BRIEF DETAILS FROM FINAL REPORT BY  
WOODWARD COMMITTEE OF INQUIRY

1. The following paras give brief details from the final Woodward Report. (All monetary figures are in AS dollars and cents).
2. Expression of Salary. Active pay is no longer the basis of salary. The future expression of military salary is:
  - a. Salary - the rate determined for each rank and pay level expressed as an annual amount; and
  - b. Service Allowance. An amount of \$750 per annum.
  - c. The military salary (i.e. salary plus service allowance) is fully taxable.
3. Service Allowance. This allowance is payable to all ranks except junior ORs and trainee officers during institutional training. This allowance is not payable to those officers currently on consolidated rates.
4. Salary for Various Purposes. Salary for the following purposes is exclusive of service allowance.
  - a. Travelling allowance;
  - b. overseas allowance;
  - c. temporary rental allowance;
  - d. temporary accommodation allowance;
  - e. rental for married quarter; and
  - f. application of national wage decisions.

NOTE: Salary for DFRB purposes has yet to be determined.

5. Marriage Allowances. Marriage, separation and provision allowances are abolished. Married and single members will receive the same military salary.

6. Rations and Quarters (R & Q). The source reduction of \$1.32 per day for R & Q is discontinued. Single members living in will be charged the following rates:

- a. Pte to Cpl (incl Junior Trainees) \$1.70 per day
- b. Sgt to WO1 \$2.10 per day
- c. Offrs \$2.30 per day

(There will be no charge for R & Q while living in the field and married members living in for service reasons will not be charged for R & Q).

d. Members living out who have meals provided by the service are to be charged as follows:

- (1) Breakfast - 30 cents
- (2) Lunch - 40 cents
- (3) Dinner - 40 cents

7. LOA. Single members living out for service reasons will be financially assisted to the extent of the difference between the charge for R & Q and the cost of reasonable commercial accommodation and laundry charges.

8. LOAFH Allowance. No change to existing provisions.

9. Separation Allowance. There is to be a new allowance to compensate married members separated from their family for service reasons. It will be paid at the rate of \$1.00 per day on and from the fifteenth day of separation. It ceases when the member officially rejoins his family at public expense for a period in excess of 48 hrs. Separation allowance will not be paid in conjunction with travelling allowance.

10. Uniform Maintenance Allowance. New non taxable rates per annum are:

- a. Pte to Cpl - \$105
- b. Sgt to WO1 - \$125
- c. Offrs (incl Brig and Maj Gen) - \$175

11. Salaried Officers. New rates for General List and Admin and Tech List officers result from restructuring of salary. The new rates maintain relativity with comparable professional groups in Commonwealth Public Service (CPS). Med and Dent officers are directly aligned with CPS Medical Officers. Salaried chaplains have been restructured. Female rates have been adjusted on the existing basis of 80% of male General List rates. New rates are:

General

1. Exercise HARD GRIND, conducted in two parts was the annual competition exercise designed to select both the champion platoon and company within the battalion.
2. Admin Coy did not compete while Spt Coy participated in Part One only.

Results

3. Champion Company A Coy.
4. Champion Platoon 12 Platoon D Coy.

Duration

5. Part One 19 - 23 Feb 73.
6. Part Two 26 Feb - 9 Mar 73.

Aims

7. These were:
  - a. to test the soldier in military skills/physical fitness; and
  - b. test the sub units in tropical warfare techniques in close country with emphasis on:
    - (1) ambush;
    - (2) patrol;
    - (3) attack; and
    - (4) withdrawal.

Location of HQ 6 RAR

8. HQ 6 RAR remained located at Kangaw Barracks.

Exercise Area

9. Part One

/ 'a. Kangaw Barracks

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- a. Kangaw Barracks; and
- b. Pulada.

10. Part Two Training Area Delta.

Commanding Officer

11. The CO 6 RAR was Lt Col J.B. Healy.

Exercise Organisation

12. Part One. Umpires and staff were provided by both Spt and Admin Coy.

13. Part Two.

- a. Umpires were provided with the unit.
- b. Enemy forces were provided by;
  - a. Int Sect; and
  - b. the unit band.
- c. A control headquarters commanded by the RSO 6 RAR was established at GR 313 475.
- d. A concentration area commanded by the OC Admin Coy was established at GR 305 485.

Supporting Forces

14. Supporting the exercise were:
- a. 106 Fd Bty; (3 X FO parties)
  - b. Base Transport Unit;
  - c. 28 Anzuk Avn Sqn; and
  - d. RNZAF.

Concept of Exercise

15. Part One. Activities were designed to test the platoon in military skills, physical fitness and teamwork. Platoons were awarded points for each event in order of their placings. Events were:

- a. weapon handling/navigation/fieldcraft;
- b. section field firing;
- c. obstacle course;
- d. arming/disarming the claymore mine;
- e. written quiz; and
- f. cross country run.

16. Part Two. A field exercise conducted in two phases, this part was designed to test both platoon and company in an operational CRW setting. Points were allocated in order of final placings.

/a. Phase One



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- a. Phase One. Each platoon was inserted by medium transport helicopter into an independent AO where a 36 hour operation was conducted. Platoons were assessed in:
- (1) helicopter insertion techniques;
  - (2) ambush by night;
  - (3) counter ambush drills;
  - (4) search of enemy camps;
  - (5) mine warfare techniques;
  - (6) protection at the halt including night harbours;
  - (7) section/platoon assaults;
  - (8) obstacle crossing drills;
  - (9) voice procedure;
  - (10) navigation; and
  - (11) fieldcraft.
- b. Phase Two. On completion of the platoon activities the company regrouped and commenced activities in a new AO. In addition to the points noted in sub paragraph 16a, the company was assessed in :
- (1) area ambush;
  - (2) battle procedure;
  - (3) deployment drills;
  - (4) attack;
  - (5) withdrawal;
  - (6) helicopter extraction techniques;
  - (7) use of artillery support; and
  - (8) use of air support.

17. Sequence of Events. See Annex B.

Administration

18. Responsibilities of Concentration Area. During Part Two the concentration area was responsible for:
- a. resupply of sub units in the field;
  - b. reception of sub units on arrival in the exercise area;
  - c. movement of sub units on completion of exercise activities;
  - d. issue and receipt of controlled stores;
  - e. issue of ammunition to sub units prior to exercise activities;
  - f. air tasking; and
  - g. briefing of pilots.

/19. Fuel

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19. Fuel. AVTUR and AVGAS were prepositioned at the landing zone located at the concentration area prior to Part Two of the exercise commencing.

