



THE EIGHTH WELLS TROPHY CHALLENGE MATCH HMAS TORRENS VS 6 RAR 11 JUN 73

General

1. HMAS Torrens and 6 RAR will contest a challenge match for the WELLS TROPHY on 11 Jun 73. The sports to be planned are listed below. The sporting activities will be followed by a Bar-B-Q and drinks.

Sports

2. The following sports are to be contested:

a.	Rugby union	(15 per side)	
b.	Australian rules	(18 per side)	
c.	Soccer	(11 per side)	
d.	Hockey	(11 per side)	
e.	Swimming relay	(5 per side)	
f.	Water polo	(9 per side)	
g.	Volley ball	(7 per side)	
h.	Basket ball	(7 per side)	
i.	Squash	(4 per side)	
j.	Cricket	(11 per side)	
k.	Boat race	(10 per side)	(Non-scoring)
1.	Golf	(4 per side)	

Points

- 3. A side will be allotted 10 points for a win in any sport.
- 4. Tie. In the event of a match being tied teams will change ends and play 5 minutes each way. The first team to score wins. If a result has not been reached after this then the points are to be halved.

Rules

- 5. General. Rules will be as per games and sports in the army and potted sports unless otherwise indicated in this instruction.
- 6. Substitutes. Up to but no more than two substitutes will be allowed in any sport at any time during a match.
- 7. <u>Volley ball</u>. The match shall be the best of 5 advantage sets. A set shall be won when either side has reached 15 points with at least two point advantage, play continuing after 15 points until a two point advantage is obtained.

/8.

- 8. Swimming relay. Standard rules, 5 per side.
- 9. Boat race. Teams to face each other, either side of a long table. No spillage is allowed. Elbows must rest on the table. Capt Edwards is required to give both teams a short brief prior to the relay commencing.
- 10. Cricket. 20 overs per side to be played from 0830 hrs to 1200 hrs.
- 11. Squash. 4 members per side. Each player will play one match of 3 games per match.
- 12. Golf. 4 members per side. Details to be decided by Team Captains.

Duration of Matches

- 13. Matches will be of the following duration:
 - a. Rugby union. 25 minutes each half, 5 minutes half time.
 - b. Australian rules. 20 minutes each quarter, no break between 1st and 2nd quarter, half time 5 minutes, 5 minutes at end of the 3rd quarter.
 - c. Soccer. 30 minutes each way. 5 minutes half time.
 - d. Hockey. 30 minutes each way. 5 minutes half time.
 - e. Water polo. 4 periods of 5 minutes each period. 2 minutes intervals between periods. Ends to be changed after each period.
 - f. Basket ball. 20 minutes each way.
 - g. Cricket. 0830 hrs 1200 hrs. 20 overseper side.

18. Sgt Harrissis to set up the co-ordination centre adjacent to the dressing sheds on the Australian rules oval. Blackboards are to be in position to show progressive scores.

- 20. Two medical orderlies are to be provided at the above venues.

21. The following transport is required $2 \times \frac{3}{4}$ ton landrover and trailer to report to PTI's office 0800 hrs 11 Jun 73 released approx 1630 hrs on that day. Domiciliary tpt is to depart Kangaw 1830 hrs. Other transport will be detailed separately.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR COMPETITORS

- 1. General Rules. Rules will be as per Games and Sports in the Army. The Referee's decision is final.
- 2. Competitors will be called to the marshalling area up to 10 minutes prior to an event commencing. Any competitor not available once the event is in the Starter's hands will be disqualified.

Specific Events

- Backstroke. Competitors line up in the water facing the starter with both hands resting on the end of the pool. Standing on the purification pipe or in the gutter is not allowed. Any competitor leaving his normal position on the back before his foremost hand has touched the end of the course, for the purpose of turning or finishing, shall be disqualified.
- 4. <u>Butterfly.</u> When touching at the turn or at the finish of the race, this will be done with both hands.
- 5. Breast Stroke. Up and down movements of the legs in a vertical plane are not allowed. Touching shall be as for Butterfly. Swimming under the surface is prohibited except for one arm pull and one leg kick after the start and turn.

