RESPONSIBILITY

During Non-operational Periods

- 4. A Commanders Diary is to be compiled by commanders of all formations.

During Operational Periods (1)

- 5. A Commanders Diary is to be compiled in duplicate by:
  - a. Commanders of all formations.
  - b. Each branch of the staff at formation headquarters commanded by a brigadier or above.
  - c. Heads of services not below the rank of lieutenant colonel.
  - d. Personal staffs and officers holding special appointments.
  - e. Unit commanders.
  - f. Commanders of a detachment of a unit when so ordered.

COMPILATION

- 6. Both original and duplicate copies are to consist of:
  - a. Cover (AF C 2119) (Adapted).
  - b. Index as printed on cover.
  - c. Narrative (AF C 2118) (Adapted).
  - d. Annexes as shown in the Index.
- 7. All details of the unit or formation (if a detachment is concerned, the name of the parent unit), period covered and enclosure numbers of the annexes are to be shown on the cover. If there has been a change of command since the last report, the date of assumption by the new commanding officer is to be included.
- 8. The annexes are to be assembled in the groups shown on the cover. If there are no enclosures for an annex NIL will be entered on the cover. If additional annexes are convenient for a particular headquarters, starting at B.

**DISPOSAL**

MONTHLY REPORT - AUG 68

GENERAL

Movement of Transmitters and Squadron Headquarters

1. The evacuation of the PHU THO site was accomplished within the time frame required with no loss of circuit time on the rear link to AUSTRALIA. One transmitter and power supply was retained at PHU THO to provide dual transmission alternate at VUNG TAU until such time as the new installation was working satisfactorily. When the new transmitters at NUI DAT eventually assumed the primary function on the rear link the building they occupy was still under construction, and it is a credit to Det 127 Sig Sqn that they were able to provide a reliable, well installed communications facility in such haste and under such trying conditions. As at the end of the month the building was complete less interior painting, floor covering, a blast wall and the installation of the last air conditioning unit. It is expected that all construction will be complete in the near future.
2. Whilst the Squadron Headquarters was in transit, a temporary HQ was set up in FWMAO and though there were minor difficulties associated with the non-availability of Squadron files, this system functioned quite well. On arrival at VUNG TAU there were some problems in accommodation as the new buildings were not available. Temporary arrangements were made and though these were the best compromise under the circumstances they were not really adequate and the Q staff laboured under some difficulty until their building was complete enough for occupation.
3. Some significant timings of movement during the month of August were as follows:
  - a. First move of personnel - 4 Aug 68.
  - b. Move of main body - 7 Aug 68.
  - c. Tx closed down at PHU THO - 9 Aug 68.
  - d. All equipment less antennae clear of PHU THO - 11 Aug 68.
  - e. Antennae removed from PHU THO - 16 Aug 68.
  - f. Huts at PHU THO dismantled and removed - 19 Aug 68.
  - g. New Q Building at VUNG TAU occupied - 27 Aug 68.
4. A tremendous effort was required by all members of the squadron connected with the move and it was due to their conscientiousness and devotion to duty that the move was effected successfully. Special mention should be made of the unit Q staff in this regard, and in particular to Capt I.R. Willoughby who headed their small but effective organization.

Change of Command

5. The change of command from Maj C.R. Hook <sup>to</sup> ~~at~~ Maj P.L. Perman was effected on 6 Aug 68.

Squadron Reorganization

6. Squadron reorganization is now complete in the form shown at Annex A. It should be noted that the SAIGON Det is responsible for its own administration whereas the VUNG TAU Det which has a larger 'G' commitment is fostered by Squadron Headquarters.

COMMUNICATIONS

SAIGON Sigcen/MRS

7. The traffic volume handled by the Sigcen/MRS rose by 16% from 84,481 messages in July to a total of 100,014 messages for the period under review.

VUNG TAU Sigcen/MRS

8. The month of August saw an increase in traffic in the Sigcen/MRS from 28,764 to 30,023 messages, constituting a rise in traffic of approximately 10%.