20. Transportation.

- a. Base Transport Unit. On dates required TCV's were used to transport exercise troops to appropriate air strips and on some occasions to or from the exercise area.
- b. Air. Air transport included B170 and medium helicopter transport.
  - (1) B170 Tasks. On two occasions movement by air was impeded due to mechanical problems with the aircraft. Although the unit benefited from the experience of moving by air, it should be noted that in future exercises use of B170 aircraft for movement of troops should not be considered when timings are critical. Further limitations are:
    - a. the need for recon of proposed landing strips;
    - b. the requirement of crash fire teams at the landing strip; and
    - c. the possibility of adverse weather.
  - (2) Medium Helicopter Transport. Tasks included insertion and extraction of sub units. On two occasions the helicopters were used to transport troops direct to and from the exercise area. The support given was first class.

21. Medical. Four casualties were evacuated by air direct from the exercise area to medical facilities in Singapore. The following medical facilities in the exercise area were employed:

- a. a medical aid centre located in the concentration area; and
- b. a medical assistant with each company deployed in the field.

Communications

22. Nets. Within the exercise area VHF was used with no difficulties experienced. HF was required for communications to 6 RAR rear and although at times heavy interference was experienced communications were acceptable.

23. Voice Procedure/Security. See paragraph *under lessons learnt*.

Vehicle Casualties

24. One sioux helicopter was lost during Part Two of the exercise. Both passengers were evacuated direct by air to Singapore.

25. One landrover was damaged.

Blinds

26. A total of seven explosive simulators failed to explode during the company exercises. These were destroyed in location by WO2 V. Creagh of 6 RAR.

Damage to Civilian Property

27. As a result of the helicopter crash and subsequent recovery a total of 20 rubber trees plus a banana tree were damaged. OC Admin Coy recorded the damage and took appropriate action.



OBSERVATIONS ON CURRENT STORES/EQUIPMENT

Ambush Communications

28. Communications within an ambush between groups continues to be a problem. The use of communication cord is not considered acceptable and at times if not correctly laid will jeopardise an ambush. There is an evident need for some electric device to allow ample warning to the ambush commander and killer group. Until it is provided there will always be the uncertainty within the ambush and the continual risk of movement hence noise before the enemy are in the killing ground.

Camouflage Cream

29. The non availability of camouflage cream is considered a limitation on a unit which is continually attempting to make infantrymen camouflage conscious.

Claymore Mines Inert

30. Although inert claymores were continually used, the lack of simulated explosion prevented realism in training. Consequently ambushes were triggered by GPMG or flare initiation and although ambush commanders were aware this would not be the case in operations, the technique could lead to bad habits.

Grappling Hooks

31. A small lightweight grappling hook should be considered as standard issue equipment within the infantry platoon. The many uses are evident, in particular when pulling a body suspected of being booby trapped or clearing trip wires. The slogan "improvise" is only good enough if each and every platoon does improvise before an operation.

Radio Packs

32. There is a need to provide a suitable pack for radio operators. The present issue pack is not suitable and valuable time is often wasted while on the move in an effort to change frequencies.

Chandler Boards

33. The Chandler Board has in the past been used with success to obtain maximum illumination from a ground flare, particularly in ambush. It is considered that a collapsible then reflecting type metal should be produced for issue to all infantry platoons. At present there are too many incidents of poor illumination or even where friendly forces are blinded by the glare. Although it is accepted that such problems are due to poor siting of flares the proposed equipment would reduce the problem.

/TRAINING OBSERVATIONS



TRAINING OBSERVATIONS AND LESSONS LEARNT

General

34. All sub units were of an acceptable operational standard.
35. A training instruction listing common faults is to be issued to all sub units.

Physical Fitness

36. During Part Two all sub units experienced extremely hot conditions. The pre exercise emphasis by sub units on fitness paid off. Only two soldiers were evacuated for heat exhaustion.

Ambushes

37. Sub units need to place more emphasis on this subject. There is a tendency for commanders to become stereo typed in their ambush layout. Consideration should be given for firm bases being occupied and economy of effort in operations of long term duration. Major points noted were:

- a. poor security;
- b. degrees of alertness not being emphasised;
- c. variation in degrees of weapon readiness;
- d. vague RV's;
- e. complicated methods of springing the ambush; and
- f. control in occupation, sweep and search.

M79 Grenade Launcher

38. Although carried, many junior commanders neglected to employ the weapon when in contact, particularly in open country.

Leadership

39. There is a tendency for the young officers to do too much thus denying the section commanders his responsibilities.

Equipment

40. There were incidents of equipment being misplaced or dropped. The need for a soldier to ensure his equipment is secure cannot be over emphasised.

Contact Drills

41. It should be remembered a drill is completed once the subunit is deployed, or when orders are given. A drill does not include an assault on an enemy position.



42. There is a need for each company to reassess its deployment drills once contact is made. The requirement for closing up, all round protection and availability of platoon commanders for orders is vital if initiative is to be maintained or even regained.

Passage of Information

43. In general this subject was poorly applied. As a result commanders, particularly at company level found themselves in unenviable situations.

- a. The platoon commander must develop a drill where he is capable of giving his commander a brief and accurate sitrep.
- b. The section commander must ensure he maintains control of his command and pass back sound information.
- c. The soldier must be made aware to report accurate information then keep quiet. Too often an entire section is heard yelling. It creates unnecessary problems and does nothing to ~~even~~ the *win* fight.

Scouts

44. There is a tendency to use only the trail method even when contact is imminent. This is folly.

Voice Procedure

45. Voice procedure within the battalion is not of an acceptable standard. Consequently radio security was of a poor standard.

Air Support

46. The support given by the helicopter pilots was excellent. Particular points of interest were:

- a. poor briefing by ground troops;
- b. throwing smoke before being requested by the pilot;
- c. poor selection of landing points by ground troops; and
- d. inadequate protection of winch or landing points.

