Bullecourt.

He belonged to the 4th Reinforcement of the 46th Battn. I came over in the same reinforcements and so I knew him. He was observing for the bombers and got up to see what was going on and was hit by a bullet either that of a sniper or a MG., he was shot through the chest. This was in the German trench which we had to evacuate. He was lying wounded when I left him and I am pretty certain he was dead, he was a very good chap.

On 21.11.17 at Bullecourt I saw No. 2176 Private Dawson G.F. 46th Bn lying dead in a German trench which we had occupied and which we had to evacuate later. As the above man was my particular friend, I can vouch for these particulars.

Re Pte. C.F. Dawson, 2176. I have much pleasure of answering your letter and hope it will be of use to you, as far as I can tell you he was wounded very badly, and by the look of the wound, would hardly pull through. He was last seen on our side of the wire entanglement, and on account of the heavy fire, was unable to be brought in. After then nothing further was heard of him. As much of his personal appearance I can tell you is, he is fairly dark, with an old scar on his left cheek, rather full in the face, and stands about 5ft six to nine inches in height.