SAIGON/MELBOURNE Circuit

9. Availability on this circuit averaged 83.7% per day for the month. It must be remembered that this circuit relies completely on AN/GRC-106 equipments. Antennas for these equipments consist of pieces of D10 cable strung from the 250 ft tower at the Free World Building. The signal received at Long Binh is only occasionally used as generally the signal strength is low. Improvement can be expected when the antenna work is completed at Long Binh.

NEW ZEALAND Embassy

10. A simple task of relocating several telephones within the New Zealand Embassy was surveyed and man hours estimated. The actual work will be undertaken towards the end of September.

Blast Wall for System Control SAIGON

11. Engineers commenced work on building blast walls around the System Control Building on 29 Aug 68. It is estimated that these will be completed by 16 Sep 68.

Line and Switchboard - VUNG TAU

12. a. Line.

(1) Tasks. The Line element completely rewired the 5 Coy RAASC telephone system during the month. D10 cable was used as a suitable two pair cable is unavailable in theatre. The ETTAMOGAH switchboard is to be deleted from the telephone directory.

(2) Faults. The faults on the telephone system were approximately an average of seven per week. These were mainly caused by aging D10 cable.

b. EMU Switchboard.

(1) Staffing. The switchboard element responsible for the operation of EMU at present is operating on a three shift system. A supervisor and three operators man the board during the day with two operators remaining on duty during the evening.

(2) Call Rate. The EMU switchboard is busier now than at any other time due to the extra extensions which now appear on the board. The call rate is calculated at 4500 calls per day.

In Country HF Circuits

13. All in country HF circuits continued to function well throughout the month.

TECHNICAL/EQUIPMENT ASPECTS

LONG BINH

14. Antennas. The rigger detachment at LONG BINH was required to dismantle the antennas at PHU THO, and work on the rhombics at the Rx station had to be suspended until 25 Aug 68. However, in the last few days of the month work progressed well and it is expected that the first of the antennas should be in service early in September.

15. VHF. Due to higher priority technical tasks and the reorganization within the Squadron, work on the VHF system was postponed; it is expected that a series of tests to select suitable frequencies will be conducted in early September.

FWMAO Area

16. Telegraph Equipment.

a. Cleaning of Equipments. The Det holds 130 telegraph machines of approximately 5 different types. Maintenance of telegraph equipment has been seriously hampered by the lack of cleaning equipment and fluids. However cleaning fluids have now been obtained and a concentrated work program is underway. Improvement is already noticeable especially in the increased availability of the Signals Centre circuit.

b. Dust Prevention. The ingress of dust to areas where telegraph equipment is working has become a major problem. Members entering these areas (when there has been a precipitation) carry in mud on their boots and in an air conditioned atmosphere this soon dries, drops on to the floor, and is crushed into dust by pedestrian traffic. Unfortunately this can not be prevented as the issue boot worn by members has a tread which lends itself to 'caking'. As a step towards the solution of this problem application has been made through HQ 1 ALSG for information concerning the catalogue number and nomenclature of ammunition overshoes, with a view to obtaining these items through the Ordnance system for wear by all members entering dust sensitive areas.

17. System Control Area. A new control console has now been installed in the control room. 1851A (send) equipment has been removed ready for installation at Vung Tau. A Sgt has now been placed in charge of System Control as a CSCO and improvements in log keeping and area cleanliness is now obvious.

VUNG TAU

18. Telegraph Equipment Repairs. Teleprinter repairs for the month amounted to thirty six. The major problems which occurred were selector faults. It is the opinion of the Foreman that the telegraph equipment held by this unit has reached the stage when, due to age, bearings and major components are showing wear. It is expected that this will increase the maintenance load in the next half year.