General

1. Exercise MIDWAY was a battalion exercise conducted in training area BRAVO.

Aim

2. To revise and practise the phases of defence and withdrawal in limited war.

Duration

3. The exercise was conducted during the period 11-20 Jun 73.

Location of HQ 6 RAR

4. HQ 6 RAR remained static during the exercise period and was located at GR 653493.

Commanding Officer

5. The CO 6 RAR was Lt Col J.B. Healy.

Exercise Organisation

- 6. Enemy forces, controlled by HQ 6 RAR were provided by:
 - a. 1 RNZIR; and
 - b. AT Pl 6 RAR.

Supporting Forces

- 7. Supporting 6 RAR during the exercise were elements from:
 - a. 106 Fd Bty 28 ANZUK Fd Regt;
 - b. 28 ANZUK Fd Sqn; and
 - c. 28 ANZUK Avn Sqn.

Concept of Exercise

As the battalion has had little recent experience in this type of activity it was decided the initial tempo would be slow enough to allow all ranks to have adequate time to correctly apply principles and procedures essential in defence. This approach was considered successful and many evident mistakes were quickly noted and corrected.

9. An exercise brigade headquarters was established to add realism and practise HQ 6 RAR in command post procedures.

- 12. Location of A Echelon. GR 671501.
- 13. Fuel. A limited supply of aviation and MT fuel was pre positioned at the echelon.
- 14. Ammunition. Additional reserves of ammunition were held at the echelon.
- 15. Rubbish. All rubbish in the exercise area was backloaded to the echelon.
- 16. Special Equipment. Sub-units were required to carry GPMG tripods, C2 sights and MAWs.

17. M:dical.

- a. The following personnel were employed:
 - (1) RMO 6 RAR located at HQ 6 RAR; and
 - (2) stretcher bearers with each sub-unit.
- b. A total of 8 NO DUFF casualties were evacuated during the exercise period.

Communications

18. The echelon was equipped with HF facilities to HQ 6 RAR (rear) at Kangaw Barracks.

- 19. The battalion command net was VHF.
- 20. Land line was laid down to platoon level, and once operational became the main means of communication within the battalion with VHF used as alternative means.
- 21. All major patrol activities were controlled by the battalion VHF command net.

Destruction of Blinds

- 22. All suspect and faulty pyrotechnics were destroyed in the exercise area by the engineer detachment. This included a total of 82 M15 and M16 simulators.
- 23. Trip flares once armed were destroyed by respective sub-units prior to movement from the exercise area.

LESSONS LEARNT AND OBSERVATIONS

General

- It is evident the unit requires further practise in defence techniques. With past priorities and emphasis on CRW the defence phase has been sadly neglected.
- 25. It should further be noted that although many of the lessons learnt may appear to be quite basic they are never the less recorded for posterity and to assist the battalion in future training activities of this nature. To illustrate the need for this there was a number of soldiers and junior NCOs who had not applied defence skill since basic infantry training.
- 26. Indeed the battalion does not make any claim to new ideas. Simply from our mistakes have we relearnt lessons and standard procedures of the past. These too are recorded.

Artillery

- 27. The support given by the BC and FO parties was sound.
- 28. No difficulties were experienced in the command post.
- 29. Shell and mortar report procedures were practised. In all cases quick and effective action was taken by the artillery representatives. The following points were noted.
 - a. Infantry sub-units tended to offer too much initial information during hostile artillery/mortar fire when only grid reference of observer and bearing to the primary were necessary to provide the artillery representative with rapid and accurate information.
 - b. When possible reports should be channelled via the FO and BC to minimise traffic on the command net.
 - c. The detailed reporting to higher headquarters of hostile artillery and mortar fire should be left to the artillery representative.

/30.

