COMMANDERS DIARIES INSTRUCTIONS

AIM

1. The aim of a Commanders Diary is to provide data on which to base future improvements in Army training, equipment, organization and administration, and to furnish historians with a record of the activities of units and formations in operational and non-operational periods in peace and in war.

GENERAL

- 2. Entries are to be made daily on AF C 2118 (Adapted) each entry being initialled by the officer detailed to keep it.
- 3. Commanders Diaries will conform with the rules for drafting orders given in "Staff Duties (Australia)", Chapter 2, Section 12.

RESPONSIBILITY

During Non-operational Periods

4. A Commanders Diary is to be compiled by commanders of all formations.

During Operational Periods (1)

- 5. A Commanders Diary is to be compiled in duplicate by:
 - a. Commanders of all formations.
 - b. Each branch of the staff at formation headquarters commanded by a brigadier or above.
 - c. Heads of services not below the rank of lieutenant colonel.
 - d. Personal staffs and officers holding special appointments.
 - e. Unit commanders.
 - f. Commanders of a detachment of a unit when so ordered.

COMPILATION

- 6. Both original and duplicate copies are to consist of:
 - a. Cover (AF C 2119) (Adapted).
 - b. Index as printed on cover.
 - c. Narrative (AF C 2118) (Adapted).
 - d. Annexes as shown in the Index.
- 7. All details of the unit or formation (if a detachment is concerned, the name of the parent unit), period covered and enclosure numbers of the annexes are to be shown on the cover. If there has been a change of command since the last report, the date of assumption by the new commanding officer is to be included.
- 8. The annexes are to be assembled in the groups shown on the cover. If there are no enclosures for an annex NIL will be entered on the cover.

BORNEO OPERATIONS CONVENTION

- 1. At the Jungle Warfare School over the period 26 28 Oct 66, representatives of units and staffs responsible for the conduct of operations in Borneo were assembled to consider a series of papers (copies attached) summarising selected aspects of the Borneo compaign. In his final report, Commander British Forces Borneo will cover tri-service aspects of the operations and will deal in some detail with logistic matters. Therefore, the papers dealt with at the convention represent only part of the "lescons learned" in Borneo. The conference was attended by Lt Gol T.R. Gibson, Deputy Commander, HQ AAF FARELF.
- 2. From the outset, the conference clearly recognised that the lessons emanating from Bernee may not have application elsewhere. However, it was generally agreed that it was desirable that a record of the campaign should be established. This task is being undertaken by HQ FARELF.
- 3. The attached papers do not represent formal FARELF views. In fact, the JWS conference will result in changes and a varied presentation. However, to indicate the changes, etc., which may occur, a brief summary of the discussion on each paper follows.

Paper 1 - Intelligence

- 4. a. For a variety of reasons, the intelligence organisation had local variations in the several Brigade areas/administrative divisions in Bornee. The paper describes the general situation.
 - b. The importance of language training for FlOs was stressed.
 - c. Organisation. The recommendations in the paper are those of the Borneo staffs. FARELF (Int) informed the conference of outline details for a world wide re-organisation of British intelligence staffs and units. Greater emphasis is to be given to "Security". At all levels, security staff officers are to be introduced in addition to the staffs, etc. dealing with operational intelligence. Flos are to be termed "Fl NCOs".
- 5. a. In certain areas of Borneo, Border Scouts had been organised in two distinct groups:-