19. HF Radio.

a. The main problem in this area is still the lack of spare parts for the AN/GRC-106: the Long Day Scale does not meet the requirement. It is intended to investigate the discrepancies in the scale but this will be extremely difficult to do without access to part numbers and nomenclatures. In the mean time there is no alternative but to process unserviceable radio sets for which parts are not held through the RATPACK system and accept the consequent delays.

b. The major faults which occurred in AN/GRC-106 equipments during August may be attributed to turret tuners.

c. The AN/PRC-47 transceivers are all in good condition less one equipment which is awaiting parts.

20. VHF (AN/TRC-24). There have been malfunctions of equipments employed on bearer circuits and these were attributable to a weakness in the repair system. This matter has now been corrected.

21. Carrier Equipment. A programme of preventitive maintenance has been carried out during the month and this is now 75% complete. Most faults found so far are attributable to vacuum tubes.

22. HP Transmitter (HF). The E513 transmitter and its associated drive equipment requires realignment and general overhaul. Arrangements are in hand to complete this task over a 48 hour period in the near future.

NUI DAT

23. AUSTCAN Transmitter Station. The installation was officially accepted by 50 Sigs and handed to 110 Sig Sqn on Thu 22 Aug 68, though it had of necessity been operated by the user unit since 9 Aug 68. The station is operating efficiently and there is a marginal improvement over the PHU THO installation in circuit availability.

24. System Control. Work is progressing well on the re-installation of the system control room, and on present indications the work there should be completed by Mid-September. Meanwhile an AN/MRC-69 is providing the alternative facilities.