- The delay in granting clear ground for fire missions was considerably reduced due to the set pre-planned and adjusted targets.
- 31. The use of an airborne FO during daylight withdrawals proved to be of value. The need for security in withdrawal operations was not over-looked.

Air

The employment of a helicopter to observe the defensive position from the air and detect camouflage flaws was of value.

Engineers

- 33. The use of engineer plant and advisers to assist in the construction of the command post and regimental aid post saved valuable man hours.
- When feasible the deployment and operation of plant forward prior to the arrival of the main body is strongly recommended.

HQ GRAR

and the state of t

- 35. As opposed to CRW operations there was less demand on the command post staff. Consequently in normal periods of activity a duty officer radio operator and artillery representative were found to be adequate in the command post.
- Apatrol forecast and programme chart was found to be essential. All relevant details were included as soon as planned/confirmed by brigade headquarters. The chart was positioned to allow easy access and study by the duty officer.
- 37. In the type of warfare practised contact reports were not considered necessary. Brief situation reports were found adequate. It is also interesting to note that many personnel insisted on referring to the main position as a fire support base.
- There is a definite requirement to produce a large sketch map of locations, obstacles, fixed lines etc as soon as possible after occupation.
- 39. As detailed in staff duties patrol forecasts were submitted to higher headquarters 48 hours in advance.
- 40. The use of runners should be considered.
- 41. There is a need to include certain aspects of defence in unit SOPs.
- Ammunition states should be forwarded daily or as requested to HQ 6 RAR.
- 43. There is an advantage in the RSM being located at the command post during "stand to" after he has completed perimeter checks.
- 44. Consideration should be given to alternating the direction of clearing patrols.

- 45. In defence, sector commanders are to ensure:
 - a. regular inspections of weapons, ammunition, equipment and clothing are conducted;
 - b. compulsory rest periods allocated;
 - c. progressive camouflage is enforced;
 - d: track discipline is enforced while it is essential for a track plan on occupation;
 - e. cutting of timber is supervised;
 - f. equipment is packed after use;
 - g. passage of information down;
 - h. FFI's are conducted at regular intervals; and
 - i. no bunching occurs,
- In lengthy periods of defence there is the danger of personnel, (particularly in headquarters) of becoming bored. Consideration should be given to:
 - a. allotting members to patrols;
 - b. interchanging within the headquarters to create interest and provide reserves within the headquarters organisation.
- 47. A regular news sheet distributed within the battalion would assist in maintaining morale and passage of information.
- 48. There was a dangerous tendency for HQ 6 RAR personnel to leave weapons and equipment above ground level during artillery and mortar attacks. The implications are evident.
- Difficulty was encountered in camouflaging the command post. On future activities HQ 6 RAR should be allocated one camouglage net to assist in camouglage.

Patrolling

- It was comforting to note that in mearly all cases enemy movement by night and day was detected well in advance thus providing the main position with adequate warning.
- 51. All patrols received a minimum of 36 hours warning. In particular all patrols were briefed and debriefed by the intelligence section.
- 52. All patrols were allotted call signs on the command net.

/53.

- It is essential that all standing patrols dig in quickly and have adequate fire power to stand and fight if required. More detailed study of standing patrols is required within the battalion.
- The importance of set procedures and accurate counts of members of a returning patrol was illustrated. Three enemy (deliberately given the task) infiltrated a company position by moving in undetected on the tail end of a friendly patrol forced to return at last light. Casualties would have occurred.
- The importance of briefing patrols on action to be taken if the main postion is attacked must not be overlooked.

