

"I knew Don but not his number. His Christian name was Alec. He was one of B. Coy and Plat. VII or VIII. He was with a machine gun I believe, and was killed at Pozieres by a piece of shell which hit him in the head killing him instantly. I saw him about half an hour after he was killed. He was buried in a gap called Centre Way with three others. I have seen his grave. There was a cross with his name No. and Batt."

(K. Aug. 22/16. Dets D & B).

"Sometime during August, 1916, at Ploers, I heard that Don was blown to pieces. A man called Pte. G.A. Heath, 23rd A.I.F., B Coy. Scout section, told me I heard this news from several of the men. He was wounded on the back of the neck at Gallipoli, and afterwards he had enteric. He was in B Coy. 7th Pltn then. I saw him again in Egypt, he hadn't rejoined then. In France he rejoined, and was attached to D Coy."

Eye Witness. Pte. G.A. Heath, Scout Section, 23rd A.I.F. B Coy. told him.

"Killed in Action 22.8.16."

Concerning the death of the late Pte. A. Don 1509, B. Coy. 23rd Battn. A.I.F. I have known the late Pte. Don since leaving Australia which was on May 8th, 1915. He was of a reserved kind of person, tall fair complexion, hair turned grey. Pte. Don also informed me that he was the son of a Parson. He was killed instantaneously on our way into the trenches for the second time at Pozieres August of last year. I was only a few yards from him in the same trench when he met his end. He was buried alongside the trench in which he met his untimely end. I cannot say if a cross with his name on was ever erected, but I can assure you he was buried but not in a cemetery. Pte. Don was of temperate habits all the time I knew him. He was also wounded on Gallipoli coming out of the Lone Pine Trenches. His wound on the neck at the back of the head being severe. He went to Hospital at Malta and was passed for Australia as unfit, but somehow or other he was sent to overseas base at Gisa Cairo Egypt from there to Tel El Kebir thence on to France where he rejoined his Battalion. Being a first reinforcement I know Pte. Alex Don was the only person holding such a number. I cannot give you any fuller particulars re burial as we "changed over"

I the undersigned received your letter of inquiry concerning the Death of the late Private A. Don. 1509. B. Coy. 23 Battalion 6th Div. I have known the ^{late} Pte Don since leaving Australia which was on May 8. 5. 15. He was a reserved kind of person. Tall fair complexion Hair turned Grey. Pte Don also informed me that He was the Son of a "Parson" He was killed Instantaneously on our way into the trenches "for the second time" at Pozieres August of last year. I was only a few yards from Him "in the same trench" when He met His end. He was buried alongside the trench in which He met His untimely End. I cannot say if a Cross with His name on was ever erected. But I can assure you He was buried and not in a "Cemetery" Private Don was of Temperate Habits all the time I knew Him. He was also wounded on Gallipoli coming out of the Lone Pine Trenches His wound on the neck at the back of His Head being severe. He went to Hospitals at Malta & was passed for Australia as unfit but some how or other He was sent to Over Sea Base at Suez Cairo Egypt from there to Tel. El. I cannot give you any further particulars re Burial as we "changed over" in Dartness & never returned to Pozieres any more.