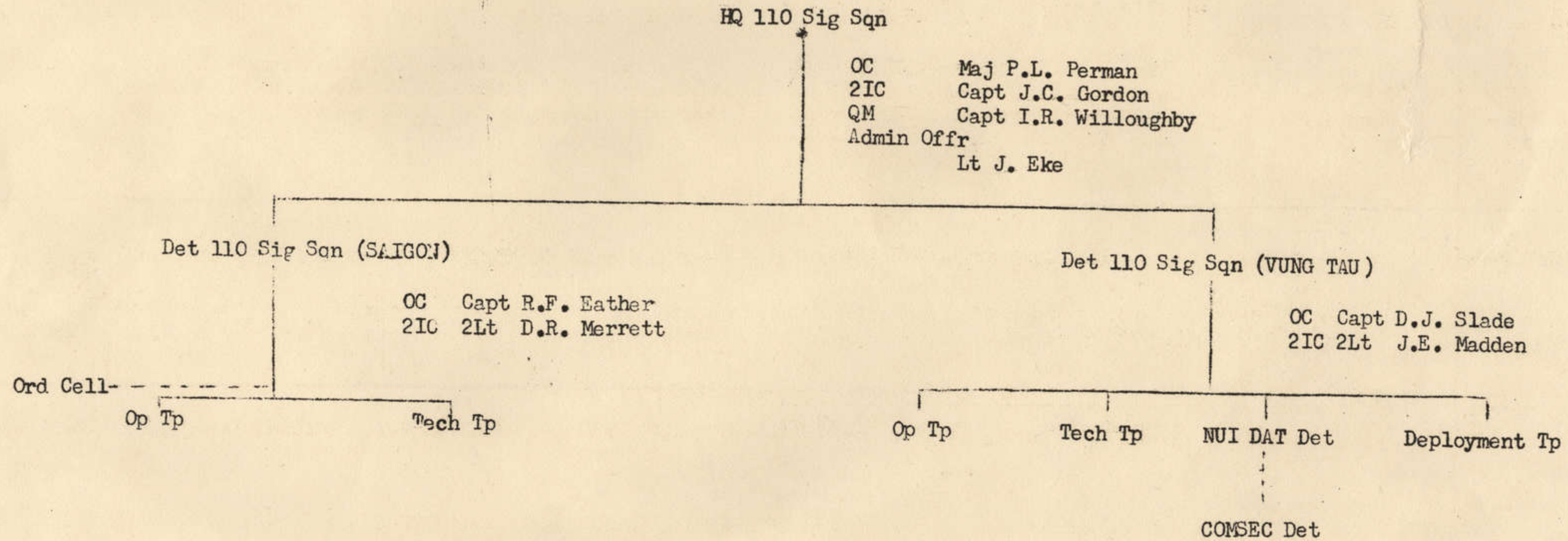