Marksmanship

47. As always this subject requires attention.

## Topography

1. General. The area mainly consists of primary and secondary jungle with small areas in the EAST under rubber and oil palm plantation. The area is well served by numerous vehicle and timber tracks. The main tracks are as detailed in the trace. Some difficulty was experienced with the track overprint which was prepared for the exercise as the main reference point in the area (277 ft feature in GS3146) was found to be incorrect.
2. Roads. The tracks as indicated in the trace are well formed laterite roads and capable of carrying up to 5 ton vehicles in good weather conditions. In wet conditions only 4 wheel drive  $\frac{3}{4}$  ton vehicle should be used. During the exercise the road WEST from the 200 ft feature was found to be cut but it is expected that the local wood cutters will repair the road within their own resources as it is one of their main exit routes.
3. LZs. Numerous LZs are located in the area their locations and capacities are detailed in the trace. Trees in the area are between 60' - 120' high so are within the winch range of the Iroquois. Some of the areas in the SOUTH of area DELTA where open areas are indicated would take little preparation for LZs.
4. Habitation/Locals. Timber cutters were found to be active in the area and one temporary camp was noted in GS 3046. Rubber tappers are active in the EAST and normally start work about 0530 hrs and work until last light.
5. Navigation. Navigation is difficult as many of the features are below 200' and are difficult to distinguish. Creeks in the lower areas tend to change course frequently in the wet season, so should not be relied on. It is virtually impossible to plot the numerous timber cutters tracks connecting to the main tracks.
6. Bridges. The main bridges and their ratings are detailed in the trace. Care should be taken during wet weather and inspections should be made of the approaches etc before use.
7. Weather. Some seasonal rain was experienced in the early stages of the exercise however it would appear that the dry season has now set in. The major creeks normally run perennially but some smaller ones tend to dry up in the dry season.
8. Water. The major creeks supply plentiful water for all year use however care should be taken and all water sterilized. Water should not be taken from creeks which drain from rubber or palm oil plantations as chemical pesticides and fertilizers are often used.
9. Wild Life. Numerous wild pigs were sighted during the exercise but fled on sighting humans.

6 RAR TRAINING INSTRUCTION 3/73  
TRAINING NOTESGeneral

1. The following comments are produced to assist commanders at all levels in achieving a higher standard in training.

Security

2. Voice procedure is not of an acceptable standard within the battalion. Consequently radio security is poor. You are well advised to read the Jan 72 edition of TIB. Some examples of breaches in security during exercise HARD GRIND:

- a. "this platoon is ready to move";
- b. sending LOC STATS in clear when there has been no contact;
- c. while preparing for an ambush, speaking of killer groups, early warning, RVs etc; and
- d. "we are approximately 400 metres west of last contact".

3. The frequent use of surnames on nets is a dangerous habit. Use regimental numbers and initials only.

Carriage of Weapons

3. Although at an acceptable standard within the unit there are still individuals who neglect this subject:

- a. soldiers other than forward scouts with fingers on the trigger; and
- b. hands over the muzzle.

Handsets

4. In wet conditions the handset will frequently trap moisture and become unserviceable. Ensure your radio operator is in the habit of protecting the handset with a piece of plastic.

Communications

5. When halting there is a tendency for radio operators to flop on the ground with no regard to where the aerial is. Develop the habit with operators of ensuring they keep the aerial upright. If communications are difficult, have the aerial changed.

Equipment

6. There are too many rattles. Ensure section commanders check and enforce the requirement for secure equipment.
7. Misplacing a claymore mine is as negligent as losing a GPMG.

Obstacle Crossings

8. There is a tendency for patrols to bunch before and after crossing an obstacle.

Passage of Information

9. Generally this subject is poorly applied. It needs practice.
10. When contact is made, give a brief setrep.

Degrees of Weapon Readiness

11. There is a difference of opinion within sub-units on what degree of weapon readiness is required in an ambush. Ensure the requirements are known by all ranks.

Coded LOCSTATS

12. Too often incorrect coded locstats are sent. As a result time is wasted in asking a sub-unit to verify. Prepare then ensure it is double checked.

Scouts

13. Scouts appear to have forgotten the various methods of movement other than the trail method.

Fire Lanes

14. Many soldiers do not appear to appreciate the dangers of halting or even going to ground in fire lanes.

Air Briefings

15. No doubt the subject is a difficult one. However we cannot hope to master it without practice. There are many in the battalion who need practice in this subject.

Ambushes

16. In selecting an RV it is pointless to expect a soldier to march by night on a magnetic bearing. One doesn't question their ability to do it, simply the number of compasses available within an ambush.
17. It is desirable for the commander to spring the ambush.
18. Signals for search parties etc should be quite simple and clear.
19. You are considered an extreme optimist if you cook and have the final smoke 25 metres from the chosen killing ground.

Contact Drills

20. The drill finishes when the last man is deployed or if an order is given. The drill does not include an assault.


Navigation

21. Too often it is only the patrol commander who navigates.

GENERAL IDEA - EX KING COBRA

Reference: A. Map West Malaysia 1:63360 Sheet 118 KAHANG.

1. FANTA is a democratic republic of the British Commonwealth bordering GANASIA (to the North) in SE ASIA and maintains strong links with ANZUK nations by treaty and trade. GANASIA is a communist country which follows the Peking line and obtains substantial military and economic aid from the major Communist - bloc countries. See Annex A.
2. Since 1970 relations between FANTA and GANASIA have deteriorated. The government of FANTA have become alarmed at the extent of GANASIAN - initiated subversive military and political activities in the North of FANTA. Political and military leaders of FANTA are currently most disturbed by a recent build-up of insurgent activity. Previously FANTA was able to cope with the low level infiltration from GANASIA and associated minor (e.g. squad or less strength) hostile incidents occurring near the border but now seriously doubts her capacity to continue successful independent resistance.
3. Therefore FANTA has invoked the ANZUK Five Power Agreement and requested military assistance, both in respect of helping to stem maritime and border infiltration of men and material, and in securing key Lines of Communications areas, to the South of FANTA's forward defended areas, in which it is suspected that the enemy are trying to develop base areas and camps. The ANZUK nations have agreed to the request by FANTA and on Apr 73, 28 ANZUK Bde was committed with ANZUK Navy and Air elements in support.
4. According to FANTA intelligence the Northern coastal area is believed to contain enemy infiltrated logistic 'off-leading' and staging areas, from which extend trails South from the border roughly parallelling the coast line and Westwards into incident-prone regions. There are further reports of enemy trails from the border moving South but much further inland.
5. FANTA assessment is that the enemy are using these trails to establish caches designed to support operations along the axis of the Jemaluang-Keluang Road with the ultimate aim of seizing the key town of Keluang, though not necessarily attempting to retain it.
6. It is believed that GANASIA's long term aims are to attend and expand their operations South towards KOTA TINGGI.
7. The regular armed forces of FANTA (FRA) consist only of two infantry brigades (one of which is deployed along the border with GANASIA) and one Border Police Battalion (FBP). Supporting arms are very limited and neither FANTA nor GANASIA possess any air, armoured or naval capacity. The second brigade is spread between KELUANG, BATU PAHAT and JOHORE BAHRU site GHQ, HQ 2 FANTASIAN Inf Bde the logistics, recruiting and training facilities, and a reinforcement holding unit of considerably less than battalion strength are located at Johore Bahru.

