authority.
 - (2) A belt one mile in depth on each side of Malacca - Terendak Camp road, North of the Seaview Hotel. This does not impose any restrictions on movement of married families within the married families area.

6. This road North of the Seaview Hotel is in bounds after curfew hours to enable personnel to return to Camp. However, all dwelling places, hotels, hostels, etc on either side of the road are Out of Bounds between 1900 hrs and 0600 hrs daily.

Out of Bounds TERENDAK Garrison Area

7. The following OUT OF BOUNDS restrictions apply within TERENDAK Camp at the time shown:-

- a. Brigade HQ. To all ranks without authority at all times.
- b. Civilian Staff Canteens. To all soldiers at all times, except MORs who may use the canteen near the CRE.
- c. Asian Community Centre - Festing Road. To all ranks at all times.
- d. Beaches
 - (1) The beach outside the WOs and Sgts and Junior Ranks Club is OUT OF BOUNDS to everyone from 2350 hrs to 0600 hrs daily.
 - (2) For security reasons, the beach fronting the Terendak and Sungei Udang Camp areas is Out of Bounds to all ranks, families and civilians (including all civilians employed within the Camp) from 0900 hrs to 0700 hrs daily.
 - (3) The following area is placed Out of Bounds, but may be used for organised picnics provided prior authority from the Garrison Adjutant is obtained 24 hours in advance. Requests are to state the area selected, Persons using the area will be responsible for cleaning it after use.

The flat ground extending from the beach above high water mark to the cliff within the limits of:

 - (a) The Headland 100 yards NORTH of the Officers' Beach Club.
 - (b) The stream (with outlet culvert marked Mosquito Control Unit) and track leading down to the area from behind the WO/Sgts' Mess of the Military Hospital.
 - (c) Private cars are NOT to use the above track or park in the above area.
 - (d) The above bounds do NOT restrict the use of this area of the Beach itself for walking or swimming.
- e. Married Quarters. To all single and married unaccompanied soldiers at all times with the following exceptions:-
 - (1) When on authorised duty.
 - (2) When having been invited by a resident in married quarters, he has in his possession an authority signed by his Coy Comd or the Bn Orderly Officer.
- f. Before a pass can be issued, the soldier must produce a written invitation from the soldier whose married quarters he intends to visit. A separate invitation must be obtained for each visit.
- g. Passes will only be authorised to extend to 2400 hrs on the day of issue.
- h. All visitors within the married quarters area will keep to the roadways during the hours of darkness.

- j. Sisters Quarters and Mess - MT TERENDAK. To all ranks at all times unless on authorised duty.
- k. Civilian Staff Quarters - MH Terendak. To all ranks at all times unless on authorised duty.
- l. WO/S sgts/ORs Beach Club.
 - (1) All single and married unaccompanied soldiers when visiting the Beach Club will move via Boyd - Beach Ave.
 - (2) Under no circumstances will they move via any other route.
- m. All other places listed in 3 RAR Standing Orders 68b and not shown above.
- n. Slim School
 - (1) The footpaths and roads leading to SLIM School are Out of Bounds to all, except persons who have business to conduct at the school.
 - (2) The school playing fields are out of bounds. Units are not to use them for recreation eg cross country running etc., unless permission has been given by the Headmaster.


The following premises are Out of Bounds to all service personnel:

- d. All places used for the purpose of smoking or otherwise consuming prepared OPIUM or CHANDU or INDIAN HEMP in any form, are "OUT OF BOUNDS" to all service personnel.
- e. All premises such as Cafes, Bars, Clubs, Restaurants and Cabarets are "IN BOUNDS" unless specifically placed "OUT OF BOUNDS" to service personnel.

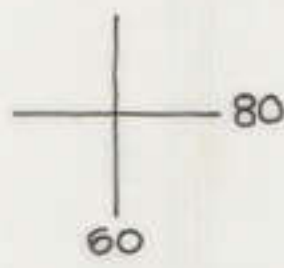
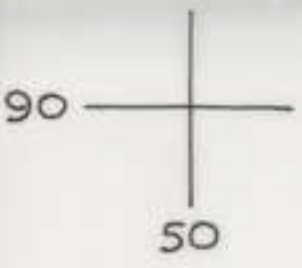
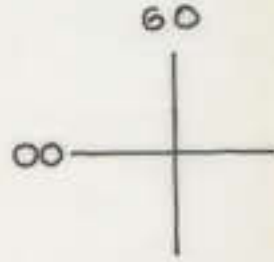