Sub-Units

- There is evidence of misunderstanding of battle procedure for this type of activity at sub-unit level.
- In some cases sub-units neglected to adequately prepare administratively for the exercise. As a result there were unnecessary demands on echelon and HQ 6 RAR (rear) for items which had initially be overlooked.
- It is important that soldier/s be policed to ensure their equipment and weapons are carried at all times when moving away from his/their weapon pit.
- Loose steel picquets etc left in the open will add to the shrapnel in the event of hostile shelling/mortaring.
- 60. Fixed lines for GPMGs in many cases were neglected. Some soldiers were not completely aware of the mothods available.
- 61. Range cards in some areas were non existent.
- 62. It is evident more attention needs to be paid to sand bagging techniques within the battalion.
- Although by the end of the exercise there was a marked improvement in the skill and knowledge required for weapon pits, certain faults remained:
 - a. poor camouflage;
 - b. loose spoil obstructing the firer and offering no protection;
 - c. incorrect dimensions;
 - d. lack of drainage; and
 - e. inadequate overhead protection.
- 64. Soldiers tended to wait until the position was receiving mortar fire before taking cover instead of reacting when hearing the primaries.
- There were various interpretations on the dimensions required for a weapon pit at stage one. This has been rectified.

/66.

- 7 -

- 66. Sub-units encountered difficulties in ensuring a correct routine in defence was established. This was mainly due to the lack of understanding by many junior NCOs and soldiers.
- Bunching became evident on occasions such as the issue of hot meals. This was corrected.
- An experiment in fire lanes was conducted. Each rifle company was given a separate task, i.e. clear completely, thin out and fire lanes only. From enemy comments the "fire lanes only" were most effective. Enemy soldiers were not aware of their existence until actually in one. It is also interesting to note that in all three cases the clearing activities were difficult to detect from the air.
- 69. Sentries must be dug in.

GPMG Tasks

- 70. A total of three battalion GPMG DF tasks were selected. One to each forward company. It became evident as the exercise progressed there was a requirement to specify the number of rounds to be fired, then repeat on order. This procedure eliminated initial confusion.
- 71. The C2 sight proved to be value, particularly on preparation of fixed lines at night.

Communications

- 72. Even during periods of heavy traffic the use of line proved an acceptable means of communication.
- 73. All line must be dug in. This is essential to prevent unnecessary breaks, particularly from hostile artillery/mortar fire.
- 74. Consideration should be given to the erection of reserve aerials.
- 75. ANZUK Sig Sqn provided an intercept service to record all security breaches.
- 76. On contact it is essential for a partyline by telephone to be established between HQ 6 RAR and all companies.
- 77. There is a need to train more morse operators within the signals platoon.

Medical

- A camouflage net should be allocated to provide/assist in camouflage of the regimental aid post.
- 79. The medical officer should not move forward to casualties.
- 80. The medical section is to include in the check list lighting for the regimental and post.
- 81. The preparation and positioning of stretchers at both the regimental aid post and at all sub-units is required if there is to be no delay with movement of casualties.

/82.

- 8 -

82. It must be stressed on drivers the urgent need to camouflage their vehicle once stationary.

Administration

- 83. Although an improvement in the accuracy of nominal rolls was noted a requirement still exist for more attention to detail.
- 84. It is considered vehicle traffic between the echelon and the main position was too heavy and operationally unrealistic. The possibility of vehicle movement forward being severely limited or restricted to hours of drakness is real.
- 85. Control and allocation of stores on the main position was difficult. A solution appears to be:
 - a. a centralised holding of defence stores on the main position;
 - b. sub-units issued on demand from the main position,; and
 - c. the central defence store replaces the items by demanding on echelon.
- The major administrative flaw noted was the disturbing number of items indented for within hours of the exercise commencing.
- 87. The echelon was practised in patrolling activities.
- 88. Movement rear of the main position should never be considered secure, particularly in close country where infiltration is not difficult.

OBSERVATIONS ON CURRENT STORES/EQUIPMENT

- 89. Comments on stores as for previous exercise reports remain valid.
- 90. The C2 sight and GPMG tripod are a definite asset particularly in defence.

Recommendations

- 91. <u>Camouflage Nets.</u> The issue of individual camouflage nets to assist in camouflage of weapon pits etc should be considered. There is a definite requirement.
- 92. Fans. Fans operated by battery should be issued for use in the regimental aid post and command post.