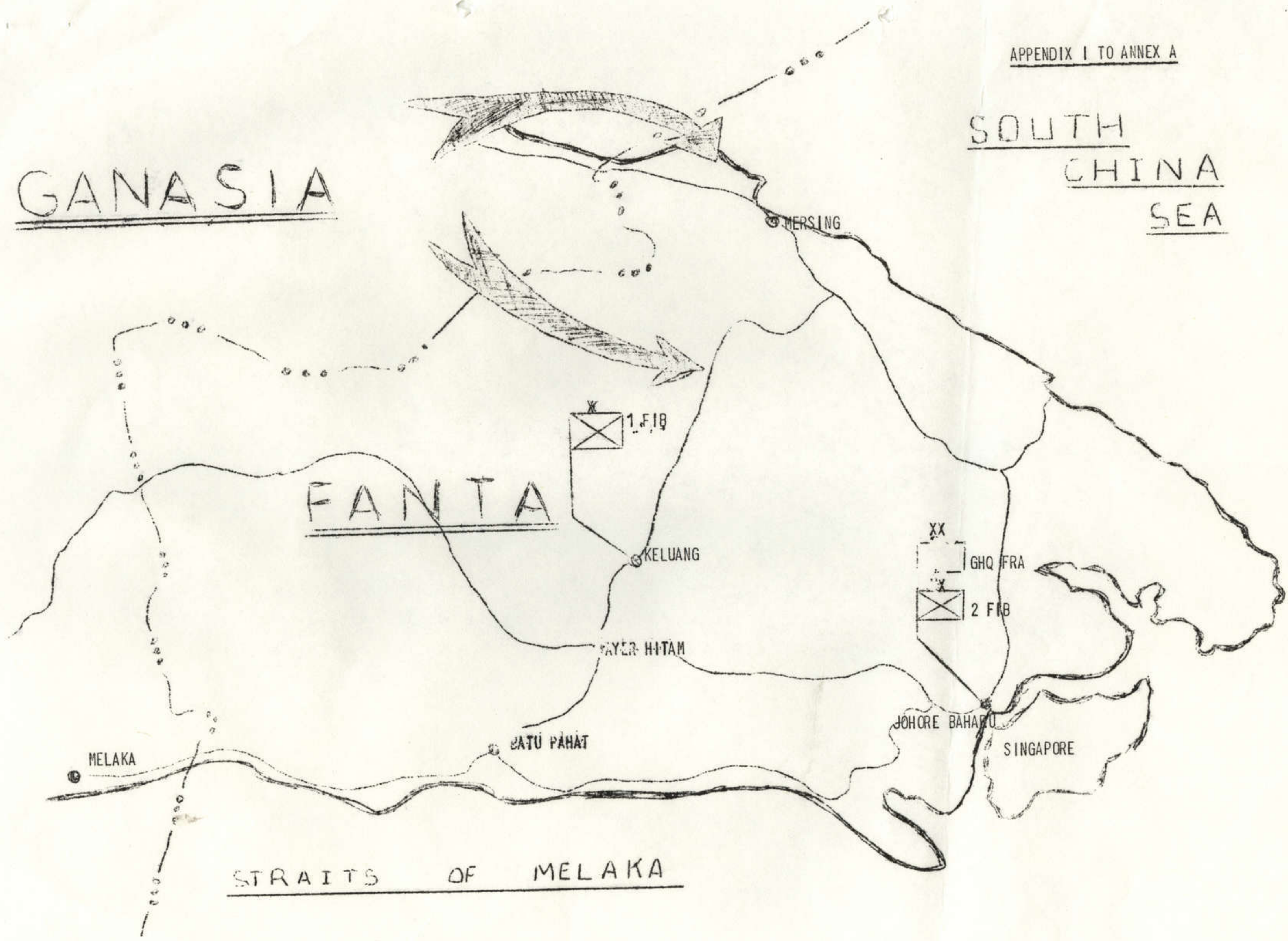

1. By coincidence the ANZUK Chiefs of Staff were meeting together in Canberra on the 20th March when the Fanta request for ANZUK military assistance came through. This request was received with enthusiasm and acclaim for they were able to temporarily suspend their talks on the "Restructuring of the ANZUK Force" and apply themselves immediately to this task.

2. The same day they issued instructions to COMANZUKFOR to:

- a. place 28 ANZUK Brigade together with necessary air and naval units at seven days notice to move to Fanta from 22 Mar;
- b. commence planning for the movement, insertion and deployment to Fanta of 28 ANZUK Brigade; and
- c. authorise limited aerial and naval reconnaissance of:
  - (1) area south of the Kluang/Jemaluang Roads,
  - (2) the Langgor forest reserve between the Kota Tinggi/Jemaluang Roads and the sea, and
  - (3) the sea approaches and offshore islands off the east coast of Fanta.

3. Acting on the instructions of COMANZUKFOR the Commander 28 ANZUK Brigade, accompanied by the Col GS (Ops and Plans) HQ ANZUK Force, SASO HQ ANZUK Force, a Staff Officer (Naval Operations) and the Brigade Major, flew to Johore Bahru to meet the Fanta Army Commander and as a result of their meeting the following decisions were taken:

- a. 28 ANZUK Brigade would be allotted two areas of operations immediately south of the Kluang/Jemaluang Roads, to be known as AO Burns, and east of the Jemaluang/Kota Tinggi Roads, to be known as AO Kelly.
- b. As naval units are unable to get close in-shore to the mainland, the island of Tioman could be used from which to mount a helicopter assault. Naval gunfire support can be provided to cover the helicopter assault. Kangar Kahang airfield would also be available to the Brigade but its security is questionable and it may be necessary to initially seize this by airborne assault.

- c. The task of the Brigade would be to destroy enemy logistic 'off loading and staging units' in the area and to harass and destroy any enemy movement through the area from Ganasia.
  - d. The project would be placed under the operational control of HQ Fanta Army but remain under command of COMANZUKFOR.
4. The information on friendly forces is given in Annex C.
5. The information on enemy forces is at present unreliable and valueless. This is being rectified by HQ ANZUK Force who are sending a Field Intelligence Team to Fanta at the earliest opportunity. We expect their report and assessment to be available by 30 Mar. The enemy mined and damaged bridges and culverts along the Johore Bahru - Ayer Hitam road on 26 Feb. The road will be unusable to military traffic for at least two months.
6. Immediately after the talks at Johore Bahru, the Commander 28 ANZUK Brigade was able to do a quick serial reconnaissance of his AOs before returning home. He took the following decisions:
- a. 1 RHF would be allotted AO Burns and would be air-landed at Kangar Kahang. This operation may have to be preceded by a company airborne assault.
  - b. 6 RAR would be allotted AO Kelly and two Companies would be taken there by frigates of the ANZUK Navy. These troops would be helicoptered ashore from the island of Tioman, as surprise could be an important factor in this area. The remainder of the Battalion would move into the area later by road.
  - c. Brigade HQ would be flown into Kangar Kahang and shortly afterwards move to occupy an area GR 0069 midway between the two AOs.
  - d. BMA would be located at Kangar Kahang.
7. Full camouflage and concealment measures are to be taken by all units of the Brigade as there are unconfirmed rumours that Ganasia have acquired some fighter aircraft from France. Neither the capabilities of their pilots nor the armaments of their aircraft is known.