- (1) Recce Force lightly armod (shetguns) to undertake a more offensive role; mention was made that this element often went "game hunting" in border areas with a view to obtaining information.
- (2) "Eyes and Ears" Force termed "trackwatchers" who remained in kampeng areas but reported intelligence information.
- b. Training. It was agreed that a school for the training of Border Scouts was desirable. At the end of confrontation, a school was operating at Bau and conducted courses of two weeks duration.
- c. Testing. The conference generally agreed that the tasking of Border Scouts should be a responsibility of the local military commender, i.e. coy, etc., comd. He should be responsible also for administration including pay, and discipline. Proquent visits by patrols to kampongs were essential to allocate tasks and to ensure that, in some cases, the Border Scouts did the job for which they were being paid. In Bornes, however, Border Scouts were paid from funds provided by the respective State Governments not from British military funds. Consequently, they were administered by the Felice Force and some conflict of interests did occur.
- d. Communications. A requirement does exist for a simple redic for communication between the kampong Border Scout and Security/Police forces. Training in the use of the radio can be given at the Border Scout school. In addition to the passage of intelligence, the radio could be used for requesting medical assistance this would be the cover for its existence in the kampong. It was also agreed that had the frequency of border crossings/incursions increased, there would have been a much greater need for Border Scout communications.
- e. The number of Border Scouts enlisted from any one area requires control.

Paper 2 - Company Base

6. a. <u>Terminology</u>. The following terms were suggested for this type of bases-

Company operational base; Company forward operational base; Company firm base.

The former is used at JWS and is likely to be adopted.

b. Other types of base mentioned in discussion but not on the paper are:-

Ambush base; Patrol base.

These types were considered to be covered adequately in existing pemphlots.

- c. Functions (para 3) also, protection of LZs and HLPs (landing points) used for supply of company base, medevac, etc., in some cases, the base secured an air-strip.
- d. Siting (paras 5 and 6) also, at sufficient distance from the border so that should an incursion occur, cutoff parties can be positioned in time to achieve clean cut-off.
- e. Defence Works (para 7) mention will be made of the Bowen Bunker concept which was developed in Borneo; reported separately to AHQ (AAF FARELF 4-1-1 of 24 Mar 66 refers).
- the only mine used in Borneo other than at locations which had not received this mine due to insufficient quantities being available. The Claymore was a Borneo "special", i.e. it is not a UK service mine. Standard AP mines were not used primarily because of their inherent danger to the indigenous people and to own troops. It was stated that it was essential to have positive remote control within the company base for the detonation of mines. With the Claymore this was achieved by electrical means; hazards were sympathetic detonation by lightning, radios in helicopters landing in the base, etc., for which drills were formulated.
- g. Devices (para 50). The ending of confrontation prevented adequate operational experience in the use of seismic detectors. They were used however by 4 RAR and 1 RMSIR. It was agreed that these devices had considerable potential but that adequate training of operators was essential if successful readings of detected movement was to be achieved.
- h. Water (para 42). The figure of 40-50 gallons per man per day was accepted as an adequate planning figure for the type of base developed in Bormeo. It does exceed the normal or textbook consumption figure but allows for showering, cooking, laundry, etc. Due to the incidence of leptospirosis in Bormeo, men were not allowed to bathe in streams. From morale and hygiene aspects, showering in bases became essential. It was stressed therefore that the planning figure of 40-50 g/m/d should be adopted to ensure that adequate engineer stores, etc., are procured and stockpiled to meet the requirement.
- j. Breaching Trials Report (Appendix L). This report is based on limited trials but not using an actual company operational base. It was stated that if not interpreted correctly, it could give rise to excessive stores requirement for the construction of a base.
- k. Sendbags. The need for an improvement in the life of sandbags still exists.

Paper 3 - VHF Communications

7. This paper deals primarily with the long range VHF communications system eventually established in Borneo. The system was successful because positions (company bases, etc.,) were static and there was little enemy interference either

physically or by jamming. It was recognised that the need for HP communications would exist prior to the establishment of VHP re-broadcast facilities - if, in a different environment, such were possible without imposing unacceptable problems of security.

