

Crane had a piece of his face carried away by a 75 shell at Lone Pine, on 7th August. Private Martin Gallagher, D.Coy., 3rd Battalion, saw this happen. Gallagher told witness he was sure Crane was too much damaged to live. Witness knew Crane well and described him as a dark, thick-set fellow, who came from Surrey Hills, N.S.W.

Visitor's Note: Please refer to my former report on J.J. Crane, dated 5th June given by Pte. T. Eaglesham. My Informant wrote at once to a friend to find out the correct Regimental numbers of the Pte. Crane who was shot through the cheek after the Lone Pine charge, and who got on all right afterwards. He tells me to-day that he has heard it was 1439 so that it cannot be the same man.

We much regret the delay in answering your enquiry for Corporal J. Thornhill Crane, 3rd Battalion, who is reported as "Missing 7-12/8/15" at A.I.F. Headquarters, and the very few details we can supply.

From several unofficial reports we are led to believe that Corporal Crane was very severely wounded in the head on 7th August just after the Lone Pine charge, when the Battalion was stationed in the third trench in the firing line, and that he died very soon afterwards. At this terrible time of stress it was almost impossible for the men to take notice of what was happening to their comrades, but Private C. Lambkin, 2165, now returned to Sydney, stated that Corporal Crane was only three men away from him at the time, and he saw the body of Corporal Crane being carried away by his comrades.

Trusting that the knowledge that Corporal Crane died gallantly in the famous Lone Pine charge will be of a little comfort to his friends

We have been asked by Miss Jessie Perrin of Balham to add to our list the name of Pte. J.R. Crane 2121 3rd Battalion, A.I.F and to send information to you. The name has been on our list for some time and all possible enquiries have been made. Below you will find some unofficial report from our searchers -

2165 Pte. C. Lambkin, 3rd Battalion, 6th Rfts, A.I.F. states "on 7th August just after the Lone Pine Charge, Crane was in the 3rd trench with informant and was killed by a shell. The men were stationed in the firing line at the time. Informant was only three men away from Crane and saw his body taken away.

3120 Pte. W.L. Carney, 3rd Battalion, 6th Rfts, states - About the 7th August, the day after the Lone Pine Charge, informant went into a trench in the second line at Lone Pine. He there saw the body of Crane, who had just died as the result of a bullet wound in the head. Informant was a tent-mate of Crane's and in the

same platoon."

Then we have another report from 2191 Pte. C.P. Wilson, B. Company, 3rd Battalion, but we are not sure that this refers to your friend as there appear to have been two Cranes in the Battalion. You will be able to tell this, however, better than we can as he adds a description - "Crane was wounded by a 75 shell at Lone Pine on August 7th. Pte. Martin Gallagher, D. Company, 3rd Battalion, saw this happen. Gallagher told witness he was sure Crane was too much damaged to live. Witness knew Crane well and described him as a dark thick set fellow who came from Surrey Hills, N.S.W."

We trust that all these particulars may be of some help to you.