SUPINTREP 1/73 - EX KING COBRA

Organisation

1. The FANTA People's Liberation Army (FPLA) is organised into a Main Force Battalion (estimated two companies strength), supported by an as yet unknown number of Local Force/guerrilla squads and the Fanta People's Min Yuen (FPMY) or Work Force, also of unknown strength.
2. The FPLA MF Bn is subordinate to the Fanta Communist Party's (FCP) Central Committee, (itself subordinate to the National Politbure), and it is reportedly commanded by a Ganasian People's Army (GPA) officer, with a number of GPA cadres specialists and advisers in support. The unit's Political Officer (PO) and 2IC are believed to be citizens of FANTA.
3. Mil orgs are shown in the attached appendices.

Tactics and Weapons

4. The tactics employed by the enemy are generally of a guerrilla warfare nature. Speed in action, continuous movement, skilful camouflage, ambush and deception measures are all likely. The enemy usually prefers numerical superiority of at least 5:1 ratio before initiating attacks. For further information see - The Enemy, 1970.
5. Enemy weapons are shown in Appendix 1.

Dress

6. Black or green uniforms and jungle hats with plaited red headbands.

Miscellaneous

7. Important enemy officers are believed to carry ID cards. Allied reports indicate that although many enemy personnel are individually lax in their own observance of security measures their camps are normally well guarded, defended and concealed. Vacated camps are often booby trapped. The enemy attempts battle-field clearance whenever possible.

1. The outline of proposed exercises is as follows:
  - a. Ex "LOST HORIZON". A navigation and communication exercise to be conducted in Area 13 to practise the following:
    - (1) All aspects of navigation including preparation of nav data sheets and going maps;
    - (2) Night navigation; and
    - (3) Consolidate signal trg taught in week one and practise communications under field conditions.
  - b. Ex "BUGIS STREET". An observation post exercise to be conducted in Area 13 to practise the following:
    - (1) OP procedures including siting, occupation, OP routine, recording and reporting of information;
    - (2) Establish comms in close proximity to the enemy.
  - c. Ex "IRON JAW". An ambush exercise to be conducted in Area 13. The following will be practised:
    - (1) Planning, briefing, siting, occupation and springing of small group ambushes;
    - (2) Use of the claymore mine in ambushes;
    - (3) Ambush routine; and
    - (4) Withdrawal from ambush position by night.
  - d. Ex "DRY RUN". A tutorial patrol exercise with an assistant instructor acting as patrol commander. The exercise will be conducted in Area C and will include the following:
    - (1) All aspects of ptl daily routine, drills and procedures;
    - (2) Practice for students in all aspects of patrol preparation.
  - e. Ex "BLACK DUCK 1 and 2". Two assessed patrolling exercises to be conducted in Area C. The following aspect will be covered:
    - (1) Assessment of each student as patrol member and patrol commander;
    - (2) Practice students in the techniques of air recce and air insertion for patrols; and
    - (3) Consolidation of all theory taught during the instructional phase of the exercise.

SAFETY INSTRUCTIONS

- Reference: A. Manual of Army Safety.  
B. 28 ANZUK Brigade Training Instructions 5 and 6.

General

1. These instructions are to be read in conjunction with the above references. All Safety Officers appointed as per para 2 below will be conversant with the provision of the references.

Safety Officers

2. Maj R.B. Bishop is appointed Course Safety Officer. All other safety officers will be nominated, briefed and controlled by Maj Bishop.

Ball Ammunition

3. Each patrol DS will carry one magazine of ball ammunition for safety purposes. This magazine will be painted red and taped.

Explosives, Pyrotechnics and Blank

4. Thunder flashes, hand grenade simulators, ground burst simulators are not to be thrown closer than 30 metres from personnel, vehicles, aircraft or equipment.

5. Pyrotechnics such as flares and illuminating devices are not to be fired directly overhead.

6. Blank ammunition is not to be fired at personnel under any circumstances.

Weapon Readiness

7. The degrees of weapon readiness to be observed when using blank ammunition are as follows:

- a. Empty. No magazines on wpn. Breech unloaded. Working parts forward. Safety device ON.
- b. Loaded. Breech empty. Working parts forward. Safety device OFF. Magazine with rounds on weapon.
- c. Action. Round in chamber. Sights up. Safety device ON. Finger OUTSIDE trigger guard.
- d. Instant. Round in chamber. Sights up. Safety device on selected firm position. Finger OUTSIDE trigger guard.

8. Weapons are to be carried within the base at all times during the course and will be in the empty state.

Removal of Ammunition

9. No ammunition, explosives, pyrotechnics or produce is to be removed from the training area.

.../Vehicle



Vehicle Movement

10. a. As most of the roads in the training area are not surfaced and constantly used by timber trucks particular care is to be taken and speed limits rigidly observed. Should the state of roads deteriorate speed limits will be revised.
- b. Troops travelling in vehicles are to ensure that all parts of the body are within the confines of the vehicle.
- c. Troops are not to sit on the tailboards of vehicles whilst the vehicle is in motion.

Helicopter Movement

11. The following points are to be observed when using helicopters:
- a. Always approach the aircraft from the front.
- b. Never approach or walk near the rear of a helicopter.
- c. Once emplaned carry out instructions given by the crewman.
- d. On deplaning remain in the prone position until the helicopter has lifted clear.
- e. Do not deplane until ordered to do so by the crewman.

Bayonets

12. Bayonets are not to be fixed during the course.

Action if Lost

13. Students will be briefed prior to each exercise the action they will be required to carry out if lost. Smoke grenades and flares will be carried to indicate patrol locations to searching aircraft or vehicles.

Snake Bite

14. Action to be taken in the event of Snake Bite is as follows:
- a. Kill and keep the snake if possible;
- b. Re-assure the individual;
- c. Keep the individual as calm as possible;
- d. Apply a lightly constricting ligature (handkerchief, belt, pieces of cloth) to the arm or leg between the bite and the heart. The ligature must be tightened until the veins stand out, but not to stop the pulse at the wrist or ankle. It should be released for one minute every thirty minutes.
- e. Wash the area of the bite with plain water without rubbing the bite.
- f. Immobilize the bitten part by making a splint as for a fracture and keep it hanging below the level of the heart if possible.