- 8. Comments in detail were:
 - a. Para 5 "overheating": It was stated that overheating of rebroadcast equipments was not due to tropical conditions but was due to "mis-match" of antenna and sets. Correctly set up, the equipments would work longer than twelve hours.
 - b. Pera 8 siting/construction. In Borneo, siting and construction of re-broadcast facilities was a Brigade signals unit responsibility. Some assistance in the construction of LPs and huts was given by engineers.
- 9. Summarising, it was agreed that VHF can be used in a jungle environment. For success, static positions are desirable and a degree of freedom from sir/ground attack of re-broadcast facilities is essential.
- 10. HQ FARELF is conducting a review of the radio diagrams of the infentry battalion and other units to incorporate unit recommendations based on Borneo experience.

Paper 4 - Artillery Support.

- ll. The "single-gum" concept employed in Borneo was an improvisation arising from the length of the border and the number of gums available to provide artillery support. The artillery regiment is not organised to operate on this basis and must be supplemented, e.g. in Borneo the lack of reads enabled drivers to be employed as gumners.
- 12. Ranging by "sound" (Para 8, last centence) was not a method acceptable for introduction into training because of the obvious safety limitations. On the other hand, sound ranging techniques were employed successfully in Borneo on a limited scale and are being reported on separately. Only 81 VT fuzes were fired throughout confrontation; the VT effect is lost in a jungle canopy.
- 13. Mention was made of the new light gun being introduced in the British Army on a world wide basis in about two years time.

 Limitations for employment in FARELF were stated tobe:
 - a. Not man-pack; barrel too heavy.
 - b. Cannot be air-lifted by current helicopters; new and larger helicopters coming into service about the same time as the gum should be able to lift the equipment.

Paper 5 - River Gressing

- 14. FARELF are investigating the use of:
 - a. Malaysian Army improved grapnel has strengthened tyres; fired from SLR.
 - b. Royal Marine cliff-climbing graphel fired by Scheermuly rocket; lighter rope required.
- 15. A need to provide aids to make swimmers safe was discussed. Some points are:-

- a. Inflateable sections of the Australian lightweight sleeping gear were used by some units.
- b. Inflateable armlets for swimmers were suggested; also "flippers".
- c. SAS (UK) life jackets ("sausage" around waist) should be given more liberal distribution.
- d. Hitachi-type radios desirable for patrol bank-to-bank communications.
- 16. Lightweight Recce Boat. This appendix was not fully accepted. It was agreed that the aim should be to develop the best method of getting a man with a rope quickly across a river; limitation the aids must be carried by a patrol; the enswer is not necessarily a boat.

Paper 6 - The Mounting and Control of an Army/Air Operation involving FGA Aircraft.

17. This paper represents a SOP evolved by West Bde and agreed by the Forward Air Commender (Kuching) and the Artillery representative. The procedures were tested on exercises but were never used operationally. Consequently, it was decided that it should not be published as a lesson learned from Borneo, but that it should now form the basis of a study by 17 Div/224 Gp RAF to evolve future drills.

Paper 7 - The Defensive Concept based on Heliberne Infantry, Borneo, 1964.

- 18. This concept was tested operationally. Points from the discussion were:
 - a. There was little artillery support available in 1964.
 - b. To achieve the flexibility required, the concept requires the construction of a large number of LPs. This required considerable initial effort and much subsequent patrolling to visit sites to cut back foliage and to ensure their security. It was stated that in one battalion area, there were 180 LPs. A few near kampong areas were maintained by the local people. Defoliants may have assisted, but it was doubted that sufficient helicopter-hours would have been available for this task.
 - e. Armed Helicopters. It was stated that because of the pay-load penalty, it was unlikely that there would be a sufficient number of helicopters available in the theatre to permit their sole use in this role.

Paper 8 - Might Illumination

- 19. It was agreed that a limited requirement exists for improved aids to illumination at night to enable infantry to:
 - a. see and fire defensive operations.
 - b. see and move offensive operations.

20. The main value of such illumination was in defensive operations. However, flares were used (Tebedu incursion) to keep the enemy on the move at night and "rum him to ground". In normal circumstances, shockelton and Camberra aircraft would not be available for this task; the dropping of flares would be carried out by MRT aircraft. The existing RAF flare is not suitable for use on the ground because it is not waterproof.

