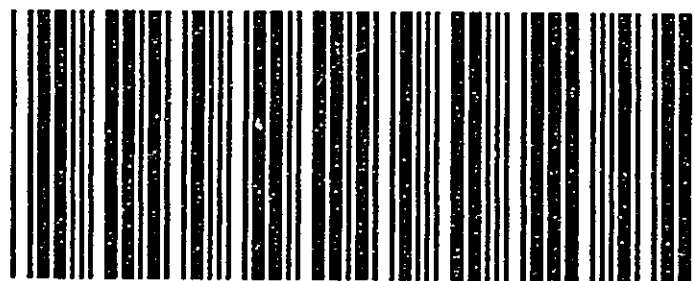

I was present at his funeral in the British Military Cemetery at Warloy on April 5th. There was a Padre present. He was a very short thick set chap, dark with a moustache, came from Murray Bridge.

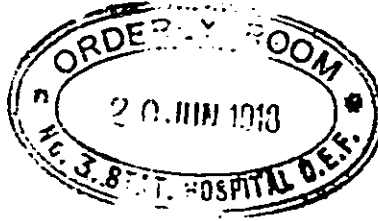