CONCLUSION

- 93. The exercise was extremely rewarding to all ranks.
- 94. Enemy activities were well conducted and contributed to the success of the exercise.
- The battalion was deliberately given limited information prior to the exercise to test reaction and efficiency. In deed, it could be argued that more detailed and explicit instructions were necessary prior to the exercise. However, in past years there has been a tendency for excessive paperwork, instructions and supervision in preparation for exercises. The ability of a battalion to mount an operation/exercise with minimum orders is considered an essential requirement to test all aspects of professional efficiency within the unit.
- 96. Not foregoing the previous comment there would be definite advantages in preceding an exercise of this nature with:
 - a. TEWTS on defence; and
 - b. training in defence techniques/skills.



OPENING NARRATIVE - EXERCISE MIDWAY

- 1. North Fantasia, a democratic republic has in recent years been subject to subversive and aggressive action from the bordering communist state of South Fantasia.
- 2. In 1972 in view of the deteriorating situation 28 ANZUK Bde was committed to operations in North Fantasia, and assisted in a War of Attrition against the Freedom Fighter Movement (FFM). The FFM although supplied and reinforced by South Fantasia were operating in company strength and their activities were directed mainly towards assassination of government officials, small scale attacks and terrorism.
- 3. By January 1973, encouraged with military successes, nation wide protests in ANZUK nations over increasing ANZUK involvement and what appeared to be a general lack of enthusiasm by SEATO to become involved in a Vietnam type conflict South Fantasia decided to strike. It decided on an overt invasion of the republic using regular forces in conjunction with the FFM.
- 4. In general outline the plan was as follows:
 - a. 101 Army. Advance, using as axis, the east coast road via Kota Tinggi, Mersing with final objective Kuantan.
 - b. 102 Army. Advance, with central main road as axis via Keluang, Rompen with final objective Temerloh.
 - c. 103 Army. Advance using as axis the west coast road to capture Port Dickson and Kuala Lumpur.
- By March 1973 when the liberation plan became evident 1 Common-wealth Division was committed to the area of which 28 ANZUK Bde now became part. Initially the division was held in reserve.
- 6. The invasion by South Fantasia demonstrated the typical characteristics of an enemy noted in previous Asian conflicts. Speed, mobility, infiltration, aggressive employment of armour and artillery were used with excellent results. On all three axis the enemy enjoyed initial success.
- Jemulang Keluang. The enemy had suffered heavy losses particularly from North Fantasia air power and were now regrouping. The delay caused by Allied forces had not been without heavy losses. Allied air power was virtually non existent and although the US 7th Fleet was within striking distance, it had as yet not been committed by its government. The Commonwealth Division's organic air support was now severely reduced. Several Divisions of the North Fantasian Army were regrouping after severe mauling. One Brigade had been placed under command of 1 Commonwealth Division.
- 8. The Commonwealth Division was given the task of defending Keluang and denying the enemy movement north along the central axis. The Divisional Commander, well aware of his opponents past record in "by passing" strong areas of opposition was concerned over the eastern flank where if a break through occurred, a new threat would be added to the Allied Division defending Jemaulang as well as isolating his Division from the east. His suspicious were confirmed when intelligence revealed that:

- a. the main thrust would be along the central axis; and
- b. enemy interest in the track system running hrough area B.
- 9. 28 ANZUK Bde with one North Fantasian Battalion under command was given the task of protecting the eastern flank by securing the area B road and denying enemy approaches from the south east and south west.

 1 RHF and 6 RAR were to deploy screens forward of the main brigade position. The screen task for 6 RAR was given to C Coy by CO 6 RAR.
- 10. It is anticipated the enemy will recommence his offensive no later than last light on 15 Jun 73.

