GENERAL

- 2. Entries are to be made daily on AF C 2118 (Adapted) each entry being initialled by the officer detailed to keep it.
- 3. Commanders Diaries will conform with the rules for drafting orders given in "Staff Duties (Australia)" Chapter 2, Section 12.

RESPONSIBILITY

During Non-operational Periods

4. A Commanders Diary is to be compiled by commanders of all formations.

During Operational Periods (1)

- 5. A Commanders Diary is to be compiled in duplicate by:
 - a. Commanders of all formations.
 - b. Each branch of the staff at formation headquarters commanded by a brigadier or above.
 - c. Heads of services not below the rank of lieutenant colonel.
 - d. Personal staffs and officers holding special appointments.
 - e. Unit commanders.
 - f. Commanders of a detachment of a unit when so ordered.

COMPILATION

- 6. Both original and duplicate copies are to consist of:
 - a. Cover (AF C 2119) (Adapted).
 - b. Index as printed on cover.
 - c. Narrative (AF C 2118) (Adapted).
 - d. Annexes as shown in the Index.
- 7. All details of the unit or formation (if a detachment is concerned, the name of the parent unit), period covered and enclosure numbers of the annexes are to be shown on the cover. If there has been a change of command since the last report, the date of assumption by the new commanding officer is to be included.

GENERAL

- 1. November 1970 must surely be remembered as one of the most critical times for 110 Sig Sqn. The tremendous workload for October spilled over into November, and with the transfer of the Major Relay Station and Senior System Control from Saigon to Vung Tau, combined with a significant changeover of personnel and poor propagation conditions on the National Rear Link, the squadron has been at near maximum pressure. It is to the credit of all ranks that all signals continued to get THROUGH, and that relatively few were inordinately delayed.
- 2. Highlights of the month were:
 - a. Cut-over of final circuits from Saigon to Vung Tau.
 - b. Transfer of stores and personnel from Saigon to Vung Tau as part of the reorganization.
 - c. Opening of the Australia "Call Home" Telephone service.
 - d. Extremely poor circuit conditions on the Melbourne-Vung Tau link.
 - e. A drop in traffic handling efficiency because of the poor Melbourne link, and the cut-over of all circuits to Saigon with a resultant settling-in period.
 - f. The arrival of two AN/MTC-1 shelters, and the non-arrival of certain associated CES stores.
 - g. The erection of the second transmit VLPA.
 - h. Two highly successful unit lectures.
 - i. Supply of 800 lbs of food to RVNAF Signal School for a Scout Jamboree.
 - j. A Subject C Course.
 - k. Arrival of the new Commander 1 ALSG.
 - 1. Visit by the CGS.
 - m. Start of work on the new Q Store.
 - n. Filming of the unit by the Army Film Unit.

TAPE RELAY TRAFFIC

Traffic Figures

- 3. MRS Traffic Summary. Annex A.
- 4. Coincidental with its move from Saigon to Vung Tau, the MRS handled 104,300 transactions, its heaviest workload since Sep 69, and one of the all-time highs. This could not have come at a worse time.
- Percentage variations over 5% in comparison with last month's figures are:
 - a. From Melbourne. A 5.1% increase.
 - b. To Melbourne. A 7.1% increase.
 - c. From AFV Comcen. A 10.6% increase.
 - d. To AFV Comcen. A 9.9% increase.
 - e. From Phan Rang. A 16.6% increase.
 - f. To Phan Rang. A 14.5% increase.
 - g. From Nui Dat. A 17.9% increase.
 - h. From Long Binh. A 9.3% decrease.
 - i. To Long Binh. A 10.9% decrease.

Traffic Analysis

- 7. Long Term Trends. Annex C.
- 8. Rerun figures remain alarmingly high and are greater than October figures, however the trend is now down again as the system settles back to normal and propagation conditions on the National Rear Link slowly improve.
- 9. All operators working in the environment of a new MRS, and especially new arrivals, were bewildered at the amount of traffic passing through, and the number of service messages. A special section working twenty-four hours a day had to be set up to cope with the volume of service traffic, and Op Tp as a whole is to be congratulated for coping with the situation with stubborn persistence and ears deaf to criticism. Despite this, there is a need for increased supervision of operators, and better service and multi-route positions. Two keyboard training positions are also planned for installation during December. Operators new to the squadron will join shifts via the training positions.

OTHER COMMUNICATIONS

1 ALSG Switchboard (Emu)

../10.

10. The long awaited AN/MTC-1 shelters arrived on 7 Nov and were quickly placed on cement plinths outside the MRS, and abutted to the wall of the exchange room. Unfortunately certain critical CES stores failed to arrive, and CSO AFV is still negotiating for them. Until they arrive the 1 ALSG telephone system has to bend to the whims of the old Emu. Visitors to the exchange are often staggered to find a technician inside the board. We are frightened to let him out.