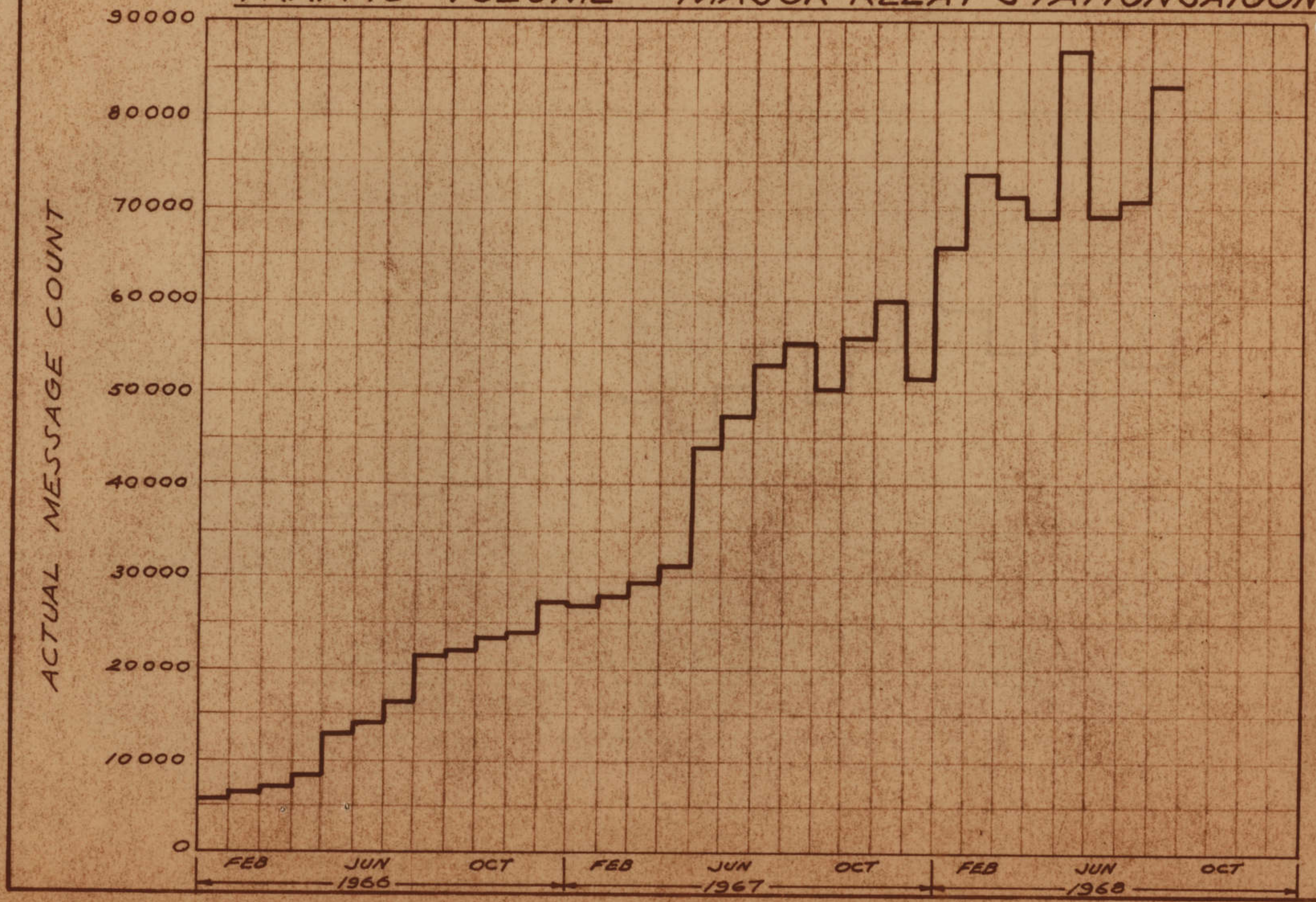