TOPOGRAPHY

- 1. General. Due to the nature of the exercise and other units located in the area the training area was extremely limited.
- 2. Relief was as indicated on the map with no significant changes noted.
- Rivers and Creeks. These were as shown on the map. The swamp area indicated was found to be inundated to a depth of up to 2 feet in the area patrolled.
- 4. Bridges. The bridges detailed on the map are estimated to be Class 10 however, these are very narrow and extreme caution should be exercised by vehicle drivers at these points.
- Roads/Tracks. The road from the main KELUANG JEMALUANG Road is a 4th class road which has a laterite surface. It is an all weather road for light vehicles but may be impassible to heavy vehicle during wet periods.
- 6. Weather. The weather generally was fine with clear skies. On a small shower was experienced during the period.
- 7. Water. The majority of rivers and streams were running however, they were dirty. The unit collected drinking water from the Keluang Water Supply.
- 8. Local Civilians. Several forestry workers and timber cutters were sighted on the track into the exercise area.
- 9. LZs. All IZs located are detailed on Appendix 1 Annex B.



ANZUK FORCE COMMANDER'S COMMENDATION

Private M.J. Armstrong, 2797827 6th Battalion Royal Australian Regiment

Private Armstrong of the 6th Battalion Royal Australian Regiment has served in the Regular Army since July 1971 following his National Service. During the 28 ANZUK Brigade Exercise "King Cobra", Private Armstrong was acting as a Platoon stretcher bearer. On the night of 9/10 April 1973 at about 1915 a member of the Platoon became violently ill with what appeared to be severe heat exhaustion. Private Armstrong took charge of the situation and directed other members of the Platoon as to the treatment to be administered whilst he arranged for the symptoms to be passed by radio to the Regimental Medical Officer.

At this stage the soldier was suffering from severe cramps, nausea, stomach pains and was semi-conscious. The condition of the soldier continued to deteriorate and at one stage he stopped breathing. Private Armstrong immediately applied mouth to mouth resuscitation until breathing was restored and he continued to give treatment until a medical evacuation helicopter arrived at approximately 2100.

Throughout this incident Private Armstrong displayed a high standard of leadership and a willingness to accept responsibility in excess of what is normally expected from a private soldier with limited medical training. I commend Private Armstrong for his actions during the night of 9 April which undoubtedly saved the life of a member of his Platoon.

117. BOUNDS - PLACES, AREAS AND PREMISES OUT OF BOUNDS

- 1. The following places are out of bounds to all ranks at all times:
 - a. brothels (including 'Male brothels');
 - opium dens and all other places used in connection with or for indulgence in harmful drugs eg; opium, heroin, cocaine, morphine, Indian hemp, marijuana etc;
 - c. unregistered massage establishments;
 - d. all tattooist shops;
 - e. bars and restaurants of the Sembawang Village area between 0145 hours and 0600 hours daily;
 - f. all married quarters, hirings and married families estates/areas except for:
 - (1) lawful occupants;
 - 2) properly authorised personnel on duty;
 - (3) guests duly invited by the occupants; and,
 (4) visitors having the permission of such person in authority or having a legitimate reason for making a visit; and,
 - g. all places used for the unauthorised presentation of shows, films etc.
- 2. In addition, from time to time certain areas will be placed out of bounds by the Service authorities. All ranks are to move out of such areas when so ordered and are not to return.
- 3. "Out of Bounds" signs are not displayed and it is the duty of all ranks to ensure that any area or premises they enter has not been placed out of bounds by this Order.
- 4. 6 RAR Routine Order 78/73 is cancelled.

118. IMPROPER POSSESSION OR CARRYING OF ARMS AND AMMUNITION

- 1. Civil and Military Law imposes severe penalties in respect of unauthorised carriage or possession of arms, explosives, etc.
- 2. All ranks are therefore forbidden:
 - a. to carry or to be in possession of any private firearm, ammunition or explosives whether serviceable or otherwise unless the possessor holds a current licence granted by the civil authorities for the said firearm, ammunition or explosives; and
 - b. to carry or to be in possession of any service firearm, ammunition or explosives of any kind except when in connection with a specific duty or when ordered by the appropriate service authority.