Paper 9 - Organisation of Air Transport Support

- 21. This paper evoked criticism from RAF representatives. It was eventually agreed that any criticism arose not from the system evolved but from the lack of helicopters available for bde/bn lifts. However, the RAF pointed out that the static nature of operations in Borneo did not provide a genuine test of the joint procedures, e.g. there were never two major incursions at one time in a brigade area and the problem of operational tasking of helicopters was usually a simple one.
- 22. The RAF representative stated that in future there would be larger helicopters but fewer of them (see also para 13b). The additional effort for the preparation of larger LPs was obvious.
- 23. Helicopters utilisation was about 60% overall during confrontation. Under-utilisation always occurs with comd's rece, casevecs, VIP visits, etc.

Paper 10 - Sarbe Cearches

- 24. This paper is in the main a reproduction of the West Bde sop for Sarbe sir search. Points of interest from the discussion are:
 - a. Sarbe MK 111 should be held on the scale of three per company or sixteen per battalion; test sets one per company.
 - b. The combination of Sarbe (UHF)/Walkie-Talkie (VHF) (see para 5 of Appx L to paper) may be difficult to achieve within weight limitations; as it does not constitute a RAF sir/sea rescue requirement, it would become a different equipment.
 - C. RAF but not AAC aircraft (Sioux, Scout, Beaver) are fitted with "Violet Picture Homer"; the latter should be so fitted.
 - d. Problems of "authentication" may arise if a more sophisticated enemy is encountered.
 - e. The matching of crystals sarbe set/aircraft frequently caused problems in the field.

Paper 11 - Air Supply in Bornes

25. The main limiting factor encountered was the shortage of parachutes. Early in the compaign, the parachute wastage rate was high. Despite the difficulties involved, it was essential that units gave high priority to the backloading of parachutes and associated equipments. Although this tended to conflict with helicopter availability, the success of air supply in Borneo was very much dependent on the speed of return of parachutes, etc. It emphasised the need to continue research to produce cheaper and/or expendable parachutes. (It was stated that FARELF are now having the 28 ft parachute manufacturered in Hong Kong at helf the UK price).

26. Other points are:-

- a. Free Brop (para 4) terrain and proximity to border were unsuitable for a free drop. The techniques developed during the Malayan Emergency (smoke, marker balloon, etc) are still used on the Malay/Thai border. Conservation of parachutes etc had a major effect in preventing free-drops.
- b. Post-drop Action (para 11) essential for less of stores in a peace-time accounting environment, e.g. write-off of lest NAAPI stores.
- c. Adverse weather could result in a considerable backlog of effort. Further, the supply of perishables warrants further consideration. Refrigeration is required by the Air Despatch Detachment to:-
 - (1) Hold perishables delivered to the airhead and which may have to be held owing to aircraft, etc. delays. Insulated packaging may assist. In some cases, perishables (e.g. fish) were delivered too early up to two hours in advance of time required.
 - (2) Hold perishables off-leaded from aircraft which were unable to complete a mission.
- d. Considerable quantitles of fuel for helicopters were dropped to company operational bases.
- e. Waterproof containers (e.g. plastic bags) essential for dropping in or near swampy ground.

27. Heavy Drop (Appx 1 to Paper 11)

- a. The main reason for the non-use of HSP in Berneo appeared to be that the AATDC in UK had not cleared the technical procedures required for dropping the equipments involved.
- b. Within height/payload limitations, the Belvedere and Wessex may recover HSP. Careful planning is necessary as only approximately 35 minutes flying time is available before the aircraft require re-fuel.
- c. DEs in Borneo were below the minimum dimensions laid down and were not suitable for heavy drop further preparation would have been necessary.