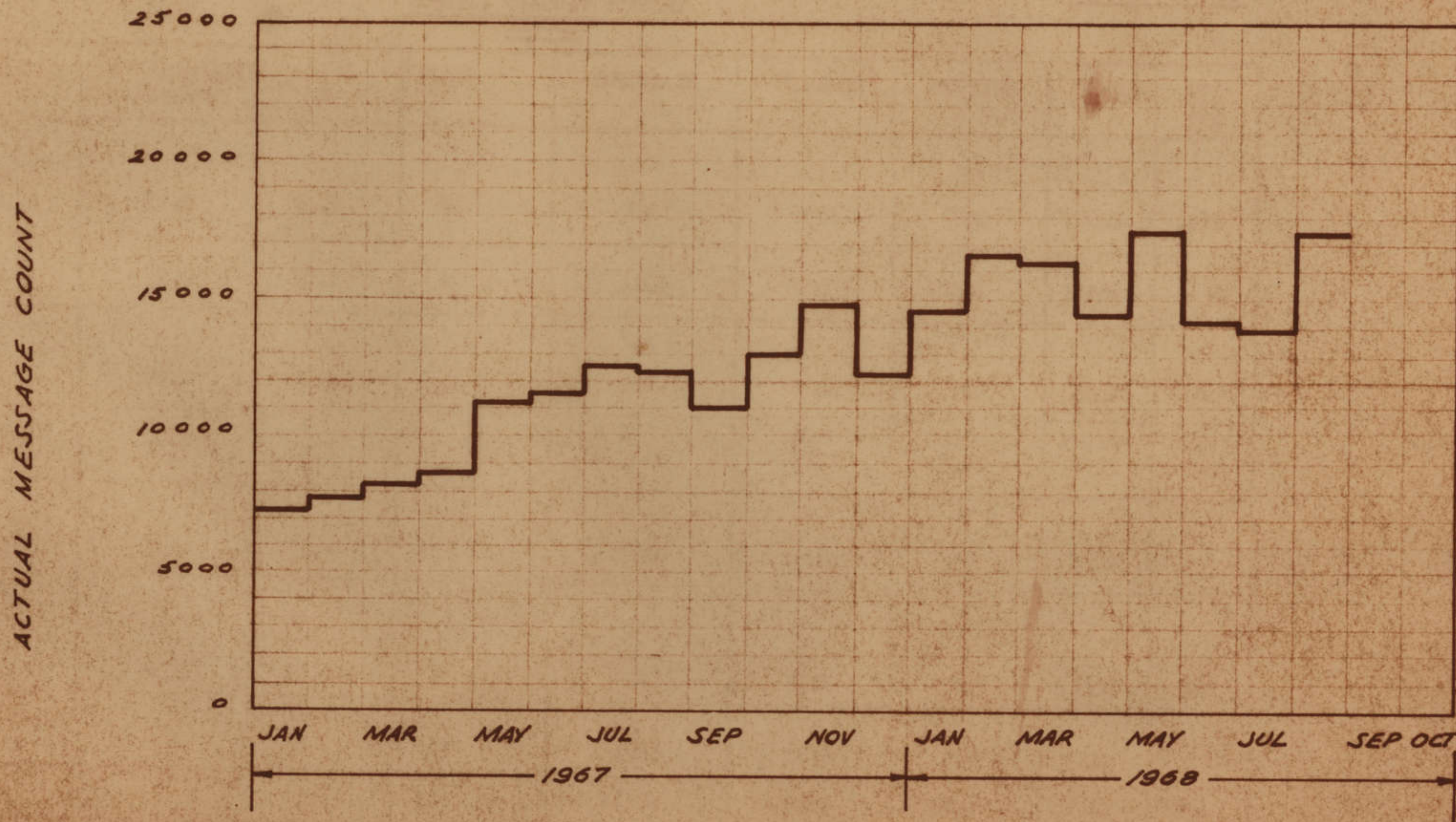

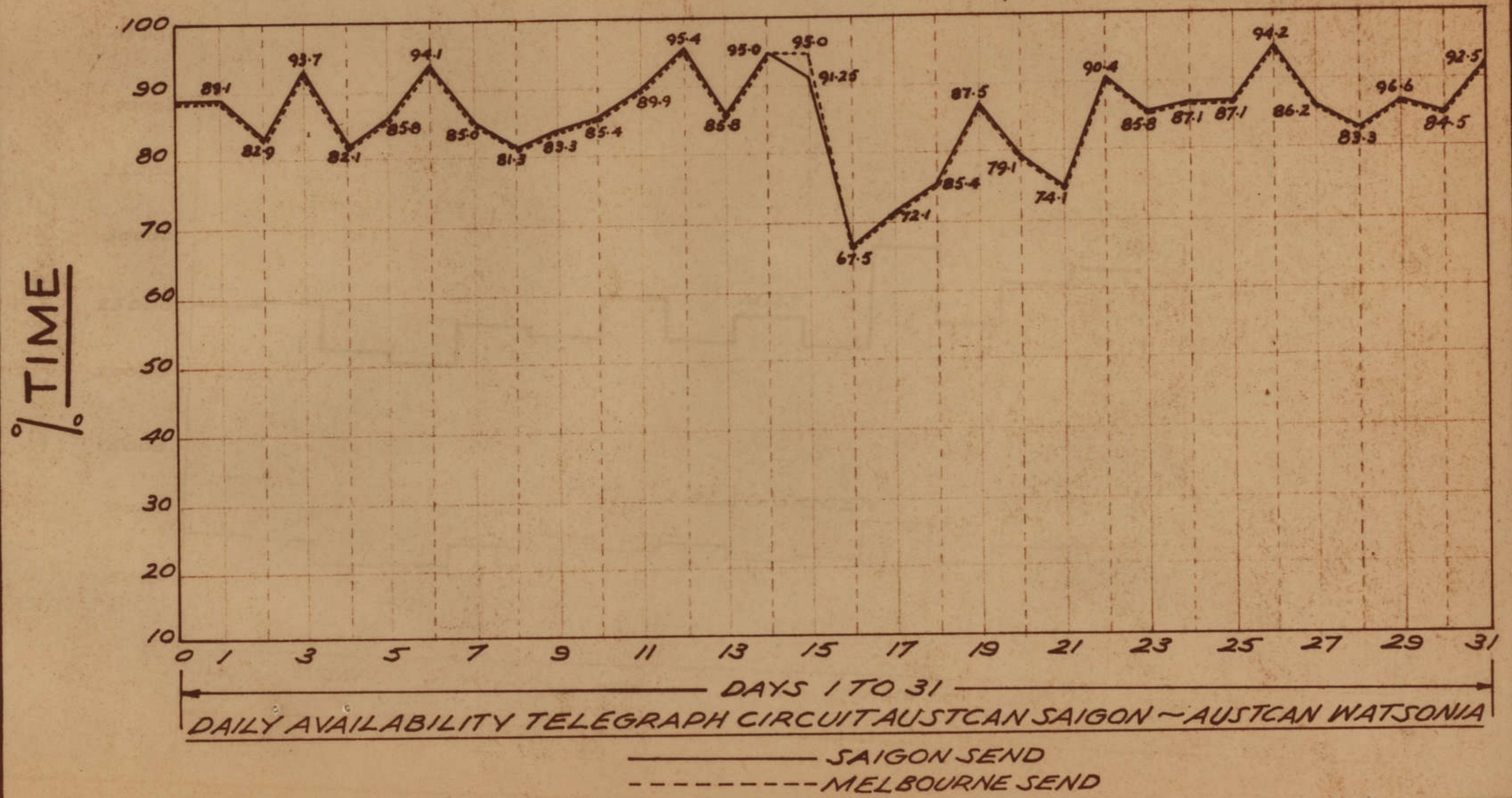