119. ANTI-MALARIA PRECAUTIONS

2 - 3

- 1. Anti-malaria precautions depend for success on training within sub-units, on good health discipline and on awareness by all personnel of the importance and reasons for, the measures required. Sub-units are reminded that the prevention of malaria requires a number of allied precautions to be rigidly observed by all personnel; the taking of Paludrine by itself is not sufficient.
- 2. Sub-units are to ensure that the necessary emphasis is given to health discipline training and to instructing all personnel in the full range of anti-malaria precautions.

 Maximum use is to be made of opportunities to send officers and soldiers on appropriate courses.
- Relevant orders are to be brought to the notice of all ranks immediately before exercises scheduled to take place in a malarial area.
- 4. Whenever possible, all soldiers on exercise are to be issued with their required dose of Paludrine daily by a nominated NCO who is to see that the soldier takes the Paludrine and is to record the issue in a daily roll book. In addition, all soldiers on exercise are to be issued with 7 days' supply of Paludrine, to be taken when formal daily issue is not possible; a record of this additional issue is also to be maintained. This additional precaution in no way absolves sub-units from supervising and recording the daily issue of Paludrine or from enforcing allied anti-malaria precautions when personnel are on exercise.
- 5. Sub-units are to remind all personnel at three-monthly intervals of the importance of continuing to take Paludrine for the stipulated period after they have been in a malarial area and have returned to barracks. These reminders are to cover warnings to families who travel into Malaysia and other malarial areas.
- Oefinitive instructions on anti-malaria precautions are included in ANZUK Base Standing Orders 199 "HEALTH".

122. CRIME PREVENTION - SALE OF PRIVATE CARS

- 1. Owners of private cars are warned that when selling their vehicles they should take the following precautions in order to prevent theft:
 - a. Do not allow the potential buyer to test drive the car without being physically present in the car during the drive.
 - b. Do not allow the potential buyer to have possession of the Car Registration Book until such time as the sale is fully completed. The owner should accompany the buyer if the Book is required to complete Hire Purchase formalities.
 - c. Do not allow the potential buyer to obtain possession of the car until such time as any cheque which he has presented in full or part payment for the car has been cleared by a Bank; this normally takes three days unless special arrangements are made.
- 2. In the event of a car being stolen, the facts should be reported immediately to the military and civil police.
- 3. Personnel are advised that the penalties for litter in SINGAPORE apply also to abandoned cars.

123. WEARING OF SAFETY BELTS IN VEHICLES

Reference: A. Manual of Army Safety paragraph 2004.

- 1. Where safety belts are fitted in Service vehicles all ranks of all services of ANZUK must wear them at all times when travelling as drivers or passengers.
- 2. Local Commanders have discretion to waive this rule, exceptionally for vehicles moving across country, or in other circumstances, where the wearing of safety belts is clearly inappropriate.

124. BREACH OF CUSTOMS REGULATIONS

- 1. A pamphlet "Australian Customs Information (Fourth Edition, Dec 72)" contains information for passengers travelling to Australia. It outlines Australian Customs requirements affecting passengers' baggage and explains the concessions available on arrival in Australia.
- 2. Customs Officers in Australia have recently preferred charges against a number of Servicemen for breaches of the Customs Act. It is understood that the substance of these charges will relate to the making of false declarations to Customs Officers and to the presentation of falsified receipts.
- 3. It is apparent that Australian Customs are strictly applying the provisions of the Customs Act and are preferring charges in cases of a breach. Therefore the attention of all members of 6 RAR is drawn to the requirement to strictly observe customs regulations when returning to Australia.

125. INSURANCE OF SERVANTS

- 1. The Singapore Workers' Compensation Act makes it compulsory for an employer to carry insurance against employers liability in respect of any workman employed by him. A penalty of a fine of up to \$4000 and/or one years imprisonment is provided for non-compliance.
- 2. Kebuns (gardeners) come within this definition, and all personnel employing such must take out this insurance at their own cost.
- 3. Domestic servants (amahs/cooks) are exempt from this requirement, but all personnel are strongly advised for their own protection to include them in such insurance cover. There have been cases in the past of the representatives of deceased amahs claiming extensive damages from servicemen and civil cases reveal that damages for death or personal injury can be well in excess of \$300,000.