Paper 12 - Use of Helicopters for Casualty Evacuation

- 28. This particular paper does not represent procedures adopted in normal circumstances but represents a SOF used for evacuating casualties which occurred on special operations. Points from the discussion are:
 - a. Location of Casualty (para 13)- Sarbe MK 111 is proferable to the gun. Further, in Borneo guns were surveyed in, which may not always be the case.
 - b. Hexamine cookers used to light LP at night.
 - c. ACOs and NCOs need training in the selection of LPs.

- d. The winch cable on current helicopters is about 60 feet; needs to be longer (say 200 feet) in jungle operations.
- e. The "Form to Accompany Deceased" was essential to meet the export/import requirements of the various civil authorities (Sarawak/Sabah/Brunei/Singapore) which became involved in the evacuation of bodies to Singapore.

Paper 13 - Medical Aspects of a Unit's Fitness for Operations

- 29. This paper was written with a medical bias toward instructing future unit commander's, whose unit may move from the UK to this theatre, of the theatre medical aspects. Nost unit commanders ex Borneo resented the inference that medical discipline was poor whereas actual statistics show that by comparison with other campaigns, the incidence of disease was low. It was interesting to note, however, that of the personnel hospitalised during confrontation, only 4% represented battle casualties. The medical authorities emphasised that health and hygiene discipline could have been better.
- 30. Points from the discussion are:
 - medical Intelligence. There is a definite need for medical intelligence concerning possible operational theatres. Until operations had commenced, it was not known that leptospirosis occurred in Bernee. In fact, medical authorities were of the initial opinion that it did not occur. (Note: HQ AAF FARELF copy of JIB(A) Report No 3/6/63 Sarawak and Brunei does not list leptospirosis as a prevalent disease).
 - b. Water. Problems arose because the equipment (pumps, etc) issued for filtration and purification of water were initially in short supply and subsequently not suitable for the task. The point made was that these equipments must be stockpiled during the planning stage and must be available on arrival of troops in the theatre.
 - c. Hygiene Officer. Most unit commanders were adament that the RMO would be allocated hygiene responsibilities in an advisory capacity; executive action to rectify faulty matters would be implemented through normal command channels.
 - d. Spectacles. The requirements for a soldier in an operational area to have two pair of spectacles should be noted.

Paper 14 - Individual Water Purification

51. Further research in this matter is taking place. However, the five gallon Millbank bag has been adopted as the section kit (3 per sec) and is now being issued throughout FARELF. It performs satisfactorily.

Paper 15 - Ammunition

32. Over 100 different natures of ammunition were used in Borneo. The remoteness of company bases and use of air supply resulted in large quantities of ammunition being held forward. Figures quoted for a company base were:-

Artillery nature - 8 tons SAA - 7 tons.

33. Points from discussion are:-

a. Scales (Para 2) - developed by Bormeo staffs because of the inadequacy of the previous War Office Rates. MOD (Army) has since issued more realistic rates for world-wide operations.

b. Deterioration (para 4). The four monthly inspection cycle was also a direct result of roulement whereby units changed over every four months.

Paper 16 - Centeen Credit System

Paper 17 - Financial System

34. These papers together with the supplementary paper on "Canteen Credit Payment Procedures" (attached) explain the problems of operating in under-developed areas. In particular, the handling of public monies increases the unit work-load. Two Australian Units (4 RAR and 22 Const Sqn) have separately stated the need for a Sgt RAAPC to assist in the running of imprest accounts, canteen accounts, payment of local labour, local purchases, etc.

Conclusion

35. The final report by Commander British Forces Borneo and reports by Branches/Directorates HQ FARELF are being compiled. The selected papers considered by the convention at JWS are only a past-contribution to the lessons from the Borneo campaign. At this stage, the papers do not necessarily reflect FARELF views.