.../g. Give



- g. Give mouth to mouth resuscitation if breathing stops;
- h. Move the individual to the nearest road or LZ for evacuation; and
- i. If necessary give aspirin (one or two tablets) to relieve pain but do not administer alcohol or morphine;

Physical Contact

15. There is to be no physical contact between troops being exercised and troops acting as enemy.

Water Obstacles

16. Every care must be taken when negotiating water obstacles with regard to:

- a. Depth of water;
- b. Speed of current.

General

1. Fire prevention is the responsibility of all ranks and requires constant alertness, use of commonsense and active co-operation. A high standard of tidiness and cleanliness in all buildings and their surrounds must be maintained to reduce the fire danger to a minimum.
2. These orders apply to all sub-units of 6 RAR and are to be displayed in a prominent position in each building.

FIRE PRECAUTIONS

3.
  - a. Good House Keeping. Cleanliness and tidiness is the essence of FIRE PREVENTION. It is the responsibility of all ranks to maintain the highest possible standard.
  - b. Regimental Police/Duty personnel are to carry out a thorough inspection of the NAAFI 15 minutes after closing and ensure that cigarette ends are not left burning.
4. Smoking Discipline
  - a. Smoking and the use of any form of naked light is STRICTLY FORBIDDEN in the following places:
    - (1) all stores;
    - (2) cookhouses;
    - (3) workshops;
    - (4) MT vehicle parks;
    - (5) garages;
    - (6) in bed; and
    - (7) all places where 'NO SMOKING' signs are displayed.
  - b. And additionally within 30 feet of the following points:
    - (1) POL points and reserve compounds;
    - (2) battery charging plants;
    - (3) ammunition store houses;
    - (4) tentage;
    - (5) armouries; and

5. Electrical

- a. No electrical appliances other than those installed and approved by DOE are to be allowed. Electrical wiring, fuses or fittings are not to be tampered with. Frayed wiring, broken switches, fuses and power plugs are to be reported immediately to the Unit QM for immediate action.
- b. Only correct fuses are to be used in plugs. On no account are fuses to be replaced by silver paper etc.
- c. Electric irons, lamps, radios and fans, are only to be used where authorised and from power sockets provided. They are to be disconnected by the withdrawal of the plug immediately after use.

6. Vegetation. Grass and undergrowth is to be kept short at all times and refuse of any kind is not to be allowed to accumulate.

7. Cookhouses, Lighting, Space Heating

- a. Authorised fuel only is to be used in Cookhouses. Insulation of chimney or stove pipes where built through walls or roofs is to be inspected at regular intervals by the respective Cook Sgts. Defects are to be reported to the QM for action. Ranges, stoves and fish fryers are at no time to be left unattended whilst in use. No part of the fryer is to be removed except for cleaning purposes and at no time is the fryer to be used for any purpose other than that for which it was originally intended.
- b. The use of candles or any form of unauthorised lighting is prohibited, except when emergency lighting is needed in the case of power failure.
- c. Oil burning lamps and stoves are to be of the official pattern. When in use they are at all times to be placed on a fire proof base of adequate dimensions. The filling of lamps, stoves is to be carried out in the open.

8. POL

- a. All engines, lights and ignition are to be turned off while vehicles are refuelling.
- b. All drivers are to comply with the fire prevention orders laid down in "Standing Orders for Drivers of Mechanised Vehicles".
- c. Petroleum filling is always to be carried out in the open, at least 30 ft away from any source of heat, and great care is to be taken that tanks are not overfilled.

- d. Pools of spilled petrol, oil and lubricants are to be immediately sanded and swept away.  
other than 200 litre drums
- e. Containers, /empty or otherwise are to be stood upright and not stacked more than three high. Caps are to be replaced on all containers. 200 litre drums are to be stored as per Supplies and POL Instructions, Pt 3, Chap 11 Sect 115 Para 14.
- f. The use of gasoline for cleaning engines or other parts or for washing down is forbidden.
- g. Oily rags, cotton waste etc are to be placed in metal containers provided. These are to be emptied and incinerated daily.
- h. POL etc is not to be kept in Huts or Barrack Rooms, but is to be kept in stores provided for that purpose.

9. Gas Cylinders/Containers. Where liquified petroleum gases are in use, a warning notice is to be displayed, to take the form of a notice large enough to be seen from 15 metres, ie:

"WARNING - LIQUIFIED PETROLEUM GAS"

- a. "Do not smoke or allow any naked flame within 15 metres of cylinder.
- b. Keep dry grass/ignitable material at least 15 metres from cylinder.
- c. In the event of any gas leak being detected, immediately notify Adjt or Duty Officer".

10. Ammunition. Ammunition is to be treated at all times with the greatest care. The ammunition storehouses are plainly marked and are "OUT OF BOUNDS" to all ranks except those acting on the specific instructions of the QM. No ammunition of any description is to be taken to or stored in any part of the barracks other than in authorised storage places.

11. Cinema Shows. State regulations are to be observed when showing films in buildings specially designed as a cinema on permanently allotted for this purpose. Special care is to be taken, and decorations of a flammable nature are to be restricted to a minimum, and not permitted where they materially increase the fire hazard. Adequate fire appliances are to be immediately available against an outbreak of fire, and trained firemen of the Army Fire Service, or a fire picquet is to be on duty during the entertainment. Detailed orders are contained in reference A para 156-163 inclusive.

12. Improvisation

- a. Accommodation or fittings are NOT to be adapted or modified for purposes of entertainment or any purposes other than intended, without seeking the advice of the unit Fire Officer.

- b. No personnel are permitted to sleep in other than official living accommodation.
- c. On no account will personnel sleep in stores without the authority of the CO.

13. Vehicle Parking - Vehicles in LADs. Vehicles are to be reversed into garages and suitably spaced to allow them to be moved quickly in the event of an emergency. In the event of a fire adjacent to an LAD, vehicles under repair are to be driven or towed to a safe location.

14. Pyrotechnics and Fire-Works. Fire-Works or Pyrotechnics are not to be introduced into or ignited in the Unit area.

Fire Alarm

15. Situated throughout the battalion area are hand operated fire alarms, all personnel are to be aware of their locations.

16. To supplement the hand operated alarms shout of "FIRE, FIRE, FIRE" will warn persons that an outbreak of fire has occurred.