127. PROPERTY TAX QUESTIONNAIRES

- 1. Several married members have received Property Tax Questionnaires for their Hirings and Married Quarters.
- 2. Any married member receiving such a questionnaire is to forward it to the Asst Adjt 6 RAR so that it may be completed by HQ ANZUK Spt Gp.

128. RAIL TRAVEL - MALAYAN RAILWAYS

- 1. Financial approval has been given for Travel Warrants to be issued for journeys on the Train Rengkas (Rapid Train) when the timings are more convenient than other trains.
- 2. The train operates between Singapore and Kuala Lumpur stopping at Johore Bahru, Kluang, Segamat, Gemas, Tampin and Seremban. It has only 2nd and 3rd Class accommodation.
- 3. Warrants issued for journeys on this train must be endorsed at the top "for travel by Train Rengkas".

129. DE FACTO RELATIONSHIPS

- 1. The Woodward Report, paragraph 83, recommended recognition of de facto relationships for all purposes of pay and allowances.
- 2. Administrative and legal problems inherent in such recognition have as yet not been resolved.
- 3. Existing policy on such relationships remains unchanged, namely, de facto relationships cannot yet be recognized for purposes of pay and allowances.
- 4. When outstanding issues are clarified, and AHQ Instruction will be issued detailing policy for recognition of these relationships.

130. WHOLE BLOOD SUPPLIES FOR THE ANZUK FORCE

- 1. Because of the size and establishment of the Pathology
 Department, ANZUK Military Hospital, it is not possible to operate
 a Blood Bank. The function of collection, typing, testing and
 storage of large quantities of donor blood is done by the Singapore
 Blood Transfusion Service (SBTS).
- 2. SBTS will supply blood free of charge to the ANZUK Force, on the understanding that they are assured of regular donations from Service sources. Units may anticipate a visit to their area about once every three months.
- 3. However, because of racial differences in the incidence of certain blood groups, SBTS will be unable to supply the ANZUK Force with large quantities of blood of these types. It will therefore be necessary for the ANZUK Force to maintain an emergency blood donor panel, so that life saving blood transfusions will be available for all servicemen and their families at all times.

- 4. All sub-units are to:
 - a. Give maximum publicity and encouragement to members when SBTS visit their area.
 - b. As at 30 Jun and 31 Dec each year, forward to the RAP a list of changes of volunteers for the Emergency Blood Donor Panel, setting out:
 - (1) number, name, rank of donor (relationship to serviceman if a dependant);
 - (2) blood group of Donor. (It is most important that this be checked thoroughly from regimental documents and all possibility of clerical error eliminated);
 - (3) home address and telephone number of Donor;
 - (4) a firm proposal for the method of contacting Donors in out-of-duty hours, and
 - (5) date of RTA of Donor.

131. MOSQUITO LARVAE SURVEYS - JULY 1973

- 1. ANZUK HMCS is to carry out routine surveys during Jul 73 in accordance with the programme shown below.
- 2. Surveys are made to detect mosquito breeding and/or potential mosquito breeding in unit/MQ areas. Where mosquito breeding is detected in MQs the occupant is informed, at the time of the visit, in writing.
- 3. "Domestic" mosquitoes breed profusely in even the smallest collection of stagnant water. Old tins, empty bottles, saucers under flower pots, coconut husks, blocked gutters/drains and old tyres are among the more common sources of trouble. Fire buckets should be emptied at least once weekly. Before refilling they should be thoroughly scrubbed internally and sun-dried. A very sound maxim is "NO STAGNANT WATER NO MOSQUITOES".
- 4. HMCS Inspectors and their assistants who carry out these surveys are in possession of a unit "authority" card and wear a green identification badge on their left breast pocket.