Signal Dispatch Service

- a. SDS figures were:

- b. The total vehicle mileage was 2311 miles shared by two DR vehicles.
- c. The two DR vehicles are awaiting painting. At this stage they will present a new image to 1 ALSG with bright vehicles, a large clear SDS sign, armbands, and blue inner helmets with a white band and "DR" in red.
- 12. HQ AFV. Two vehicles shared 1599 miles during the month delivering mail, ADS and Safehand Bags.

Air Dispatch Service

- 13. ADS figures for the month were:
 - a. ADS Bags. 178.
 - b. Safehand Bags. 87.

Radio

- 14. A summary of activities for the month follows:
 - a. 2 Sqn RAAF Phan Rang. This HF back-up circuit has not performed well because of faults at both ends, and poor frequencies. It was successful at the last weekly test, and during December, a new antenna is to be erected at Vung Tau.
 - b. AFV Emergency Frequency. Permanent listening watch was maintained on this frequency.
 - c. Vung Tau-Nui Dat-Saigon. AN/GRC-106 back-up comms were tested regularly. A new HF antenna is to be erected at Saigon.
 - d. Shipping. Schedules were worked with:
 - (1) HMAS Perth. Good comms 17-18 Nov.
 - (2) HMAS Jeparit. The vessel was contacted on 24 Nov on her most recent voyage to SVN. At this time she was at the tip of Cape York.

- 4 - DESTRICTED

- (3) AV Harry Chauvel. Nineteen messages were passed during the month.
- e. Radio Australia. Monitoring of transmissions continued daily with good results.
- f. 1 ALSG Defence Net. One breach of security was notified to HQ 1 ALSG during the month. The standard of Radiotelephone procedure remains poor.
- g. Security Monitoring. Det 110 Sig Sqn Nui Dat reported the following security breaches during the month:
 - (1) Two breaches on radio relay telephone trunks.
 - (2) Eleven breaches on VHF nets in the 1 ATF TAOR.

Communication Centres

- 15. 1 ALSG Comcen. A number of minor telegraph machine faults have occurred demanding that we have a closer look at our maintenance programme. Overall, the Comcen is running very efficiently.
- 16. HQ AFV Comcen. The old air-conditioning units are faulty and at times conditions are almost intolerable for operators and equipments. CE's staff have been trying to remedy the situation for nearly two months.

Tape Relay Stations

- 17. MRS Saigon closed on 5 Nov, and the building is being converted into a new Orderly Room and small Q Store.
- 18. The new MRS at Vung Tau is a decided improvement on past installations, but still requires the following work to be done:
 - a. Two additional receive consoles for the proposed 2 AOD circuit and spare positions.
 - b. Two more transmit consoles to cater for the 2 AOD circuit, the Phan Rang RATT back-up, and spare positions.
 - c. A better multi-route position located against the side wall instead of an island counter in the centre of rather a narrow room.
 - d. An improved services position.
 - e. Two keyboard training positions for new operators.
 - f. An efficient Circuit Outage Indicator Board common to both Traffic Hall and Syscon.

Australia "Call Home" Telephone System

19. The Call Home service was inaugurated on 7 Nov.

- 5 - RESTRICTED

- 20. The Australia circuit is accepted from the civilian agencies by Syscon Saigon at 0800 hrs daily, and handed in turn to Nui Dat, Vung Tau and Saigon for use by soldiers on a reverse-charge basis at \$12 for three minutes to Australia, and \$13 for three minutes to New Zealand. Daily allocation of the service is:
 - a. Nui Dat. (Pearson Club) 0800-1600 hrs.
 - b. HQ AFV. (Duty Offr's Room) 1600-1700 hrs.
 - c. 1 ALSG
 - (1) YMCA

1700-1900 hrs.

(2) 1 Aust Fd Hospital

1900-2030 hrs.

The planning date for the introduction of the service was 5 Oct 70, however delays were occasioned by two faults in submarine cables between Hong Kong and Sydney. Currently it is working very well.

ENGINEERING

General

- 22. Telegraph Circuit Availability. Annex D.
- 23. The availability for in-country circuits remained at a satisfactory level, although an improvement is expected in December when the benefits of wiring changes made in the control area should become evident.

National Rear Link

- 24. November has undoubtedly been the worst month on record for rear link availability. Sunspot activity reached an unusually high level, and in an effort to anticipate solar storms and magnetic disturbances, WWVH IP warnings were monitored to overcome the late receipt of Melbourne IPSO warnings. On several occasions all HF frequencies were rendered unusable by disturbances.
- 25. The problem was compounded by the non-availability of the high power transmitter at Digger's Rest, and it is hoped that these will become available in the near future.
- Several deficiencies were discovered in our maintenance programme, and the relatively poor condition of antenna isolating units and the receive HLPA have not enhanced our chances of obtaining a useful signal when only poor signals are available. In addition several equipment panels were overloaded because poor signals were blamed.
- 27. The third receiver is to be moved to the Syscon area to allow maintenance to be carried out on the main receivers as soon as possible.
- 28. The increasing maintenance problem with the 1851 series of equipments (which was also experienced in Melbourne) should be an indication that replacement items may soon be necessary.