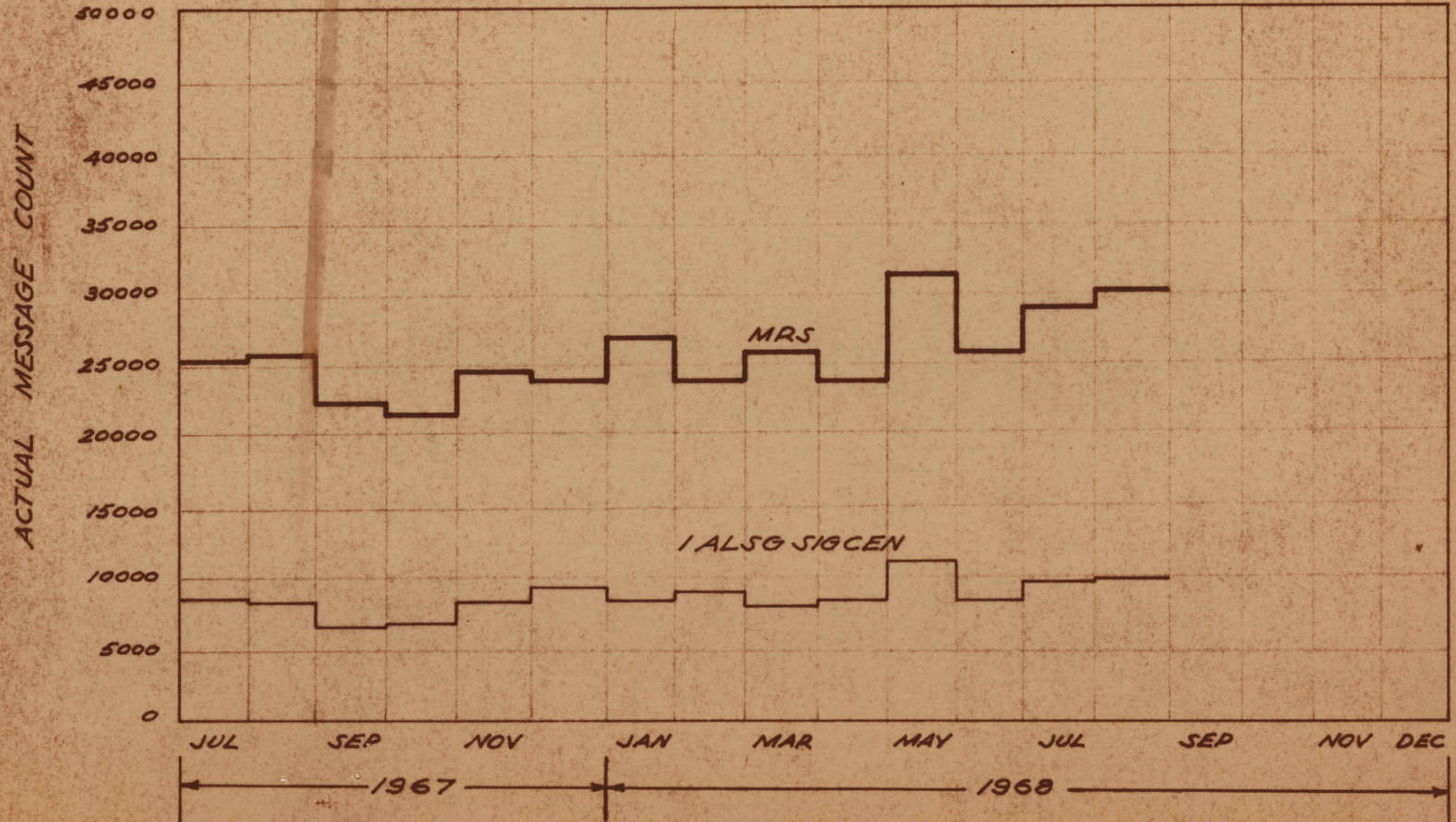