17. Do not waste time searching for an alarm, alert people as soon as possible. Time may save lives, and equipment.

18. Duties. The duties of battalion personnel are as follows:

a. Unit Fire Officer. The unit fire officer is responsible for:

- (1) Maintain an unit fire occurrence book in which details of all fires are to be entered in red. Occurrences such as inspections, drills, maintenance and repairs of equipments are entered in black.
- (2) Training of fire squads, fire picquets, fire parties, and the conducting of rehearsals.
- (3) Supervision of all fire equipment in the 6 RAR area.
- (4) Inspect and sign the unit and sub-unit fire occurrence books monthly/immediately after a fire.
- (5) Prepare a water supply map which is to be located in the guard room where it would be immediately available to the fire service in the event of fire.
- (6) Submit a report on all fires to the CO.
- (7) On the outbreak of fire he is to assume control of fire fighting personnel and direct operations until arrival of the fire brigade. The senior fire service officer will then assume control.
- (8) Effect liaison with the area fire service, and local civil fire authority.

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- 5 -

- b. Unit Fire NCO. The unit fire NCO is responsible:
- (1) To act as a deputy to the unit fire officer.
  - (2) Assist the unit fire officer in all aspects of unit fire prevention and fire fighting.
- c. Sub-Unit Fire Officer/NCO. The sub-unit fire officer/NCO is responsible to:
- (1) Maintain a sub-unit fire occurrence book showing details of all fires which are to be entered in red. Occurrences such as inspections, drills, maintenance and repairs of equipment are entered in black.
  - (2) Inspect sub-unit fire fighting appliances once per month for serviceability.
- d. Duty Officer. The duty officer during working hours on normal working days is to report to his coy fire parade. During silent hours, 1630-0800, and stand down periods is to assume responsibility of the unit fire officer. Therefore, all officers are to be conversant with these orders.
- e. All Ranks. All ranks of 6 RAR are to be conversant with these fire orders, and the types of fire fighting appliances within their area. All ranks are to be aware of the location of fire alarms within their work areas.
- f. Fire Picquet. A unit fire picquet will not be mounted during normal working hours. The Bn Quarter Guard is to act as the unit fire picquet during silent hours, and stand down periods. Their duties will be to act as directed by the orderly officer/sgt, eg, traffic control, direction to fire.

19. Outbreak of Fire. On an outbreak of fire companies are to ensure that all personnel are accounted for. All soldiers are to parade under coy arrangements, and all fire fighting appliances are to be carried on the parade. Companies are then to await instructions from the unit fire officer or appropriate officer commanding the fire fighting.

EQUIPMENT

20. Fire Fighting Appliances

- a. Fire equipment is provided for all accommodation within the Garrison. Special and/or additional equipment is provided and sited as recommended by the District Fire Adviser.
- b. Fire equipment and its distribution is not to be altered without the authority of the Fire Officer and is to be used only for fire fighting.

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- 6 -

- c. All personnel are to make themselves fully acquainted with the position and composition of the fire points in the vicinity of their living accommodation and place of work.
- d. Extinguishers are to be tested and maintained in accordance with instructions in ANZUK Base Standing Order No 351.
- e. Fire buckets are to be emptied, left in the sun for 15 minutes to destroy mosquito larvae and refilled 2/3rd full of clean water each Friday under unit arrangements.

21. Water Supplies. Units are to ensure that all sources of water supply are at all times kept clear of obstruction and that any defects ie. leaking hydrants, fouled or leaking water tanks are reported to the Unit Fire Officer for immediate action.

22. Fire Fighting Appliances - Types. There are three types of fire appliances which may be installed in the unit areas.

- a. Carbon dioxide and bromochloride flammethane extinguishers for fires involving electrical apparatus.
- b. Foam extinguishers for flammable liquids.
- c. Simplex water filled extinguishers for material fires, wood, paper, textiles etc.
- d. Except in case of fire, no fire appliance is to be removed from its brackets or used unless authorised by the Unit Fire Officer.
- e. Faulty or damaged appliances are to be reported immediately to the Unit Fire Officer or fire NCO on Ext 3501/3629.
- f. Internal hose reels. Hose reels are to be tested every month. The hose is to be run out at its full extent, and with the branch closed at the nozzle, and the hose under mains pressure for one minute, an examination is to be made for leakage at unions and glands over the full hose length. Both reels and hose guides are to be checked for free and easy movement. They are to be lubricated as necessary.

23. Assistance. The ANZUK force fire fighting service for the 6 RAR area is the Nee Soon stations, telephone 3333.

Action to be taken after the Fire

24. The officer in charge of the fire fighting will issue instructions regarding "stand down".

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- 7 -

25. No movement or clearing up of debris is to take place, other than action to render the premises or equipment safe, until the fire has been fully investigated.


26. All fires are to be reported to the Nee Soon fire station. 6 RAR will report fires as per current MBI.

Publication of Fire Orders

27. Fire orders are to be displayed on all notice boards, in all offices, storerooms and places of accommodation.

28. Company commanders are to ensure that all members of their company are read relevant extracts from fire orders at monthly intervals, and that such reading are recorded in the sub-unit fire book.

37. DRESS - WEARING OF DACRONS

The Commanding Officer's policy is that members of 6 RAR in sedentary type duties may wear dacrons at all times. Other members may wear dacrons if activities are suitable. The decision as to which dress personnel are to wear is vested with company commanders. 6 RAR Routine Order 16/73 dated 26 Jan 73 refers.

38. MOSQUITO LARVAE SURVEYS - MARCH 1973

1. ANZUK HMCS is to carry out routine surveys during Mar 73 in accordance with the programme shown below.
2. Surveys are made to detect mosquito breeding and/or potential mosquito breeding in unit/MQ areas. Where mosquito breeding is detected in MQs the occupant is informed, at the time of the visit, in writing.
3. "Domestic" mosquitoes breed profusely in even the smallest collection of stagnant water. Old tins, empty bottles, saucers under flower pots, coconut husks, blocked gutters/drains and old tyres are among the more common sources of trouble. Fire buckets should be emptied at least once weekly. Before refilling they should be thoroughly scrubbed internally and sun-dried. A very sound maxim is "NO STAGNANT WATER - NO MOSQUITOES".
4. HMCS Inspectors and their assistants who carry out these surveys are in possession of a unit "authority" card and wear a green identification badge on their left breast pocket.

2. Single members are advised that this contractor offers substantially lower rates than other removalists for charges of packing and cost of boxes for shipping.

44. DRIVING OF MOTOR VEHICLES INTO MALAYSIA FROM THE REPUBLIC OF SINGAPORE

1. The Malaysian Minister of Transport has issued certain rules under the Malaysian Road Traffic Ordinance 1958 which affect the driving of motor vehicles from the Republic of Singapore into Malaysia.
2. The effect of these rules, as applied by the Malaysia authorities, is to require any person bringing a vehicle into Malaysia for a temporary stay to obtain a pass in accordance with the Fourth Schedule of the Rules before bringing the vehicle into Malaysia. Any pass so issued is affixed to the left hand side of the windscreen of the motor vehicle in a similar position to the Registration Certificate.
3. An instance has occurred of a serviceman being prosecuted in a Malaysian court for driving a vehicle whilst temporarily in Malaysia and not being in possession of a pass issued under the Fourth Schedule.
4. All servicemen are advised that if they contemplate driving a private motor vehicle into Malaysia for a temporary stay, they should obtain such a pass to avoid any difficulties in entering Malaysia. These passes can be obtained from the Malaysian High Commission, Visa Section, J. Holland Park, Singapore.

