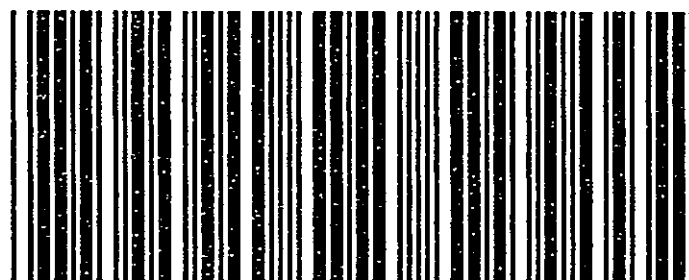

He had gone out with the white flag after a wounded man at Merris when he was sniped through the stomach. I helped to carry him in, and took him to our R.A.P. just behind Merris, he was then sent on to Borre Hospital. I know nothing of his death or burial.

"Died of Wounds 2-7-18"

Re the above named soldier. I gladly give the following particulars. He was admitted into this Hospital on the 1st ulto suffering from abdominal ~~wound~~ injuries received in action. His condition was hopeless from the first and he died the following day. He is laid to rest in the Longuenesse Cemetery, where a cross is erected to his memory. All particulars were sent to his next of kin a few days after his death.

He was in A Co. The number here is an error, the proper was 333 with a letter showing a transfer. He came from the 27th to us. He was shot while carrying a white flag, having gone out to bring in a wounded man. It was broad daylight when he was shot. He was buried at Hazebrouck and a proper cross was erected by his own mate, R.R. Montgomery, who is a Cpl. and now with the Unit. Hanley was a short, pleasant looking man, quite young, 22 or 23 and was at the time a S/B. He came from West Adelaide.

"Died of Wounds 2-7-18"

Re Pte. D.H. Hanley 3331 - A. Coy. 10th Battn., who was wounded. As he was a very old pal of mine I wrote home to his Mother, explaining all to her how he met his death. He was wounded on the 30th June this year, up on the Merris sector, whilst carrying out his duties as a Coy. B/B. One of our lads was lying out at one of the front line posts, badly wounded, and Pte. Hanley and the 3 other bearers, who were at Coy. Hqs., went out to bring him in. This was about 7 a.m. on the morning of the 30th June, and Pte. Hanley was carrying a white flag in his hand, so that they would not shoot at them, but just as they got to where the wounded lad was, Pte. Hanley got two bullets in the abdomen from German snipers, and he had to lie out in the trenches all that day, and he was conscious all the time, and he was carried in that night as soon as it was dark, and that was the last I saw or heard of him, until we were relieved from the line, then I heard that he had died on the 2nd July at a C.C.S. in St. Omer, and that he was also buried at St. Omer, and I wrote straight home to his Mother then, giving her an account of it all.

Dear Miss Deabrie a (D)

Just these few lines, to let you know that I received your letter safely, asking me if I could give you any particulars concerning how Pte D. H. Hanley, No. 3331, A. Coy, 10<sup>th</sup> Batt. A. I. F. was wounded, well I am only too pleased to be able to give you particulars of how he was wounded, as he was a very old Pal of mine, I wrote home to his Mother explaining all to her how he met his death, well to start off with, he was wounded on the 30<sup>th</sup> of June this year, up on the Morris sector, whilst carrying out his duties as a Coy Stretcher-bearer, one of our lads was lying out at one of the front line posts, badly wounded and Pte Hanley and three other bearers, who were at Coy. Headquarters went out to bring him in, this was about 7:00 on the morning of the 30<sup>th</sup> of June, and Pte Hanley was carrying a white flag in his hand, so that they wouldn't shoot at them, but just as they got to where the wounded lad was, Pte Hanley got two bullets in the abdomen from German rifles, and he had to lay out in the trench all that day, and he was conscious all the time, and he was carried in that night as soon as it was dark, and that was the last I seen or heard of him, until we were relieved from the line, then I heard that he had died on the 2<sup>nd</sup> of July at a 4<sup>th</sup> Cabin in St. Omer, and that he was also buried at St. Omer.

and I wrote straight home to his Mother then giving her an account of all I will I think this is all the information that I can give you concerning him, so I will now draw these few lines to a close.