Vung Tau Transmitter Station

29. The second VLPA has been installed and testing commenced on the last day of the month.

Technical Maintenance Workshop

- The Vung Tau Workshop is still working at maximum pressure maintaining telegraph equipment, and bringing "acquired" equipments up to standard. With the influx of equipment, a tight maintenance programme and a lack of technicians trained on console equipment, this section of the workshop will be busy for at least a further two months.
- 71. Two MIJI LIFTS arrived during the month. P26 action is being processed to have them installed at Vung Tau and Saigon.
- 32. Cipher Workshops. The main cipher workshop together with the workshop stores account will be transferred from Saigon to Vung Tau in early Dec.

Upgrading of Nui Dat-Vung Tau Telegraph Circuit to 75 Baud Working

33. An attempt to convert to 75 baud working was made on 22 Nov. This proved unsuccessful, and the project has been shelved until 104 Sig Sqn obtains additional equipments capable of sustained working at the increased speed.

Australian Embassy Telegraph Link

34. Progress has been made on this project to a point where an unclassified telegraph link should be established in Dec.

Line and Antenna

- 35. Line. Apart from normal maintenance, tasks for the Line Sect were:
 - a. Renewal of indoor wiring at the R & C Centre.
 - b. Replacing of short runs of 25-pair cable at the ASCO Bulk Store.
 - c. Laying of three miles of D10 cable to provide telephone facilities for AV Harry Chauvel berthed at the Cat Lo Pier.
 - d. Installation of coaxial cable from Syscon to the HLPA.
 - e. Staying of poles on Cable 7 (to Air Base).

36. Antennae. Tasks were:

- a. Repair of HF antennae at HF House.
- b. Move of the Australian Forces Radio receive antenna to a new location at the RAAF base.
- c. Maintenance of the HLPA at Vung Tau. This has become a major job involving:
 - (1) Renewal of power wiring and conduit.
 - (2) Renewal of mast nuts and bolts.
 - (3) Renewal of inner guys.
 - (4) Freeing of seized bearings so that the antenna section will rotate.

d. Continuation of the Astromast trial. At this stage, although the 35 ft and 60 ft masts may have many uses, several joints and diagonal latches have been found to be unsatisfactory.

Deployment Troop

- 37. Deployment Tp dets remain at Nui Dat and The Horseshoe.
- RR System. The AN/TRC-24 link Nui Dat to The Horseshoe returned a circuit availability of 99.64%. This included a controlled outage of thirty minutes during which time a complete shelter was exchanged at The Horseshoe.
- Field Generators. Of the nineteen 10 KVA generators held, only three remain in workshops. This is the best situation for nearly a year. A total of five generators have had complete motor replacement. Water in the fuel, and the age of the generators accounted for the disturbing outage figures reported in Sep 70.
- 40. Field Accommodation. The Horseshoe installation has had a face-lift. In addition to having a new generator shed, the AN/MRC-69 shelter has been relocated, and a sturdy hut has been erected for personnel accommodation.

Projects

- 41. The Ops Room staff is hard at work with:
 - a. The design of the 2 AOD tributary station.
 - b. Planning modifications to the MRS.
 - c. Drawings for the modification of the Cipher Workshop.
 - d. Drawings for the safety fence around the transmit antennae.
 - e. Producing station wiring diagrams.

TRAINING AND DEFENCE

- 42. Range Practices. Normal weekly range practices were conducted.
- 43. Weekly Runs. Weekly runs of 1.5 miles in boots continued.
- 44. Subject C. Subject C coaching ended in a three-day course 27-29 Nov, with an exam on 30 Nov. Results were:

- b. All personnel in the unit who come in contact with crypto material and equipment were reminded of their responsibilities.
- 46. Patrols. Weekly patrols in the AOs surrounding the 1 ALSG area continued.

CONCLUSION

110 Sig Sqn is a large, busy and good unit. Its morale is as high 72. as any other unit, and a deal higher than some. All ranks are working long hours and working hard. They have weathered a major reorganization and a very difficult period with communications at a time when traffic built up to near record proportions in the MRS, propagation conditions to Melbourne were poor, and new personnel joined the squadron. It is distressing therefore to find that we are suspected of "mismanagement" of the Melbourne-Vung Tau link by a Directorate remote from practical communications in an overseas theatre.

It is anticipated that December will see an improvement in circuit availability, and a dramatic decrease in service traffic.