- 1. The draft establishment for a Reinforcement Holding Unit forwarded under cover of reference 'A' is related to planning and does not contemplate a variation to the actual current scale of Australian contribution to Jungle Warfare School.
- 2. The Jungle Warfare School in certain circumstances reorganises as a Reinforcement Holding Unit and assumes the responsibility for processing reinforcements as shown in Annex 'B' JWS/A/11/1 of 18 Aug 66 attached to reference 'A'.
- 3. UK establishment FE 2147/3/66(W)(ERE) was issued without obtaining formal approval from Australia and New Zealand for appointments required to be filled by these countries. HQ FARELF have now had another look at the requirement and the draft establishment forwarded with reference 'A' is their new proposal. Comments on deletions and additions relate to a comparison of establishment FE 2147/3/66(W)(ERE) Reinforcement and Training Unit FARELF and proposed establishment for a Reinforcement Holding Unit FARELF.
- 4. The Australian contribution is to be increased only in the circumstances that require JWS to reorganise as an RHU and this contribution is less than that shown as the Aust Component to the Reinforcement and Training Unit FARELF.
- 5. HQ FARELF consider that wings should be commanded and administered by the OC of the unit being processed and that national personnel provide the instruction in each wing, supplemented as required by the RHU. For this reason the Maj (OC wing) has been deleted in the new proposal. However, this appointment can be included if required.
- 6. Your approval or suggested amendments to the Aust component of the proposed Reinforcement Holding Unit FARELF would be appreciated.

- 1. The above references deal with the supply of items from FARELF sources to AFV. It seems appropriate at this stage that the problem should be restated and the procedures reviewed.
- 2. The Republic of Singapore is neutral in relation to the present operations in South Vietnem. Singapore has made it clear that it does not wish to become involved in any activities which imply support for the military operations of the Allies. Notwithstanding this expressed attitude, the Government of Singapore has agreed to accept US and Commonwealth servicemen from South Vietnem in Singapore on R & R leave. This agreement may have been influenced by the inflow of dollars with the servicemen.
- 3. Any logistic support for AFV from this area involves the processing of domands through HQ PARELF and its agencies, and the actual movement of stocks from depots of the Singapore Base most of which are located on Singapore Island. This processing and handling of stocks inevitably involves the handling of papers and addressed cases, crates, etc. by Asians who are employed within the Base.
- 4. NQ FARELY is agreeable to providing from British sources whatever is required by AFV, subject to current stock holdings and their own anticipated requirements. However they are anxious to ensure, as far as practicable, that the political niceties are observed and that items despatched from depots are not seen to be destined for AFV. In brief this involves vouchering to HQ AAF or 110 LAA Bty and marking cases accordingly and changing the address at Butterworth for enward movement to AFV. HQ PARSLF is anxious to ensure that any of their employees cannot make political capital out of the fact that he has seen items leaving depots destined for South Vietnam, thus causing embarrassment to both HQ PARSLF and the Government of Singapore.

- 5. This matter was discussed with DGS during his recent visit and our understanding was that it was agreed that AFV would submit all demands direct to Australia in accordance with established procedures. If any of these demands could be more readily met from PARELF rather than Australian sources AHQ Melbourne was to request HQ AAF to approach HQ FARELF and, provided the items were available, HQ AAF was to submit the necessary indents and make arrangements for movement to AFV using substitute addresses for the first stage of movement to Butterworth and for inscription vouchers raised by the supplying depot.
- 6. The scheme outlined above would ensure that no mention of AFV as the final destination would be evident while indents, vouchers, claims or goods are being handled by HQ FARELF or its agencies.
- 7. The problems raised in detail in References A to D and F are now of no concern in establishing our future method of operation. Reference E clearly indicates the method of requesting maintenance by AFV. Reference G however is at variance with the understanding arrived at with DOS as described in paragraph 5. In this case a demand has been placed directly on FARELF by ANQ Melbourne indicating address for stores. Copies of this signal have been refer by this headquarters and the consignment is being handled in accordance with paragraph 5.

8. It is requested that in future all demends placed on FARELF in support of AFV be channelled through this headquarters.