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45. DOMICILIARY TRANSPORT

Introduction

1. Many instances have been found recently of members not completing the work ticket satisfactorily. For example, this is only too obvious when taxis carrying out identical journeys vary greatly in both mileage and time. Enquiries have generally shown that, either the passengers do not fill in the work ticket or the drivers apply verbal pressure to have either or both figures extended. Although there may be only 1 mile per trip per taxi involved, it can be seen that at the rate of 40 cents per mile, multiplied by two trips per day by 230 taxis could result in \$184 excess expenditure per day or \$46,368 per year. Some discrepancies are considerably more than one mile.

Entitlements

2. All Service personnel, PSOs and LEC(E)s of the ANZUK Force are entitled to the provision of transport for their conveyance from their place of residence to place of duty.

3. The domiciliary journey must be taken at the official start of a working day or period of duty. When a member using domiciliary transport is detained late on duty or is required early on duty, separate transport will be provided for the additional journey subject to the requesting procedures as laid down in paragraph 8a. or b. being carried out.

Use of Contract Taxis

4. Under no circumstances are sub-units or individual members to deal direct with the taxi contractors or their representatives (drivers). ATCCO, ATMA SINGAPORE is the only agency authorised to deal with the contractors and members should divert complaints through the unit transport officer.

Taxi - Work Ticket

5. Members allocated taxis for domiciliary are to ensure that all details are completed correctly at the completion of each journey. Names of passengers travelling, residence, unit and place of duty must be entered on the work ticket. It is essential that members enter the vehicle mileage and time at the start and finish of each journey. At the completion of each journey the work ticket is to be checked and endorsed by the last passenger to alight from the vehicle with the member's name in BLOCK letters and signed in the column provided.

6. If members encounter instances where drivers of domiciliary taxis will not conform with these regulations then the vehicle number is to be reported to the unit transport officer. It is the responsibility of all members using domiciliary, duty taxis and shift-workers taxis to ensure that they carry out the procedures laid down.

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7. Other than in emergencies Taxis are not to deviate from the authorised route or have waiting time added without the prior authority of ATCCO. ATCCO have available routing and mileage information for all journeys. Failure to observe these instructions renders the member liable for the cost of the whole journey.

Duty Taxis

8. Provision is made for members to obtain duty taxis where either the time, mileage and or pick-up/destinations vary from the normal daily requirement by carrying out the following procedures:

- a. During duty hours the member will request transport through the unit transport officer supplying the reason, details of the journey, number of passengers and the time required.
- b. Out of duty hours the member will request to the ATMA DUTY NCO (Phone Mil Ext 5390) for transport supplying the reason, details of the journey, number of passengers and the time required.

9. On receipt of this request ATCCO or the ATMA DUTY NCO will arrange the duty taxi with the contractor and allocate a TRANSPORT CONTROL NUMBER authorising the journey. To minimise any inconvenience the member requesting a duty taxi should where possible request to ATCCO well in advance of the date and time the vehicle is required. This is not only to assist ATCCO but also to give the contractor a reasonable time to arrange a vehicle.

10. Failure to obtain a Transport Control Number will render the member liable for the cost of the journey. Members allocated duty taxis are to observe the instructions laid down in paragraphs 4, 5, 6 and 7.

Shift-Workers Taxis

11. Unit MTOs are to request shift-workers taxis on a monthly basis. These requests are to be submitted at least one week prior to the date of commencement. Each vehicle will be allotted a number prefixed by the letters SW. ATCCO will where possible fill all taxi seats with shift-workers, however these will not necessarily be from the same unit. Any personnel amendments to the monthly schedule are to be notified to ATCCO immediately they are made. No taxi timings or routing are to be changed without prior permission of ATCCO. A taxi not allocated by ATCCO in this way will not be paid for and the bill will be returned to the unit for payment.

Members allocated shift-worker taxis are to observe the instructions laid down in paragraphs 4, 5, 6 and 7.

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

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



The attention of all ranks is directed to those parts of the Crimes Act 1911-1960 and of the Defence Act 1903-1966 which deal with the safe-guarding of official secrets and to the severe penalties which may follow the unauthorised disclosure, intentional or unintentional of official information. Extracts from the Acts are set out in Annex A to Chapter 11 of ANZUK Force Security Instructions.

56. DENTAL APPOINTMENTS

57. MOSQUITO LARVAE SURVEYS - APRIL 1973

1. ANZUK HMCS is to carry out routine surveys during April 73 in accordance with the programme shown below.

2. Surveys are made to detect mosquito breeding and/or potential mosquito breeding in unit/MQ areas. Where mosquito breeding is detected in MQs the occupant is informed, at the time of the visit, in writing.

3. "Domestic" mosquitoes breed profusely in even the smallest collection of stagnant water. Old tins, empty bottles, saucers under flower pots, coconut husks, blocked gutters/drains and old tyres are among the more common sources of trouble. Fire buckets should be emptied at least once weekly. Before refilling they should be thoroughly scrubbed internally and sun-dried. A very sound maxim is "NO STAGNANT WATER - NO MOSQUITOES".

4. HMCS Inspectors and their assistants who carry out these surveys are in possession of a unit "authority" card and wear a green identification badge on their left breast pocket.

58. INSECTICIDAL DISPENSERS AEROSOL - SCALE OF ISSUE

1. The scale of issue Aerosol Insecticide is as follows:

a. Married Quarters or Hirings. Two (2) per married quarter or hiring per month.

N.B. This includes single PSO's, School teachers etc occupying quarters or hirings provided by the Force.

b. Single Accommodation.

(1) Messes, Dining Halls, Kitchens, Cookhouses etc.

12 per Mess/Dining Hall etc per month.

(2) Single Sleeping Accommodation.

(a) 1 per occupied room per month plus 50% where the occupants of a room exceed 4 in number.

(b) 2 per occupied room per month where the number of occupants exceeds 7.

(3) Exercises (Where the use of static locations and tented accommodation is envisaged). At the discretion of the unit Medical Officer.

2. To ensure that optimum and economical use is made of the insecticide, members attention is drawn to their correct use. They are designed as indoor airborne knockdown sprays and they should not be used for surface spraying or for direct attack upon individual insects.

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
